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CITY COUNCIL WORK SESSION AGENDA ITEMS:

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1. NRCS UPDATE

22 23 Mayor Ellis stated that as far as the city is aware the NRCS is not affected by the government shut down.

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2. SPIKE 150 DISCUSSION

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Royce Swensen stated that the deadline for adding an event has past and the city has been unable to find if the city would still be able to add an event to celebrate the Golden Spike Anniversary. Discussion ensued on some possible things the city could do- art/coloring contest, 5k run. Nelson Abbott will head this up to see if there is something feasible the city can do in the next week or two.

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3. CONDITIONAL USE DISCUSSION

Royce Swensen the Planning Commission is transitioning away from having to meet twice a month with all of the development. The Planning Commission no longer needs to meet that often and when a meeting is needed for a conditional use such as an accessory apartment it is hard to get a quorum. The trend is conditional use matters being reviewed and approved by administration. Royce recommends moving the duties of conditional use away from Planning Commission and making it administrative. Discussion ensued on how public comment would be handled and with the few conditional uses the city has, this would be appropriate for administration to review and approve.

Mayor Ellis stated that Republic is no longer paying the tipping fees for the city which the city is now

responsible to pay. Mayor Ellis showed on the overhead what the cost to the city would be for cans and recycle

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cans, admin costs, etc. The cost to Republic to pick up cans, which is passed onto the city is - first can \$7.80, the second can is \$6.25 and recycling is \$6.95 but recycle could very well go up to \$7.65. Republic may increase the cost per recycle can if the percentage of recycling drops too far below 50%, but it is unknown at this time if 44 that will happen. The year to year increase is expected to be approximately 3%. Administrative costs are about 45 10% a year. Current prices to the residents are; first can \$12, extra can \$7, and recycle \$8.20. There may also 46 be a fuel surcharge from Republic, if so, that cost will need to be distributed to the residents as a line item on 47 48 the utility bill. The city has signed a contract with Republic from Jan. 1, 2018 through June 30, 2020, 18 months, at which time the city will be looking seriously at or will be prepared do to do its own garbage service. Nelson 49

Abbott asked how much the city will be able to save in the next 18 months. Mayor Ellis stated that would be approximately \$12,000, which would go into an enterprise fund in order to track it better. The city should not have to increase the rates for 5 years as this rate increase will balance out over a 5 year period. Discussion ensued on whether the city should push recycling more, perhaps by having to take a recycle can before a second can or the price of a second can being lower if the resident has a recycle can, mandating recycling etc. <u>Royce Swensen</u> stated to keep in mind that there is more variable possibility on the tonnage for the recycle, it could go to \$100 per ton. <u>Nelson Abbott</u> stated that he thought the cost per can should be \$14.25 for the first can, \$8.25 for second and \$10.00 for recycling. Based on the volatility that may occur on the recycling tonnage, it would be better to run the service based on the numbers and have the ability to add tonnage and fuel surcharges if needed. <u>Mayor Ellis</u> stated that the city will have to watch the recycling very closely, if recycling drops off to much then the price for a can will keep going up and eventually will be so high that recycling will die. <u>Royce Swensen</u> stated that the percentage will go down even at raising the price to \$10.

5. PUBLIC RELATIONS/EMERGENCY PERSON DISCUSSION

Mayor Ellis stated the reality is that the city has a quite a number of items to deal with due to the fire. The staff does not have the time it takes in order to stay on top of everything. The city should be in tighter conversation with the county, the legislature both state and federal, and the cities around Elk Ridge. The city needs to look at how to purchase land, depending on the NRCS if needed and planning and preparations for the projects in the canyon. The city needs someone to manage all of this. It is constant, there is always something to do. David Jean and Royce Swensen have been doing a good job in trying to keep up with it but it is impossible to keep up with this and everything else they have to do. Mayor Ellis proposes creating a part time position in order to take care of these items and the other odd things that come in like finding someone to oversee projects requested by the county-like painting bulls or pigs, etc. Also who is putting together the binder with the documentation to deal with the fire? The city would have to budget for this position. Jared Peterson stated that perhaps code enforcement office could do that as well. Nelson Abbott stated that Woodland Hills is dealing with the same thing and wondered if we could team up with them. Discussion ensued on what the position would entail including PR. Mayor Ellis and Royce Swensen will work up a job description.

CITY COUNCIL WORK SESSION AGENDA ITEMS:

1. FIRE DEPARTMENT/TENDER PUMP UPGRADE DISCUSSION

Mayor Ellis stated that the fire department has 2 pumps on the equipment replacement list: a brush truck pump and a tender truck pump. There is \$9,000 for each pump in replacement funds available, totaling \$18,000. Fire Chief, Seth Waite stated that the fire department has been looking to see how it can better utilize the trucks, duel and triple purposing where possible. Fire Chief Waite proposes that by making a few simple upgrades, the ISO rating will increase. He recommends putting the new tender pump on the brush truck and surplusing the old pump. The new tender truck will get a new pump at \$13,500. There will be some costs incurred, less than \$4,000 which is already in the budget. With the mutual aid the city has in place it is not necessary to get another engine.

The fire department is very close to being able to have ambulance service. They have been able to meet the on call requirements. This will decrease the cost for ambulance service for residents in the city to Mountain View Hospital. Mayor Ellis stated that the city council will vote tonight to have a public hearing to amend the budget for the purchase of the pump.

2. SPIKE 150 DISCUSSION

Nelson Abbott stated that he is working on what the city is able to do and would like to get some input from the residents through social media and to discuss this again on March 12th meeting.

