Catch the Wave

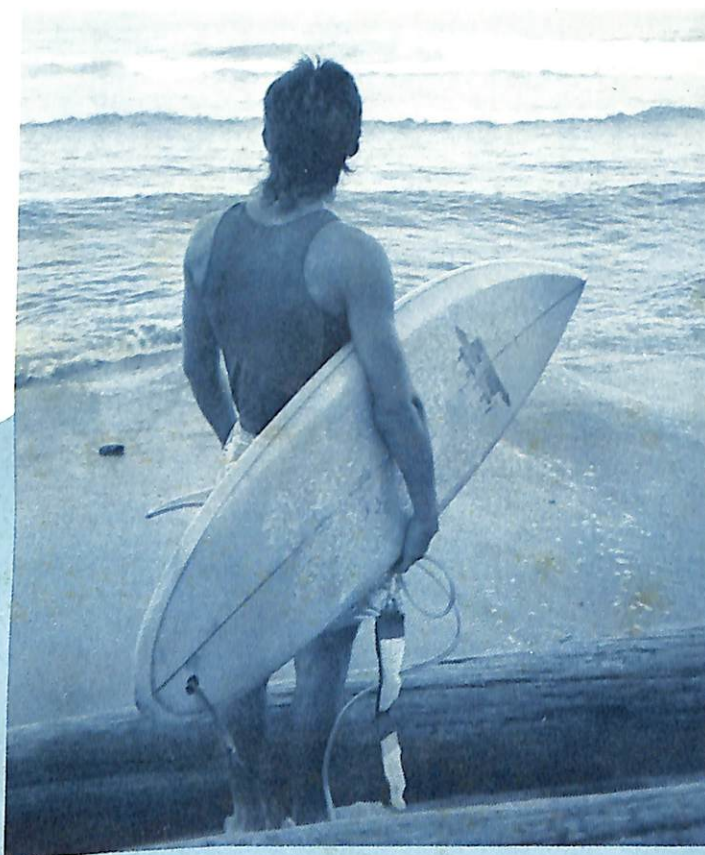

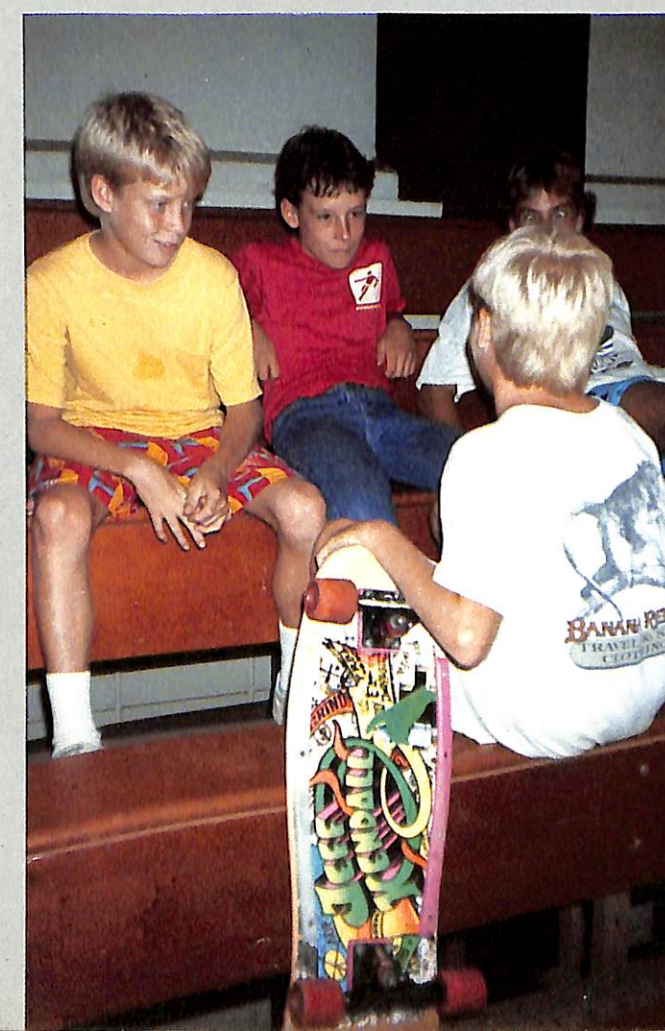
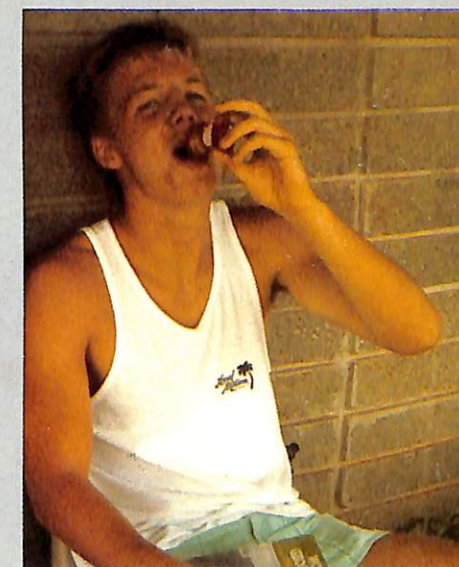
For three decades, teenagers everywhere have donned their long, baggy shorts and shades to spend the day at the beach. More people have adopted this

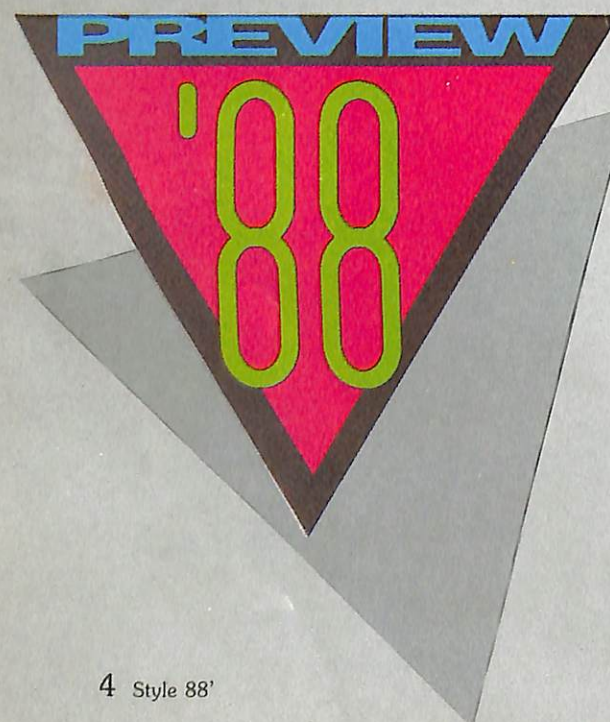

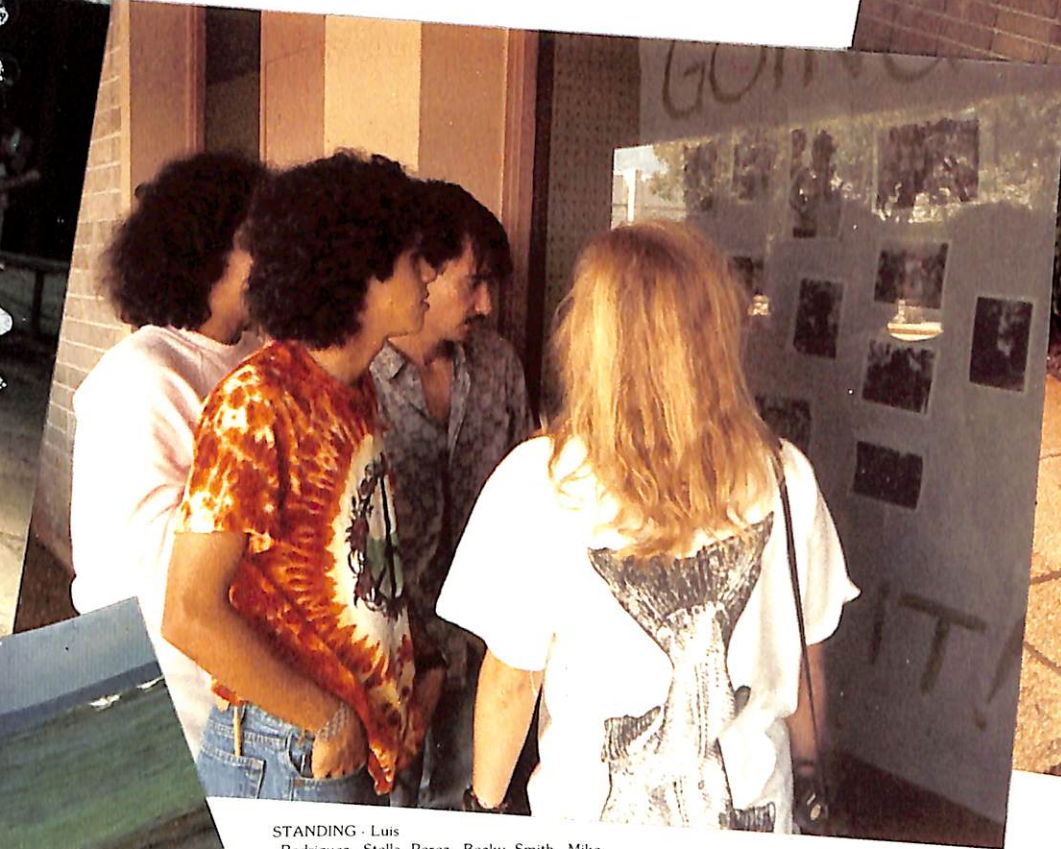

After a day at the beach, a stop on the way home might

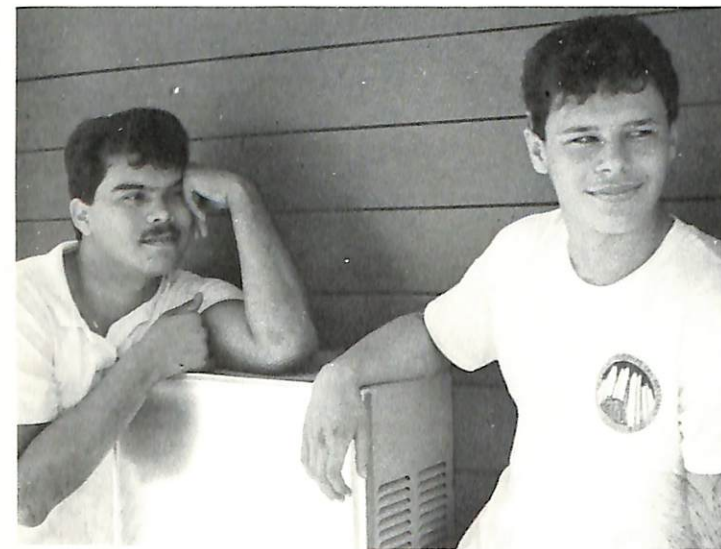
be at Wendy's. It is a cool place to enjoy a hot hamburger, fries, and a cold frosty. For students from the mainland it is a taste of home's typical fast food.

