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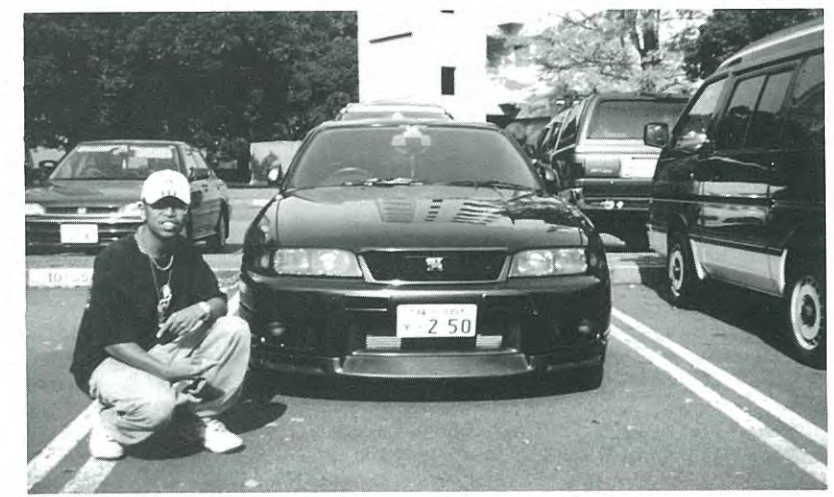
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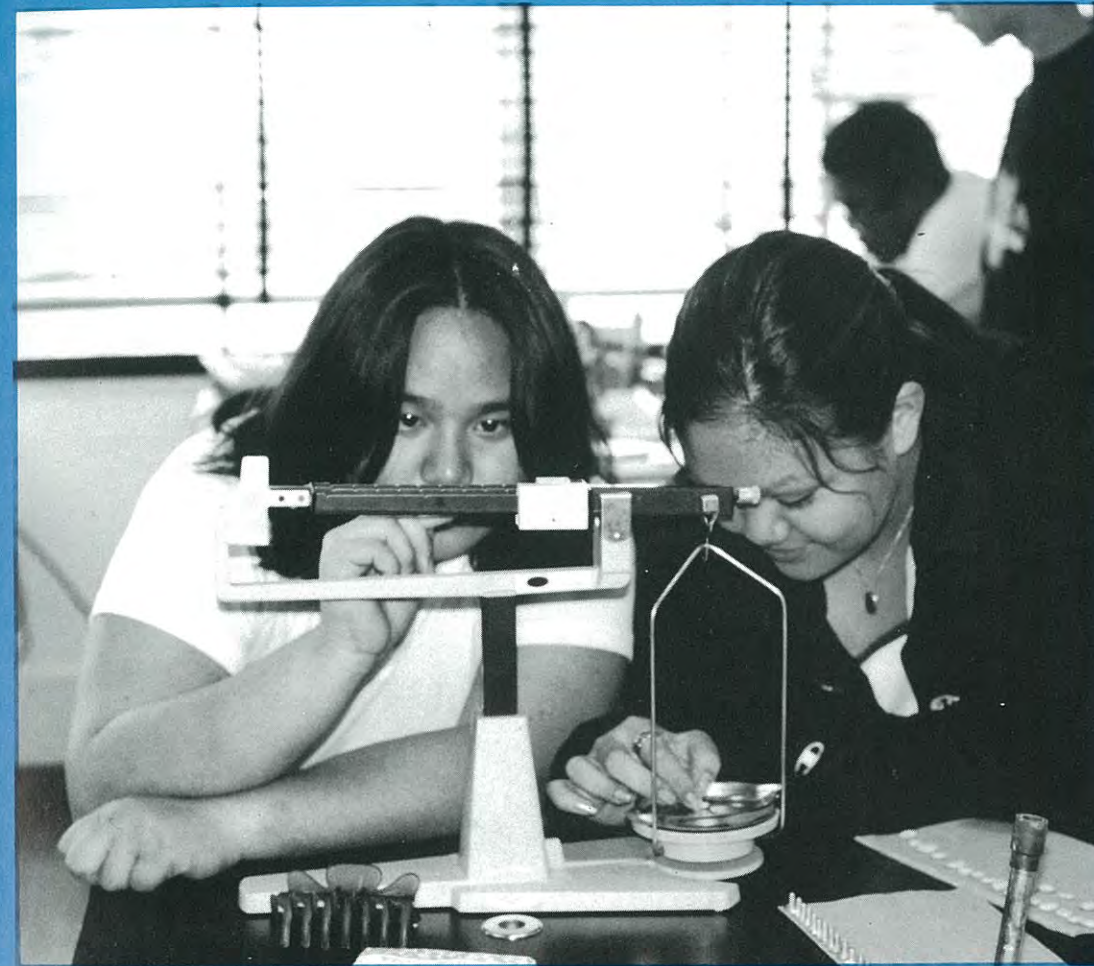


