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Independent Auditor's Report

Opinions

We have audited the financial statements of the governmental activities, the business-type activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of Town of Mountain View (the "Town"), as of and for the year ended December 31, 2021, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the Town's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities, the business-type activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Town as of December 31, 2021, and the respective changes in financial position and, where applicable, cash flows thereof for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Basis for Opinions

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAS). Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of the Town and to meet our other ethical responsibilities, in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audit. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinions.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Town's ability to continue as a going concern for one year after the date that the financial statements are issued.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinions. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with GAAS will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from

fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Misstatements are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements.

In performing an audit in accordance with GAAS, we:

- Exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit.
- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, and design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks. Such procedures include examining, on a test basis, evidence regarding the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Town's internal control. Accordingly, no such opinion is expressed.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluate the overall presentation of the financial statements.
- Conclude whether, in our judgment, there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Town's ability to continue as a going concern for a reasonable period of time.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal control-related matters that we identified during the audit.

Required Supplementary Information

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the management's discussion and analysis and budgetary comparison information be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

Supplementary Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the Town's basic financial statements. The budgetary comparison schedules, balance sheet, and local highway finance report are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements.

The supplementary information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements or to the basic financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the supplementary information is fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the basic financial statements as a whole.

Management's Discussion and Analysis

This discussion and analysis of the financial performance of the Town of Mountain View, Colorado (Town) provides an overview of the Town's financial activities for the fiscal year ended December 31, 2021. Please read it in conjunction with the financial statements.

FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS

- The assets and deferred outflows of the Town exceeded its liabilities and deferred inflows at December 31, 2021 by \$5,965,427 (net position). Of this amount, \$4,893,966 (unrestricted net position) may be used to meet the Town's ongoing general obligations to residents and creditors. An additional \$272,909 may be used specifically for Parks and Open Space, Public Safety, and emergencies. \$798,552 is invested in capital assets.
- The fund balance of the General Fund increased by \$868,346 (23.7%) during 2021.
- The Town spent \$52,529 in the General Fund on Town Hall improvements and \$41,128 in the Wastewater & Storm Drainage Enterprise Fund on storm drainage improvements in 2021.

USING THIS ANNUAL REPORT

This discussion and analysis is intended to serve as an introduction to the Town of Mountain View's financial statements. The Town's basic financial statements are comprised of three components: 1) government-wide financial statements, 2) fund financial statements, and 3) notes to the financial statements. This report also contains other supplementary information in addition to the basic financial statements themselves, including budget-to-actual comparisons for all funds with adopted budgets.

Government-wide financial statements

The government-wide financial statements are designed to provide readers with a broad overview of the Town's finances, in a manner similar to a private-sector business.

The *Statement of Net Position* presents information on all the Town's assets and liabilities and deferred inflows and outflows of resources, with the difference reported as *net position*. Over time, increases or decreases in net position may serve as useful indicators of whether the financial position of the Town is improving or deteriorating.

The *Statement of Activities* presents information showing how the Town's net position changed during the most recent fiscal year. All changes in net position are reported as soon as the underlying event giving rise to the change occurs, *regardless of the timing of related cash flows*. Thus, revenues and expenses are reported in this statement for some items that will only result in cash flows in future fiscal periods (e.g., uncollected taxes).

Both government-wide financial statements distinguish functions of the Town of Mountain View that are principally supported by taxes and intergovernmental revenues (governmental activities) from other functions that are intended to recover all or a significant portion of their costs through user fees and charges (business-type activities). The governmental activities of the Town include general government (administration and municipal court), public safety (police), public works, parks and recreation, and trash collection. The business-type activities of the Town include sanitary wastewater & storm water drainage services.

Fund financial statements

A fund is a grouping of related accounts that is used to maintain control over resources that have been segregated for specific activities or objectives. The Town of Mountain View, like other state and local governments, uses fund accounting to ensure and demonstrate compliance with finance-related legal requirements. All funds of the Town can be divided into two categories: Governmental Funds and Proprietary Funds.

Governmental Funds -- Most of the Town's basic services are reported in governmental funds, which focus on how money flows into and out of those funds. The balances left at year-end are available for spending in future years, provided that balances restricted for certain purposes are spent for those purposes only. Governmental Funds utilize the modified accrual accounting method, which measures cash and all other financial assets that can readily be converted to cash. The governmental fund statements display detailed short-term views of cash, operations, and the basic services provided. Governmental fund statements show the reader whether there are more or fewer financial resources available at the end of a fiscal year that can be spent in the near future to finance government programs and objectives.

Because the focus of governmental funds is narrower than that of the government-wide financial statements, it is useful to compare the information presented for governmental funds with similar information presented for governmental activities in the government-wide financial statements. By doing so, readers may better understand the long-term impact of the government's near-term financing decisions. Both the *Balance Sheet - Governmental Funds* and the *Reconciliation of the Statement of Revenues, Expenditures and Changes in Fund Balances of Governmental Funds to the Statement of Activities* provide reconciliations to facilitate this comparison between governmental funds and governmental activities.

The Town of Mountain View currently maintains three individual governmental funds. Information is presented by fund name in the *Balance Sheet--Governmental Funds* and the *Statement of Revenues, Expenditures, and Changes in Fund Balance--Governmental Funds* for the two governmental funds that meet the criteria to be designated as major funds (General Fund and Department of Justice Fund) and for the Conservation Trust Fund which is the Town's only non-major governmental fund.

