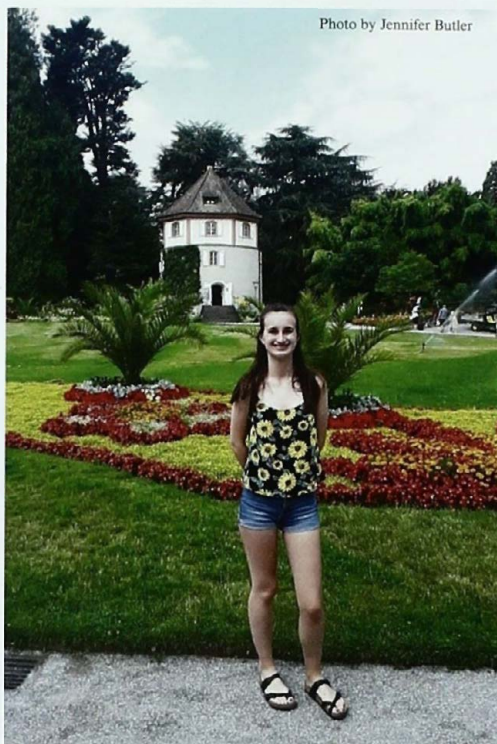

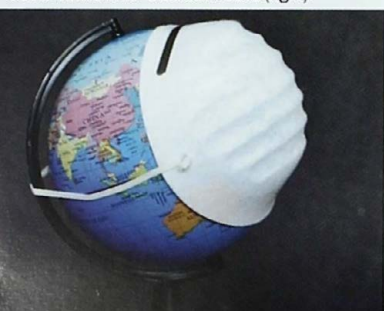

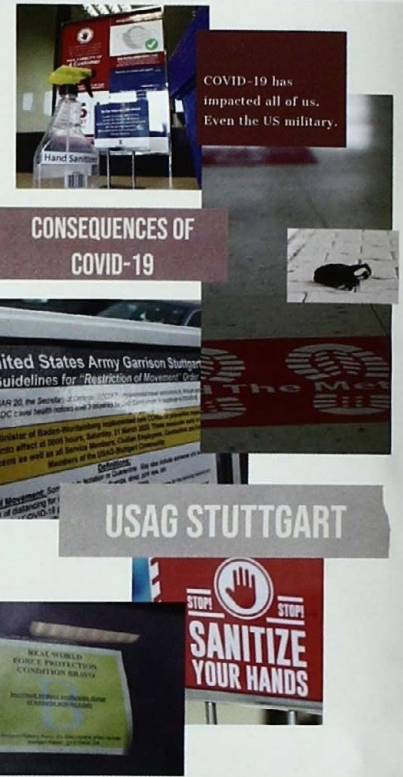
Physical education classes still remain in tact with COVID precautions still being implemented outside despite the December temperature drop.

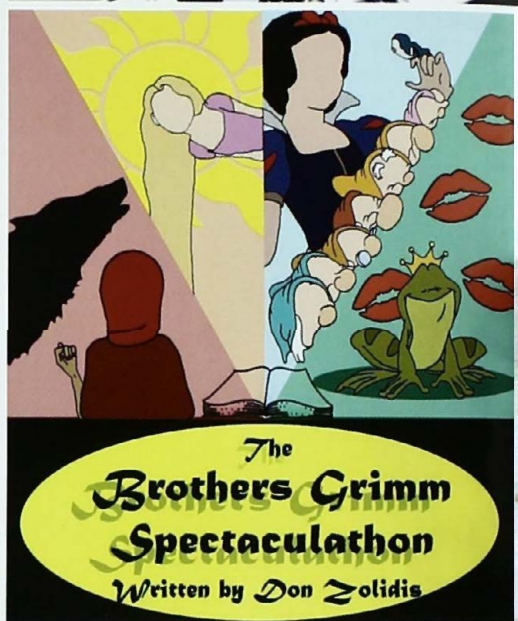

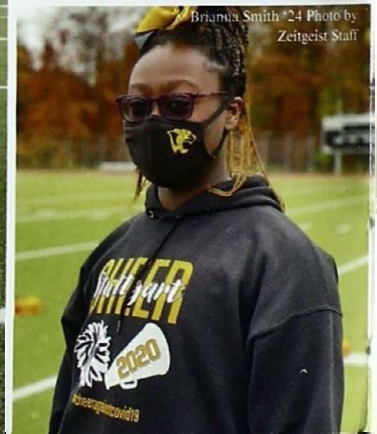

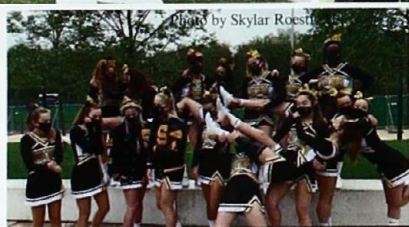

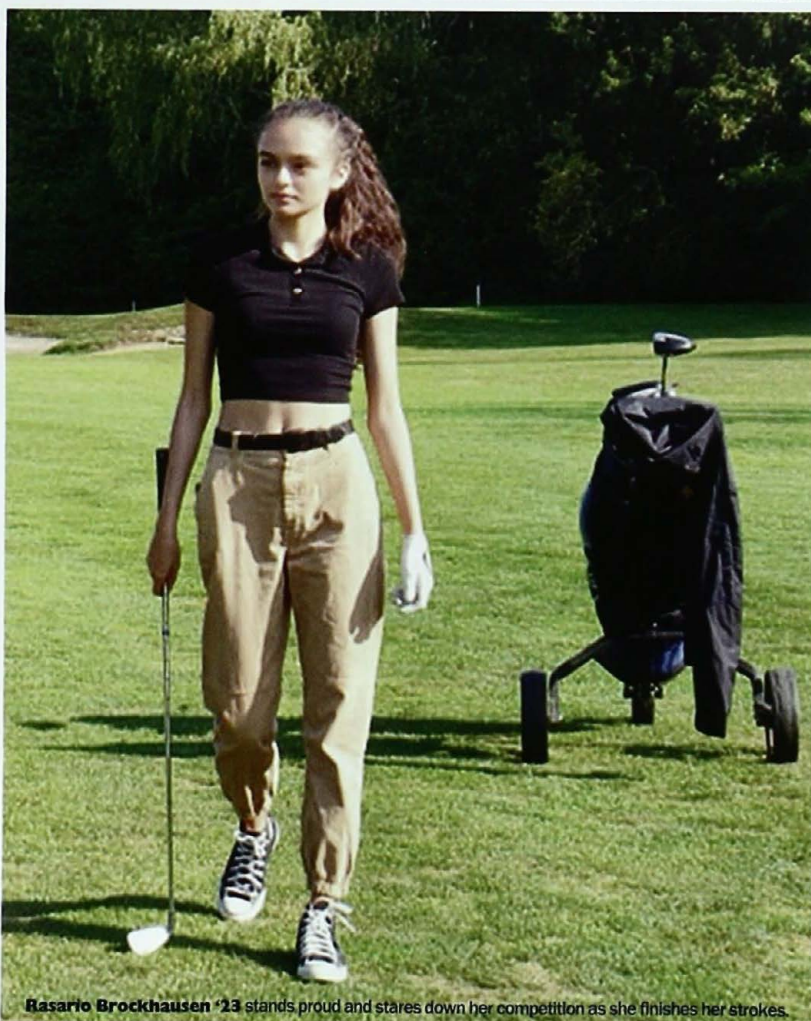

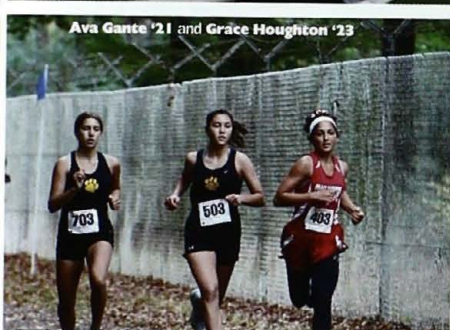

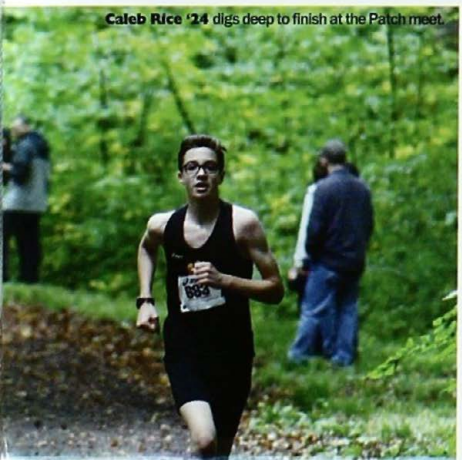


"PRE"

