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PREFACE

AS ROMAN CATHOLICS, we are privileged to benefit from the cumulative treasure of our faith expressed as profound ritual and prayer, timeless Scripture and exquisite sacred music. All are both formative and professive (*lex credendi*, *lex orandi*; *lex orandi*, *lex credendi*). Still, the most powerful confession and the most efficacious, even formative grace can arguably be experienced through compelling hymns, songs, psalms and service music.

Throughout the centuries, each generation has contributed to the storehouse of time-honored, faithful sacred music and texts. At times, we have experimented with trite and fleeting works, often directed to one another rather than to God. But, art that endures and sung prayer that elevates our minds, our hearts, and our souls into a true experience of our loving God is never about us. Augustine of Hippo reminds us always that everything in our lives ought to be praise of God, and if our prayer does not direct us to Him, how then could our lives?

Hymnal 2022 is the finest collection of hymns and songs directed to God. In this hymnal, there is no tampering with the language of God, the persons of the Trinity, or the masculine pronouns that refer to Father, Son and Holy Spirit. There is no attempt at homogenization, the blurring of lines between Catholic and other Christian traditions as well as non-Christian religions in the pretense of unity. There is no confusion of doctrine. There is no attempt to be all things to everyone, for when we do so, in the end we are nothing. For the sake of both clarity and respect, all divine pronouns are capitalized; we always know to Whom we are singing. Lastly, the hymns are about and in praise of God, not us, and are never fluff or "in the moment."

The year 2020 was perhaps the most challenging of our lives. We have suffered through restrictive circumstances to protect our health and familial well-being. We have even lost loved ones unexpectedly and abruptly. Yet, as often happens, strife can bring with it the fruit of goodness. In this year, we rediscovered that which brings the greatest lasting value to our lives. In this year, we renewed our spousal and familial love through increased time together and the gift of shared experiences that might not have been. And in this year, *Hymnal 2022* began.

2020 brought us clarity of vision; and, following two years of careful crafting, *Hymnal 2022* now celebrates the sacred music that brings true fidelity to our prayer and to our lives. It is the only hymnal in the United States that completely honors the guidelines of the document *Sacred Music at the Service of the Church* authored by the Doctrine Committee of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops.

May it improve our lives, enrich our faith, and invigorate our Baptism in the days and years before us. Through this book and our singing of the great works within it, may our children and their children know the legacy of our believing, without compromise.

INTRODUCTORY RITES

All stand. When the people are gathered, the Priest approaches the altar with the ministers while the Entrance Chant is sung.

When the Entrance Chant is concluded, the Priest and the faithful, standing, sign themselves with the Sign of the Cross, while the Priest, facing the people, says:

Mass in Honor of Saint Cecilia





GUIDELINES FOR THE RECEPTION OF HOLY COMMUNION

For Catholics

As Catholics, we fully participate in the celebration of the Eucharist when we receive Holy Communion. We are encouraged to receive Communion devoutly and frequently. In order to be properly disposed to receive Communion, participants should not be conscious of grave sin and normally should have fasted for one hour. A person who is conscious of grave sin is not to receive the Body and Blood of the Lord without prior sacramental confession except for a grave reason where there is no opportunity for confession. In this case, the person is to be mindful of the obligation to make an act of perfect contrition, including the intention of confessing as soon as possible (Code of Canon Law, canon 916). A frequent reception of the Sacrament of Penance is encouraged for all.

For Other Christians

We welcome our fellow Christians to this celebration of the Eucharist as our brothers and sisters. We pray that our common baptism and the action of the Holy Spirit in this Eucharist will draw us closer to one another and begin to dispel the sad divisions which separate us. We pray that these will lessen and finally disappear, in keeping with Christ's prayer for us "that they may all be one" (Jn 17:21).

Because Catholics believe that the celebration of the Eucharist is a sign of the reality of the oneness of faith, life, and worship, members of those churches with whom we are not yet fully united are ordinarily not admitted to Holy Communion. Eucharistic sharing in exceptional circumstances by other Christians requires permission according to the directives of the diocesan bishop and the provisions of canon law (canon 844 & 4). Members of the Orthodox Churches, the Assyrian Church of the East, and the Polish National Catholic Church are urged to respect the discipline of their own Churches. According to Roman Catholic discipline, the Code of Canon Law does not object to the reception of communion by Christians of these Churches (canon 844 § 3).

For Those Not Receiving Communion

All who are not receiving Holy Communion are encouraged to express in their hearts a prayerful desire for unity with the Lord Jesus and with one another.