At night or right after school, a popular place to go is the Pizza Parlor. It is walking distance from any where on Ramey Base, especially from

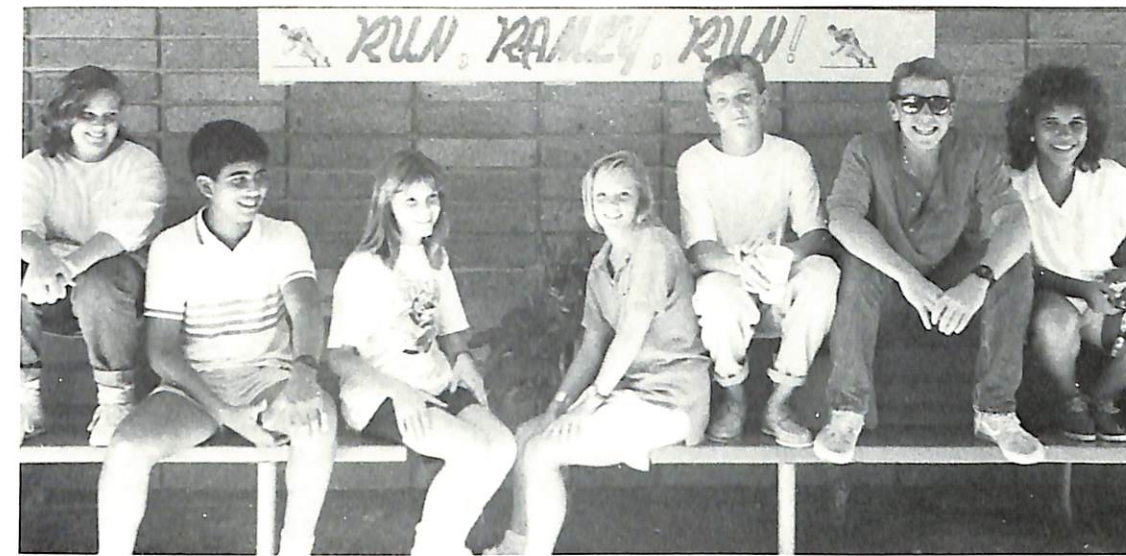
school.

A hang out doesn't have to be a public place everyone goes. It may be just a couple of friends over at someone's house.

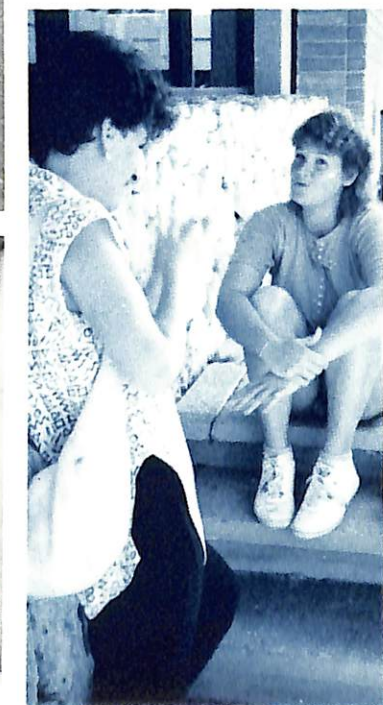
No matter where students from Ramey school hung out they were sure to be having fun.

After this great day at the beach, most went home tired and a little sunburned but looking forward to the coming of other sports this year and to next year's fall sports.

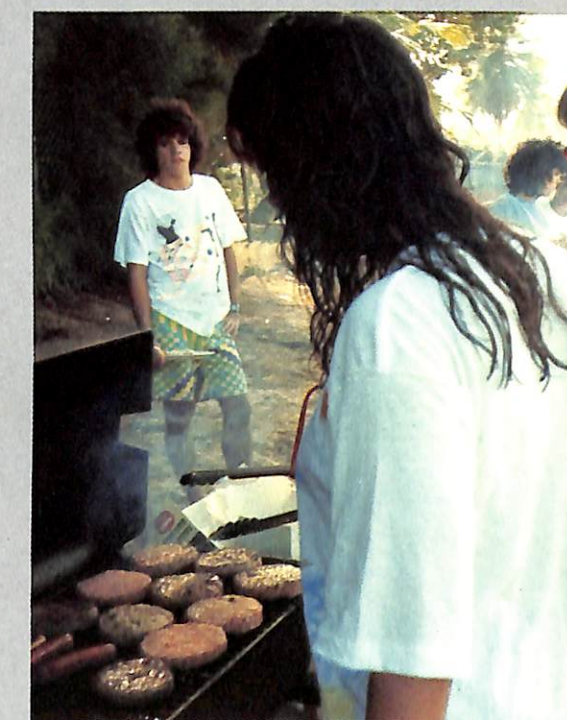
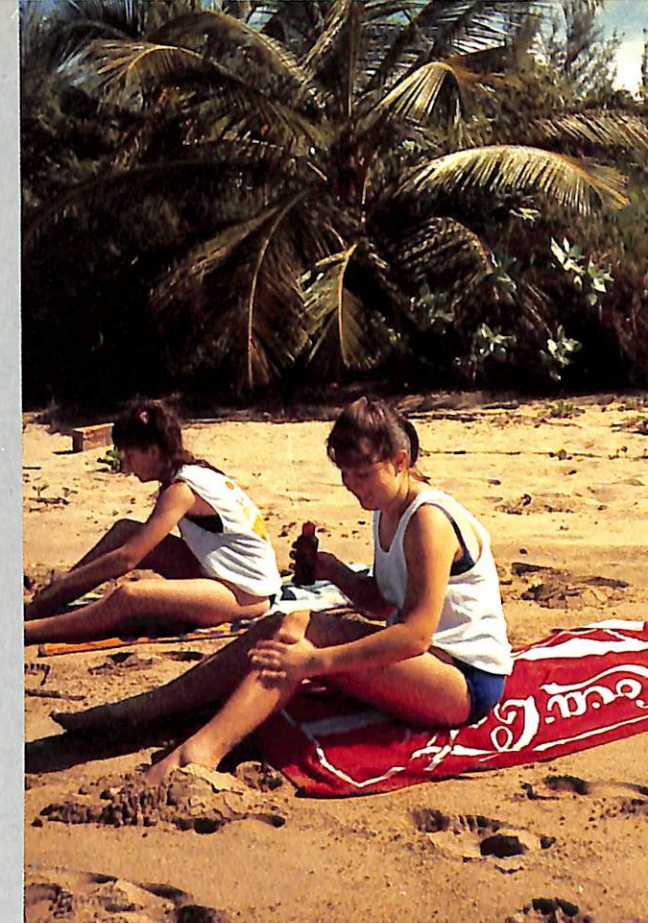

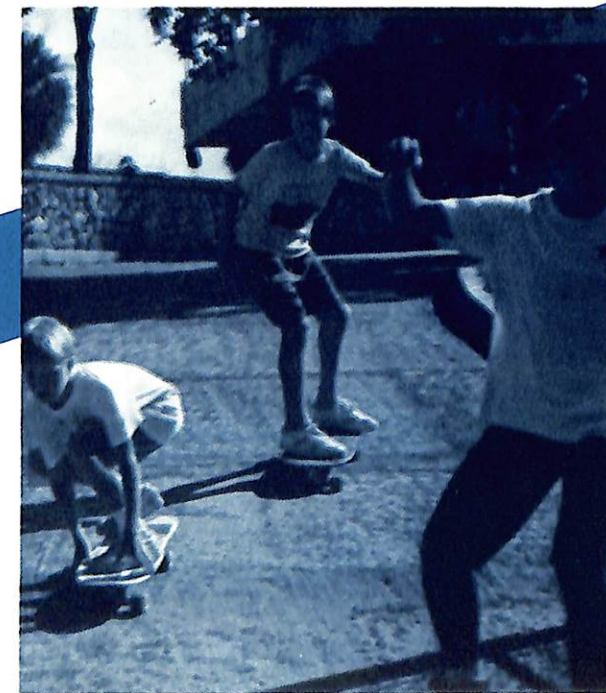
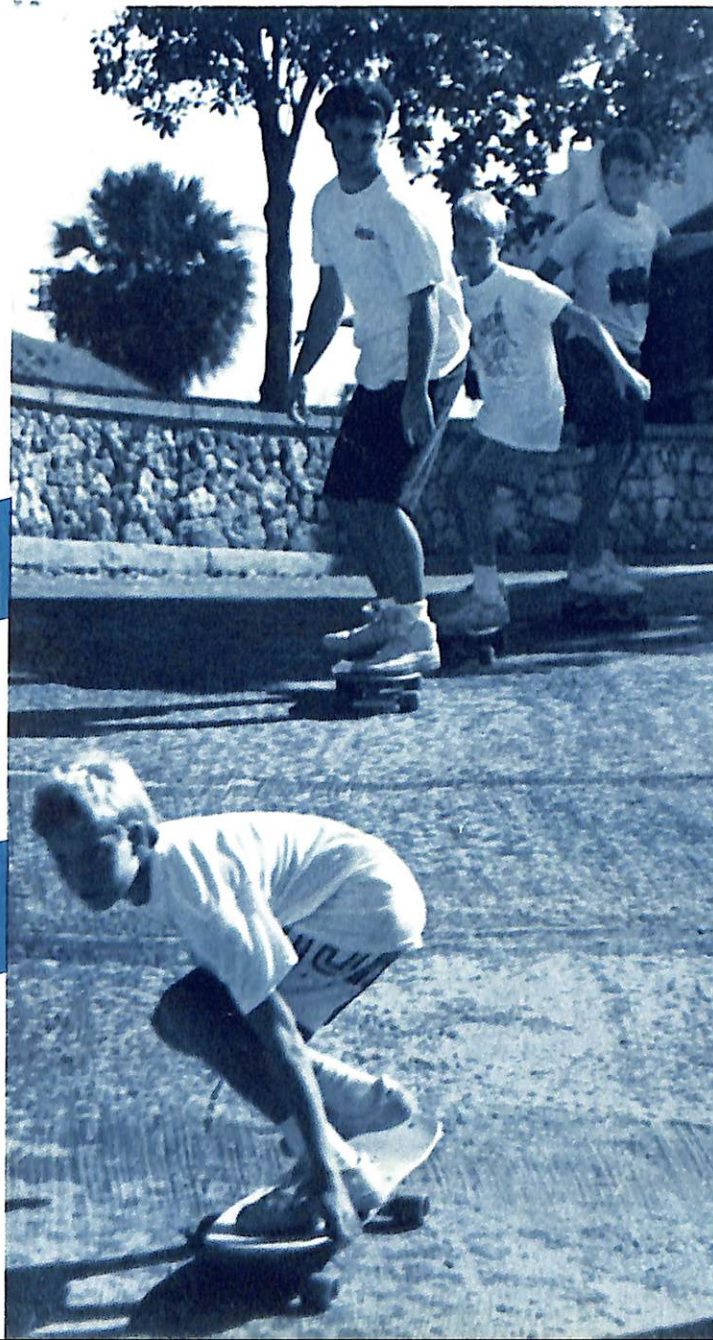
and competitions show the talent and skill of skateboarders.

