## Guidance Helps Students Help Themselves

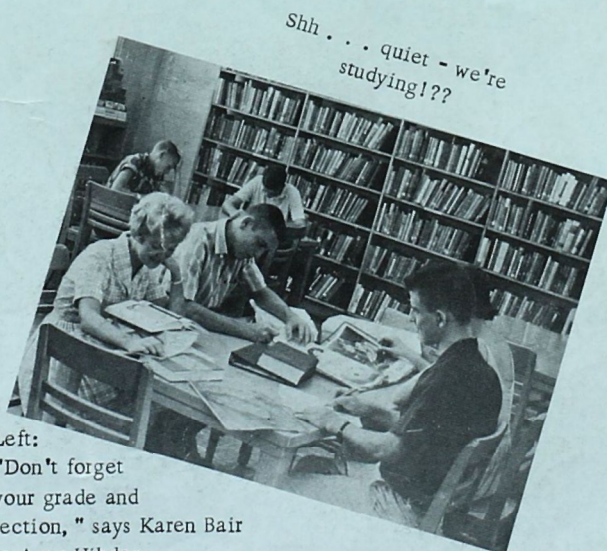

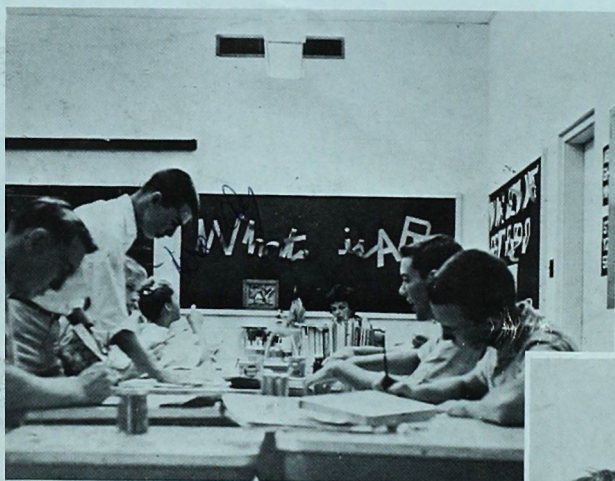

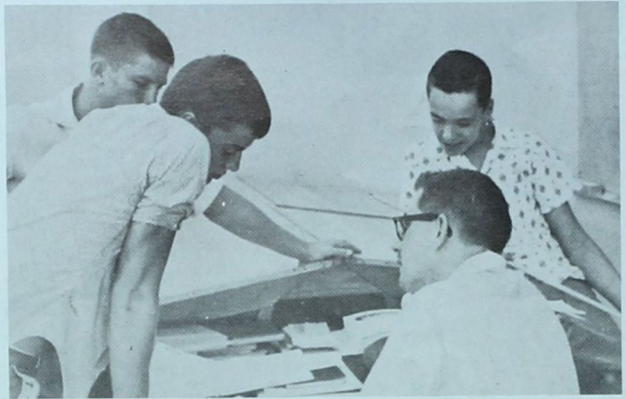




## Industrial Art Pursuits

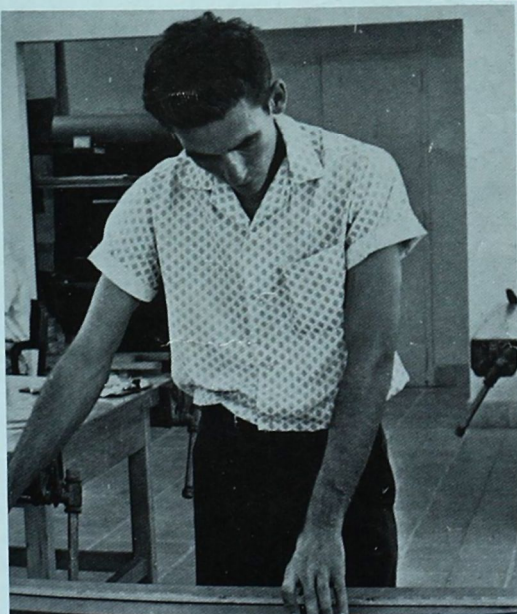

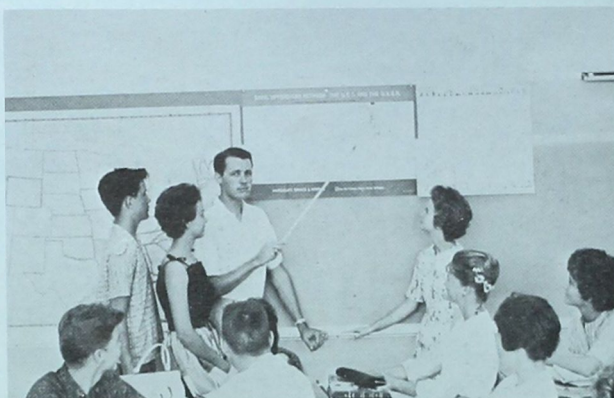

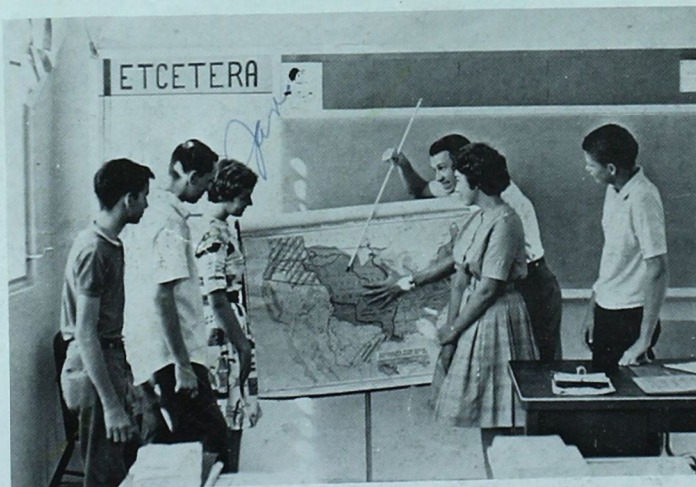

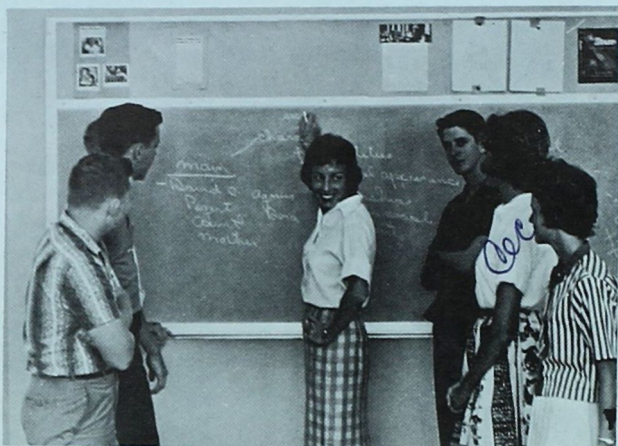

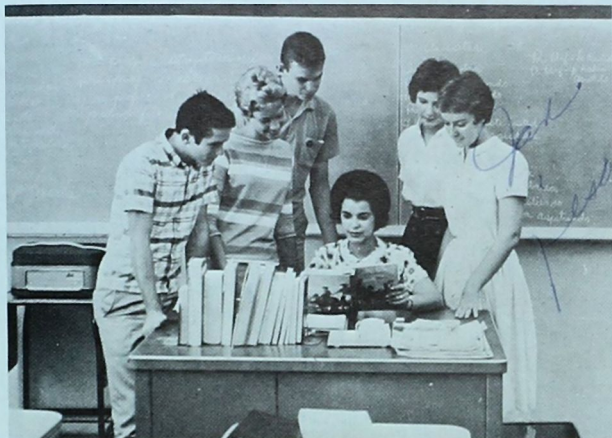
