Opinions

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the business-type activities for the years ended December 31, 2020 and 2019 and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the District's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the business-type activities of Bancroft-Clover Water & Sanitation District, as of December 31, 2020 and 2019 for the years then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Basis for Opinions

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of Bancroft-Clover Water & Sanitation District and to meet our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audit. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about Bancroft-Clover Water & Sanitation District's ability to continue as a going concern within one year after the date that the financial statements are available to be issued.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists.

The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Misstatements, including omissions, are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements.

In performing an audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, we:

- Exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit.
- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, and design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks. Such procedures include examining, on a test basis, evidence regarding the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of Bancroft-Clover Water & Sanitation District's internal control. Accordingly, no such opinion is expressed.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluate the overall presentation of the financial statements.
- Conclude whether, in our judgment, there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about Bancroft-Clover Water & Sanitation District's ability to continue as a going concern for a reasonable period of time.

Other Matters

Required Supplementary Information

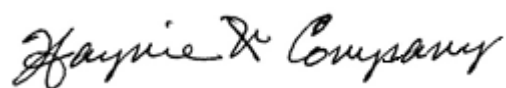

We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

Our audits were conducted for the purpose of forming an opinion on the financial statements that collectively comprise Bancroft-Clover Water & Sanitation District's financial statements as a whole. The supplementary information section is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the financial statements.

The other supplementary information, as listed in the table of contents, is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the information is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the financial statements as a whole.

Bancroft-Clover Water & Sanitation District Management's Discussion and Analysis

This section of the District's annual financial report presents our analysis of the District's financial performance during the Fiscal Years ended December 31, 2020 and 2019. Please read it in conjunction with the financial statements.

Financial Highlights

Bancroft-Clover Water and Sanitation District increased its net position by \$2,749,658 in 2020 compared to an increase in net position of \$2,326,452 in 2019. The increase in net position was \$3,899,915 more than budgeted and was largely due to variances in water and sewer capital outlay. Capital outlay for water and sewer were under budget by \$3,509,317 due to delays in plan approval for water and sewer improvements projects.

The Board increased rates for water and sewer service to absorb increased rates from the District's partners, Denver Water and The Metro Wastewater Reclamation District. Water rates were increased by 3.75% and sewer rates were increased by 3.75% to reflect the increased cost to provide water and sewer service.

Overview of the Financial Statements

The financial statements of the District report information about the District using accounting methods similar to those used by private sector companies. These statements offer short and long-term financial information about its activities.

Statement of Net Position

The Statement of Net Position provides information about the nature and amounts of investments in resources (assets) and obligations to District creditors (liabilities). It also provides the basis for computing the rate of return, evaluating the capital structure of the District and assessing the liquidity and financial flexibility of the District.

Statement of Revenues, Expenses, and Changes in Net Position

This statement measures the results of the District's operations over the past year and may be used to determine profitability, credit worthiness, and whether the District has successfully recovered all its costs through its user fees, taxes and other charges.

Statement of Cash Flows

The final required financial statement is the Statement of Cash Flows. The primary purpose of this statement is to provide information about the District's cash receipts and payments during the reporting period. This statement reports cash receipts, cash payments, and net changes in cash resulting from operations, non-capital financing, capital and related financing, and investing activities. It also provides answers to such questions as where did the cash come from, how cash was used, and what was the change in cash balance during the reporting period.

Financial Analysis of the District

One of the most important questions asked about the District's finances is "Is the District as a whole better off or worse off as a result of this year's activities?" The Statement of Net Position and the Statement of Revenues, Expenses, and Changes in Net Position report information about the District's activities in a way that can help answer that question. These two statements report the net position of the District and the related change in these assets. The District's net position, (the difference between assets and liabilities), is one way to measure financial health or financial position. Over time increases in the District's net position are one indicator that the District's financial health is improving. However, one will need to consider other non-financial factors such as changes in economic conditions, population growth, or changed governmental legislation.

The District's net position increased by \$2,749,658 or 5.4%, due primarily to increases in investments.