3. SALT SHED ENGINEERING BUDGET AMENDMENT DISCUSSION

<u>Jared Peterson</u> recommends having the engineering and design already set before putting the project out for bid so that the bids are compared as apples to apples. This gives the city better control over the finished project. Discussion ensued on the differences in cost, timeline and effectiveness of accepting bids that are all based on the same design as opposed to different design and the associated costs. <u>Mayor Ellis</u> stated that this will be part of the public hearing motion tonight.

4. HASKELL DRYLAND ANNEXATION RESOLUTION DISCUSSION

<u>Jared Peterson</u> asked if the landowners who didn't sign were opposed to the annexation. <u>Larry Lee</u> stated that those who did not sign do not want to be annexed. The Lee family had a meeting with all the landowners and told them what was planned for the annexation. Many of the residents are older and do not want to deal with an annexation and a change in there water, utilities, property taxes etc. <u>Jared Peterson</u> is concerned about islands within the annexation. <u>Royce Swensen</u> stated that he contacted the county and was told that the county would not oppose the annexation due to islands. However, there is a state code against islands. There is hearsay from residents that they were told the

 state would oppose the annexation due to islands. Mayor Ellis stated that he doesn't want to force anyone to annex in that doesn't want to. Perhaps there can be something put in place that upon change in ownership the property needs to be annexed in. Technically because they have 85% of the property, the whole thing should be annexed, as this was what was discussed with Payson previously. The Mayor asked for confirmation regarding the code that for anyone who is 300 feet from a sewer line has to be hooked in. Nelson Abbott stated that they just have to be 300 feet from an actual sewer line. Jared Peterson stated that his experience is that unless a property is improved upon or subdivided they are grandfathered in with their sewer and or water. Discussion ensued on the amount of properties actually being annexed and the islands. Royce Swensen stated through his conversations with the county and the city planner the annexation will be done through resolution and will only include those who signed the petition. If the state sends it back then the city will have to include all of the properties. Right now we are only matching the petition.

6. INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT BETWEEN CITY AND COUNTY DISCUSSION

Mayor Ellis stated that the city needs to have an Interlocal Agreement with the county so that the county knows that the city will participate in its portion of the costs. The agreement asked for 2 separate things 1) The city will fund 25% of everything that the city does: design costs, acquire land etc. Design costs are supposed to be a zero cost to the city. 2) They are calling a "feature project " a retention pond in Salem which is being called a regional retention pond and the city will agree to pay 6.25 % of the construction cost and 16.67% for the land acquisition in Salem. This is so Salem can move forward with development below 11200 because it is in the flood plain. Mayor Ellis stated his opinion is 1) the city first funds protection of critical assets- well, sewer lines storm drain in the canyon. First and for most protecting the well. 2) to protect the homes, and 3) is to provide any funding out of the city. Elk Ridge City does not have the funds to pay for Salem's retention basin. Discussion ensued on the language of the agreement and where Elk Ridge responsibility ends. The Mayor recommends having the agreement voted down tonight, the Salem Regional Retention Pond is not a higher priority to Elk Ridge than the projects needed within the city.

CITY COUNCIL WORK SESSION AGENDA ITEMS:

1. SHULER LANE POTENTIAL SUBDIVISION

Nelson Abbott read Shay Starks technical review:

The Shuler's have provided a drawing detailing a proposal to divide the 2.4 acre parcel property located at 943 W Goosenest Dr. The staff recommended that they bring the proposed subdivision before city council prior to submitting an official application to clarify what improvements will be required on Shuler Lane.

Shuler Lane has a long complex history it began as the access to Payson Canyon but as development had occurred in the surrounding area the lane has been shortened to a 1200 foot segment serving the surrounding parcel owners and maintenance access for Payson City. Only about 600 feet of the lane is a dedicated right of way of varying width.

A plat recorded by Brad Shuler and recorder in June of 1994 is attached which details the dedicated right of way. As can be seen on the plat the width of the right-of-way on the south end is 44 feet wide and narrows to 29.43 feet wide at the north end. It is important to note that legal descriptions found in deeds on surrounding parcels which have been recorded since the recording of the plat do not match the right-of-way description on the plat. The current deed descriptions for Karl Shuler's parcel and the Moore's parcel adjacent to the east side of the street extend approximately 12 feet into the right-of-way shown on the plat. The issue will need to be resolved with some research by a title company.

The City's residential street standard is 56 feet wide and consists of 34 feet of pavement, four feet of curb, two five foot park strips and 2 four foot sidewalks. 56 feet of width is not practical on Shuler Lane. If a 44 –foot wide right-of-way is eventually improved, it could include: 34 feet of pavement, 4 feet of curb and three-foot park strip on each side for location of utilities, fire hydrants, etc.

Maintaining the ability to have 34 feet of pavement width is important as this allows a large vehicle such as emergency vehicle to pass in between two stopped or parked vehicles. The fire department also benefits from a paved surface on the side where hoses are connected to the truck. While the number of residence currently fronting the street is limited,

development of the large parcels located to the south and west of the Lane at some point in the distant future could potentially increase traffic and therefore, maintaining the 34 feet of pavement width would be critical. The existing pavement is in poor condition. It would make sense to have the Shuler's replace the existing pavement and base course along their frontage at the current width, also making sure the right-of-way width in the 1994 pat is maintained. This will at least improve a portion of the existing pavement and will help to provide the necessary width to maintain a standard pavement width if development occurs to the south and west in the future. END

Mayor Ellis stated that the city has looked at this in the past and something needs to happen with this road. Karl Shuler stated that 34 feet seems unreasonable for this road. This is one of the original roads in Elk Ridge. When Brad Shuler did his subdivision he did widen the road to 16 feet wide. He widened the road where it connects to Goosenest making it 20 feet wide which is the widest it could get and then it widens out to 21 feet. In comparison, Goosenest narrows down to 19 feet where it approaches Payson and is 21 feet across for most of the road. 34 feet for this road is unreasonable and it should be grandfathered in. It has had very little city maintenance and has been a city road for 20 plus years.

