Students who are most successful typically review the lecture videos as if they were "in class" taking notes on the posted slides for the following week. They supplement the lecture videos with the practice quizzes or additional questions in the book. They come to the classes in person to reinforce key learnings and ask questions.

Course Description:

Career Focus:

Capital markets play a key role in the global economy. Every day, they set prices for CEOs, investors, and governments, and help to drive the global economy forward by facilitating investing and raising money. In 2020, listed equities were valued at \$94 trillion, the outstanding amount of bonds at \$119 trillion, and the gross value of derivatives at \$12.4 trillion.

The course covers security markets and instruments (equities, bonds, and options), pricing of capital assets, and portfolio investment tools. Given the importance of these markets, it is applicable to students interested in a broad range of careers in finance, such as portfolio management, wealth management, marketing, sales, and corporate finance, as well as for managing personal finances and for careers outside of finance.

Educational Objectives:

The objective of the course is to introduce key theories and empirical observations in the area of financial markets. Students will also learn analytical tools considered 'industry standard' in the asset management business (e.g. Sharpe's Index). These concepts and tools should ultimately help students to develop their approach to a broader understanding of dynamic financial markets, where existing practical tools and modes of implementation do not always work.

Graded Component Details

Participation:

Groups for classwork:

An important part of learning in this class occurs by working in groups on solving practice questions or preparing a presentation. A group typically has three to four members.

Problem solving demonstration:

To help facilitate learning, I will ask a group of students to demonstrate their solutions to selected practice questions in front of a class. You will know ahead of time which class you will be asked to demonstrate your solutions as well as the assigned questions.

Office hours and class sessions:

All live, scheduled events for the course, are required. The instructor and/or a TA will take attendance. Office hours are optional.

Participation grading:

Participation grading will be comprised of:

- Problem solving demonstration in group
- Regularly attending class
- Subjective measure: did student have quality engagement during the semester by asking good questions and/or providing responses to questions
- Peer evaluation: above or below expectations on group assignments

Quizzes:

There are 6 graded quizzes (each worth 18 points) in Carmen over the course of the semester. You will take these "live" during class time with your laptop. I will drop the worst score out of the six quizzes.

The quiz is only open during short window of class time. Students complete these individually, adhering to OSU's Academic Integrity standards (see further in syllabus). During exams, turn off cell phones. **Make sure you bring your laptop**, a pencil, and calculator, in class on assignment days.

A missed quiz will be recorded as a "0". In the extreme and properly documented cases (see the course testing policy for more details) you may be allowed by the instructor to make up for the quiz points in the midterm/final exam. In such cases, your points from the final exam will be scaled accordingly.

Midterm:

There is only one possibility to take the midterm. Check the course schedule for an exact date. A missed midterm will be recorded as a "0". In the extreme and properly documented cases (see the course testing policy for more details) you may be allowed by the instructor to make up for the midterm points in the final exam. In such cases, your points from the final exam will be scaled accordingly.

More details about the midterm format and scope will be covered in class during a review lecture before the midterm.

Final exam:

There is only one possibility to take the final exam (date will be posted on Carmen ahead of time). The final exam is cumulative and places more weight on the second half of the course, which builds on material from the first half. Anything mentioned in class, or in assignments, is "fair game" for exams. All exams are the property of the instructor. More details about the exam format and scope will be covered in class during a review lecture before the exam.

Trading Project:

You will be trading in groups through the semester. Details of the trading project will follow in a few weeks.

Student Presentations:

Your group will present on in class on your trading project. More details about the presentation content and grading will be posted on Carmen and explained in class.

At the end of the semester, you will be required to complete a simple peer feedback assessment (shared only with Professor). You will grade your group mates as "above", "meeting", or "below" expectations for the group work.

Guest speaker reflection:

There will be two guest lectures delivered on Zoom. You are required to participate in the guest lecture or watch the recording and write a reflection of the lecture. More details about the reflection format and grading will be posted on Carmen and explained in class.

Additional grading details:

Additional Policies

Absence Policy:

There are <u>no make-ups for quizzes</u>, <u>midterm</u>, <u>or other graded components</u>. A missed midterm will be recorded as a "0". Missed midterm or other graded component can only be made-up in extreme cases (e.g., death of a family member, personal hospitalization, etc.) with proper documentation (e.g., a physician's note, ER paperwork, obituary, etc.). Each decision of potentially allowing a make-up is made by the instructor on a case-by-case basis. In case of missed midterm or quiz due to extreme reasons, you may be allowed by the instructor to make up for the missed points in the final exam. In such cases, your points from the final exam will be scaled to the sum of exam points (50) and missed points (e.g. 35 for a midterm). Additionally, you MUST contact the instructor as soon as you know of a potential problem or conflict with an exam date. If you are experiencing an extreme situation or emergency, please attempt to notify the instructor by email ASAP.
