





RULES: MAKE EM OR BREAK EM?

Rules, Rules, Rules. Who makes them? And who breaks them? It's the administration at Patch that makes the rules, but it's a select number of students that break them. Some Patch students disagree with the rules of old, yet others fume about new rules.

It is well known that students are not allowed to smoke on campus, which is reasonable, especially since Patch High School is adjacent to an elementary school. For

the 98-99 school year, a few things changed. The powers that be decided that this year, no one under the age of 18 could smoke on base, period. If a school faculty member or an MP caught anyone smoking, the cigarettes would be confiscated, and the student would be punished. Many students were appalled by this. Jackie Agor, a senior at Patch, stated, "I think it sucks, because if someone wants to smoke, it's their personal choice- and it's not really illegalthe law says that you must be 18 to purchase cigarettes, not to smoke them." It has been more than obvious that several students are dissatisfied with this rule. A number of students have been forced to smoke in seclusion, and others have dared to openly defy regulations, and have suffered the consequences as well. Josh Hobbs, also known as Peach, said, "I think the new rules suck, it's not like we're hurting anybody else." Becca Inman protested the new rule, and said," In previous years, they let us smoke on the corner, which basically said that they didn't mind. Then they turned around this year and said that we couldn't smoke at all." Although some students vehemently disagree with this new rule, it is less than likely that things will change at Patch. It's a classic example of that old cliché, "I fought the law, and the law won."

Another rule disliked by students at PHS is the "no walkmans or headphones in the building" rule. Tony Adams, a sophomore at Patch, stated, "As long as I don't use it in class, I don't see any problem." Many other students agreed with Tony's statement. Ian Martin, grade 11, said, "It's kind of stupid, it's not like people listen to them [walkmans] during class." Students can usually be found listening to music anytime except classtime, however. Crystal Taylor, a sophomore, said, "Why is it a problem if I listen to music in between classes, at lunch and after school? It's not like I'm blaring music out of a speaker, I'm just listening to my music, and not bothering anyone." Fred Baker had a different point of view on the matter. "Sometimes, music can enhance the

learning experience, especially in classes like art. My history teacher plays classical music while we are taking tests, and it helps you concentrate." said Baker. Lamar Davis had his own opinion as well. Lamar questioned, "If teachers can play music during school hours, why can't students? Their music doesn't bother us, so why should ours bother them?" As for now, music lovers will have to settle with a tune-free learning environment, or face the consequences.

Tardies became a major problem for many students. The rule at Patch is that after three unexcused tardies. a student is suspended overnight. Some students think that tardies that are defined as unexcused tardies should be reconsidered, such as instances where traffic is involved. Alice Mason, a junior, was upset when she was told that being stuck in a stau while riding to school with her father was not a legitimate excuse for being tardy. "I can't control traffic!" she exclaimed. The school did, however, excuse students who were stuck in the very same stau as she, but rode the school bus instead. In fact, the school bus showed up to school long after Alice did. Another junior, Ryan Deslauriers, said," If I walk in as the bell rings, that shouldn't be a tardy. Tardies build up faster than you'd think. It's not like I miss part of the day's lesson by walking in a few seconds late anyway." Many schools in the states have a tardy policy much different than that of Patch High School. In many stateside schools, it takes up to seven tardies to be suspended, and usually the punishment for excessive tardiness is detention. Some students at Patch elect to skip class when they know they have acquired their third unexcused tardy, to avoid being suspended. The penalty for skipping class is actually less than it is for excessive tardies, so it would be logical for one to skip and serve detention rather than tarnish one's record by getting an overnight suspension.

Whether students like or dislike the rules at Patch is not the question. Rules are rules, and we as students are entitled to obey them. The question is, what are students who disagree with regulations going to do about it?



Overall, there were many hobbies kids were involved in. You just had to find out what was for you and go do it. Hobbies taught you to venture out there and BREAK ON




If you thought being a Sophomore was difficult, imagine what it was like being the class president! Rachael Rawson said, "Probably the first thing that comes to mind






Would the freshmen of future years be able to come up with new, bigger, and better ideas? No one really could decide, but all agreed that they would be a hard pair of shoes to fill.





"I've always grown up in big cities, so I'm not used to a small community, but I haven't found anything objectionable about it," added Junior Daniel Reiness.







My eyes shine with triumph, and I am filled with an incredible sense of identity. I AM CAPRICORN!


