


A message from Edward Zabrocki, village president, Tinley Park

I would like to thank Star Publications for putting together this comprehensive guide to the Village of Tinley Park. The information that it provides our citizens is in-

valuable and will be used over and over.

In 1992, the Village of Tinley Park will be celebrating its Centennial. Actually, Tinley Park was known as New Bremen until 1892. It was named New Bremen because the original German settlers of this area left Germany from the port of Bremen on their way to the United States. We are very proud of our heritage and especially today with the great diversity of nationalities that are rep-

resented in our community.

The latest population figure for our village is 37,121 residents which makes us the 36th largest community in Illinois. Many people have asked why we care called a "village" as opposed to a "city." In a city such as Chicago or Oak Forest, the aldermen are elected to represent a specific geographic ward and are responsible only to that ward. In a Village such as Tinley Park or Orland Park, the trustees are elected at-large by the entire community and are, therefore, responsible to the entire community. You may find the following populaton figures interesting: In 1950 our population was 2,326 and in 1960 it was 6,392 an increase of 4,066 or 174%; during the 1960's an increase of 6,000 to 12,392 (94%); during the 1970's an increase of 13,779 to 26,171 (111%) and during the 1980's an increase of 10,950 to 37,121 (42%). You can see that our largest growth came in the 1970's which was the result of the "baby-boomers" moving to suburbia. Additionally, our estimated population for the year 2000 is 43,000 residents which will be one of our smallest growth periods.

Through the years we have made a conscious effort to lessen the Village's dependence on real estate taxes as a source of revenue. Approximately 27% of our 90-91 budget is dependent on real estate tax. In 1980 our sales tax revenues were \$1,100,000 and in fiscal year 1991 that amount has grown to \$3,100,000. Sales tax income is now 36% of our general operating budget. As you can see that by shopping Tinley, we can lessen the pressure on the Vil-

lage's portion of your tax bill.

We can also be proud of our Tinley Park Volunteer Fire department. We are the largest all-volunteer fire department (75+) in the state of Illinois which is rated a Class Three. This rating is based on the level of fire protection that is provided a community. There are approximately 1300 fire districts or fire departments in Illinois. Less than 45 of them have a rate Class Three or less. By the way, 1991 is the 90th Anniversary of our Tinley Park Volunteer Fire Department. We also have one of the lowest public employee to resident ratios in the state. This is directly attributable to the dedication of our employees in the Public Works Department, Police Department, Building Department and the Clerk's Office. To this we add the volunteers

of our 13 commissions (approximately 125 people), ESDA and plus the numerous volunteers that make Oktoberfest a success year after year and we have a village that is interested in its people and looks to the future with enthusiasm.

Tinley Park will continue to set the standard for others to follow. SHOP TINLEY!!!

Board provides leadership

Tinley Park holds a leadership role in the southwest suburban area as a government concerned for the welfare of its citizens. This concern was first demonstrated shortly after the village was incorporated in 1892, when the new Board of Trustees created a series of committees to review the community's needs. Through the years, village officials have planned carefully and creatively to meet the public service requirements of a growing community.

A new milestone for village government was reached in 1987 when it moved into newly constructed quarters, a handsomely modern brick building set on a large, open site at 16250 Oak Park Ave., which was designed to fit harmoniously with the nearby residential area. The interior is both attractive to the eye and functional for the people who serve in elected and staff positions.

Governed by a council-manager form of government, Tinley Park has a mayor,

clerk, and six trustees, elected at large and serving four-year staggered terms. The key to Tinley Park's success is its committee structure. Appointed on a non-partisan basis and giving highly capable civic minded people an opportunity to participate in their local government, are some 11 major commissions. These are commissions for Economic Development, Human Resources, Health Services, Industrial and Commercial, Veterans, Youth, Long Range Planning, Environmental Control, Civic Service, Zoning Board of Appeals, and Historical Preservation. These committees involve more than 100 residents. All meetings are open to the public. Interested citizens can also address the village board at three meetings each month. The village's active participation in several community-wide events provides an unusual opportunity for interaction between civic personnel and residents, while they work together in a spirit of neighborliness and fun.



New museum in Tinley celebrates Native American history, culture

The interest in the culture and art of Tinley Park's earliest inhabitants is being researched and displayed at one of the area's most interesting new museums: The Woodlands Native American Museum and Gallery.

