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Independent Auditor's Report

Honorable Mayor and the Members of the Board of Trustees
Town of Milliken, Colorado

Opinions

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities, the business-type activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Town of Milliken (the "Town") as of and for the year ended December 31, 2021 and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the Town's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities, the business-type activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Town of Milliken, as of December 31, 2021 and the respective changes in financial position and, where applicable, cash flows thereof for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Basis for Opinions

We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of Town of Milliken and to meet our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audits. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinions.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Town's ability to continue as a going concern for twelve months beyond the financial statement date, including any currently known information that may raise substantial doubt shortly thereafter.

Auditor's Responsibility for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinions. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards (GAAS), will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Misstatements are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements.

In performing an audit in accordance with GAAS, we:

- Exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit.
- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, and design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks. Such procedures include examining, on a test basis, evidence regarding the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Town of Milliken's internal control. Accordingly, no such opinion is expressed.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluate the overall presentation of the financial statements.
- Conclude whether, in our judgment, there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Town of Milliken's ability to continue as a going concern for a reasonable period of time.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal control related matters that we identified during the audit.

Required Supplementary Information

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the management's discussion and analysis and required supplementary information, as listed in the table of contents, be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board, who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

Other Supplementary Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the Town of Milliken's basic financial statements. The combining and individual nonmajor fund financial statements, budgetary comparison schedules, Local Highway Finance Report are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements. The information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the combining and individual nonmajor fund financial statements, budgetary comparison schedules and Local Highway Finance are fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the financial statements as a whole.

Year Ended December 31, 2021**

As Management of the Town of Milliken (the "Town"), we are pleased to present the basic financial statements of the Town's financial activities for the year ended December 31, 2021. We also offer this narrative and analysis to help guide the reader in understanding the Town's financial position, the fiscal reflection of the decisions adopted by the Board of Trustees, and the administration and execution of those decisions by Town staff. We encourage readers to review and consider the information presented here in conjunction with additional information provided in the Financial Statements.

FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS

The Town ended the year in a strong financial position, even with the extended lock-down due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The Town saw sales tax revenues come in above budget for the second year in a row as home deliveries continued. Staff worked to keep expenditures in check and those came in below budget. Because of these items, the Town is well-prepared to fund the operations and capital projects slated for 2022.

The general operations of the Town are primarily funded by property and sales and use tax revenues. The water and sewer utilities as well as the trash collection and stormwater activities are funded by service charges to customers designed to recover long-term costs of operations and continue to provide quality services to Town residents.

- The assets and deferred outflows of resources of the Town exceeded its liabilities and deferred inflows of resources (Net Position) by \$73,480,740 at the close of 2021. Of this amount, \$15,004,713 (20%) is unrestricted and may be used to meet the Town's ongoing obligations to citizens and creditors.
- The Town's Net Position increased by \$4,889,144 in 2021. This increase is significantly attributable to the increase in sales taxes as well as an continued building activity which led to higher Building Permit revenues and Impact Fees in the Governmental Activities and the Capital Investment Fees in the Water, Sewer, and Stormwater Funds (Business-Type Activities).
- Property Tax revenues increased in accordance with revenue limits.
- At December 31, 2021, the combined fund balance for the Town's Governmental Funds was \$10,681,304, an increase of \$2,610,427 from 2020. Nearly 39.7%, \$4,241,030 of this balance, is unassigned and available for spending at the Town's discretion.
- General Fund expenditures decreased approximately 21% when compared to 2020, mostly due to capital expenditures in 2020. General Fund revenue increased about 9% compared to 2020. The net effect to the fund balance of the Town's General Fund was an increase of \$1,403,529.

USING THIS ANNUAL REPORT

The basic financial statements of the Town are comprised of three components: (1) Government-Wide Financial Statements, (2) Fund Financial Statements, and (3) Notes to the Financial Statements. Below is a brief description of the nature and purpose of each component.

Government-Wide Financial Statements

The Government-Wide Financial Statements are designed to provide readers with a broad overview of the Town's finances in a manner similar to a private-sector business. These statements distinguish functions of the Town that are principally supported by taxes and intergovernmental revenues (*Governmental Activities*) from other functions that are intended to recover all or a significant portion of their costs through user fees and charges (*Business-type Activities*). The Governmental Activities of the Town include Town Board, Municipal Court, Administration, Public Safety, Community Development, Public Works, Facilities Maintenance, Parks and Open Space, and Community Festivals. The Business-type Activities of the Town include Water, Sewer, Trash and Stormwater.

The ***Statement of Net Position*** presents information on all of the Town's assets, deferred outflows of resources, liabilities, and deferred inflows of resources, with the difference between these categories being reported as Net Position. Over time, the increases or decreases in Net Position may serve as a useful indicator of whether the financial position of the Town is improving or deteriorating.

The ***Statement of Activities*** presents information showing how the Town's Net Position changed during the year. All changes in Net Position are reported as soon as the underlying event giving rise to the change occurs, *regardless of the timing of related cash flows*. Thus, revenues and expenses for some items reported in this statement will result in cash flows in future periods (e.g. uncollected taxes and earned but unused personal time).

Fund Financial Statements

A *fund* is a grouping of related accounts that is used to maintain control over resources that have been segregated for specific activities or objectives. Some funds are required to be established by state law and bond covenants; however, the Town Board of Trustees establishes other funds to help control and manage money for particular purposes. All of the Town's funds can be divided into two categories: Governmental Funds and Proprietary Funds.

Governmental Funds - *Governmental Funds* are used to account for essentially the same functions reported as *Governmental Activities* in the Government-Wide Financial Statements. However, unlike the Government-Wide Financial Statements, Governmental Fund financial statements focus on *short-term inflows and outflows of spendable resources*, as well as on *balances of spendable resources* available at the end of the fiscal year. Such information may be useful in evaluating a government's short-term financing requirements. The accounting method used for these funds is called *modified accrual* accounting.

Because the focus of Governmental Funds is narrower than that of the Government-Wide Financial Statements, it is useful to compare the information presented for Governmental Activities in the *Governmental Funds* with similar information presented for *Governmental Activities* in the Government-Wide Financial Statements. By doing so, readers may better understand the long-term impact of the government's short-term financing decisions. Both the Governmental Fund Balance Sheet and the Governmental Fund Statement of Revenues, Expenditures and Changes in Fund Balances provide a reconciliation to facilitate this comparison between *Governmental Funds* and *Governmental Activities*.

The Town presents seven individual Governmental Funds. Information is presented separately in the Governmental Fund Balance Sheet and in the Governmental Fund Statement of Revenues, Expenditures and Changes in Fund Balances for the General Fund and other Major Funds. The Non-Major Funds are combined and reported as *Other Governmental Funds* into a single, aggregated presentation. Individual fund data for each of these Non-Major Governmental Funds is provided in the form of combining statements elsewhere in this report.