Okay, so maybe it's not quite like reading your horoscope, but it is another means of classification. We're all used to the old stereotypes: Susie's a smart girl, but Stan just seems to be...well, slow. Slow, stupid, intellectually challenged, whatever you want to call it, such a label means that a person is not meeting the standard. But who set this "standard" anyway, and who says that it is an accurate standard against which intelligence should be measured? This is the very question that Harvard psychologist Howard Gardner asked as he reviewed America's educational systems in the 1980's. He was rather disappointed with what he found and subsequently developed his theory of Multiple Intelligences. He felt the focus of evaluating intelligence was too centered on a student's ability to retain and logically process data and not attentive enough to the student's other abilities. He concluded that there are at least seven different intelligences—independent faculties of the brain that can work alone or together—which are equally important and valid. These he named linguistic, logical-mathematical, spatial, musical, bodily-kinesthetic, intrapersonal, and interpersonal. Thus, according to Gardner, you are now no longer either smart or dumb. Now you can be word-smart, number-smart, picture-smart, music-smart, body-smart, self-smart, people-smart, or, more likely, a combination of any of them.





Are you good at reasoning?

f your favorite thing to hear in the morn ing was find dx/dy if y=cos3x/x2 ex, then you probably have a high logical intelligence. Paired with linguistic intelligence, logical intelligence has been very highly valued for centuries. When the IQ (Intelligence Quotient) Test was developed by a French psychologist at the turn of the century, it was created to test primarily for

logical intelligence. Even the extremely popular standardized tests of today (such as the SAT) test only the linguistic and logical parts of the mind. Just like the Language Arts classes that focused specifically on linguistics, there were a multitude of Math and Science classes designed to challenge students' logical thinking abilities.

Do we get to blow something up today? Such a request was often heard echoing in the Chemistry lab rooms. Who said science had to be boring? In fact, it was observations like watching an explosion, that assisted in inductive reasoning. Let's say I put sodium in water and it exploded. If the next four or five times I put sodium in water, it exploded, I could come to the conclusion by using my inductive reasoning that sodium reacts violently with water. So watching things explode actually makes you smarter. Ms. Zekel said, "In Chemistry, students often have to solve problems or set up their own sequences in order to understand concepts."

Even though many students hated to admit it, Pathagorous and his little theorem (a2+b2=c2) made their lives much simpler. By having a given when presented a problem, the problem became much easier to solve. Such a problem was solved by using deductive reasoning. That means you used a given, like a theorem, to come to a conclusion. Logical intelligence also includes the usual expertise at

doing calculations and understanding how numbers relate. Senior Nate Huddleson said, "I like math because it just makes sense. There is usually a process to follow and only one right answer."

Logic was not just restricted to use with math and science. We used logic in even the strangest settings. Just ask any student of Herr Berg. Senior Eddie Iiams said, "German grammar is easier if you think of it as a mathematical equation. The formulas for grammer resemble the ones you would see in your standard Geometry class." Language classes aren't the only unusual setting for logic. Art students also use logical intelligence to manipulate patterns, and many employ a harmony or symmetry to their art which is rooted in their logical intelligence. Senior Vicky McMillin said, "I observe the harmony in everyday life and translate it into art." Although it may not be the only intelligence, as many people formally believed, logic can be helpful in almost any area of study. by Lori Prince

elly and Steve dated for three months. People who didn't now them well vondered why the two got along so well, since their personalities seemed so different. Kelly resembled what most people would call shy. She didn't talk often in class, liked to work by herself, and sometimes looked lost in thought. Steve, on the other hand, loved to discuss and argue, excelled when working in groups, and usually understood instinctively how other people were feeling. What these two have realized is that these traits have more to do with their minds than

their personalities. In fact, Kelly could be very social outside of the classroom and Steve enjoyed the occasional afternoon spent sitting quietly and reading. Why, you ask, did they behave so differently in school? Kelly is intrapersonally intelligent and Steve is interpersonally intelligent. They learn best in different environments and by different processes.

Each of us, at one time or another, craved time to think and ponder in complete isolation. But when you were presented with an especially important decision to make or problem to solve, how did you go about finding an answer? If you prefered to work out a solution on your own, like Kelly, you most likely have a high intrapersonal intelligence. Unlike the previous intelligences, intrapersonal doesn't have to do with an end product, like writing a paper or singing a song. A high intrapersonal intelligence is identified by how a person approaches studying in general. Intrapersonally strong people like to work alone, listen instead of talk, and have an intense understanding of themselves.