Proprietary Funds -- The Town's wastewater and storm water collection services are reported in the proprietary fund; it focuses on overall economic position rather than year-end fund balances. The type of proprietary fund utilized is an Enterprise Fund. Enterprise funds report the same functions presented as business-type activities in the government-wide financial statements but in a bit more detail.

Notes to the Financial Statements

The notes provide additional information that is essential to a full understanding of the data provided in the government-wide and fund financial statements. The notes to the financial statements are the final section of the basic financial statements.

Other information

Required and additional supplementary information is included after the Notes to the Financial Statements. This includes certain pension information and budgetary comparison schedules for those funds with adopted budgets (General Fund, Conservation Trust Fund, and Wastewater & Storm Water Fund). The budgetary comparison schedules demonstrate each fund's level of compliance with adopted budgets.

GOVERNMENT-WIDE FINANCIAL ANALYSIS

As noted earlier, net position may serve over time as a useful indicator of a government's financial position. In the case of the Town of Mountain View, total net position was \$4,989,927 at the close of 2021.

At December 31, 2021, 85.6% (\$5,106,408) of the Town's total assets were in Current Assets. The excellent cash position in the Governmental Activities will enable the Town to continue to provide services to the community and build reserves for future infrastructure needs. The Business-type Activities had \$258,598 in current assets and long-term debt of \$756,118.

Approximately 4.6% (\$272,909) of the Town's total net position is restricted for parks and recreation, open space, certain public safety activities, or emergencies. Another 13.4% (\$798,552) is invested in capital assets. The remaining amount (\$4,893,966) represents 82.0% of total net position and may be used to meet the Town's other ongoing obligations to residents and creditors.

The following chart displays the changes in net position experienced by the Town over the last two years. An analysis of these changes follows for both its Governmental and Business-type Activities.

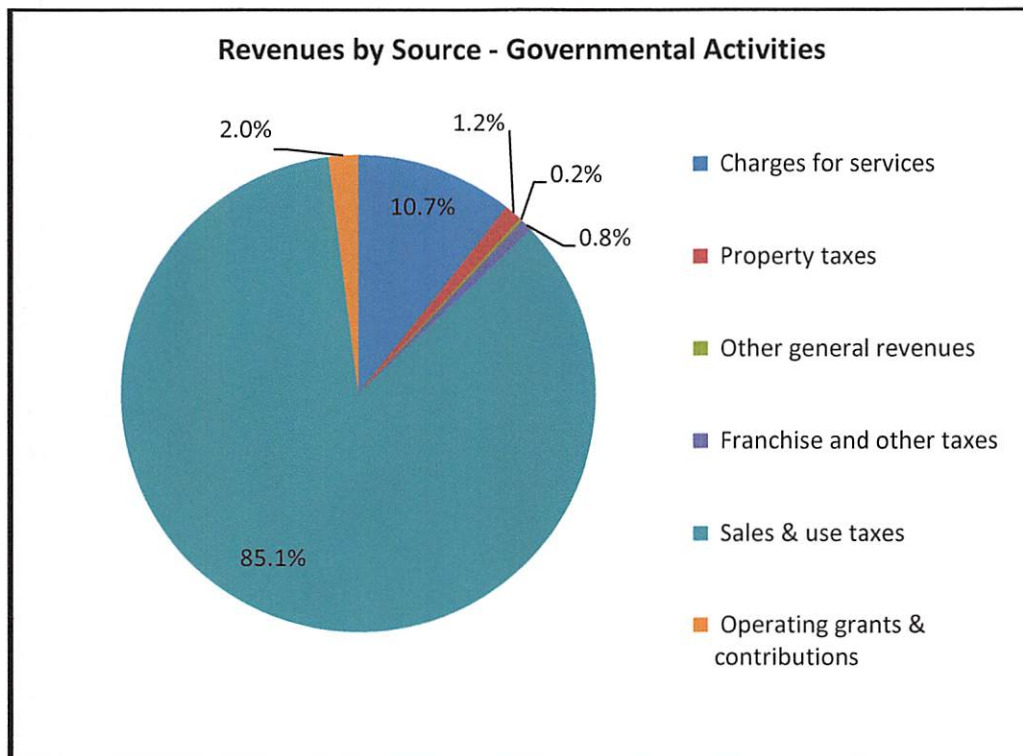
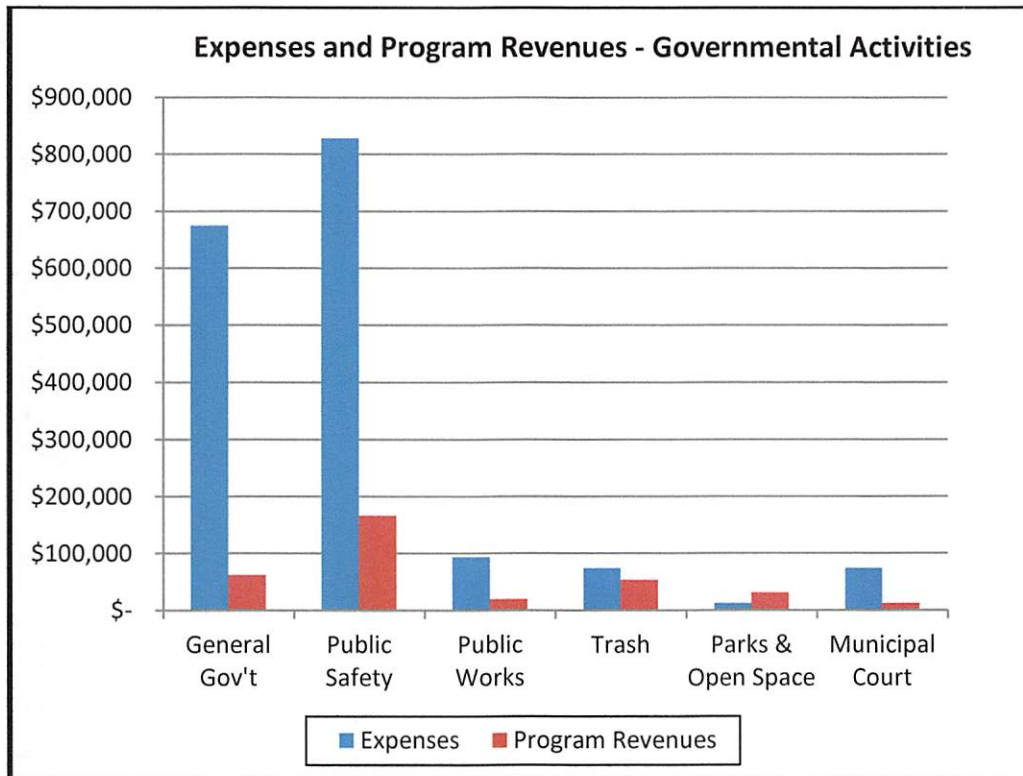