Mayor Ellis asked how much of a shoulder there is. Karl Shuler stated there is 12 feet on one end and 11 feet on the other. Mayor Ellis stated that he felt that as long as this isn't a major thoroughfare, he doesn't know why it would need to be 34 feet of pavement. If the road had a couple of 12 foot lanes with a paved shoulder, with somewhere to put the snow, that is all that is needed: 34 feet of paved road is a challenge and not sure if it is necessary. If another road eventually connects to it then that becomes a problem. Right now the only connecting road would be Olympic and with the current owners of the surrounding land that is even questionable. Discussion ensued on a narrower road then 34 feet and a curbing along the road to protect the edges.

The subdivision being discussed tonight would only have to do the road in front of the subdivision. Discussion would need to be done with the other land owners on how to complete the rest of the road

2. YOUTH COUNCIL DISCUSSION

3. BOOSTER STATION BUDGET AMENDMENT DISCUSSION

Mayor Ellis stated that the city has a project estimate for the booster station that will feed water from the Hillside tank to the top tank. David Jean stated that this will complete getting water from the Fairway tank to the top tank. This will tie into the waterline that is being replaced this summer. This is in capital facilities so it can use 40% impact fees. Jared Peterson is concerned about the engineering costs. The estimated numbers put the engineering cost at 12% which is high. General contractors get 12% otherwise the fee should be about 6%. Discussion ensued on the estimated costs.

4. PARKSIDE COVE PHASE 3 FINAL APPROVAL DISCUSSION

Mayor Ellis stated that this is the final phase of Parkside Cove.

Tricia Thomas read Shay Starks technical review:

Technical Review

Phase 3 is the final phase to complete the Parkside Cove Subdivision. Phase 3 includes many of the drainage structures and improvements to both Elk Ridge Drive and Park Drive. The City has been particularly concerned with these two elements of the project as well as with what will be landscaped vs. left in the natural state and the required water to maintain the landscaping.

The storm drainage basins have been designed to overflow into each other if there is an unprecedented storm. Basin sumps have been moved to locations that are accessible for Public Works to utilize their vacuum truck for maintenance.

The City has decided to have the Developer construct the curb and gutter and sidewalk/trail on Elk Ridge Drive and Park Drive but pay the City in lieu of completion for the pavement of these two streets so that the City can rework the intersection to fix grading and drainage issues. Because of this a Development Agreement will be drawn up that will state as one of the terms: The Developer shall pay (Base \$0.98, 3" pavement \$1.35 for a total of \$2.33 per square foot) the estimated cost for the provision and construction of a 3" asphalt patch on 12" of base material for 6,000 square

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feet (6,000 sq.ft. x \$2.33 = \$13,980). Plus, the estimated cost for a 1" overlay with milling to meet existing pavement surface at edge \$1.20 sq.ft.) of Elk Ridge Drive and Park Drive to a width of 17 feet x 694 linear feet or 11,798 square feet minus the 6,000 square feet of payement patch (11,798 - 6,000 = 5,798 sq.ft. x \$1.20 = \$6.957.60) for a total payment of \$20,937.60. By making this payment to the City the Developer shall not be required to make payement improvements to Elk Ridge Drive of Park Street. (The numbers that have been used need to be verified and will be adjusted before finalizing the agreement.)

The City also will include a term in the Development Agreement that states: The Developer has provided 33.28 acre feet of water rights for the provision of household water use and irrigated landscaping in the areas as shown in the attached plan. If any additional irrigated landscaping is created outside the irrigated landscape boundary's noted on the plan the Homeowners Association shall provide the City an accurate plan showing the areas in which additional irrigated landscaping is proposed with a calculation of the additional square feet from which the City shall determine the amount of additional water rights that the Homeowners Association shall provide to or purchase from the City to be allocated to the Parkside Cove Subdivision. Once the City has accepted the additional water rights the Homeowners Associate may proceed with the additional irrigated landscaping. If the landscaping requires that a new meter is installed the Homeowners Association shall pay the necessary connection fees associated with the new water service. The proposed subdivision meets the intent of the general plan and has been designed to meet the requirements of the Elk Ridge Development Code and City Standards. Staff is working with the design engineer to see if the elevations of the sidewalk and curb and gutter at the corner of Park Drive and Elk Ridge Drive can be slightly adjusted to reduce the current cross slope on Park Drive which is just over 5%. Elk Ridge Drive and Park Drive are existing streets and thus the existing grades control what can be achieved. The 5% cross slope is on par with or even better than other existing streets in the community. However, any lessening of the slope that can be achieved benefits someone making the right hand turn from Elk Ridge Drive to Park Drive on a slick road. This may or may not be able to be adjusted. The change cannot come at the price of creating a steeper grade leading into the intersection from Elk Ridge Drive which may negate the benefit. END

Staff recommends that City Council approve Parkside Cove Phase 3 Final Plat with the understanding that staff is looking that the intersection elevations with the Developers Engineer and the elevations may change slightly if there is an overall improvement to the drivability of the intersection.