Intrapersonal intelligence could be found in any class, in any grade. It was important to develop this intelligence just like any other. The first thirty minutes of seminar that were reserved for silent study were very helpful for strengthening intrapersonal intelligence. Students were given an opportunity to solve problems on their own, without any help from teachers or other students. Developing intrapersonally can help students to do better in situations where they are unable to seek help, like tests.

Mr. Pinschmidt asked his seventh grade English students to

keep personal journals. The journals offered great opportunities for insight into oneself, as seventh grader Eric Johnson came to realize. He said, "Keeping a journal has helped me see how important it is to keep track of the things that have happened in my life." Many people think that discussions benefit only the speakers, but that is not always true. Students with good listening skills often leave a discussion with new ideas to ponder. Senior Kyle Parker felt he profited from listening because, "there is usually something said that is thought-provoking. If I don't listen closely, I might miss it." Even spontaneous writing can provide intrapersonal opportunities. Mrs. Zank-Rehwaldt has most of her students practice "reflex writing" each morning on either an assigned or personally chosen topic. From silent study time, to keeping journals, to listening during a discussion, teachers were very aware of the importance of intrapersonal skills, and were making many efforts to encourage it in their classrooms.



Are you aware of your space?

he great Renais sance painter and sculptor, Michealangelo, used to say that the figures he sculpted were originally in the pieces of stone he carved; his job was to find them. This idea of understanding how images and objects occupy space is the basis of spatial intelligence. If you were especially good at drawing an accurately proportioned person or learned best when you were given some sort of visual aid, you are intelligent spatially. Even a knack for navigation or what

we like to call a "good sense of direction" showed a spatial intelligence. Classes aimed at developing spatial skills were not as emphasized as are those that are for logical or linguistic skills. Many of the spatial classes were electives, such as Tech Ed or Art, and students with a proficiency in these classes were not always categorized as intelligent.

I once walked into the art room and there was a mop, bucket, and ladder sitting atop one of the tables. Mr. Swenson answered my puzzled look with, "The students are learning about negative space." Not being much of an art student myself, I had never known there was such a thing as negative space. It seemed like an oxymoron to me, but I was confidently reassured that it is just as important to know about negative space as it is to know about positive space. Both are essential for drawing accurately. Ceramics students also dealt continuously with three dimensional space. Junior Sarah Bailey said, "Three dimensional drawings can be difficult, but the more you do them, the easier it becomes."

Measure twice, cut once. It was the mantra of all Tech Ed

teachers. More eloquently put, it meant: Figure out what you want to do before you start hacking away at all my wood. A precise "mind's eye" is a gift which was often manifested in classes like Drafting or Shop. Drafting often required the student to envision objects from different angles, while Shop involved an ability to translate a mental picture from the brain to the hands. Junior Chris Johnson recalled his application of spatial intelligence in Drafting class. He said, "We would look

at pictures in the book of different views of an object and then have to draw it in three dimensions."

Spatial intelligence was not just limited to building or creating with your hands. The key was seeing something in your mind, be it a picture, object, or even words. Even the traditional classes of logic and linguistics employed spatial intelligence now and then. In Geometry, shapes were used abundantly and students needed be able to visualize the application of several theorems and postulates. Sophomore Rachel Rawson said, reminising back on her days in Geometry, "It is very important to be able to visualize the positions of the shapes and angles and how they relate." Spatial intelligence even extends to visual aids and the like that assisted in learning. Ms. Richard was a well-known advocate of visual aids, be it a poster or movie or filmstrip. She said, "I use visual aids to give the students a visual image of what I am talking about." Her students, like many others, were sure to get the picture and expand their visual intelligence. by Lori Prince

could perform like them. Although a certain percent of their talent was inborn, it was possible to improve your performance as an athlete. That was what classes like Physical Education are for. Bodily-kinesthetic intelligence is probably the most controversial of the seven, but it has been proved that certain parts of your mind control your motor skills, and that these parts can be exercised and developed.

For people with high bodily intelligences, playing a sport was just that: playing. The word connotates a childlike abandonment and an overall feeling of fun. The challenge presented was not a test, but a game to win, an obstacle to overcome. Physical Education classes were based on sharpening bodily intelligence skills, and used many methods to enhance both voluntary and preprogrammed movements.

