Course Prerequisites

Prereq: 3220 (620), BusMgt 2320 (330), and 2321 (331). Not open to students with credit for 4210, 4211, 4212 (721), 4220, 4221, or 4222 (722).

Course Description

Applications in Finance with a discussion of Investment alternatives such as Money Market instruments, Stocks and Bonds and Corporate Finance issues such as Corporate Governance, Cost of Capital and Capital Budgeting.

Learning Outcomes

By the end of this course, students should successfully be able to:

- Explain the different investment vehicles available in financial markets
- Understand features of a corporation's financial situation and how it impacts the decisions of a corporation
- Explain how security markets work
- Explain the risk/return relationship
- Determine the Time Value of Money for different types of investments
- Determine the value of specific types of investments including stocks and bonds
- Understand the difference between investment companies
- Define put and call options

How This Online Course Works

Mode of delivery: This course is 100% online. However, there are required sessions when you must be logged into CarmenZoom at a scheduled time for your lecture each week.

Pace of online activities: This course is divided into **weekly modules**. Students are expected to keep pace with weekly deadlines but may schedule their efforts freely within that time frame.

Credit hours and work expectations: This is a 3 credit-hour course. According to [Ohio State bylaws on instruction](https://go.osu.edu/credithours) (go.osu.edu/credithours), students should expect around 3 hours per week of time spent on direct instruction (instructor content and Carmen activities, for example) in addition to 6 hours of homework (reading and assignment preparation, for example) to receive a grade of C average.

Attendance and participation requirements: Research shows regular participation is one of the highest predictors of success. With that in mind, I have the following expectations for everyone's participation:

- **Participating in online activities for attendance: at least once per week**
You are expected to log in to the course in Carmen every week. During most weeks you will probably log in many times. If you have a situation that might cause you to miss an entire week of class, discuss it with me *as soon as possible*.
- **Lectures: Synchronous and Asynchronous** Lectures have already been recorded by the Finance Department. You are able to view these at your leisure in Carmen. Check the Course Schedule each week. We will also have guest speakers in our class to supplement the course material for that week.
- **Synchronous Lecture classes: once per week** We will be going over chapter problems and Excel assignments.
- **Office hours: optional**
All live office hours are optional.

Descriptions of Major Course Assignments

Homework Assignments

Please NOTE: All assignments are due based on the University's time zone: Eastern Time Zone (ET). If you are taking this course in a different time zone, please make sure to meet the assigned deadlines based on Eastern Time.

Complete Individual Excel and End-Of-Chapter Problems in MindTap: Usually due every 1-2 weeks. Check the course schedule in CarmenCanvas for due dates.

- Each week a new Excel and End-Of-Chapter Problem set is due by that week's Sunday night at 11:59PM (See course schedule for details).
- Each Excel assignment will be worth 10 points with an unlimited number of attempts.
- Each End-Of-Chapter Problem set will be worth 10 points.
- You will have 3 attempts to complete each End-Of-Chapter Problem set.
- Once the first attempt is complete, feedback is provided to help you understand anything you missed. This will help you with the second and/or third attempts on the homework. The highest score from your attempts will be the final grade for each End-Of-Chapter Problem Set assignment.
- Complete each End-Of-Chapter Problem set early as this will help Professor Staufenberg resolve any material that the class might need help with.

Complete the Stock Market Project: This project will be completed individually. Check the course schedule in Carmen for due dates.

- The Stock Market Project will be worth 40 points. Details about this assignment will be shared at the beginning of Week 3.

Chapter Readings

It is essential that you read the chapter before completing any work. Each chapter provides multiple explanations of each concept and shows the financial calculator steps in how to solve the example problems. This will also help you and your group with the weekly assignments.

Exams: Two midterms and one final exam. Exams will be taken during classtime and proctored via CarmenZoom.

There will be 2 midterms and 1 final exam. The tests will be administered through CarmenCanvas Quizzes and will require you to log into CarmenZoom with your camera on the entire time while taking the exam. The tests will be given during your **scheduled recitation time** on Monday evening at 5:30PM. Each timed test will be 80 minutes in length. The clock starts at 5:30PM. The test must be completed in that one sitting and all exams must be completed by 6:50PM. Questions can be asked via the CarmenZoom private chat feature during the exam. The midterms and final exam will be non-cumulative.

There will be no make-up exams unless you have a valid family, health or safety emergency. Please email the instructor PRIOR to the exam. If you miss an exam without my knowledge, then you will receive a zero for that component of the grade.

Academic integrity and collaboration: Your written assignments, including discussion posts, should be your own original work. You are encouraged to ask a trusted person to proofread your assignments before you turn them in but no one else should revise or rewrite your work.

Use of AI

Use of artificial intelligence (AI)-powered programs, including but not limited to ChatGPT, for course assignments must be first discussed and permitted by the faculty instructor. The scope of use may range from not permitted (with exception of AI-powered search engines such as Google, Bing, etc.) to a broader spectrum of allowed applications. When AI-powered programs are permitted, and used by students, the scope of use and content must be specified and referenced by students accordingly. Students are expected to be aware of the shortcomings of use of AI-powered programs, including risk of academic misconduct (e.g., plagiarism; etc.).

Testing Policy

Missed exams can only be made-up in extreme cases (e.g., death of family member, personal hospitalization, etc.) with proper documentation (e.g., a physician's note, ER paperwork, obituary, etc.). Each decision of potentially allowing a make-up exam is made by the instructor on a case-by-case basis. Discussion and Communication Guidelines

The following are my expectations for how we should communicate as a class. Above all, please remember to be respectful and thoughtful.

- **Writing style:** While there is no need to participate in class discussions as if you were writing a research paper, you should remember to write using good grammar, spelling, and punctuation. A more conversational tone is fine for non-academic topics.
- **Tone and civility:** Let's maintain a supportive learning community where everyone feels safe and where people can disagree amicably. Remember that sarcasm doesn't always come across online. I will provide specific guidance for discussions on controversial or personal topics.
- **Citing your sources:** When we have academic discussions, please cite your sources to back up what you say. For the textbook or other course materials, list at least the title and page numbers. For online sources, include a link.
- **Backing up your work:** Consider composing your academic posts in a word processor, where you can save your work, and then copying into the Carmen discussion.
- **Synchronous sessions:** During our CarmenZoom sessions I ask you to use your real name and a clear photo of your face in your Carmen profile. During our full-group lecture time, you may turn your camera off if you choose. When in breakout rooms or in small-group discussions, having cameras and microphones on as often as possible will help you get the most out of activities. You are always welcome to use the [free, Ohio State-themed virtual backgrounds](https://go.osu.edu/zoom-backgrounds) (go.osu.edu/zoom-backgrounds). Remember that CarmenZoom and the CarmenZoom chat are our classroom space where respectful interactions are expected.

Ohio State has had a longstanding practice of making reasonable academic accommodations for students' religious beliefs and practices in accordance with applicable law. A student's request for time off shall be provided if the student's sincerely held religious belief or practice severely affects the student's ability to take an exam or meet an academic requirement and the student has notified their instructor, in writing during the first 14 days after the course begins, of the date of each absence. request is made outside the notice period. A student may not be penalized for an absence approved under this policy.
