Pursuing Peace

Part II: Overcoming the painful results of presumption Proverbs 13:10

A) The pain of presumption

Presumption leads to strife (Prov 13:10).

Primary Point: Presuming bad things about other people is a painful sin in our life.

Presumption is making false conclusions before you have all the facts. In other words, to presume usually results in believing a lie.

B) Biblical rules against presumption

You must not convict anyone of a crime on the testimony of only one witness (Deut 19:15; cf. Prov 18:17; 1 Cor 13:7).

C) Overcoming presumption

- 1) Have correct theology on the Christian's heart. (Jer 17:9; Ezek 36:26-27; Matt 5:8)
- 2) Follow the Golden Rule (Matt 7:12).
- 3) Ask the question

"I think I misunderstood you earlier. Did you mean when you said (or did) ?