For Non-Christians

We also welcome to this celebration those who do not share our faith in Jesus Christ. While we cannot admit them to Holy Communion, we ask them to offer their prayers for the peace and the unity of the human family.

Gospel John 2:1–11

Jesus did this as the beginning of his signs at Cana in Galilee

There was a wedding at Cana in Galilee, and the mother of Jesus was there. Jesus and his disciples were also invited to the wedding. When the wine ran short, the mother of Jesus said to him, "They have no wine." And Jesus said to her, "Woman, how does your concern affect me? My hour has not yet come." His mother said to the servers, "Do whatever he tells you." Now there were six stone water jars there for Jewish ceremonial washings, each holding twenty to thirty gallons. Jesus told the them, "Fill the jars with water." So they filled them to the brim. Then he told them, "Draw some out now and take it to the headwaiter." So they took it. And when the headwaiter tasted the water that had become wine, without knowing where it came from—although the servers who had drawn the water knew—, the headwaiter called the bridegroom and said to him, "Everyone serves good wine first, and then when people have drunk freely, an inferior one; but you have kept the good wine until now." Jesus did this as the beginning of his signs at Cana in Galilee and so revealed his glory, and his disciples began to believe in him.

The Sacred Paschal Triduum

In the Sacred Triduum, the Church solemnly celebrates the greatest mysteries of our redemption, keeping by means of special celebrations the memorial of her Lord, crucified, buried, and risen.

The Paschal Fast should also be kept sacred. It is to be celebrated everywhere on the Friday of the Lord's Passion and, where appropriate, prolonged also through Holy Saturday as a way of coming, with spirit uplifted, to the joys of the Lord's Resurrection.

Mass of the Lord's Supper

Entrance Antiphon

The Gloria in excelsis (Glory to God in the Highest) is said. While the hymn is being sung, bells are rung, and when it is finished, they remain silent until the Gloria in excelsis of the Easter Vigil.

Collect

O God, who have called us to participate in this most sacred Supper, in which your Only Begotten Son, when about to hand himself over to death, entrusted to the Church a sacrifice new for all eternity, the banquet of love, grant, we pray, that we may draw from so great a mystery, the fullness of charity and of life. Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever.

First Reading

Exodus 12:1-8, 11-14

The law regarding the Passover meal.

The LORD said to Moses and Aaron in the land of Egypt, "This month shall stand at the head of your calendar; you shall reckon it the first month of the

year. Tell the whole community of Israel: On the tenth of this month every one of your families must procure for itself a lamb, one apiece for each household. If a family is too small for a whole lamb, it shall join the nearest household in procuring one and shall share in the lamb in proportion to the number of persons who partake of it. The lamb must be a year-old male and without blemish. You may take it from either the sheep or the goats. You shall keep it until the fourteenth day of this month, and then, with the whole assembly of Israel present, it shall be slaughtered during the evening twilight. They shall take some of its blood and apply it to the two doorposts and the lintel of every house in which they partake of the lamb. That same night they shall eat its roasted flesh with unleavened bread and bitter herbs.

"This is how you are to eat it: with your loins girt, sandals on your feet and your staff in hand, you shall eat like those who are in flight. It is the Passover of the LORD. For on this same night I will go through Egypt, striking down every firstborn of the land, both man and beast, and executing judgment on all the gods of Egypt—I, the LORD! But the blood will mark the houses where you are. Seeing the blood, I will pass over you; thus, when I strike the land of Egypt, no destructive blow will come upon you.

"This day shall be a memorial feast for you, which all your generations shall celebrate with pilgrimage to the LORD, as a perpetual institution."

Solemnities, Feasts, and Various Occasions

FEBRUARY 2: THE PRESENTATION OF THE LORD

The Blessing of Candles and the Procession

FIRST FORM: THE PROCESSION

At an appropriate hour, a gathering takes place at a smaller church or other suitable place other than inside the church to which the procession will go The faithful hold in their hands unlighted condles.

While the candles are being lit, the following antiphon or another appropriate chant is sung.

Behold, our Lord will come with power, to enlighten the eyes of his servants, alleluia.

When the chant is concluded, the Priest, facing the people, says: In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Then the Priest greets the people in the usual way, and next he gives an introductory address, encouraging the faithful to celebrate the rite of this feast day actively and consciously. He may use these or similar words:

Dear brethren (brothers and sisters),

forty days have passed since we celebrated the joyful feast

of the Nativity of the Lord.

Today is the blessed day

when Jesus was presented in the Temple by Mary and Joseph.

Outwardly he was fulfilling the Law,

but in reality he was coming to meet his believing people.

Prompted by the Holy Spirit,

Simeon and Anna came to the Temple.

