Course Description

Basic principles and main characteristics of the Insurance Industry and the fundamentals of risk identification, insurance contracts, and annuities.



How This Online Course Works

Mode of delivery: This course is 100% in-person. There are no required sessions when you must be logged in to Carmen at a scheduled time.

Pace of online activities: This course is divided into **weekly modules** that are released one week ahead of time. Students are expected to keep pace with weekly deadlines but may schedule their efforts freely within that time frame.

Credit hours and work expectations: This is a [3] credit-hour course. According to [Ohio State bylaws on instruction](http://go.osu.edu/credithours) (go.osu.edu/credithours), students should expect around [3] hours per week of time spent on direct instruction (instructor content and Carmen activities, for example) in addition to [6] hours of homework (reading and assignment preparation, for example) to receive a grade of [C] average.

Attendance and participation requirements: Research shows regular participation is one of the highest predictors of success. With that in mind, I have the following expectations for everyone's participation:

- **Attendance is highly recommended:**
A portion of your exams will consist of information that will only be presented during lecture. Therefore, attending as many classes as possible is essential for performing well in this course. If you have a situation that might cause you to miss a class, be sure to get the notes from one of your group members. If you have a situation that might cause you to miss an entire week of class, discuss it with me *as soon as possible*.
- **Grading Policy:**
There is no extra credit offered. Graded quizzes will be taken through Carmen on your laptop during class time. If you are not in class in-person (limited exceptions for absences may be made on a case-by-case basis) for a graded quiz you will receive a score of zero for that quiz.

Descriptions of Major Course Assignments

Class Reflection

Description: In order to provide the best experience possible I ask for feedback twice a semester. The feedback from the class reflection assignment will be implemented when possible.

Group Insurance Company Simulation

Description: You will be placed into groups and take on the challenge of creating your own insurance company, competing head-to-head with other teams in the class. This project will give you real-world experience in two critical areas. First, you'll design an investment portfolio using Liability Driven Investing (LDI) to turn collected premiums into compound growth. Second, you'll develop, market, and launch a strategy to generate profit from your insurance products. This is your chance to apply financial theory, sharpen your strategic thinking, and see which team can build the most successful insurance company!

Quizzes

Description: The in-class quizzes will be given before the start of each new chapter. The purpose of these quizzes is to prepare you before the start of class, which is essential for this material. All quizzes will be five points and on the major topics of the PowerPoint. **FROM THE POWERPOINTS ONLY!** The quizzes will also compose part of your mid-term and final exams. The dates for the quizzes are dependent on the progress we are making in class, but are intended to be before the start of each new chapter. **If you can't be there on a quiz day, please email me, and we will make arrangements. On the date of your make-up, please print and present your email in order to make up for the quiz. Otherwise, there won't be any make-up quizzes.**

Insurance Lab and “Board of Directors Report”

Description: During the Thursday Insurance Lab, each group will complete and present the Board of Directors Report using the provided template. The report is designed to simulate a real-world Board presentation by combining insurance industry developments, financial market data, economic trends, and portfolio performance into a professional weekly update. Groups should use current events and market information to explain how changing economic and insurance conditions may impact portfolio strategy, risk management, and the broader insurance industry.

Mid-Term and Final Exam

Description: **Exams are closed-book and IN-PERSON.** Absences from exams will only be excused for the most serious of reasons and documented by an appropriately accredited professional (i.e., a medical doctor). If there is an issue with the date and time of the final exam (ie, 3 exams in one day), please let me know in ADVANCE and I will try to accommodate that.

Academic integrity and collaboration: Your written assignments, including discussion posts, should be your own original work. In formal assignments, you should follow [MLA/APA/Chicago etc.] style to cite the ideas and words of your research sources. You are encouraged to ask a trusted person to proofread your assignments before you turn them in but no one else should revise or rewrite your work.

Use of AI

Use of artificial intelligence (AI)-powered programs, including but not limited to ChatGPT, for course assignments must be first discussed and permitted by the faculty instructor. The scope of use may range from not permitted (with exception of AI-powered search engines such as Google, Bing, etc.) to a broader spectrum of allowed applications. When AI-powered programs are permitted, and used by students, the scope of use and content must be specified and referenced by students accordingly. Students are expected to be aware of the shortcomings of use of AI-powered programs, including risk of academic misconduct (e.g., plagiarism; etc.).

Testing Policy

ALL EXAMS and QUIZZES ARE IN-PERSON AND CLOSED BOOK. *There are no make-ups for quizzes. Missed quizzes will be recorded as a "0". Missed exams can only be made up in extreme cases (e.g., death of a family member, personal hospitalization, etc.) with proper documentation (e.g., a physician's note, ER paperwork, obituary, etc.). Each decision of potentially allowing a make-up exam is made by the instructor on a case-by-case basis.
