Course Description

An introduction to American legal institutions, sources of law, and an analysis of basic concepts of public and private law related to business decisions. Primary areas covered include contracts, torts, and equal employment opportunity law.



How This Online Course Works

Mode of delivery: This course is 100% online. There are no required sessions when you must be logged in to Carmen at scheduled times. There are reading assignments in the textbook, lectures recorded on Zoom and posted on Carmen, and weekly written assignments due (usually) at the end of each weekly module. The weekly written assignments will require you to draw upon and/or apply the assigned reading and recorded lectures.

Pace of online activities: This course is divided into **weekly modules**. Students are expected to keep pace with weekly deadlines, but may schedule their efforts freely within that time frame.

Credit hours and work expectations: This is a 1.5 credit-hour course. According to Ohio State bylaws on instruction (go.osu.edu/credithours), students should expect around 3 hours per week of time spent on direct instruction (instructor content and Carmen activities, for example) in addition to 6 hours of homework (assigned reading preparation and written assignment preparation, for example).

Attendance and participation requirements: Because this is an online course, your attendance is based on your online activity and participation. The following is a summary of students' expected participation:

Participating in online activities for attendance at least once per week:
 You are expected to log in to the course in Carmen every week. During most weeks you
 will probably log in many times. If you have a situation that might cause you to miss an
 entire week of class, discuss it with me as soon as possible. You are expected to keep
 up with the reading assignments, view the recorded lectures, and turn in each week's
 written assignments on time.

Office hours and live sessions: optional

All live, scheduled events for the course, including my office hours, are optional.

Two Important Points: (1) Generally, on or about the beginning of each week (Mon.), I'll send you via the Announcements tool in CarmenCanvas, an *Announcement* giving details about how the module content is covered over that week (Mon. through Fri.); and (2) this will include the module's written assignment, usually due Fri., 5:00 p.m. U.S. Eastern Time (The exceptions are the modules for weeks 4 and 7 (see p. 13 *infra*.)

The Big Picture: The course builds your knowledge and skills in the following step by step approach: Reading the *Announcement* reveals the weekly plan \rightarrow Reading the Assigned Reading (in the chapter and any additional material) provides information and develops critical thinking skills \rightarrow Viewing the Recorded Lecture helps understand the hard stuff \rightarrow Submitting Weekly Written Assignments helps develop ability to critically analyze and apply what is learned (and gets you grade points).
