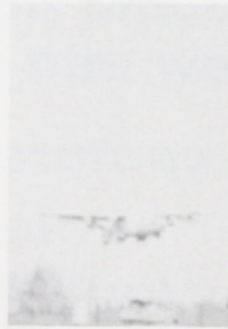

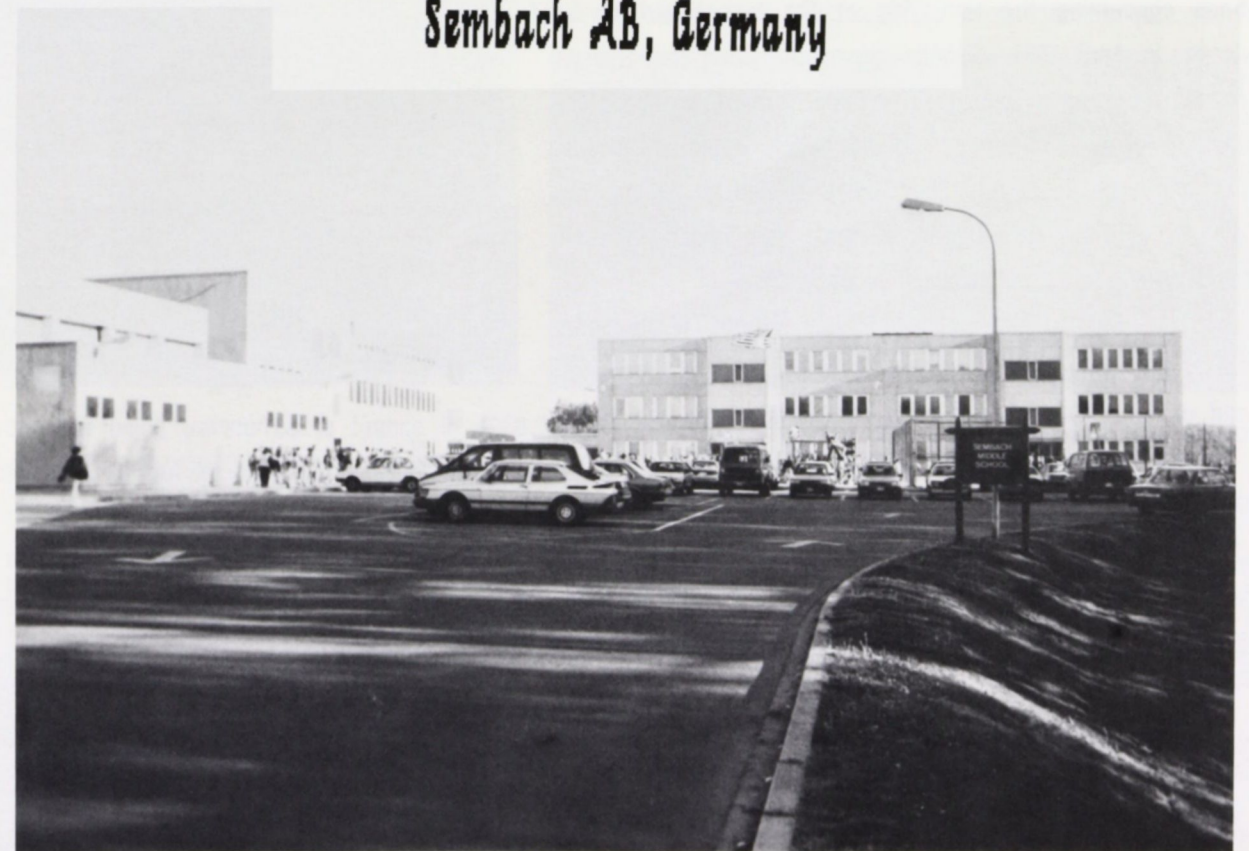

A Short History of Sembach Air Base

The history of Sembach began in 1919 after the Treaty of Versailles when French occupation troops used the eastern half of the present flight line as an airfield. It consisted of ten iron barracks and twenty six wooden hangers with canvas coverings. As a general withdrawal the French forces left the bank of the Rhine and abandoned the airfield on June 15, 1930.