Proprietary Funds - The Town maintains one type of Proprietary Fund - an *Enterprise Fund* - to account for its Water, Sewer, Trash and Stormwater Funds. *Enterprise Funds* are used to report the same functions presented as *Business-Type Activities* in the Government-Wide Financial Statements. These funds are considered to be Major Funds of the Town.

Notes to Financial Statements

The Notes provide additional information that is essential to a full understanding of the data provided in the financial statements and offer helpful insights into the transactions that are reflected on all levels of these Financial Statements.

FINANCIAL ANALYSIS OF THE TOWN AS A WHOLE

As noted previously, Net Position may serve as a useful indicator of the Town's financial position over time. For the year ending December 31, 2021, the Town's combined assets and deferred outflows of resources exceeded liabilities and deferred inflows of resources by approximately \$73.5 million, compared to \$68.6 million in 2020.

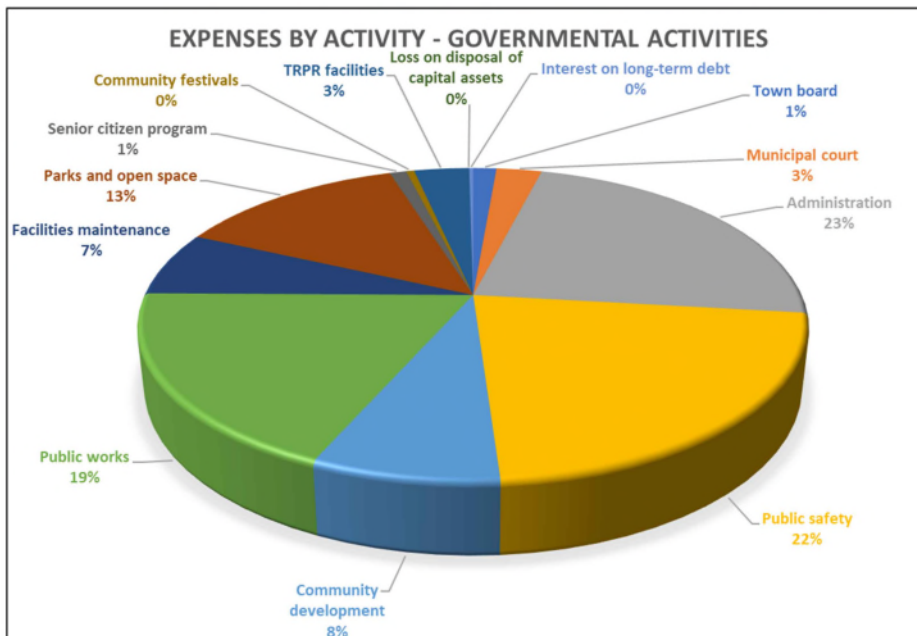
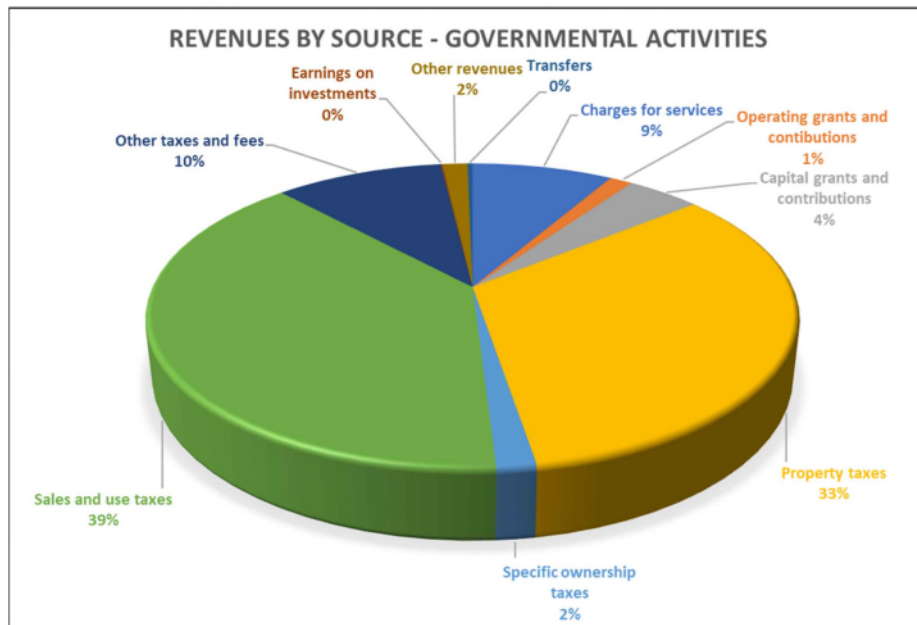

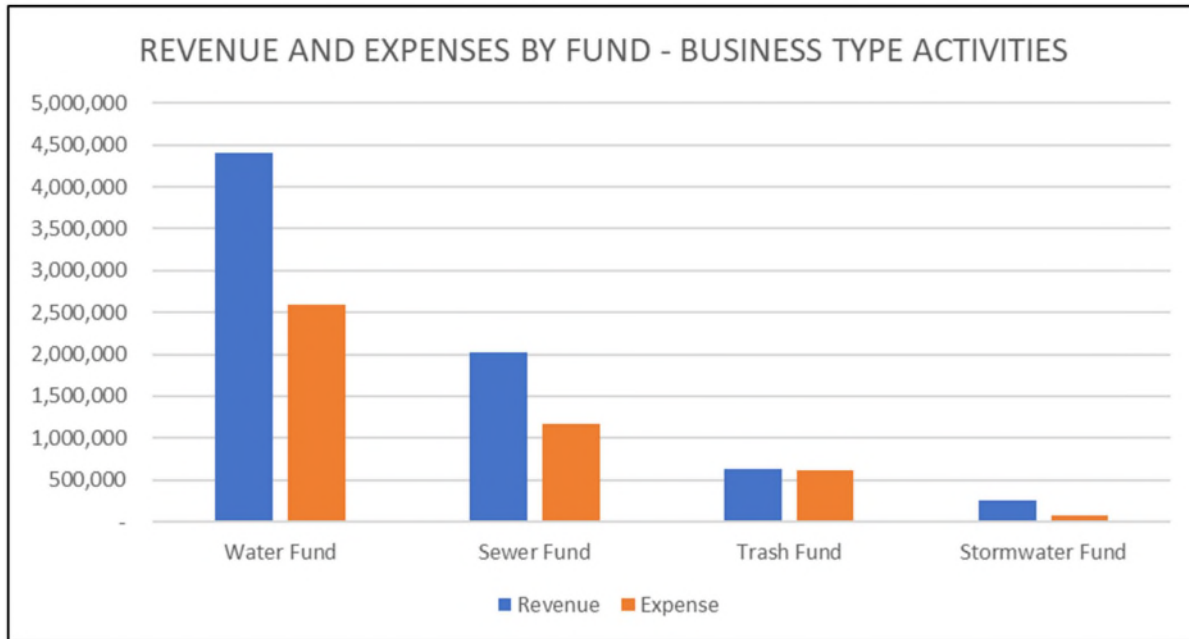
FINANCIAL ANALYSIS OF THE TOWN'S FUNDS

Governmental Activities. The focus of the Town's Governmental Funds is to provide information on near-term inflows, outflows, and balances of spendable resources. Such information is useful in assessing the Town's financing requirements and in providing accountability for General Governmental Activities. The charts below illustrate the major sources of revenues, that funded the Town's General Governmental Activities for 2021 and where those funds were directed in meeting the needs of the Town. For example, they help visualize the significant contribution made by Property Taxes (33%) and Sales and Use Taxes (39%) to the Town's financial outlook. They also help demonstrate how the Town allocates these resources in providing a balanced menu of services to its citizens while carrying a relatively small amount of debt.