What began as a one-room operation when it opened in August, 1990, has now grown to two rooms and shows signs of expanding even more as it gains a national reputation for its original paintings and artworks.

It centers around the woodland Indians that by the early 1800s were not only talented artists but had developed a trade system stretching from Alaska to the Gulf of Mexico.

Tom Bleyle, museum director, explained that the Indians developed a complex society that became rich through the fur trade. They left the Tinley Park area with a treasure trove of artifacts: spear points, grinding stones, and

other tools which were found in the yards of Tinley Park and are now on display in the museum.

Also on display are artifacts from around the country, as well as paintings showing the lore of these early Native Americans.

The museum and gallery, as the name suggests, offers good Native American art, sculptures, and according to Bleyle, "masterful bronzes." Janet Gridley, an artist contributing to the museum, makes pots as these early Native Americans did, using red clay from pits near Kankakee. Many, many years ago, these same pits provided the same kind of clay to Native American potters.

The Woodlands Native American Museum and Gallery is at 16860 Oak Park Ave., Tinley Park. The phone is 614-0334. Hours are 9 a.m. to 6:30 p.m., Monday through Saturday; noon to 5:30 p.m., Sunday. There is an admission charge.



Park District has variety of recreational facilities

Tinley Park is a recreation-oriented community, a natural outgrowth of hiking and riding trails, fishing, tobogganing, cross country skiing, 18-hole golf course, and the thousands of acres of Forest Preserve land that are in, and surround, the village.

Planning for the recreational needs of all Tinley Park citizens is the Tinley Park-Park District, a separate municipal agency governed by five elected commissioners, and established for the purpose of providing parks, facilities and recreational programs. It is also responsible for the maintenance and administration of parks under its jurisdiction.

In the spring of 1991, the Park District will open the 132-acre Structure 32 Site located just west of Harlem Avenue on 167th Street. This site will offer more than two miles of pathways, fishing piers, picnic areas, and play equipment. Plans are also underway for the development of a 53-acre site at 171st Street and 80th Avenue.

Until these two sites are opened, the largest Park District park is the 28.5-acre Vogt Woods, followed by the 12.5-acre Bicentennial Park, and the 10-acre McCarthy Park. In all, there are currently 24 park sites, covering 155 acres, in Tinley Park.

For swimming, there is the large indoor pool at Andrew High School, and the Aqua Center, built by the Lions Club of Tinley Park, a 4.5-acre park with a 25-meter pool.

Nearing completion is a large park and lake in the heart of Tinley Park. Part of the Little Calumet Watershed flood control project, it will offer a total of 132 acres of parkland, permanent recreation area, and a lake for fishing and sailboating.

The Park District also offers an exciting and comprehensive array of programs for all age groups: preschool programs, youth programs, tot time activities, teen and adult programs that include crafts and ceramics, sports and athletics, workshops and seminars, trips and tours, special events, and activities just for senior citizens.



Oktoberfest returns Oct. 3-6

Mark these dates right now: Oct. 3 through 6, Tinley Park's annual Oktoberfest.

It's the 12th year for this massive community event which last year drew more than 55,000 to the World Music Theater, site of the 1990, and now 1991 Oktoberfest.

Frank Kurzawa, president of Oktoberfest's planning group, said this year's plans include more than 30 food vendors, a carnival with the world's largest Ferris wheel, three entertainment tents with music guaranteed to set everyone's feet tapping.

Also, in addition to a huge car show, fest-goers will enjoy free admission, and plenty of parking.

Parking is important, Kurzawa said, since the Tinley Park Oktoberfest is considered "one of the largest community events in the South Suburbs. It is

covered by all the local and Chicago media," he added.

Oktoberfest will include a large parade down Oak Park Avenue on Oct. 6 at 10 a.m. Kurzawa estimates that more than 100 groups will be represented with bands and floats.

More than just a yearly fling to celebrate the harvest. Oktoberfest is a large fund raiser that benefits approximately 15 Tinley Park groups. "All the money raised stays in Tinley Park," Kurzawa

And when the last car departs this year's Oktoberfest and the last tent and table are packed up, is it time for the committee to take a long winter rest?

