


Many events have taken place during the 1992-1993 school year. Despite all the different things happening in Germany, there were many events happening around the world; many memo-







Working Hard ... Hardly Working






Part of everyday life!



BUILDING FRIENDSHIPS








Spirit - Vigor, liveliness; cheerfulness.



October 24, 1992 was a day where many fans, young & old alike, came out to support Ansbach's athletic teams.

As an alternate to heading out to the clubs, Club Beyond sponsored an after Homecoming Lock-In at the YS.


All in all, Homecoming became quite an interesting experience.






"First line of business is to finish the construction," said **Mr. Sessions**. He already has plans for reopening the courtyards, and installing benches for student use.




S.A.D.D. educates students about the risks associated with drinking and driving and helps them to become aware of the problem as it exists on the local, state and national levels.



Bomb Threat: the Real Story

"It was Pearl Harbor Day." That's how Mr. Neas will always remember that December 7th day when the entire Ansbach High School student body, as well as the faculty, waited out on the football field in freezing cold weather for both the military and the German police to complete their careful search for a possible bomb, hidden somewhere in the school building.

Early that morning, immediately after a call came in, warning the main office of the possible threat of a bomb being somewhere in the building, the entire school was evacuated. School buses were beginning to come in, and the students stepping off their buses were quickly ushered onto the football field, where there was nothing more to do but wait.

Soon after the last school bus

arrived, its load of students being directed to the football field, the military police showed up on the scene. At 9:30 A.M., after a careful check of the lockers and the front end of the building with no sign of a bomb, the all-clear was given and classes resumed as normal.

To deter further pranks, such as a fake bomb threat, Mr. Neas stresses the consequences of these actions. The student or student involved in such "practical jokes" will receive a ten-day suspension, courtesy of Mr. Neas. As it is, the entire student body will feel the effects of this latest "joke" since it remains a possibility that the students will have to make up an hour of school lost, all due to the fake bomb threat.






COUGARS GO ALL THE WAY BEST SEASON EVER

CROSS COUNTRY

Boys Win Division III Championship; Girls are Runner-Ups

The Ansbach Cross Country team finished the season with a couple of trophies and plaques. Overall, both guys and girls team had a great year. Some of the teams we competed against were: **Hahn, Fulda, Vilseck, Bonn, and Bad Aibling**. The boys, won every meet, which gave them the all conference title. The girls were also very successful, winning all the regular meets but the one against **Fulda**, however they came back at the championships and beat **Fulda**. The guys ran even better at the Division III Championships. Led by **Billy Reed's** first place finish, AHS's boys cross country team captured the championships held at **Bad Kreuznach** on 31 October. The Cougar team easily outdistanced second - place **Vilseck** by 10 points and the remainder of the teams from **Augsburg, Bad Aibling, Bad Kreuznach, Bonn, Brussels, Fulda, Hahn, Karlsruhe, and Soesterberg**.

Reed's time of 18:02 over the five kilometer course was just off the course record. The finishes of the other team members were **Keith Miles** 4th, **Julio Dejesus** - 8th, **Doug Austin** - 9th, **Ben Medley** - 10th, **Patrick Young** - 49th.

In the women's division, **Ansbach** was edged out for the championship by **Hahn** by a mere four points. Leading the strong Lady Cougars' performance were **Heather Hayden** and **Louvenia Magee** who finished fourth and fifth, respective-

ly. They were followed by **Angie Brock** - 12th, **Katie Erdman** - 16th, **Laura Bourque** - 17th and **Susanne Shanteau** - 27th.

Neither AHS's men's or women's teams were as fortunate at the European Finals held in Heidelberg on the 6th of November. This competition pitted the best cross country teams from Division I, II, III against one another.

Ansbach's men's team, hurt by the lack of competition during the regular season, managed to finish a respectable eighth in the field of 14 teams. While they were beaten by Division II power houses **Hanau, Bitburg, SHAPE, Mannheim, Frankfurt International School, and St. John's** and Division I **Heidelberg, AHS** outdistanced teams from **Ramstein, Kaiserslautern, Frankfurt, Wuerzburg, Vilseck, and Augsburg**.

Bill Reed also ran a blistering time of 16:49 over the relatively flat but sandy course, but he was only able to finish 12th in the competition. One hundred, seventeen men comprised the championship field.

The women's team, hurt by injuries to **Heather Hayden** and **Angie Brock**, were unable to compete up to their potential and finished last in the field of 12 teams. **Louvenia Magee** and **Laura Bourque** did turn in outstanding performances, though, as they finished 52nd and 55th in the field of 103 women.


BASKETBALL CHEERLEADERS






WRESTLING