Exercising your body and its center in the brain did not have to be done through sports. There were other classes that build up a strong bodily intelligence. A strong command

illusion. He must have supreme control over his body to portray the character completely and correctly. Senior Drama student Aaron Ernest said, "If your body language doesn't go with how your character feels and acts, the audience will not believe in your character."

Another class that required an intense connection between mind and body is Choir. Unlike traditional choirs, show choirs do not just stand and sing. Instead, they performed songs with choreography, movements that go along with a song. Sometime these movements were slow and graceful and other times they were fast and complicated. Sophomore Aryne White said, "It is important to have control over your body when you perform because your body language shows how you are feeling and the point you are trying to get across to the audience." teve is a prime e x ample o f someone with a strong interpersonal intelligence. He is a natural leader, because he motivates, communicates,

and understands. He prefers to discuss a problem in a group rather than solve it on his own. He comprehends what other people feel or want, sometimes without even thinking about it. He is what most would call a "people-person."

Did your teachers ever give you an assignment where you were put in a group and told to solve some problem and present it to the class? An exercise like that was designed to build interpersonal skills, and was used very frequently. Group work developed cooperation, which is a very important skill to have for the fu-

ture. Even if you are an intrapersonal learner, you will still gain a lot if you try to participate in group projects. Junior Richard Foster said, "Group work helps develop the skills needed to work as a team and communicate."

Another thing that develops interpersonal intelligence is tutoring. You know the old saying, if you can explain it to someone else, you understand it. Teachers knew that students can be productive instructors themselves, and many took advantage of the opportunity. Ms. Gheyson's AVID students actively helped each other with assignments on a daily basis. She said, "Students need to learn to be independent and help each other with problems without the aid of a teacher." By practicing effective communication, students were able to not only help others, but also help themselves.

What are you talking about now?



Who was America's eighteenth president? Can you convince a




Concentrating on learning yet another language, Kristina Wall writes down German vocabulary words while Eddie liams gets organized.







And finally, the Poet's Corner and the Reel World analyzed creative works and created ideas, opinions, and poetry of their own.





Got that European Style

I'm sure you've heard countless adults blab on and on about the advantages of being in Europe. But in actuality, it's really not as boring as the occasional visit to the Rothenburg dungeons or the Christmas market. There are things to do everyday, a plethora of opportunities to discover Europe without endless lectures about history and art. The easiest way to do this is simply to meet people. Most Americans live under the preconception that it is impossible to communicate with Germans without knowing German. The fact is, more Germans speak English than vice versa and they are always happy and impressed to meet Americans. Knowing people is the easiest way to learn about their temperament and the key to feeling comfortable in a foreign country. Stuttgart may not be a thriving metropolis compared to London, Paris or Rome, but Stuttgart is in an ideal location if you want to travel to other countries. France and Switzerland are less than two hours away, Italy and Austria four to five hours away, Holland and Belgium are about the same.

Many students have enjoyed their time in Germany immensely and others did not. When asked about what he liked about Germany, Blayne Davis enjoyed "The beer, the fests and the food." George Leach liked the fact that "you can go downtown to clubs at a younger age than in the States." Some kids didn't have a very high opinion of Europe. Adam Ernest remarked that "It sucks. When the sun goes down, everything closes, it's medieval over here." But the majority of Patch students found some advantages for being over here.







To most, the mere thought of returning to the states brought mixed emotions. Some were anticipating their return, whether it was for a visit or a permanent move. Guided by The Stars



During the late 60's and early 70's, no one could cast a more terrifying shadow over "The Summer of Love" than the sadistic and deceitful killer known only as the "Zodiac." The "Zodiac" tallied up 49 victims, and only 3 were able to escape. Students should have been aware, for the killer had not yet been caught! However, you could have been assured that he more than likely was not lurking the halls of Patch High School.

When people heard the word "Zodiac," most thought of the 12 signs of the Zodiac. After thinking of the zodiac, your train of thought would possibly have led you to your Horoscope. Horoscopes, little summaries of the day, week, month or year, told you what to expect, similar to a fortune teller. 

Going begond The Words



Did you ever stick your tongue out at someone? Cross your arms? Roll your eyes? Chances are you've done these things and more, without giving them a second thought. People communicated through body language day in and day out, intentionally and unintentionally. Body language generally referred to facial expressions, gestures, and how you said things rather than what you said. Basically, it had to do with appearances. It made reading people's actions, reactions, and the motives behind them somewhat simpler. It related to others the feelings and attitudes that didn't always come across through normal speech.






