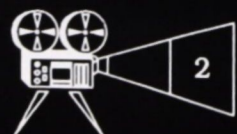

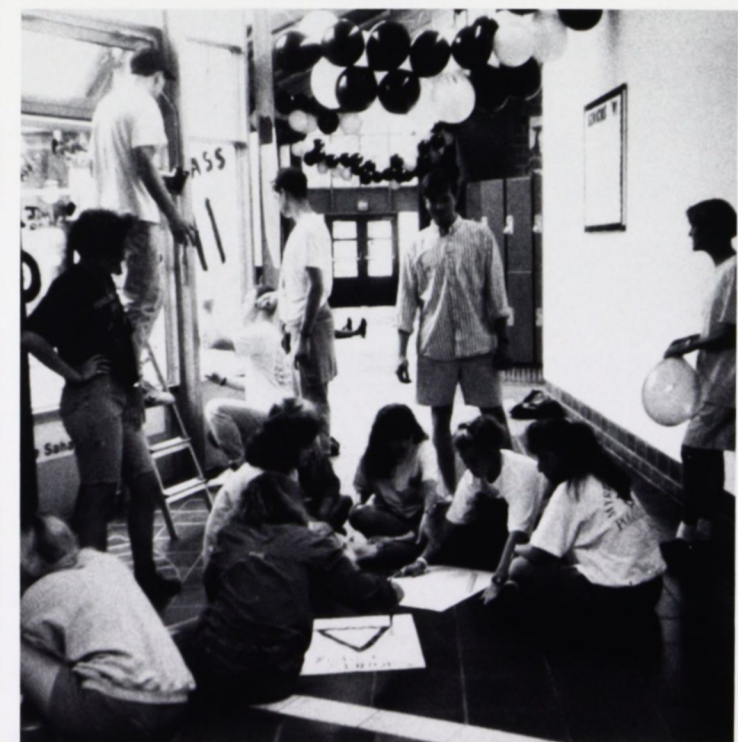

I'm glad I didn't have to do this over here.

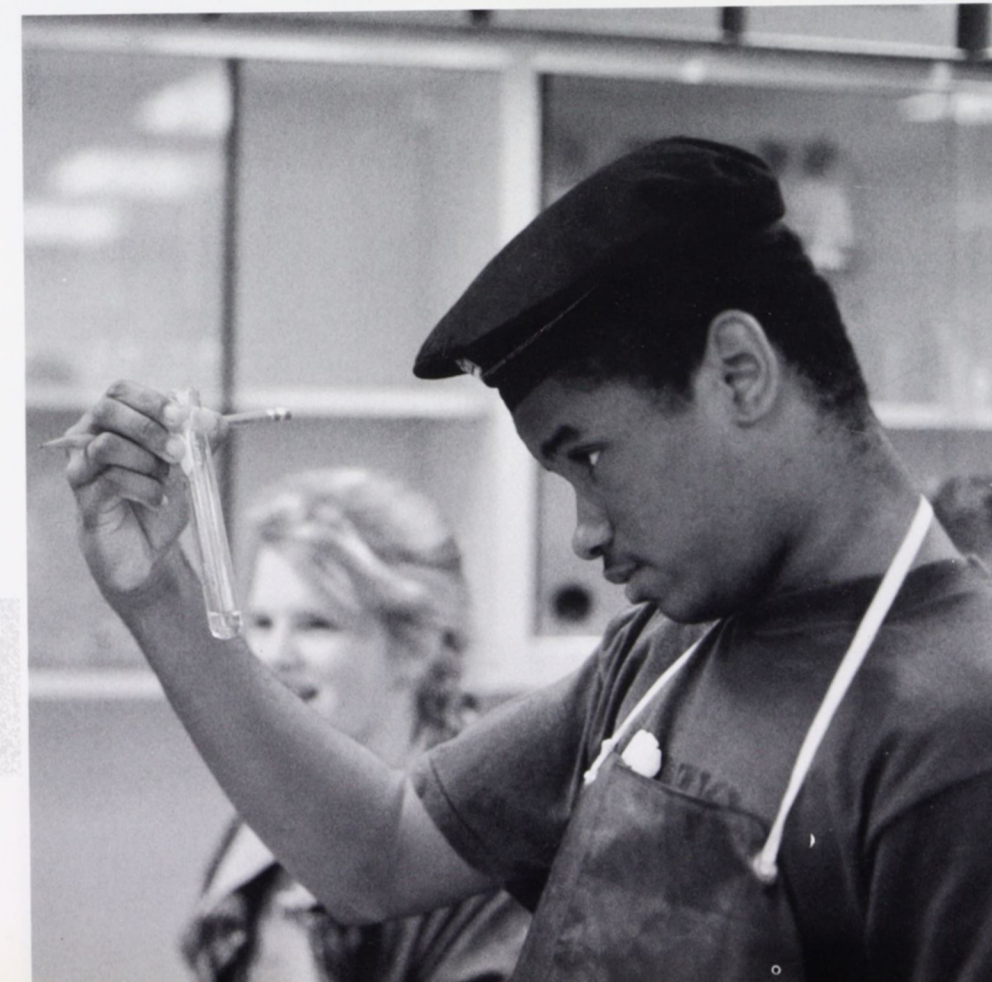
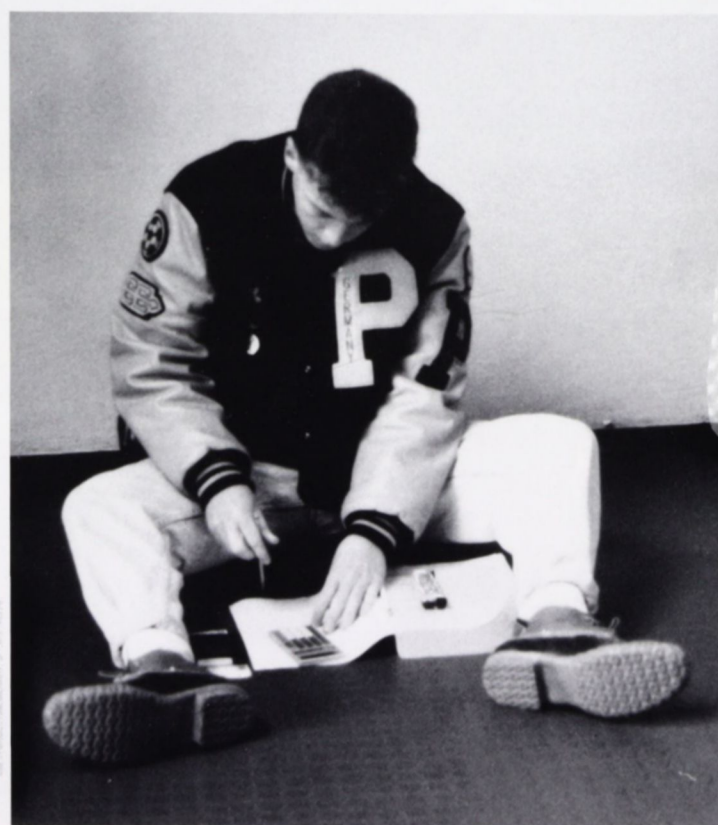
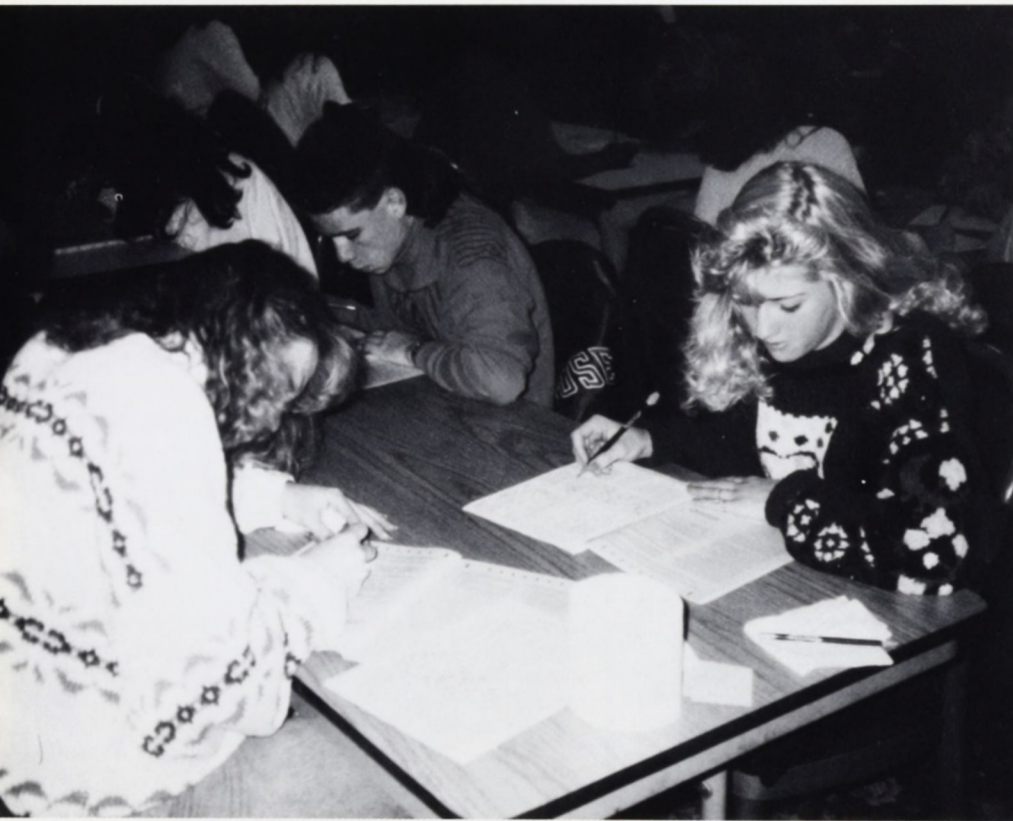