The Quest For Success

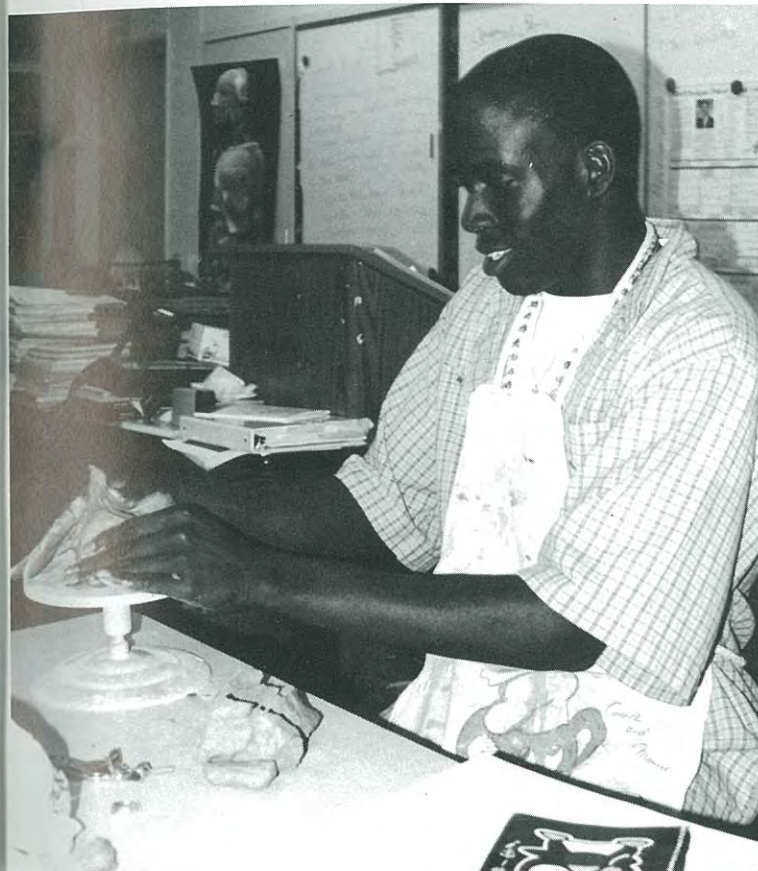

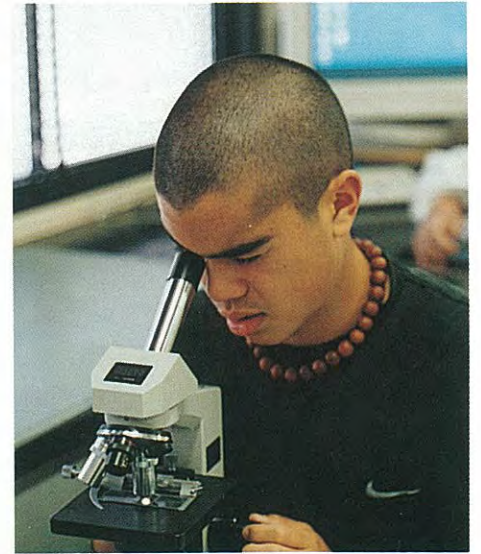

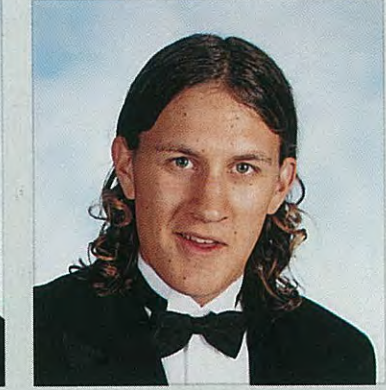


Andrew Medina

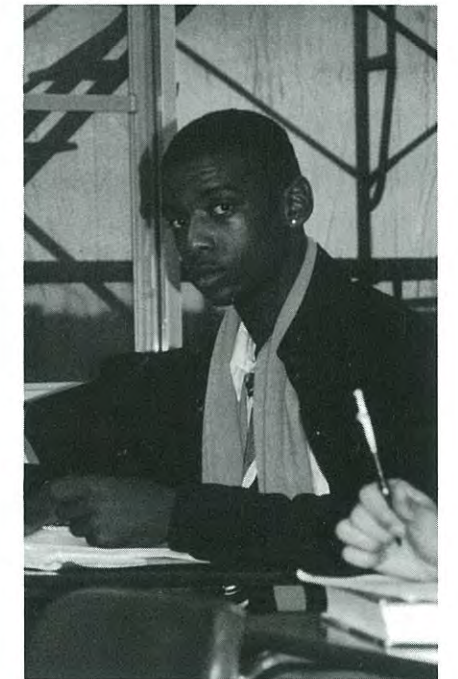

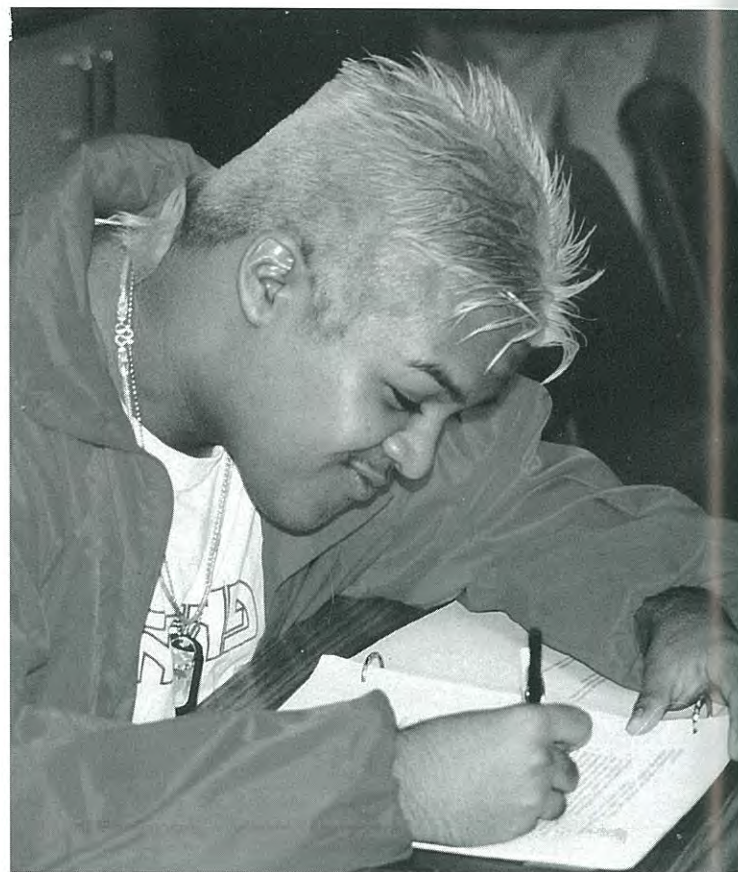

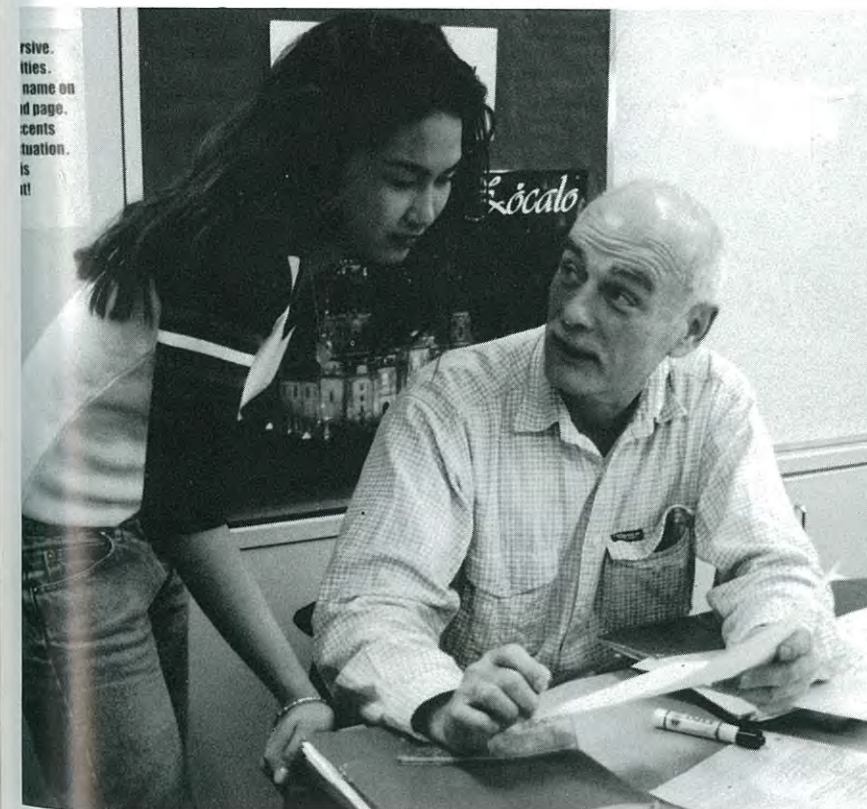
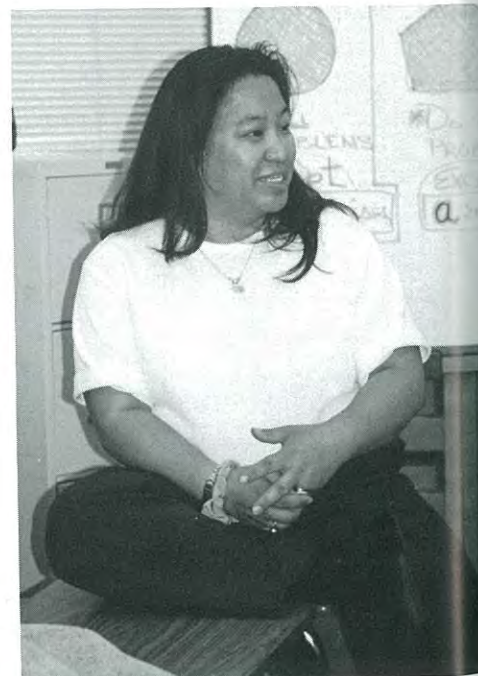
What inspired you to enter the teaching profession and what is your reward?

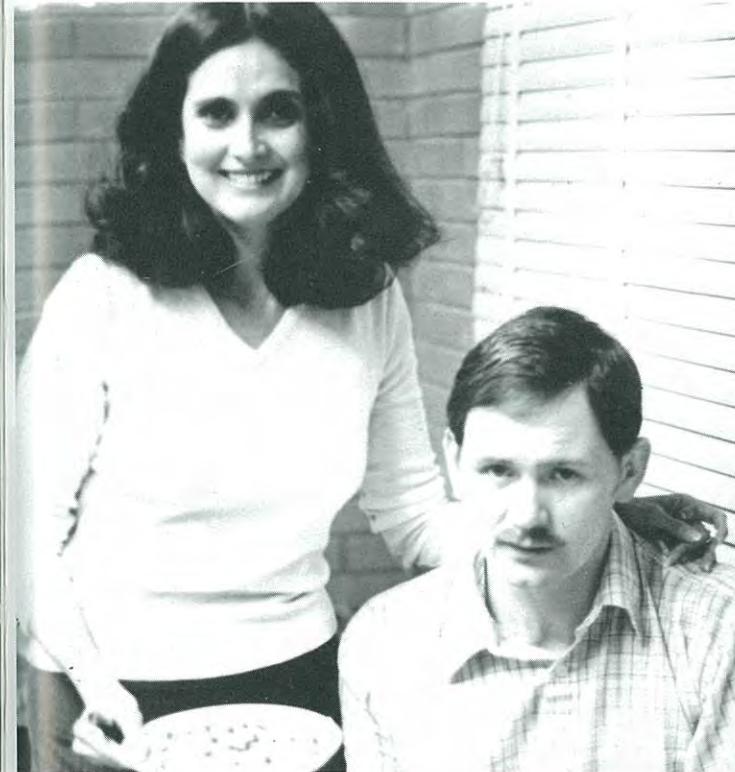
What places have you visited that has made your teaching experience worth while?