The Statement of Net Position shows the changes in the financial position and, the Statement of Revenues, Expenses, and Changes in Net Position provides answers as to the nature and source of these changes. As can be seen in the following chart, during the year, the District's operating and non-operating revenues increased by \$938,171, or 6.6%, compared to last year due mainly to an increase of \$1,082,510 in water sales. Total expenses increased by \$680,942 which was mainly due to an increase in water purchases.

Budgetary Highlights

As required by State Law, the District adopts a budget and appropriates funds by December 16 for the following fiscal year. If an amendment is necessary, the Board will approve a supplemental appropriation at a public hearing and file it with the State of Colorado. In 2020, no supplemental appropriation was requested. Budget to actual comparative statements are included as Supplemental Information in the audited financial statements.

Capital Assets and Debt Administration

At the end of 2020, the District had invested \$22,267,024 in net property, plant and equipment representing an increase of 0.3% over prior year. The table below summarizes the changes in property, plant and equipment.

System increases are due to contributions from small development projects as well as the sewer and water rehabilitation project. In 2020 the District spent \$427,977 on constructed sewer and water systems for the West Mexico, West Jewell and Ohio Line projects.

Long-Term Debt

The District continues to have zero long-term debt.

ECONOMIC FACTORS AND 2020 SERVICE RATES

The District's Board of Directors and management considered many factors when setting the 2020 budget, including user fees and charges and replacement of service lines. As in past years, the District conducted an analysis of the impact of Denver Water's and Metro Wastewater's 2020 rate adjustments. A private consulting firm was engaged to calculate water and sewer rates based on its cost of service. Operating revenues were budgeted to increase by approximately 6.2% in 2020. In 2020, charges paid to Denver Water were budgeted to increase by 3.6%. This increase was driven largely by the increased cost of treated water. Fees paid to Metro Wastewater were budgeted to increase by 9.4% due to adjustments applied to volumes of wastewater processed in 2019 and 2020. The District's rates for service reflect the changes in revenues necessary to fund operations and capital projects. In most years, treated water and sewer processing are the two largest cost items in the District budget.

In the 2021 budget, Bancroft-Clover's net position is expected to decrease by \$1,753,028 from 2020. The budgeted decrease in net position is due to projected capital expenditures to replace portions of the treated water distribution system and sewer systems. Operating revenue is budgeted at \$13,405,335 and total expenses are budgeted at \$16,864,428.

Notes to Audited Financial Statements

December 31, 2020 and 2019

1. Definition of Reporting Entity

Bancroft-Clover Water & Sanitation District (District), a quasi-municipal corporation, was established on August 30, 1954 as a Title 32 Special District to provide water and sanitation services to southeastern Lakewood and portions of unincorporated Jefferson County, Colorado.

The District contracts with the City and County of Denver through its Board of Water Commissioners (Board) to purchase water to serve the District's customers. The District contracts with Metro Wastewater Reclamation District to provide its raw sewage processing.

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The accompanying financial statements have been prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles applicable to local governments. A summary of the District's significant accounting policies applied in the preparation of these financial statements follows:

Financial Reporting Entity

The District follows the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) accounting pronouncements which provide guidance for determining which governmental activities, organizations and functions should be included within the reporting entity. GASB pronouncements set forth the financial accountability of a governmental organization's elected governing body as the basic criterion for including a possible component governmental organization in a primary government's legal entity. Financial accountability includes, but is not limited to, appointment of a voting majority of the organization's governing body, ability to impose its will on the organization, a potential for the organization to provide specific financial benefits or burdens and fiscal dependency.

The District is not financially accountable for any other organization, nor is the District a component unit of any other primary governmental entity.

Fund Accounting

The Proprietary Fund is composed of water and sewer operations. It is used to account for operations that are financed and operated in a manner similar to a private business enterprise, where the intent of the governing body is that the costs and expenses, including depreciation, of providing goods or services to the general public on a continuing basis be financed or recovered primarily through user charges.

