Course Objectives:

The goal of this course is to provide a conceptual foundation of accounting principles that can be used to understand and attack a broad set of important issues that will arise now and in the future.

Course Description:

The course is designed for those whose careers will require expert understanding of advanced financial accounting and reporting concepts. We will emphasize financial reporting as part of the economic environment underlying complex financial transactions.

Topics covered include the accounting for:

- Business combinations
- Consolidations
- Derivatives and hedges
- Foreign operations

Course Focus

- Developing knowledge of accounting principles, skills required to apply these principals to complex M&A transactions, and the ability to combine multiple concepts covered to understand consolidated financial statements (corresponding to the CPA exam FAR and BAR sections).
- Developing the ability to read, understand, and analyze lengthy complex financial statement footnote disclosures (10-K and 10-Q) related to the covered concepts.
- Understanding the economic forces that give rise to a demand for accounting information and for the regulation of financial information.

Course Expectations

- myBusinessCourse readings and assignments to be completed prior to class on the assigned day.
- Reading quizzes to be used to evaluate understanding and areas requiring review.
- Carmen Additional readings and class notes and examples viewed before class for familiarization.
- Collaborative approach taken on in class examples and group problem sets and presentations.
- Midterms based on individual effort.
