

On June 14, 1998 the Village of Worth declared Depot Street, between 109th Street and 110th Street, our Historic District. Homes #1 - #6 are located in the Historical District.



10850 South Bepot Street Built in 1900

1. 10850 South Depot Street/ Built in 1900/ Home located on John & Mary Leipstorff's farm. Their original homestead is located at 7240 107th St. The Leipstorff's came to this country from Germany in the 1850's. John worked on a barge pulled by mules along the Feeder Canal or Stony Creek. They bought approx. 200 acres from Wales Tobey in 1868, farmed the land and raised seven children. Son, Henry, was Worth's first rural mail carrier. Henry's son, Harry, resided in this home.

10906 South Depot Street Built in 1899



2. 10906 South Depot Street/Built in 1899/ The Anton Maas Family originally lived in this home. It was also once owned by Arvid & Harriet (Fisher-Cure)Lysen & family. The Lysen brothers Olaf, Arvid, Oscar, & Raymond were carpenters who had built most of the original homes in Palos Heights and Worth. Harriet was the daughter of George and Jeanie (Crandall) Fisher. Ben and Harriet Crandall were her grandparents and John and Jane Crandall, who where the first to settle Worth in 1858, her great-grandparents.

10910 South Bepot Street Built in 1896



3. 10910 South Depot Street/ Built in 1896/ Four generations of Wilsons resided in this home. Mr. & Mrs. Edward Wilson had arrived in the U.S. in 1853, started a farm at 93rd & Harlem in 1861 and spent their declining years in this home. Edward was a member of the original Worth Methodist Church Board. Son, Robert J. and his wife Elva L. (Peterson) moved from their farmstead at 95th & Harlem to this home in 1913. Robert was a member of Worth's first Village Board & served on the School Board. Elva was an active member of the Women's Society of the Worth Methodist Church. Elva was the second President of the Worth School PTA and was a Life Member. Her brother, George Peterson had been part owner with Carl Bishop of the Bishop's General Store. Robert & Elva had 3 children. Son, Edward L. with his wife Janet and 4 children, also resided in this home. Edward had served on the Worth School Board.

10936 South Bepot Street Built in 1898



4. 10936 South Depot Street/ Built in 1898/ Home built by Robert Lucas. Robert invented the Coleman Lantern. Robert & Ida (Bishop) had 3 sons, George, Bruce, & Kenneth. Ida was the sister of Edward Payson Bishop who had built and operated the first general store located on the NE corner of 111th St. & Depot and was appointed Post Master in 1883. Son, Kenneth, remained in this house in which he was born throughout the 82 years of his life. Kenneth was a Police Magistrate and Worth Township Supervisor, and his wife Mildred "Sis" (Roulo) Lucas, humanitarian and community activist had been named Woman of the Year.

10940 South Bepot Street Built in 1890



5. 10940 South Depot Street/ Built in 1890/ Home of Worth's first Mayor, Harry Woods, who served from 1914 until his death in 1930. The first village meetings were held in this home. After the Woods nephew, Emil Schultz, and wife Margaret (Beck) lived here. Margaret's father owned the Beck Saloon next door. This was also the home of Edward & Jessica (Conway)Emond & their two daughters. Edward J. Emond was Chief of Police. He also served on the Police Pension Board and was an active member of the Worth Volunteer Fire Department. Jessica was the daughter of Edward & Gertrude Conway. Edward was the second Mayor of Worth.



6. 7100 West 110th Street/ Built in 1893/ An addition was added to the back in 1914. At one time this building housed Fred Lurdtke's Saloon, the Dart Brothers Hardware, and the Beck Saloon. Charles Beck was the proprietor. Emma (Preller) Hildebrand lived in this building. Her husband, Fred, was Village Treasurer. In 1904 Fred & Emma had purchased the Worth Hotel located at the southwest corner 111th and Depot. The Worth Race Track was very popular at that time and the hotel provided a place for the jockeys, trainers, and owners to stay. He later converted the building into a general store. The building also contained a community dance hall where the first Village Board met.