Governmental Activities

Governmental activities caused the Town's total net position to increase by \$945,943 (20.3%) in 2021. This significant increase was primarily attributable to strong sales tax revenues. Total program expenses stayed relatively constant from 2020 to 2021.

The following two charts illustrate the Governmental Activities revenues and expenses.



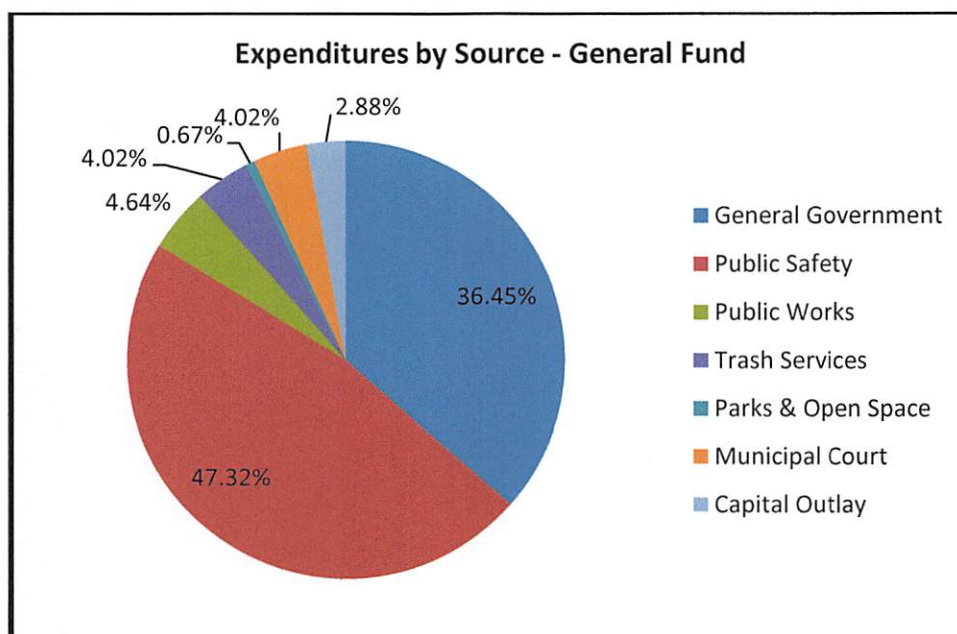
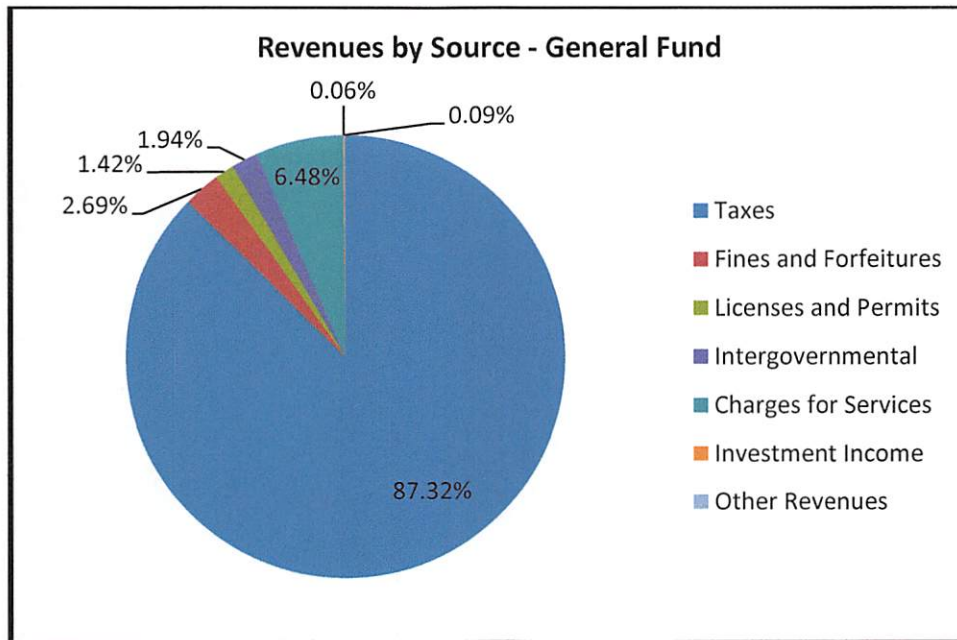
Business-type Activities

Business-type Activities increased the Town of Mountain View's net position by \$29,557 (0.6%) during 2021. Charges for services in the Wastewater & Storm Water activity exceeded expenses by \$29,439 (31.0%).