Business-Type Activities. The Net Position in the Town's Business-Type Activities increased by \$2,843,246 in 2021. This surplus is primarily the result of increased construction activity, which brought in additional tap and plant investment fees. The Town is committed to maintaining financially sustainable water, sewer, trash and stormwater services and providing adequate funding for the capital improvements necessary to maintain quality service to its citizens. These recent surpluses will significantly assist the Town in funding important capital improvements.



General Fund Budgetary Highlights

The Town's General Fund earned revenues of \$6,730,878, which was \$815,111 more than the Town's amended Budget. The primary sources of revenues were property taxes (\$2,530,990), sales and use taxes (\$2,624,503) and building permits (\$513,704). In addition to revenues coming in higher than budgeted, the Town also was well within the amount budgeted for appropriated expenditures. The net result was an increase to the fund balance of \$1,403,529. The amount in the ending fund balance for 2021, \$4,492,235, is well in excess of the minimum target reserve of approximately \$1,065,470 (20% of annual expenditures).

Capital Assets

At the end of the year, the Town's capital assets held, less accumulated depreciation, amounted to \$50,616,760. Assets consist of land, infrastructure, utility distribution systems, property and equipment. Refer to Note 7 in the Notes to Financial Statements for more information.

Long-Term Debt

In 2018, the Town issued Water Revenue Refunding and Improvement Bonds in the amount of \$5,285,000 for the purposes of refunding the Town's outstanding notes payable and investing in capital assets. The Town also issued \$1,480,000 in general obligation refunding bonds to take advantage of lower interest rates. In 2018, the Town also paid off sales and use tax revenue bonds in the amount of \$565,000.

At the end of 2021, long-term debt balances in governmental activities was \$1,262,691, a decrease of \$205,963 from 2020. Long-term debt balances in business-type activities decreased \$556,969 as compared to 2020, ending the year with \$5,756,852.

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The financial statements of the Town of Milliken, Colorado (the "Town") have been prepared in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted ("GAAP") in the United States of America as applied to governmental units. The Governmental Accounting Standards Board ("GASB") is the accepted standard-setting body for establishing governmental accounting and financial reporting principles. The more significant of the Town's accounting policies are described below.

Reporting Entity

The Town was founded September 17, 1910. The Town is governed by a Mayor and a six-member Board of Trustees ("Board") elected by the residents. The Town provides the following services: public safety (police); streets; parks and open space; planning and zoning; water, sewer and refuse; and general administrative services.

As defined by GAAP established by the GASB, the financial reporting entity consists of the primary government, as well as component units, which are legally separate organizations for which elected officials of the primary government are financially accountable. Financial accountability is defined as:

- 1) Appointment of a voting majority of the component unit's governing board, and either, a) the ability to impose its will by the primary government, or b) there is a potential for the component unit to provide specific financial benefits to, or impose specific financial burdens on, the primary government; or
- 2) Fiscal dependency on the primary government and there is a potential for the organization to provide specific benefits to, or impose specific financial burdens on, the primary government regardless of whether the organization has (1) a separately elected governing board, (2) a governing board appointed by a higher level of government or (3) a jointly appointed board.

Component Unit:

The accompanying financial statements present the Town and its discretely presented component unit, an entity for which the Town is financially accountable. The discretely presented component unit is reported in a separate column in the government-wide financial statements to emphasize that it is legally separate from the Town.

The Milliken Housing Authority (the "Authority") has been included as a discretely presented component unit in the accompanying financial statements. The Authority does not have the power to levy taxes, determine its own aggregate budget or issue bonded debt, without the approval of the Town. Separate financial statements are not issued. Financial information regarding the Authority can be obtained from the Town's administrative offices at 1101 Broad Street (PO Box 290), Milliken, Colorado 80543.

Government-wide and Fund Financial Statements

The government-wide financial statements (i.e., the statement of net position and the statement of activities) report information on the activities of the Town and the component unit. For the most part, the effect of interfund activity has been removed from these statements. Governmental activities, which normally are supported by taxes, charges for services and intergovernmental revenues, are reported separately from business-type activities, which rely to a significant extent on user charges for support. Likewise, the primary government is reported separately from the legally separate component unit for which the primary government is financially accountable.

The statement of activities demonstrates the degree to which the direct expenses of a given function or activity are offset by program revenues. Direct expenses are those that are clearly identifiable with a specific function or activity. Program revenues include: 1) charges to customers or applicants who purchase, use, or directly benefit from goods, services, or privileges provided by a given function or activity, and 2) grants and contributions that are restricted to meeting the operational or capital requirements of a particular function or activity. Taxes and other items not properly included among program revenues are reported instead as general revenues.

Fund Financial Statements - Fund financial statements report detailed information about the Town. The focus of governmental and enterprise fund financial statements is on major funds rather than reporting funds by type. Each major fund is presented in a separate column. Nonmajor funds are aggregated and presented in a single column.

Measurement Focus, Basis of Accounting, and Financial Statement Presentation

The government-wide financial statements are reported using the economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting, as are the proprietary fund and fiduciary fund financial statements. Revenues are recognized when earned and expenses are recognized when a liability is incurred, regardless of the timing of related cash flows. Property taxes are recognized as revenues in the year for which they are levied. Grants and similar items are recognized as revenue as soon as all eligibility requirements imposed by the provider have been met.

As a general rule, the effect of interfund activity has been eliminated from the government-wide financial statements. Exceptions to this general rule are charges between the enterprise funds and various other functions of the government. Elimination of these charges would distort the direct costs and program revenues reported for the various functions concerned.

Amounts reported as program revenues include: 1) charges to customers or applicants for goods, services, or privileges provided, 2) operating grants and contributions, and 3) capital grants and contributions, including special assessments. Internally dedicated resources are reported as general revenues, rather than as program revenues. Likewise, general revenues include all taxes.

Governmental fund financial statements are reported using the current financial resources measurement focus and the modified accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recognized as soon as they are both measurable and available. Revenues are considered to be available when they are collectible within the current period or soon enough thereafter to pay liabilities of the current period. For this purpose, the Town considers revenues to be available if they are collected within 180 days of the end of the current fiscal period. Expenditures generally are recorded when a liability is incurred, as under accrual accounting.