For students who wished to improve their speaking ability a half semester of speech was offered, and the second semester gave our actors and actresses a chance to display their dramatic talents.

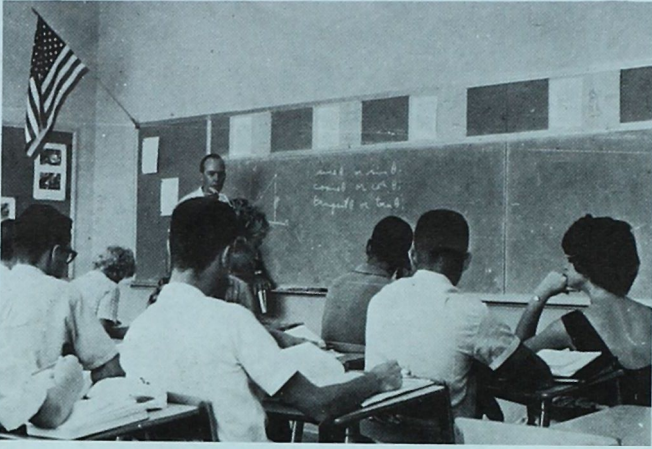

In a few years you'll look back and see what mathematics has given you: a logical and inquiring mind, greater understanding of the world about you, and a ruined report card.

