Issues of leadership as related to value-based decision making, character, and personal integrity.

Course Purpose

Character means different things to different people. Character is also one of the two main components of a leader with the other being competence. The purpose of this course, Leadership and Character (L&C) is to study leadership character and its importance to the way we lead as well as examine the ways we can apply leadership skills and abilities (the competence side of leadership). We will discuss personal values, decision making, and virtues as well as learn how we can lead with character. Character is built overtime and this course stimulates growth through focused learning, exploration and reflection.

Course Description and Concept

L&C is a highly interactive course blending theory and practice. The course includes a combination of group work, lectures, reading and practical exercises. Character is different for every leader. These differences will make lively class discussions. Leadership is a hands-on activity and so is this class. Students are expected to read prior to class and be prepared to discuss the reading in class. Students will be expected to share their own impression of the reading. This will lead to self-discovery and help students establish their personal values and character they will draw upon as leaders. That is a long way of saying that the class will involve a lot of discussion and very little lecture. Students will learn from each other through guided discussion.

The second half of the course will focus on how to be an exemplary leader. We will read *The Student Leadership Challenge* (or *The Leadership Challenge*) and use its lessons to learn how to apply what we learned in the first half of the course.

Guest speakers will present periodically to reinforce key areas of character and leadership. There personal stories will help students relate to the material covered through the course.

Students are assigned to a small group to conduct two group assignments. The first assignment is a presentation covering the lessons learned from watching the movie *Sully*. The second group assignment requires teams to present a profile of a leader and discuss character or ethical issues they faced resulting in failure or success.

Course Objectives

This course is focused on developing students' understanding of character and its importance to leadership. More specifically, students will:

- 1) Develop a more comprehensive understanding of leadership character
- 2) Explore personal values and further develop one's own set of personal values
- 3) Explore real and hypothetical leaders and situations involving character
- 4) Read The Leadership Challenge and gain understanding of exemplary leadership
- 5) Develop habits of personal reflection and self-discovery
- 6) Have fun and engage in lively class discussions

Course Interaction

It is worth emphasizing that L&C is highly interactive. Students will work closely together as teams and as a class. Leadership is a hands-on-activity, please be prepared to participate and make the most of this opportunity. Students are expected to contribute to class discussion and interact with guest speakers.

Classroom Environment and Policies

The classroom environment is focused on collaboration and shared learning. Students are encouraged to actively participate in class discussions. A significant amount of time will be spent on group discussions. These discussions are only beneficial if you participate in them. The classroom is a safe environment and students should refrain from judging other students. The individual differences that we all have create diversity of thought. The classroom needs to remain a safe place that allows students to find their voice and explore their thoughts.

Course Assignments

Journal Entries - Entries are submitted on Sundays, no later than midnight. One point is deducted for each day that the entry is late. There are 15 journal entries. Each entry is worth 10 points each. Entries are submitted in the appropriate folder on Canvas. Each journal entry is different and encourages students to reflect on topics from the week, current events (related to leadership) or other leadership themes. Students are also given the opportunity to write about a topic they have on their mind.

Group Presentations – Students are assigned to groups. Each group conducts two group assignments. Each assignment is worth 200 points. More information on these assignments will be posted to Canvas.

The first assignment is to watch the movie *Sully* and present to the class where there assigned virtue is displayed or not displayed but should have been in the movie. Each team will be assigned a virtue (or virtues) from our textbook.

The second assignment is a presentation on a leadership profile. Groups will choose a leader and present a profile of the leader. They will also present a

Reflection Paper – Students are required to write a self-reflection paper at the end of the semester. This paper is in lieu of a final exam. Students utilize the lessons learned throughout the course to write a reflection paper on what they have learned and how they can apply it. More information will be provided during the course.

Class Participation – Students are awarded up to 250 points for class participation. Points are assessed based on the student's attendance, timeliness, participation and contribution. Peer and self-evaluations will also contribute a student's class participation grade. Class participation is focused on contribution to the class. This includes but is not limited to class discussions, attendance, and group projects.
