
For three decades, teenagers everywhere have donned their long, baggy shorts and shades to spend the day at the beach. More people have adopted this

look and it has intensified with the increase in popularity of the sport of surfing.





Although rock may be pop-
















THE BIG

After this great day at the beach, most went home tired and a little sunburned but looking forward to the coming of other sports this year and to next year's fall sports.








FIFTH GRADERS - GOIN' FOR THE GUSTO








A privilege brought once again to Puerto Rico this year by the International Surfing Association, the Amature World Surfing Contest was held here at Ramey Base from February 11th to the 22nd. This contest not only brought changes to our community, as it did Rincon in 1968, but also drew crowds of over 2,000 people in one single weekend day. Though Ramey Base was put in the public eye, there were also disadvantages; including pollution, traffic jams, and minor accidents.

Puerto Rico was expected to do very well in this year's contest, as well as Australia and Brazil. But, the Puerto Rican team consisted of mainly bigger-wave riders that did not get along too well in the 3' to 5' foot surf that took place in the elev-

en day span. The PR team got off to a shaky start, but picked up soon after, with the help of such team members as Alberto Licha, Eric Fridman, Juan Ashton, and Evaristo Merced. Puerto Rico finished sixth in the final standings with first place going to the Australians, second to the United States, third to Brazil, fourth to Hawaii, fifth to French Polynesia, and, edge out of the sixth place standing, New Zealand came in seventh.

Guy Ashton, head of the world Surfing Titles 1988, stated that "Australia dominated from the start, due to a well balanced team, but they had some tough competition in the U.S. and Brazil."

are a lot like Australia's; had some good days and some bad.