THE TOWN'S FUNDS

As noted earlier, the Town of Mountain View uses fund accounting to ensure and demonstrate compliance with finance-related legal requirements. The Governmental Funds utilize the modified accrual basis of accounting, and the balances of the spendable resources (fund balances) in each fund are shown at year end. At December 31, 2021 the Town's three Governmental funds reported combined fund balances of \$4,633,771. This represented a 22.5% increase over the previous year. The major governmental funds are discussed below.

General Fund. The General Fund is the chief operating fund of the Town of Mountain View. It accounts for all the general services provided by the Town. At the end of 2021, the fund balance of the General Fund totaled \$4,529,411. This represented a 23.7% increase over the previous year. As mentioned earlier, strong sales taxes are the primary reason for the improvement of this fund. The following two tables illustrate General Fund revenues and expenditures in 2021.



Department of Justice Fund. The Department of Justice Fund tracks the receipt and use of funds forfeited under laws enforced or administered by the U.S. Department of Justice and joint law enforcement task forces participated in by the Town's police department. At the end of 2021, the fund balance of the Department of Justice Fund totaled \$64,370. This represented a 26.0% decrease from the previous year due primarily to allowable spending of prior year reserves for police operations, training, and equipment.

Wastewater & Storm Water Fund. At December 31, 2021 the Net Position of the Town's proprietary fund, the Wastewater & Storm Water Fund, was \$372,129. It had \$124,336 in operating revenues and \$91,048 in operating expenses resulting in operating income of \$33,288. Storm drainage improvements totaling \$41,128 were constructed in 2021.

CAPITAL ASSETS AND DEBT ADMINISTRATION

Capital Assets. At December 31, 2021 the Town had invested in a range of capital assets including land, buildings and improvements, equipment, and vehicles. Note 3 of the financial statements provides a summary of these assets. Town capital acquisitions and expenses during 2021 included:

ECONOMIC FACTORS AND NEXT YEAR'S BUDGETS AND RATES

The Town of Mountain View expects continued strong revenue streams from taxes on the sale of marijuana in the Town. In general, the Town is optimistic about the pace of general sales taxes as marijuana stores and enhanced commercial properties in neighboring jurisdictions continue to bring shoppers to the area. The Town continues to anticipate increased remodeling activity as housing prices in the Denver metropolitan area have increased. Utility revenues are budgeted with small increases for 2022.

Beginning in March 2020 and continuing into 2021, the State of Colorado imposed lengthy restrictions on businesses, recreation, and places of worship with the stated purpose of slowing the spread of the Coronavirus so that hospital facilities would not be overwhelmed with patients. The Town was economically impacted by these restrictions. Sales and use taxes increased by 5.3% over 2020 as proceeds from residents' and local businesses' on-line purchases expanded. Extensive federal spending, unemployment insurance policies, restrictions on domestic energy production, and considerable expansion of the monetary supply is causing significant inflation throughout all sectors of the economy. The full economic impact these state- and federal-imposed policies and restrictions on the Town's 2022 budget has yet to be determined.

Notes to Basic Financial Statements
December 31, 2021

Note 1: Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The Town of Mountain View, Colorado (the Town) was incorporated in 1904. In April 1972, the residents voted to become a home rule municipality, as authorized by Article 20 of the Colorado Constitution. The Town is governed by a mayor and six-member Town Council elected by the residents.

The accounting policies of the Town conform to generally accepted accounting principles as applicable to government entities. The Governmental Accounting Standard Board (GASB) is the accepted standard-setting body for establishing governmental accounting and financial reporting principles. Following is a summary of the more significant policies.

Reporting Entity

The financial reporting entity consists of the Town, organizations for which the Town is financially accountable, and organizations that raise and hold economic resources for the direct benefit of the Town. All funds, organizations, institutions, agencies, departments, footnotes, and offices that are not legally separate are part of the Town. Legally separate organizations for which the Town is financially accountable are considered part of the reporting entity. Financial accountability exists if the Town appoints a voting majority of the organizations governing board and is able to impose its will on the organization, or if there is a potential for the organization to provide benefits to, or impose financial burdens on, the Town.

Based on the application of this criteria, the Town does not include additional organizations in its reporting entity.

Government-wide and Fund Financial Statements

The government-wide financial statements (i.e., the statement of net position and the statement of activities) report information on all activities of the Town. For the most part, the effect of interfund activity has been removed from these financial statements. Exceptions to this general rule are charges for interfund services that are reasonably equivalent to the services provided. Governmental activities, which normally are supported by taxes and intergovernmental revenues, are reported separately from business-type activities, which rely to a significant extent on fees and charges for support.

The statement of activities demonstrates the degree to which the direct expenses of the given function or segment are offset by program revenues. Direct expenses are those that are clearly identifiable with a specific function or segment. Program revenues include 1) charges to customers or applicants who purchase, use, or directly benefit from goods, services, or privileges provided by a given function or segment and 2) grants and contributions that are restricted to meeting the operational or capital requirements of a particular function or segment. Taxes and other items not properly included among program revenues are reported instead as general revenues. Internally dedicated resources are reported as general revenues rather than as program revenues.