1. NRCS UPDATE

Mayor Ellis stated that the city did not get funded. The NRCS has had to alter the application and is still working on getting funding for the county's mitigation efforts. The application started at 26 million dollars and was lowered to 20 million dollars. The NRCS said that the Democrats are holding up funding because the aid package to Puerto Rico has stalled. The NRCS has separated the projects into 2 groups - urgent needs which was 8 million dollars and non-urgent needs which is 12 million dollars. They have or are submitting the 8 million dollar list and are hoping it is approved. The retention basin is not on the urgent list. It is part of the 12 million dollar list and has been added to an application to another program through a farm funding bill, which will take a longer time period to process. Utah County has filed a Catastrophic Public Nuisance suit with the federal government. This is a long shot and not quite sure if it has ever been done. This suit states that the federal government created a public nuisance and it needs to mitigate. This has been submitted to the governor and has to be reviewed by the attorney general and everyone needs to approve it. In the meantime the city can start spending money but it will not count towards the match; it is a catch 22. Right now there will not be a retention basin in this round. The basins in Woodland Hills and Payson were not covered either. Ditches are in the plans at this point. Mayor Ellis is confident is the County and the local NRCS who are really working hard on the city's behalf. Commissioner Lee is also very engaged as well. But there is no way to know how long any funding will take. Commissioner Lee can give more thorough answers if needed.

2. BYU LAW UPDATE -Postposed

3. SHULER SUBDIVISION DISCUSSION

Karl Shuler stated that the last time he and the Johnson met with the city council there was a discussion on having to put in rolled curb. <u>Jared Peterson</u> stated that it could be flat curbing, which is 16\$ liner foot, to keep the road from falling off at the edges. <u>Karl Shuler</u> stated the residents along Shuler Lane do not think it is necessary to rebuild the road and they do not want to put curb and gutter in either. The whole road does not need to be totally redone. The bid to redo the road was \$12,000 for 270 feet for the lower part of the road and \$12,000 for the upper part of the road with the 2 inch overlay. That bid was from Eccles and they may give the city a better rate. Karl and the residents propose to just leave the road as it is. Karl stated that there was a road vacation that was given back to the residents and he isn't sure if the city planner had this information. Shay also wanted to add extra width to the road for on street parking, the residents do not need room on the street for parking. Goosenest and Loafer Canyon doesn't allow for on street parking. <u>Jared Peterson stated that he see this as 3 main things 1) the width</u>

of the road 2) the lot improvement in front of the Johnson property and 3) the issue with rebuilding the road. The council stated previously they were ok with the narrower road and does not think the city should put any money towards redoing the road until it can be done correctly. Mayor Ellis stated that Elk Ridge has not had a chance to talk to Payson and the use/abuse the road takes from Payson City using it. David Jean stated that perhaps the Johnson could pay in lieu of for when the city redoes the road. Mayor Ellis stated that the council needs Shays memo and to talk to Payson and then this will be ready to go to the Planning Commission with all the information and figures.

4. SALT SHED ARCHITECTURAL CONSTRUCTION AGREEMENT DISCUSSION

Mayor Ellis stated that the salt shed cost for the architectural plans is \$24,000 total cost. There is room in the plans to consolidate equipment. There were no issues or concerns.

5. UTAH COUNTY PARK GRANT DISCUSSION

<u>David Jean</u> stated this is for the north park-Bear Hollow. Once city purchases everything it will be reimbursed for up to \$1875. If there are shipping charges then they will not be able to get the bucket swings. This is not in the capital facility plan and cannot use impact fees. There were no other questions.

OFF AGENDA ITEM

Mayor Ellis stated that he had spoken with the gentleman who had complained that the natural area (on the north side of the road across from park) is supposed to be a maintained park with sprinklers and grass. The Mayor stated that he told him that he thought it was irresponsible for the city to be spending more funds watering grass and he told the gentleman no. This was always supposed to be a natural area but the city can entertain ideas. If the gentleman wanted to form a committee and come up with another idea that would help and it will go in the newsletter as well (which it did).

1. RANKED CHOICE VOTING AND ELECTION COSTS PRESENTATION BY LISA ALLSUP AND JOSH DANIEL UTAH COUNTY ELECTIONS DISCUSSION AND DECISION

Josh Daniel's the Chief Deputy Clerk Auditor for Utah County covers the elections department and Lis Allsup the elections coordinator. Mark Roberts, who is the representative for Elk Ridge area, had a bill pass that gives the cities the option to use Ranked Choice Voting. With ranked choice voting there is no need for a primary. The voters rank candidates by preference on their ballots. If a candidate wins a majority of firstpreference votes, he or she is declared the winner. Candidates are all listed on the ballot and rank as 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th. and so on. Nelson Abbott asked if a candidate doesn't' get 50% of the vote is the lowest ranked candidate removed and the numbers retabulated? Josh Daniel's confirmed this is process. This process is automated through software which eliminates the need to keep taking out the lowest ranked candidate to find the candidate with the majority. Tricia Thomas asked if a candidate only wants to vote for one can they? Josh Daniel's stated that you can vote for one candidate. Tricia Thomas asked how ranked choice voting majority is any different than a traditional vote, she needs more mathematical evidence that there is really a difference. Paul Crook is concerned about the results of the candidate with the majority of the 1st place ranking actually winning. Discussion ensued on how rank choice voting is tabulated against the traditional primary and general election results, ballots being confusing, costs and if it is really needed in Elk Ridge, as well as the differences in mail in voting and the traditional vote in person.

