

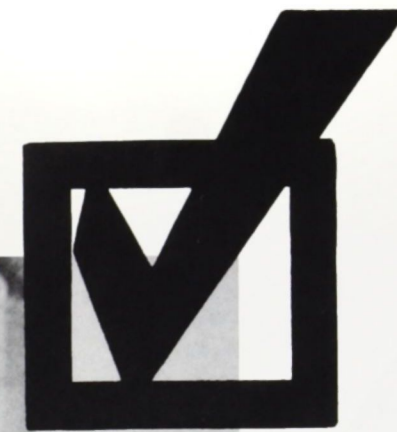

The wonderful power of memory. Nothing can replace the images, smells, sounds and even sometimes the tastes of something forgotten: a wurst at lunch,

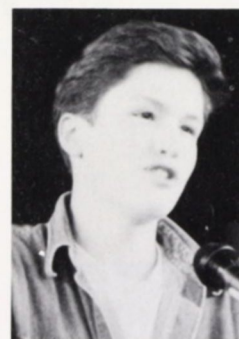

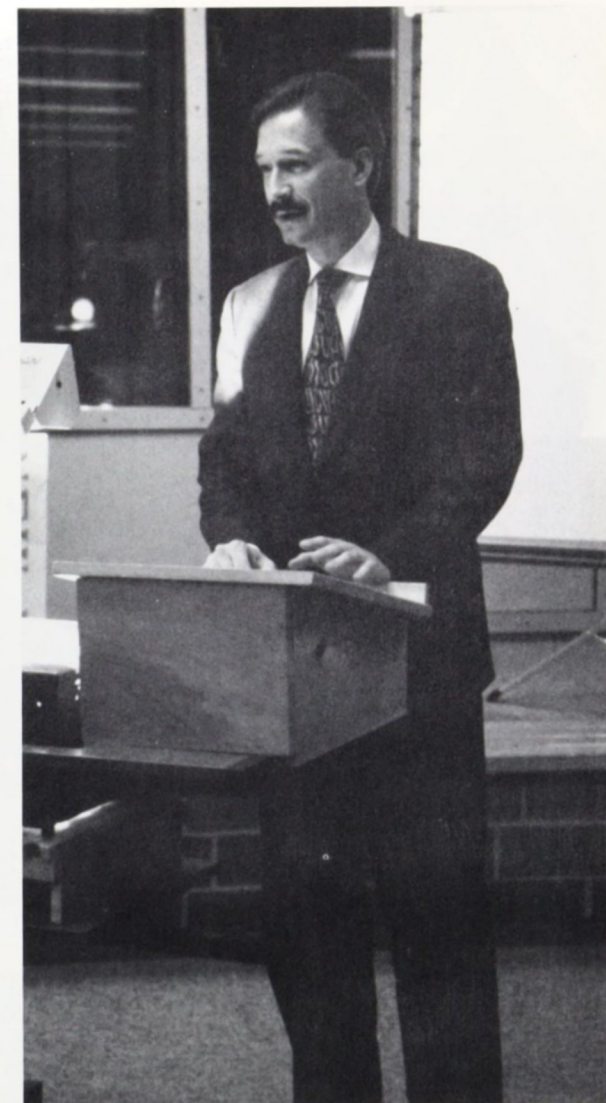

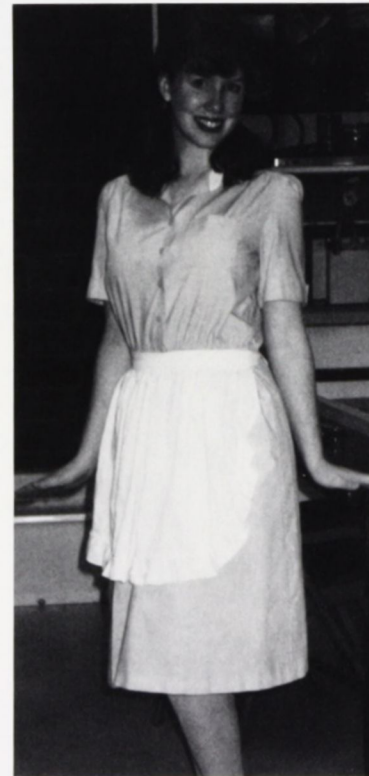

Two down and two to go. Junior year is the mid-point of our high school "career." We are now, upper classmen, who can actually look down on freshmen.

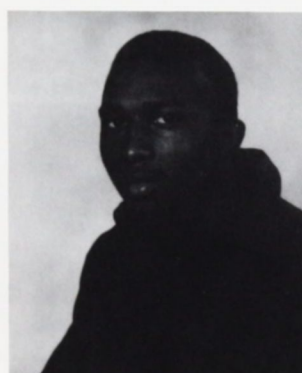

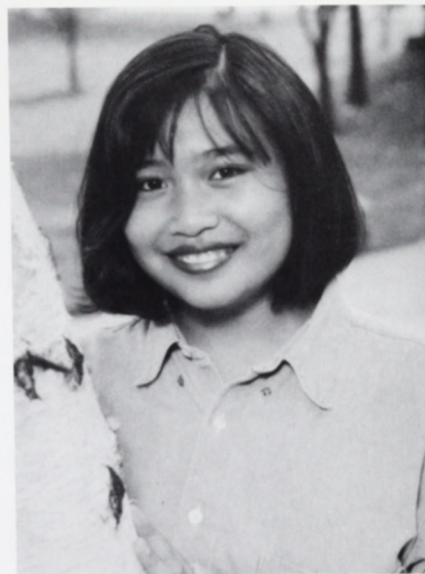

The team also placed 1st. in the conference meet hosted by Vilseck and Stewart Keller was named THE OUTSTANDING TOURNAMENT WRESTLER.