Many students choose to brown-bag it either because it's easy or because they know what to expect.

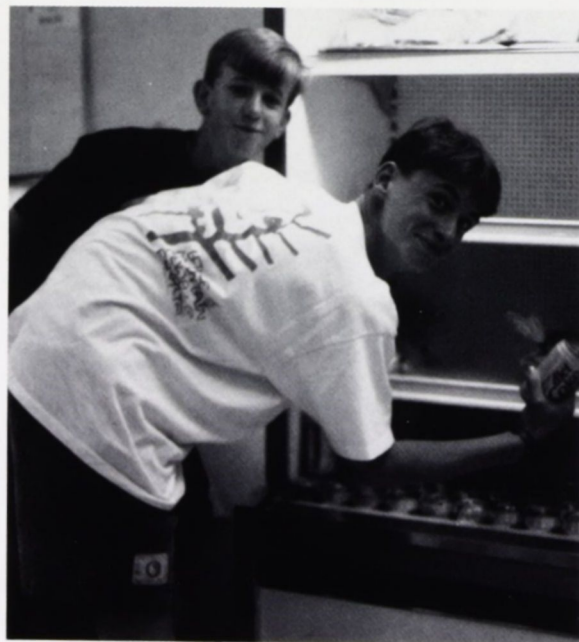
ROTC, the cafeteria's nearest competitor, offers students the opportunity to buy fresh grilled burgers and wurst.

