St. Luke's University Health Network (SLUHN) is a fully integrated, regional, non-profit Network providing services at ten hospitals and more than 315 outpatient sites in Lehigh, Northampton, Carbon, Schuylkill, Bucks, Montgomery, Berks and Monroe counties in Pennsylvania and Warren and Hunterdon counties in New Jersey.

The 10 SLUHN hospitals: St. Luke's University Hospital – Bethlehem, St. Luke's Allentown Campus, St. Luke's Sacred Heart (Allentown), St. Luke's Anderson Campus (Bethlehem Township), St. Luke's Miners Campus (Coaldale) St. Luke's Monroe Campus (Bartonsville), St. Luke's Quakertown Campus, St. Luke's Palmerton and St. Luke's Gnaden Huetten (Lehigh), all in Pennsylvania, and St. Luke's Warren Campus in Phillipsburg, NJ.

St. Luke's Care Network, our evolving clinically integrated network, comprises 153 St. Luke's-owed practices with 1,156 physicians, nurse practitioners and physician assistants; and 117 independent, community practices with 467 physicians, nurse practitioners and physician assistants.

SLUHN also includes various outpatient testing and service facilities, the region's only medical school campus, largest hospital-based EMS unit in Pennsylvania and various other health care services, including hospice and home health. St. Luke's vision is to achieve top decile performance in clinical quality and safety measures, provide exceptional service and be perceived as EASY to use by everyone accessing our services.

St. Luke's has won the Watson Health (formerly Truven) Top 100 Hospitals Award in the major teaching hospital category for four years in a row, widely regarded as one of the highest honors in the health care industry. The Network has also been routinely honored by a multitude of other organizations, including U.S. News & World Report in its annual listings of America's Best Hospitals and Hospital Top Performance.

Medical Education

An exceptional commitment to the advancement of medical education has been a core St. Luke's focus since its inception in 1872. St. Luke's is one of only 400 members of the prestigious Council of Teaching Hospitals.



In response to the record shortage of physicians facing our nation, St. Luke's and the Lewis Katz School of Medicine partnered to develop the first and only medical school campus in the Lehigh Valley. Students spend their first year at Temple in Philadelphia and their remaining three years at St. Luke's University Hospital – Bethlehem. The inaugural class graduated in 2015. St. Luke's expects to graduate 300 physicians in 10 years and to retain 150 (50 percent) in the Lehigh Valley region.

St. Luke's offers more than 226 intern/resident/fellowship positions in 28 accredited programs. Teaching staff hold faculty appointments at the Lewis Katz School of Medicine, The University of Pennsylvania and Philadelphia College of Osteopathic Medicine.

Additionally, St. Luke's School of Nursing is the nation's longest continuously operating nursing school. The fully accredited, 20-month program currently enrolls 150+ students. St. Luke's is also a major allied health training site. More than 200 students representing 22 colleges, universities and technical institutes annually spend 55,000+ hours at St. Luke's.



Community Health & Preventive Medicine

St. Luke's supports and implements meaningful community outreach that achieves measurable outcomes. The Network maintains medical, specialty care, women's, pediatric and dental clinics at convenient, easily accessible community locations, annually serving 140,000+ clinic patient visits.

The Department of Community Health and Preventive Medicine uses a Network-wide approach developed as a result of the Community Health Needs Assessments. Initiatives were developed using best practices and evidence-based models in collaboration with various community partners.



The department operates four mobile health and mobile dental vans throughout the region. Department initiatives have achieved impressive results, improving dental health, vision care and access to care through various community health centers and maternal child programs with outcomes exceeding state and national benchmarks.

St. Luke's citizenship is also reflected in its annual payment of \$2.8 million in property and school taxes (physician offices, selected outpatient locations, etc). Community benefits represent 12.2 percent, or \$148 million, in costs of our total expense budget. According to the IRS Form 990 for fiscal year 2017, that represents the highest percentage of community benefits among health systems in the Lehigh Valley.
