





Our lives here are a blend of American and German cultures. While sometimes we may miss living in the States, we'll always remember the time we spent in Berlin.










Despite the long hours on the bus and hectic nonstop pace, the trip was a blast and most were sorry to return to school.



"Today Is A Great Day In The History Of Berlin.

t is a day of thanks to our Allied friends and partners in Berlin said former West Berlin Mayor Walker Momper on that day in which the two Germanys officially reunited and the Allies gave up their special status.

Many students, expecting another huge party equal to the one on November 9, 1989, were surprised by the relative calm and peacefulness of the reunification celebrations. Entire families came out to stroll under the Brandenburg Gate, gather in front of the Reichstag, or walk freely between the

two sections of the city.

Some BAHS students enjoyed observing and taking part in the celebrations. "It was great to see all the fireworks and happy people." said one person who was there. The reunification will have a great effect on American forces in Berlin. We are now guests in the city, as opposed to occupiers. The US military has said it will take out its military when Soviet forces are removed from the eastern part of Germany, which will probably be a couple of years. All this means that as Germany is now one again and is looking forward to a new future, the purpose of our military presence is accomplished and our future here is uncertain.









Beyond The Ordinary





Model United Nations gave the group an inside look at how the UN works and politics around the world.




No Problem Is Difficult