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Basis of Accounting

Enterprise fund accounting is utilized in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles. The financial statements are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting. Under this method revenues are recorded when earned and expenses are recorded at the time liabilities are incurred. Revenues received in advance are recorded as a liability for deferred revenue and the liability is removed when earned.

The District has elected to follow Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) pronouncements.

Property, Plant and Equipment

Capital assets which include land, buildings, water and sewer distribution and collection systems and furniture and equipment are reported by the District. Capital assets are defined by the District as assets with an initial, individual cost of more than \$5,000. Such assets are recorded at historical costs or estimated historical cost if purchased or constructed. Donated capital assets are recorded at estimated fair market value at the date of donation.

The cost of normal maintenance and repair that do not add to the value of the asset or materially extend the life of the asset are not capitalized. Improvements are capitalized and depreciated over the remaining useful lives of the related fixed assets, as applicable.

Depreciation expense has been computed using the straight-line method over the estimated economic useful lives:

Buildings	30 years
Water System	50 years
Sewer System	50 years
Furniture and Equipment	5 - 7 years

Interest costs incurred during the construction phase are capitalized as incurred.

Budget and Budgetary Accounting

In accordance with the State Budget Law, the District's Board of Directors holds public hearings in the fall each year to approve the budget and appropriate the funds for the ensuing year. The District's Board of Directors can modify the budget by line item within the total appropriation without notification. The total appropriation can only be modified upon completion of notification and publication requirements. The appropriation is at the total fund expenditures level and lapses at year end. Contributions of water and/or sewer lines are not reflected as a budgetary revenue or expenditure as they do not generate or require the use of funds available.

Operations

Operating revenues and expenses generally result from providing services and producing and delivering goods in connection with the District's ongoing operations. The District's principal operating revenues are charges to customers for sales and services. Operating expenses include the cost of sales and services, administrative expenses, and depreciation on capital assets. All revenues and expenses not meeting this definition are reported as non-operating revenues and expenses.

Tap Fees and Contributed Lines

Tap fees are recorded as revenue when received and contributed lines are recorded at year end.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

The District considers cash deposits and highly liquid investments with an intended maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

Investments

The District's policy is to account for investments at fair market value in accordance with GASB 31. Gains or losses on the sale of investments are recognized when the investment is sold.

Accounts Receivable

Accounts receivable are determined to be fully collectible as shown at December 31, 2020 and 2019; therefore, an allowance for doubtful accounts is not recorded in the financial statements.

Inventories

Inventory is stated at the lower of cost or net realizable value, using the first-in, first-out method, and consists of expendable supplies.

Compensated Absences

The District has a policy which allows employees to accumulate unused personal leave time. Personal leave time is accrued annually based on years of service. The maximum carryover limit is 352 hours. The District records a liability at year end for the amount of carryover.

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Net Position

Net position represents the difference between assets and liabilities. Net investment in capital assets consists of capital assets, net of accumulated depreciation, reduced by the outstanding balances of any borrowing used for the acquisition, construction or improvement of those assets. The net asset amount is also adjusted by any bond issuance deferral amounts. Net assets are reported as restricted when there are limitations imposed by creditors, grantors or laws or regulations of other governments. All other net positions are reported as unrestricted. For 2020, the District's Unrestricted Net Position totaled \$31,642,831 which was \$2,673,735, or 9.2% more than 2019.

The District applies restricted resources first when an expense is incurred for purposes for which both restricted and unrestricted net position are available.

Management Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Property Taxes

The District collects property tax from property owners within the district based on assessed values at December 31 of the prior year. Property owners are to pay these assessments either in full by April 30th or in halves by February 28/29th and June 15th. These taxes are collected by Jefferson County and remitted to the district on the 10th day of the month following collection. Tax revenues remitted to the District for 2020 totaled \$598,500.

Subsequent Events

The District has evaluated subsequent events through June 21, 2021, the date which the financial statements were available to be issued. During the period, the District was not aware of any material recognizable subsequent events.

