

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On Mission On January 23, 1855, Rev. Daniel J. Flickinger, Dr. D. C. Kumler, and Rev. W. J. Shuey were the first to be sent overseas from the US as United Brethren missionaries on a scouting trip. They crossed the Atlantic to reach Sierra Leone. After initial exploration of the land, meeting some key leaders, and suffering the challenges of malaria, two men returned to report back and recover. (All told, these two spent 76 days at sea for 88 days in Sierra Leone.) Flickinger returned home in April 1856, after suffering various setbacks, more bouts with malaria, but having purchased some land in Freetown to launch future missions initiatives there.

Emma's Journey: Jen Blandin's **Reaching Shoptar** and Beyond

Emma has been faithfully serving among the unreached Muslim Shoptar people group, and her journey reflects both adaptability and determination. Her involvement with UB Global began as an intern, immersing herself in ministry work to build relationships and share God's love with the Shoptar. These experiences deepened her commitment, leading her to take on a one-year role with UB Global.

Her passion for the unreached took her to the West Coast for several months, engaging with a community of Shoptar refugees and immigrants. Initially, her plan was to serve among the Shoptar in the Middle East next, but unforeseen health challenges required her to stay stateside. Emma didn't allow these challenges to derail her mission. Instead, she pivoted and embraced the opportunities around her in the Fort Wayne area. Collaborating with local organizations, she has been working not only with the Shoptar but also with other Muslim communities.

One of the most profound moments in Emma's journey was witnessing a Shoptar woman take the bold step of baptism—a testament to the power of God working within the people. Pray that this will be an encouragement to others to follow because a paltry 0.003% of Shoptar follow Jesus.

Despite the twists & turns of life, Emma is faithfully making an impact right where God has placed her, on mission with God to reach the unreached with the Gospel. Her story is a powerful reminder that ministry happens wherever we are willing to be God's hands and feet, even if it's not our plan.

When my church meets in our various homes, we break bread together, we study the Scriptures, we pray together. We do the very things that the early church did in Acts 2:42. And each of our families attends various 'big' churches on the weekends.

We have the opportunity to help define 'church' among new Thai Christians. I desire for them to experience a church like my church. Do they need a 'big' church? Yes, the church is the assembly of believers, and the value of 'big' church cannot be quantified. But for former Thai Buddhists, they can experience what it means to 'be' the body of Christ, to learn a lifestyle of worship, to 'one another' in the love of Jesus, and to share this good news from house to house. Let us not teach them just to 'go' to church to sit and listen like we so often do. They are to 'be' the church, the body of Christ!



Christopher, Liz, and their young kids are the newest UB Global missionaries. They served as an associate pastor in UB churches and then planted a UB church. They are aiming to work with an experienced local team in eastern Pennsylvania, loving many new Afghan immigrants who were war allies forced to flee since the Taliban takeover in 2021.

Both families are currently building their support networks.

Currently, our team visits 50 homes on a monthly rotation, and they make weekly visits to 6 homes where individuals have come to faith in Jesus. All of our home discipleship happens in homes where spouses are divided in faith between Christianity and Buddhism. Will you pray for those spouses to be drawn by God through the witness of their believing spouse? When we make disciples of Jesus, we establish the church.



Celebrating Baptisms

We celebrate the baptisms of new brothers and sisters in three locations in 2024:

• There was a couple in Asia who decided to be baptized this past year. Our missionaries and short-term mission trip attendees have been faithfully sharing the Gospel with them for 30 years; and now we see the fruit in this former government leader!



One has to crawl before one learns to walk, but once a baby begins crawling, she is no longer an infant. Sometimes people refer to our mission work in Thailand as being in its infancy. Not any more. Just in the past year we have baptized the first believers who came to Jesus through our team's direct evangelistic witness, established the first weekly small home church, organized disaster relief for our Thai neighbors affected by historic flooding, and established a soccer program that is reaching large numbers of Thai youth. That doesn't sound like crawling, does it? Here are three big steps that are helping us continue to grow.

#1. It's strange to think that parts of the world do not celebrate Christmas, but Thai people traditionally do not. So it is a grand opportunity to throw a big party, give gifts, and share the story of Jesus' coming and God's plan to redeem the

world through him. We had two parties this past December. Our public Christmas party was held at the local Thai activities center where we saw 315 Thai come to eat a meal and celebrate Christmas with us, hearing a clear presentation of the Gospel. The children from the GSCC put on a program they had prepared for months. For the first time, our middle school students expressed praise to God through dance, which was led by Faa, one of our national Thai staff teammates. Our second party at the GSCC was also incredibly successful and held specifically for the dozens of children who attend our year-round programs. We are grateful for the UB churches and donors whose financial support made these parties possible. And also to those individuals who gave during our Christmas in July donor campaign. Please be prepared for another fundraising drive this summer to continue to provide these incredibly effective Christmas outreaches.

#2. Our mission has applied with the Thai government to establish The Good Soil Foundation, our own charitable foundation. This may not sound too impressive, but everything we do as a ministry has to be accountable to the Thai government.



Let us pray that these new believers will be firmly established in Jesus and in local churches. Let us also ask for many more unreached to turn to their Savior!

We were blessed with unexpectedly quick approval by the Thai government. We are now in the process of setting up the administration of the Foundation. Having our own Foundation will give us significant advantages going forward.

#3. We have established the Thailand Network. This is a relational network for US and Canadian supporters of our Thailand mission. We have nearly 300 individuals and churches who are already invested in our Thailand mission and missionaries. The Thailand Network gives access to opportunities to connect with each other throughout the year, insider communications, timely prayer requests, and more. We established the Thailand Network to build a community that will more effectively empower the mission and missionaries who are bringing Jesus' message of hope and love to the Thai.
