


## HOMECOMING MADNESS






School ... The very word conjures all kinds of images for people. Children spend most of their lives in this place called school, and are sure the intent of the teachers is torture.


All in all, the group felt that they had competed a successful year in FBLA and many look forward to returning next year to participate again.






The team also placed 1st. in the conference meet hosted by Vilseck and Stewart Keller was named THE OUT-STANDING TOURNAMENT WRESTLER.







know that with the help of talented students, we can have an even better book next year. Why don't you join us and "LEAVE YOUR MARK!" in 1994-1995.