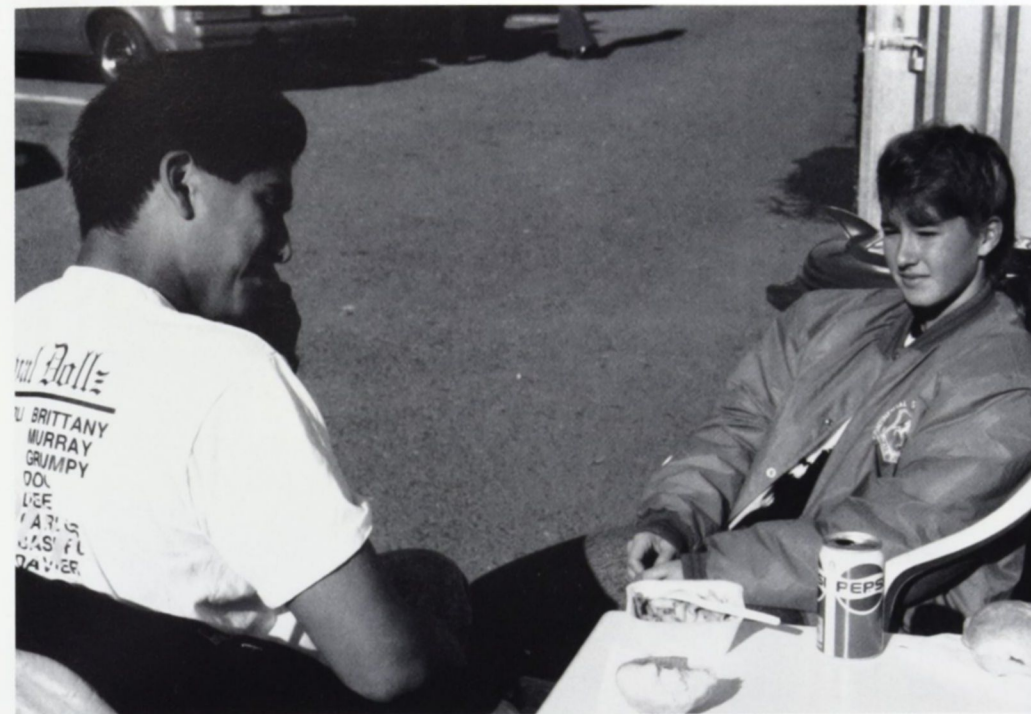

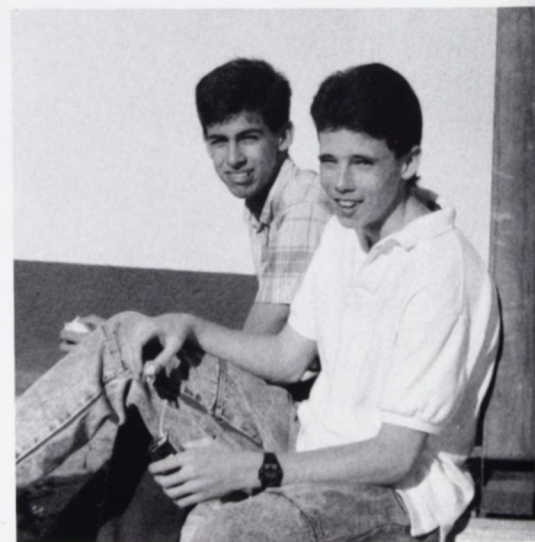


Just Between Friends

Reunited Germans celebrate

October 3, 1990 - two nations separated for 41 cold dark years, became whole again. Industrialized and thriving West Germany reunited with its poor, suffering brother. The German Democratic Republic oppressed by a corrupt communist government, dissolved and became part of a single Germany. Only 327 days after the fall of the Wall, Germany was united in a swift merger, indicative of the people's desire for immediate freedom. At midnight a huge black, red, and gold flag unfurled above the Reichstag in Berlin. Fireworks danced across the moonlit sky. Germans everywhere, no longer characterized by being East or West, clasped each

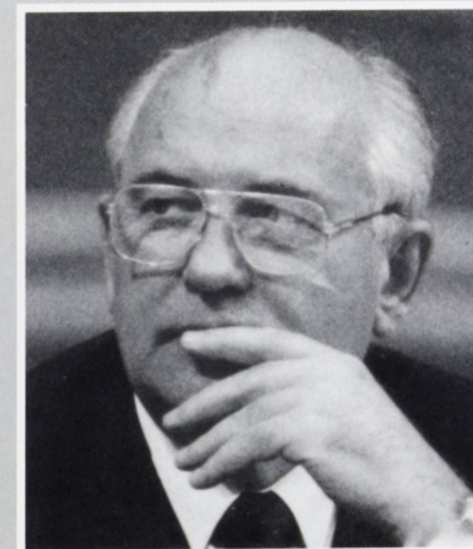
other in warm, welcoming embraces. Tears glistened in eyes at the prospect of a new hope for themselves and their long lost relatives.

The day was marked by a national holiday and US military personnel also got the day off. Patch High was closed to allow students to experience the celebrations. 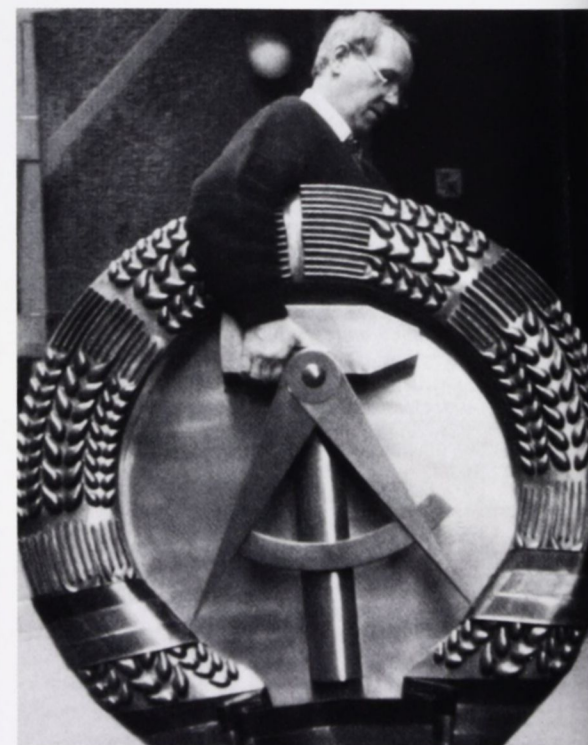
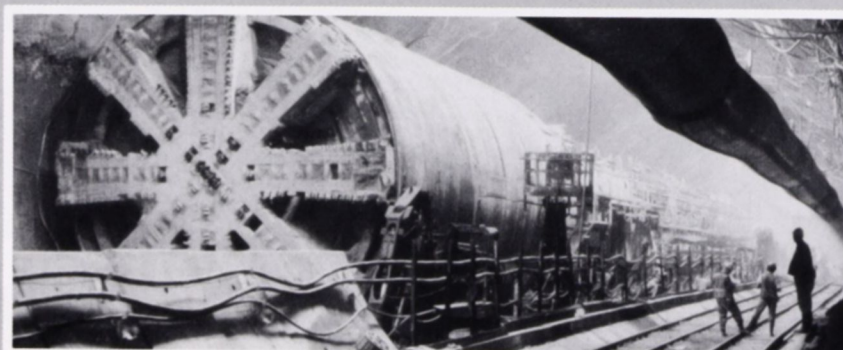
Crackdown—Or Breakdown?