7. 7132 West 110th Street/Built in 1880/ This was the original Wabash Depot until 1905. After it was moved to this location it was the home of Oscar & Emily (Braniger) Stromberg. Emily's half-brother, Franklin Russert, served as Worth's fourth Mayor. John and Jennie (Poorman) Martin purchased this home in 1907. Jennie Martin worked as the Ticket Agent for the Worth train station. Daughter, Mary (Martin) Marrs, who had moved to this home when she was nine and remained here, was married to Ray Marrs who died during WWI and whose name represents our American Legion Post #991. Mary served as the American Legion's Ladies Auxiliary's first President in 1946. Both Ray and Mary had worked for the Wabash Railroad. Mary retired at the age of 72 after 53 years of service.

8. 7136 West 110th Street/ Built in 1912/ This was once the home of Henry & Irene (Wagner) Lode and daughter Betty Jean who married Ed Fisher. Henry migrated from the Netherlands in 1923 along with his parents, Cornelious, Akke, and 7 siblings. They later added 2 more children. The Lodes worked a truck farm at 107th & Worth Ave. The Lode family was involved in the community for many years taking active roles in the village government, fire department, Marrs-Meyer Post #991 American Legion, the Lions Club, the high school district, Worth Bank & Trust, and the Worth Methodist Church. Brother, Bert served as Fire Chief. Brother, Ed, was proprietor of Worth Texaco Service Station & Lode Petroleum Co. located at the northeast corner 111th & Harlem. This had been the first gasoline station in the village originally owned by Louis Lange, son of John & Minnie Lange. Ed (Lode Investments) was also responsible for many of the apartments and homes built in Worth.



9. 7138 West 110th Street/Built in 1916/This Dutch Colonial style home was originally one story. A second floor was added in the 1980's.

10917 South Harlem Abenue Built in 1903




10. 10917 South Harlem Avenue/Built in 1903/ This home represents a 1 1/2 story Cape Cod style. This was originally the home of Minnie Hoffman. Bub & Ruth Hoff had also resided in this home. Bub owned a radio repair store at 110th & Western.

10934 South Harlem Abenue Built in 1903



11. 10934 South Harlem Avenue/Built in 1903/ Home of William & Hazel (Hildebrand) Little. William Little was the first Fire Chief of the Worth Volunteer Fire Department. He was also the first Commander of the Marrs-Meyer American Legion Post #991, which he organized along with Jack Burgert of Palos Heights in 1946. His wife, Hazel, served as Village Clerk. Hazel's father, Fred Hildebrand, was the Village's Treasurer. William owned the hardware store on the SW corner of 111th & Depot, which he acquired from his father-in-law when it was a general store. In 1946 the Littles donated a portion of their property to the Worth Methodist Church so that it could be rebuilt after a fire damaged the original church located at 7127 111th St. The present church is located at 112th & Depot.

7136 West 109th Place Built in 1892



12. 7136 West 109th Place/ Built in 1892/ The original home of George & Louise Poorman. George's sister, Jennie Martin, was the Ticket Agent for Worth's Wabash train station. Clarence & Lottie Kline purchased this home in 1947. Clarence worked in the meat market of the IGA Store, located at 7011 W. 111th St. Son, Richard, married Loretta Russert whose brother was the fourth mayor of Worth. Richard was involved with the Worth Boy Scouts for many years. To date, the home has remained in the Kline Family.

7150 West 109th Place Built in 1914




13. 7150 West 109th Place/ Built in 1914/ This style of home represents a 1 1/2 story bungalow. This was the home of Merlan Kittel who was Commander of Marrs-Meyer American Legion Post #991.

7148 West 109th Place Built in 1928



14. 7148 West 109th Place/ Built in 1928/ English style home with gambrel roof. This was the home of Vivian (Kittle) Schachow, sister of Merlan Kittle. Vivian owned Vivian's Beauty Salon, located at 11350 S. Harlem, in the 1950's & 1960's.



15. 7001 West 108th Street/ Built in 1908/ Sam & Mary (Leipstorff) Stewart inherited this property from Mary's parents, John & Mary Leipstorff, one of Worth's first settlers. Sam's brother, Henry, built this home and resided here with his wife, Anna Louis and their 5 children. Henry became a Village Trustee in 1924. Henry also ranked among the ten highest checker players in the country.