3. Cash, Cash Equivalents and Investments

Cash Deposits

The Colorado Public Deposit Protection Act (PDPA) requires that all units of local government deposit cash in eligible public depositories. Eligibility is determined by state regulators. Amounts on deposit in excess of federal insurance levels must be collateralized. The eligible collateral is determined by the PDPA. PDPA allows the institution to create a single collateral pool for all public funds.

3. Cash, Cash Equivalents and Investments (continued)

The pool for all the uninsured public deposits as a group is to be maintained by another institution or held in trust. The market value of the collateral must be at least equal to the aggregate uninsured deposits. The institution is required to certify sufficient collateral to cover uninsured public funds to state agencies on a regular basis.

The State Regulatory Commissions for banks and financial institutions are required by statute to monitor the naming of eligible depositories and reporting of the uninsured deposits and assets maintained in collateral pools.

For deposits, custodial credit risk is the risk that in the event of a bank failure, the District's deposits may not be returned. The District does not have a deposit policy for custodial credit risk. Deposits that are exposed to custodial credit risk are collateralized with securities held by the pledging financial institution through PDPA.

The District's cash deposits are categorized to give an indication of the level of risk assumed by the District at year-end. Category 1 includes deposits not covered by depository insurance and uncollateralized. Category 2 includes deposits not covered by depository insurance, but are collateralized with securities held by the pledging financial institution. Category 3 includes deposits not covered by depository insurance, but are collateralized with securities held by the pledging financial institution's trust department or agent but not in the depositor-government's name. The District had no Category 3 deposits in 2020 and 2019, respectively.

Investments

Colorado statutes specify investment instruments meeting defined rating and risk criteria in which local governments may invest, which include:

- obligations of the United States and certain U.S. government agency securities,
- general obligation and revenue bonds of U.S. local government entities, bankers' acceptances of certain banks,
- commercial paper,
- written repurchase agreements collateralized by certain authorized securities,
- certain money market funds,
- guaranteed investment contracts, and
- local government investment pools.

Credit Risk - The District's investments are recorded at fair value based on quoted market prices. District investments are securities that are held by the entity or its agent in the District's name, and are insured or registered by the District or its agent. The District does not have a formal investment policy that limits investment maturities as a means of managing its exposure to fair value losses arising from increasing interest rates, or would further limit its investment choices. The District places no limit on the amount the District may invest in any one issuer.

As of December 31, 2020 and 2019, the District's investments in U.S. Treasuries and U.S. instrumentalities were rated AA+ by Standard and Poor's and Aaa by Moody's Investors Service.

Local Government Investment Pools – As of December 31, 2020 the District had \$10,643,890 invested in the Colorado Local Government Liquid Asset Trust (Colotrust), an investment vehicle established for local government entities in Colorado to pool surplus funds and is registered with the State Securities Commissioner. Colotrust is rated AAAM by Standard and Poor's. Colotrust operates similarly to a money market fund and each share is equal in value to \$1.00. Colotrust offers shares in two portfolios, Colotrust Prime and Colotrust Plus+. The District funds are only invested in Colotrust Plus+. The portfolio may invest in U.S. Treasury securities and repurchase agreements collateralized by U.S. Treasury securities. A designated custodial bank serves as custodian for Colotrust's portfolios pursuant to a custodian agreement.

Substantially all securities owned by Colotrust are held by the Federal Reserve Bank in the account maintained for the custodial banks. The custodian acts as safekeeping agent for Colotrust investment portfolios and provides services as the depository in connection with direct investments and withdrawals. The custodian's internal records segregate investments owned by Colotrust.

Colotrust records its investments at fair value and the District records its investments in Colotrust using the net asset value method.

The District does not have a policy that addresses limitations on the amount that can be invested in any one issuer. As of December 31, 2020, U.S. Treasury Securities of \$15,850,198 comprise 60% of the District's investment portfolio.

Fair Value Measurement and Application – The District categorizes its fair value measurements within the fair value hierarchy established by generally accepted accounting principles. The hierarchy is based on the valuation inputs used to measure the fair value of the asset. Level 1 inputs are quoted prices in active markets for identical assets; Level 2 inputs are significant other observable inputs; and Level 3 inputs are significant unobservable inputs. All of the District's investments are measured at fair value using Level 1 inputs.

5. Net Position

The District has net position consisting of two components — net investment in capital assets and unrestricted net position.

Net investment in capital assets consists of capital assets, net of accumulated depreciation. The District had no outstanding debt as of December 31, 2020 and 2019. As of December 31, 2020 and 2019, the District had net investment in capital assets of \$22,267,024 and \$22,191,101, respectively.

Restricted assets include net position that are restricted for use either externally imposed by creditors, grantors, contributors, or laws and regulations of other governments or imposed by law through constitutional provisions or enabling legislation. The District had no restricted net position as of December 31, 2020 and 2019.

Unrestricted net position consists of net position that do not meet the definition of net investment in capital assets or restricted capital assets.

6. Contracts and Commitments

Water Service Contract

The District is provided water under a master meter distributor's contract with the Board of Water Commissioners of the City and County of Denver (Denver Water Board). The contract provides, among other things, that Denver Water Board will serve the District until build out, may restrict the right of the District to issue new taps and requires compliance to their Operating Rules and Engineering Standards.

Sewage Treatment Contract

The District is a "special connector" by agreement with Metro Wastewater Reclamation District (Metro) which provides the treatment of sewage collected within the District. The standard service agreement with Metro provides for annual charges to be assessed by formula against the District on an estimated basis. Corrections to the estimated charge for metered flows and actual costs are billed and payable or credited during the two succeeding years. Metro assesses tap fees against the District for connections to the system. The composition of the charges from the 2020 and 2019 estimates are as follows:

7. Risk Management

The District is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts, thefts of, damage to, or destruction of assets; errors or omissions; injuries to employees; or acts of God. The District pays annual premiums for liability, property, public officials' liability and workers compensation coverage. Settled claims have not exceeded this coverage in any of the past three fiscal years.

8. Employee Retirement Plan

The District participates in the Colorado County Officials and Employees Retirement Association Defined Contribution Plan (CCOERA). In a defined contribution plan, benefits depend solely on amounts contributed to the plan plus investment earnings. Employees become participants after one full month of employment. Under this plan, six percent of the employees' compensation is withheld and remitted to the CCOERA along with a matching payment of six percent from the District.

8. Employee Retirement Plan (continued)

The District's contributions, plus earnings, become vested, based on years of service, at a rate of 50% after three years; 75% after four years; and 100% after 5 years. Unvested contributions for employees who leave employment before five years of participation are used to reduce the District's current period contribution requirement. Plan provisions and contributions requirements are established and may be amended by CCOERA and would have to be approved by the District's Board of Directors. There is no liability for benefits under the plan beyond the District's matching payments.

Both the District and the participating employees made the required six percent contributions for 2020 and 2019. Some employees elect to contribute more than the required six percent.

The District has a deferred compensation plan created in accordance with the Internal Revenue Code Section 457. This plan is also administered by CCOERA. Participation in the plan is optional for all employees. The plan allows the employees to defer a portion of their salary until future years.

*There were no forfeitures used in 2020. Forfeitures are funds paid into an employees retirement plan with the assumption of that employee fully vesting. If the employee separates from the company prior to fully vesting, excess funds are held by plan administrator as forfeitures and can be used as a credit by the company in lieu of future contributions.

9. Intergovernmental Agreements

Technical Advisory Committee Agreement

Effective July 31, 2003, the District became a participant of the Technical Advisory Committee (TAC). The committee was formed to promote cooperative strategies to respond to drought and research water rates and fees in the Denver area. The TAC consists of a designated representative from each participant. The participant's share of the costs is based on the participant's percentage share of the total number of accounts.

A year-end reconciliation of actual costs to budgeted costs is calculated and amounts are refunded or billed to participants or credited to the participant's payment due for the subsequent year. The percentage share for each participant is adjusted as of December 31 or each year based on the total number of participants. The agreement automatically renews for each participant from calendar year to year. For the year ended December 31, 2019, the District did not pay any monies under this agreement. Member fees were reinstated in 2020 and the District paid \$2,690.

