Also, Dunamis Piano Duo won the second prize at the Ischia International Piano Competition, without the first prize being awarded. Presently, they are actively teaching pre-college students, along with performing around the country and sharing beautiful piano duet music on YouTube.

Georgia is known for our prominence in the timber industry, with 24.5 million acres of forests in our state. Has Georgia's landscape always existed in this condition? What might our landscape have looked like in 1700, and what do we have to lose from a changing landscape? We will look at land use history to see the drastic changes that have occurred over the past two centuries. Beyond that, we will look to evidence from other historical documents, plant ecology, and grassland remnants that suggest a Georgia that was unlike the one we know today and discuss what we can do to conserve Georgia's native ecosystems.



Zach Wood is an ecologist, land manager, and wildland firefighter whose focus is on grassland restoration. Zach provides leadership and technical assistance to land-managing organizations and individuals in Georgia, Alabama, and South Carolina whose goal is to restore and manage native grassland habitats. Zach's expertise is in prescribed fire as a land management tool for endangered species.

The Georgia State Lunatic, Idiot, and Epileptic Asylum, more commonly known as Central State Hospital, opened its doors in Milledgeville in 1842. Over the next hundred years, the number of patients grew to more than 12,000 in the 1960s, making it the largest mental institution in the world. The goal for the creation of many state hospitals was one of benevolent care, but overcrowding quickly turned that goal into one of survival, and Central State Hospital and other institutions across the nation became warehouses for people with disabilities. In the late 1960s, several exposés uncovered the inhumane conditions contained therein. This presentation will include photos and stories from Central State Hospital and from five mental institutions in the northeast. It will also highlight the role that parents played in advocating for the educational rights of their children once they were removed from the institutions. Finally, in stark juxtaposition to this bleak history of Milledgeville, the presenter will share information about the creation of Georgia College’s inclusive postsecondary education program, GC THRIVE, to serve college students with intellectual disabilities.

Dr. Nicole M. DeClouette serves as Interim Associate Dean and Professor of Special Education at Georgia College & State University and as Vice President for the Council for Exceptional Children’s (CEC) Division of International Special Education and Services (DISES). Dr. DeClouette’s interest in institutionalization began when she was a doctoral student at Syracuse University and exposed to *Christmas in Purgatory*. She considers the co-author, Dr. Burton Blatt, her “philosophical grandfather.”

On this lively evening of amazing jazz, the Andersons will explore the works of pianist and composer Duke Ellington (1899-1974), arguably the most prolific American composer of all time. Ellington's songs include "It Don't Mean a Thing If it Ain't Got That Swing," "Mood Indigo," "Caravan," "In My Solitude," "In a Sentimental Mood," and "Satin Doll."

The Andersons have recorded on 3 volumes of the Grammy-winning soundtrack to HBO's Boardwalk Empire, and they received a Drama Desk Nomination for their Off-Broadway Production "Le Jazz Hot" in 2012. Aside from leading performances in over 45 U.S. States, in Japan, Brazil, Canada, and the U.K., they've lectured at over a dozen universities, including Florida State, Xavier, Temple, and Ohio State. Joining them this evening is jazz guitarist, Adam Moezinia.


When a severed hand washes ashore in the wealthy enclave of Palm Beach, Florida, the lives of two women—a lonely writer obsessed with the unsolved murder of her mother’s best friend and a panicked wife whose husband has disappeared with their children—collide as the world shutters in the pandemic lockdown of 2020. In a nod to the true crime that inspired it, Deborah Goodrich Royce’s *Reef Road* probes unhealed generational scars in a wrenching and original work of fiction.


In her talk, Deborah will weave together the story of her life—from her small-town childhood to her film and television career to her historic preservation projects to her success as a writer, sprinkling in two marriages, children, stepchildren, grandchildren, and fascinating friendships along the way. She will lead it up to her latest book, which circles back to the real-life murder of her mother’s best friend in 1948 Pittsburgh and the effect this unsolved crime has had on them both.

Deborah Goodrich Royce’s thrillers examine puzzles of identity. *Ruby Falls* won the Zibby Award for Best Plot Twist in 2021, and *Finding Mrs. Ford* was hailed by Forbes, BookRiot, and Good Morning America’s “best of” lists in 2019.

She began as an actress on *All My Children* and in multiple films, before transitioning to the role of story editor at Miramax Films, developing *Emma* and early versions of *Chicago* and *A Wrinkle in Time*.

With her husband, Chuck, Deborah restored the Avon Theatre, Ocean House Hotel, Deer Mountain Inn, United Theatre, Savoy Bookshop & Café, and numerous Main Street revitalization projects in Rhode Island and the Catskills.