Enlightened by the same Spirit,

they recognized the Lord

and confessed him with exultation.

So let us also, gathered together by the Holy Spirit,

proceed to the house of God to encounter Christ.

There we shall find him

and recognize him in the breaking of the bread,

until he comes again, revealed in glory.

After the address the Priest blesses the candles, saying: Let us pray.

O God, source and origin of all light, who on this day showed to the just man Simeon the Light for revelation to the Gentiles, we humbly ask that, in answer to your people's prayers, you may be pleased to sanctify with your blessing these candles, which we are eager to carry in praise of your name, so that, treading the path of virtue, we may reach that light which never fails. Through Christ our Lord.

R' Amen.

Or:

O God, true light, who create light eternal, spreading it far and wide, pour, we pray, into the hearts of the faithful the brilliance of perpetual light, so that all who are brightened in your holy temple by the splendor of these candles may happily reach the light of your glory. Through Christ our Lord.

R' Amen.

He sprinkles the candles with holy water without saying anything, and puts incense in the thurible for the procession.

Then the procession begins, with the Deacon announcing (or if there is no Deacon, the Priest himself):

Let us go forth in peace to meet the Lord.

Or:

Let us go forth in peace.

In this case all respond:

In the name of Christ. Amen.

All carry lighted candles. As the procession moves forward, one or other of the antiphons that follow is sung, namely the antiphon A light for revelation with the canticle (Luke 2: 29–32), or the antiphon Sion, adorn your bridal chamber or another appropriate chant.

A light for revelation to the Gentiles and the glory of your people Israel.

Lord, now let your servant go in peace, in accordance with your word. ANT.

Sion, adorn your bridal chamber and welcome Christ the King; take Mary in your arms, who is the gate of heaven, for she herself is carrying the King of glory and new light. A Virgin she remains, though bringing in her hands the Son before the morning star begotten, whom Simeon, taking in his arms announced to the peoples as Lord of life and death and Savior of the world.

As the procession enters the church, the Entrance Antiphon of the Mass is sung. After the singing of the hymn Gloria in excels (Glory to God in the highest), the Mass continues in the usual manner

SECOND FORM: THE SOLEMN ENTRANCE

Whenever a procession cannot take place, the faithful gather in church, holding candles in their hands. The Priest, together with the ministers and a representative group of the faithful, goes to a suitable place, either in front of the church door or inside the church itself.

When the Priest reaches the place appointed for the blessing of the candles, candles are lit while the antiphon Behold, our Lord or another appropriate chant is sung.

Then, after the greeting and address, the Priest blesses the candles, and then the procession to the altar takes place, with singing.

As the procession enters the church, the Entrance Antiphon of the Mass is sung. After the singing of the hymn Gloria in excelsis (Glory to God in the highest), the mass continues in the usual manner.

At the Mass

Luke 2:22-40 or 2:22-32

My eyes have seen your salvation. For the shorter form, read only the parts in brackets. [When the days were completed for their purification according to the law of Moses, Mary and Joseph took Jesus up to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord, just as it is written in the law of the Lord, Every male that opens the womb shall be consecrated to the Lord, and to offer the sacrifice of a pair of turtledoves or two young pigeons, in accordance with the dictate in the law of the Lord.

Now there was a man in Jerusalem whose name was Simeon. This man was righteous and devout, awaiting the consolation of Israel, and the Holy Spirit was upon him. It had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he should not see death before he had seen the Christ of the Lord. He came in the Spirit into the temple; and when the parents brought in the child Jesus to perform the custom of the law in regard to him, he took him into his arms and blessed God, saying:

"Now, Master, you may let your servant go

in peace, according to your word,

for my eyes have seen your salvation,

which you prepared in the sight of all the peoples:

a light for revelation to the Gentiles,

and glory for your people Israel."]

The child's father and mother were amazed at what was said about him; and Simeon blessed them and said to Mary his mother, "Behold, this child is destined for the fall and rise of many in Israel, and to be a sign that will be contradicted—and you yourself a sword will pierce—so that the thoughts of many hearts may be revealed." There was also a prophetess, Anna, the daughter of Phanuel, of the tribe of Asher. She was advanced in years, having lived seven years with her husband after her marriage, and then as a widow until she was eighty-four. She never left the temple, but worshiped night and day with fasting and prayer. And coming forward at that very time, she gave thanks to God and spoke about the child to all who were awaiting the redemption of Jerusalem.

When they had fulfilled all the prescriptions of the law of the Lord, they returned to Galilee, to their own town of Nazareth. The child grew and became strong, filled with wisdom; and the favor of God was upon him.