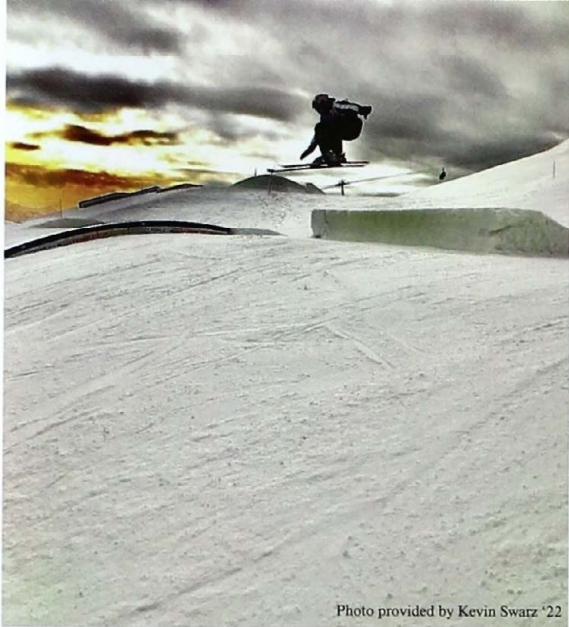

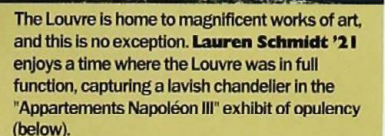

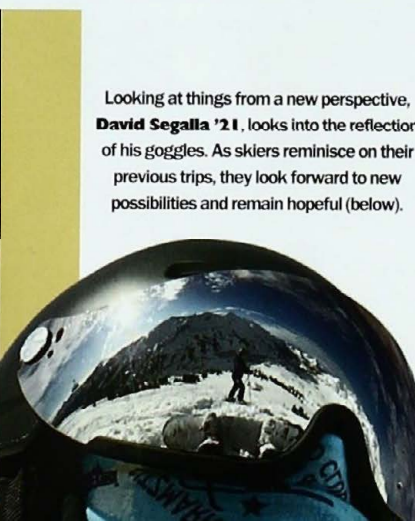

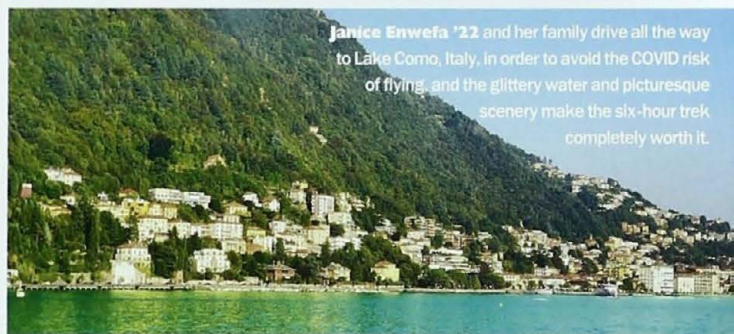

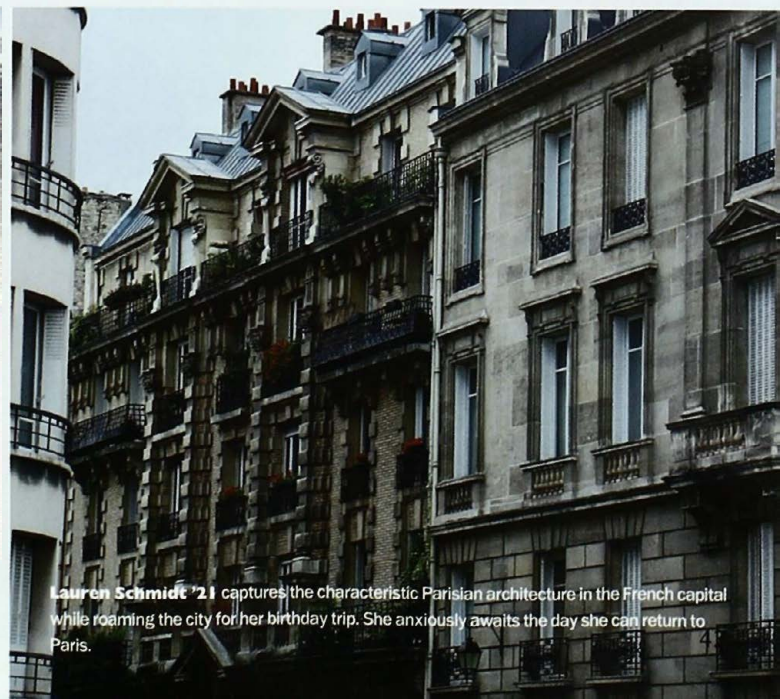

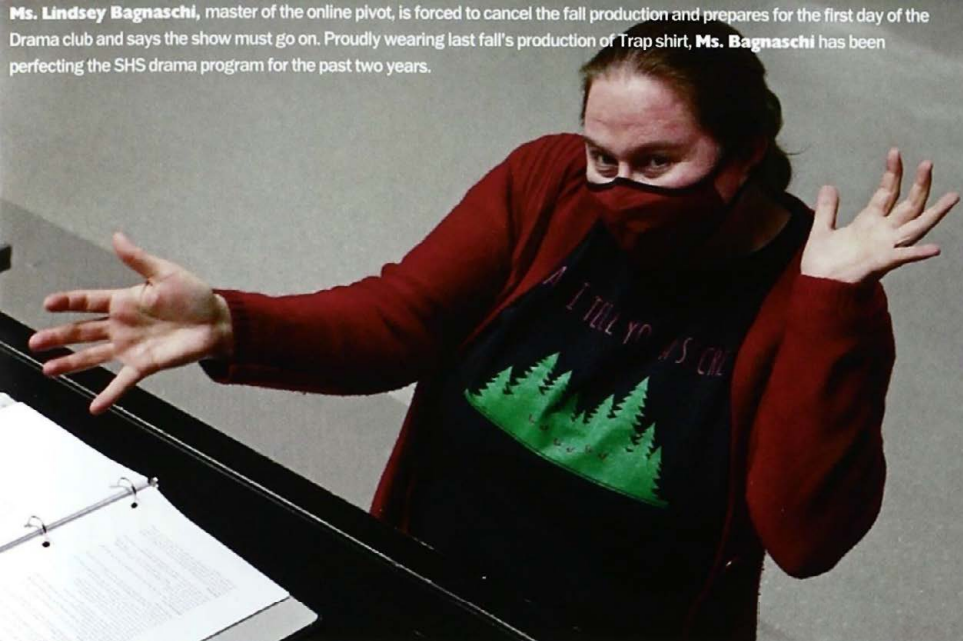

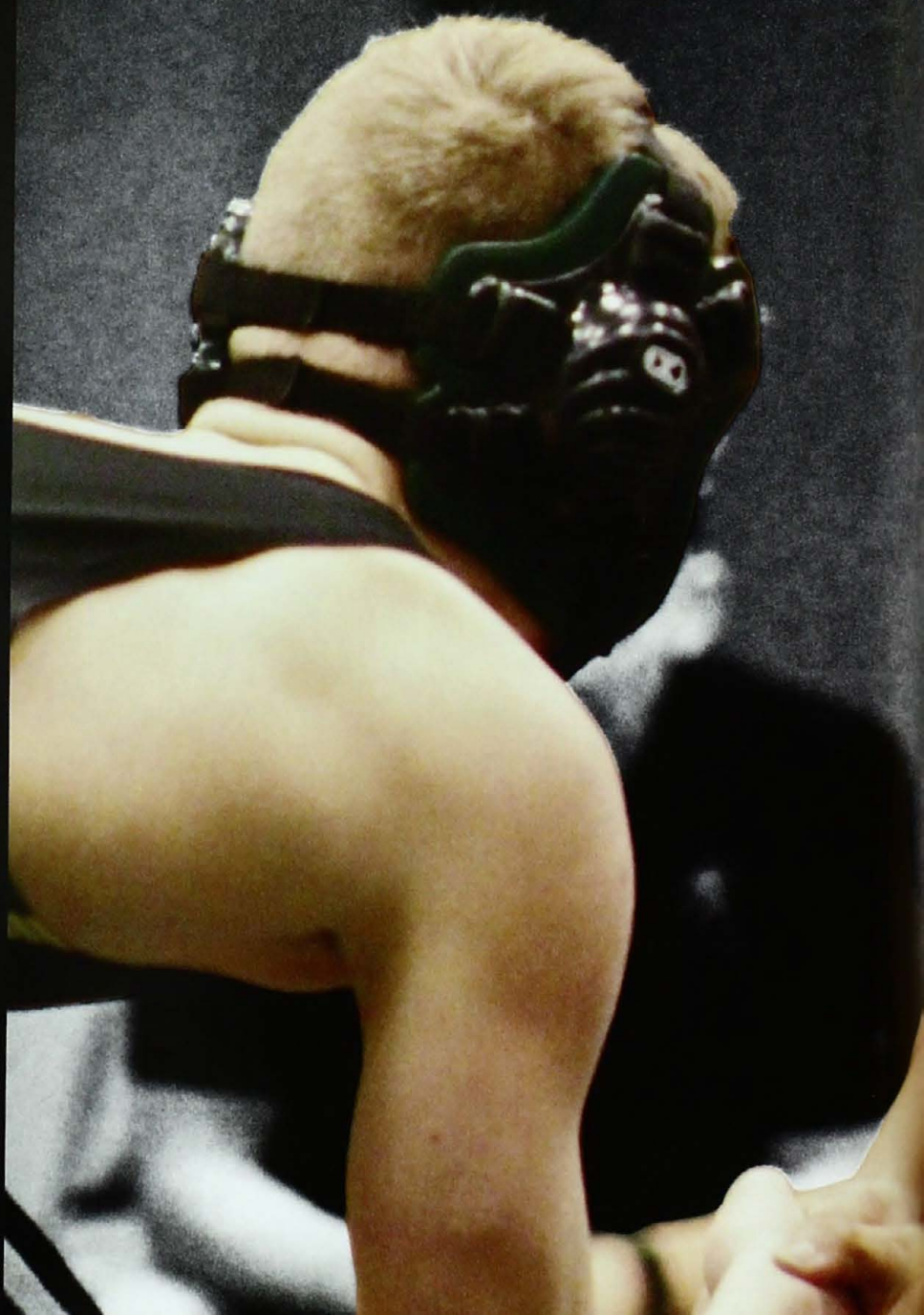

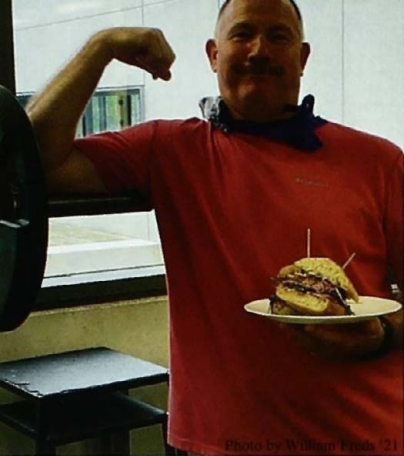

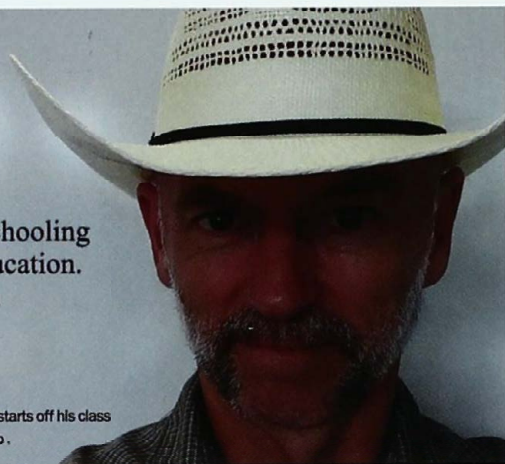
Most people think chemistry is

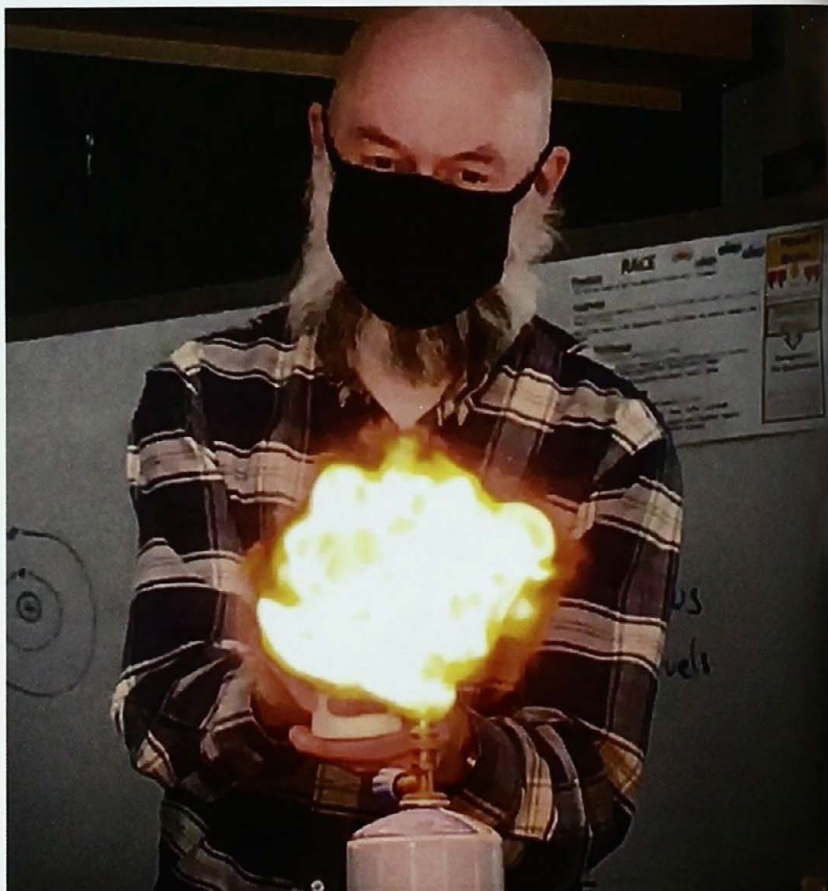

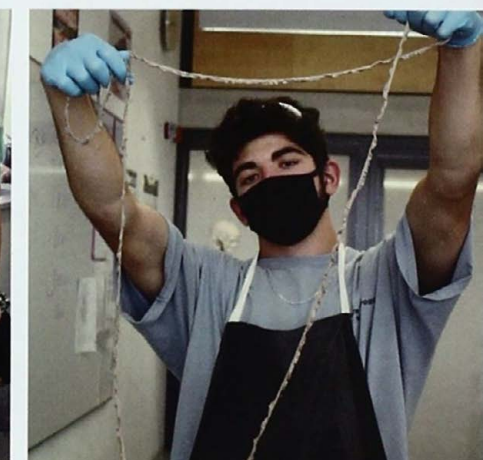

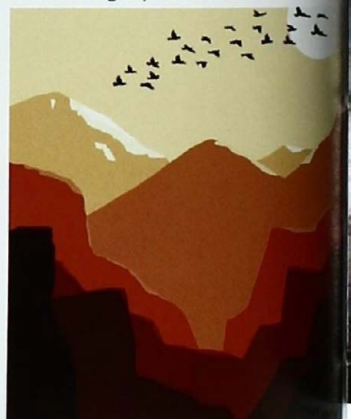

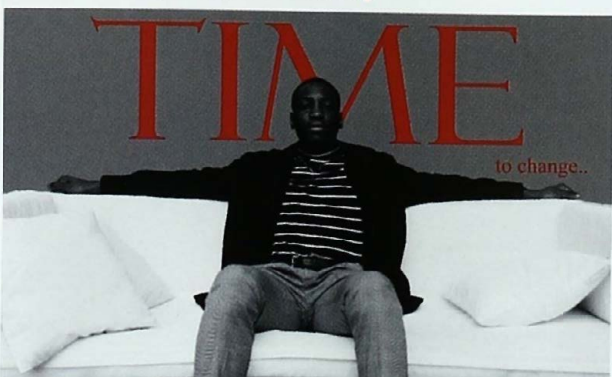

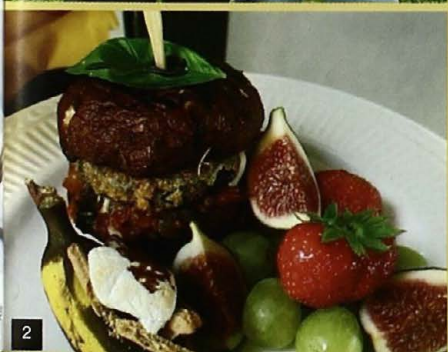

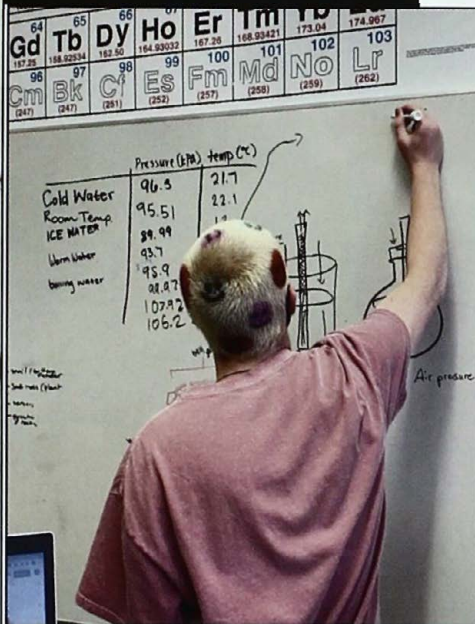

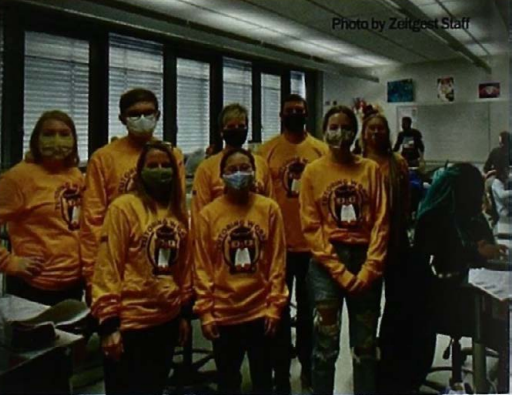