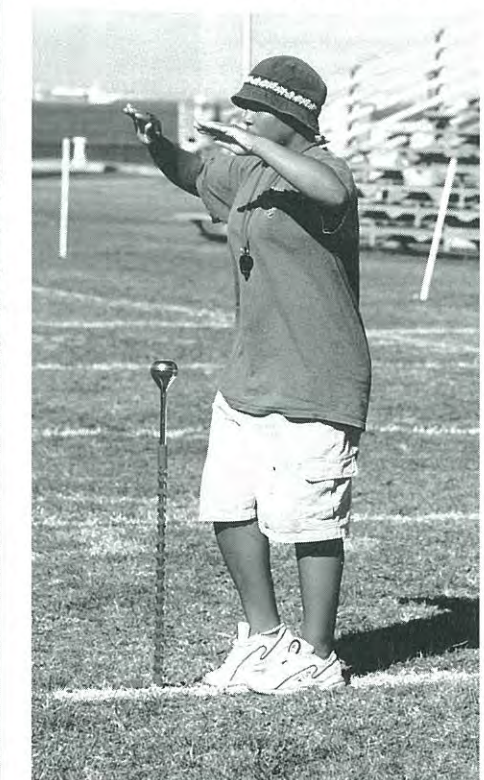

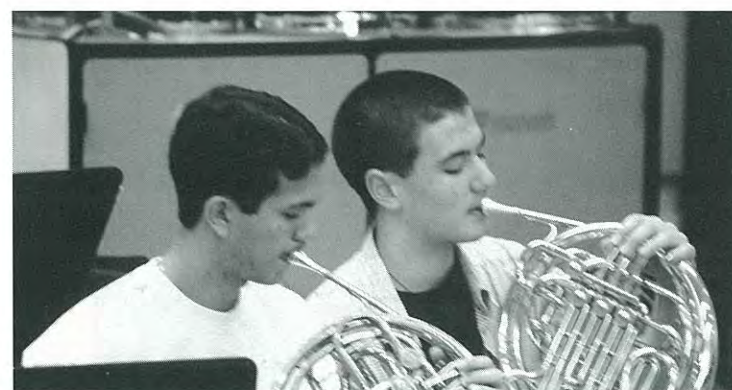

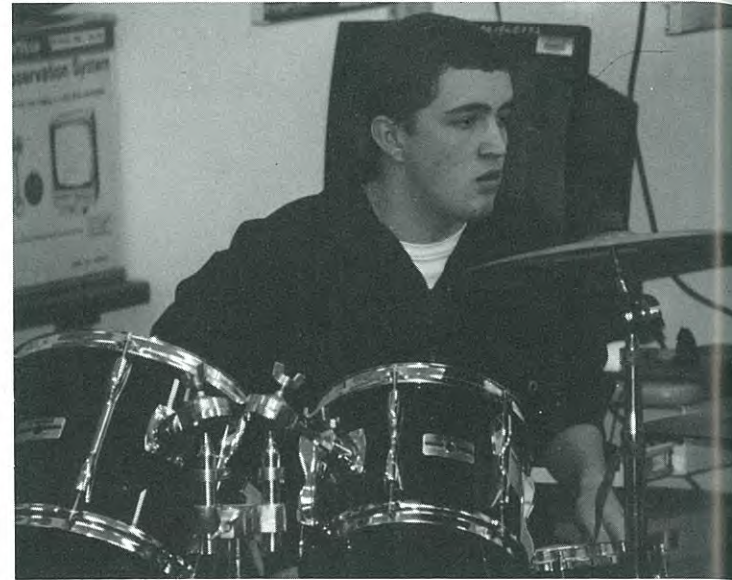
The flutes can be heard above every other instrument in the band. Freshling Emmanuel Delacruz and Junior Christina Graham play trilling sounds that soar skyward.

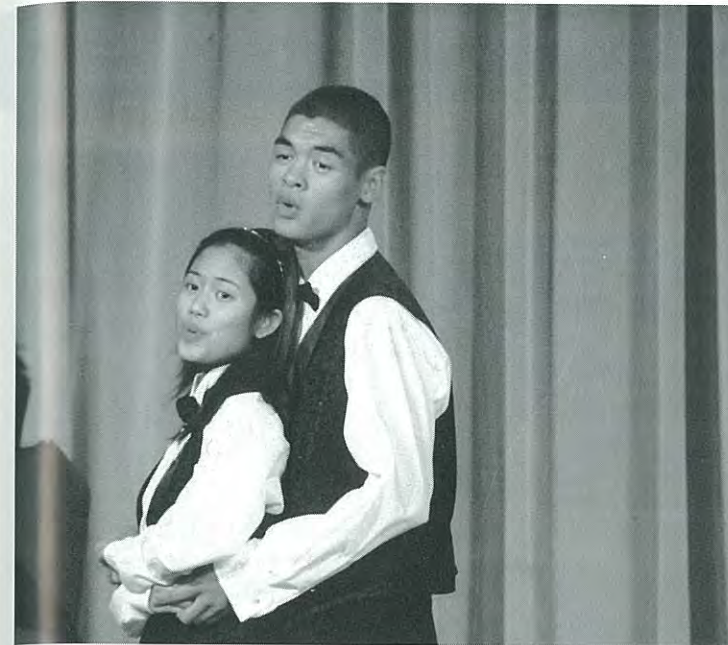
Start with the basics of singing, then move on to dancing and singing at the same time. That would be the show choir.