However, debt service expenditures, as well as expenditures related to compensated absences, and claims and judgments are recorded only when payment is due.

Sales taxes, intergovernmental grants, and earnings on investments associated with the current fiscal period are all considered to be susceptible to accrual and so have been recognized as revenues of the current fiscal period. All other revenue items are considered measurable and available only when cash is received by the Town.

In accordance with GASB Statement No. 33, Accounting and Financial Reporting for Nonexchange Transactions, the corresponding assets (receivables) in non-exchange transactions are recognized in the period in which the underlying exchange occurs, when an enforceable legal claim has arisen, when all eligibility requirements have been met, or when resources are received, depending on the revenue source.

Governmental funds are used to account for all or most of a government's general activities, including the collection and disbursement of earmarked funds (special revenue funds) and the capital projects fund. The following are the Town's major and nonmajor governmental funds:

General Fund - The General Fund (a major fund) is the Town's general operating fund and is used to account for all financial transactions, except those required to be accounted for in another fund. Major revenue sources include local property taxes, sales tax, franchise tax and other intergovernmental revenues. Expenditures include all costs associated with the daily operation of general government, public safety, public works, parks and open space and community development.

Grants Fund - The Grants Fund (a major fund) accounts for the revenues from earmarked revenue sources from federal, state, and local grants not allocated to other funds which finance specific expenditures as required by law or administrative action.

Impact Fees Fund - The Impact Fees Fund (a major fund) accounts for revenues from specific development fees which are used to fund projects throughout the Town.

The other governmental funds (nonmajor funds) are Special Revenue Funds (Conservation Trust and Streets) and are established to account for revenues derived from recreation fees and specific taxes or other earmarked revenue sources, which finance specific activities as required by law or administrative action; the Capital Projects Fund, which accounts for revenue sources and the corresponding expenditures for major capital projects; and the Debt Service Fund which accounts for the accumulation of resources for the payment of principal and interest on long-term revenue and general obligation debts of the governmental funds not being financed by proprietary funds.

Proprietary funds focus on the determination of the changes in net position, financial position and cash flows and are classified as enterprise funds. Enterprise funds may be used to account for any activity for which a fee is charged to external users for goods or services. The Town has four major enterprise funds, which are used to account for the activities of the Water, Sewer, Trash and Stormwater Funds.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, demand deposits and participation in local government investment pools. Cash balances from different funds are combined and invested to the extent possible in local government investment pools.

To improve cash management, cash received by the Town is pooled and invested. Monies for all funds are maintained in this pool. Individual fund integrity is maintained through the Town's records. Interest in the pool is presented as "Equity in pooled cash and cash equivalents" on the financial statements. Investments of the Town's cash management pool and investments with an original maturity of three months or less at the time they are purchased by the Town are presented on the financial statements as cash equivalents. Investments with an initial maturity of more than three months that were not purchased from the pool are reported as investments.

Receivables

Accounts receivables are reported at their gross value and, when appropriate, are reduced by the estimated portion that is expected to be uncollectible. No amounts were determined to be uncollectible at December 31, 2021.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with GAAP requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets, deferred outflows of resources, liabilities, and deferred inflows of resources, the disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements, and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Property Taxes

Property taxes for the current year are levied and attached as a lien on property the following January 1. They are payable in full by April 30 or in two equal installments due on the last day of February and June 15. Property taxes levied in the current year and collected in the following year are reported as a receivable at December 31. However, since the taxes are not available to pay current liabilities, the receivable is recorded as a deferred inflow of resources.

Prepaid Items

Certain payments to vendors reflect costs applicable to future accounting periods and are recorded as prepaid items in both government-wide and fund financial statements. Because these assets do not represent current financial resources, there is a corresponding nonspendable fund balance in the governmental funds.

Capital Assets

Capital assets, which include land, buildings, equipment, vehicles, and machinery, are reported in the applicable governmental or business-type activities columns in the government-wide financial statements and in the enterprise fund financial statements. Capital assets are defined by the Town as assets with an initial, individual cost of more than \$5,000 and an estimated useful life exceeding one year. Such assets are recorded at historical cost or estimated historical cost if purchased or constructed. Donated capital assets are recorded at the acquisition value at the date of donation. The costs of normal maintenance and repairs that do not add to the value of the asset or materially extend assets lives are not capitalized.

Depreciation on all assets is provided on the straight-line basis over the following estimated useful lives:

Collection and distribution systems	30 – 50 years
Buildings & other improvements	30 – 50 years
Infrastructure	10 – 50 years
Vehicles, machinery & equipment	5 – 30 years

Public domain assets consisting of roads, bridges, curbs and gutters, streets and sidewalks, drainage systems and lighting systems are examples of infrastructure assets. Infrastructure assets are distinguished from other capitalized assets since their useful life often extends beyond most other capital assets and are stationary in nature. General infrastructure assets are those associated with or arising from governmental activities.

Accrued Compensated Absences Payable

In accordance with the provisions of the GASB Statement No. 16, *Accounting for Compensated Absences*, vested or accumulated vacation pay that is expected to be liquidated with expendable available financial resources is reported as an expenditure and a fund liability of the governmental fund that will pay it. Amounts of vested or accumulated vacation pay that are not expected to be liquidated with expendable available financial resources are reported on the government-wide financial statements. Compensated absences are reported in governmental funds only if they have matured.

Accrued Liabilities and Long-Term Obligations

All accounts payable, accrued liabilities and long-term obligations are reported in the government-wide financial statements, and all accounts payable, accrued liabilities and long-term obligations payable from proprietary funds are reported on the proprietary fund financial statements.

In general, accounts payable and accrued liabilities that will be paid from governmental funds are reported on the governmental fund financial statements if they will be liquidated with current resources. In general, payments made within sixty days after year-end are considered to have been made with current available financial resources. Bonds and other long-term obligations that will be paid from governmental funds are not recognized as a liability in the fund financial statements until due.

Bond Premiums, Discounts and Issuance Costs

In the governmental fund statements, bond premiums, discounts, and issuance costs are recognized as current period revenues and/or expenditures. Bond premiums and discounts in the government-wide and proprietary fund statements are deferred and amortized over the life of the bonds using the straight line method, which approximates the effective-interest method. Issuance costs are expensed as incurred, while bond premiums and discounts are netted against the related debt.

Fund Balance and Net Position

In the government-wide and proprietary fund financial statements, net position is classified in the following categories:

Net Investment in Capital Assets - This category groups all capital assets, including infrastructure, into one component of net position. Accumulated depreciation and the outstanding balances of debt that are attributable to the acquisition, construction or improvement of these assets reduce this category.

Restricted Net Position - This category presents external restrictions imposed by creditors, grantors, contributors or laws or regulations of other governments and restrictions imposed by law through constitutional provisions or enabling legislation.

Unrestricted Net Position - This category represents the net position of the Town, which is not restricted for any project or other purpose. A deficit will require future funding.