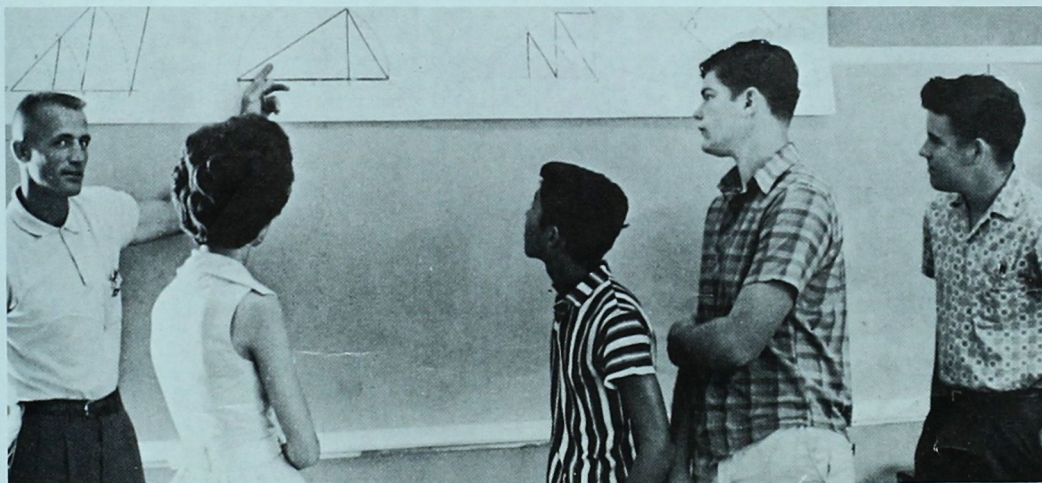
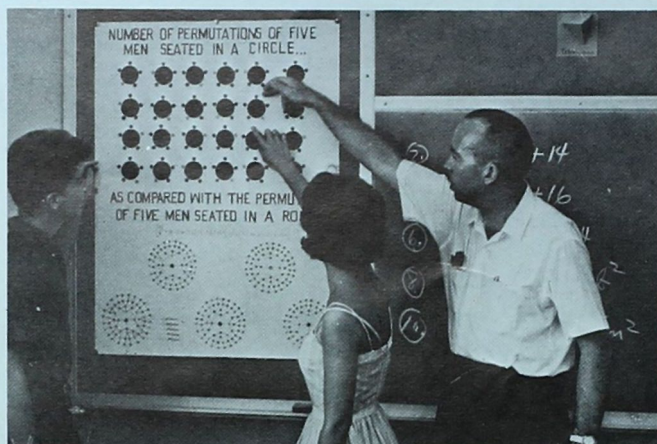