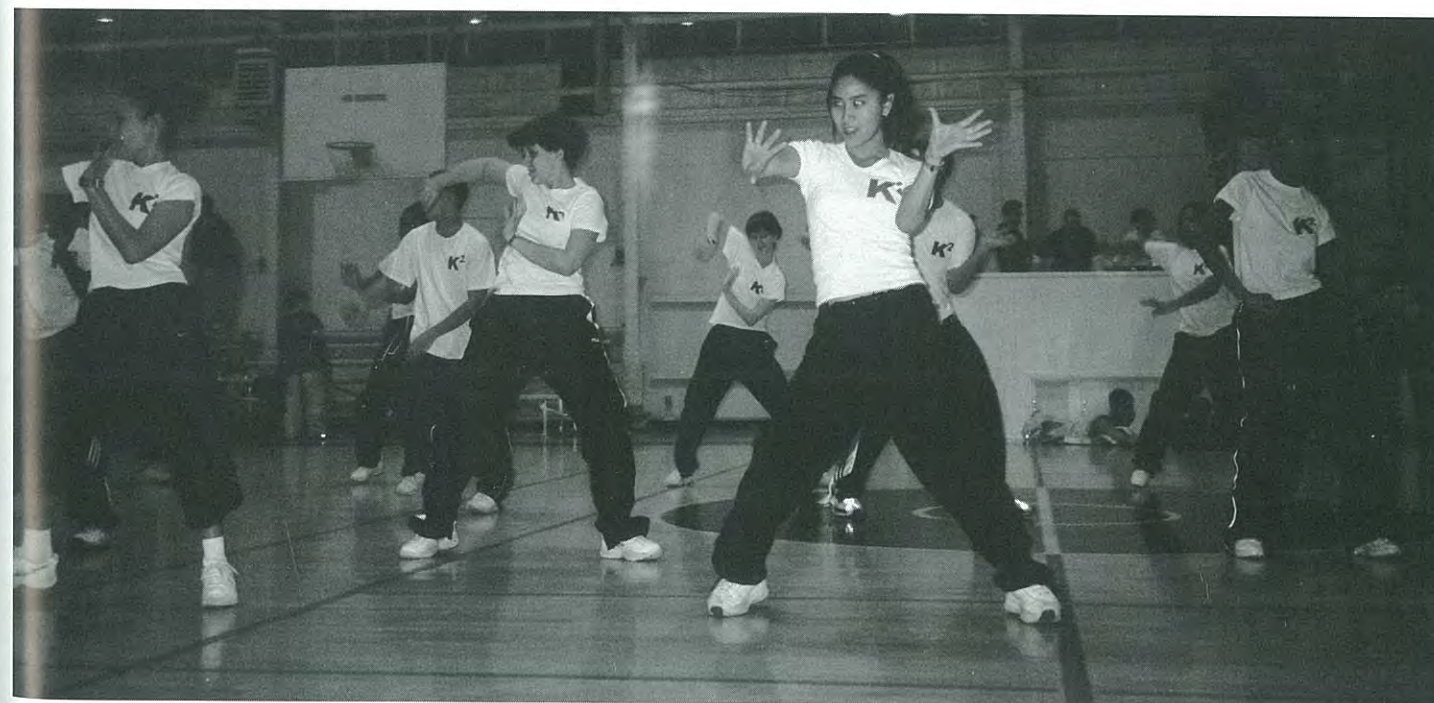

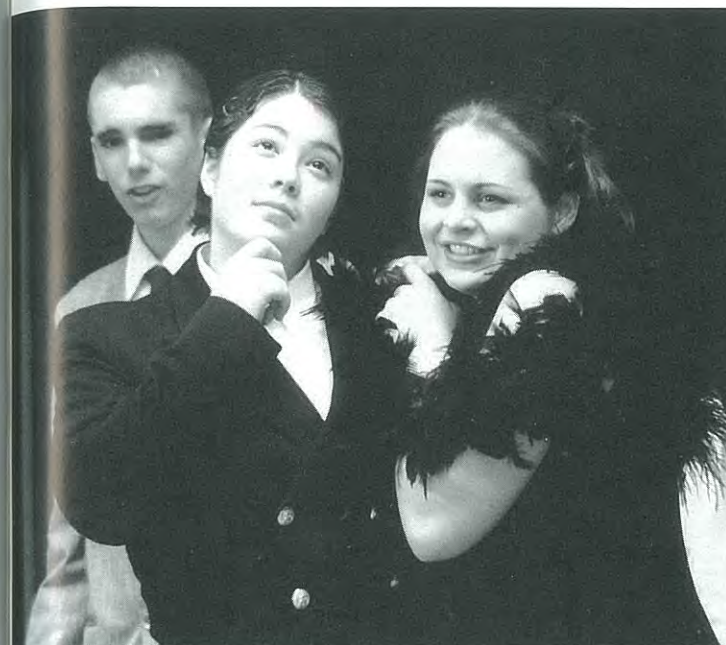

One more line to go! Sara Slaughter spends some down time doing a final check over her lines, making sure she knows them all. Sara was in the chorus of the one-act play.



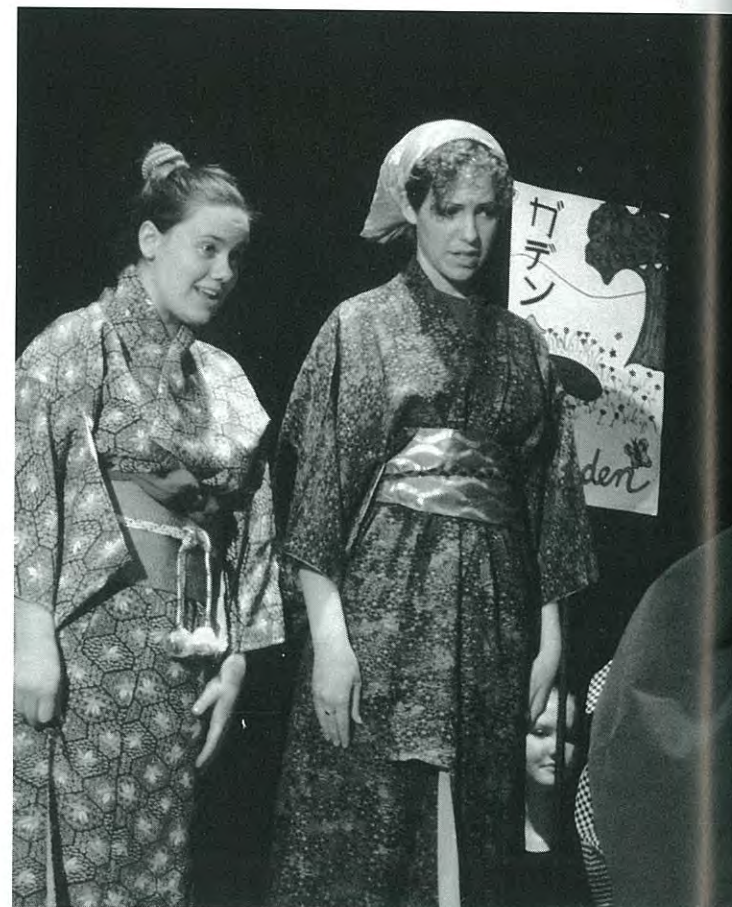

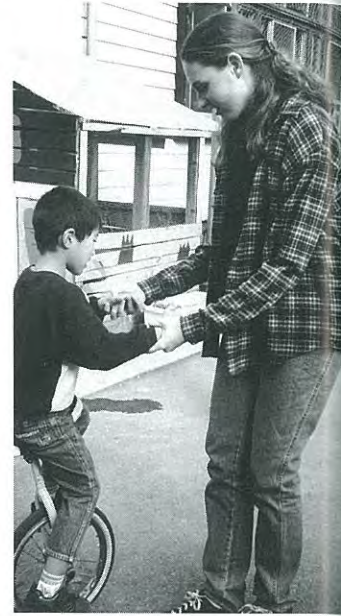
This year, the members of the National Honor Society participated in several community service activities. The NHS and the Japanese club visited an orphanage at Hakone, and had

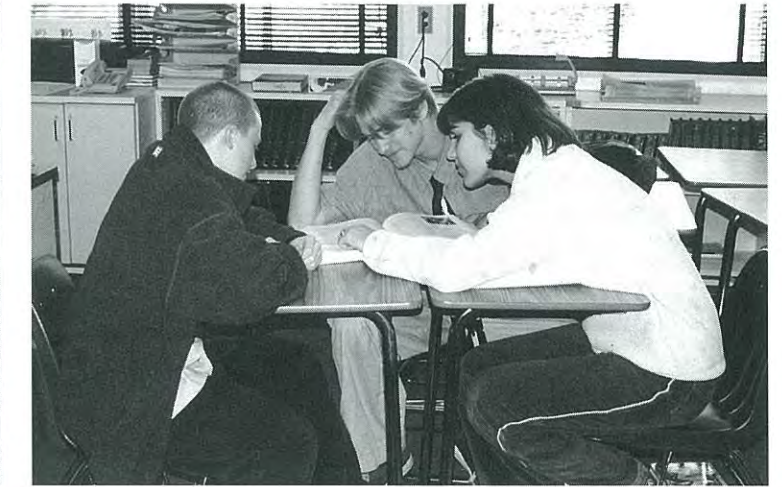

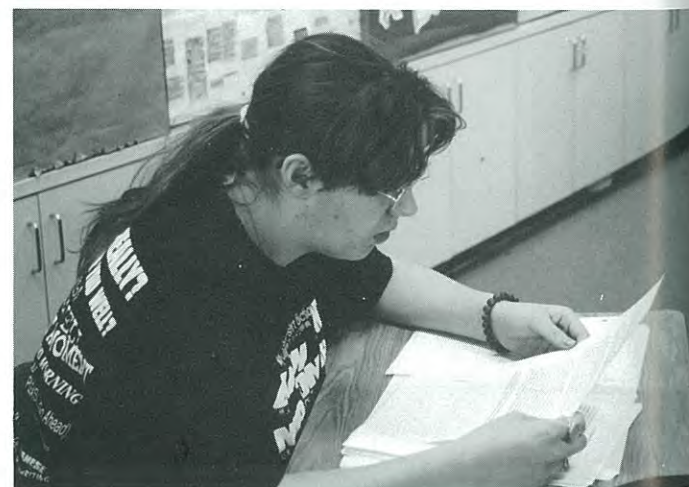
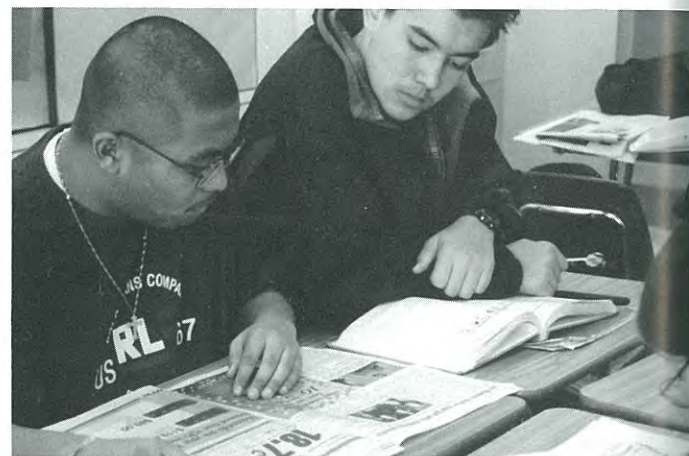
CATCH THE 411 THROUGH THE ECHOES

