## The observation and explanation

## of natural phenomena.

What is science??? Reactions labs and dissecting make up only a part. Projects and presentations are standard curriculum including such projects as making machines from five of the six simple machines, toothpick bridges, posters on AIDS and element presentations. Scientific procedure is studied in all courses through labs. Biology often dissects plants, fetal pigs, sharks and other forms of life. Physical Science and Chemistry does microscale chemistry, reactions which are done on a small scale.

THE REAL WORLD is what the science classes are focusing on more. Students become environmentally aware by learning how harmful chemicals damage the earth and how the low efficiency of some machines wastes a considerable amount of energy

## The learning of non-native speech.

What is foreign languages? French. Spanish and German are the three foreign longuages offered in Nuemberg. All of these courses go to the AP level. When taking a language class, students aren't limited to just learning the language, they live the culture as well. Sampling the fine cuisine from the countries is a common (and well liked) activity in the courses. Ms. Glenn's Spanish classes often have fiestas so they can sample various kinds of Hispanic dishes. What is Video Production? Upon first entering Video Production, students are introduced to the techniques of operating a video camera. Budding Spielbergs then learn various camera angles and shots, head room and white balance, lighting and special effects. After planning a script and storyboard, these high school cameramen are ready for their first production which they shoot and edit. The real work begins here. Editing involves studying raw footage frame by frame then cutting and fitting frames together to make a cohesive and creative production. Students find that a three-minute production can take an hour of raw footage and at least ten hours of editing. Students also learn how to do a short animation and this year they are producing soap operas as special projects.

What is Home Economics? This year, the Home Economics department offered three courses to students: Foods I Foods II, and, for the first time in several years, Sewing. Students in Foods I gained experience in the basics of cooking. They studied nutrition, meal planning, careers, and terminology and utensils. They created cookies, cream puffs, and home-cooked meals. In Foods II advanced students continue studying these subject but in more depth. Chefs in Foods II also prepare more complicated meals like those that might be served in restaurants. They create soups from scratch, homemade breads and cakes, pizza, salads, and fancy meat and dairy entrees.

## The Study of Military Science

What is AJROTC? Cadets entering their first year of Army Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps learn basic military history, drill, procedures, and ceremony. During class, students complete lessons from the "Blue Book," present oral reports, learn marching and manual drills, drill with weapons, and conduct and participate in inspections. Students who do well in the program and continue to more advanced training in subsequent years have opportunities from promotion in rank and, possibly, easier access to the military or to a military college.

AJROTC members perform many ceremonies for school functions outside the classroom. Color Guard presents the Colors at sports events and other occasions. Drill and rifle teams compete in USAEUR contests. AJROTC also takes off-campus field trips to places like the M-16 range and visitors to the classroom, like the CPR instructors, help train cadets

What is AVID? AVID is a new college-preparatory program in DoDDS which teaches students proper study habits and college entry skills. NAHS was one of the four high schools in Germany offering the course to freshmen as a pilot program. AVID increases the chances of students entering and surviving a four-year college.

The 23 freshmen involved in AVID were selected last year on the basis of grades, teacher recommendations, and test scores. Each student had to demonstrate in future college attendance and sign a contract agreeing to $21 / 2$ hours of homework nightly. Further requirements include maintaining a notebook, participating in biweekly tutorial groups, and enrolling in rigorous courses.

On Mondays and Wednesdays, students study basic skills such as math and writing, note taking, textbook surveying, listening, speed reading, and organizing. Note taking follows the Cornell system. On Tuesdays and Thursdays, AVID freshmen participate in tutorial groups led by college students and upperclass students. The tutors job is to lead the discussion and help AVID kids come up with the answers. Fridays are reserved for guest career speakers, authorities on making it to college, or field trips. This year's students visited The University of Maryland at Augsburg and Dachau concentration camp. Students also completed a research paper comparing and contrasting their choices of two top colleges. "This program will help whomever is in it to prepare for college," said student Monica Hernandez.

What is desktop publishing? For one thing, Desktop Publishing is a new course at Nuernberg American High School offered for the first time second semester by Ms. Slattery.