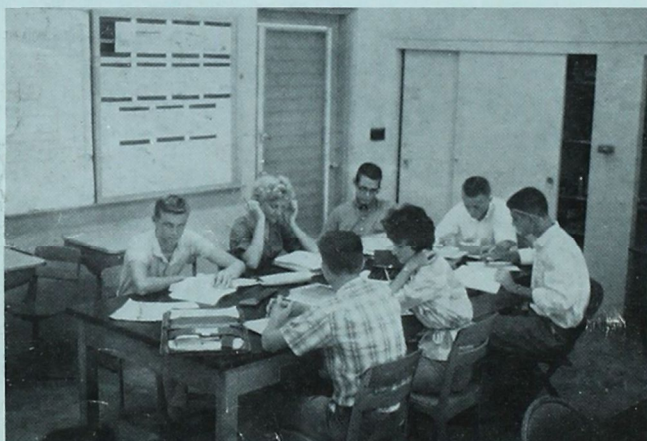


## Insight to Science Is the Key to Life

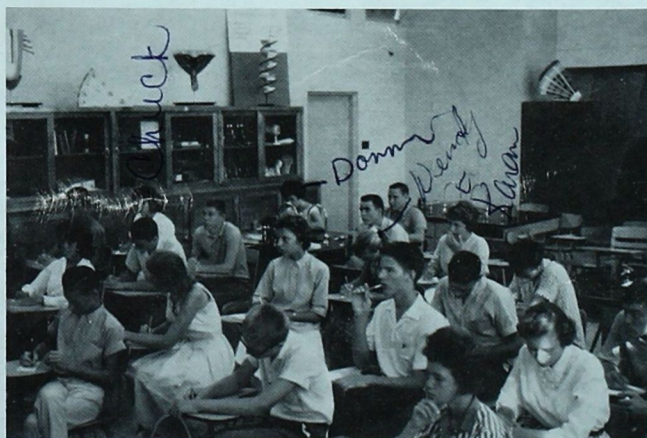

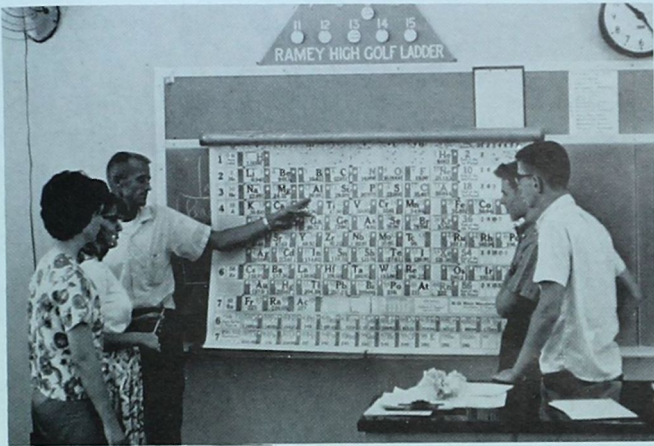

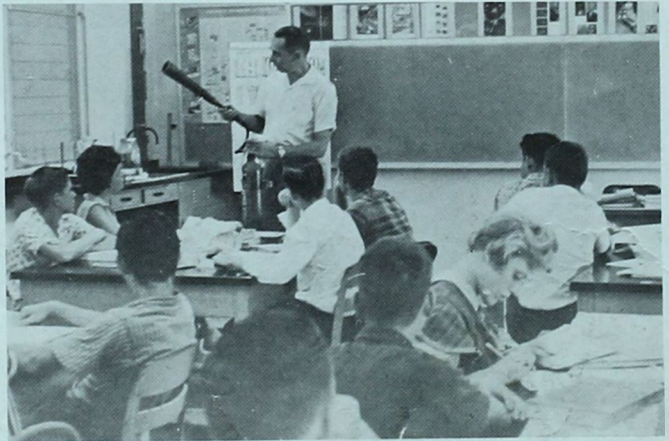