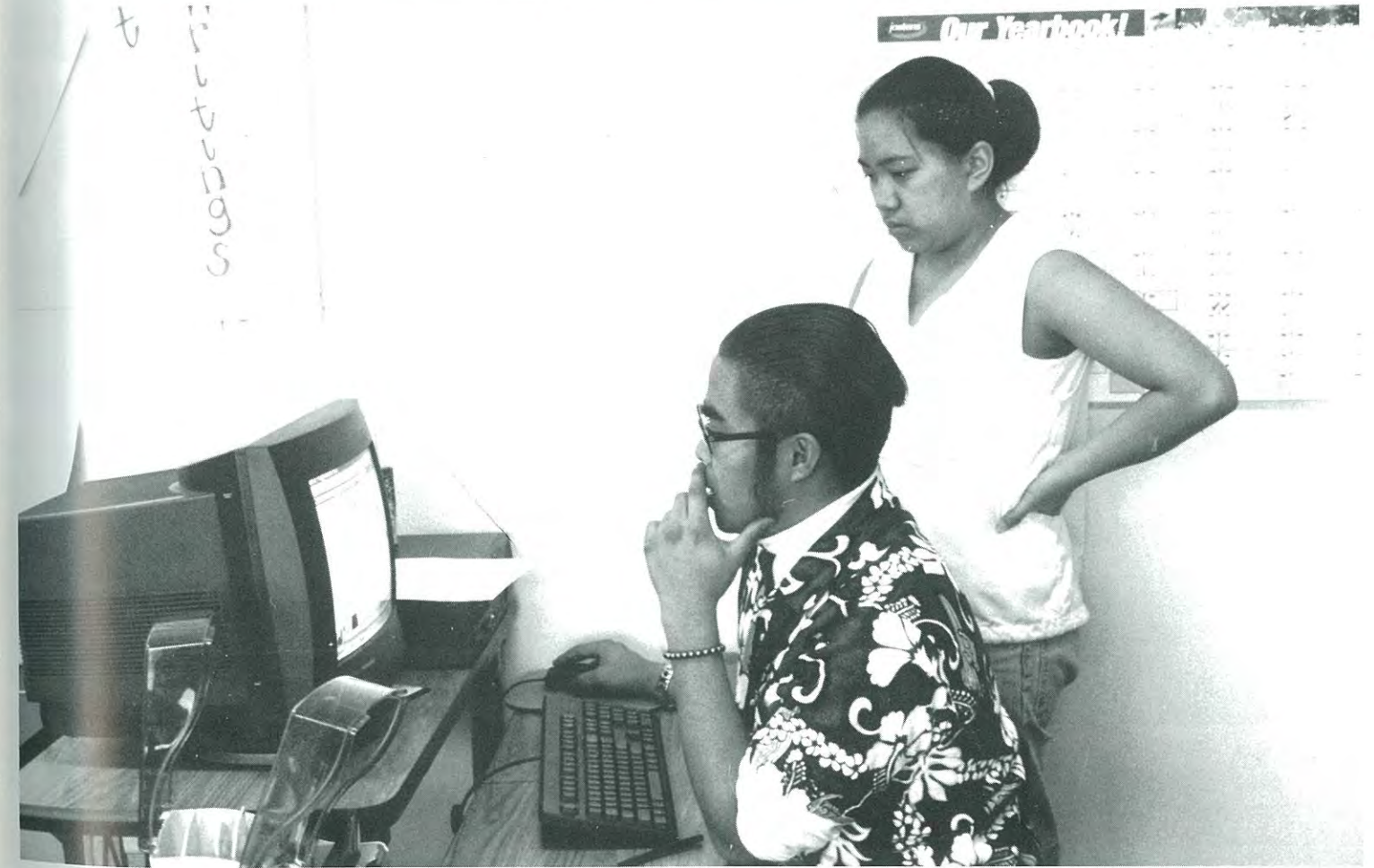

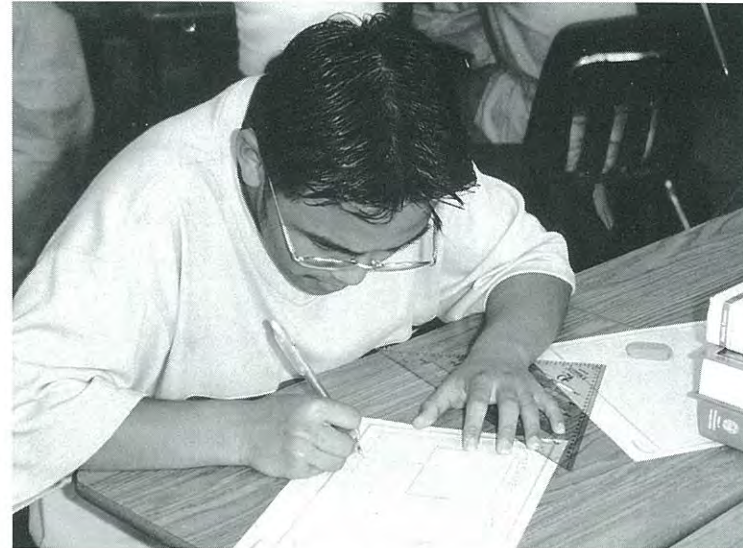

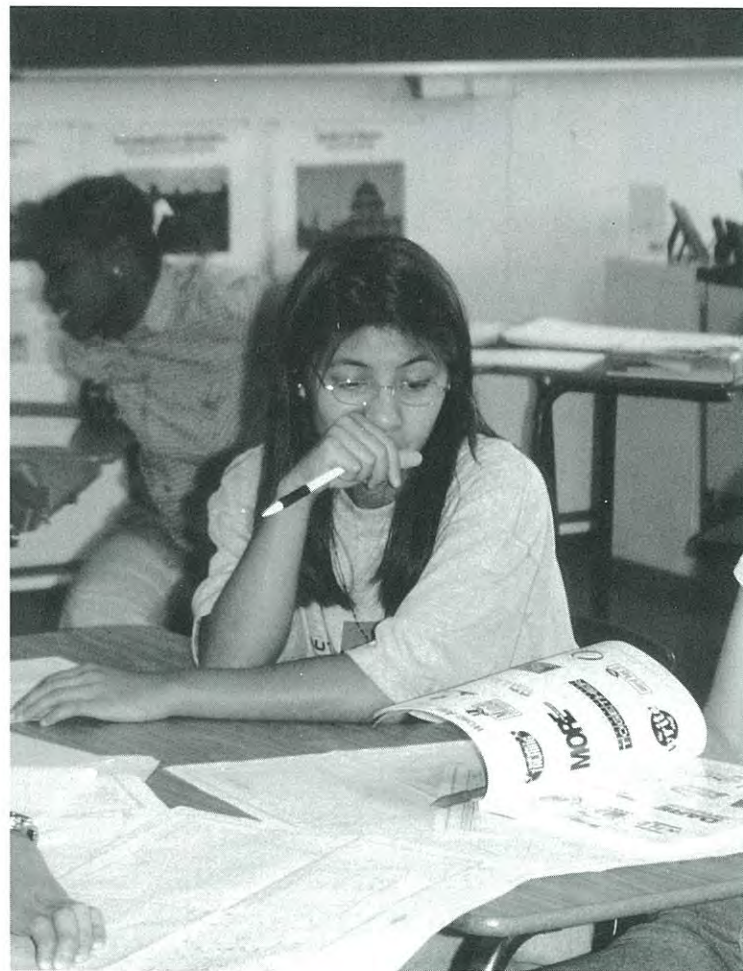

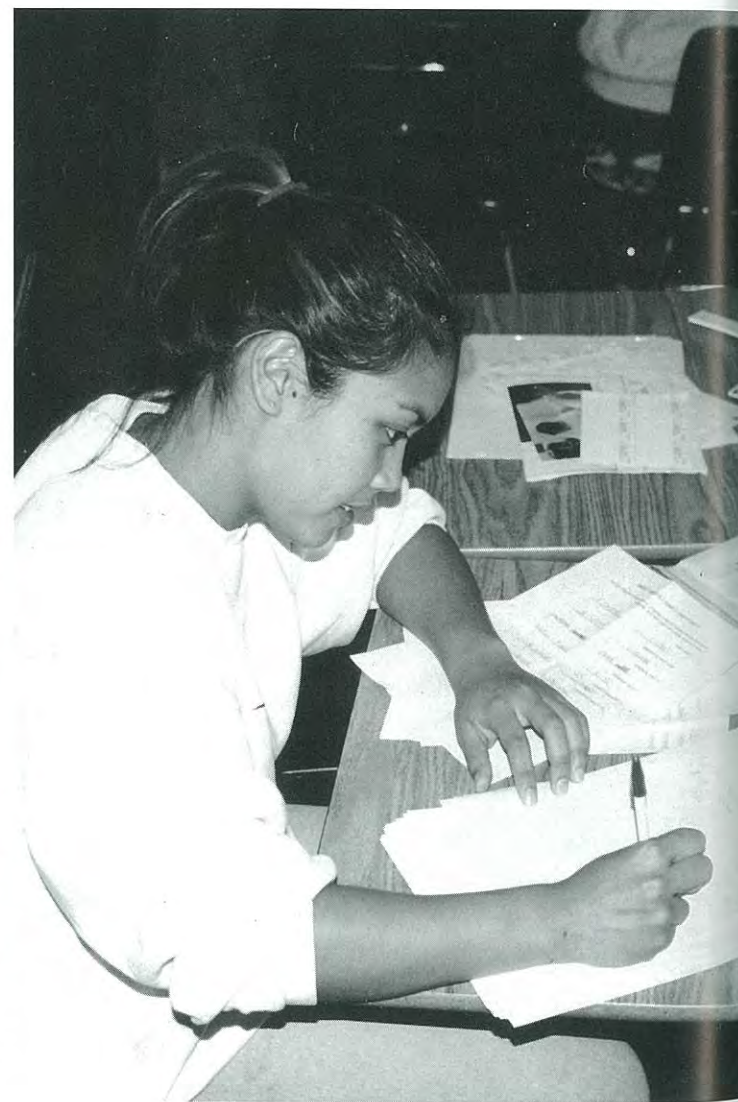

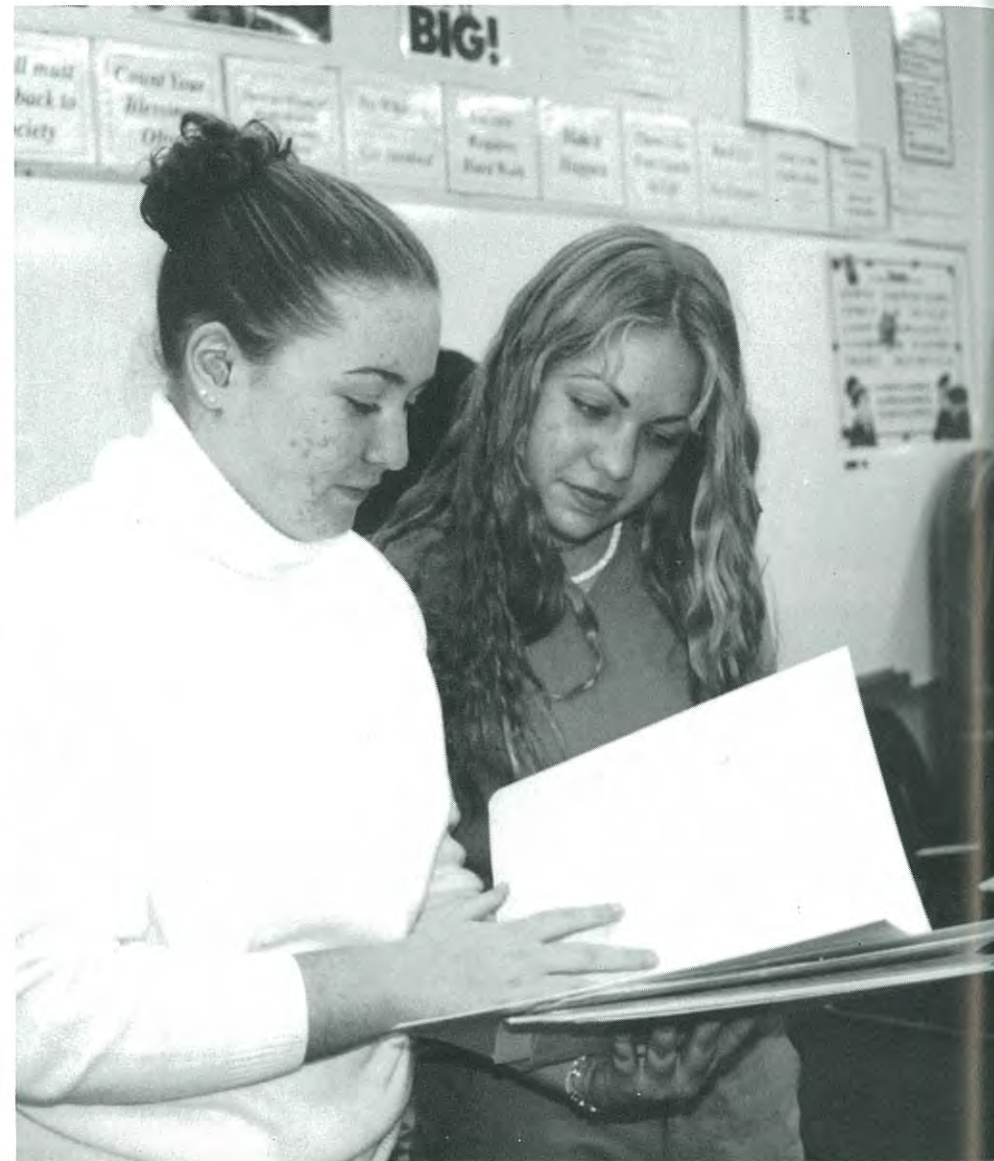

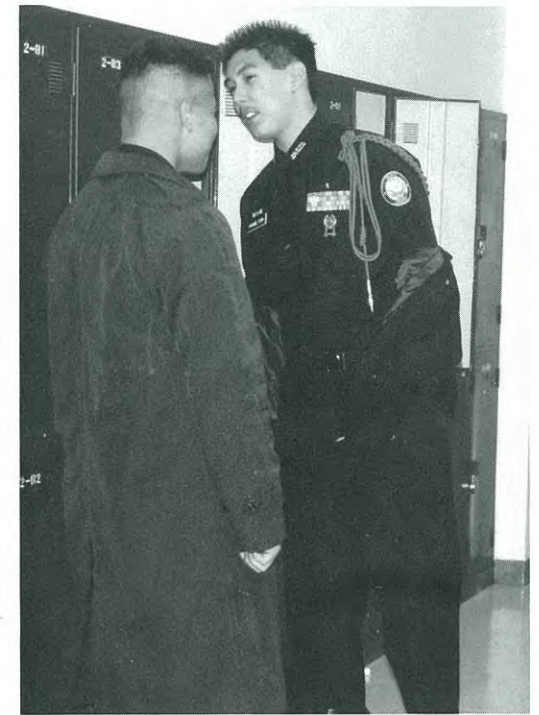