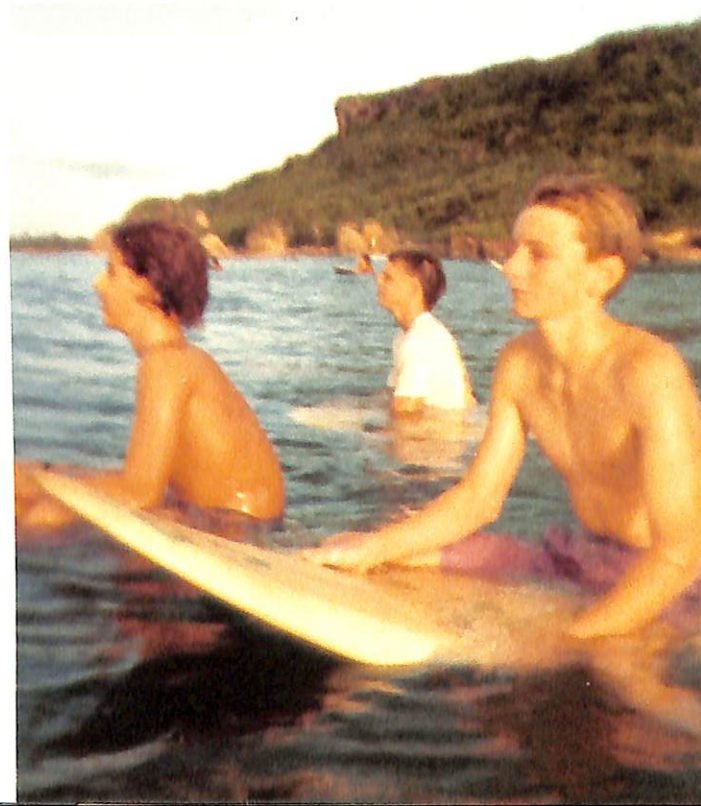
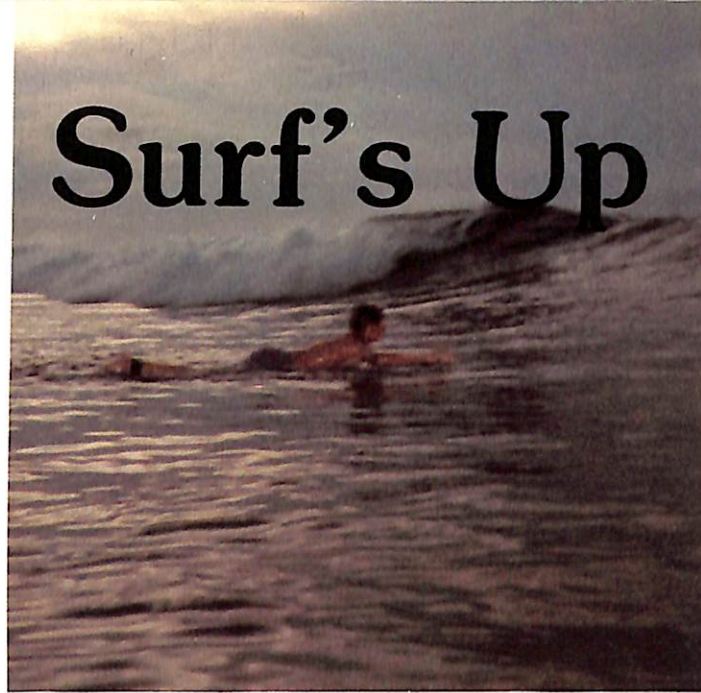

