### **COURSE OBJECTIVES & OVERVIEW**

Finance 2 will explore key concepts that drive financial markets and explore themes that are shaping the asset management industry *today* including:

- The link between risk and return
- Sources of return (CAPM and factor based models)
- Investment philosophy (active vs. passive, value vs. growth)
- Fixed Income market dynamics in an age of low interest rate policy
- Elements of expected return and portfolio attribution

We will accomplish these objectives through:

- Interactive lectures and class discussions that will draw heavily from current events shaping financial markets and the asset management industry
- Weekly discussion posts linking class content to current market events
- Case studies that provide the opportunity to critically think and apply course material to issues impacting the world of finance today
- A comprehensive final exam

#### **HOW THIS COURSE WORKS**

**Mode of delivery:** This course will meet in-person.

**Pace of online activities:** This course is divided into **weekly modules** that are released one week ahead of time. Students are expected to keep pace with weekly deadlines but may schedule their efforts freely within that time frame.

Credit hours and work expectations: This is a 1.5-credit-hour course. According to Ohio State policy, students should expect around 3 hours per week of time spent on direct instruction (instructor content and Carmen activities, for example) in addition to 6 hours of homework (reading and assignment preparation, for example) to receive a grade of (C) average.

# Case assignments (60%) – (Groups of 4 students)

Case assignment questions will be graded on the basis of:

- 1) Answering the question <u>directly</u> and succinctly
- Supporting your answer with evidence from the case or supplementary information provided
- 3) Embracing the ambiguity—or—open ended nature of the question and <u>taking a distinct</u> <u>position</u>

In essence, tell me in the first sentence (one sentence) what you think. Next, support your answer with facts from the case or outside support, if supplementary files are provided feel free to use them as support.

# Discussion posts + Class participation (20%) - Individual

Discussion posts related to current events (Wall Street Journal) will be graded. The grade will be assigned based on the *quality* of the contribution <u>not</u> the quantity. Qualitative judgements are by their very nature *subjective*.

Class participation will be recorded and included as part of the grade. I utilize Top Hat for our live lectures to: 1) gauge whether you understand and can apply a concept we discuss (a learning "speedbump") 2) to solicit your opinion (no right or wrong answers) and 3) level the playing field for introverts.



# Final (20%) - Individual

The final exam will be administered **Decmeber 9-11, 2022 on Carmen (online)**. The final exam will be comprehensive (covering lecture/discussion, articles & case material) and consist of 40-50 questions.

# **CARMEN ACCESS**