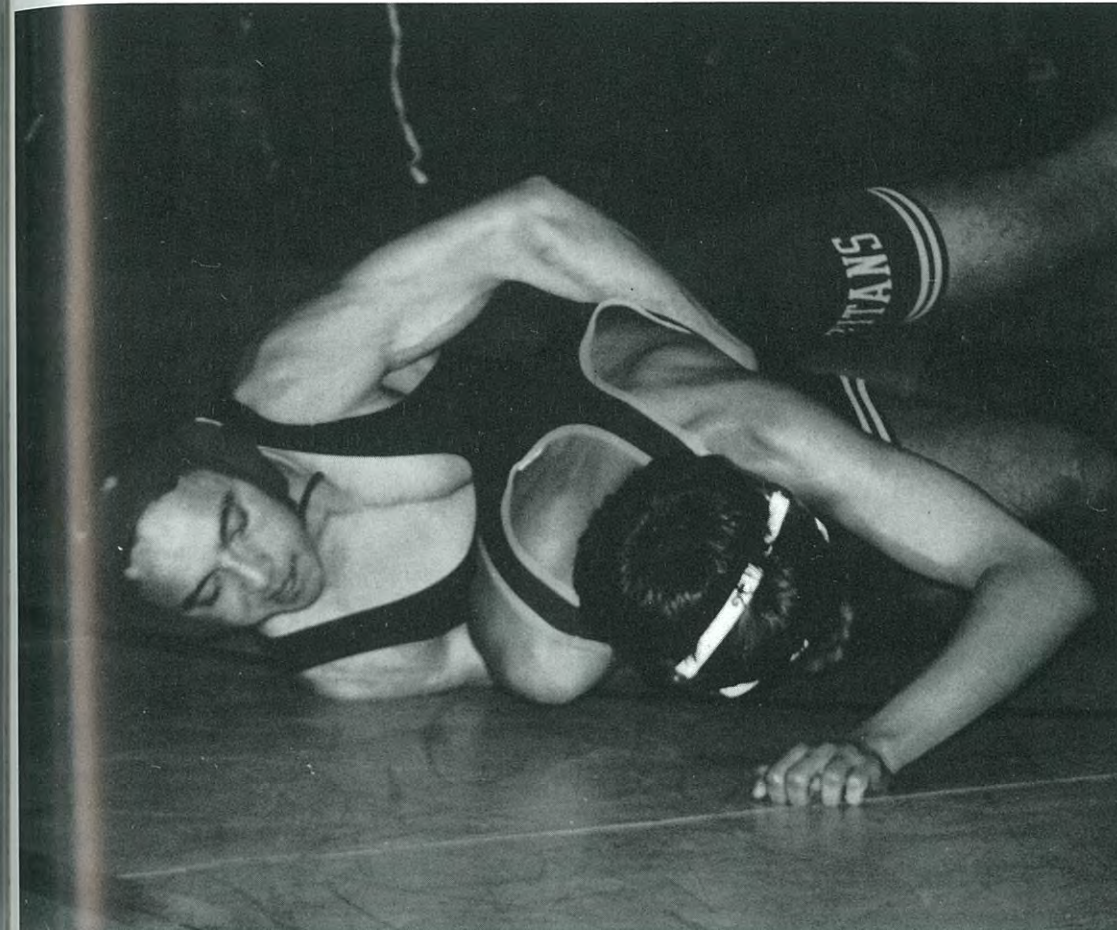

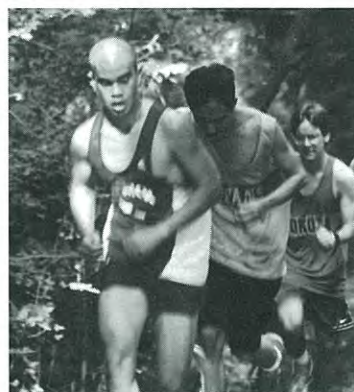

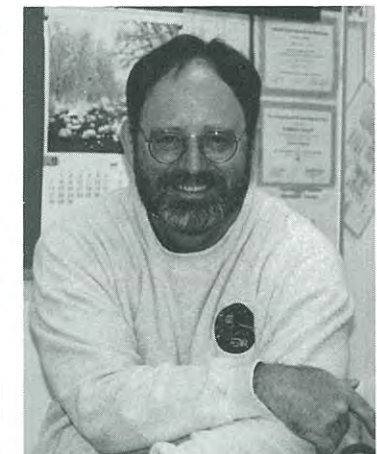

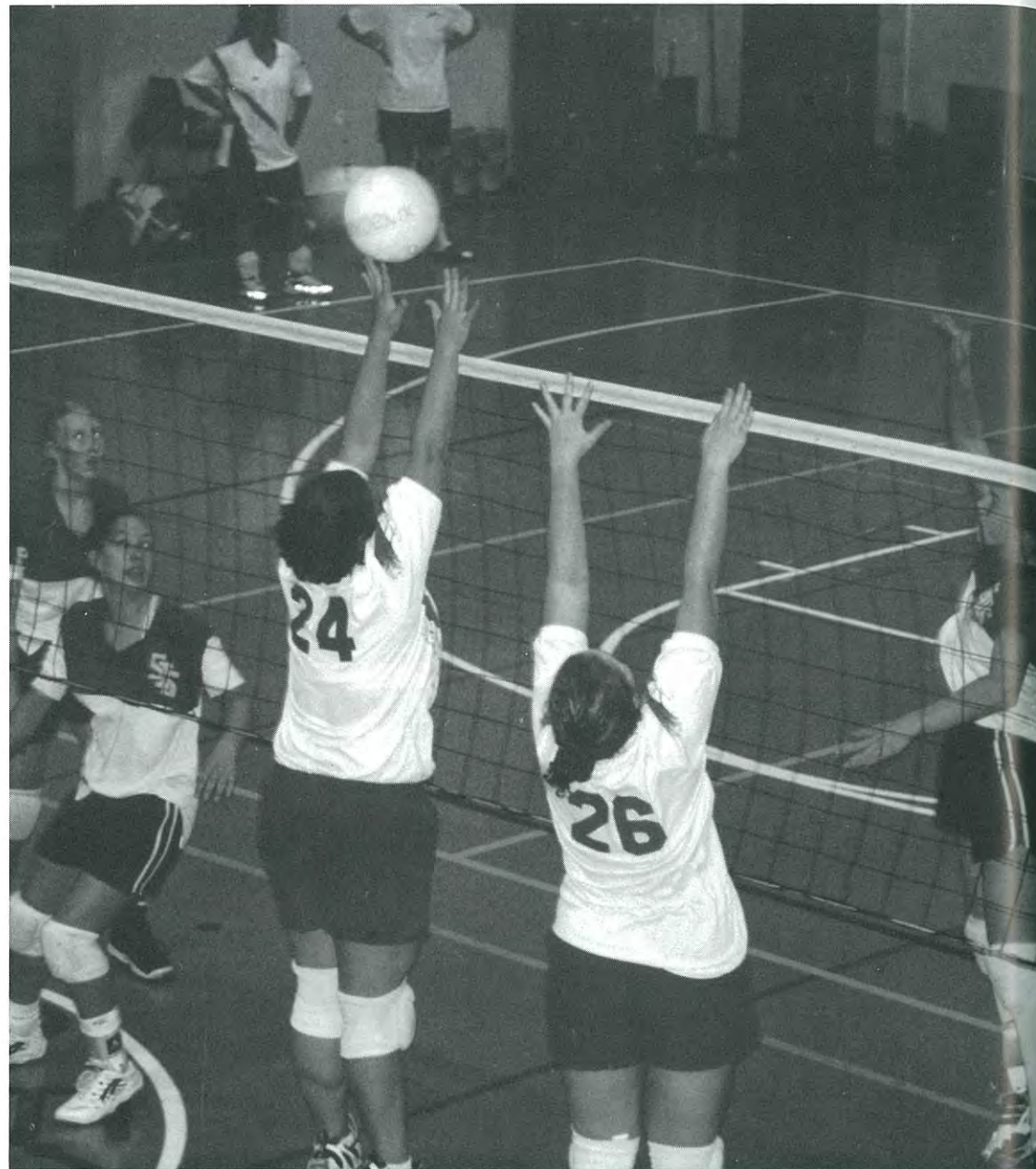

This year's JV Volleyball team has soared to the limits. Just short of making two teams, these 11 girls really worked well together.

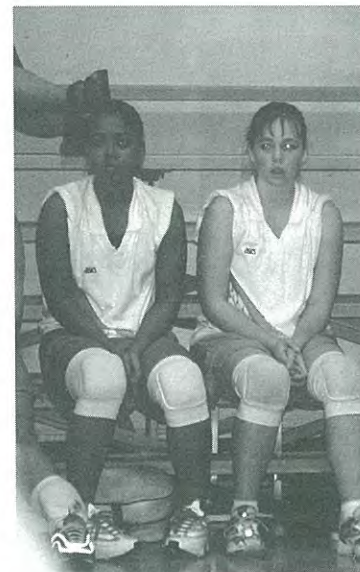

These girls faced each team with all of their might. They went all the way, never once giving up. These JV "Mafia" members have an eye on the varsity squad next year.