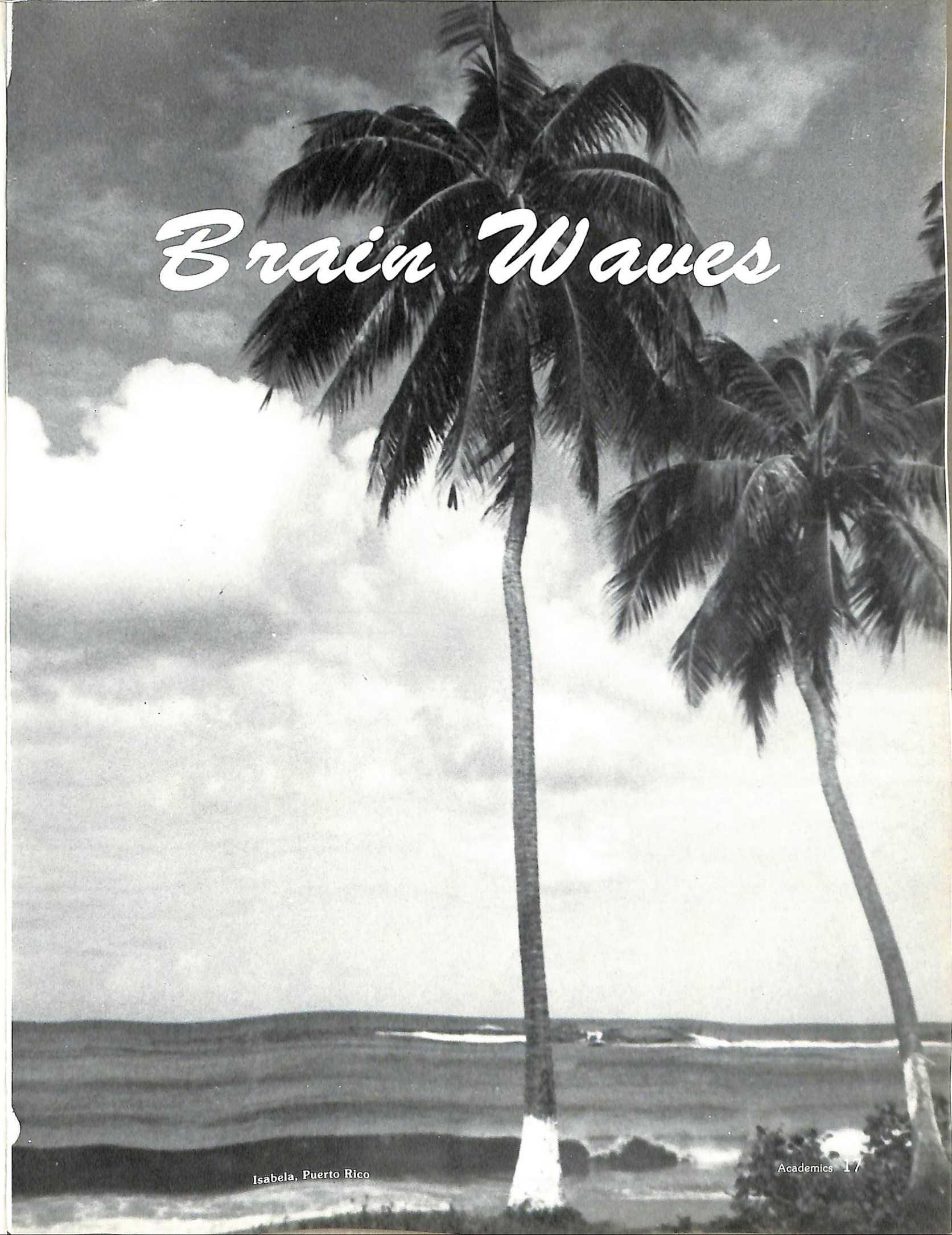

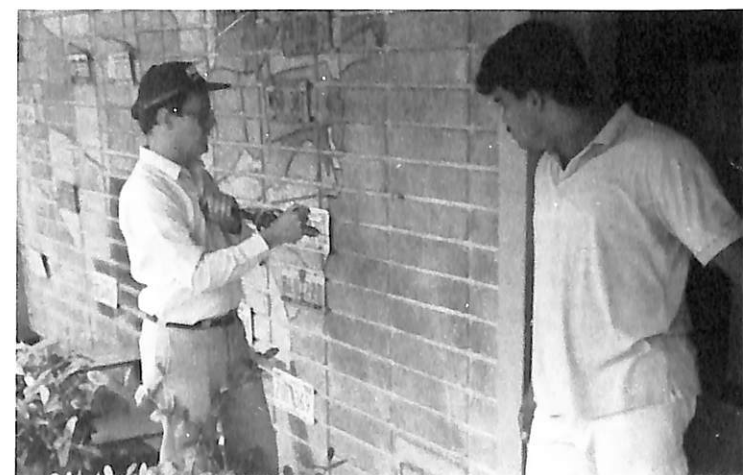

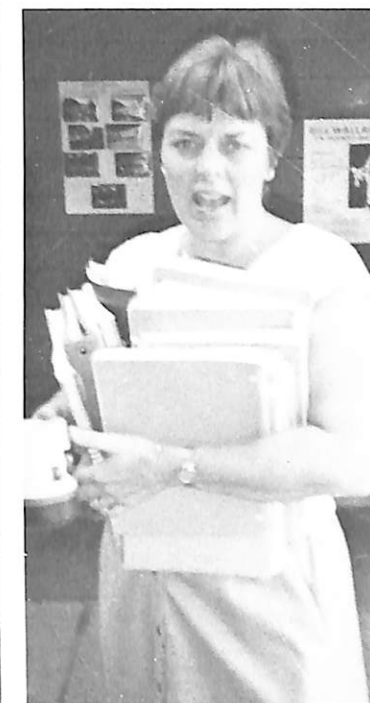

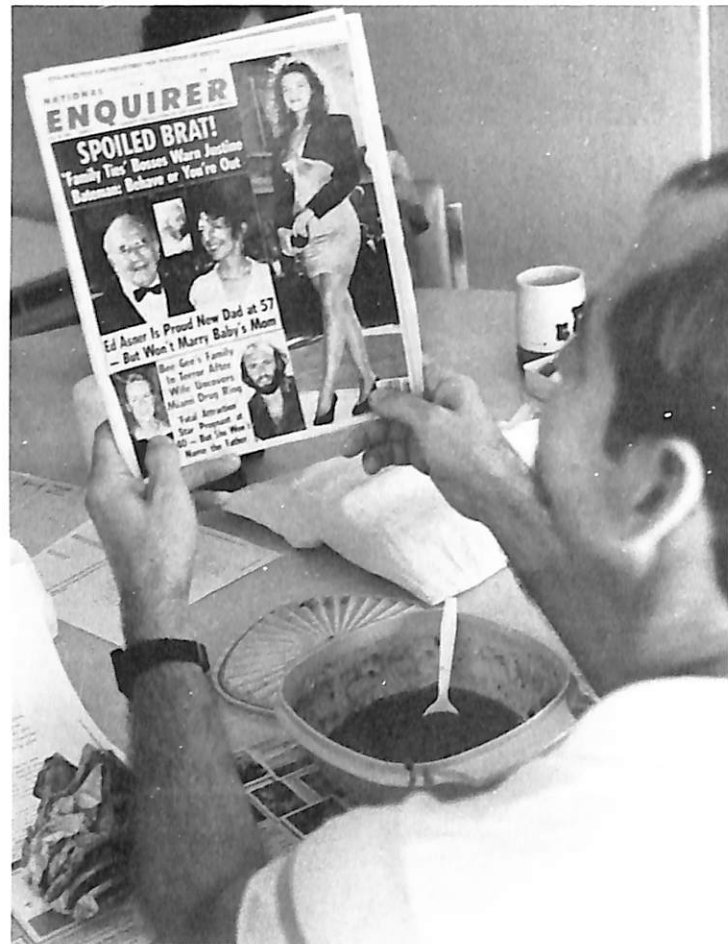

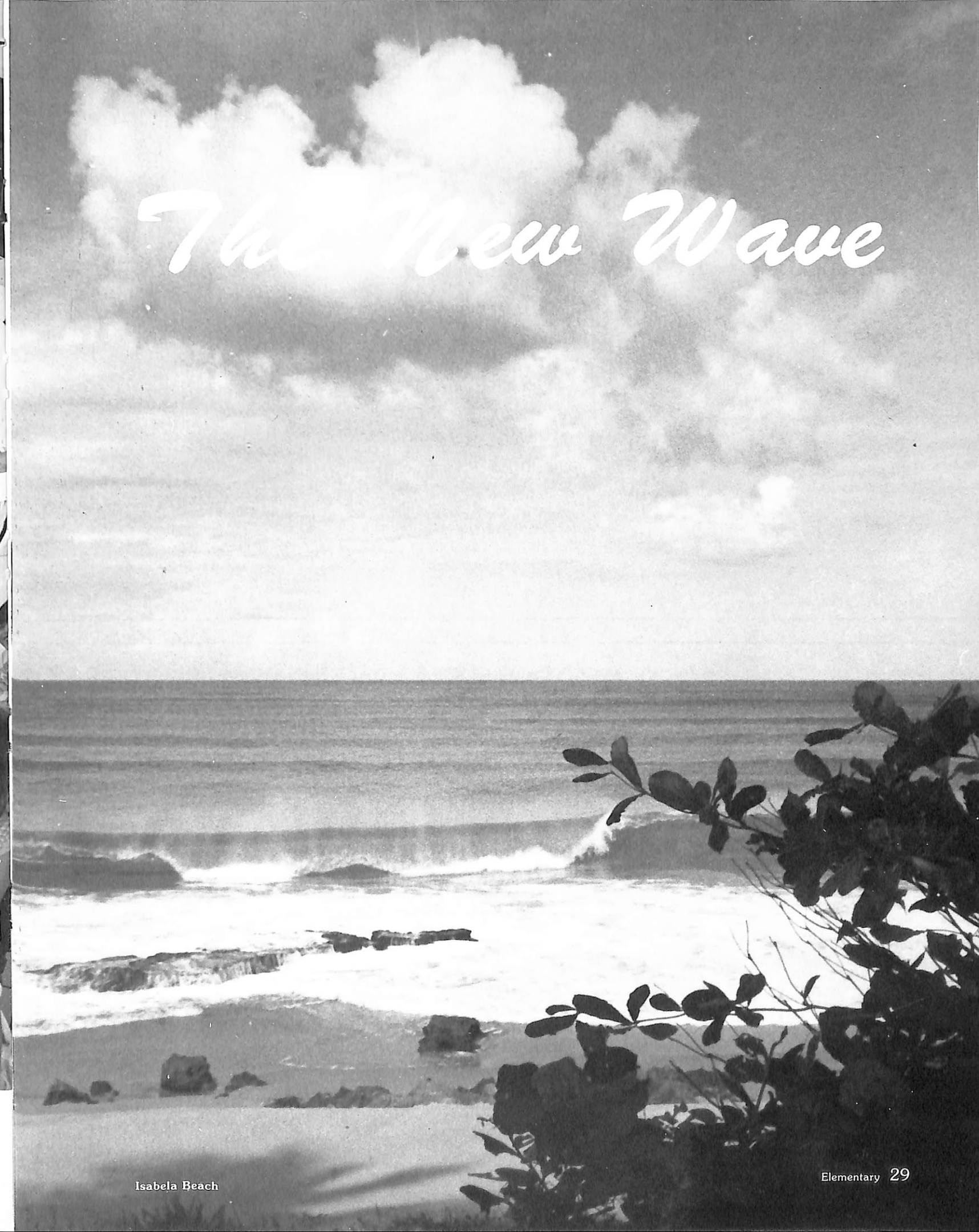
They Came to the Rescue

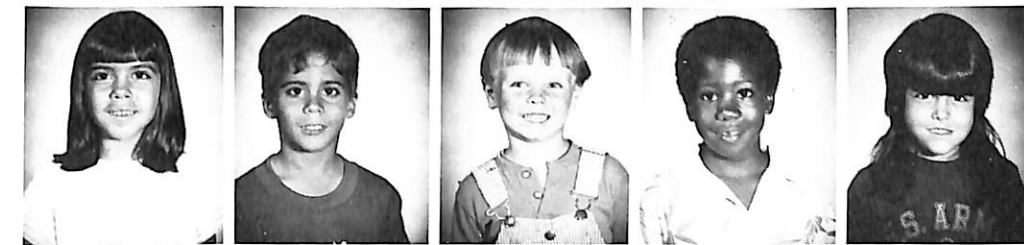

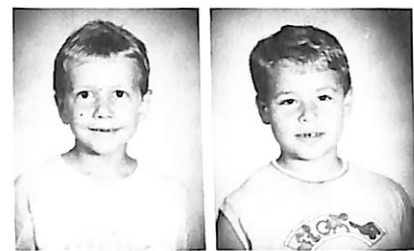
Mr. Conklin had a lot of fun with his class, he said, although sometimes he felt like dipping little Justin Lee in the fish pond.