Revolts in the Baltic States, lack of food, and the return to previous oppressions caused many problems in the Soviet Union this year. Edward Shevardnaze, Soviet Foreign Minister, resigned in order to warn Mikhail Gorbachev (left) that force will not halt the chaos. Gorbachev, though starting many reform in the USSR, faced his darkest hour so far.



Newspapers everywhere announced the resignation of Margaret Thatcher, Prime Minister of Great Britain for 11 years. She was soon replaced by John Major. The "Chunnel," a tunnel under the English channel, links the UK and France. For the first time since the Ice Age, England is no longer an island.

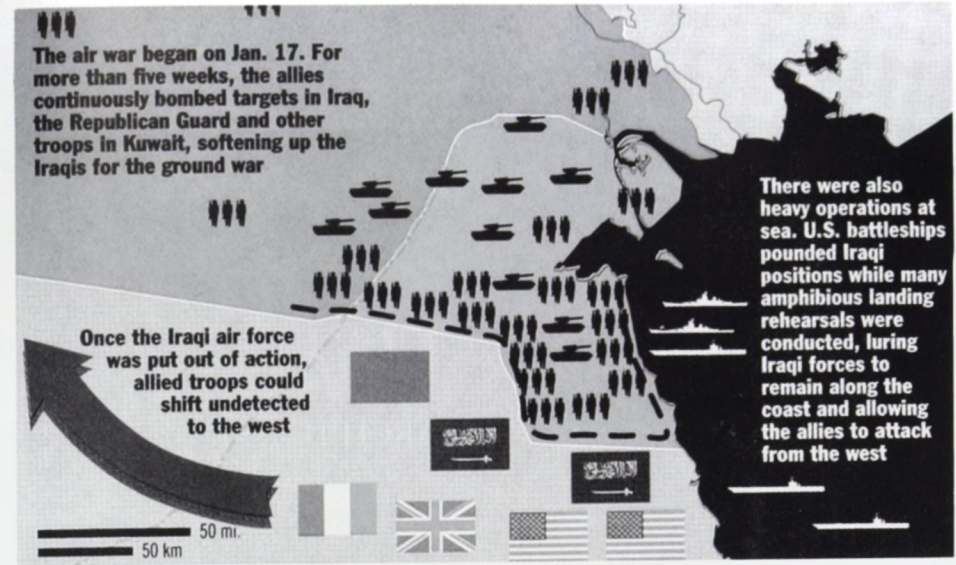
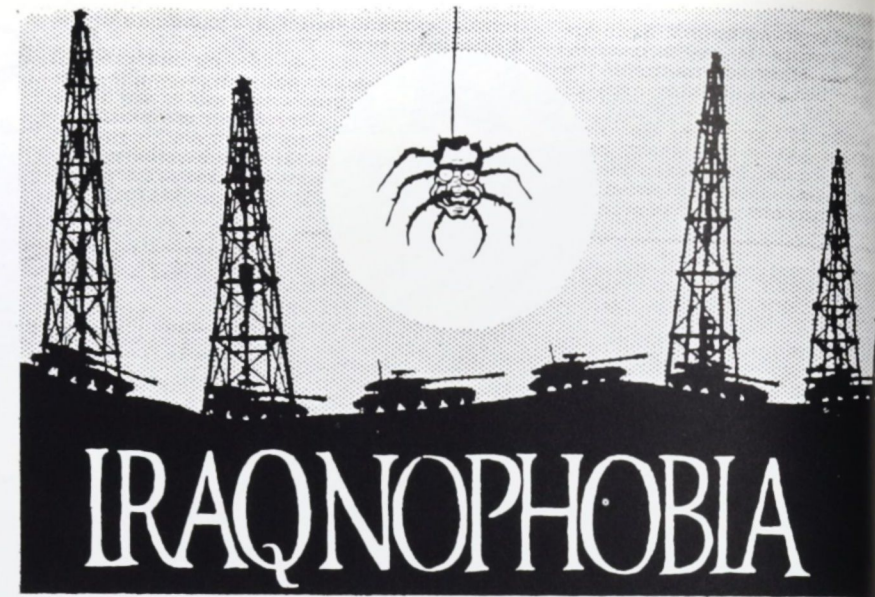