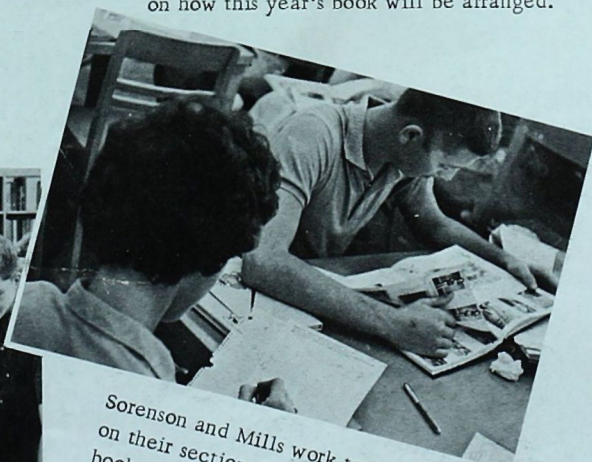

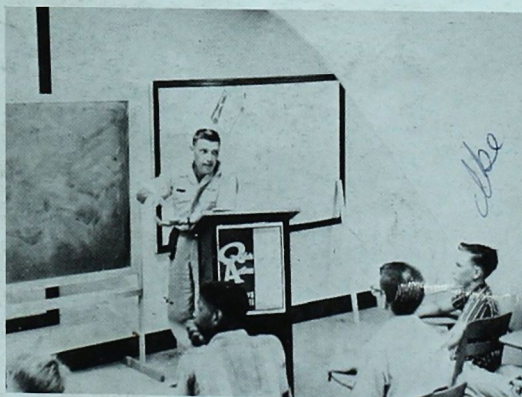

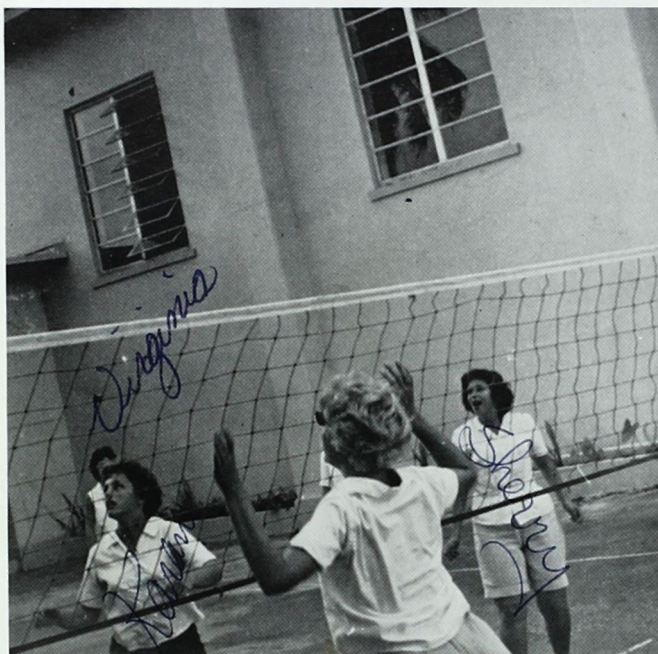

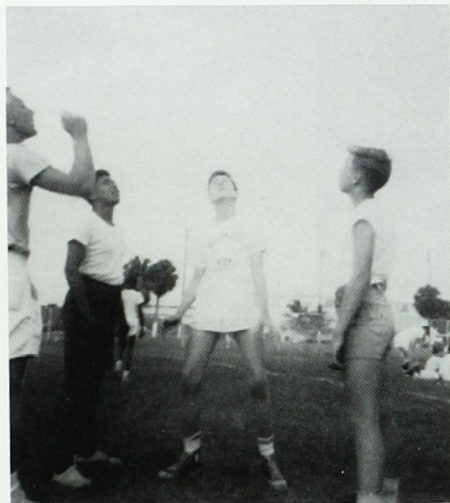

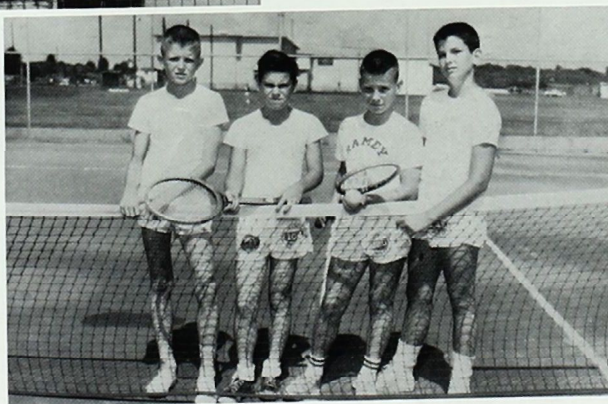

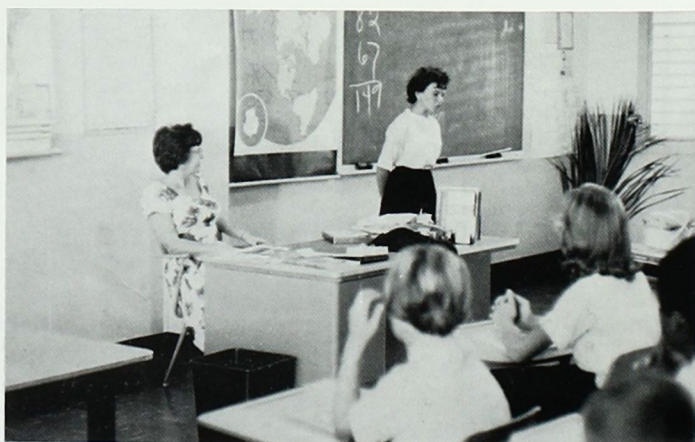