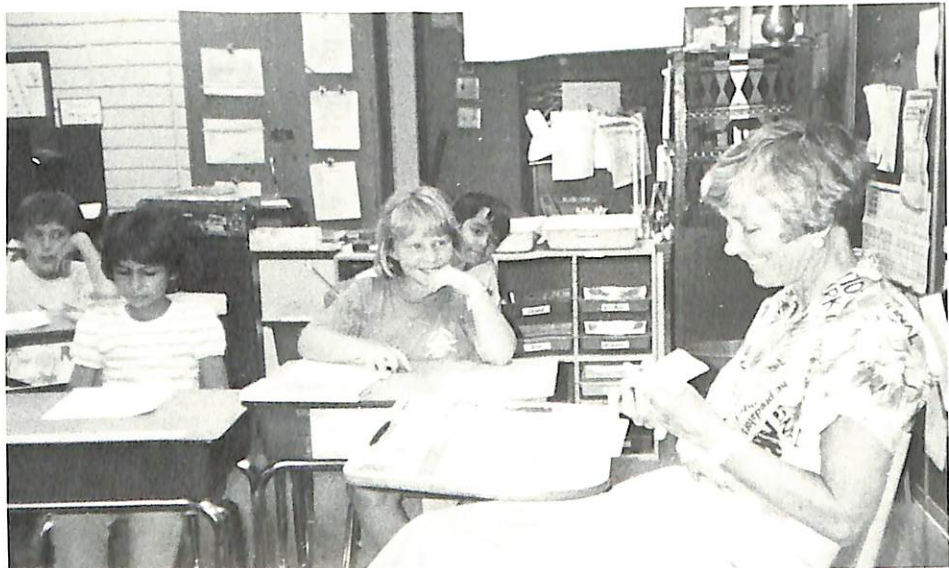

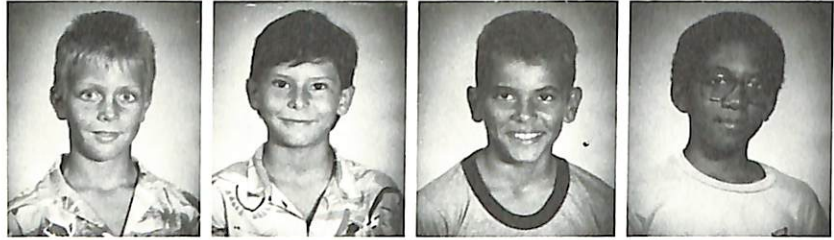

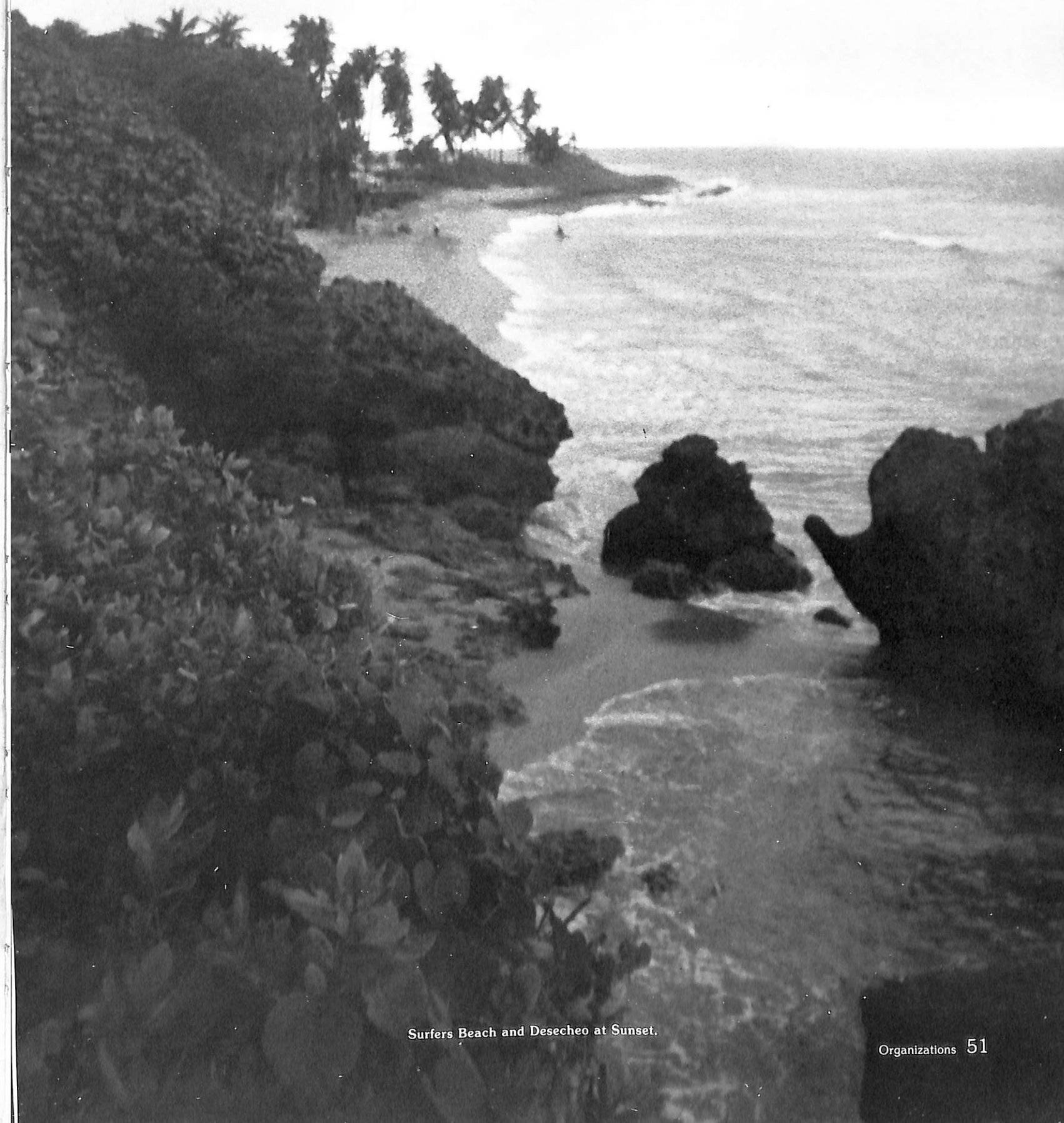

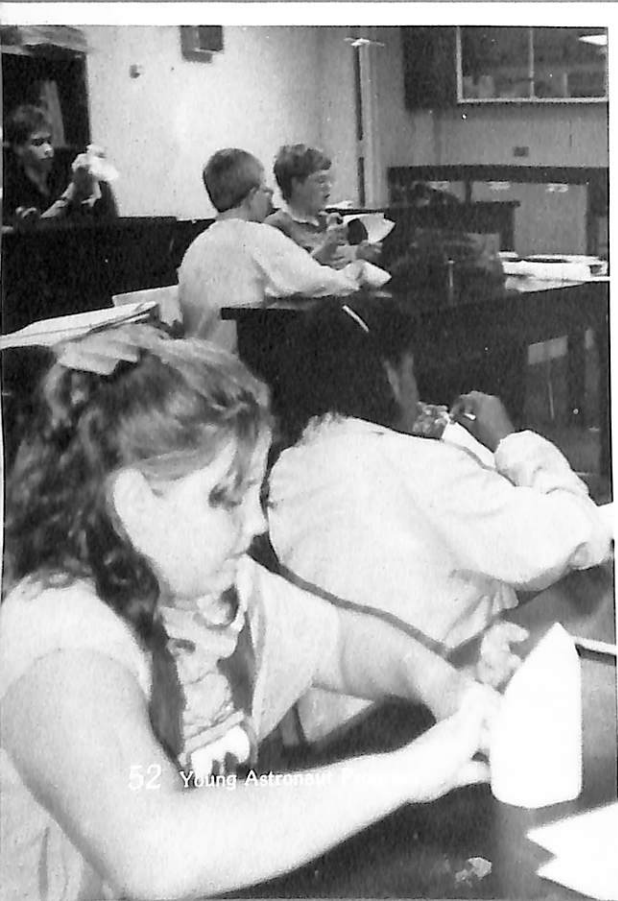

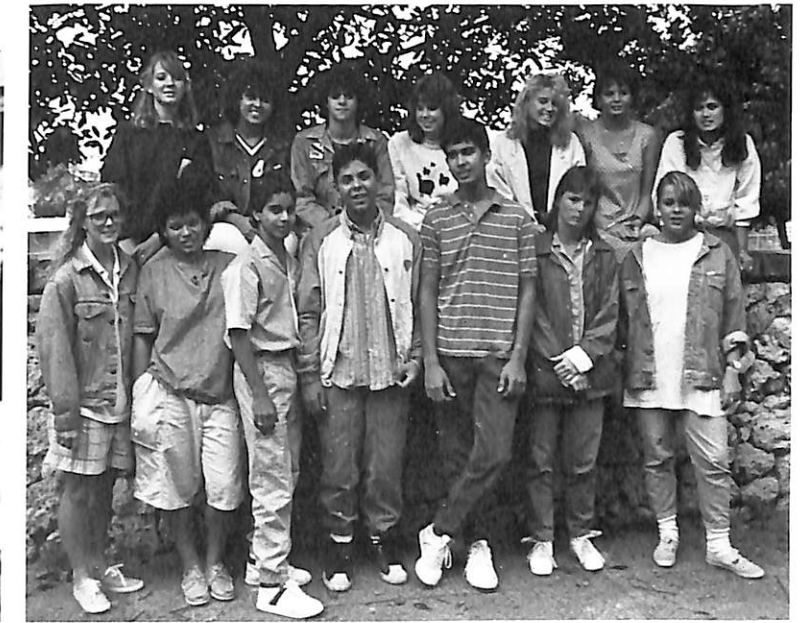

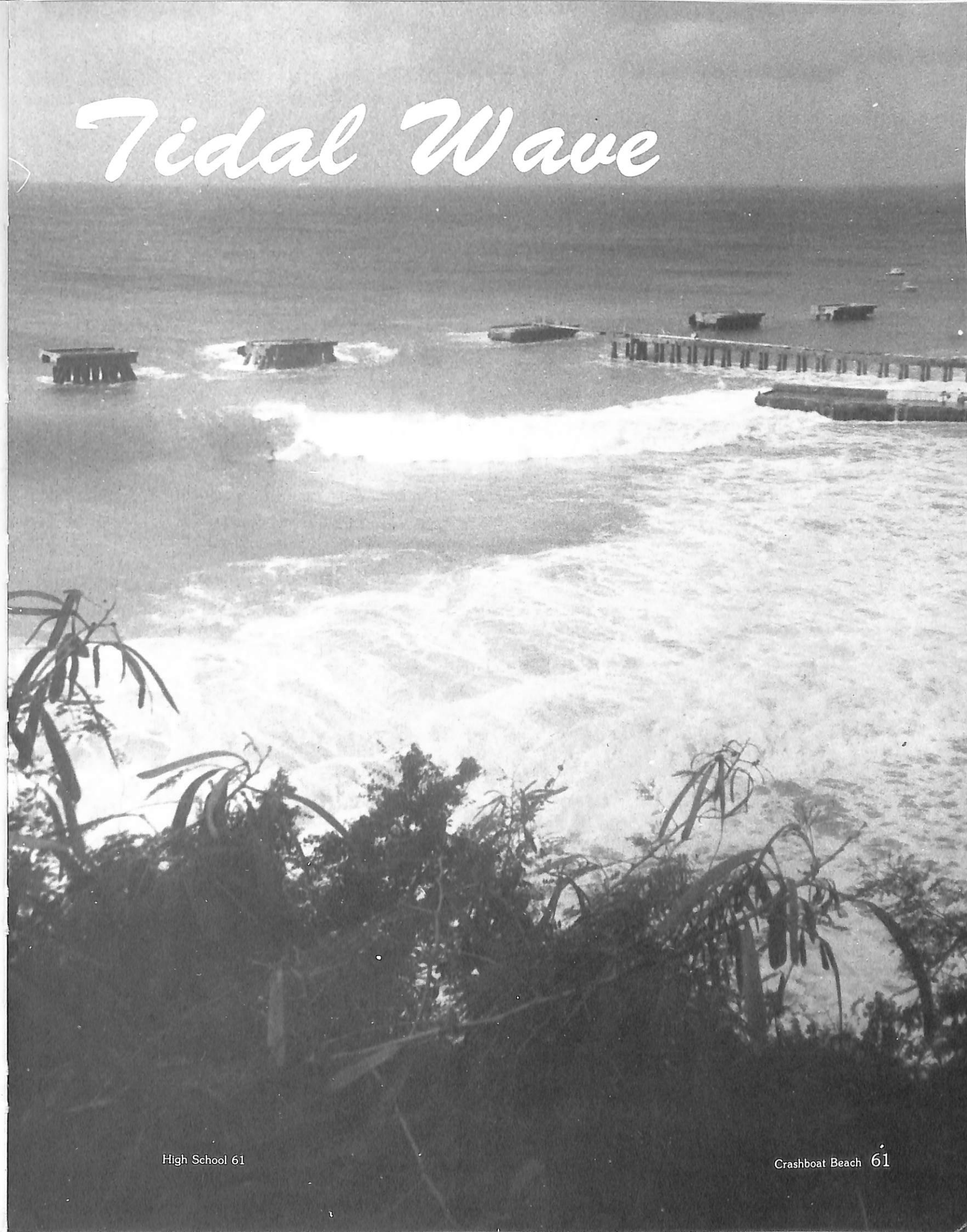

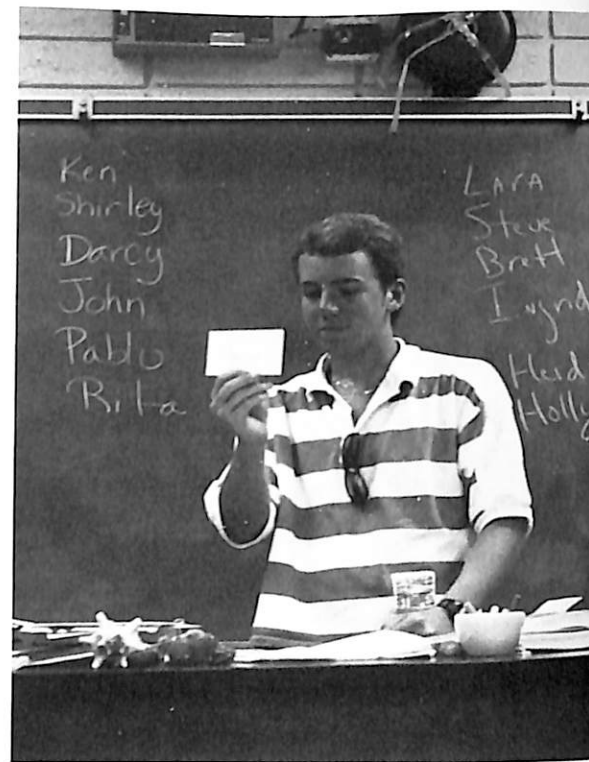
Juniors prep for prom