16. 7001 West 107th Street/ Built in 1901/ This home was built on a section of John & Mary Leipstorff's original farm. The Leipstorff's purchased 200 acres in 1868 from Wales Tobey. This was the home of their son, William & wife, Martha (Biefuse). William & Martha had 6 children & one adopted child. Five generations of Leipstorff's have lived in Worth and continue to reside in Worth today. George and Dorothy Gombanickis (Gombis) bought this home on 2 1/2 acres from Martha in 1940. An addition was built to the front of the home to provide room for Happy Time Nursery School, which Dorothy ran from 1948-1977. A very devote religious family, George could often be found on 111th St. preaching the gospel. The home & property was sold to a developer in 2006.



17. 6920 West 107th Street/ Built in 1917/ Home of Edward and Katherine (Cure) Lange. Edward was the son of John and Minnie (Rickhoff) Lange. Minnie's parents were one of Worth's first settlers emigrating from Germany in the early 1860s. John Lange first came here to work on William Leipstorff's farm. John & Minnie farmed the original Rickhoff homestead located at 6939 W. 107th St. The Lange's supplied most of Worth with butter, eggs and milk during the horse and buggy days. Katherine was the daughter of Peter & Mary Cure. The Cure family settled here in 1900. Peter was Worth's first Treasurer. Edward was also on the first Village Board as a Trustee.

11030 South Nagle Abenue Built in 1901




18. 11030 South Nagle Avenue/ Built in 1901/ Evidence proves that the original building and surrounding property housed an office and spur railroad track for what once was the Worth Race Track and is now the Holy Sepulchre Cemetery located on 111th & Ridgeland. The horse race track was open from 1900 until 1910. The Lysen brothers built an addition onto the building but it was not actually recognized as a home until 1961. A caboose had remained on the property until the 1960's.

111th & Wak Park Abenue Built in 1915

19. 111th & Oak Park Avenue/ Built in 1915/ The original front building replaced the first 2-room school located at 7130 111th St. in order to accommodate Worth's 49 school age children in 1915. The land for this building was donated by Worth's first settlers, John & Jane Crandall.



20. 6859 West 110th Street/ Built in 1893/ Home built by (Daniel) Lincoln Crandall. Lincoln was the youngest child of Worth's first settlers, John & Jane Crandall. They had 6 children. Olaf & Olga Lysen rented this home in 1910. They had 7 children. Olaf was a Village Trustee. Son, Elmer, also served on the Village Board and was a member of the Worth Volunteer Fire Department. Son, Walter, who was born in the home with the help of midwife, Minnie (Leipstorff) Rosembaum, was a Village Trustee and a Sunday school teacher at the Worth Methodist Church. To date, Walter is the Editor and Publisher of the Worth Citizen Newspaper. Olaf's arrival from Scandinavia at the turn of the 20th Century paved the way for his brothers, Arvid, Oscar, Raymond, and sister, Signe.

In 1866, John Crandall purchased a tract of land for \$25 an acre from Benjamin Adams of Chicago. With the hope of increasing the settlements' population, John subdivided the land between 110th & Crandall Ave., Depot to Worth St., into 31 home-sized lots. Houses #21 - #31 are located within the Crandall Subdivision. John Crandall also provided the land on which the Wabash Railroad built.

10955 South Worth Abenue Built in 1918 MAIL ORDER HOME



21. 10955 South Worth Avenue/ Built in 1918/ This home is the Princeville Model from the Sears Roebuck & Co. catalog. It was originally located at the SE corner of Crandall & Worth Ave. Lindon & Mabel (Crandall) Perry originally lived in this home. An identical house was built directly south and facing 111th St. for Mabel's brother Albert James Crandall & wife Dolly. Mabel & A.J. were the children of James Albert & Mary "Mollie" (Sproat) Crandall. James was the son of John and Jane (McKenzie) Crandall who were the first settlers in Worth.

