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Course Description:

This hands-on course covers the application of financial software tools. You will be exposed to real world applications used in corporate finance, investment banking, and asset management. You will source and analyze real-time market data relating to various finance topics such as: forecasting, project analysis, capital budgeting, financial statement analysis, intrinsic valuation, and portfolio management.

Course Objectives:

This course will utilize Bloomberg, S&P Capital IQ, Morningstar, Excel, and other financial market data software. The course objectives include:

- Efficiently find and download financial data
- Ability to analyze and manipulate data
- Deal with uncertainty and imperfect information
- Draw conclusions based on data analysis

Bloomberg Market Concepts:

The BMC is a 10-hour, self-paced e-learning course that provides an interactive introduction to the financial markets. BMC consists of 5 modules—Economic Indicators, Currencies, Fixed Income, Equities, and Getting Started on the Terminal—woven together from Bloomberg data, news, analytics and television.

Safety and health requirements

Disenrollment:
