<u>Course Description</u>: An introduction to American legal institutions and sources of law and an analysis of basic concepts of public and private law related to business decisions. 1.5 credit hrs. This class will take place entirely online.

<u>Course Objectives</u>: The primary objectives of this course are to provide students with: a) an understanding of the legal framework within which American business operates, b) an introduction to basic concepts of public and private law relevant to business decisions, and c) experience in legal analysis.

<u>Course Materials:</u> Kubasek, Nancy. *Dynamic Business Law 5*e. New York: McGraw-Hill, 2017. See below for the options on where to get the book. Additional material will be posted on Carmen.

How This Course Works:

Mode of delivery: This course is 100% online. There is one required session on the first day of class when you must be logged in to Carmen at a scheduled time.

Pace of online activities: This course is divided into **weekly modules**. Students are expected to keep pace with weekly deadlines but may schedule their efforts freely within that time frame.

Credit hours and work expectations: This is a **1.5-credit-hour course**. According to Ohio State policy, students should expect around an average of 3 hours per week of time spent on direct instruction (instructor content and Carmen activities, for example) in addition to 6 hours of homework (reading and assignment preparation, for example).

Attendance and participation requirements: Because this is an online course, your attendance is based on your online activity and participation.

Carmen access

- Request passcodes to keep as a backup authentication option. When you see the Duo login screen on
 your computer, click Enter a Passcode and then click the Text me new codes button that appears. This
 will text you ten passcodes good for 365 days that can each be used once.
- Download the <u>Duo Mobile application</u> to all of your registered devices for the ability to generate one-time codes in the event that you lose cell, data, or Wi-Fi service.

<u>Homework</u>: Two graded surveys are required through Carmen. These involve defining terms and help prepare you for the exams. You may complete these surveys over multiple sessions as long as you complete it by the due date. Any additional homework assignments will be posted on Carmen.

<u>Quizzes</u>: Quizzes will appear on Carmen for many of the class weeks. You will have several days to complete the quiz, and it will cover material to be discussed in class that week.

<u>Carmen</u>: Information regarding class will be posted as announcements on Carmen. You are responsible for signing up on Carmen for notifications. You may not claim lack of knowledge of information posted on Carmen or sent through a Carmen email as an excuse for failure to comply with a class requirement.

If you believe that a score posted on Carmen is not accurate, you must notify me by email within **five** days of the date that it was posted. If you fail to notify me within the five-day period, you agree that the score posted is accurate and give up all rights to contest the score.