In the fund financial statements, fund balances of governmental funds are classified in separate categories. The categories, and their general meanings, are as follows:

Nonspendable - amounts that cannot be spent either because they are not in spendable form or because they are legally or contractually required to be maintained intact.

Restricted - amounts that can be spent only for specific purposes because of constitutional provisions, charter requirements or enabling legislation or because of constraints that are externally imposed by creditors, grantors, or the laws or regulations of other governments.

Committed - amounts that can be used only for specific purposes determined by a formal action of the Town Board of Trustees. The Town Board of Trustees is the highest level of decision-making authority for the Town. Commitments may be established, modified, or rescinded only through resolutions approved by the Town Board of Trustees.

Assigned - amounts that do not meet the criteria to be classified as restricted or committed but that are intended to be used for specific purposes. The Town Board of Trustees has authority to assign amounts for specific purposes.

Unassigned - all other spendable amounts.

When an expenditure/ expense is incurred for purposes for which both restricted and unrestricted resources are available, it is the Town's policy to use restricted resources first. When an expenditure/expense is incurred for which committed, assigned, or unassigned fund balances are available, the Town considers amounts to have been spent first out of committed funds, then assigned funds, and finally, unassigned funds, as needed, unless the Town has provided otherwise in its commitment or assignment actions.

Deferred Outflows/Inflows of Resources

In addition to assets and liabilities, the Statement of Net Position will sometimes report separate sections for deferred outflows of resources and deferred inflows of resources. A deferred outflow of resources is a consumption of net position by the Town that is applicable to a future reporting period, and a deferred inflow of resources is an acquisition of net position by the Town that is applicable to a future reporting period. Both deferred outflows and inflows are reported in the Statement of Net Position but are not recognized in the financial statements as revenues and expenses until the period(s) to which they relate.

The Town has certain items that relate to pension plans that qualify for reporting as deferred outflows of resources and deferred inflows of resources. See Note 10 for more information. Deferred inflows of resources also consist of property taxes receivable. Property tax revenue is considered a deferred inflow of resources in the year the taxes are levied and measurable and are recognized as an inflow of resources in the period they are collected.

Pensions

The Town participates in the Non-Civil Employees' Pension Plan, a defined contribution plan. In addition, the Town participates in the Statewide Defined Benefit Plan ("SWDB") and the Statewide Hybrid Plan ("SWH"). Both are cost-sharing, multiple-employer defined benefit pension plan administered by the Fire and Police Pension Association of Colorado ("FPPA"). The SWH is comprised of two components: Defined Benefit and Money Purchase. The plan is administered by the Fire and Police Pension Association of Colorado ("FPPA").

For purposes of measuring the net pension liability, deferred outflows of resources and deferred inflows of resources related to pensions, and pension expense, information about the fiduciary net position of the SWDB and SWH plans and additions to/ deductions from the SWDB and SWH plans fiduciary net position have been determined on the same basis as they are reported by the FPPA. For this purpose, benefit payments (including refunds of employee contributions) are recognized when due and payable in accordance with the benefit terms. Investments are reported at fair value.

Interfund Transactions

Interfund receivables and payables are reported within individual funds. Transactions that represent reimbursements to a fund for expenditures or expenses initially made from it that are properly applicable to another fund are recorded as expenditures or expenses in the reimbursing fund and as reductions of expenditures or expenses in the fund that is reimbursed.

Interfund receivables and payables represent borrowing arrangements between governmental fund types that are current interfund loans and expected to be paid off within one year. Advances to and from other funds represent borrowing arrangements between nongovernmental fund types that are noncurrent. All other outstanding current balances between funds are reported as "Due to/from other funds."

Transfers include operating subsidies and authorized transfers from funds receiving revenues to funds that will expend those resources.

2. Reconciliation of Government-Wide and Fund Financial Statements

The governmental funds balance sheet includes a reconciliation between fund balances (total governmental funds) and net position of governmental activities, as reported in the government-wide statement of net position. Additionally, the governmental fund statement of revenues, expenditures and changes in fund balances includes a reconciliation between net change in fund balances and changes in net position of governmental activities, as reported in the government- wide statement of activities.

These reconciliations detail items that require adjustments to convert from the current resources measurement and modified accrual basis for government fund statements to the economic resources measurement and full accrual basis used for government-wide statements. However, certain items having no effect on measurement and basis of accounting were eliminated from the government fund statements during the consolidation of governmental activities.

Custodial Credit Risk- Deposits

This is the risk that, in the event of failure of a depository financial institution, a government will not be able to recover its deposits. The Town's deposit policy is in accordance with Colorado Revised Statutes ("CRS") 11-10.5-101, the Colorado Public Deposit Protection Act ("PDPA"), which governs the investment of public funds. PDPA requires that all units of local government deposit cash in eligible public depositories. Eligibility is determined by state regulations. Amounts on deposit exceeding federal insurance limits must be collateralized by eligible collateral as determined by the PDPA. The financial institution may create a single collateral pool for all public funds held. The pool is maintained by another institution, or held in trust, for the uninsured public deposits as a group. The market value of the collateral must be at least equal to 102% of the uninsured deposits. The institution's internal records identify collateral by depositor and as such, these deposits are considered uninsured but collateralized. The State Regulatory Commission for banks and financial services are required by statute to monitor the naming of eligible depositories and reporting of the uninsured deposits and assets maintained in the collateral pools. As of December 31, 2021, all the Town's deposits are either insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation ("FDIC") or collateralized by the PDPA program, and are therefore, not deemed to be exposed to custodial credit risk.

Local Government Investment Pool

At December 31, 2021, the Town had invested \$27,009,433 in the Colorado Secure Assets Fund ("CSAFE"), a local government investment pool established in Colorado to pool surplus funds for investment purposes. These funds operate similarly to a money market fund and each share is equal in value to \$1.00. The designated custodial bank of the pooled investment provides safekeeping and depository services in connection with the direct investment and withdrawal functions of the pooled investment. All securities owned by pooled investments are held by the Federal Reserve Bank in the account maintained for the custodial bank. Investments of pooled investments consist of U.S. Treasury bills, notes, and note strips and repurchase agreements collateralized by U.S. Treasury Notes.

The final maturity of all securities purchased by pooled investments may not exceed one year. CSAFE is rated AAAM by Standard and Poor's and the balance is measured at amortized cost. The investment policy of CSAFE does not include investing in derivatives. Separately issued financial statements may be obtained at www.csafe.org.

Custodial Credit Risk - Investments

For investments, custodial credit risk is the risk that in the event of a failure of a counter party, the Town would not be able to recover the value of its investments or collateral securities that are in the possession of an outside party. The Town does not have a specific policy for custodial credit risk of investments. As of December 31, 2021, the Town had no investments exposed to custodial credit risk.

