



Registration Day, August, 1984: Who would've ever thought so many students would be this eager for school to resume.




For Homecoming, the pep rally included a skit from the Drill Team and from each class and of course the seniors won that, too, with their skit, "The Wizard of Oz."











THE CANDIDATE





This year's band, under the guidance of Mr. Hubbard, displayed some raw talent.


































PRODUCERSAND DIRECTORS







Mr. Romeu was born in Puerto Rico and moved to the U.S. in 1953. Later, while he was in Japan, he met


his wife, or as he put it, "I didn't meet her, she met me."

When asked how he felt about his life, Mr. Romeu replied, "I'm too old now to think about life. I'm working my way toward retirement and then I'll fade away like all things."







Herr Vogt has been here for 4 years and he admits, "I like being here; the students are very nice."






Ella Spray