Not at all. "We begin planning next year's fest during this year's fest," Kurzawa said. "This is when we talk about wat to change and what to keep, while it's fresh in our minds." Officially, Oktoberfest's year begins each February.

Centennial celebration

It's likely no one is still around who remembers the incorporation of Tinley Park since it took place almost 100 years ago.

According to Jerry Meyer, who with Dr. Robert Kovarik, heads up the planning committee to celebrate the centennial in 1992, events marking the 100 years of Tinley Park's development and growth will cover an entire year.

"All these events will be built around Tinley's origins and growth, such as its beginnings as a farming community, right up to, and beyond, the impact cars have had on our community," Meyer said.

In June and July, 1992, events planned will include parades, pageants, fireworks (with a tie-in with Tinley's Fourth of July celebrations), and the involvement of local schools in the festivities.

The last event of the year will be more formal, with a dinner currently in the planning stage.

"Right now, we're looking for old pictures, and former mayors," Meyer said. "We're trying to locate Rose Brown who was one of the first women mayors in the area. We were way ahead of the pack at that time."

Little Red Schoolhouse


Today it is the site of Little Red Schoolhouse Nature Center of the Forest Preserve District of Cook County. Taking the place of the three Rs are stories about plants and animals. The 500 acres of the center include nature trails, a small museum, wildlife refuge and slough.

cluding the Sunday edition of the Miami Herald. The library also provides a collection of books in large print, books written in German. cassette players, and a growing collection of educational, health, and travel cassettes.

Also available at the library are copy machines on both the upper and lower levels, an Apple computer for public use, microfiche reader, two electric typewriters, 86 framed art prints available for one-month loans, 84 (and the number is growing) compact discs. plus a jigsaw puzzle, pattern and coupon exchange bin.

New features in the library include fax facilities for public use, \$1 per page for any message across the United States; a fiction videocassette collection that includes includes classic as well as Academy Award nominee and winning films; a collection of unabridged books on cassette tape, initially 18 titles have been purchased with 12 best sellers to be added every three months.

Also, the library has the INFO-TRAC a CD-ROM database index for magazines. This provides a quick and convenient way to do a subject search for information in magazines. In addition, there is the magazine collection which is a microfilm collection of magazines, making these articles readily accessible and printable with the new Minolta microfilm reader-/printer. Information can be printed on plain paper for 15 cents per page.

Programs at the library include the very popular summer reading program for children from age 3 through grade 8. Flyers listing all the summer's activities are available at the circulation desk in the Youth Services Department.

Fultons arrived via wagon in 1835

The dynamic community that is Tinley Park today had its quiet beginning in 1835 with the arrival by covered wagon of the John Fulton family, dairy farmers from New York State. The Fultons established a 160-acre homestead in a region clearly marked on early maps as "Wilderness." By the early 1840s, the Fultons had carved a farm out of this frontier land and were already purchasing more homesteads.

The development of a major railroad network throughout the U.S. had a primary impact on the future of Tinley Park. In 1850, reacting to proposed routes, efforts were made to link Chicago and Joliet by railroad. In 1851, work was begun of the Chicago and Rock Island Railroad with Tinley Park located on the main line. Local historians feel that the single greatest economic factor in the growth of Tinley Park was the arrival of the Rock Island Line.

The need for workers on the railroad attracted a large number of German immigrants. Many of these industrious people joined earlier New England settlers to build homes, farms, and establish businesses. The little village soon became known as the Village of New Bremen, after Bremen, Germany, birthplace of many of the new settlers.

New Bremen began to grow as an agricultural and commercial center. George Bortels built a large wheat grinding mill in 1872.

The long fan-like arms of the huge windmill towered over the land attracting artists from throughout the Midwest to capture this prominent landmark on canvas. When the wind was strong, millers would work round-the-clock to grind the rich farm products of New Bremen.

When the mill was finally torn down, many of its stones were used in the construction of some of the turn-of-the-century homes in Tinley Park.

An important highlight of the year 1886 was the opening of Bremen Cash Store with its pulley-operated elevator to carry shoppers between the basement and the two floors above.

As the end of the 19th Century approached, leading citizens felt the town, as an important commercial hub, should be incorporated as a village. The name Tinley Park was selected to honor three brothers, Sam, Charles and Edward Tinley, who had been builders of the Rock Island Railroad.