Separate financial statements are provided for governmental funds and the proprietary fund. Major individual funds are reported as separate columns in the fund financial statements.

Measurement Focus, Basis of Accounting, and Financial Statement Presentation

The government-wide financial statements are reported using the economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting, as are the proprietary fund financial statements. Revenues are recorded when earned and expenses are recorded when the liability is incurred, regardless of the timing of related cash flows. Property taxes are recognized as revenues in the year for which they are levied. Grants and similar items are recognized as revenues as soon as all eligibility requirements imposed by the provider have been met.

Governmental fund financial statements are reported using the current financial resources measurement focus and the modified accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recognized as soon as they are both measurable and available. Revenues are considered to be available when they are collected within the current year or soon enough thereafter to pay liabilities of the current year. For this purpose, the Town considers revenues to be available if they are collected within 60 days of the end of the current year.

Taxes, intergovernmental revenues, and interest associated with the current year are considered to be susceptible to accrual and so have been recognized as revenues of the current year. All other revenues are considered to be measurable and available only when cash is received by the Town.

Expenditures generally are recorded when a liability is incurred, as under accrual accounting. However, debt service expenditures, as well as expenditures related to compensated absences, are recorded only when payment is due.

Proprietary funds distinguish operating revenues and expenses from nonoperating items. Operating revenues and expenses generally result from providing services and producing and delivering goods in connection with a proprietary fund's principal ongoing operations. Operating expenses for enterprise funds include the cost of sales and services and administrative expenses. All revenues and expenses not meeting this definition are reported as nonoperating revenues and expenses.

When both restricted and unrestricted resources are available for a specific use, it is the Town's practice to use restricted resources first, then unrestricted resources as they are needed.

In the fund financial statements, the Town reports the following major governmental and proprietary funds:

The *General Fund* is the general operating fund of the Town. It is used to account for all financial resources except those accounted for in another fund.

The *Department of Justice Fund* accounts for federal asset forfeitures shared with the Town for law enforcement purposes.

The *Wastewater and Storm Water Fund* accounts for the financial activities associated with the provision of sewer services to Town residents.

Assets, Liabilities, and Net Position/Fund Balance

Cash Equivalents – Cash equivalents include investments with original maturities of three months or less. Investments in pooled cash are considered cash equivalents.

Receivables – All receivables are reported at their gross value and, where appropriate, are reduced by the estimated portion that is expected to be uncollectible.

Capital Assets – Capital assets, which include land, parks, buildings, equipment, vehicles, and infrastructure assets purchased since January 1, 2004, are reported in the applicable governmental or business-type activities columns in the government-wide financial statements and the proprietary fund in the fund financial statements. Capital assets are defined as assets with an initial, individual cost of \$5,000 or more and an estimated useful life in excess of one year. Such assets are recorded at historical cost or estimated historical cost if purchased or constructed. Donated capital assets are recorded at the acquisition value on the date of donation. The costs of normal maintenance and repairs that do not add to the value of the assets or materially extend asset lives are not capitalized.

Capital assets are depreciated using the straight-line method over the following estimated useful lives.

Buildings and Improvements	20 – 100 years
Infrastructure	25 – 40 years
Vehicles and Equipment	5 – 10 years

Personal Time Off (PTO) – Employees are eligible to accrue PTO of certain amounts depending on length of employment. However, PTO must be used prior to each employee's anniversary date. In certain situations, the mayor may approve a carryover of PTO up to 40 hours. Accrued but unused PTO will be paid upon separation from employment. However, no liability is reported in the financial statements because the accrued PTO is insignificant.

Deferred Inflows of Resources – Deferred inflows of resources include property taxes earned but levied for a subsequent year.

Pensions – The Town participates in the Statewide Defined Benefit Plan (the Plan), a cost-sharing multiple-employer defined benefit pension plan administered by the Fire & Police Pension Association of Colorado (FPPA).

The net pension asset (liability), deferred outflows of resources and deferred inflows of resources related to pensions, pension expense, information about the fiduciary net position, and additions to and deductions from the Plan's fiduciary net position have been determined using the accrual basis of accounting, the same basis of accounting used by the Plan. For this purpose, benefit payments (including refunds of employee contributions) are recognized when due and payable in accordance with the benefit terms. Employer contributions are recognized in the year the contributions are due.

Net Position/Fund Balance – In the government-wide and fund financial statements, net position and fund balance are restricted when constraints placed on the use of resources are externally imposed. The Town Council establishes a fund balance commitment through passage of an ordinance and is authorized to informally assign amounts to a specific purpose.

The Town has not established a formal policy for its use of restricted and unrestricted fund balances. However, if both restricted and unrestricted fund balances are available for a specific purpose, the Town uses restricted amounts first, followed by committed, assigned, and unassigned amounts.

Property Taxes

Property taxes attach as an enforceable lien on January 1, are levied the following December, and collected in the subsequent calendar year. Taxes are payable in full on April 30 or in two installments on February 28 and June 15. The County Treasurer's Office collects property taxes and remits to the Town on a monthly basis.

Cash Deposits

The Colorado Public Deposit Protection Act (PDPA) requires all local government entities to deposit cash in eligible public depositories. Eligibility is determined by State regulations. Amounts on deposit in excess of federal insurance levels must be collateralized by eligible collateral as determined by the PDPA. The PDPA allows the financial institution to create a single collateral pool for all public funds held. The pool is to be maintained by another institution or held in trust for all uninsured public deposits as a group. The market value of the collateral must be at least equal to 102 percent of the uninsured deposits.

