**Part IX-A: Summary of Direct Charitable Activities**

The Maine Health Access Foundation (MeHAF) is the state's largest private 501(c)(3) nonprofit health care foundation. Our mission is to *promote access to quality health care, especially for those who are uninsured and underserved, and improve the health of everyone in Maine*. The foundation is governed by a fifteen-member statewide Board of Trustees and the Board benefits from the input of an eighteen-member statewide Community Advisory Committee.

MeHAF is non-partisan, does not have members, and has a self-sustaining funding source through its invested endowment. We do not receive public funding for our activities.

*The information below is excerpted from MeHAF's 2019 Annual Report. It provides general highlights that describe how MeHAF is achieving its core mission, as well as specific examples of grants made during the year.*

*Responsive Solutions Improve Health*

For a number of years we have heard from grantees, partners, our Board and Community Advisory Committee, and staff that MeHAF should do more responsive grantmaking.

In 2019 we dug into this request. We learned that while MeHAF's focused grant programs are valued, particularly when they jump-start activities in important areas such as integrated care and "thriving in place," there is also a need for more open and predictable funding opportunities.

Thus, MeHAF created our new grant program, Community Responsive Grants. This program, launched in the summer of 2019, provides funding for community-defined solutions that align with one or more of MeHAF's goals and advance health equity. And in 2020, we'll start a second - the Systems Improvement and Innovation Responsive Grants program. Both new programs help us to quickly respond to changing health, social, and economic needs and trends.

Focused grantmaking will not go away, because it has resulted in essential changes in Maine. However, in the future, it will be driven both by defined best practices and by the innovations and trends we see in projects supported by our two responsive grantmaking programs.

As MeHAF concludes its 19th year and moves toward its 20th anniversary, we cherish our ability to hear and be responsive to the many individuals and organizations who are our partners and advisors. We all learn together then put what we learn to work for the benefit of communities within Maine, and the entire state.

*Furthering Health Equity by Building Capacity*

In 2019, we nearly doubled our investment in the Health Equity Capacity-Building (HECB) program, which supports organizations led by and serving communities that face

disproportionate barriers to health. The original group of eight grantees grew by an additional seven. This cohort of 15 Maine-based nonprofits exemplifies grassroots leadership in communities of color, LGBTQ+ communities, people with disabilities, and people experiencing homelessness.

Grantees meet to explore strategies for advancing health equity from their diverse and collective perspectives and to inform the continued implementation of the program and strengthen our broader work to advance equity in Maine. Grantees are also instrumental in guiding us as we seek to transform ourselves into an organization that is characterized by our responsiveness, our commitment to true partnerships with grantees, and with an informed use of our power to advance equitable outcomes and just systems.

Through deep and honest conversations with these partners, we have expanded our understanding of what organizations need to build their capacity, how we can use our leadership voice and visibility to influence change, and how to continually improve our work through shared feedback and planning.

### *Strengthening Systems for Better Care*

In 2019, our Expanding Patient-Centered Addiction Care grant program continued its long-standing work to support a robust, trauma-informed, integrated behavioral health care system by focusing on building capacity for medication-assisted treatment (MAT) for opioid use disorder.

Since the program's inception in 2017, grantees have reported promising results. These include: a 40% increase in the number of patients with their opioid use disorder documented; approximately 300 patients referred to Behavioral Health services; and the development and implementation of a universal release form to enhance care coordination between providers.

The number of authorized prescribers delivering MAT has increased by 65%, and the number of patients on MAT has increased tenfold. The work has also brought attention to how stigma, poverty, poor housing, and lack of insurance create significant barriers to patients' ability to access available treatment and achieve sustained recovery.

Our Expanding Patient-Centered Addiction Care Grant program is complemented by a variety of Foundation-Initiated and Discretionary Grant projects in our continued effort to be responsive to Maine's need for accessible, appropriate, and patient-centered addiction care.

### *Making Response the Reaction*

Beginning with information collected from grantees and applicants by the Center for Effective Philanthropy that offered reflections on improving our processes, we began hearing about untapped opportunities to better meet the needs of Maine people. Our networks suggested enhancing responsiveness to empower community-driven solutions to improve equitable access. The message was reinforced by diverse voices through focus groups preceding development of

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our Strategic Framework approved in 2018. It was then echoed in recommendations from our Equity Subcommittee of Board and Community Advisory Committee members to bring an equity lens to all of our work.

The subcommittee's recommendations included funding for community-initiated equity grants to address emerging issues and expanding our Discretionary Grants Program to better support community-identified needs and allow new voices to be heard. The committee also encouraged us to invite more community engagement in program design and RFP development.

Responding to these voices, we launched our Community Responsive Grants (CRG) Program in 2019, crafted with extensive input at all stages from our community partners. Partners were engaged from concept and RFP development to convening a review panel. Twenty-four people from across Maine communities helped to make final funding recommendations.