Credit Risk - Investments

The Town is required to comply with State statutes which specify investments meeting defined rating, maturity, and concentration risk criteria in which local governments may invest, which include the following:

1. Repurchase agreements in obligations of the United States;
2. Obligations of the United States or obligations unconditionally guaranteed by the United States;
3. General obligation or revenue bonds of any state, District of Columbia, US territory or any of their subdivisions, with certain limitations;
4. Bankers acceptance issued by a state or national bank, with certain limitations;
5. Commercial paper, with certain limitations;
6. Any obligation, certificate of participation or lease/purchase of the investing public entity;
7. Money market funds, with certain limitations, which invest in the types of securities listed above;
8. Guaranteed investment contracts, with other certain limitations;
9. Participation with other local governments in pooled investment funds (trusts). These trusts are supervised by participating governments and must comply with the same restrictions on cash deposits and investments. These trusts are "CSAFE".

Investment Interest Rate Risk

The Town has no formal investment policy that limits investment maturities as a means of managing its exposure to fair value losses arising from increasing interest rates. The Town held no investments as of December 31, 2021.

5. Notes Receivable

The Authority has five separate notes receivable from Dove Valley, LLLP, the company that owns and operates the low-income housing facility for which the Authority was created. Four of the notes carry interest at 0.5% compounded annually, with balances of \$400,000, \$201,000, \$746,192, and \$140,000 at December 31, 2021. The other note carries an interest rate of 5.0% and a balance of \$39,043 at December 31, 2021. All of the notes mature in December 2046, when all the principal and accrued interest will be due. As of December 31, 2021, there was accrued interest of \$160,894, included in "Receivables" in the accompanying Statement of Net Position.

6. Interfund Transfers

Transfers are used to (1) move revenues from the fund that statute or budget requires to collect them to the fund that statute or budget requires to expend them, (2) move receipts restricted for debt service from the funds collecting the receipts to the debt service fund as debt service payments become due, and (3) use unrestricted revenues collected in the general fund to finance various programs accounted for in other funds in accordance with budgetary authorizations. Contributed capital between the governmental funds and proprietary funds is shown within the transfer line for financial statement presentation.

8. Long-Term Liabilities

Governmental Activities

Bonds Payable

In April 2018, the Town issued \$1,480,000 in General Obligation Refunding Bonds, Series 2018, with interest rates ranging from 3 to 4 percent. The net proceeds of \$1,467,738 (after payment of \$61,524 in underwriting fees, insurance, and other issue costs) were used to refund the Town's outstanding General Obligation Bonds, Series 2007. The refunding resulted in a difference between the reacquisition price and the net carrying amount of the old debt of \$15,198. The Town completed the refunding to reduce the total debt service payments over a period of 10 years by \$113,224 and to obtain an economic gain (difference between the present values of the old and new debt service payments) of \$43,980.

Leases Payable

In June 2018, the Town entered a capital lease for two new vehicles. Annual payments are required until June 20, 2022, including interest at 6.45%. The vehicles secure the capital lease and lease payments will be made by the General Fund.

In May 2019, the Town entered a capital lease for five new vehicles. Annual payments are required until May 13, 2023, including interest at 6.75%. The vehicles secure the capital lease and lease payments will be made by the General Fund.

Business- Type Activities

Notes Payable

During 2003, the Town obtained financing from the Colorado Water Resources and Power Development Authority ("CWRPDA") to construct a wastewater treatment plant. Payments of principal and interest are due semi-annually on February 1 and August 1, through August 1, 2024. Interest accrues at 3.28%.

Leases Payable

In June 2018, the Town entered a capital lease for a new truck. Annual payments are required until June 20, 2022, including interest at 6.45%. The truck secures the capital lease.

Bonds Payable

In April 2018, the Town issued \$5,285,000 in Water Revenue Refunding and Improvement Bonds, Series 2018, with interest rates ranging from 3 to 4 percent. The net proceeds of \$5,285,000 (after payment of \$252,022 in underwriting fees, insurance, and other issue costs) were used to refund the Town's outstanding USDA note payable and invest in capital assets. The net proceeds used in the refunding of the USDA note was \$685,671 (after payment of \$21,620 underwriting fees, insurance, and other issue costs). The refunding resulted in a difference between the reacquisition price and the net carrying amount of the old debt of \$7,540. The Town completed the refunding to reduce the total debt service payments over a period of 20 years by \$29,362 and to obtain an economic gain (difference between the present values of the old and new debt service payments) of \$32,250.

9. Public Entity Risk Pools

The Town is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts; theft of, damage to, and destruction of assets; errors and omissions; injuries to employees; and natural disasters. For these risks of loss, the Town is involved with the Colorado Intergovernmental Risk Sharing Agency ("CIRSA"), a separate and independent governmental and legal entity formed by intergovernmental agreement by member municipalities pursuant to state statute.

The purposes of CIRSA is to provide members defined liability, property, and workers compensation coverage and to assist members in preventing and reducing losses and injuries to municipal property and to persons or property which might result in claims being made against members of CIRSA, their employees and officers. It is the intent of the members of CIRSA to create an entity in perpetuity which will administer and use funds contributed by the members to defend and indemnify, in accordance with the bylaws, any member of CIRSA against stated liability of loss to the limit of the financial resources of CIRSA. It is also the intent of the members to have CIRSA provide continuing stability and availability of needed coverage at reasonable costs. All income and assets of CIRSA shall be at all times dedicated to the exclusive benefit of its members. CIRSA is a separate legal entity, and the Town does not approve budgets, nor is it able to significantly affect the operations of CIRSA.

Plan Description

Statewide Defined Benefit Plan

The Town contributes to the Statewide Defined Benefit Plan ("SWDBP"), a cost-sharing multiple-employer defined benefit pension plan administered by FPPA for fire or police departments hired on or after April 8, 1978 (New Hires), provided that they are not already covered by a statutorily exempt plan. As of August 5, 2003, the SWDBP may include clerical and other personnel from fire districts whose services are auxiliary to fire protection. The SWDBP became effective January 1, 1980. All full-time, paid police of the Town are members of the SWDBP.

The SWDBP assets are included in the Fire & Police Members' Benefit Investment Fund and the Fire & Police Members' Self-Directed Investment Fund (for Deferred Retirement Option Plan ("DROP") assets and Separate Retirement Account assets from eligible retired members). The SWDBP is administered by FPPA.

Statewide Hybrid Plan

The SWH Plan was established January 1, 2004 as a cost-sharing multiple-employer pension plan covering full-time firefighters and police officers from departments that elect coverage. The Plan may also cover clerical staff, other fire district personnel whose services are auxiliary to fire protection, or chiefs who have opted out of the Statewide Defined Benefit Plan. The Plan is comprised of two components: Defined Benefit and Money Purchase. With the latter component, members have the option of choosing among various investment options offered by an outside investment manager. Employers may not withdraw from the Plan once affiliated.