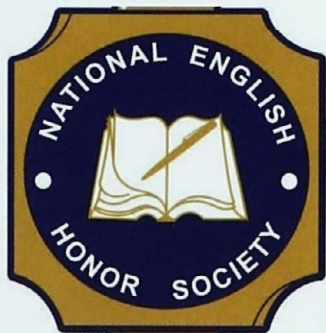

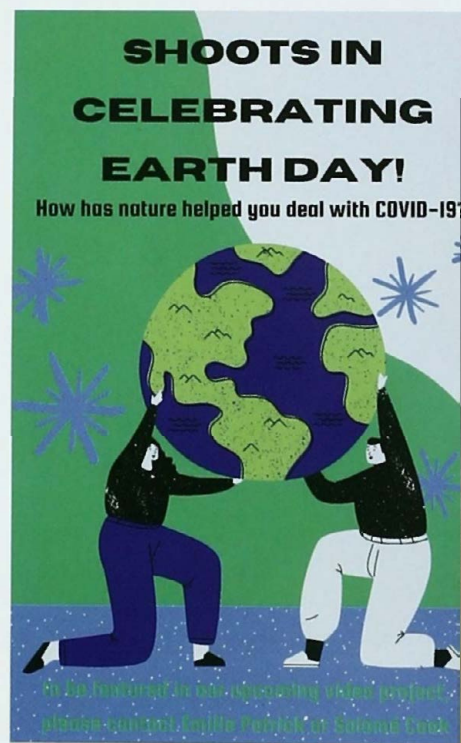

Panther Nation Scholastic Art & Writing Awards Yearly Competition for 2020-2021

The Scholastic Art & Writing Awards are presented by the Alliance for Young Artists & Writers. The Alliance is a nonprofit organization whose mission is to identify students with exceptional artistic talent and present their remarkable work to the world through the Scholastic Art & Writing Awards. The Awards give students opportunities for recognition, exhibition, publication, and scholarships. Stuttgart High School artists competed with students across America (nearly 320,000) in 28 different categories of art and writing. **Dr. Michael Mosby**, SHS Art teacher and Department Chair, is in charge of assisting students in the competition. This is the only national benchmark that gives art students the opportunity to gauge their work against all of the other schools in the nation and world. The initial judging is done in five regions, SHS is in the international region which includes all American and International schools outside the US, including all DoDEA schools. Receiving just one Gold Key is a true accolade but this year SHS received four Gold Keys, six Silver Keys, and eight honorable mentions. This is a phenomenal achievement. The Gold Key recipients will move on to the National judging which is held in New York City during March.