Throughout its long history, the citizens of Tinley Park have demonstrated concern and care in the midst of crisis. Irish, English, and German citizens of Tinley Park led the list of Civil War volunteers from the state. During the period, rumors of area farms as stations in the Underground Railroad were many. This same concern exists today in the numerous charitable organizations in the community.

Tinley Park continues to preserve its rich heritage in many ways. An apartment building, constructed by Carl Vogt in 1857, has gained National Landmark status, and from its restored Old Zion Lutheran Church museum, the Bremen Historical Society of Tinley Park continues to research local history. By village proclamation, the museum has a room devoted to the history and contributions of the Pottawattomi Indians who occupied the land before the first New England settlers arrived. The society maintains cotact with the Pottawattomi Band of Oklahoma, descendants of these American natives.

Tinley Park Historical Society

The Tinley Park Historical Society was organized to preserve and document the heritage of Tinley Park and its surrounding areas. The "Old Zion" Lutheran Church, a "prairie gothic" style frame structure built in 1884, was acquired as its home. Now known simply as "The Landmark," it has been the center for the history of Tinley Park.

A museum has been established in the addition behind the original church. The museum features infor-





classes in eight high school centers including Tinley Park High School and a College for Kids featuring music, dance, language, computer and other programs for tod-

dlers through teens.

Through College-sponsored Adult Basic Education (ABE) and General Education Development (GED) classes, adult students who were unable to finish their elementary or high school studies can prepare for completion of their diploma. These free classes are available at adult education centers located in Tinley Park, Calumet City, Country Club Hills, Dolton, Harvey, Hazel Crest, Lansing, Markham, Midlothian, Oak Forest and Phoenix. English as a Second Language (ESL) classes are also available at the College and two off-campus locations for non-English speakers.

The college works closely with local businesses through its Business and Career Skills Center, which sponsors a variety of business-oriented workshops and seminars, designs customized training programs, and provides consultants to work with local business on specific projects of interest. A variety of resources for small businesses and government procurement assistance are also available

through the College.

South Suburban College is accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools and is approved for veterans benefits. Financial aid is available in the form of grants, scholarships, loans and a work study program. The college also offers a number of waiver programs to make college courses even more affordable.

SSC operates on a semester system with classes typically beginning in late August and mid-January. Eightweek courses are also offered, with many beginning in mid-October and mid-March. Eight-week and four-week sessions are also scheduled throughout the summer.

Burning regulations


NO burning of refuse, garbage or leaves is permitted.

Budingen, Tinley have strong ties

Question: Why did a city in Germany, when news of the August, 1990, tornado reached them, placed worried calls to Tinley Park to see if everyone was all right?

The answer is in Tinley Park's Sister City Program with Budingen, Germany, one of Europe's most charming

medieval towns.

Of course, the residents of Budingen were worried about Tinley Park: 180 of them had visited their counterpart village in south suburbia, and 100 Tinley Park residents will make a similar trip to Budingen this spring.

But, let's start at the beginning.

Tinley Park has an old history dating back to the time when it was the center of American Indian Culture with tribes such as the Pottawattomi, Mohawk, and Illini living

and hunting in the area.

The first Europeans in the region were French explorers and traders, but by the early 1800's the founding families had made permanent settlement in the area. From the 1830's to the mid 1840's the settlers were primarily English.

By 1845, Germans emmigrating predominately from the State of Hessen began settling in the area, forming a village known as New Bremen. The founding mayor, a citizen from the Budingen area, took office in 1892.

Over the last 100 years, Tinley Park has grown from a village of about 200 to a community of approximately 37,000. Today the village has citizens from throughout the

world, but is still very proud of its German heritage.

To celebrate it's German heritage, Tinley Park developed an ongoing Sister City Program with Budingen.

Founded in the early 8th Century, Budingen grew as a center of agriculture and forestry. It was a recognized town within the Holy Roman Empire in about the year 1000. The Noble House of Ysenburg assumed rule over Buedingen and its forests around 1247, and from that time until the present, the House of Ysenburg and the City of Bedingen have been interconnected.

Today Budingen is the center of commercial, industrial, and agriculture expansion. With over 18,000 citizens, it continues to look toward the future while it safeguards it's medieval past. The city of Budingen is located near

Frankfort, Germany, in the State of Hessen.