At December 31, 2021, the Town had bank deposits of \$547,360 collateralized with securities held by the financial institution's agent but not in the Town's name. The Town also has FDIC coverage of \$250,000.

Investments

The Town is required to comply with State statutes which specify the investments meeting defined rating, maturity, and concentration risk criteria in which local governments may invest, which include the following. State statutes do not address custodial risk.

- Obligations of the United States and certain U.S. Agency securities
- Certain international agency securities
- General obligation and revenue bonds of U.S. local government entities

- Bankers' acceptances of certain banks
- Commercial paper
- Local government investment pools
- Written repurchase agreements collateralized by certain authorized securities
- Certain money market funds
- Guaranteed investment contracts

Interest Rate Risk – State statutes generally limit investments to an original maturity of five years unless the governing board authorizes the investment for a period in excess of five years.

Credit Risk – State statutes limit certain investments to those with specified ratings from nationally recognized statistical rating organizations, depending on the type of investment.

Concentration of Credit Risk – Except for corporate securities, State statutes do not limit the amount the Town may invest in any single investment or issuer.

Local Government Investment Pools – At December 31, 2021, the Town had \$11,307 invested in the Colorado Surplus Asset Fund Trust (CSAFE) and \$3,900,795 in the Colorado Local Government Liquid Asset Trust (ColoTrust), investment vehicles established for local government entities in Colorado to pool surplus funds. The Colorado Division of Securities administers and enforces the requirements of creating and operating CSAFE. CSAFE operates in conformity with the Securities and Exchange Commission's Rule 2a-7. CSAFE is measured at the net asset value per share, with each share valued at \$1. CSAFE is rated AAAm by Standard and Poor's. Investments of CSAFE are limited to those allowed by State statutes. A designated custodial bank provides safekeeping and depository services in connection with the direct investment and withdrawal functions. The custodian's internal records identify the investments owned by the participating governments.

GASB 72 Disclosure Requirement for COLOTRUST – COLOTRUST measures its investments a fair market value in accordance with Paragraph 41 of Statement 79 and Paragraph 11 of Statement 31, and therefore a Participant's investment in COLOTRUST is not required to be categorized within the fair value hierarchy for purposes of Paragraph 81a(2) of Statement 72.

Credit Quality Disclosure – COLOTRUST PLUS+ and COLOTRUST PRIME are rated by S&P Global Ratings. The current rating is 'AAAm.'

Interest Rate Risk Disclosure – The dollar weighted average days to maturity (WAM) of COLOTRUST PLUS+ at December 31, 2021, is 51 days. Next interest rate reset dates for floating rate securities are used in the calculation of the WAM. The weighted average life (WAL) of COLOTRUST PLUS+ at December 31, 2021, is 80 days. The dollar weighted average days to maturity (WAM) of COLOTRUST PRIME at December 31, 2021, is 13 days. Next interest rate reset dates for floating rate securities are used in the calculation of the WAM. The weighted average life (WAL) of COLOTRUST PRIME at December 31, 2021, is 92 days.

The Town entered into a loan agreement without recourse with the Colorado Water Resources and Power Development Authority on July 2, 2019 to fund the 2019 Sanitary Sewer Improvements Project of the Wastewater and Storm Water Activity Enterprise. The project consists of improvements, repairs to the existing sewer collection system, and includes reconstruction and installment of a new stormwater drainage system. The source of repayment is a lien on pledged property with loan repayments occurring semi-annually on May 1 and November 1. The pledged property is net revenue defined as gross revenue from the operation and use of the sewer collection system and stormwater drainage system, after deducting Operation and Maintenance Expenses.

The project was completed in 2020 for a total cost of \$869,506, which was less than the original estimated cost. Therefore, the CWRPDA issued a letter of rescission for \$27,890 of the original loan proceeds of \$810,000 and a revised amortization schedule. The term of the loan is 30 years with an annual interest rate of 0.5 percent. The loan repayment commencement date was November 1, 2020. The loan agreement requires that gross revenue be sufficient to pay 110 percent of the debt service due for each calendar year. The Town is in compliance with this requirement.

Note 5:**Pension Plans****Plan Description**

The Statewide Defined Benefit Plan (SWDB) is a cost-sharing multiple-employer defined benefit pension plan covering substantially all full-time employees of participating fire or police departments in Colorado hired on or after April 8, 1978 (New Hires), provided that they are not already covered by a statutorily exempt plan. As of August 5, 2023, the Plan may include clerical and other personnel from fire districts whose services are auxiliary to fire protection. The Plan became effective January 1, 1980.

The Plan assets are included in the Fire & Police Members' Benefit Investment Fund and the Fire & Police Members' Self-Directed Investment Fund (for Deferred Retirement Option Plan (DROP) assets and Separate Retirement Account assets from eligible retired members).

The Plan is administered by the Fire & Police Pension Association (FPPA). FPPA issues a publicly available comprehensive annual financial report that can be obtained at www.FPPAco.org.

Description of Benefits

A member is eligible for a normal retirement pension once the member has completed twenty-five years of credited service and has attained the age of 55. Effective January 1, 2021, a member may also qualify for a normal retirement pension if the members' combined years of service and age equals at least 80, with a minimum age of 50 (Rule of 80).