But they didn't get off that easy; many juniors began pre-

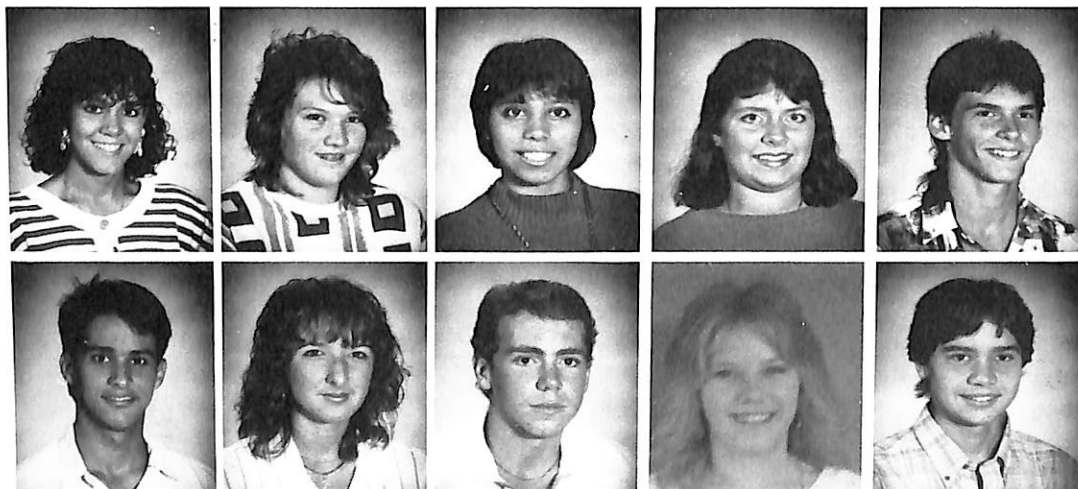

Fearing a neck injury the coaches and Mrs. Conklin didn't want to move him until

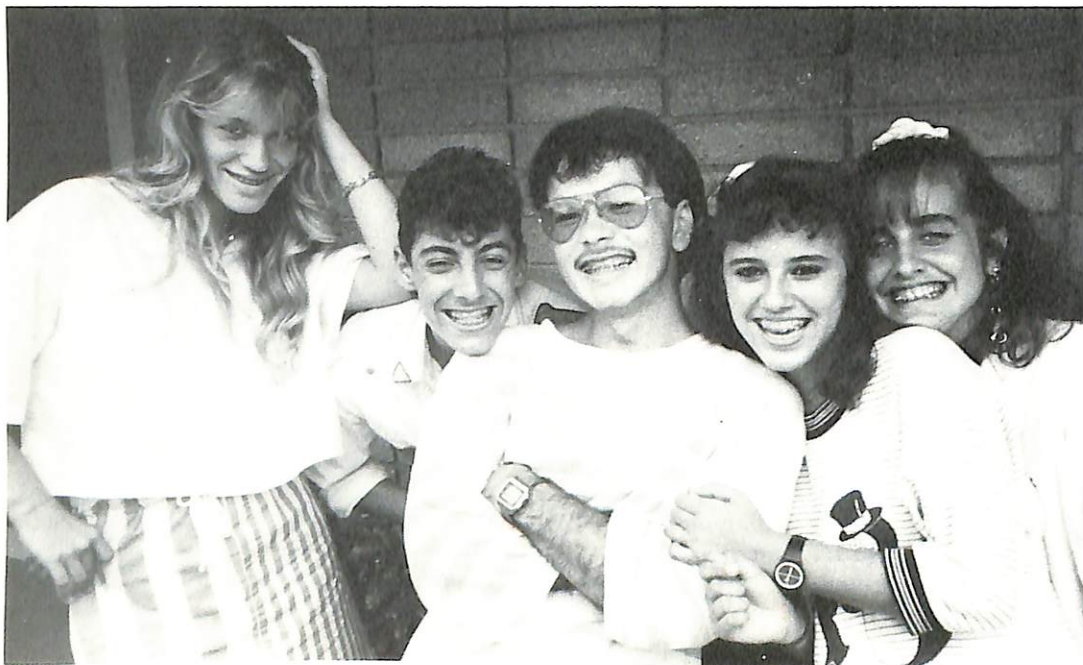
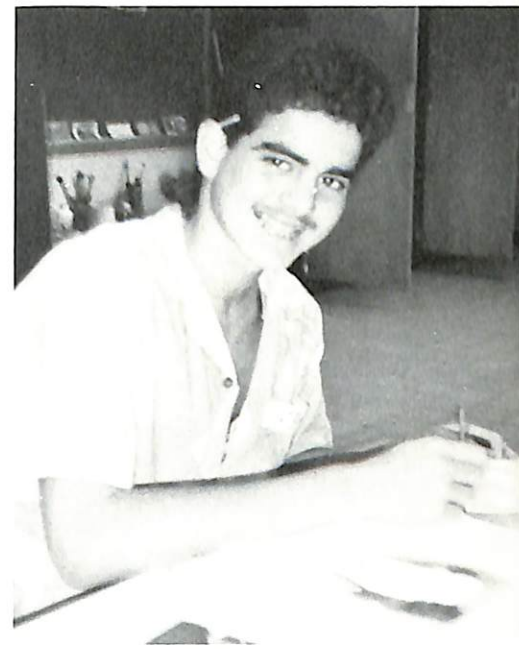
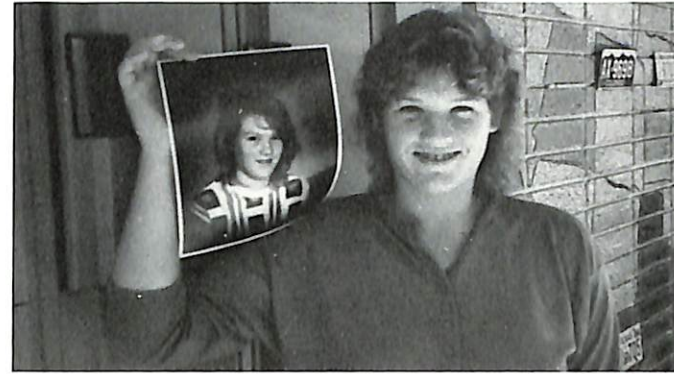