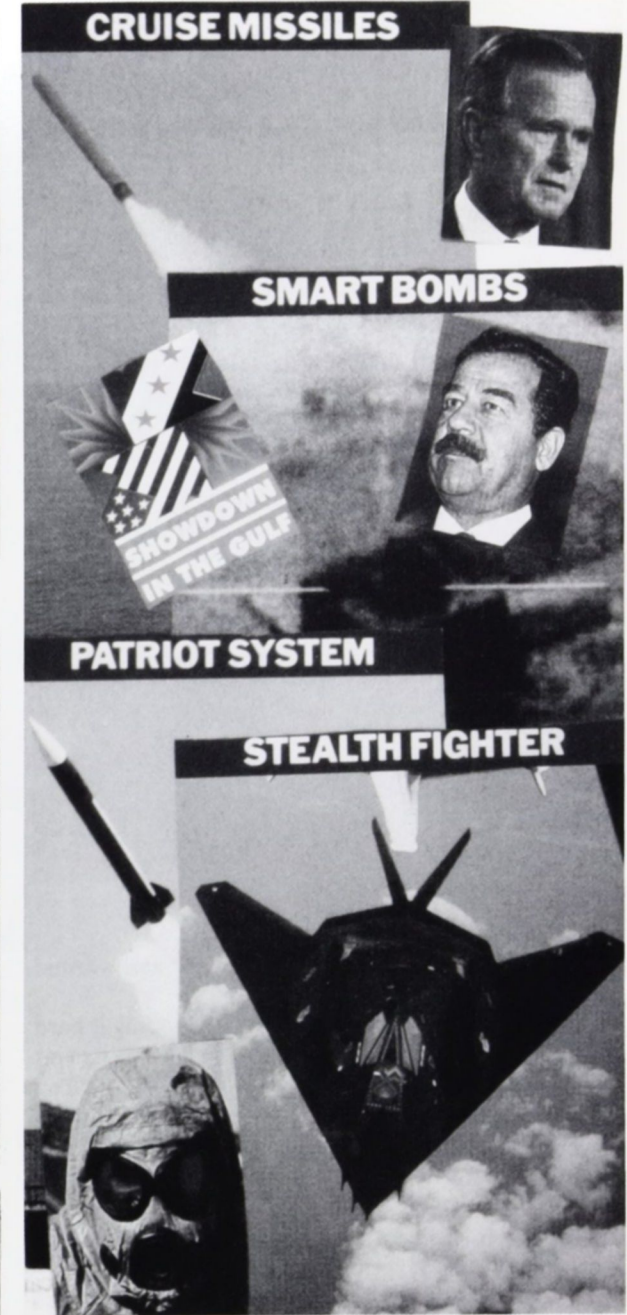
Air armada hammers Iraq



The air war began on Jan. 17. For more than five weeks, the allies continuously bombed targets in Iraq, the Republican Guard and other troops in Kuwait, softening up the Iraqis for the ground war.

Once the Iraqi air force was put out of action, allied troops could shift undetected to the west.

There were also heavy operations at sea. U.S. battleships pounded Iraqi positions while many amphibious landing rehearsals were conducted, luring Iraqi forces to remain along the coast and allowing the allies to attack from the west.

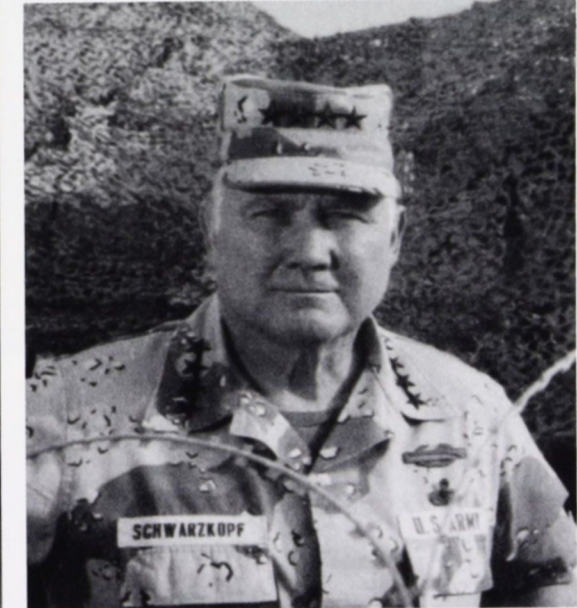

Major Events of the War

- Aug. 2 - Iraq's army overruns Kuwait following Iraqi grievances. President Bush orders economic embargo against Iraq.
- Nov. 9 - VII Corp was notified that many troops would be deployed to the Gulf.
- Nov. 29 - U.N. Security Council votes to give Iraq until Jan. 15 to pull its troops out of Kuwait.
- Jan. 16 - The allies launch air attacks against Iraq and Kuwait. Operation Desert Storm begins one day after deadline.
- Jan. 19 - After Iraq attacks Israel with Scud missiles, Patriot missiles are sent.
- Jan. 23 - After over 12,000 sorties, the allies claim air superiority.
- Jan. 25 - By sabotaging Kuwait's main supertanker, Iraq dumps millions of gallons of crude oil into the gulf.
- Feb. 23 - The U.S. and its allies launch a massive ground assault against Iraqi troops in Kuwait. Bush announces that "the liberation of Kuwait has now entered a final phase."
- Feb. 28 - Bush announces cease-fire as Iraq accepts U.N. terms. Kuwaitis rejoice at the liberation of their country.
- Feb. 29 - American military soldiers begin to return home as the United States celebrates.

SNOW WHITE

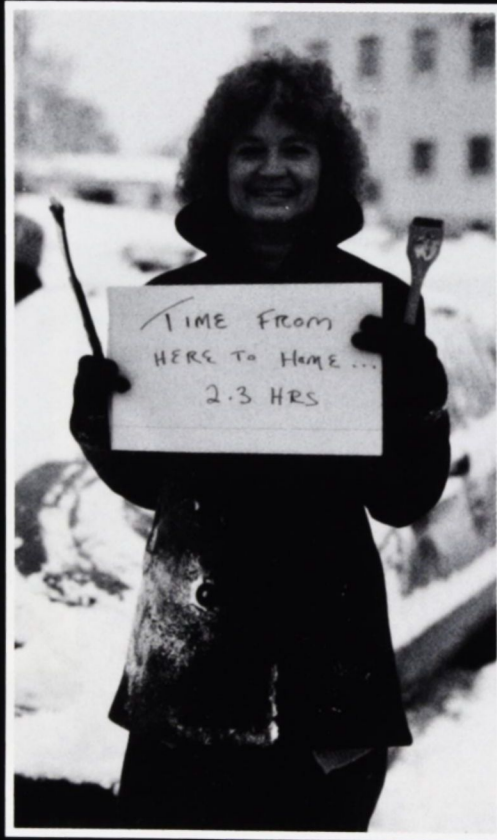

ner says, "It is absolutely beautiful."

