



SPIRIT WEEK







OFF BASE





The cheerleading squad was under the supervision of Lt. Barbara Miller and Ms. Kenney who showed the team a great amount of support and dedication.









Running in the right direction




Above: Brian Hoffower plays in the water while others from the team take time to cool down. Right: Alvin Diosa makes headway on the Ikego Hills course.








GIRL'S TENNIS












