CONFERENCE LOGISTICS

Check-in will open at noon on March 28th at the DoubleTree and will remain open until 5:00 pm. Pre-con workshops will run simultaneously with registration from 1:00 pm – 5:00 pm.

The conference will commence with a Celebration Reception at 6:15 pm and Pam Warkentin will kick off the conference with a look back at interpreting through the years – What a Difference (session beginning at 6:45.)

Friday and Saturday will offer opportunities from 7:45 am – 9:45 pm. CEU opportunities will run from 8:45 am – 9:00 pm on Friday and from 9:00 am to 9:00 pm on Saturday.

The conference will conclude with a banquet on Saturday, which is included in the registration cost.

Sunday, March 31st is a bonus day with a very special Deaf worship service open to the public, and a second chance to view the “The Book of Job” movie produced by Deaf Missions. (The activities on Sunday do not qualify for CEUs.)

DOUBLETREE BY HILTON OMAHA DOWNTOWN

The conference will be held at the DoubleTree Omaha Downtown. The hotel is about a 10 minute drive from the airport (Eppley Airfield, Omaha) and will offer a complimentary shuttle. Please secure your rooms for the conference at your earliest convenience – rooms are going fast. Reservations must be made prior to March 5th. On March 5th our room block will be opened up to the public and our conference rate will no longer be guaranteed.

ACCOMMODATIONS/ACCESSIBILITY

All featured sessions will be interpreted for equal access for both hearing and Deaf attendees. With the exception of the Saturday night banquet, voicing will be provided quietly in a target area of the room so it is not distracting to those who would like to access the information in ASL.

Elective workshops will be presented in the language of choice of the presenter—most often their heart language. Elective workshops presented in ASL will NOT be voice interpreted. Elective workshops presented in spoken English will be interpreted upon request for Deaf attendees. Attendees will choose workshops according to their skill and comfort level.

The Sunday morning worship service is an ASL immersion experience and will not include voice interpreting.

If you require a low-vision interpreter, this request must be made in advance.

REGINA DANIELS is a full-time Assistant Professor at North Central University (NCU) in Minneapolis, Minnesota. As the lead American Sign Language (ASL) instructor in the Carlstrom Interpreter Training Program, based at NCU—she thrives on developing creative, challenging, yet fun methods of language instruction. She enjoys teaching students about sign language interpreting from a Deaf person's perspective and helping them develop language competency! Prior to coming to North Central, she taught ASL at Columbia College Chicago, where she also began working in the ASL/English Interpretation Department. She holds a Master's Degree in Performance Arts Management and is currently working toward her Ph.D from Northeastern University. Regina is passionate about dance, theater and teaching ASL.

PAM WARKENTIN is a California native, born and raised in the San Francisco Bay Area. She has made her home in the Central Valley since 1982. Pam is a proud child of deaf adults (CODA) and considers herself blessed to have ASL as her first language. She has been interpreting for 45 years, having obtained her first RID certification in 1975. She thoroughly enjoys working in a variety of settings, including but not limited to: legal, medical, platform, educational, mental health and video relay. Over the years, she has had the privilege of interpreting for a number of local and national dignitaries. Pam is a member of Cross City Christian Church in Fresno, California, where she has felt God's call to interpret for the past 15 years. She first began professional interpreting at the age of 16, working during the summers, when her father decided to return to school and complete his degree. She completed her

AA degree in 1977. She later completed a Legal Interpreting program in 2003. She currently holds a CSC and SC:L certification in addition to NAD-V certification. Pam is passionate about continual growth, serving the Deaf and Hard of Hearing community and strives to make a difference in the lives of others! In addition to working as a private practice interpreter, she has supervised numerous student interpreters at California State University, Fresno. She is a former President and Vice President of Central California Registry of Interpreters for the Deaf and continues to serve on the leadership team today.