11015 South Worth Abenue Built in 1925




22. 11015 South Worth Avenue/Built in 1925/ The Lysen brothers, Olaf, Oscar, Arvid, and Raymond built this home. This home was built for Al and Hazel Holstrom who owned a fuel oil company in Oak Lawn. They had 2 children, Albert Jr. & Gloria. Son, Al Jr., married Elva Behrends. The Behrends owned a large hardware store in Oak Lawn for many years. Al Jr. was one of the first pilots to fly airmail for the U.S. Mail Service. This was also the home of Worth Police Officer, William Demblon.

11017 South Worth Abenue Built in 1924



23. 11017 South Worth Avenue/ Built in 1924/ Home built for Otto & Signe (Lysen) Johnson. The Lysen brothers built this home for their sister. Otto worked for the Borden Milk Co. who at the time was converting from horse drawn milk tankers to truck tankers. He was the first employee to drive a big tanker from Wisconsin every day to pick up milk. Otto and Signe had two children, Raymond & Helen. Helen married Erwin Cure whose grandfather, Peter Cure, was Worth's first Treasurer. The Lysen-Cure family owned this home for 70 years.

11019 South Morth Abenue Built in 1923



24. 11019 South Worth Avenue/ Built in 1923/ The home of Arvid & Amanda Lysen and daughter Ethel. The Lysen brothers Olaf, Oscar, Arvid, and Raymond built this home. The brothers were carpenters who had built most of the original homes in Palos Heights and Worth. The Lysens were active in community affairs including school, church, sports and politics. At one time this house had been converted into a real estate office.

11020 South Worth Abenue Built in 1895



25. 11020 South Worth Avenue/ Built in 1895/ Home of Benjamin & Harriet Crandall. In 1879 Ben married his second cousin, Harriet, the daughter of John and Jane Crandall who first settled Worth in 1858. Ben was the son of Heman & Lydia (Bushnell) Crandall. In 1833, at the age of 21, Heman walked from Lake Champlain, New York to Chicago to purchase land. He eventually settled in Bremen Township. Heman was one of the earliest settlers in this vicinity. Ben was a member of Worth's first Health Board in 1914, a Police Magistrate, and was Worth Township's Road Commissioner. Harriet frequently acted as a midwife in the community. Their son, Dan, also served as Worth Township's Highway Commissioner and was Worth's first Police Chief. Through the years the Crandall family had completed a century of service in elective offices & civic work. To date, descendants of the Crandall family still reside in the home.

7006 Mest Crandall Abenue Built in 1896



26. 7006 West Crandall Avenue/ Built in 1896/ This home was originally built for the Crandall family. The Foyle family had also resided here. Fred Foyle served on the Village Board as a Trustee. Son, Bert, started a well contractor business, Foyle & Sons, in 1906 and served on the School Board for several terms. This was also the parsonage for Rev. Guy Chester Jones, Pastor of the Worth Methodist Church from 1928 - 1936. And, this has been the home of Herb & Alice Stewart & family. Herb was the son of Henry Stewart who served on the Village Board. Herb "Stew" played semi-pro baseball with the Cole-Lenzi team, coached & managed local teams and started Worth's first Little League. To date, the home has remained in the Stewart Family.

7012 Mest Crandall Abenue Built in 1893



27. 7012 West Crandall Avenue/ Built in 1893/ Franklin Russert, who resided here, was the fourth Mayor of the Village of Worth and served from 1943-1949. His wife, Dorothy, was President of the PTA. Franklin was the grandson of Henry & Margaret (Brainiger) Russert who first settled at 111th & 75th Ave., which was known as the gravel pit, in the mid 1800's. Frank's father, William, worked as a watchman during the construction of the Cal-Sag Channel. Frank had worked for the Worth Dairy delivering milk door to door. The dairy was located at 112th & Harlem. Lewis & Mary Macauley had also resided here before purchasing the house next door.