The SWH is comprised of two components: Defined Benefit and Money Purchase. The Plan assets associated with the Defined Benefit Component are included in the Fire & Police Members' Benefit Investment Fund and the Plan assets associated with the Money Purchase Component and Deferred Retirement Option Plan (DROP) assets are included in the Fire & Police Members' Self-Directed Investment Fund.

Colorado statutes assign the authority to establish benefit provisions to the state legislature. FPPA issues a publicly available annual financial report that includes financial statements and required supplementary information for the Statewide Defined Benefit Plan, the Statewide Death and Disability Plan and the Statewide Hybrid Plan. FPPA issues a publicly available comprehensive annual financial report that can be obtained on FPPA's website at <http://www.fppaco.org>.

Benefits Provided

Statewide Defined Benefit Plan

A member is eligible for a normal retirement pension once the member has completed twenty-five years of credited service and has attained the age of 55. Effective January 1, 2021, a member may also qualify for a normal retirement pension if the member's combined years of service and age equals at least 80, with a minimum age of 50 (Rule of 80).

A member is eligible for a normal retirement pension once the member has completed twenty-five years of credited service and has attained the age of 55. Effective January 1, 2021, a member may also qualify for a normal retirement pension if the member's combined years of service and age equals at least 80, with a minimum age of 50. The annual normal retirement benefit is 2.0 percent of the average of the member's highest three years' base salary for each year of credited service up to ten years, plus 2.5 percent for each year of service thereafter. The benefit earned prior to January 1, 2007 for members of affiliated Social Security employers will be reduced by the amount of Social Security income payable to the member annually. Effective January 1, 2007, members currently covered under Social Security will receive half the benefit when compared to the Statewide Defined Benefit Plan ("SWDB Plan"). Benefits paid to retired members are evaluated and may be re-determined every October 1. The amount of any increase is based on the Board's discretion and can range from 0 to the higher of 3 percent or the Consumer Price Index.

A member is eligible for an early retirement after completion of 30 years of service or attainment of age 50 with at least five years of credited service. The early retirement benefit equals the normal retirement benefit reduced on an actuarially equivalent basis. Upon termination, an employee may elect to have member contributions, along with 5 percent as interest, returned as a lump sum distribution. Alternatively, a member with at least five years of accredited service may leave contributions with the Plan and remain eligible for a retirement pension at age 55 equal to 2 percent of the member's average highest three years' base salary for each year of credited service up to ten years, plus 2.5 percent for each year of service thereafter.

Statewide Hybrid Plan

The Plan document states that any member may retire from further service and become eligible for a normal retirement pension at any time after age 55, if the member has at least 25 years of service.

The annual normal pension of the Defined Benefit Component is 1.5 percent of the average of the member's highest three years' base salary for each year of credited service. Benefits paid to retired members of the Defined Benefit Component are evaluated and may be re-determined annually on October 1. The amount of any increase is based on the Board's discretion and can range from 0 to 3 percent.

A member is eligible for early retirement within the Defined Benefit Component after completion of 30 years of service or attainment of age 50 with at least five years of credited service. The early retirement benefit equals the normal retirement benefit reduced on an actuarially equivalent basis. Upon termination, a member may elect to have all contributions, along with 5 percent as interest, returned as a lump sum distribution from the Defined Benefit Component. Alternatively, a member with at least five years of accredited service may leave contributions with the Defined Benefit Component of the Plan and remain eligible for a retirement pension at age 55 equal to 1.5 percent of the average of the member's highest three years' base salary of each year of credited service.

Contributions

Statewide Defined Benefit Plan

Contribution rates for the SWDB plan are set by state statute. Employer contribution rates can only be amended by state statute. Member contribution rates can be amended by state statute or election of the membership. Effective January 1, 2021, contribution rates for employers and members may be increased equally by the FPPA Board of Directors upon approval through an election by both the employers and members.

In 2014, the members elected to increase the member contribution rate to the SWDB plan beginning in 2015. Member contribution rates will increase 0.5 percent annually through 2022 to a total of 12 percent of pensionable earnings. Employer contributions are 8 percent and 8.5 percent in 2020 and 2021, respectively. Employer contributions will increase 0.5 percent annually beginning in 2021 through 2030 to a total of 13 percent of pensionable earnings. In 2020, members of the SWDB plan and their employers are contributing at the rate of 11 percent and 8 percent, respectively, of pensionable earnings for a total contribution rate of 19 percent.

Contributions from members and employers of departments reentering the system are established by resolution and approved by the FPPA Board of Directors. The reentry group has a combined contribution rate of 23.0 percent and 23.5 percent of pensionable earnings in 2020 and 2021, respectively. It is a local decision as to whether the member or employer pays the additional 4 percent contribution. The member and employer contribution rates will increase through 2030 as described above for the non-reentering departments. Effective January 1, 2021, reentry departments may submit a resolution to the FPPA Board of Directors to reduce the additional 4 percent contribution, to reflect the actual cost of reentry by department, to the plan for reentry contributions. Each reentry department is responsible to remit contributions to the plan in accordance with their most recent FPPA Board of Directors approved resolution.

The contribution rate for members and employers of affiliated social security employers is 5.5 percent and 4 percent, respectively, of pensionable earnings for a total contribution rate of 9.50 percent in 2020 and 9.75 percent in 2021. Per the 2014 member election, members of the affiliate social security group had their required contribution rate increase 0.25 percent annually beginning in 2015 through 2022 to a total of 6 percent of pensionable earnings. Employer contributions are 4 percent and 4.25 percent in 2020 and 2021. Employer contributions will increase 0.25 percent annually beginning in 2021 through 2030 to a total of 6.5 percent of pensionable earnings.

Contributions to the Plan from the Town were \$68,875 for the year ended December 31, 2021.

Statewide Hybrid Plan

The Plan sets contribution rates at a level that enables all benefits to be fully funded at the retirement date of all members. The members of the SWH plan and their employers are currently each contributing at the rate determined by the individual employer, however, the rate for both employer and members must be at least 8 percent of the member's base salary. The amount allocated

to the Defined Benefit Component is set annually by the FPPA Board of Directors. Excess contributions fund the Money Purchase Component of the Plan. The Defined Benefit Component contribution rate from July 1, 2019 through June 30, 2020 was 13.80 percent. The Defined Benefit Component contribution rate from July 1, 2018 through June 30, 2019 was 13.40 percent.

Within the Money Purchase Component, members are always fully vested in their own contributions, as well as the earnings on those contributions. Vesting in the employer's contributions within the Money Purchase component, and earnings on those contributions occurs according to the vesting schedule set by the plan document at 20 percent per year after the first year of service to be 100 percent vested after 5 years of service. Employer and member contributions are invested in funds at the discretion of members.

Contributions to the Plan from the Town were \$9,625 for the year ended December 31, 2021.