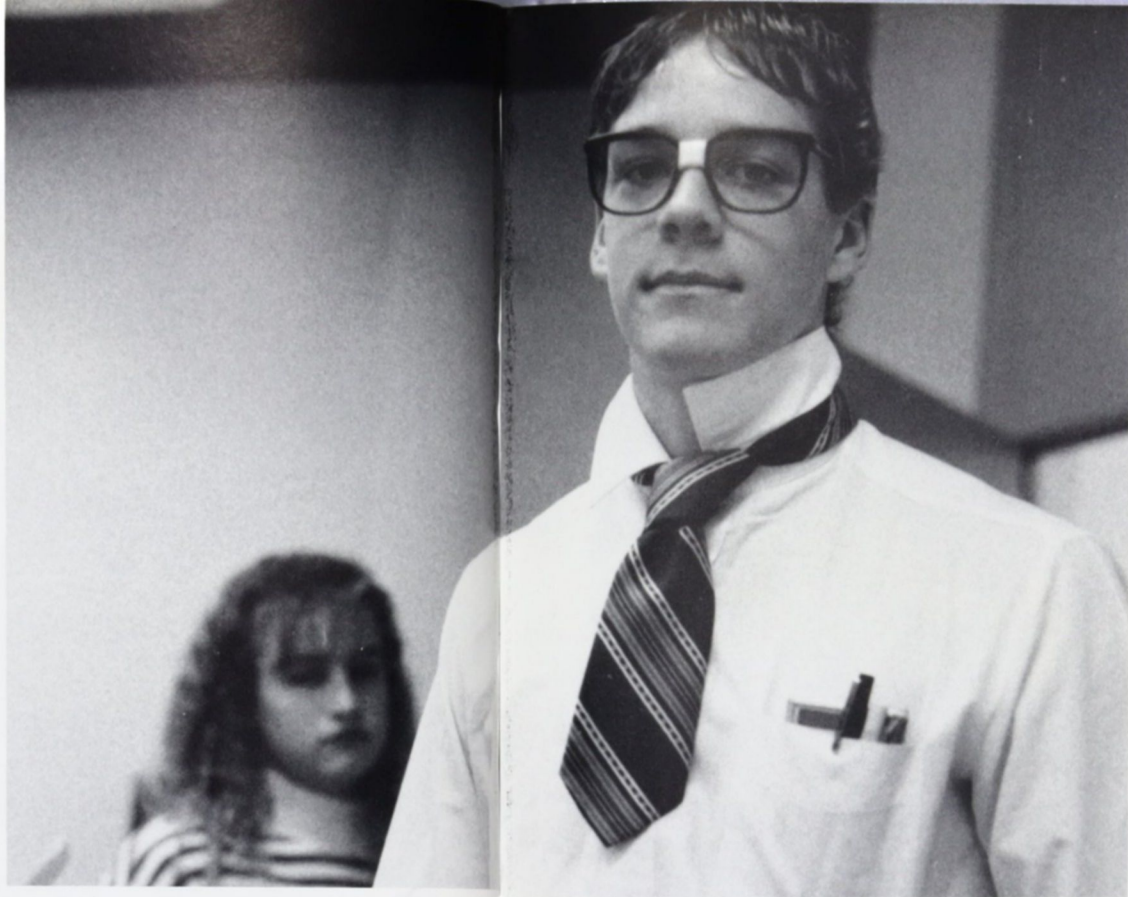
"But really expensive, right?" asks Brienna Perelli.