2. SESD PRESENTATION

Ryan Bagley Electric Utility Planner and Brook Christensen, Superintendent of SESD presented a rough outline of SESD's fiber optic plan. Ryan Bagley stated that SESD has been looking at doing fiber optics using the infrastructure that is already in the city. With updated water meters, readings could be read using fiber optics decreasing read times. SESD is still gathering information into fiber optics and it will be a couple weeks before SESD has all the information they need in possibly going forward with fiber optics. Jared Peterson asked if SESD could work up a proposal, for the city and how it would impact Elk Ridge, both for city utility and private use. Ryan stated that he didn't know how many meters would need to be updated which would add to the city's cost. It would depend also on how many fibers the city wanted/needed. SESD will be replacing conduit in the upper part of Elk Ridge so the fiber could be placed at that time. Fiber to every house would be needed in order to read the meters through fiber optics. The fiber could be leased to a third party to offer meter read services. Mayor Ellis asked what the time frame would be for SESD in getting everything up and running and would the council want it to be serviced by an outside party. Ryan stated that it could be less than a year for the lower part of the city and a little longer for the upper part due to conduit needing to be updated and or placed. Ryan did not have any costs ready to quote. Jared Peterson asked if Ryan could get back to the city in a month with a proposal. David Jean can let Ryan know what kind of meters the city has in order to draft a relative proposal. Ryan stated he could come back in a month. Ryan stated that there are side benefits to updating the meters in forecasting peak loads, leaks, turning on and off meters onsite. Mayor Ellis asked where the servers would be and who would own and maintain them. Ryan stated that because of federal regulations they have to adhere to for SCADA those servers have to be at SESD otherwise the servers could be in Elk Ridge or at SESD. There would have to be an administrator at SESD or the data could be pushed to Elk Ridge. Mayor Ellis is very concerned with the city being on the hook for a bond or payment and having a competitor come in such as SESD and cut the rate and lose customers. Ryan stated that it is unknown when SESD would be able to proceed, they are still researching and if SESD is delayed SESD will let the city know so the city could go elsewhere for internet. Tricia Thomas stated that she does not think the internet is a necessity and that the city does not need to put in internet and be on the hook for it financially.

Kim Mc Kinley introduced the entire team and gave a recap of the history of Utopia. The financial obligations to install Utopia in Elk Ridge requires a 44% take rate which is 492 subscribers as of toda. This 492 does not change. Then the bond debt is covered which is a 2 million dollar bond backed by franchise fees or sales tax revenue from the city. There is a yearly debt obligation of \$177,000 but Elk Ridge has 2 years to hit the 44% take rate. That is get and stay at 44% or above. Cost per subscriber is placed at \$65.00: \$30 to cover the infrastructure to pay the bond (a portion of which goes to Utopia to cover operations), \$35 goes to the retail provider. The amount will also vary depending on what provider and package a subscriber choses. If the 44% is not met then the city has a monthly fiduciary obligation. There is a promissory note/contract that the city and Utopia enter into. At any time the % is less than 44% then the city makes payments for the difference to Utopia. The promissory note is drafted at the time the city actually starts paying a monthly obligation. Tricia Thomas asked if Elk Ridge goes above the 44% do those funds go towards the loan? Kim stated that it does not. Jim Chase asked if subscribers have other fees when they originally sign up? Kim stated that no, the fee is \$65.00 any fees are covered in the price and they ask for a 1 year commitment. Nelson Abbott asked if paying the \$1500, or whatever amount it is per subscriber, up front would lower the amount of the bond? Aaron Leach COO stated that most people want to do the monthly fee and not have a larger payout at the beginning. It might relieve a portion of the bond but they could not bond for just the \$30 a month per subscriber. Kim stated that only about 8% of the subscriber choose to pay up front. Nelson Abbott is concerned about not having someone on the board to protect the city's interest if the city signed an agreement for 27 years. Kim stated that buildout is 1 year starting from when the contract is signed. Utopia helps with marketing, the area will know Utopia is here. Utopia will pre-sign subscribers. Mayor Ellis thanked everyone from Utopia for coming and bringing the council back up to speed again.

Ryan Bagley of SESD presented SESD's plan for fiber optics in Elk Ridge using the infrastructure that is already in except for the older part of the city which will be updated with new conduit. SESD is partnering with CentraCom- Broadband, Calix- equipment, cloud services, Horrocks Engineers, Fibertel- installation of fiber optics and ICPE-SCADA and metering. The project will be separated into phases and completed in 1 year; 1-6 months in the newer part of Elk Ridge, and the older area 6-12 months due to laying new conduit. Cost to the residents is dependent on the rate chosen by the resident and will range from \$45 for 25 mbps up to \$95 for 1 gig. An estimated installation fee per household is \$150-\$200, any nonstandard installations could run a little more. There are no data caps or bandwidth metering. This will be run by private enterprise and not by Elk Ridge.

2. NATHANIEL MORRELL PRESENTATION

Nathaniel Morrell stated he is a government teacher in Salem Hills High School and he was challenged by his students to become more involved in the city. Through brainstorming, he and his students came up with 3 areas that could help the community and bring it together. The first idea is a Concert in the park. For instance: a long time resident, Paul Jones' band would play and they would invite food trucks. Paul Jones would charge a fee and there would be an admission price. Nathaniel is willing to find a sponsor for the fee and talk to food trucks. This may not even happen until next year. Mayor Ellis stated bringing the community together is a high priority and is worth spending some money on. Tricia Thomas stated that she wants to do this but there are always extra expenses that the city will need to think about and food trucks have not done very well here. Nelson Abbott stated he likes the idea as well.