Pension Liabilities, Pension Expense, and Deferred Outflows of Resources and Deferred Inflows of Resources Related to Pensions

At December 31, 2021, the Town reported net pension assets of \$205,611 and \$105,589 for the Statewide Defined Benefit Plan and the Statewide Hybrid Plan, respectively, for its proportionate shares of the net pension asset. The net pension asset was measured as of December 31, 2020, and the total pension asset used to calculate the net pension asset was determined by an actuarial valuation as of January 1, 2021. The actuarially determined contributions as of December 31, 2020 are based upon the January 1, 2021 actuarial valuation. The Town's proportion of the net pension asset was based on the Town's share of contributions to the pension plan relative to the contributions of all participating entities.

At December 31, 2020, the Town's proportion was 0.094 percent, which was an increase of 0.001 from its proportion measured as of December 31, 2019 for the Statewide Defined Benefit Plan. At December 31, 2020, the Town's proportion was 0.547 percent, which was a decrease of 0.013 from its proportion measured as of December 31, 2019 for the Statewide Hybrid Plan.

For the year ended December 31, 2021, the Town recognized pension income of \$61,343. At December 31, 2021, the Town reported deferred outflows of resources and deferred inflows of resources related to pensions from the following sources:

At least every five years the FPPA's Board of Directors, in accordance with best practices, reviews its economic and demographic actuarial assumptions. At its July 2018 meeting, the Board of Directors reviewed and approved recommended changes to the actuarial assumptions. The recommendations were made by the FPPA's actuaries, Gabriel, Roeder, Smith & Co., based upon their analysis of past experience and expectations of the future. The assumption changes were effective for actuarial valuations beginning January 1, 2019. The actuarial assumptions impact actuarial factors for benefit purposes such as purchases of service credit and other benefits where actuarial factors are used.

The long-term expected rate of return on pension plan investments was determined using a building-block method in which best-estimate ranges of expected future real rates of return (expected returns, net of pension plan investment expense and inflation) are developed for each major asset class. These ranges are combined to produce the long-term expected rate of return by weighing the expected future real rates of return by the target asset allocation percentage and by adding expected inflation (assumed at 2.5 percent). Best estimates of arithmetic real rates of return for each major asset class included in the Fund's target asset allocation as of December 31, 2020 are summarized in the following table:

Discount Rate

The discount rate used to measure the total pension liability was 7.00 percent. The projection of cash flows used to determine the discount rate assumed that contributions from participating employers will be made based on the actuarially determined rates based on the Board's funding policy, which establishes the contractually required rates under Colorado statutes. Based on those assumptions, the SWDB plan fiduciary net position was projected to be available to make all the projected future Fire & Police Pension Association of Colorado notes to the Schedule of Contributions and Schedule of Collective Pension Amounts Statewide Defined Benefit Plan December 31, 2019 benefit payments of current plan members.

Therefore, the long-term expected rate of return on pension plan investments was applied to all periods of projected benefit payments to determine the total pension liability.

Projected benefit payments are required to be discounted to their actuarial present values using a Single Discount Rate that reflects (1) a long-term expected rate of return on pension plan investments (to the extent that the plan's fiduciary net position is projected to be sufficient to pay benefits) and (2) tax-exempt municipal bond rate based on an index of 20-year general obligation bonds with an average AA credit rating as of the measurement date (to the extent that the plan's projected fiduciary net position is not sufficient to pay benefits).

For the purpose of this valuation, the expected rate of return on pension plan investments is 7.00 percent; the municipal bond rate is 2.75 percent (based on the weekly rate closest to but not later than the measurement date of the "state & local bonds" rate from Federal Reserve statistical release (H.15)); and the resulting Single Discount Rate is 7.00 percent.

11. Defined Contribution Plans

Non-Civil Employees' Pension Plan

All non-civil employees who work a minimum of 20 hours each week are eligible to participate in a defined contribution pension plan upon completion of their probationary period. In a defined contribution plan, benefits depend solely on amounts contributed to the plan, plus investment earnings. The contribution requirements of plan participants and the Town are established, and may be amended, by the Board. The Town is required to contribute 3% of each participant's base salary to the plan, and employees must contribute 2% of their salary. Employees become vested in employer contributions to the employees' pension plan at 20% per year of service. During the year ended December 31, 2021, the Town and employee contributions were \$46,578 and \$31,269 respectively, equal to the required contributions.

12. Commitments and Contingencies

Tabor Amendment

In November 1992, Colorado voters passed an amendment (the "Amendment" or "TABOR") to the State Constitution (Article X, Section 20) which limits the revenue raising and spending abilities of state and local governments. The limits on property taxes, revenue, and "fiscal year spending" include allowable annual increases tied to inflation and local growth in construction valuation. Fiscal year spending, as defined by the Amendment, excludes spending from certain revenue and financing sources, such as federal funds, gifts, property sales, fund transfers, damage awards, and fund reserves (balances). The Amendment requires voter approval for any increase in mill levy or tax rates, new taxes, or creation of multi-year debt. Revenue earned in an amount exceeding the "spending limit" must be refunded or approved to be retained by the Town under specified voting requirements by the entire electorate.

On November 6, 2001, voters within the Town approved the collection, retention and expenditure of the full revenues generated by the Town commencing on January 1, 2001, and subsequent years, notwithstanding the provisions of the Amendment.

The Amendment also requires local governments to establish emergency reserves to be used for declared emergencies only. Emergencies, as defined by the Amendment, exclude economic conditions, revenue shortfalls, or salary or fringe benefit increases. These reserves are required to be 3% or more of fiscal year spending (excluding bonded debt service). At December 31, 2021, the Town has restricted \$247,357 in the General Fund for emergencies as defined under Article X, Section 20 of the Colorado Constitution.

The Town believes it is compliant with the provisions of TABOR. However, TABOR is complex and subject to interpretation. Many of its provisions will require judicial interpretation.

Litigation

The Town is periodically subject to various claims and legal proceedings covering a wide range of matters that arise in the ordinary course of its activities. The Town believes that any liability that may ultimately result from the resolution of these matters will not have a material adverse effect on the financial position or activities of the Town.

Budgets and Budgetary Accounting

Annual budgets are adopted on a basis consistent with GAAP for all governmental funds. Budgeting for enterprise funds is generally on a modified accrual basis. All annual appropriations lapse at year-end.

By October 15, the budget officer (not an elected official) of the Town submits a proposed operating budget for the fiscal year commencing the following January 1 to the Town Board (elected officials). The operating budget for all budgeted funds includes proposed expenditures and the means of financing.

Public hearings are held at the regular Board meetings to obtain taxpayer input. Prior to December 15, the budget is legally enacted through passage of a budget resolution. The Town Treasurer is authorized to transfer budgeted amounts within a department of any fund. The Board must approve revisions that change total expenditures of any fund or department within a fund. Appropriations are controlled, and the budget is only amended in conformity with Colorado Revised Statutes, which require a balanced budget. Expenditures which exceed appropriations may violate Colorado Revised Statutes and must be reported to the Office of the State Auditor.

Budget amounts included in the financial statements are as originally adopted or as amended by the Board. The following is a summary of the original budget, total revisions and revised budget for the Town's funds for the year ended December 31, 2021.
