Course Description

AMIS 3200 is the first course in a three-semester sequence in financial reporting. The other two are AMIS 3201 and 4200 and have this course as a prerequisite. Collectively, the three courses represent the core financial accounting component of the undergraduate accounting curriculum. Most enrolled students take the course as accounting majors, and others have elected to take this course to fulfill other requirements.

This course is intended to provide students with an understanding of the theory and practice of financial reporting. The curriculum focuses on the measurement and presentation of financial information in accordance with United States generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP). This course covers a series of topics, including: the FASB conceptual framework, valuation and financial reporting of cash, receivables, inventory, property plant and equipment, intangibles, and liabilities, and revenue recognition. In addition, students will complete a group project that requires them to understand the assigned financial statements and summarize the purpose and content of the filings to other students in the class.

<u>Exams</u>

There will be a 100-point midterm exam worth 20% of the course grade and a 100-point final exam worth 25% of the course grade. The midterm is scheduled for **Wednesday**, **June 1**, **2022** and will be given in class starting at the **regular class time**. The final exam date and time will be announced in class, as well as on Canvas.

Quizzes

Quizzes will be administered in class throughout the semester. These quizzes will be based on previously covered material and are designed to help students practice for questions on the exams. Students may use the textbook, course materials, and/or their notes when taking quizzes. However, students may not work with other students during quizzes.

Group Project

There will be one group project due on June 20, 2022. Students shall organize themselves in groups of either five or six members and email the instructor about their group preferences by the second class (May 16). Students who do not have a group, or groups with fewer individuals may be re-assigned by the instructor. Each group will conduct a short, 10-minute presentation in-class on June 20 about their findings. For more information on the group project, please refer to the assignment document on Canvas.

Participation

I expect all students to attend my class on-time and participate in in-class discussions. By the second week of class, please choose a seat for the entire term. I will distribute notecards at the beginning of the term so students can write their full name on the card. Students will bring their notecards to all classes.

Homework

In addition to the practice problems in class, homework problems will be posted to the course Canvas website. Each assignment's due date will be delineated on the site.

Grade Appeals Policy