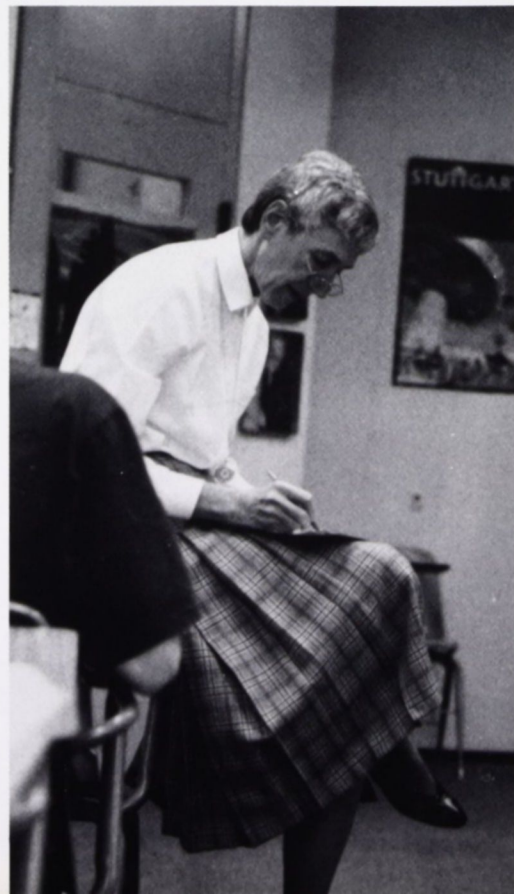
DEAD POET'S SOCIETY

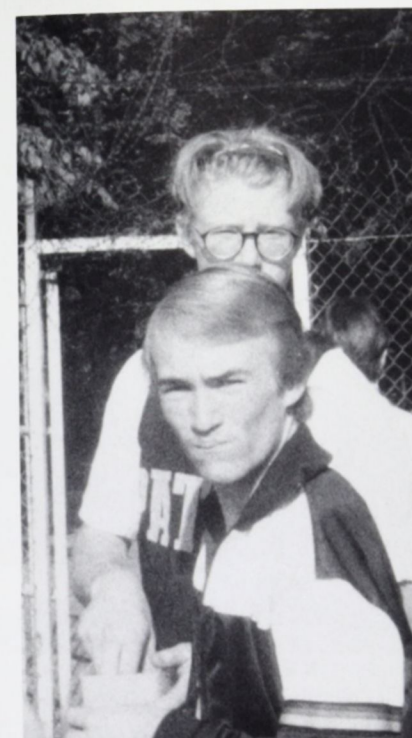

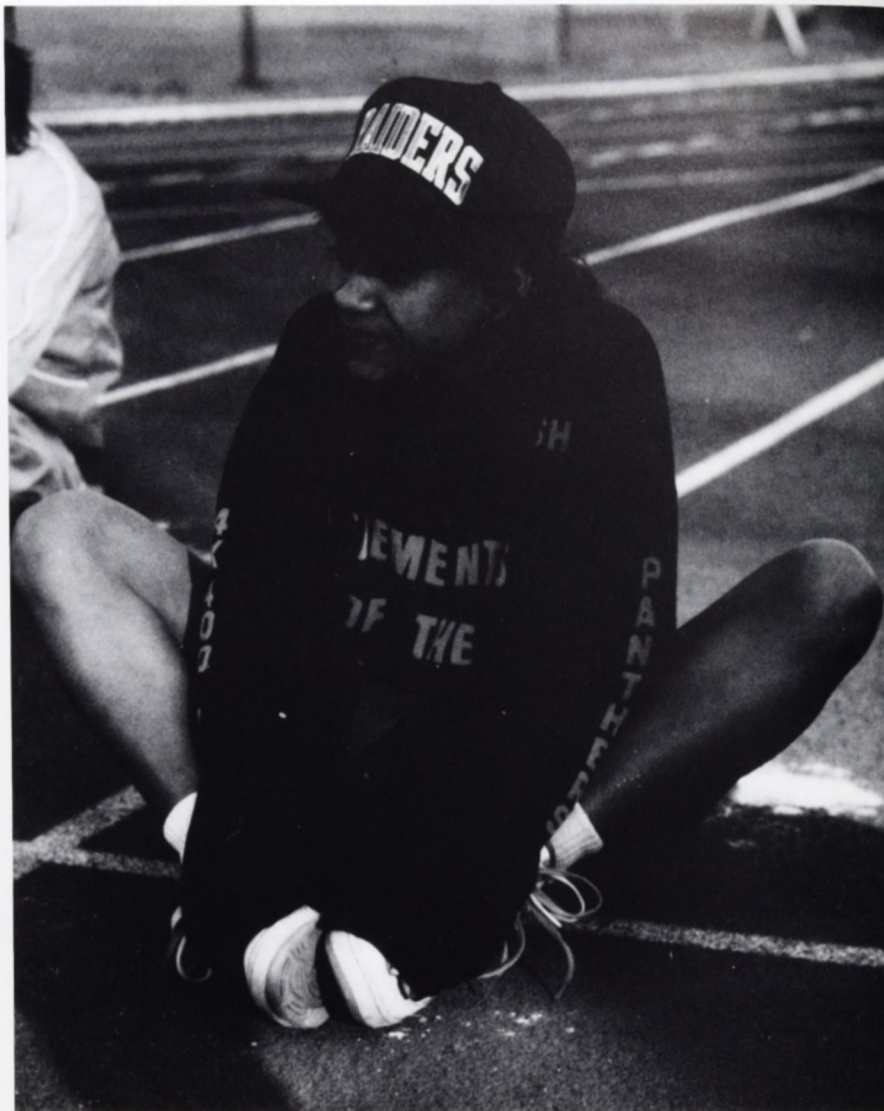

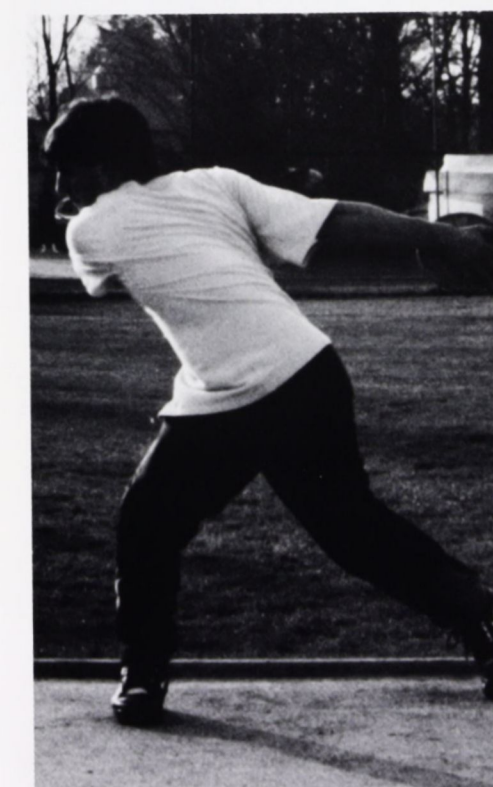

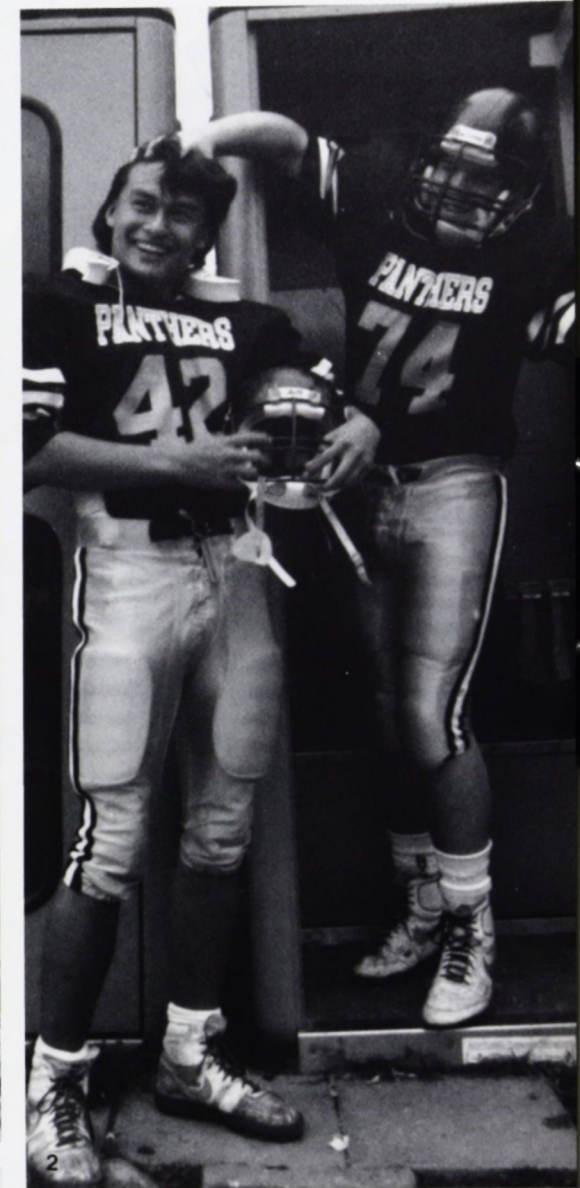
Tough Guys

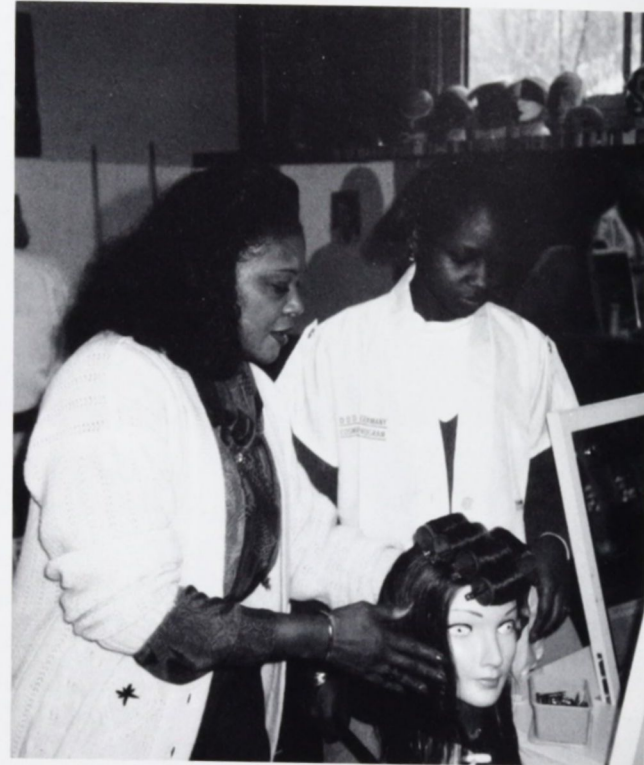

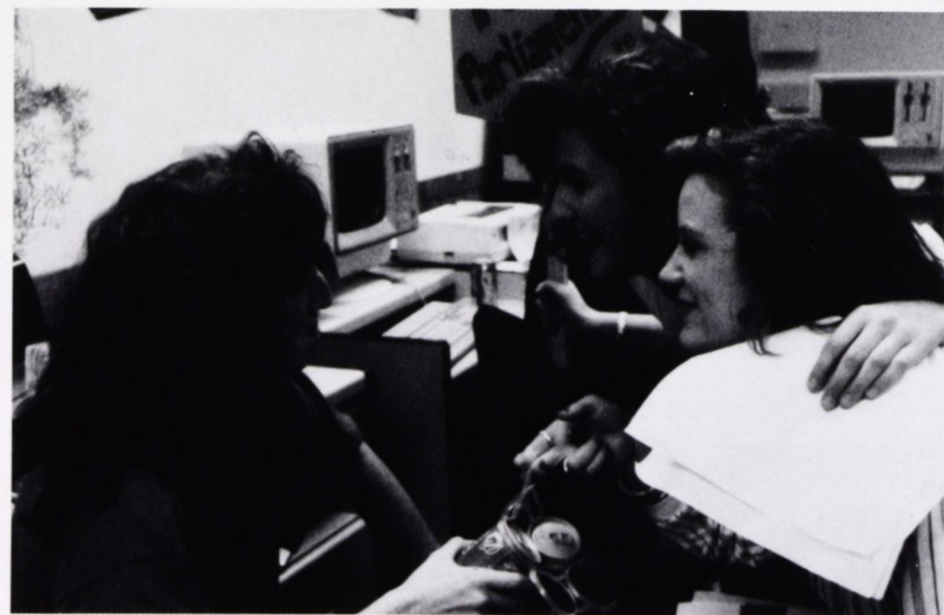

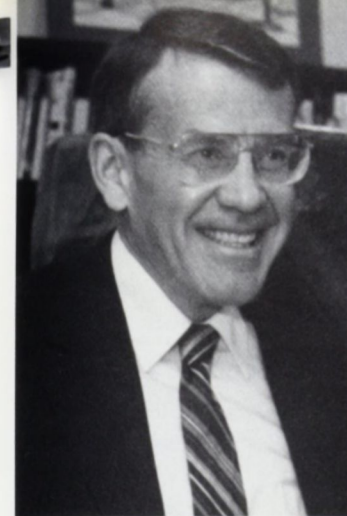

AFJROTC Cadets Participate in Field Marshal Rommel Memorial Ceremony

In 1942 Prime Minister Winston Churchill addressed the House of Commons. He spoke of Field Marshall Erwin Rommel - "We have a very daring and skillful opponent against us, and may I say across the havoc of war, a great general." Field Marshall Rommel's exploits and achievements on the field of battle earned the respect and admiration of the World War II allies. The legendary "Desert Fox"-certainly, Germany's most beloved and revered military personality of WWII, is buried in a simple grave in the village of Herrlingen (vicinity of Ulm). Each year he is remembered on the anniversary of his death. On 14 October, a group of 25 Cadets travelled to Herrlingen for the somber and impressive grave site ceremony. The Cadets, along with numerous German, American, French,

and Australian dignitaries, shared in the wreath laying ceremonies. At the conclusion of the ceremony, the Cadets met and chatted with Lord Mayor Rommel, the Field Marshall's son, the participation by the Cadets in this annual event deeply touches the Germans and the Cadets are always warmly received. Several years ago an elderly German woman commented, "We were close friends of the Rommels and I come each year to pay my respects. We, of course, see the military and old people - but rarely young people. How refreshing to see a group of young people and how particularly nice that they are young Americans!" This event was not the only one which the ROTC members participated in. They kept busy with many other good will and military projects throughout the year.