We awarded 14 Community Responsive Grants totaling \$592,878 to organizations that reflect strong community leadership, a deep understanding of their communities' needs, service to some of the most marginalized groups in Maine, and a strong commitment to advancing health equity. Of the organizations funded, five are new to support from us.

The CRG Program, which we anticipate repeating annually, will provide predictable opportunities to fund ideas and solutions - as defined by community members - that address issues and opportunities that align with our goals and advance health equity. Building on the experience and learning from the CRG program, we will launch a companion opportunity - the Systems Improvement and Innovation Responsive Grants Program - in 2020.

The Discretionary & Meeting Support Grants program experienced a record year as well, with 44 grants awarded, totaling \$226,731 - a 25% increase over 2018 and including 16 first-time grantees.

These programs provide ways for our grantee partners, who are embedded in their communities, to define their approaches to address our priorities, rather than being limited to fitting their needs into strategies we define. By offering more responsive opportunities, we hope to enhance our approach to grantmaking and contribute in new ways to positive changes in Maine.

*More Voices for Better Health Outcomes*

In 2019, we increased our investment in and redesigned our approach to funding for our Policy Advocacy program to be more inclusive, responsive, and grantee-centered. Our new strategy includes moving away from focusing on a defined set of health care access priorities shared by a smaller group of organizations, and toward supporting a larger group of advocacy organizations whose priorities reflect a more diverse and complete vision for health reform in Maine. The new approach also included a dedicated effort to bring in more community-led and community-driven organizations that are amplifying voices of those who face disproportionate barriers to health.

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Grantees in this larger and more representative cohort now receive unrestricted funding, allowing them to respond nimbly to dynamic policy environments, rather than project-based funding with pre-determined work plans. We have also responded to grantee requests to support communications and messaging efforts by engaging national and statewide experts to provide training and guidance to grantees.

We are committed to supporting advocates of good health policy, and we trust that putting grantee needs at the center of our design will result in better policies to benefit a healthy Maine for all, especially for those experiencing the greatest challenges.

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*The projects above represent examples of how MeHAF deploys an array of strategies to advance our work. In 2019, we made single and multi-year grants, funded consultant engagements to advance targeted work, provided technical assistance on various initiatives, and conducted research and analysis to advance our priorities and our mission.*

In 2019, MeHAF created its new grant program, Community Responsive Grants. This program, launched in the summer, provides funding for community-defined solutions that align with one or more of MeHAF's goals and advance health equity. MeHAF awarded 14 Community Responsive Grants totaling \$592,878 to organizations that reflect strong community leadership, a deep understanding of their community's needs, service to some of the most marginalized groups in Maine, and a strong commitment to advancing health equity. Of the organizations funded, five are new to support from MeHAF. The Discretionary & Meeting Support Grants program experienced a record year as well, with 44 grants awarded, totaling \$226,731 - a 25% increase over 2018 and including 16 first-time grantees.

Also in 2019, MeHAF nearly doubled its investment in the Health Equity Capacity-Building (HECB) program. This cohort of 15 Maine-based nonprofits exemplifies grassroots leadership in communities of color, LGBTQ+ communities, people with disabilities, and people experiencing homelessness. In addition, MeHAF's Expanding Patient-Centered Addiction Care grant program continued its long-standing work to support a robust, trauma-informed, integrated behavioral health care system by focusing on building capacity for medication-assisted treatment (MAT) for opioid use disorder.

MeHAF convenes grantees for regular meetings to share information and for "learning communities" at which experts share relevant information and research. Feedback from grantees indicates that this is viewed as helpful to their work and staff views this as among the most important things that MeHAF can do to support grantee success. In addition, Program Officers maintain regular contact with the directors of the grants (both competitive and foundation-initiated) they oversee, often through regularly scheduled progress update calls, and generally after reviewing interim and final grantee reports. Grants Associate, Holly Irish, provides technical support to grantees on budgeting, reporting, and application processes through one-on-one assistance, webinars and recorded trainings, and help videos that are posted on the MeHAF website.

**Line 2c:** All submission deadlines are outlined in the foundation's requests for proposals available through the website. [www.mehaf.org](http://www.mehaf.org). In addition to RFP solicitations, MeHAF offers open funding opportunities through the discretionary grants and meeting support program. MeHAF will also occasionally reach out to nonprofits to request that they submit foundation-initiated (invited) grants focused on specific topics defined by the foundation

**Line 2d:** MeHAF is a mission-driven organization that provides funding to promote access, advance higher quality health care delivery, and help Maine people regain or preserve good health. The foundation generally limits its grant awards offered through competitive RFPs to 501(c)(3) tax-exempt charitable organizations, educational institutions, governmental entities, tribal organizations, or other public, non-profit entities. Private foundations, individuals, fiscal sponsorships and organizations with pending non-profit status are generally ineligible to receive funding through the competitive RFP process. MeHAF primarily funds Maine-based organizations; however, qualified organizations from outside the state may apply for funding if the project activities focus on Maine's health care system or Maine residents.