The second idea is a scholarship fund for graduating seniors from Elk Ridge only. This would be a donation scholarship from local residents. A criteria would have to be in place. The scholarship would be for those who don't get a typical scholarship and would go directly to the school for books etc. Nathaniel could help set up the criteria and run the scholarship committee. Nathaniel would like to include trade schools. Nelson Abbott suggested making the Concert in the Park a fund raiser for the scholarship.

The third item is a cemetery in Elk Ridge through a land donation to the city. Would the residents of Elk Ridge accept a \$2 a month tax on their property tax to maintain a cemetery? Nathaniel has spoken with many residents of Elk Ridge and all the responses were every favorable for a cemetery and the small monthly fee to maintain one. Nelson Abbott stated that the city could put it on a ballot as an initiative. Jared Peterson

stated that the city would need to run some real numbers on what it would take to maintain a cemetery. 1. GOLF CART PRESENTATION BY OFFICER DOYL

Officer Doyl stated that there is no state code regarding golf carts on city roads. There have been a few bills regarding golf carts but they have never gone anywhere. Legally, according to his stand point according to state law they are not allowed because they do not meet the proper safety requirements for registrations lights, mirrors, etc. He has done research in other communities and could not find anything. Golfing communities, such as St. George, allow it to get mail or go to the golf course but on the flip side of that they also say they are not allowed. His Sergeant said Goshen has a code allowing people to drive off road vehicles on the road in order to get to to trails; if juveniles are riding on the road there is a minimal fine. The problem is juveniles driving other juveniles on city streets. He stopped 2 teens with their cellos loaded in the cart going to a cello lesson, then there are the golfers and those that use it as a means to get to church. He recommends a city ordinance to deal with safety and age issues but that would need to be decided by the city council. Tricia Thomas stated that the vounger kids should not be allowed on the street. Nelson Abbott stated that they blow through stop signs and yield signs and if a licensed driver did that they would be ticketed. The carts don't have brake lights so you can't tell when they are going to stop, you just can't tell what they are going to do. Mayor Ellis stated on the other hand he likes the friendly nature of being able to drive it down to the golf course or church. Nelson Abbott stated that if the council does do something with the code the council should allow for that, Jared Peterson asked for confirmation that it is against state law for a golf cart to operate on the street. Deputy Doyl stated since the carts do not have the proper safety equipment they are illegal to be on the road. Tricia Thomas asked why couldn't the city have the same requirements for golf carts as four wheelers. Nelson Abbott recommends a documented warning to the parents if a juvenile is pulled over. Mayor Ellis asked the council to think about this, he thinks the city needs to manage this situation because it is getting out of hand and is dangerous for multiple parties. This will go on the agenda in 2 weeks for further discussion.

2. DRYLAND ANNEXATION AND ANNEXATION AGREEMENT REVIEW DISCUSSION

Royce Swensen stated that the city planner drafted an agreement which has some questions in it in red for discussion. Royce spoke with the county attorney and city attorney and both attorneys strongly recommend adding the 3 properties that are not included, into the annexation. Mayor Ellis stated that he has given this a great deal of thought and does not think it is wise to go against the state statute, county recommendation and the attorney recommendation to not annexed these properties and recommends to make them part of the annexation. He thinks the property owners should keep the

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03 04 rights they have now with septic tanks and wells until the time the property use changes. Jared Peterson stated that 99% of the landowners concerns are addressed in the agreement. Lee Haskell stated that he does not, at this time, plan on proceeding with the Memory Care Facility but that the conditional use is permitted in residential area. Mayor Ellis stated that at such time the landowners are forced to hook up to the city to the sewer due to EPA or an outside source then the landowners the impact fees will apply. The city will not force them to hook up to utilities. Jared Peterson stated that the EPA could make them hook up to the sewer even being in the county. Mayor Ellis stated that this agreement is a big picture of what the property is going to be and will be fined tuned as far as where everything actually is when the development is submitted. There is an area for commercial but if you do not want to add the commercial when the time comes then you don't have to zone it as commercial. Mayor Ellis asked Lee to look closely at the agreement and let the office know of any concerns or changes.

Royce Swensen stated that the city office has been asked a few times if AIRBNB's are permitted in the city. The code has hotel in it but not Airbnb. Tricia Thomas will work on something for the council for some time in September or Oct.

Jared Peterson drafted an ordinance and an application that requires the applicant to have a proper business license, insurance and sign a "hold harmless to the city" clause. The application asks for details of the event, and added a limitation ordinance and requirement of a bond and setting perhaps a 30 day time period to review it prior to the event date. Discussion ensued on the approval process and parameters.

5. CODE AMENDMENT 10-4-2A-3 SPECIFIC NUISANCES: NOXIOUS WEEDS. VEGETATION DISCUSSION

Jim Chase stated that he added the definition of what a structure is so that a fence is considered a structure. This covers vacant lots, not residential homes which are covered under a different code. Jared Peterson stated that he thought the fire chief should be added giving him authority through code enforcement to deem a field of noxious weeds a fire hazard. David Jean stated that the city will have a hard time staying in compliance.