7030 West Crandall Abenue Built in 1903



28. 7030 West Crandall Avenue/ Built in 1903/ The Sladek family were the original owners. Lewis & Mary (Polchow) Macauley purchased this home in 1921. Lewis had worked for a construction crew on the Calumet Sag Channel in 1915. He worked for Bert Foyle well drilling from 1919 until 1926 when he started his own well drilling company. Along with the Foyles, together they provided the majority of the deepwater wells in Worth, Chicago Ridge, & Palos Heights. Lewis served as Director, Clerk, & President of the School Board from 1926-1947. In 1946 Lewis became Director of Orland State Bank and in 1955 became the President of the bank. He was also President of the Worth Civic Assoc. in 1951 and was a lay leader in the Worth Methodist Church. Son, Wilbur (Buss), served on the School Board in 1949 and worked for Worth Township. He served in WWII as a demolition expert. Son, Chester also served in WWII as a pilot of a B-24 bomber. The home remained in the Macauley family until 2002.

7013 Mest Crandall Abenue Built in 1934 MAIL ORDER HOME



29. 7013 West Crandall Avenue/Built in 1934/This home is the Collingwood Model from the Sears Roebuck & Co. catalog. Home kits had approximately 39,000 numbered parts, not including nails and screws. This mail-order home was built by George & Anne (Leipstorff) Hasenfang Anne was the daughter of William & Martha Leipstorff and granddaughter of John and Mary Leipstorff, who first settled in Worth in 1868. The home was delivered here by the Wabash Railroad. Two additions and other alterations, such as closing in the front porch, have occurred since it was first built. To date, the home has remained in the Leipstorff family.

11026 South Worth Abenue Built in 1922 MAIL ORDER HOME




30. 11026 South Worth Avenue/Built in 1922/ This is a Gordon-Van Tine Co. Bungalow. The home was built for Mary "Mollie" Elizabeth (Sproat) Crandall. Mary was the wife of James Albert, son of John & Jane Crandall, who first settled Worth in 1858 and played an important part in the development of Worth. James & Mary originally resided next door with their children Albert James (A.J.) and Mabel Elizabeth. After the death of her husband Mary subdivided the lot and had the smaller home built for herself. The Crandalls were one of the prominent families who founded Worth's first church in 1883. It was originally known as the Methodist-Episcopal Church, located at 7127 W. 111th St. Mary served the church as a member of the Ladies Aid Society. At one time this home had served as a parsonage for the church. This was also the home of John & Ruby Henning. Ruby worked for the Worth Post Office. The home originally had a front porch with French windows, which was converted in the 1980's.

11028 South Worth Abenue Built in 1896 RAZED 2006



31. 11028 South Worth Avenue/ Built in 1896/ Home of James Albert & Mary Elizabeth (Sproat) Crandall. James was the oldest son of John & Jane (McKenzie) Crandall. In 1834, at the age of 4, John came to Illinois from Franklin County, New York. Jane came to the U.S. from Scotland in 1835. John & Jane first resided in Bremen Township in 1845 and settled in Worth in 1858. Their homestead was located at 6901 W. 111th St. James married Mary Sproat from Joliet and they had two children, Albert and Mabel who resided in homes directly across the street with their families. The Altman family also lived here. Frank Altman & his wife, Juanita were Village Trustees. Frank also served on the School Board. Juanita was the great granddaughter of John & Jane Crandall and granddaughter of Ben & Harriet Crandall. This had also been a parsonage for Rev. Harold Brett who served as Minister of the Worth Methodist Church.

11116 South Worth Abenue Built in 1926



32. 11116 South Worth Avenue/Built in 1926/ Home of the Conway Family and built by Edward G. Conway. The Conway Blacksmith Shop also occupied this property. Edward "Pappy" was the second Mayor of Worth from 1930-1941. He also served as Fire Chief for the Worth Volunteer Fire Department. His wife, Gertrude, was the first President of the PTA. Their son, Edward Jr., was Commander of the Marrs-Meyers American Legion Post #991 and served on the Police force and the Worth Volunteer Fire Department. He married Florence "Babe" Jousma who served in the Marines in WWII. Daughter, Jessica married Edward Emonds. Son, William "Stogie" also served as Fire Chief and was married to Elsie Coverick. To date, the home has remained in the Conway family.

11150 South Worth Abenue Built in 1912



33. 11150 South Worth Avenue/ Built in 1912/ This home represents the Foursquare style. Lindon Perry built this home for his parents. Lindon was married to Mabel Crandall, who was the daughter of James & Mary Crandall and granddaughter of first settlers, John & Jane Crandall. A servants' quarters was located where the garage now stands. The Dancie family resided there.

