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



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ADMINISTRATION

As we push more into the depths of the office, we run into the Principal's Secretary, Ms. Youngquist, who is always at work with the school's constant demands.







Janitors Keep The School Grounds Spotless








Physical Education-A Nice Way To Keep Fit







Bringing You The Best In Communication Skills



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




A Practical Way To Improve Your Life





Sponsor Ms. Page was again an essential part of the NHS. She helped with the two elections for new officers, when the President Eddie Wansley departed on a flight to the states.






We Bestow The Honor Of Shogun On





And yes, we tip our hat As we stand tall and loudly say-ay, That we are proud of that We did it our way!








The Best Of Times








Unpredictable Red-Machine




Running Through Nature's Walkway






Working From The Base








Coaches Corner

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





















The Class Of '83 Takes It To The Top
