I add a few thoughts of my own. The other elders may or may not agree with what I have to say here or with the wisdom of sharing it at this point, so please direct any questions or criticisms about what I say next specifically to me.

About ten years after Paul and Barnabus' disagreement that led to them going separate directions on God's Mission, Paul wrote a letter to the Phillipians. In Chapter 4, he addresses two women in the church who are having some kind of serious dispute. He recognizes how easy it is for the evil one, the adversary, the accuser to gain a foothold in our hearts and minds in situations like this, perhaps from his own personal experience with Barnabus and Mark. In that context, Paul writes the following in Phillipians 4:

Phil. 4:4 Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, rejoice!

(It's a command. Paul repeats it a second time to remind us that we can always expect the Lord to act to bring about LIFE no matter how grim the circumstances might appear.)

Phil. 4:5 Let your gentle *spirit* be known to all men. The Lord is near.

(We don't have to fix the other person or the situation; the Lord is present and is at work.)

Phil. 4:6 Be anxious for nothing, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God.

(Don't be anxious. Don't be distracted by fearful thoughts. God knows that we have needs of all kinds. We can ask God regarding both the general things and the specific things, but Paul adds, don't forget the thanksgiving!)

Phil. 4:7 And the peace of God, which surpasses all comprehension, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus.

(That's what we need most. We need for our hearts and minds to be guarded by the peace of God. Guarded from what? Guarded from attacks by the accuser. So, what about when we're tempted to slander the other person (or even God Himself) in our hearts and minds?)

Phil. 4:8 Finally, brethren, whatever is true [about the other person], whatever is honorable [about the other person], whatever is right [about the other person], whatever is pure [about the other person], whatever is lovely [about the other person], whatever is of good repute [about the other person], if there is any excellence and if anything worthy of praise [about the other person], dwell on these things.

Phil. 4:9 The things you have learned and received and heard and seen in me, practice these things, and the God of peace will be with you.

(Paul has had experience in this and has learned from it and is passing that on to us. If we listen to Paul's teaching here and follow it, not only will the peace of God guard our hearts and minds but the God of peace Himself will be with us.)