Alameda Water and Sanitation District Agreement

The District has a formal agreement with Alameda Water and Sanitation District (Alameda) dated August 15, 2011 for the shared use of the Sanderson Gulch sewer line with Alameda to reimburse a portion of the costs subsequent to each year end. Based on the agreement, Alameda is to reimburse the District for the average flow per Equivalent Residential Unit (EQR) for properties flowing into the Sanderson Gulch Metering Facility. The cost per EQR is based on the annual charge for service charged by Metro Wastewater Reclamation District as well as any costs of maintenance of the Bancroft-Clover facilities.

Green Mountain Water and Sanitation District

The District has a formal agreement with Green Mountain Water and Sanitation District (Green Mountain) for the shared use of Weir Gulch sewer line. Based on the agreement, the District is to reimburse Green Mountain for a certain percentage of the Weir Gulch Metering Facility costs charged by Metro Wastewater Reclamation District.

Bear Creek Water and Sanitation District

The District has a formal agreement dated November 3, 1969 with Bear Creek Water and Sanitation District (Bear Creek) for a connection to the District's system. Under the agreement, Bear Creek installed approximately 1,870 feet of 12-inch pipe and a water meter to feed up to 250 single family residential taps in their district. Bear Creek maintains the water meter and vault, and the District maintains the 12-inch pipe line. Water supplied to Bear Creek through this connection is credited to the District each billing cycle.

The District also has a formal agreement with Bear Creek Water and Sanitation District dated April 11, 2011 for a shared use of the Bear Creek sewer line, with Bear Creek to reimburse a portion of the costs subsequent to each year-end. Based on the agreement, the District is to reimburse Bear Creek for a pro-rated share of the Bear Creek Metering Facility costs charged by Metro Wastewater Reclamation District.

South Sheridan Water and Sanitation District

The District has a formal agreement with the South Sheridan Water and Sanitation District (South Sheridan) dated February 8, 2012 that sets forth the terms for the District and South Sheridan to provide sanitary sewer services to each other. It was determined that there are certain properties within the District's boundaries being serviced by South Sheridan and likewise, certain properties within South Sheridan's boundaries being serviced by the District. Per the agreement, each district will pay the other district the respective costs for services provided to these properties.

10. Tax, Spending and Debt Limitations

Article X, Section 20 of the Colorado Constitution, commonly known as the Taxpayer's Bill of Rights (TABOR) contains tax, spending, revenue and debt limitations which apply to the State of Colorado and all local governments.

Enterprises, defined as government-owned businesses authorized to issue revenue bonds and receiving less than 10% of annual revenue in grants from all state and local governments combined, are excluded from the provisions of TABOR. The District's management believes a significant portion of its operations qualifies for the exclusion. However, TABOR still applies to the assessment of the District's mill levy.

Spending and revenue limits are determined based on the prior year's Fiscal Year Spending adjusted for allowable increases based upon inflation and local growth. Fiscal Year Spending is generally defined as expenditures plus reserve increases with certain exceptions. Revenue in excess of the Fiscal Year spending limit must be refunded unless the voters approve retention of such revenue.

The District's management believes it is in compliance with the provisions of TABOR. However, TABOR is complex and subject to interpretation. Many of the provisions, including the interpretation of how to calculate Fiscal Year Spending limits and qualification as an Enterprise will require judicial interpretation.

11. Risks and Uncertainties

On March 11, 2020, the World Health Organization declared the outbreak of coronavirus (COVID-19) a pandemic. In response, many state and local governments instituted restrictions that substantially limited the operations of non-essential businesses and the activities of individuals. While some of these restrictions have been eased, there is still significant uncertainty around the extent and duration of those still in place and the possibility for restrictions to be increased again in the future. The extent to which the pandemic will impact the District's financial results in the coming periods depends on future developments, including where there are additional outbreaks of COVID-19 and the actions taken to contain or address the virus. However, the District believes it will be able to continue operations under current governmental guidelines while mitigating the impact as much as possible to minimize losses.