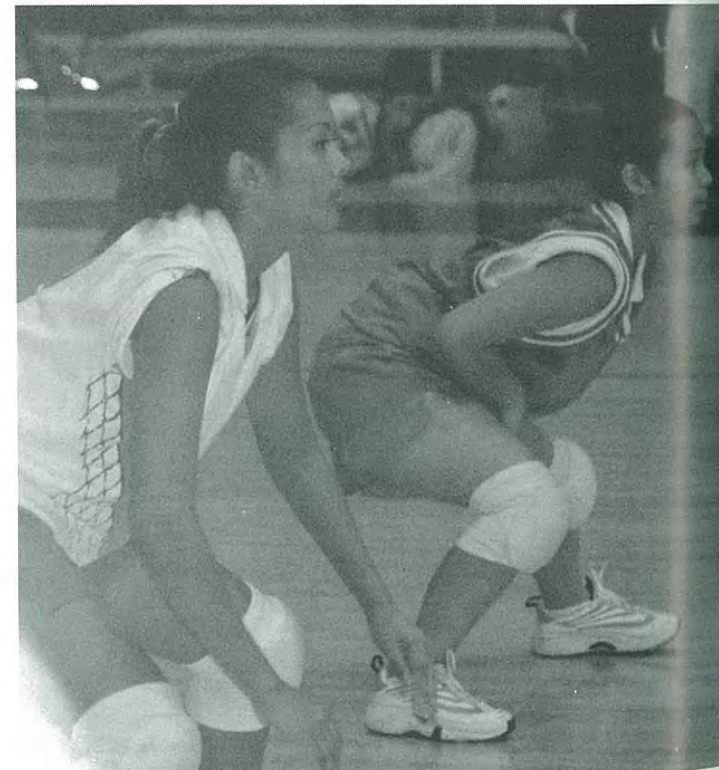

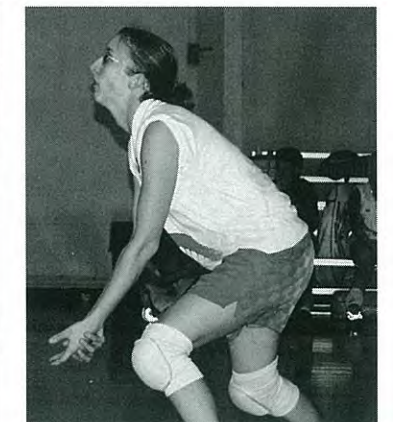

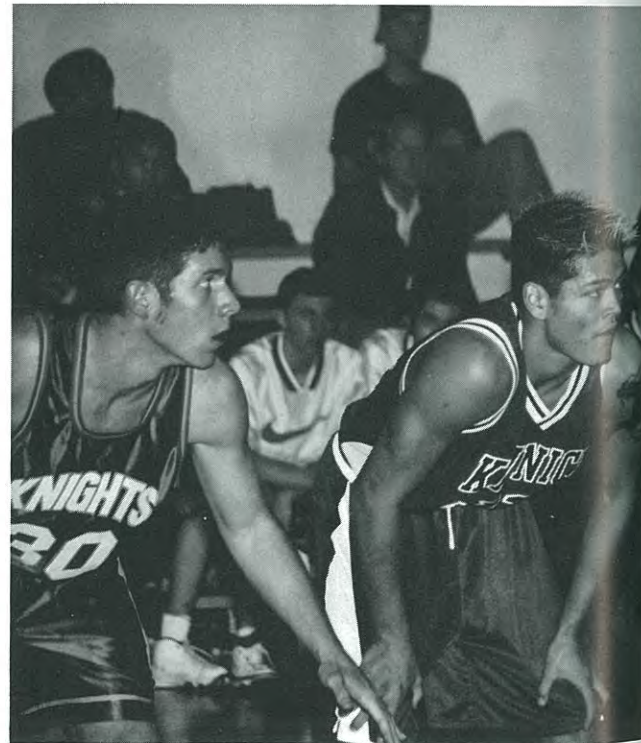

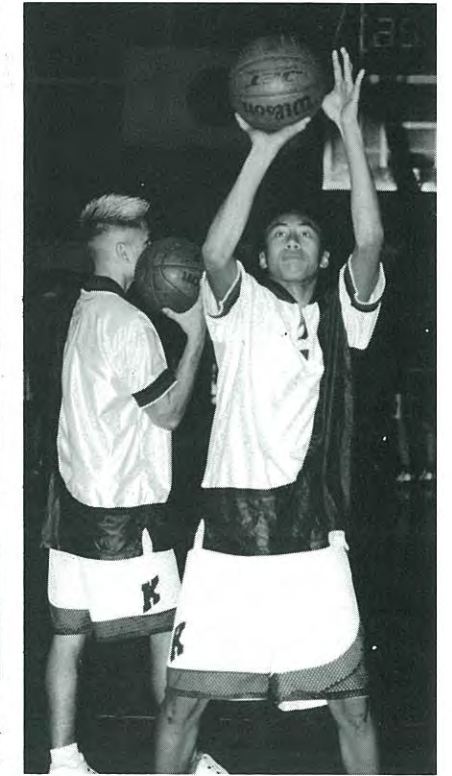
Varsity Basketball

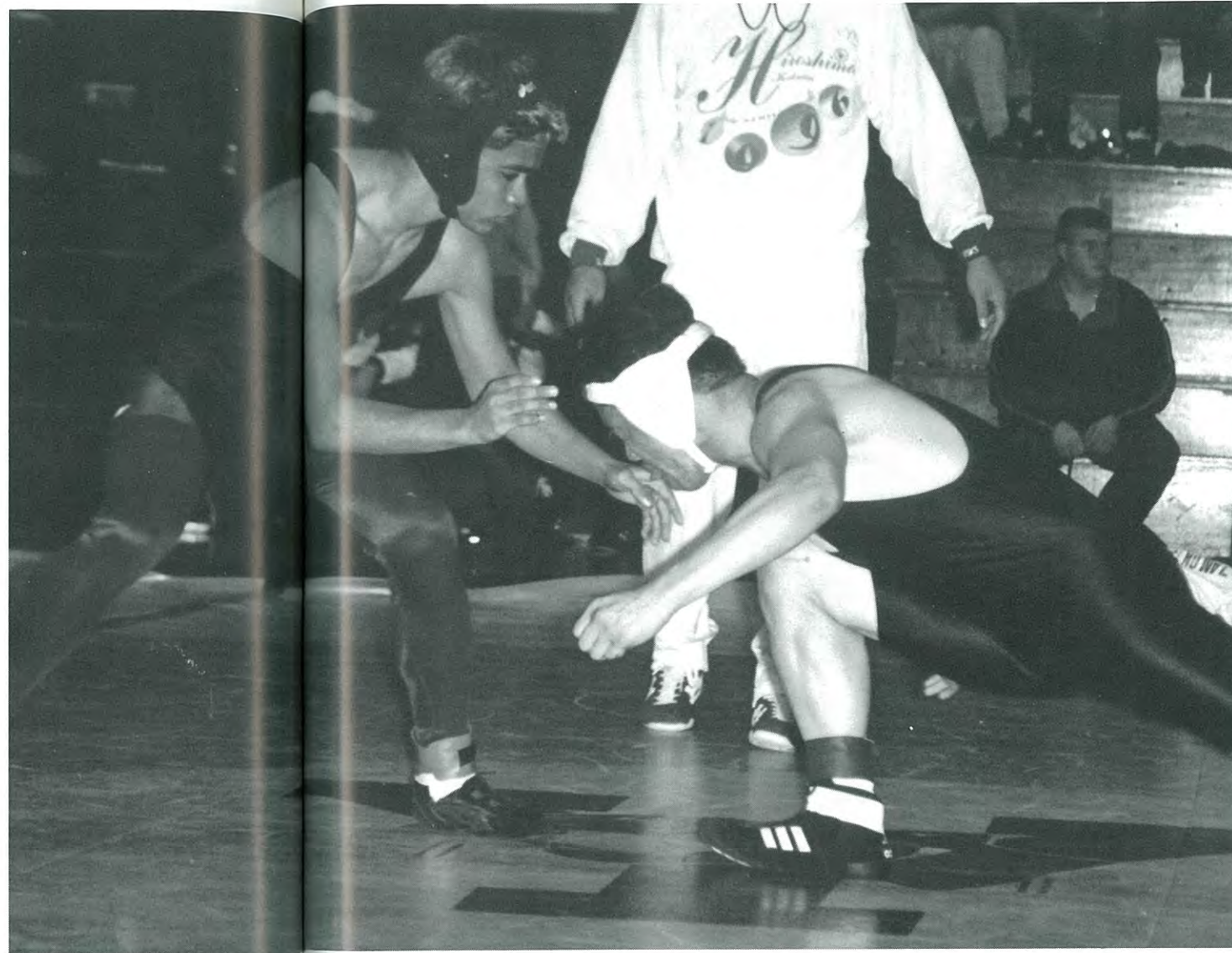

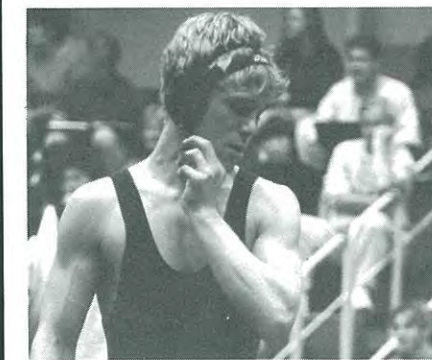
