
One night a man had a dream. He dreamed

one belonging to him, and the other to the LORD.


When the last scene of his life flashed

and saddest times in his life.



most you would leave me.”


The LORD replied: “My precious,


It is therefore with love that the 1985 yearbook staff dedicates this yearbook to Noemi Alcaide . . . a truly special person.

Ms. MacCullagh is the school's registrar. From typing up the school's daily announcements to writing up unexcused absences, Ms. MacCullagh always has a smile.





RIGHT: Though not new to RRM/HS, this is Ms. Costa's first year as teacher here. She cheerfully enlightens her class with the wonders of the English language.





Grades 7 through 12 stayed in the Bundy area.

By 1961 the old "120 Housing" area, which had been across the access road from the present Navy Flying Club, was almost entirely dismantled, and few people remembered the old school. Today, all one sees of the old area is a rank growth of underbrush and small trees.

In 1964 Mr. Ron Howard became principal of the Roosevelt Roads Schools with Mr. Gerry Hooley responsible for the Elementary School, grades K-6. Since the student body had grown quite a bit, it was necessary for grades five and six to go back to the Bundy area. As there was no lunchroom facility suitable for the middle schoolers, it was necessary for the fifth and sixth graders to ride a bus from Bundy to the present school site, and then back. Needless to say, those were some interesting bus rides! After all, just how many choruses of various songs could one survive? Oh well, survive we did.

Perhaps you would think that there would be no playground



From 1953 until 1955 the school was run by DOD and was located in an area that was called "120 Housing." Grades K-4 had regular teachers, but all other students took correspondence courses supervised by the Principal, Mr. Mantania.

During 1955-1957 the Roosevelt Roads Schools became part of the Antilles Consolidated Schools under the direction of Mr. Jesse Stinson, who was the Superintendent, located at Fort Buchanan. The new principal in 1955, Mr. Dick Jenkins, taught grades five through eight and supervised correspondence courses with the University of Nebraska for grades nine through twelve. There were four teachers on the faculty; Mr. and Mrs. Jenkins and Mr. and Mrs. Edmisten. They worked with seventy-five students.

During 1957 the Roosevelt Roads Schools were moved from the "120 Housing" area to renovated barracks in the Bundy area, across from the Mariposa Chalet. Mr. Baxter Stinson became principal and the school was operated as an Elementary School and a High School.

In 1961 Roosevelt Roads Elementary School opened for grades K-6 and the All School Meeting for the Antilles Consolidated Schools was held in the new building. The building is currently being used by the Roosevelt Roads Middle School.



for the students who were in fifth and sixth grades. Oh, how wrong you would be! The current Bundy Ball Park was at the disposal of the students and they made grand good use of the whole area. The area was so large that students were not the least bit upset when a well-meaning but somewhat careless student BLEW UP the science lab. In fact, most of the fifth and sixth graders didn't even hear the big BANG when it happened. Oh, but the lab and high school heard it! Fortunately, there were no more serious injuries than a little injured pride and slightly singed hands. You may rest assured that the Middle Schoolers didn't let those know-it-alls from High School forget that!



The Roosevelt Roads High School opened in February, 1967. It was the FIRST air-conditioned building in ACSS! Of course, the mere fact that the air-conditioning didn't work a great deal of the time was overlooked. In July of that year Mr. Dennis Smith became principal of grades four through twelve. Mr. Paul Lane was the assistant principal. Grades four through six remained in Bundy and continued to enjoy the daily bus rides for lunch. Grades K-3 remained in the old elementary building, but not for too long.

The year 1968 saw some remarkable changes. In January the Elementary School opened and grades K-3 finally had a permanent home. Also, the Middle School was AIR CONDITIONED! We were really top-of-the-heap. Just imagine, REAL air conditioning, and it worked, too. That is, it worked IF there was not a lot of cooking going on at the same time. The people in the kitchen were really great — they came in early — sometimes as early as 4:00 A.M. — to be sure that the ovens and cook-tops were off before the students arrived. All in all, it was a very interesting period of time.

Usually there is a simple explanation for quite involved problems. So it was with the air conditioning system. It seems that one of our maintenance people had told the contractors that he



believed he knew what the problem was. They merely smiled, nodded, and went about their search for some great engineering mystery. After all was said and done — and all the head-scratching was over — the maintenance man prevailed. The primary electrical supply wires were IN the building, but they had NOT been connected. It is absolutely amazing what wires can do when they are connected to the correct terminals . . . By the by, that "maintenance man" is still looking out for what makes the school tick. His name is William Garcia. Just about everyone who has had the pleasure of going through this school over the last twenty years remembers that smile and the hearty greeting that awaited them each day — rain or shine; test or game day.



In 1978 the fourth grade was moved from Roosevelt Roads Middle School to the new facility down by the Telephone Exchange. There the Kindergarten and grades one through four remain, happily engaged in learning and all that that entails.

In 1980 Mr. Dennis Smith departed Roosevelt Middle/High School for a principalship in the ACSS system at Fort Buchanan. At the same time, Mr. Lane Gutsche, who had functioned as assistant principal, moved to the Roosevelt Roads Elementary School. These gentlemen were replaced by Dr. Miles Turner as principal and Mr. Baylen Smith as assistant principal.


In 1982 Dr. Turner departed from the fields-of-snow and Dr. William Schreck took over the helm. Mr. Baylen Smith remained as assistant principal.

After guiding the ship-of-learning for an eventful two years, Dr. Schreck departed the mundane meadows of mere local administration for the heady heights of the Central Offices of ACSS.



In the early days of school year 1984-85, Mr. Al Musco arrived, fresh from the Land of Reality, to take over the helm of Roosevelt Roads Middle/High School. As you read this epistle, the Messers. Musco and Smith are labouring mightily to lift Roosevelt Roads Middle/High School to the rarified environs of educational excellence envisioned as the end-all and be-all of public education in our enlightened republic.




BOY'S CROSS COUNTRY