After the French withdrawal, the land was returned to the farmers and was used as a hay field until 1939, when the German Luftwaffe ordered that the area be

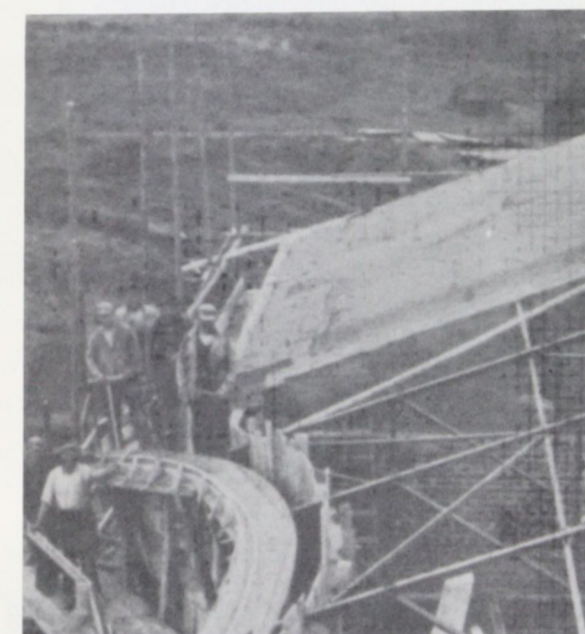


reserved for use as a fighter base. Because of the brevity of the French campaign in the first year of the Second World War, the area was returned to the farmers to be used as a pasture in June 1940.

Early in 1951, there were rumors in the village of Sembach concerning the surveying of the former airfield by Americans. In April 1951, German surveyors visited the area in the company of French officers. The local farmers protested the construction of a hard-surface airfield which would entail the loss of much of the land. They demonstrated in Mainz, the capital of the Rhineland-Palatinate, and were aided in their protest by West German Communist propagandists.

Despite the opposition, the French occupational authorities began the construction of a more modern airfield at the end of June 1951. Construction continued around the clock, with night-time illumination. The pouring of the 8,500 foot long runway began in early September 1951 and was finished at the end of the month. The taxiways were finished at the end of December. The flight line was completed in April 1952 with the construction of the road leading to the Bundesstrasse 48 (Snake Hill Road).

In the middle of April 1952, the residents of Sembach learned that the land to the north of the now completed flight line was to be used for construction of multi-story barracks and office buildings. On April 22 officials began to survey the



land. On April 23, the chief of the State Chancellery personally visited Sembach and promised Sembach farmers that he would do all he could do to protect their rights. The Sembach farmers were not convinced, however, and on April 28, they again denied the surveyors entrance to their field.

The land was successfully surveyed in August. In September, the Minister President of the Rhineland - Palatinate announced that the government had offered an alternate site for the planned construction. Shortly afterward, the occupation authorities agreed to build on the area known as heuburg, a sandy area of comparatively little agricultural value, located approximately a mile from the flight line. Sembach became a center of activity once more, as the construction of the administrative area of the base began in October 1952. More than 2500 workers labored day and night, operating bulldozers, dump trucks, and cement trucks. The present barracks and administrative buildings were completed in the spring of 1953. While all of the construction and surveying was supervised and conducted by the French, Sembach was built for American NATO forces. The American flag first flew at Sembach July 8, 1953.