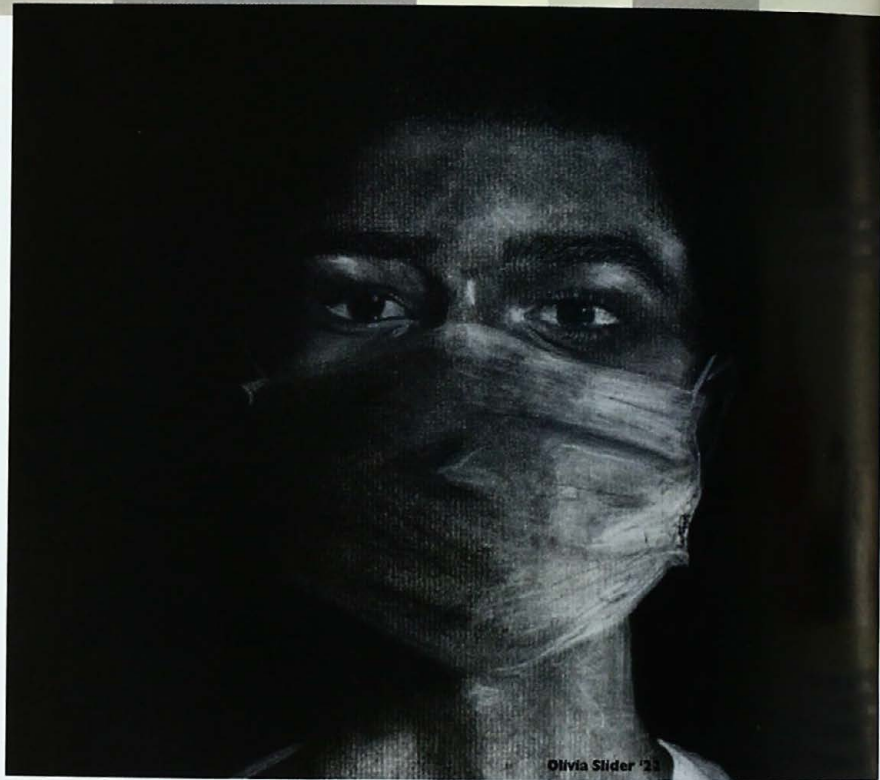

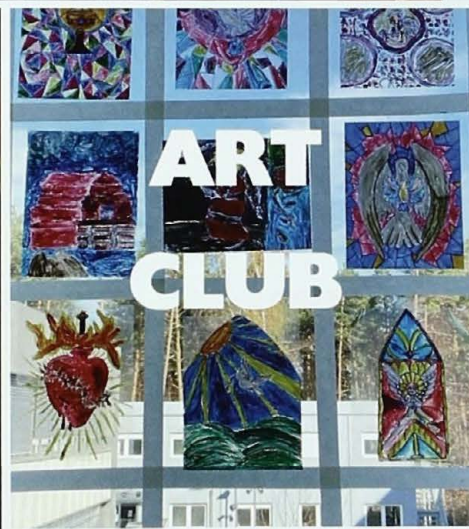

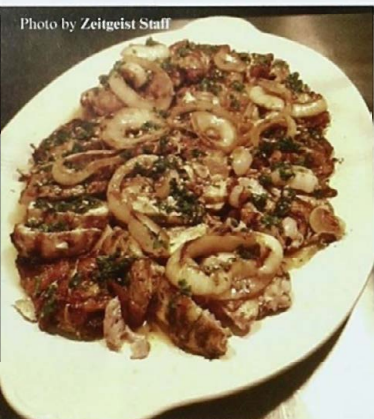

ROBOTICS

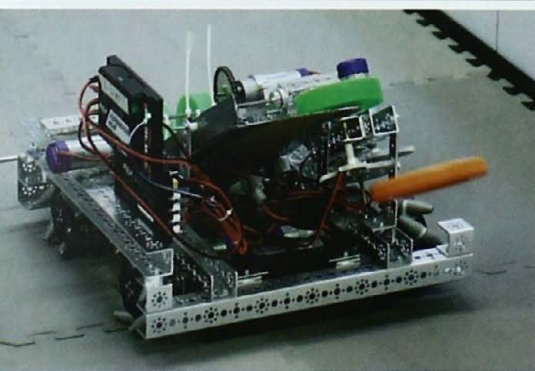

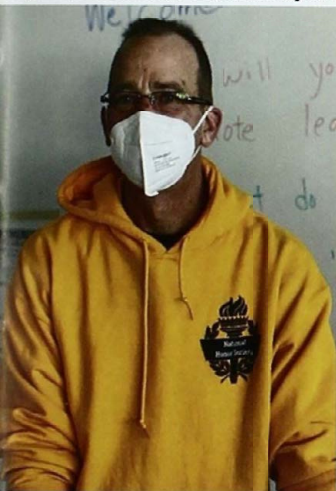

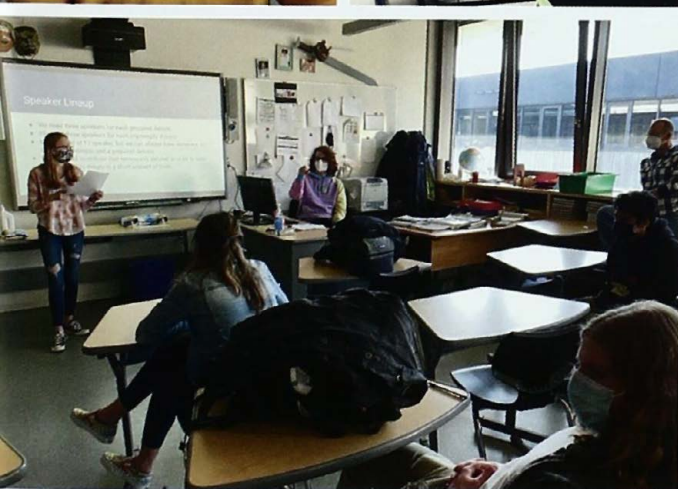

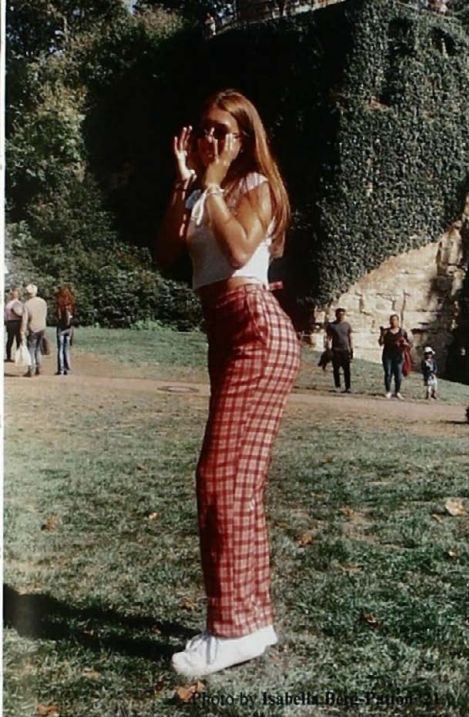

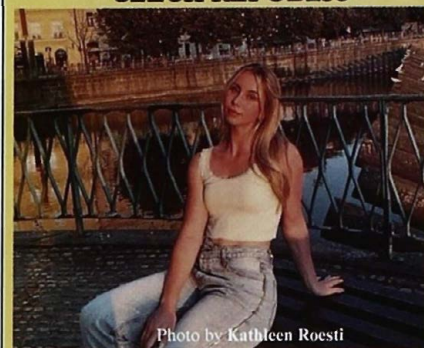

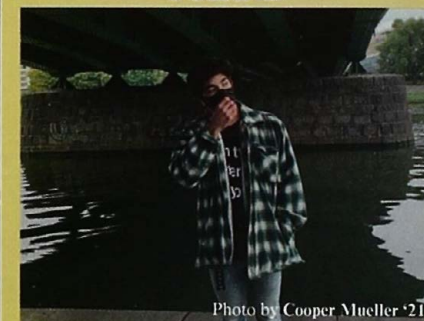

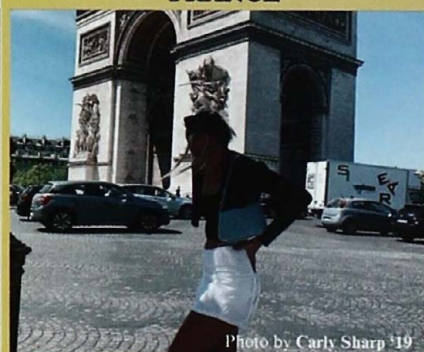

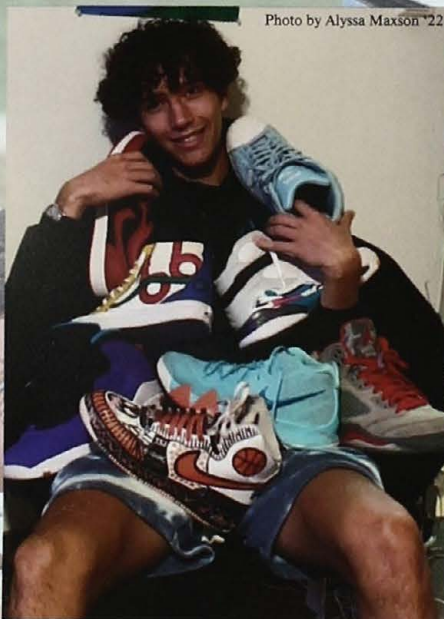

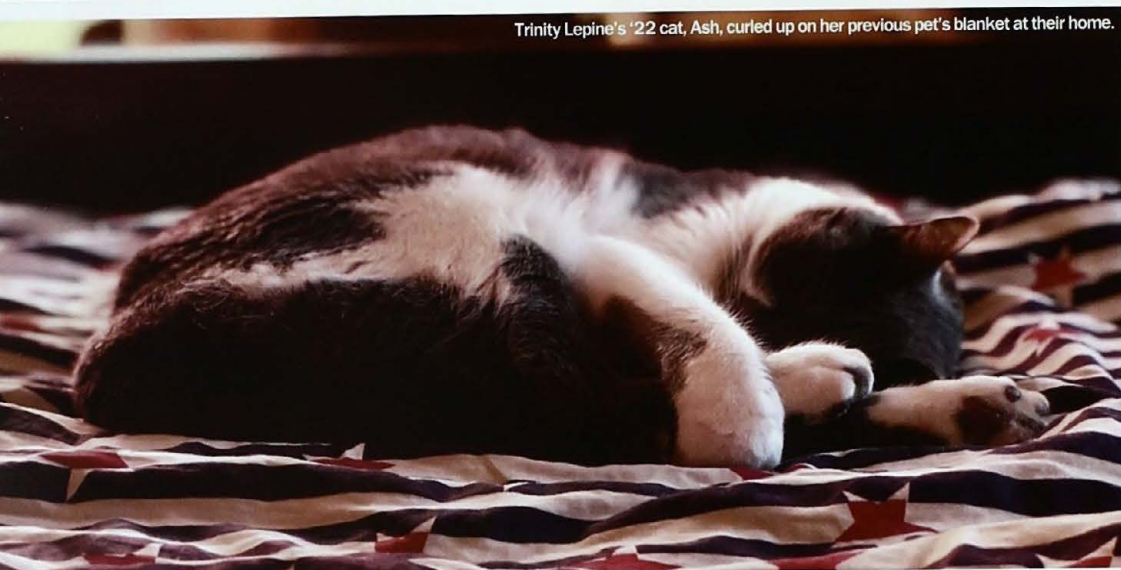

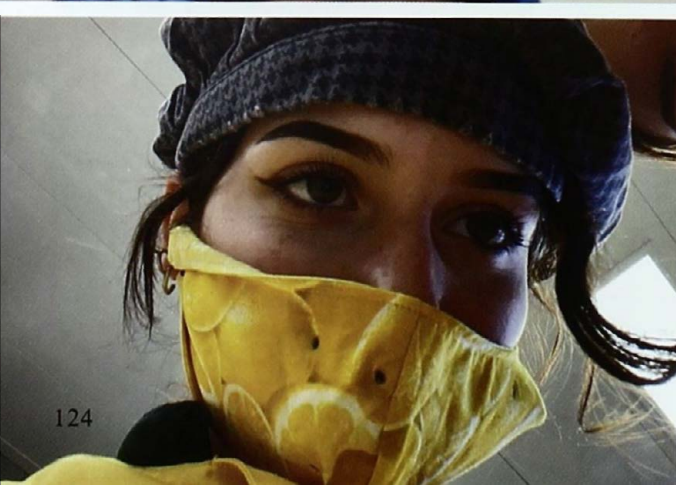

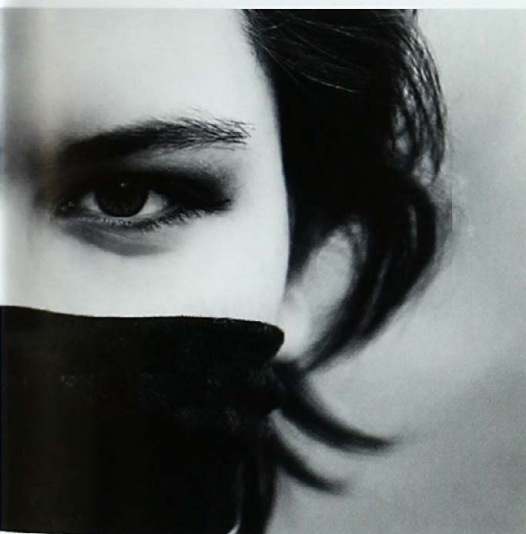

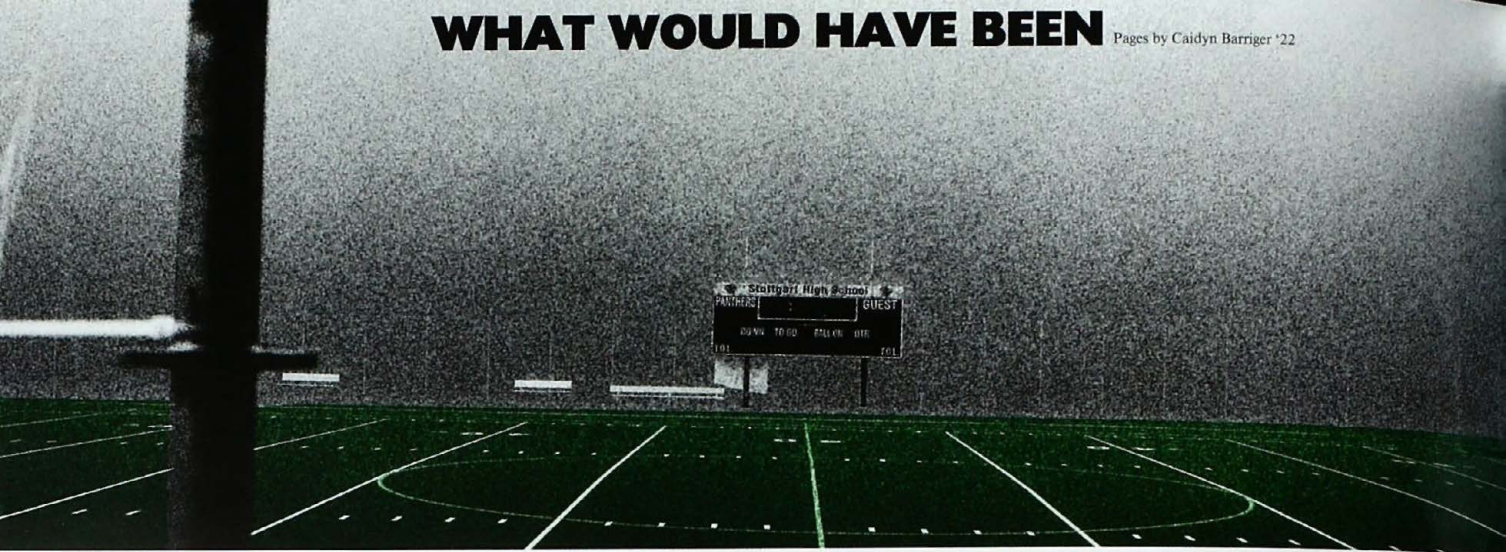

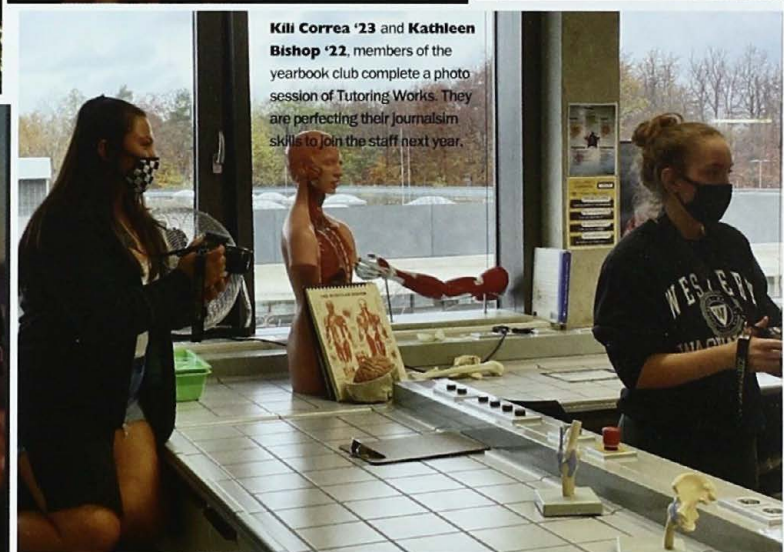

National Merit Scholarship

The National Merit Scholarship Program is a United States academic scholarship competition for recognition and university scholarships administered by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation, a privately funded, not-for-profit organization based in Evanston, Illinois. The program began in 1955. **Kyle Stevenson '21** and **Esidore Eneinyang '21** stand together as two strong finalists (left)!

17-year-old Esidore Eneinyang, a first-generation American with parents from Nigeria and the Philippines, has soared above the competition and achieved a position as a finalist in the National Merit Scholarship program. His family's several moves have allowed him to "...to find pieces of myself - hobbies, aspirations, and interests. I picked up mountain biking in Georgia, where I would ride along the Savannah river trails all weekend. My fascination for cars began in the Netherlands, and since then, I have attended some of the biggest auto shows in the world and have had the privilege of repairing cars." Esidore decided to work towards the National Merit Scholarship in his Sophomore year; he had barely made the PSAT score cut-off and decided to partake in SAT study programs to boost his test scores. On top of that, Esidore advocates for taking many practice tests to prepare for both the topics at hand and the format of the test. Stuttgart High is immensely proud of Esidore, and we hope to see him excel at Stanford, the University of Southern California, or wherever he chooses to go!

Kyle Stevenson is a soon-to-be college student and has transcended the competition into the finalist ranking of the National Merit Scholarship. Kyle has indeed been an amazing student at Stuttgart High, and has been offered early decision admittance to the very selective Massachusetts Institute of Technology, and multiple U.S. military academies. Not only does Kyle demonstrate academic excellence, but has been a top-tier student athlete in the junior varsity Men's Soccer team and the varsity Stuttgart Piranhas swim team.