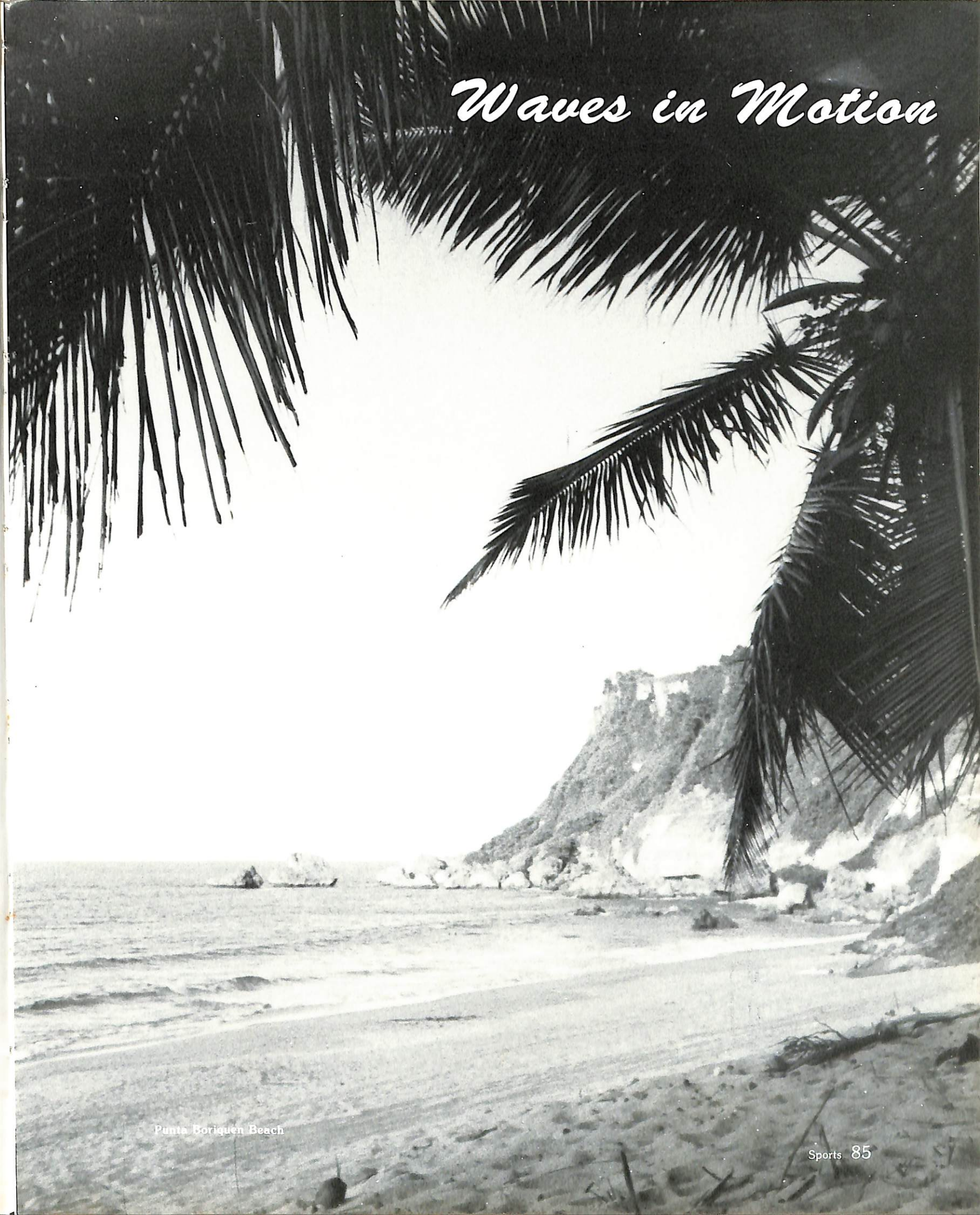

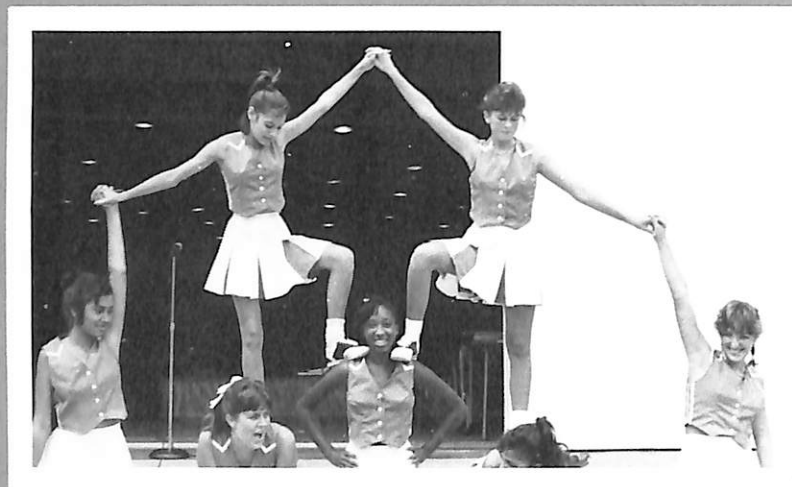
Sponsoring Spirit Week, in which students were encouraged to dress accordingly to the named day, gave the girls a

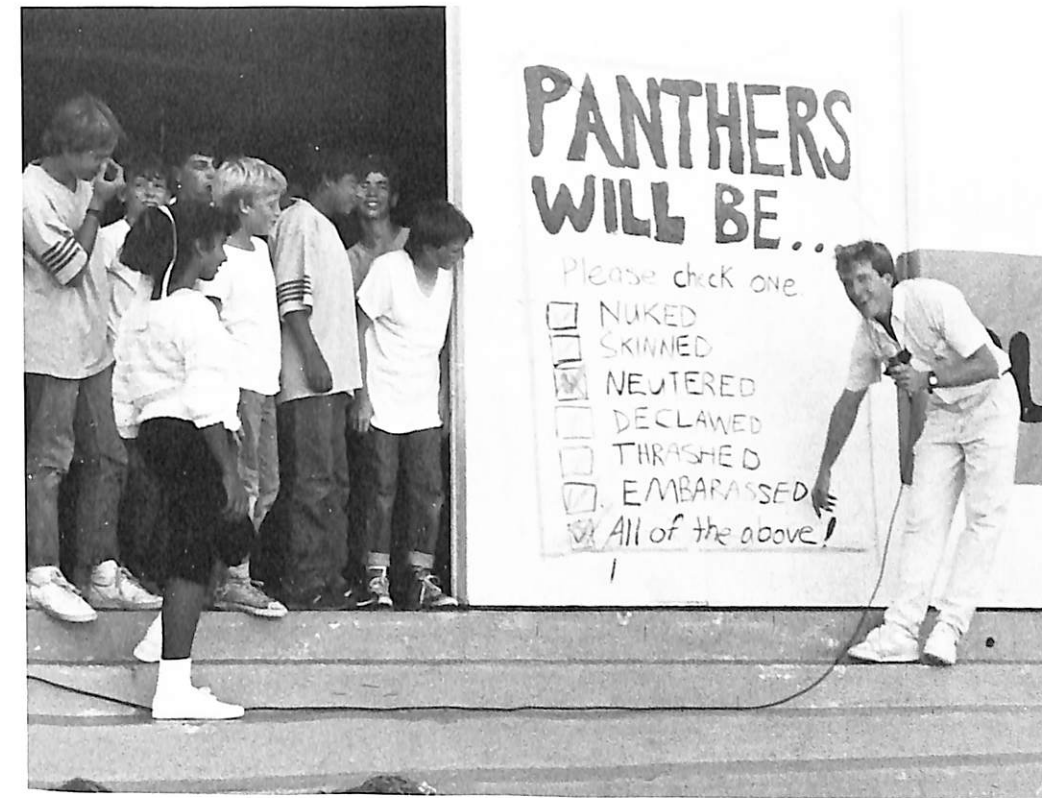

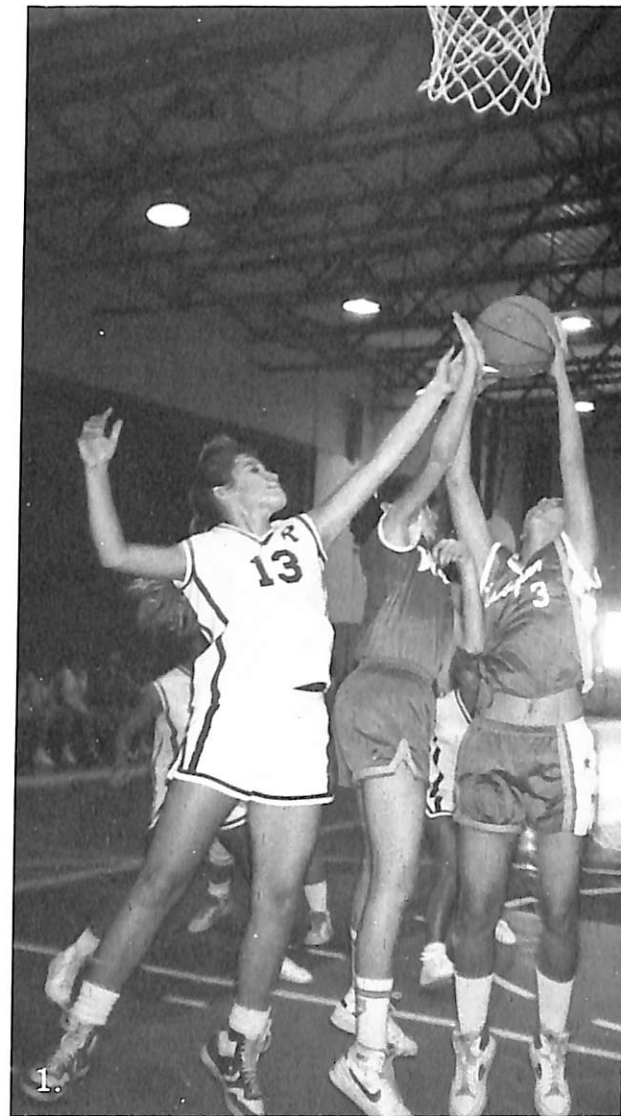
The team's first place finish in the B-division gives Ramey its third straight first place trophy in varsity soccer. The season carried on with the tradition that Ramey is *numero uno*.

