Visitor Firearms in Capitol Buildings

Does your state capitol prohibit the public from carrying firearms?

Status	Number of States
Prohibited	27 states
Not prohibited	6 states
Combination	9 states

Are there any exceptions for the public?

Exceptions	Number of States
None	15 states
Law enforcement, military, or security personnel	11 states
Concealed carry	1 state

Visitor Firearms in Capitol Buildings

Exceptions

Examples and Stipulations

- Some states require law enforcement to be uniformed and on official business
- Enhanced concealed carry licenses
- Carry in the building, but not the chambers or select offices
- Concealed carry allowed, open carry prohibited
- Open carry allowed, concealed carry prohibited

Public Entrances

How many public entrances does your capitol building have?

Number of Public Entrances	Number of States
1-2 entrances	24 states
3-5 entrances	16 states
More than 5 entrances	2 states



Public Entrances

Are there screenings at the capitol building's public entrances?

What do they entail?

Screenings	Number of States
Metal detector and bag search	33 states
No screening	9 states

Other Approaches

- Some states have capacity or devices on hand for certain occasions
- Some states prohibit firearms but have no screening
- No screening but stationed security or law enforcement

Public Entrances

- There can be differing policies between buildings or even offices within a single building
- Staff and members typically have access to separate entrances or lines



Cameras

Does your capitol building use cameras and/or technology for security purposes?

- Almost every state we spoke with answered "yes"
- Several states cited this as a recent upgrade
- For those who shared, the number of cameras ranged from 100-330
- Some only include public areas




Security and Law Enforcement

Legislative police department	4 states
Legislative security	1 state exclusively6 states supplementally
Private security	5 states supplementally



Number of Buildings	Number of States
One building	3 states
2-5 buildings	23 states
6-9 buildings	9 states
10+ buildings	7 states

Sergeants at Arms

Where do your sergeants at arms have jurisdiction?

Sergeant Role and Jurisdiction	Number of States
Chamber space only	35 states
Armed or LEO	4 states
Ceremonial and decorum	19 states
Session only	6 states
No Sergeant at Arms	1 state



Capitol Security Funding



How is your capitol security funded?

Funding Source	Number of States
Legislative operations budget	7
Agency appropriations	23
Combination	10

- Specific amounts for capitol police are often not broken out
- At least two examples of legislative budgets paying for overtime or making up for costs beyond the agency appropriations line item
- At least one example of a one-time legislative appropriation for enhanced security improvements