Commission sponsors youth events

The Tinley Park Youth Commission has a membership of 12, five of them teen-agers. They are all "very giving people," according to Chairman Brenda Babjak.

A look at the activities the commission plans and coordinates gives new meaning to the phrase "community involvement."

"We are an all-volunteer commission," Babjak said.
"We serve and focus on the teen population of Tinley Park."

This active group helps staff the Teen Drop-In Center open every Wednesday evening at the Park District's Vogt Woods Building at 6527 W. 171 Street. "The center is directed by Brad Gumbert, a professional provided by the Southwest YMCA. He is assisted by volunteers from the Youth Commission," Babjak said.

"The center is basically unstructured. Kids can come and go as they please, although many stay all evening," she said. "Because kids have so much structure in their lives today, I think they like the opportunity to be unstructured

in a safe environment. However, there are rules they must follow."

Because Gumbert is a professional counselor, "kids may use this opportunity to talk to him. He relates to them and is very good with them," Babjak said.

Moving beyond the teen center, the Youth Commission is busy with a number of othe activities, including

• Youth Awards presented every spring when four \$500 scholarships are granted to resident high school seniors. The scholarships must be used at an accredited community or four-year college.

The providing of monetary assistance to local organizations helping youth in non-school programs such as the Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts, 4-H. Applications for this assistance are available from the Youth Commission.

• The planning of Youth Week — this year scheduled for April 14-20. This year's theme is "Say yes to gettig involved in Tinley Park." "In the past we have used the theme 'Say no to drugs,' but this year we wanted to high-

Recycling effort a success

Tinley Park is proud of the success of the recycling progam started July 1, 1990, for all single family dwellings in the Village of Tinley Park.

Over 75 percent of these homes participated in the curbside program for glass, tin, aluminum, newspaper and

plastic gallon jugs.

Not satisfied to rest with this impressive participation, today the village is asking for 100 percent participation during the first quarter of 1991. Families are asked to make recycling a family effort. Individuals are asked to try to buy products packaged in recyclable containers. Children are encouraged to become involved.

The village is taking steps to recycle cans in their municipal building's lunchroom, as well as using recycled pa-

per and envelopes.

Now in the planning stage is a recycling program for condo, townhouse and apartment dwellers. To assist in the compilation of a list of all multi-unit addresses and contact names in Tinley Park, association presidents or landlords are asked to call the Village Hall or Tom Durkin, Village Planner, at 532-7700 to be place their multi-

unit building on the mailing list.

The Reycling Drop-Off Center will be up and running on February 1, 1991. Located at the Public Works Building at the corner of 183rd Street and 80th Avenue, residents are invited to bring their recyclables (tin, aluminum, glass and newspaper) to the collection site. Hours are 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday, and 9 a.m. to 12 noon on Saturday.

Recyclable items include:

 Newspapers, but no magazines, junk mail, telephone books or other paper that is glued or stapled together.

• Glass bottles and jars; remove lids, but labels and rings can be left on. No window glass, light bulbs, mirrors or pyrex glass can be accepted.

• Tin and aluminum cans; labels can be left on. No gas,

paint or aerosol cans will be accepted.

Plastic gallon jugs; remove lids, labels can be left on.
 No two-liter soda bottles can be accepted.



Homeowners who purchased a 95-gallon yard waste toter from Tinley Park Disposal Company can use it for regular household refuse during the months of December through March.

Toters are the property of the homeowner, who is asked to keep a record of the toter's serial number, and to label the toter with the owner's name and address on the inside lid or bottom. To order a toter, call Tinley Park Disposal

Company at 532-8787.

The yard waste picked up this summer by Tinley Park Disposal has not been taken to a landfill, but instead is being composted into rich, organic, humus-like material. When added to gardens and flower beds, it adds nutirents to the soil. Plans are underway to offer this free compost material to Tinley Park residents in the spring.



Tinley population soars to 37,100

Tinley Park ranks as one of the fastest growing communities in the state, as well as the entire Midwest. Just look at the 1990 census figures.

Today the population, as counted by census takers, stands at 37,121. That's a 41.8 percent increase and quite a few thousand people more than had been thought in recent years when the population was estimated to be 33,000 residents.