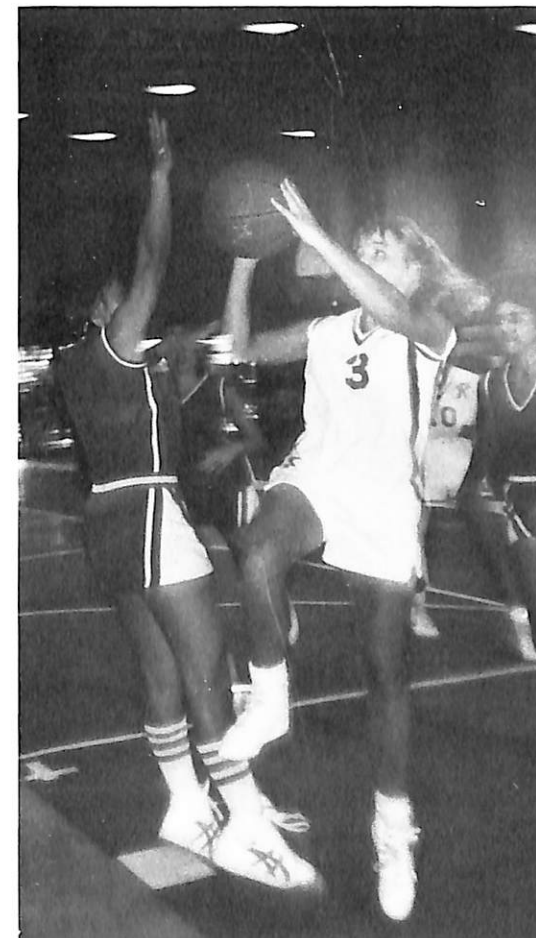

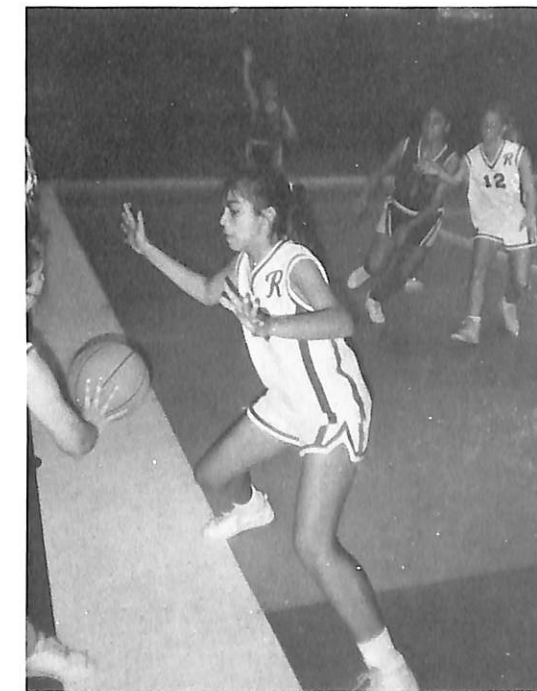

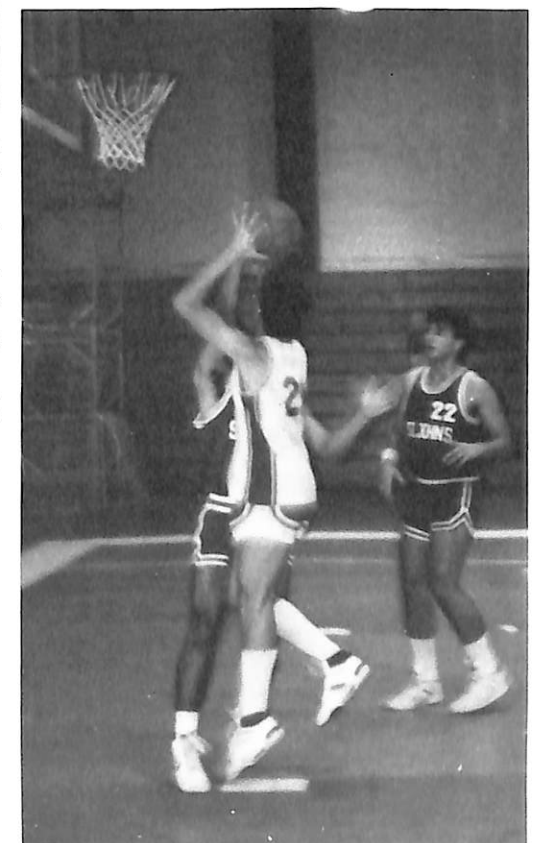
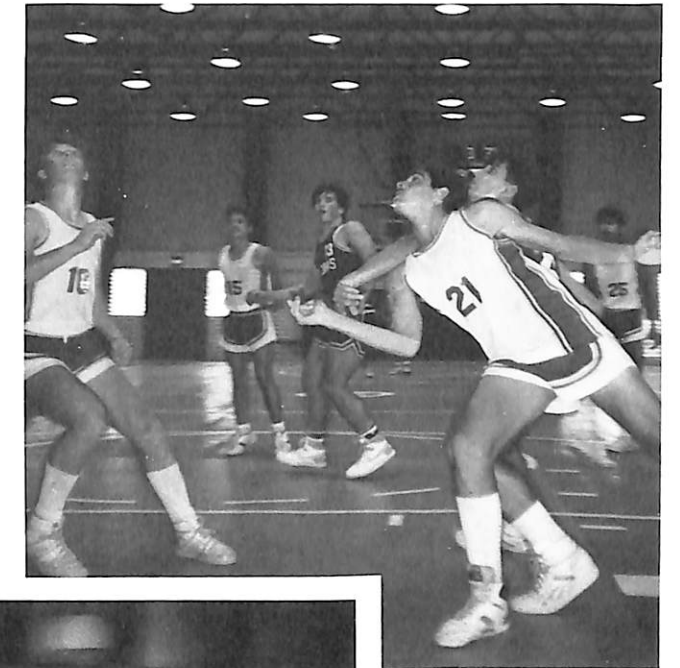

Our softball team consisted of 15 girls. They had a total of 10 games played in "B" division. The season went through April ending with the Championships, which consists of the top teams in our league.

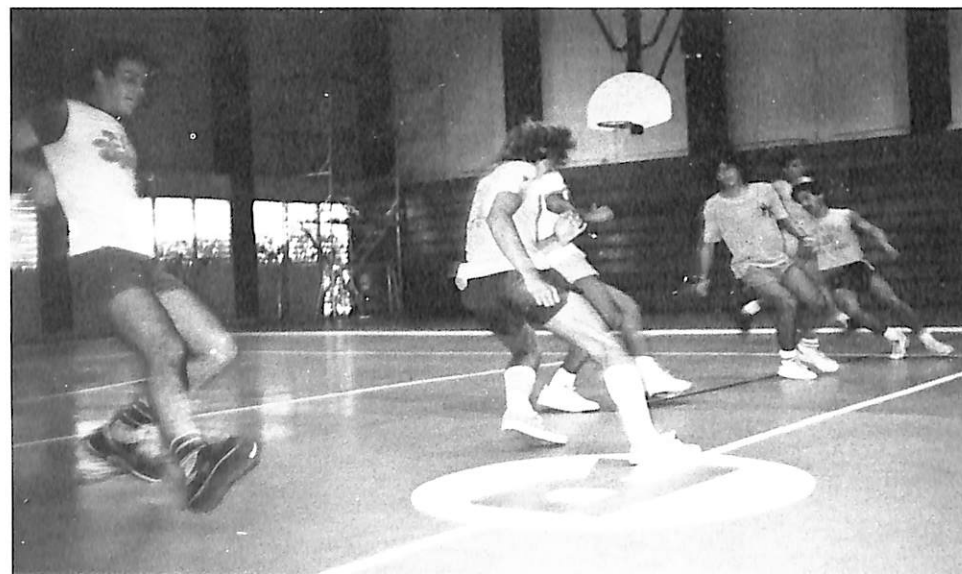

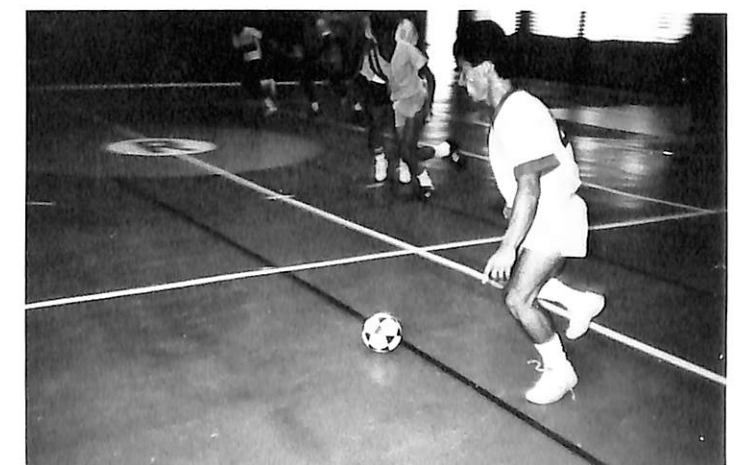

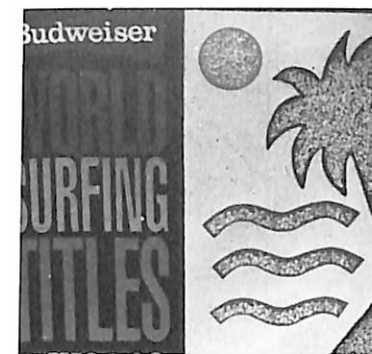

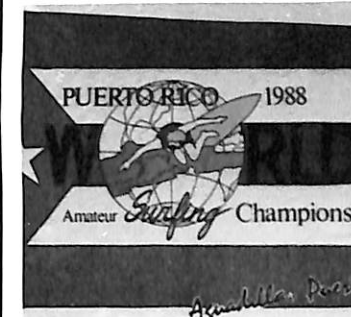
