
# Zweibrucken City



## Germany



On Saturday mornings market places all over Germany are bubbling over with excited shoppers, noise, fruit and vegetables, dogs and little children




















## Work Study




## English


Forensics class involved students in the art of such things as dramatics, unpromtu speaking, and interpretations.

The world of communications was based on technical writing such as directions for model airplanes.



#### Social Studies





## Band and Choir make music




Jr. High Band are the future musicians of the world.






## Art Department


#### Math

#### Foreign Language







#### Girls








#### **Electronics**


#### **Business Education**

#### Nurse






## Supply


Disiplinary action is a part of every school year. Although the firmness it takes varies from school to school, its purpose remains the same: to bring a type of action against those individuals who violate school rules. In Zweibrucken High School, the measures taken were assigned the name "Chipmunk Duty".










#### Christmas 1974





In the report cards it tells us the name of the school, name, date, classes that person took, periods, grades and how much credit they got for each class.




#### Golf






# **Gymnastics**


#### German American Club

The German American Club, composed of 422 members, emphasised the students interest in the German Language and culture. (They began working under two sponsors, Miss Brandt and Miss Braser)




## Safety Patrol


#### Band


