




Some of our students have had mixed feelings about the "Coming Together" of the two Germanys because it means that the presence of Americans will diminish.


In another way, our students also got together by becoming more cohesive and unified with each other. On these and the following pages we hope to capture the spirit of the times, here at Vilseck High and in the world.


Whether the times were good or bad, we were together. We came together to learn not only from those assigned to educate us, but also from each other.

No matter where we go, we'll always be together as the Class of '91.



The Vilseck Cross Country Teams provided their small following with the thrill of several victories during the season. Outstanding scores and individual times were recorded both by the girls and boys.


Individually, in the girls' ranks, Tracy Wrinkle showed the rest of the squad and the field what dedication and hard work is. She won several races last fall.

And then came the Homecoming Dance, where they really showed us their real personalities. They danced to the rap music and romance filled the air as they took to the floor during the slow songs.








# CHRISTMAS CONCERT