The National Merit Scholarship Corporation (NMSC) is a not-for-profit organization that gives out 30 million dollars in scholarships to high school seniors throughout the nation. Founded in 1955, The NMSC teams up with over 400 companies a year to provide scholarships to thousands of seniors every year. By recognizing academic excellence across the United States, the NMSC chooses up to 16,000 seniors to move to the esteemed semifinalist position in the program. 15,000 of these accomplished young adults will then be lifted to the Finalist Position. Of these 15,000 students, approximately 2,500 will be chosen to receive a scholarship of \$2,500. The National Merit Scholarship Corporation works every year to provide new opportunities for rising college students throughout American communities everywhere.

535+ years!!

The adjustment to stagnation is the fundamental principle of perseverance. Stuttgart High School, the place we know and love, is acclimating to a new type of school year, one in which students cannot predict the future of their learning. We have transitioned to online learning twice, giving us new sleep schedules, unique personalities, new pastimes, new hobbies, new chips on our shoulders, and a new appreciation for the things static as opposed to wavering. If more remote learning is on the way, expect this to happen again and again, as it is a paradigm that doesn't break easily. Under **Principal Rick Renninger's** ultimate supervision, the school formatted new learning platforms to become a constant presence in the ever-changing time. Our teachers brought about Google Classroom, Schoology, Webassign, Clever, StudioWorks, all forums for our organizational well-being.

The usually resilient students hesitantly returned at 8:00 a.m. on October 27th, 2020. A deficit of in-person interactive learning styles has given our students an appreciation for the whiteboard. For such a fast transition, things had been seamless, and life could continue as it had before. The second transition to home learning had been far more impactful. Lasting from early December to late February (nearly three months, giving plenty of time for self-reflection by the students and teachers alike), subjects became monotonous and information more difficult to retain, yet we persisted. Our learning had to be merged with the internet, and yet we persisted. Students and teachers defamiliarized, and we persisted further.

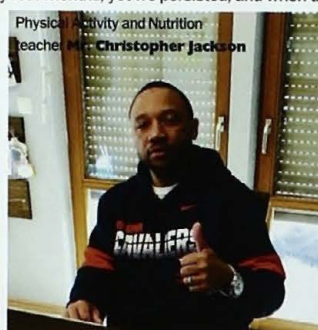
Out of four million American students publicly surveyed during their online transition (while 19.6 million students were able to be surveyed, they had not qualified due to their school's COVID-19 policies), 11% had changed opinions on attending a four-year university. 11% of students had seen COVID-19 as a deterrent to a continuation of online learning. The imperfections of staring at a screen for hours on a circadian basis could hold immense repercussions on Stuttgart High School students. How are students handling the isolation emotionally? How are teachers? To what lengths should Stuttgart High School go to ensure the emotional salubrity of their students?

Nothing expedited the answer to these questions. As a community or even family, we had to endure the entirety of lockdown to understand our limits. Now, as we walk the tightrope between lockdown and in-person learning, we can realize the importance of seeing our peers and teachers. As a family, we have seen to it that we will be prepared instead of our earlier naive approach. The storm buffeted us for nearly four months, yet we persisted, and when the storm comes again with the Bundestag and Bundesrat pushing a lockdown familiar to us, we will persist.

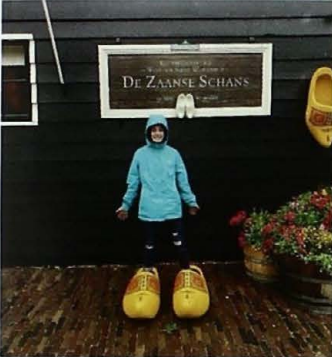

This past year, I had the amazing opportunity to work closely with the Yearbook teacher, Ms. Shana Blankenship, at my high school. I was the Co-Editor-in-Chief and Copy Editor-in-Chief of the 2020-2021 Zeitgeist Yearbook, as well as an assistant teacher for Yearbook and multiple Digital Publishing and Imaging classes. I have taken this happenstance to develop my interpersonal and time-management skills as I hope to become an English Professor in the future.

Working with dozens of students from hundreds of backgrounds to publish an expansive yearbook, which is around 300 pages, by March, has given me many chances to learn, teach, and adapt. With many clubs and events being cancelled due to COVID-19 restrictions, we, as a leadership group, have had to be creative, by rearranging the pages and inventing new topics to fill the vacated space of football, homecoming, and various other activities. Having lost our connection to each other, as my school has become virtual to limit the exposure students may have to infected people, the challenge this year has been to make sure each and every student is getting the help they need as well as the opportunity to shine in their respective areas. Assigning pages, sections, dividers, and body texts has turned into a chance to achieve a deeper connection to the students, their mindsets, and skills in spite of our physical distance.

Along with the loss of connection, we, as a student body, were unable to access Adobe programs that we often use in class, such as Adobe Photoshop, Adobe InDesign, Adobe Illustrator, and Adobe Lightroom. These programs are what make our yearbook one of the best, as the accents, cover, and dividers require special care and talent to make them as eye-catching as they have been in the past. We fortunately have access to various online programs that offer similar tools and tricks and a handful of overtly talented students who have mastered these programs to a degree that the knowledge transfers to other programs.

With access to past knowledge, as I have been involved in yearbook since my sophomore year, and to Ms. Blankenship, who has been in-charge for dozens, we were able to persist, through only online training and Balfour Studioworks, our yearbook publishing program, tutorials. Passing this knowledge onto students has been dramatically rewarding, as I am able to see my efforts from learning in the past instantly influence the outcome of this year's yearbook.

Our ability to directly help students has been affected by the pandemic but our ability to create and preserve through has not. Google Meets, our preferred video conferencing platform, limits us to names and icons. The social aspect of school has all but disappeared, leaving us to strictly stick to doing out assignments and projects. Nevertheless, our greatest accomplishment was submitting our yearbook cover months in advance, giving the printing facility time to deal with their own restrictions without changing our distribution date.

Responsibility across the school has unfortunately diminished as the pressure of being in-person has encouraged students to work hard for generations, so, as school has been starting later and later due to restrictions across elementary, middle, and high school, the number of people sleeping in, forgetting assignments, and just not caring, has grown tenfold in comparison. Despite these restrictions, Ms. Blankenship, fellow Editors-in-Chief, and many students put their all into keeping up with the ever increasing deadline and the ever decreasing amount of topics we have the ability to cover. Without these key factors, we would still be stuck on the first page we published.

The company, Balfour Studioworks, has been incredibly helpful as well, as one of the publishers is a long time friend of Ms. Blankenship and has therefore been in contact with us throughout. Learning through her has been incredible, as we are able to gain exclusive and immediate information about how to proceed with our yearbook.

The 2021 cover artist is Master Designer **Eric Hein '21**; he created a classic black and gold cut-out claw cover. Eric is a four-year staffer and has produced numerous award-winning designs through his tenure at Stuttgart High School. Eric created the end sheets, divider pages, and countless beautiful artwork additions on Adobe Photoshop. Nearly 12,000 "All-Calls for Photos" emails were vetted to the 865 member student body. The staff made every attempt to use these photos to attain their goal of "every student in the yearbook three times." Additionally, a massive outreach was extended to parents for photos. Our ever-supportive and inspirational Balfour European Publishing consultant, **Ms. Karen Burbach-Barker**, located at Shipston-on-Stroud, CV36 4RD, England, helped us work through all the issues.

Co-Editors-in-Chief, **Sydney Anderson '21**, **Kweku Andoh '21**, **Sofia Montero '21**, **Rebecca "Becky" Rhoden '21**, **Lauren Schmidt '21**, and Copy Editor, **Gina Forzano '21**, were assisted by journalists under the direction of Panther Pulse Magazine editors, **Hope Simpson '22** and **George Svoboda '22**. The work of the staff members made this extraordinary book possible. The Zeitgeist staff completed the main book in eight months, under the added challenge of the COVID-19 pandemic, which placed the entire school, community, and world into a period of redefining normal. Sydney reconstructed the overall book structure over a dozen times as each wave of new cancellations rolled over Panther Nation.

It has been especially difficult for the Class of 2021; they grieve the loss of the most iconic of all American Dreams: the march to graduation through sports, pep assemblies, senior trips, and prom. But none-the-less, they persisted!

