Are You Planting Winter Wheat This Fall?



Many times, planting winter wheat depends on when your soybeans &/or corn silage comes off. If you add winter wheat to your policy and do not plant any, you do not pay any premium.

After the late plant period, producers have the option to make the wheat uninsurable or take 60% of their original coverage and pay the full premium. If you plant uninsurable wheat, these acres must still be recorded. Please call your agent to discuss coverage.

September 30th	No Late Plant with the Winter Option
October 5th and 10th	10-day LPP (lose 1% coverage per day)
October 20th	5-day LPP (lose 1% coverage per day)

DEFFERAL OF INTEREST FOR 2022

The RMA has waived interest on spring planted crops until December 1st. Premium paid by Nov 30th will not be charged any interest.

This applies to Corn, Soybeans, Oats and Canning Crops.

Forage Seeding and Winter Wheat premium needs to be paid by Sept. 30 as that is the termination date for those policies & if unpaid they will be cancelled! Spring Seeding is typically on the same bill as your other spring crops, so contact your agent for clarification.

Harvest Reminders and Claims

As you drive around and look at crops, as we all do, you are hard pressed to find a field that doesn't show promising potential. We're not out of the woods yet, but overall things are looking pretty good.

Even with a good-looking crop, we still must keep a few things in mind as it pertains to your Crop Insurance policy. As we approach harvest, here are some reminders to check off your list before firing up equipment.

- Are you chopping silage, harvesting high moisture corn, or bypassing severely damaged areas? If the answer is yes to any, an appraisal of those acres will be needed. An appraisal will need to be set up before you begin harvest. Even if you don't think there is a loss, the appraisal is needed for verification of yield for your history, but is mandatory to pay a loss on those acres. The use of "check strips" can be beneficial, but if that is logistically impossible or overly inconvenient; communicate with your agent and adjuster right away.
- Do you have any "old crop" in the bin that you will be comingling with "new crop"? If you do, we will need to send an adjuster out to measure the existing production to be able to isolate the 2022 crop after harvest. Call your agent to set that up.
- Harvested production needs to be accounted for by unit. If you have "Optional Units" you need to keep track of production by section. If you have "Enterprise Units" keeping track by section or farm is less important but still highly recommended to keep your options open down the road if you chose to change unit structure.

- Do you have any "uninsured acres"? Uninsured New Breaking acres or crop planted after 1st crop hay for example will need to be kept separate from your insured acres when reporting for history purposes.
- If you notice any damage, contact your agent to file a claim. Notice is to be given to the company within 72 hours of discovery of the damage. We would always rather open a claim and release it than miss a deadline to report a payable loss.

In my experience, most of the issues we run into with claims could be headed off with early communication between the farmer and agent or adjuster. If you ever question something or are in doubt of how the policy works, please reach out to your agent so we can all stay on the same page. Best of luck as we head into the fields and stay safe!

New Changes to the Forage Seeding Policy!

Summer/Fall Seeded Alfalfa: If you have a forage seeding policy in place by July 31st, you can insure any fall planted seeding that is between 60%-100% Alfalfa. "Fall Seeded" alfalfa is any alfalfa seeding planted between July 1st and the final plant date for your county. New for 2023, the old final plant dates of 8/1, 8/15, & 8/20 have moved back to 8/10, 8/20, & 8/31. Please reference the map to find what applies to your county.


Spring Seeded Alfalfa and Red Clover: In the spring you can insure your 60% - 100% alfalfa and/or red clover seeding. In the past, WI had final plant dates of 5/15, 5/25, & 5/31, depending on your county.

New for 2023, 41 counties now have a pushed back final plant date of 5/31 and 19 northern counties have had their final plant date extended to 6/15!

There is still no late plant period for forage seeding. However, these changes give you a longer time period to get that seeding planted and for it to be insurable!

Also, in the past forage seeding fields harvested after 8/15 or 8/20, depending on the county, had their forage seeding coverage terminated, as this was considered the end of the insurance period. New for 2023, that date has changed to August 31st for all, but the most northern 17 counties in WI. This will give producers more time to harvest into late summer/early fall without jeopardizing their forage seeding coverage.

Coverage For Your Hay

You have 3 different policy options to consider when looking to cover your established hay. Each of these policies work quite differently.