The annual normal retirement benefit is 2 percent of the average of the member's highest three years' pensionable earnings for each year of credited service up to ten years, plus 2.5 percent for each year of service thereafter. The benefit earned prior to January 1, 2007 for members of affiliated Social Security employers will be reduced by the amount of Social Security income payable to the member annually. Effective January 1, 2007, members covered under Statewide Defined Benefit Social Security Component will receive half the benefit when compared to the Statewide Defined Benefit Plan. Benefit adjustments paid to retired members are evaluated annually and may be re-determined every October 1. The amount of any increase is based on the Board's discretion and can range from zero to the higher of 3 percent or the Consumer Price Index for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W).

A member is eligible for an early retirement after completion of 30 years of service or attainment of age 50 with at least five years of credited service. The early retirement benefit equals the normal retirement benefit reduced on an actuarially equivalent basis. Upon termination, an employee may elect to have member contributions, along with 5 percent interest, returned as a lump sum distribution. Alternatively, a member with at least five years of accredited service may leave contributions with the plan and remain eligible for a retirement pension at age 55 equal to 2 percent of the member's average highest three years' base salary for each year of credited service up to ten years, plus 2.5 percent for each year of service thereafter.

Contributions

Through December 31, 2020, contribution rates for the SWDB plan are set by state statute. Employer contribution rates can only be amended by state statute. Member contribution rates can be amended by state statute or election of the membership. Effective January 1, 2021, contribution rates for employers and members may be increased equally by the FPPA Board of Directors upon approval through an election by both the employers and members.

In 2014, the members elected to increase the member contribution rate to the SWDB plan beginning in 2015. Member contribution rates will increase 0.5 percent annually through 2022 to a total of 12 percent of pensionable earnings. Employer contributions are 8.0 percent and 8.50 percent in 2020 and 2021, respectively. Employer contributions will increase 0.5 percent annually beginning in 2021 through 2030 to a total of 13.0 percent of pensionable earnings. In 2020, members of the SWDB plan and their employers are contributing at the rate of 11.0 percent and 8.0 percent, respectively, of pensionable earnings for a total contribution rate of 19.0 percent.

Contributions from members and employers of departments reentering the system are established by resolution and approved by the FPPA Board of Directors. The reentry group has a combined contribution rate of 23.0 percent and 23.5 percent of pensionable earnings in 2020 and 2021, respectively. It is a local decision as to whether the member or employer pays the additional 4 percent contribution. The member and employer contribution rates will increase through 2030 as described above for the non-reentering departments. Effective January 1, 2021, reentry departments may submit a resolution to the FPPA Board of Directors to reduce the additional 4 percent contribution, to reflect the actual cost of reentry by department, to the plan for reentry contributions. Each reentry department is responsible to remit contributions to the plan in accordance with their most recent FPPA Board of Directors approved resolution.

The contribution rate for members and employers of affiliated social security employers is 5.5 percent and 4 percent, respectively, of pensionable earnings for a total contribution rate of 9.50 percent in 2020 and 9.75 percent in 2021. Per the 2014 member election, members of the affiliate social security group had their required contribution rate increase 0.25 percent annually beginning in 2015 through 2022 to a total of 6 percent of pensionable earnings. Employer contributions are 4.0 percent and 4.25 percent in 2020 and 2021, respectively. Employer contributions will increase 0.25 percent annually beginning in 2021 through 2030 to a total of 6.5 percent of pensionable earnings.

Pension Liabilities, Pension Expense, and Deferred Outflow of Resources and Deferred Inflows of Resources Related to Pensions

At December 31, 2021, the Town reported a net pension asset of \$160,871, representing its proportionate share of the net pension liability of the plan. The net pension liability was measured at December 31, 2019, and the total pension liability used to calculate the net pension liability was determined by an actuarial valuation as of January 01, 2020. The Town's proportion of the net pension liability was based on the Town's contributions to the plan for the calendar year ended December 31, 2020, relative to the projected contributions of all participating employers. At December 31, 2020, the Town's proportion was 0.074100 percent, which is approximately the same as the prior year.

For the year ended December 31, 2021, the Town recognized pension expense of \$79,270. At December 31, 2020, the Town reported deferred outflows of resources and deferred inflows of resources related to pensions from the following sources:

For determining the total pension liability and actuarially determined contributions, the post-retirement mortality tables for non-disabled retirees uses the 2006 central rates from the RP-2014 Annuitant Mortality Tables projected to 2018 using the MP-2017 projection scales, and the projected prospectively using the ultimate rates of the scale for all years. The pre-retirement off-duty mortality tables are adjusted to 50 percent of the RP-2014 mortality tables for active employees. The on-duty mortality rate is 0.00015.

At least every five years the FPPA's Board of Directors, in accordance with best practices, reviews its economic and demographic actuarial assumptions. At its July 2018 meeting, the Board of Directors reviewed and approved recommended changes to the actuarial assumptions. The recommendations were made by the FPPA's actuaries, Gabriel, Roeder, Smith & Co., based upon their analysis of past experience and expectations of the future. The assumption changes were effective for actuarial valuations beginning January 1, 2019. The actuarial assumptions impact actuarial factors for benefit purposes such as purchases of service credit and other benefits where actuarial factors are used.

