#### **Course description**

This course will discuss investment alternatives such as Money Market instruments, Stocks and Bonds and Corporate Finance issues such as Corporate Governance, Cost of Capital and Capital Budgeting.

#### **Course learning outcomes**

By the end of this course, students should successfully be able to:

- Explain the different investment vehicles available in financial markets
- Understand features of a corporation's financial situation and how it impacts the decisions of a corporation
- Explain how security markets work
- Explain the risk/return relationship
- Determine the Time Value of Money for different types of investments
- Determine the value of specific types of investments including stocks and bonds
- Understand the difference between different investment companies
- Define put and call options

# **HOW THIS COURSE WORKS**

Please NOTE: All assignments are due based on the University's time zone: Eastern Time Zone (ET). If you are taking this course in a different time zone, please make sure to meet the assigned deadlines based on Eastern Time.

**Mode of delivery:** This course is 100% online. However, there are required sessions when you must be logged into CarmenZoom at a scheduled time for your assigned recitation each week.

Pace of online activities: This course is divided into a weekly schedule as outlined on the course website in Carmen. Students are expected to keep pace with weekly deadlines but may schedule their efforts freely within that time frame.

Credit hours and work expectations: This is a 3-credit-hour course. According to <a href="Ohio State policy">Ohio State policy</a>, students should expect around 3 hours per week of time spent on direct instruction (instructor content and Carmen activities, for example) in addition to 6 hours of homework (reading and assignment preparation, for example) to receive a grade of (C) average.

**Attendance and participation requirements:** Because this is an online course, your attendance is based on your online activity and participation. The following is a summary of everyone's expected participation:

- Participating in online activities: AT LEAST ONCE PER WEEK

  You are expected to log into the course in Carmen every week. (During most weeks you will probably log in many times.) If you have a situation that might cause you to miss an entire week of class, you must discuss it with me as soon as possible.
- Lectures: SYNCHRONOUS AND ASYNCHRONOUS Lectures have already been recorded by Professors' Clark and Staufenberg. Professor Clark has taught this course in the past. You are able to view these at your leisure in Carmen. Check the Course Schedule each week. We will also have guest speakers in our class to supplement the course material for that week.
- Synchronous Recitation classes: ONCE PER WEEK

There are 60 points available for attending recitations in this course. There are a total of 12 recitations in this course. You will be required to engage in 10 different weeks of recitations throughout the semester. This can be achieved by attending an online recitation (with access link posted in CarmenCanvas). You will receive 6 points per recitation attended up to a maximum of 60 points. The recitations must be for different weeks to count towards your recitation grade. If you have questions about your attendance grade, please email Professor Staufenberg.

# <u>Please follow the guidelines below regarding recitations to ensure you receive appropriate credit.</u>

When logging into CarmenZoom (online recitations):

- Login with your first and last name as it appears on your Canvas page.
- Login with your name.#@osu.edu or name.#@buckeyemail.osu.edu. Do not use any non-OSU email address.
- Attendance will be taken through Top Hat: tophat.com. Instructions in how to sign-up for Top Hat will be given on the first day of class.
- If you are unable to login using your OSU credentials, it is your responsibility to email Professor Staufenberg immediately informing of which recitation you attended and what email you used to login. You will not receive credit unless you send this email within one week of the recitation in which you logged in with a non-OSU email address. It is recommended that you keep track of which recitations you attend, including date, time and any proof of attendance, as this is a large course and mistakes in tracking occasionally occur. Recitation points will be posted on Canvas half-way through the semester and at the end of the semester. You are welcome to email Professor Staufenberg at any time throughout the semester to check your progress. If at the end of the semester you believe your posted Recitation score is incorrect you may email Professor Staufenberg with a list of the recitations you attended (with the information/proof suggested above). You must provide this information. Due to the number of students in the course Professor Staufenberg cannot double check your attendance without guidance from you on where to look. If you send an email that only says "I believe my score is incorrect" without any additional information, your score will not be reviewed or changed.
- Tests: TWO MIDTERMS AND ONE FINAL EXAM. EXAMS WILL BE TAKEN DURING CLASS TIME AND PROCTORED VIA CARMENZOOM.

There will be 2 midterms and 1 final exam. The tests will be administered through CarmenCanvas Quizzes and will require you to log into CarmenZoom with your camera on the entire time while taking the exam. The tests will be given during your **scheduled recitation time** on Monday evening at 5:30PM. Each timed test will be 80 minutes in length. The clock starts at 5:30PM. The test must be completed in that one sitting and all exams must be completed by 6:50PM. Questions can be asked via the CarmenZoom private chat feature during the exam. The midterms and final exam will be non-cumulative.

There will be no make-up exams unless you have a valid family, health or safety emergency. Please email the instructor PRIOR to the exam. If you miss an exam without my knowledge, then you will receive a zero for that component of the grade.

- Complete Individual Excel and End-Of-Chapter Problems in MindTap: USUALLY DUE EVERY 1-2 WEEKS. CHECK THE COURSE SCHEDULE IN CARMENCANVAS FOR DUE DATES.
  - Each week a new Excel and End-Of-Chapter Problem set is due by that week's Sunday night at 11:59PM (See course schedule for details).
  - Each Excel assignment will be worth 10 points with an unlimited number of attempts.
  - Each End-Of-Chapter Problem set will be worth 10 points.
  - You will have 3 attempts to complete each End-Of-Chapter Problem set.
  - Once the first attempt is complete, feedback is provided to help you understand anything you missed. This will help you with the second and/or third attempts on the homework. The highest score from your attempts will be the final grade for each End-Of-Chapter Problem Set assignment.
  - Complete each End-Of-Chapter Problem set early as this will help Professor Staufenberg resolve any material that the class might need help with.
- Complete the Stock Market Project: THIS ASSIGNMENT WILL BE COMPLETED INDIVIDUALLY. CHECK THE COURSE SCHEDULE IN CARMEN FOR DUE DATES.
  - The Stock Market Project will be worth 40 points. Details about this assignment will be shared at the beginning of Week 3.