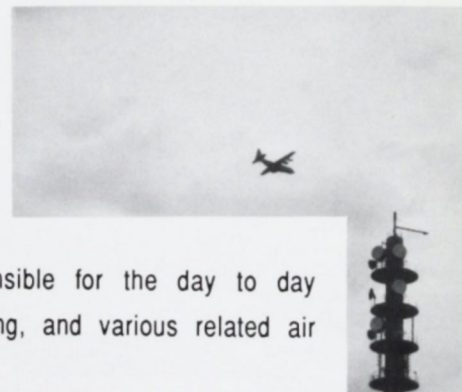
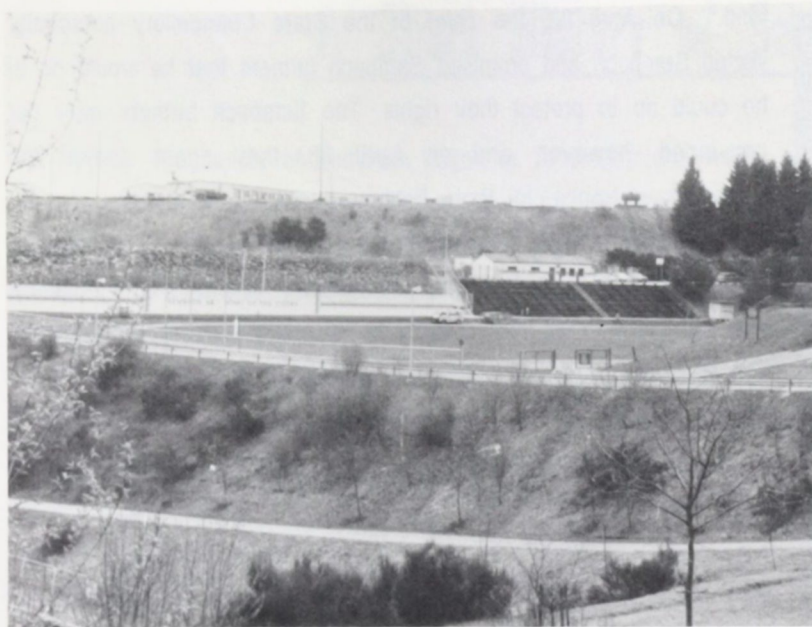
The third and final phase of construction was conducted in the summer of 1954 when the present housing area was built. The 66th Tactical Reconnaissance Wing operated RF-84 Thunder jets and RB-57



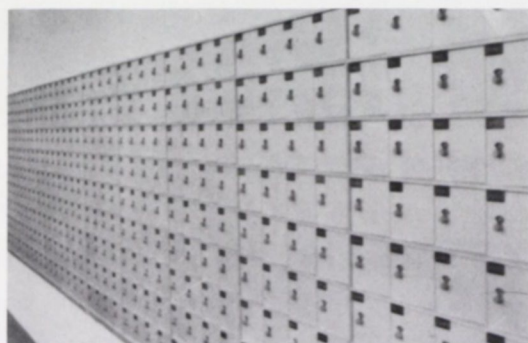
Canberras until being transferred to France in 1958. On August 20, 1959 the 38th Tactical Missile Wing moved to Sembach making it the Air Force's prime missile base in Europe until 1966.

On January 8, 1976 the 601st TCW returned to Sembach after being moved to Wiesbaden in 1973. The 601st is the largest wing in the US Air Forces Europe and is responsible for air surveillance and control of NATO aircraft in Germany. In 1979 Sembach became the first of four forward operating locations for A-10 Thunderbolts flying out of RAF Bentwaters in England. The wing is headquartered at Sembach but personnel operate at 48 different locations extending from the North Sea to northern Italy.

The 17th Air Force moved its headquarters to Sembach in 1972. It provides surveillance of U.S. Air Force assigned forces in central Europe and includes six tactical wings, one tactical fighter squadron, one air base group, and one operations group. 17th AF also interfaces with the U.S. Army, Europe and 7th Army to insure Air Force/Army day-to-day support and deployments are consistent with wartime objectives. Other groups at Sembach include the 66th Command



Support Group (which touches our lives most directly since it is responsible for the day to day operations and support services on base), the 66th Electronics Control Wing, and various related air force and army units.

The immediate area in which we live is a district called Palatinate which is part of the Rheinland Pfalz, a German Federal State. Historically, the Palatinate is one of Germany's most interesting and fertile provinces, having been a meeting place and crossroad of tribes, nations, and civilizations for thousands of years.

Numerous excavations conducted in this area during the past 100 years have produced traces of human activity dating back as much as 250,000 years to the remote period when specimens of the so-called Heidelberg Man roamed the banks of the Rhein River.