Nathaniel Morrel passed out questions for the survey, cost estimates for a banner and a rate schedule and costs to maintain a cemetery from another local cemetery. Mayor Ellis would like to see a more detail list on the maintenance. Tricia Thomas would like to get another estimate for the banner and feels an estimate over \$500 is extreme. Tricia Thomas stated that her father-in-law said that it takes about \$60,000 annually to maintain the cemetery where he works, which is in a city about the size of Elk Ridge.

Discussion ensued on the questions for the survey. Tricia will take care of the banner. Mayor will work with Nathan on the survey questions.

2. CODE AMENDMENT 10-12-26: LANDSCAPING REQUIREMENTS; RESIDENTIAL AND COMMERCIAL LANDSCAPE DISCUSSION

Discussion ensued on the timeline of having landscaping in for new homes as well as existing homes and do park strip trees have to be put in by those whose building permit was issued under the current code. Royce Swensen asked for clarification that no one is required to put in trees, even if they got a permit under the old code. Nelson Abbott and Jared Peterson both confirmed that is correct. Discussion ensued on weeds in the front yard-weeds just have to be maintained it is not the intent that weeds are not allowed in the yard.

3. SHULER ROAD DISCUSSION

Mayor Ellis stated that this pertains to the ribbon along the edge of the road and rebuilding 220 feet. The city is planning on fixing the road before the winter. The ribbon may go on in the spring. The road will be 22 feet and the ribbon will be 18 inches on each side and the easement is about 4 feet. Discussion ensued on who will pay for the ribbon; landowners or the city.

APPLICATION FOR PARTICIPATION IN THE NATIONAL FLOOD INSURANCE PROGRAM DISCUSSION

Royce Swensen stated that this is the document that Nelson Abbott referred to last meeting. Royce called Cathy Holder, Flood Plan Manager for the Utah Division of Emergency Management and she stated that there is nothing that the city needs to do. The document refers to an annual report but it is no longer required. There is no expiration date on the document.

5. DRYLAND ANNEXATION AGREEMENT

Council reviewed the agreement with the changes discussed last council meeting. There were no further changes needed to be made.

6. ACCESSORY APARTMENT PARKING DISCUSSION

Royce Swensen stated that the off street parking for accessory apartments needs interpretation. The interpretation for the last few years is that the primary home needs 2 off street parking and the accessory apartment needs 3 off street parking places. Recently the question has been asked if this is the correct interpretation. Discussion ensued on how many offstreet parking spaces and where the parking should be. Nelson Abbott stated the intent was to make sure the tenant had dedicated off street parking but 3 off street parking places is too much. Mayor Ellis and Royce Swensen will work on restructuring the code for off street parking for accessory apartments.

7. C&L SUBDIVISION WATERLINE DISCUSSION

David Jean stated that he would like the pipeline increased to 12 inch pipe when C&L Subdivision goes in. The upgrade is in the Capital Facilities as part of the dedicated pump line that carries water from the Skyhawk and Cloward Wells to the Fairway Tank. Royce Swensen stated the city could pay for the difference in cost and that an amendment to the budget will be needed in order to do this. Per Shays memo: "As part of the C&L subdivision the Developer needs to run 600 feet of 8" water line in Elk Ridge Drive to feed the proposed lots fronting the east side of the street. This line can be upsized to 12-inch diameter and serve as part of the distribution line. As this is only in the Preliminary Stage it has not been fully engineered yet and costs have not been derived. However, based upon the upsizing costs that the City paid for the section of line running through Galdstan View Estates it looks like the 600-foot section might be roughly \$10,000 - \$12,000. This cost does not take into account increases in cost since the Gladstan project was constructed and therefore may come in a little higher but considering that if the City were to install an new 600 foot long 12" diameter line paralleling the 8" water line that will be installed by the C&L subdivision it very likely would cost around \$60,000 as the City has to bid the project out and the project would involve new trenches and road patches.

If the section of water line fronting C&L Estates is completed it would leave the City with approximately 750 feet of 12-inch line to complete the distribution line between Olympic Lane and the Gladstan View Subdivision. There is also roughly a dozen water services that would need to be removed from the pump line and tied to distribution lines as well as a few fire hydrants. It may be possible to work with the Developer to complete this remaining portion of the project if the City so desires. As this is not engineered any estimate is extremely rough as there could be some other tieins or other obstacles that need to be addressed. A rough estimate is somewhere around \$75,000 for the 750 feet of line."

The changes that were thought to be 20 years down the road are only 2 to 3 years away. The city will need to eventually add another water source whether it is a well or secondary water. Based on the study done in 2014-2015, for ultimate build out, the city would have to have, on a peak day capacity, about 3,800 gallons a minute. Right now the city is at about 3,000 gallons per minute. As the city grows the redundancy the city has now with the new well will start to erode. It has always been anticipated that there would be a 4th well or another source of water that could be used, which could be the Central Utah Project water. The city does not need it yet but it will eventually. There is imported surface water, the ULS water, which has advantages: it doesn't impact the basin, it gives the city some redundancy, but would be very expensive. If the city does this alone is the lowest upfront cost but the annual operational costs would be higher. There are tradeoffs of digging a well vs ULS water. Craig recommends staying involved with any discussions so when the time comes the council can make the best decision. Discussion

1. STORM DRAIN DAVID JEAN DISCUSSION

<u>David Jean</u> stated that he and Royce Swensen met with the storm water group in Salt Lake regarding the Utah Pollution Discharge and Illumination System Storm Water Program. The city has to comply with the new regulations. The city does have a plan that was drafted by Aqua which the city submitted in 2015. The city does have some infrastructure issues that will need to be dealt with. This is going to be very involved and the city will need to increase man power, 1 to 2 people to just deal with storm drain/storm water. There are large fines involved with not complying. He was told the city should expect an audit and the city needs to put the plan into action now. Discussion ensued on the budget and when the city needs to hire additional staff and the possibility of having to increase storm drain fees.