The long-term expected rate of return on pension plan investments was determined using a building-block method in which best-estimate ranges of expected future real rates of return (expected returns, net of pension plan investment expense and inflation) are developed for each major asset class. These ranges are combined to produce the long-term expected rate of return by weighing the expected future real rates of return by the target asset allocation percentage and by adding expected inflation (assumed at 2.5 percent). Best estimates of arithmetic real rates of return for each major asset class included in the Fund's target asset allocation as of December 31, 2020 are summarized in the following table:

The discount rate used to measure the total pension liability was 7.00 percent. The projection of cash flows used to determine the discount rate assumed that contributions from participating employers will be made based on the actuarially determined rates based on the Board's funding policy, which establishes the contractually required rates under Colorado statutes. Based on those assumptions, the SWDBN plan fiduciary net position was projected to be available to make all the projected future benefit payments of current plan members. Therefore, the long-term expected rate of return on pension plan investments was applied to all periods of projected benefit payments to determine the total pension liability.

General Employees' Pension Plan

The Town contributes to an Internal Revenue Code Section 401(a) pension plan on behalf of all full-time employees. Employees may participate in the Plan on their date of employment. The Town and employees are each required to contribute 8 percent of each employees' eligible salary. The Town Council is authorized to amend the Plan provisions and determines the contributions to be made by the Town. During the year ended December 31, 2021, the Town contributed \$14,525, which is equal to the required contributions. The Plan investments are managed by Great-West Financial.

Note 6: Risk Management

The Town is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts; theft of, damage to, and destruction of assets; errors and omissions; injuries to employees; and natural disasters. The Town purchases commercial insurance for its workers compensation claims. For other risks of loss, the Town participates in the Colorado Intergovernmental Risk Sharing Agency (CIRSA), a separate and independent governmental and legal entity formed by intergovernmental agreement by member municipalities pursuant to the provisions of 24-10-115.5, Colorado Revised Statutes (1982 Replacement Volume) and Colorado Constitution, Article XIV, Section 18(2).

The purposes of CIRSA are to provide members defined liability and property coverages and to assist members in preventing and reducing losses and injuries to municipal property and to persons or property which might result in claims being made against members of CIRSA, their employees and officers.

It is the intent of the members of CIRSA to create an entity in perpetuity which will administer and use funds contributed by the members to defend and indemnify, in accordance with the bylaws, any member of CIRSA against stated liability of loss, to the limit of the financial resources of CIRSA. It is also the intent of the members to have CIRSA provide continuing stability and availability of needed coverages at reasonable costs. All income and assets of CIRSA shall be at all times dedicated to the exclusive benefit of its members.

Note 7: Other Postemployment Benefits

Plan Description – The Town contributes to the Statewide Death and Disability Plan, a cost sharing multiple-employer defined benefit death and disability plan administered by the Fire & Police Pension Association of Colorado (FPPA). All full-time police officers are members of the plan. Contributions to the plan are used solely for the payment of death and disability benefits. Benefits are established by State statute and generally allow for benefits upon the death or disability of a plan member prior to retirement. FPPA issues a publicly available annual financial report that includes financial statements and required supplementary information for the plan. That report may be obtained by contacting FPPA as described previously.

Funding Policy – The contribution requirements are established by State statute. The Town Council determines the contribution split between members and the Town. No contributions are required for members hired prior to January 1, 1997. For members hired on or after January 1, 1997, the Town contributed 2.80 percent of base salaries during the year ended December 31, 2021.

Note 8: Commitments and Contingencies

Claims and Judgements

The Town participates in a number of federal and state programs that are fully or partially funded by grants received from other governmental entities. Expenditures financed by grants are subject to audit by the appropriate grantor government. If expenditures are disallowed due to noncompliance with grant program regulations, the Town may be required to reimburse the grantor government. Management believes that additional disallowed expenditures, if any, based on subsequent audits will not have a material effect on the overall financial position of the Town.

TABOR Amendment

Colorado voters passed an amendment to the State Constitution, Article X, Section 20, which has several limitations, including revenue raising, spending abilities, and other specific requirements of state and local governments. On November 8, 1994, voters authorized the Town to collect, retain and expend the full proceeds of any revenue source of the Town notwithstanding any limitation contained in the Amendment.

The Town has established an emergency reserve, representing 3 percent of qualifying expenditures, as required by the Amendment. At December 31, 2021, the reserve was reported within the General Fund as restricted fund balance in the amount of \$82,000.

Note 9: Subsequent Event

Subsequent to year-end, the United State of America and the State of Colorado have declared an emergency associated with the Coronavirus pandemic. The Town has been economically impacted by the event, however the full economic effect has yet to be determined.

Note 1: Stewardship, Compliance, and Accountability

Budgetary Accounting

In accordance with State statutes, budgets are adopted for all funds of the Town except the Department of Justice Fund. The expenditure of federal asset forfeitures in the Department of Justice Fund are not required to be budgeted by the Town Council. Budgets for the governmental funds are adopted on a basis consistent with generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP). Budgetary comparisons for the enterprise fund are presented on a non-GAAP budgetary basis. Capital outlay and debt principal are budgeted as expenditures and depreciation is not budgeted.

- The Town follows these procedures to establish the budgetary information reflected in the financial statements:
- Management submits to the Town Council a proposed operating budget for the fiscal year commencing the following January 1. The operating budget includes proposed expenditures and the means of financing them.
- Public hearings are conducted to obtain taxpayer comments.
- Prior to December 31, the budget is legally adopted through passage of an ordinance.
- Management is authorized to transfer budgeted amounts between departments within any fund. However, any revisions that alter the total expenditures of any fund must be approved by the Town Council.
- All appropriations lapse at year end.