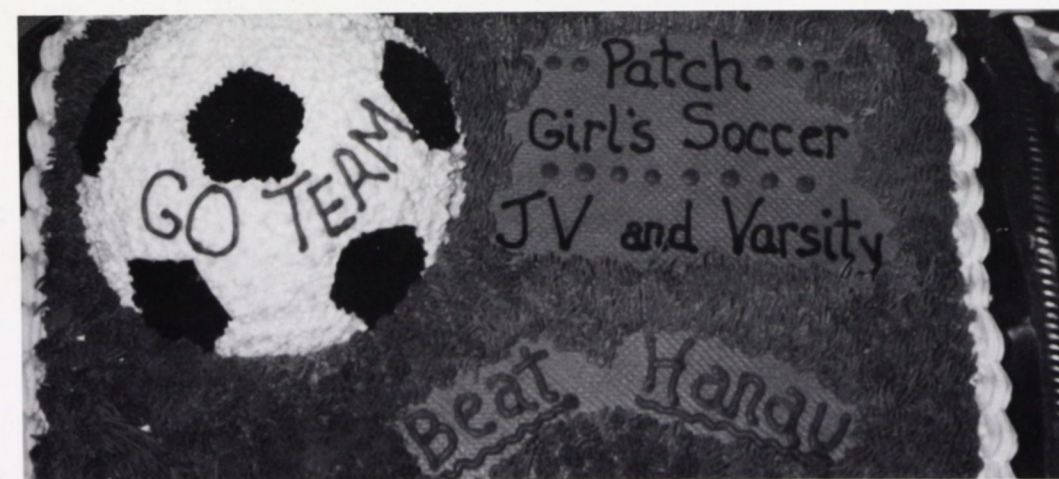

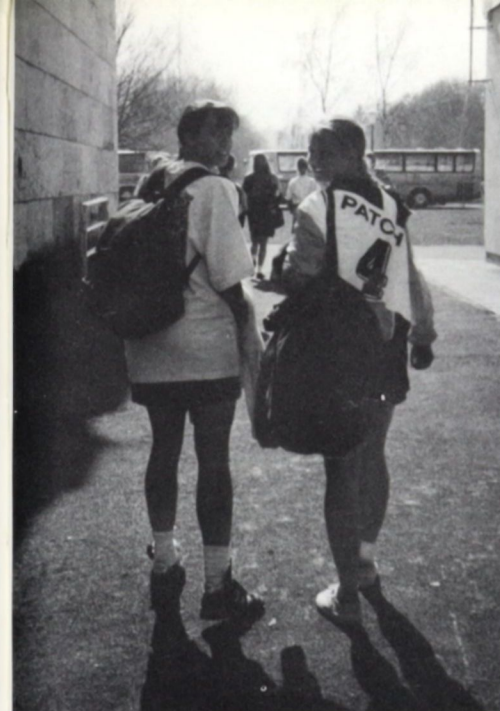

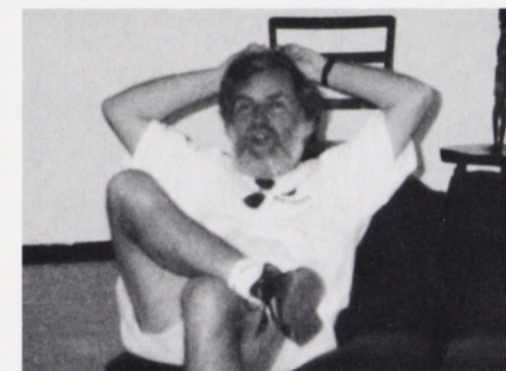
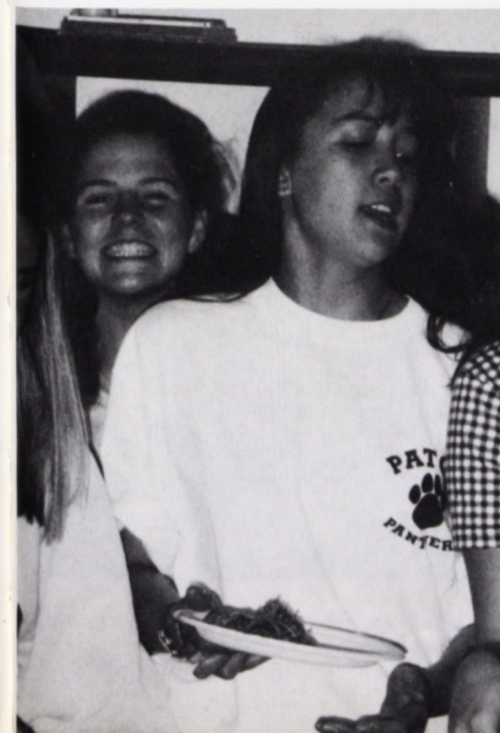
