

Course Description:

This course is a required course for all accounting majors. It focuses on advanced topics in financial reporting including business combinations, consolidations, and foreign transactions. The emphasis is on consolidating the financial statements of parent and subsidiary firms. Additionally, the course will cover how to account for and manage foreign currency situations.

Course Learning Outcomes:

Upon successful completion of this course, the student will be able to:

- Prepare consolidated financial statements for acquisition-type business combinations involving various intercompany transactions.
- More effectively convey complex information clearly
- Attain a level of competence with the presented material sufficient to perform well on applicable portions of the CPA exam.

How This Course Works:

Mode of delivery: This course is 100% online. There will be required sessions when you must be logged in to Zoom or CarmenCanvas at a scheduled time for a "live" synchronous class or exam. You will also be assigned pre-recorded lecture video assignments for some sessions. Please review the course schedule for details for each class.

Pace of online activities: This course is divided into **chapter modules** that are released as the course progresses. Students are expected to keep pace with reading and online quiz deadlines. Graded homework assignments will be assigned via the textbook Connect platform which will provide an opportunity to solve problems similar to the type of problems that will be on the exams. Connect is linked to CarmenCanvas.

Credit hours and work expectations: This is a **3-credit-hour course**. According to <u>Ohio State policy</u>, students should expect around an average of 3 hours per week of time spent on direct instruction (instructor content and Carmen activities, for example) in addition to 6 hours of homework (reading and assignment preparation, for example).

Attendance and participation requirements: Because this is an online course, your attendance is based on your online activity and participation. The following is a summary of everyone's expected participation:

• Participating in online activities for attendance:

You are expected to log in to the course in CarmenCanvas and Connect often (During most weeks you will probably log in many times.) If you have a situation that might cause you to miss an entire week of class, discuss it with me *as soon as possible*.

• Live sessions:

You are strongly encouraged to attend all live scheduled events for this course at the time they are scheduled. There will be group discussions during the live Zoom sessions and your participation will be monitored and graded.

- Download the <u>Duo Mobile application</u> to all of your registered devices for the ability to generate one-time codes in the event that you lose cell, data, or Wi-Fi service.

Grading and Evaluation:

The student's final grade in the course will be determined on the following basis:

Each student will receive a letter grade based on a total points earned through attendance/participation, assignments, and two exams that will be given throughout the course. Overall, you will be evaluated in terms of your relative performance as compared to classmates. Extra points obtained in one category will be capped at the category value (i.e., 610/600 Assignment points = 600 Assignment points) and are NOT transferrable to other categories. Make-up examinations will ONLY be given in cases of extreme emergency or an excused absence with proper documentation. Grades will NOT be rounded up (i.e., 89.8% is a B+).