Senior Dedication Ads were under the direction of **Kayelyn Diaz '21** and **Aliyah Wilson '21** with unfailing assistance by **Anthony Caballero '21**. Kayelyn "Lovey" and Aliyah perfected a flawless business model. Each advertisement is individually designed in tandem with parents until satisfaction is achieved. The process is immensely sensitive; often, it is a parent's final farewell as their child transitions from high school to college. The dedication becomes a formal goodbye to the child and hello to the adult. Parents purchase the dedications, and the money funds the special yearbook applications that our designers have come to use as the cornerstone of the Zeitgeist program. Lovey, Aliyah, and Anthony have completed one of the most challenging and time-consuming portions of the 2021 book and did so under "Sheltering in Place," collaborating virtually. They have learned the art of running a small advertisement company, including the adage, "the customer is always right." Their work is professional, and they have created the best dedication section ever. We will forever appreciate their skills, patience, organizational skills, and commitment.

The 2021 Virtual Spring Supplement will be completed in time for The Zeitgeist Yearbook distribution, hosted in June. Yearbook Club ran after school, allowing additional staff to participate. School portraits were by Rotary International, based in London, England.

The 224-page book was designed using Balfour Studioworks, 29 Dell computers, two Microsoft Surfaces, 74 cell-phones, and many 24-35mm Canon EOS SL Rebel cameras. The book features a 9" by 12" large format used to showcase extraordinary photography and excellent writing: 100% high gloss book paper and matte end sheets. The color scheme, based on dark blacks and traditional gold tones, with an occasional accent color, matched the photography. The font families were Benjamin Gothic Medium, Chantilly Heavy, Cooper Black, Octave Medium Olympia, Storyteller Brush, and Times New Roman, including Medium, Condensed, and Bold. 475 books were produced and sold for \$98.00 each during early-bird sales; the price rose to \$135.00 during the final sales round. Sincere thanks to Balfour's **Karen Burbach-Barker** for her unfailing assistance and to **Principal Rick Renninger** for his unwavering support of the SHS Yearbook/Journalism program. Thanks to the patient teachers and staff that allowed numerous interruptions to accommodate our real-world learning to procure photos and information. Thanks to the unfailing support of the entire 2020-21 Zeitgeist Staff. You have exceeded ALL my expectations. I will never again have such a capable, caring, service-above-self staff. You never lost hope, you never diminished in your positive forward thinking, your work ethic soared, you never fought, you loved, listened, forgave, and worked... and worked... and this is significant, when the rest of the world fell apart.

Fireworks at a gender reveal party spark one of a record-setting number of California wildfires in 2020. Over 4.1 million acres are burned and over 10,000 structures are destroyed. The August Complex fire becomes California’s first “gigafire,” a blaze that burns over 1 million acres of land.

From COVID Lockdown to Federal Lockup >

14 men are arrested by the FBI for orchestrating a domestic terrorist plot to kidnap Michigan Gov. Gretchen Whitmer. A federal grand jury indicts six men with felony charges, while eight others are charged with state crimes. Federal investigators identify it as a plot by anti-government extremists who are dissatisfied with the governor’s strict orders to stay-at-home and control the spread of coronavirus.



SCOTUS is Ruthless

Judge Amy Coney Barrett takes the Constitutional Oath and is sworn in as a Supreme Court Justice, filling the position left vacant by the passing of Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg.

Most schools start using some form of virtual or distance learning, either full-time or on a "hybrid" schedule. Many clubs, activities and sports are restricted. There are clear plastic dividers everywhere. We have temperature checks in the building and microphone checks on Zoom. And for most of us, masks are mandatory and handshakes are history.



A Summer for Social Justice

When footage of the death of George Floyd in Minneapolis, MN goes viral, social justice movements, marches, and protests take center stage. In more than 2,000 cities and towns in 60 countries, masses fill the streets demanding racial equality, speaking out against policies that facilitate systemic racism.

A Massive Buzzkill

Sightings of Asian giant hornets (Vespa mandarinia) in Washington prompt fears that the vicious, invasive insect could devastate the US honey bee population. A hornet's sting is painful, but the effects of a reduced honey bee population hurts more; honey bees are responsible for pollinating the fruit, plants and nuts that humans eat, and the alfalfa that feeds the animals that provide meat and dairy to people. Without honey bees, we all get stung.



Protest Takes Violent Turn

Angry protesters storm the US Capitol building on Jan. 6, 2021 in an attempt to stop a joint session of Congress from confirming Joe Biden's victory. The Senate and House of Representatives are evacuated as rioters occupy and ransack the empty chamber, posting videos to social media all the while, making it easy for the FBI to arrest over 200 people within two weeks of the riot. Five people die from the event, and dozens are injured.

Powerful Explosions Shatter Beirut

In Lebanon's capital city of Beirut, a fire reaches a 2,750-ton stockpile of ammonium nitrate causing two devastating explosions. The catastrophic blasts destroy 85% of the country's grain supply and cause \$15 billion in property damage and leave at least 200 dead, 7,500 injured, and an estimated 300,000 people homeless. Lebanese government declares a state of emergency to deal with the aftermath. The explosions ripple through the industrial waterfront, extending to popular nightlife and shopping districts and densely populated neighborhoods.

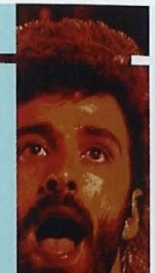

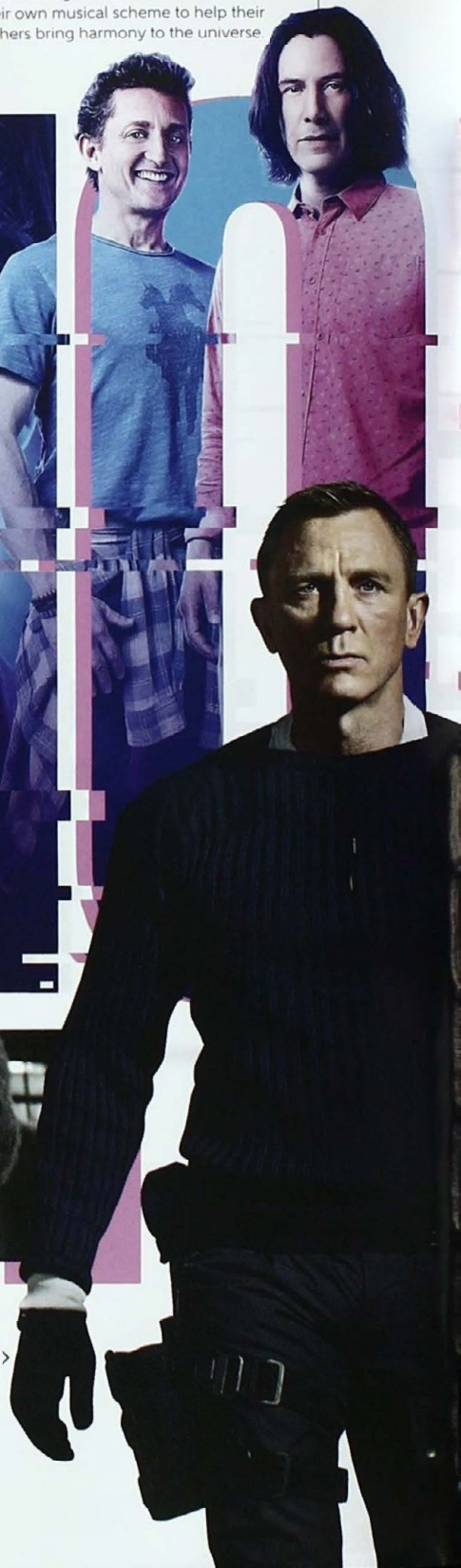
Ivan the Adorable >

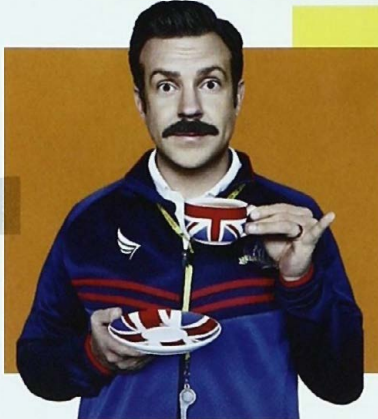
→ Art and Soul

^ Combine Cartoons with Showtunes

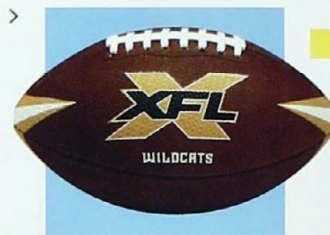