APH Forage

- Uses a tonnage history to establish your guarantee.
- You must keep tonnage records per cutting to keep your history.
- If you rip up fields, it is crucial for you to inform your agent, so it doesn't impact your APH.
- Deadline to sign up is September 30th

AYP Forage

- The guarantee for this policy is based on an area expected yield.
- Losses are figured off of county/ area yield declines.
- There is no record keeping on your tonnage for this policy.
- Losses are not paid until the following spring when yields are announced.
- •Deadline to sign up is September 30th

PRF (Pasture Rangeland Forage)

- Covers only lack of rainfall, regardless of yield.
- There is no record keeping.
- You pick 2-month intervals. If there is not normal rainfall during that period, the policy pays. You can pick as many 2-month interval as you would like.
- You can insure fields intended for having or grazing.
- Deadline to sign up is December 1st.

Important Prevent Plant Reminder

The rules changed in 2021 to read that acreage must have been "planted to a crop, insured, and harvested" in at least 1 out of the previous 4 crop years to qualify for a prevent plant payment.

You will NOT have PP coverage, if you cannot prove that the land was planted to a crop, insured, and harvested in 1 of the last 4 years. That land also MUST be planted, insured, and harvested for 2 consecutive crop years for that land to be PP eligible again. So please keep in mind if you are:

- a new producer
- adding new land to your operation
- taking hay or pasture out of rotation
- taking a crop insurance policy for the first time

Price Movement and Your Revenue Policy

Each fall we get questions regarding how the price movement in the markets affects our Crop Insurance policy. Here is a quick refresher to help you identify if you may be in a loss situation. Revenue protection policies set a guaranteed revenue per acre which is based on your coverage level and your production history multiplied by the projected price that was set in February based on CBOT. At harvest we look at the bushels that you harvest and multiply that amount by the harvest price, which is again set by CBOT on the average of December corn and November soybeans during the month of October.

Today, it appears that the October Corn price will be higher than the \$5.90 Feb price we used to set our guarantee. If that is the case, your yield would need to be below your coverage level to trigger a loss. Any bushels below the trigger point will be replaced using the higher October price.

For example:

Corn history of 180 at 80% = 144 bu. and October corn is \$6.75.

You harvest 140 bu. The 4 bushels short are paid at \$6.75 or \$45.56 / acre.

As of this moment when I'm writing this, soybeans are at \$14.17 which is very close to the \$14.33 they were in February. If Oct is above Feb, it will work the same as the above corn example. If Oct is below Feb, then we could see a potential price loss payment.

For example:

Soybean history of 54 at 80% = 43bu. Rev Guar = (43 X \$14.33) \$619/acre.

You harvest 44 bu so there is no bu loss. Oct price average is \$14.00.

 $44 \times 14.00 = \$616$. (\$619 - \$616) = \$3.00 revenue loss per acre.

This is a very shallow loss of course, but it illustrates the point that you need to watch these numbers closely and make sure you identify your triggers with your agent so that we get claims submitted timely if needed.

Again, the policy will not use what you sold the crop for. All numbers are derived from the CBOT.

Margin Protection For Corn & Soybeans

Margin Protection (MP) provides coverage against an unexpected decrease in operating margin (revenue less input costs). MP is area-based, using county-level estimates of revenue and input costs to establish the amount of coverage and indemnity payments.

Key Points

- •Purchased in fall September 30th deadline o Uses expected county yields
- Area-Based plan (add-on to RP)
 - o Harvest yields calculated by county
 - o Federally subsidized premiums
- Provides shallow loss coverage
 - o 90% and 95% coverage levels available
 - o Can be stand alone or add-on to RP/YP
 - Premium credit if add-on
 - Receive higher of MP or RP/YP indemnity
- Protects against a decline in margin
 - o Drop in future price
 - o Decline in county yields
 - o Increase in variable costs

Planting Cover Crops?

If you plant cover crops, please make sure to report them to FSA by November 15th, in the event of a credit becoming available for 2023.

Advantages of MP

- Protects against a decline in margin
- Federally subsidized
- Provides for early price discovery on MP o August 15-September 14th

Disadvantages of MP

- Must be purchased by 9/30
- Individual farm APH and costs aren't considered in the coverage
- Indemnity not determined until June 2024
- Additional premium and administrative fee if purchased with RP/YP policy
- If you have MP, can't buy ECO and/or SCO MP is the only federally subsidized insurance product that considers input costs to determine an indemnity. The current economic conditions of higher projected prices and rising costs may make MP a valuable risk management tool for your operation. Contact your insurance agent to learn more about MP.