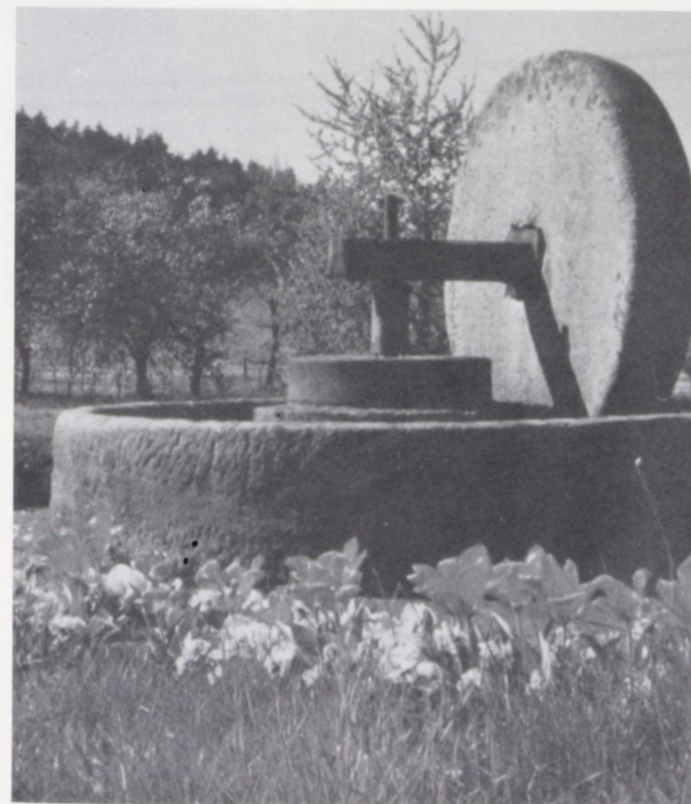
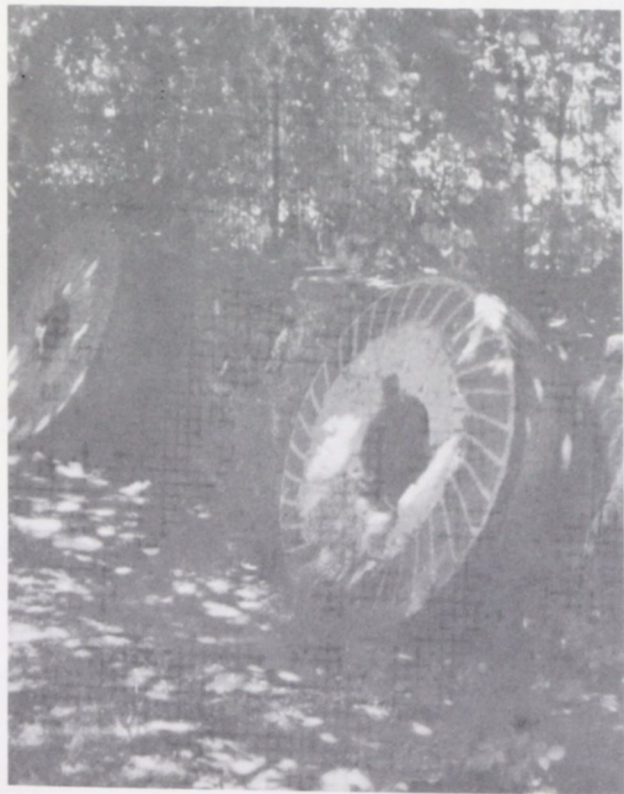
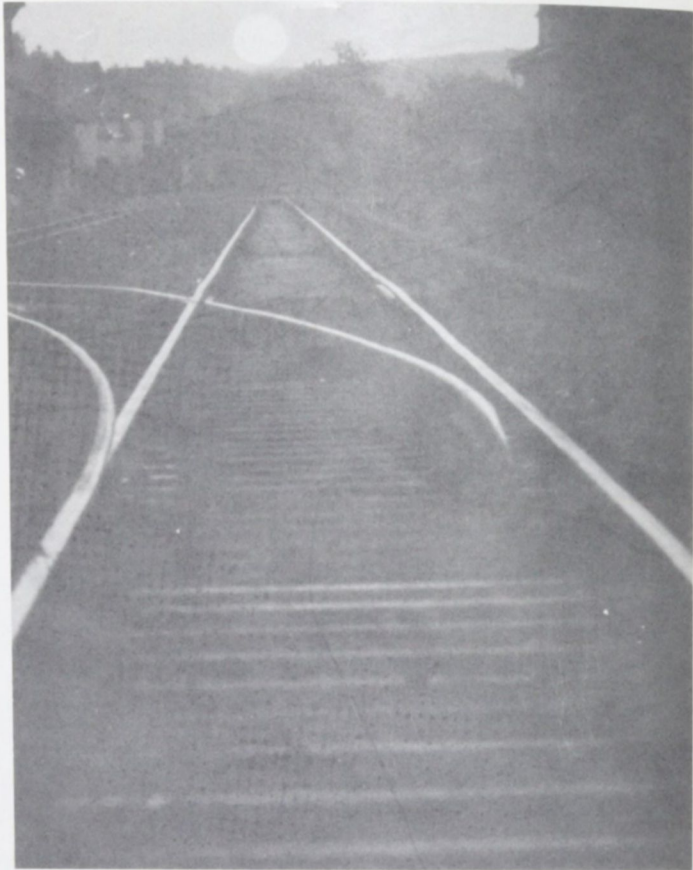
By about 100,000 B.C. this region was right in the center of the stone-age culture which is believed to have led to the development of the Neanderthal Man. About 500 B.C. large groups of iron-ware tribes, known as the Celts, set out from their original homes around the upper Rhein River into what is now France, Spain, Britain, Southern and Central Germany, Northern Italy, The Balkans and Asia Minor. A few hundred years later, however, the powerful Celts were conquered by the Roman Legions of Caesar and the Palatinate became a Roman province.