11158 South Morth Abenue Built in 1917




34. 11158 South Worth Avenue/Built in 1917/ Harry Ferrin resided here. He was a Village Trustee and the first butcher in Worth. The home is a Foursquare style. Characteristics of a Foursquare are two stories, four rooms per floor, no center hall, hipped or pyramidal roofs with pronounced eaves and dormers hiding an extra half story. A distinctive American house type during the opening years of the 20th Century.

11219 South Worth Abenue Built in 1925



35. 11219 South Worth Ave./ Built in 1925/ The home of William F. & Jennie Teason. This home, and the adjoining home to the south, were built by William F. and sons Leonard, & William C. William F. was in charge of a construction crew on the Cal-Sag Channel and served on the Village Board. William C., his wife Margret (Lysen) Teason & family had also resided here. Margret was the daughter of Olaf & Olga Lysen. Olaf had also served on the Village Board. Leonard and his family resided next door.



36. 7011 West 113th Street/Built in 1874/ Original home of Wales & Elizabeth (Burt) Tobey. Wales first acquired land here in 1856 and then settled here with his bride in 1874. They had a dairy farm. In 1883 Wales donated land for the first church to be built. Since there were few churches in the area the original Methodist Church, located at 7127 111th St. had also served other denominations. Their son (Charles) Clifford, resided in this home, where he was born in 1884, until his death in 1953. Cliff was Worth's Postmaster from 1926 - 1953. Also home of the McDonough Family. Marjorie (Tobey) McDonough was Cliff's daughter. Francis McDonough was the fifth Mayor of Worth who served from 1949 - 1955.

11257 South Bepot Abenue Built in 1928



37. 11257 South Depot Avenue/ Built in 1928/ This home along with the adjacent home directly east was built by the Good Fellowship Club, or Booster Club, which was made up of early settlers such as A.J. & Dan Crandall, Robert Wilson, & Clifford Tobey to stimulate the local economy. The Club had built 4 homes and was also responsible for purchasing Worth's first fire truck in 1925. This was the home of George & Mary "Pansy" (Powers) Plahm. They had 8 children. Both George and Pansy held the office of Village Clerk. George served from 1928 - 1955 and Pansy from 1955 - 1963. In the early years this home was used as the office of the Village Clerk. George was also Fire Chief on the Worth Volunteer Fire Department from 1949 - 1952. As a child George worked as a water boy during construction of the Cal-Sag Channel.

11123 South Preller Abenue Built in 1928



38. 11123 South Preller Avenue/ Built in 1928/ Home of the Templin family. Vernon Templin was the sixth Mayor of Worth from 1955 - 1961. His wife, Leah Rose, was a schoolteacher in Worth. Their son, Charles, was a Lieutenant on the Worth Volunteer Fire Department. Leah was the grand daughter of Edward Payson Bishop who first bought farmland in Worth Township in 1865 and in 1881 settled in Worth with his wife Elizabeth. They built and operated the first general store and raised 7 children. Their oldest son, Carl, Leah's father, remained a life-long resident and carried on the family business until 1940. To date, the home has remained in the Templin family.

11119 South Preller Abenue Built in 1923



39. 11119 South Preller Avenue/ Built in 1923/ Home of the Bishop family. Edward "Bud" Bishop served as Worth Township Road Commissioner. He was also a Village Trustee for 12 years. Son of Carl Bishop and grandson of Edward Payson Bishop who settled here in 1881 and built the first general store located on the northeast corner of 111th St. & Depot. The store also served as the first Post Office. Edward P. served as Post Master and the Justice of Peace for many years.



40. 7500 West 111th Street/Built in 1918/ Home of Walter G. & Florence (Diesing) Mahaffay. This is also the former site of the Mahaffay Machine Shop. Walter G. was a Village Clerk of Worth. His son, Walter, served on the Worth Planning and Zoning Commission. Florence's parents owned a grove just east of the home. Diesing's Grove hosted picnics for 42 years.