2. AIRBNB PROPOSED ORDINANCE AMENDMENT DISCUSSION

<u>Tricia Thomas</u> copied off some information that other cities have done, Utah passed a law that a city cannot ban Airbnb. Discussion ensued on how involved the code needs to be, if any. Tricia Thomas will draft a basic code with minimal requirements.

3. NONCONFORMING LOTS DISCUSSION

Council reviewed the memos from Shay Stark, City Planner. Council has discussed this topic several times. 6:00 PM WORK SESSION ITEMS:

1. PEDIATRIC RESOLUTION DISCUSSION

Mayor Ellis stated that during the South County Mayor meeting a pediatric surgeon and doctor spoke with the mayors about the nearest pediatric trauma being Primary's Children which is located in Salt Lake. They are pushing for Timpanogos Hospital to be a Pediatric Trauma Center and have been working on it for a long time. There are 300 plus requirements which one of the requirements is to have local support. This resolution is to help with this requirement. There is no cost to the city and huge benefit to the county.

2. SMART ANNEXATION RESOLUTION DISCUSSION

Mayor Ellis stated this resolution states that the city is willing to Annex the Smart Property.

3. CITY FEE SCHEDULE, BUILDING PERMIT FEE DISCUSSION

Royce Swensen stated there are 2 items. The International Code Council sets the square foot construction costs every 6 months. It has been 4 years since the city has updated this cost. This change is so that the city can make the necessary adjustments when the new costs are posted and not have to have a resolution every 6 months. This cost is based on the percentage of the valuation of the build. Discussion ensued on inspection fee calculations. The second item is the grama request fee changed to an increase of \$25 an hour, an hour minimum. There would be 10 minutes complimentary and if it takes longer than that then it would go to the hourly rate. Anything over an hour would be prorated.

4. CITY MISDEMEANOR VIOLATION FEE SCHEDULE DISCUSSION

Royce Swensen stated that these are the fees set forth in the city code for misdemeanor violations. Approving the violation fee schedule is one of the steps the city needs to take in order for law enforcement to cite for these violations instead of code enforcement. Officer Doyle stated the county will collect the fees and the city receives a percentage, which is still being determined. Most cities the size of Elk Ridge aren't set up to have law enforcement site for violations so this is breaking ground.

5. BUDGET AMENDMENT, CANYON VIEW DR AND OCAMPO LANE SEWER IMPROVEMENTS PROJECT DISCUSSION

<u>David Jean</u> showed on the overhead the footage taken with the sewer cam from Cortez Dr. showing the walls and joints of the concrete pipe that are being eaten away from H2S gas. It gets worse further down the pipeline which shows a large root ball and a hole in the pipe which will only get worse. He continued to show video of different parts of the pipeline which is all crumbling. The pipe will start at Canyon View and not go through residential yards. <u>Mayor Ellis</u> stated that the rough bid from Aqua was \$208,000. There needs to be a budget amendment in order to do this. The funds would come out of the sewer fund which has the funds available.

6. MODERATE INCOME HOUSING DISCUSSION 53 Royce Swensen stated that Moderate Income Housing is a big discussion statewide. The city met with 54 Robert Allen, the Senior Planner, TIP & Land Use at of MAG (Mountainland Association of 55 Governments) to help us understand what is required of the city and the timelines. The city does not have an immediate deadline but when the city population reaches 5,000 that is when a hard deadline 57 happens to have a plan in place. 7. SETBACKS DISCUSSION

Nelson Abbott stated that he researched setbacks and cantilevers and every city is just like the Elk Ridge code except for the one he has for the council. This handout has a formula for figuring out set backs on irregular lots. Cantilevers or part of the house should be treated the same, the only way to build a cantilever to the property line would require a great deal of steel and great expense. This gives residence a little more flexibility with additions. Jim Chase stated that he is concerned about roof lines such as a roof over a deck that goes to the property line. Jared Peterson stated that years ago building code said the "drip line of roof" was how the roof line was measured. Nelson Abbott stated that this handout is a very rough draft and thinks the Planning Commission needs to work on the setbacks. Discussion ensued on setbacks and the need to change the entire code or and just clarifying our current code and how setbacks affect nonconforming lots, and minimum square feet of home, privacy and safety.

8. 2ND AMENDMENT SANCTUARY CITY DISCUSSION

Nelson Abbott stated that this is a unique opportunity to make a statement by adopting a resolution, as a city, to tell the state that the city supports, believes in and upholds the 2nd, 4th 9th, 10th and 14th amendment of the constitution as well as a number of decisions by the Supreme Court that citizens have the right to bear arms. There are provisions in the resolution that allows law enforcement to enforce laws that are already on the law books. Nelson will continue to draft the resolution for an upcoming council meeting.

Off Agenda Item

<u>Jared Peterson</u> stated that neighboring cities along with the DNR are making steps, through controlled hunts, to lower the population to a healthier number of deer. This is done by professional, certified hunters, not citizens, to lower the numbers. The deer are at pre-fire numbers which is 10-12% times the number of deer before predevelopment of Elk Ridge. There are probably more than that now because of the fire. The herds are weak due to over population and diet, which leads to disease. It is a safety issue for the residents and the deer. Jared will look into this further.