Rheinland Pfalz: Historical Perspective

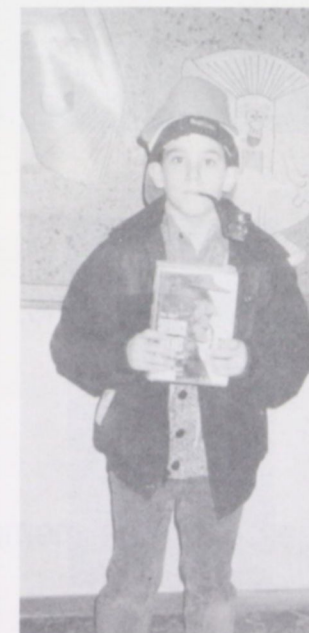
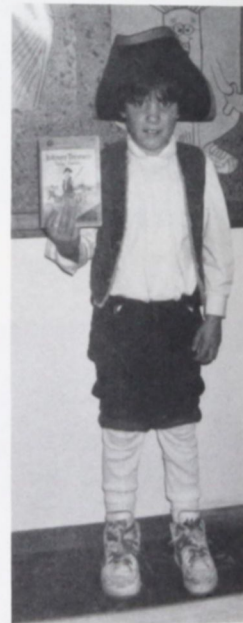


During the following centuries Germanic tribes from the east and north put pressure on the Roman Rhein frontier. The Roman Empire fell apart, and by about 500 A.D. the land on the western bank of the Rhein River was almost completely Germanicized.

While being part of the Frankish Empire during the first century, Christianity spread widely; being adopted by the populations on the west side of the Rhein. This development involved the establishment of bishoprics; and, because of the vast size of the Frankish Empire, its rulers established their places in areas located conveniently to maintain communications between the east and west dominions. Some of the most popular were: Kaiserslautern, Trier, Speyer and Worms. These palaces also give the clue for the origin of the name Palatinate. Among high office holders at the courts there used to be Lords Chamberlain, Constables, Marshals, and Chancellors. In addition there was one named the "Count of the Place" or Count Palatine. All of these high-ranking vassals were endowed with special trust and power and given large holdings of land. Subsequently, the land received by the Count Palatine acquired the name "Palatinate". Originally, there were a large number of Palatinates in Germany. However, this is the only one to have retained the term "Rhein Palatinate" as part of its proper name.
