#### 2022 Grad Receives **Prestigious Scholarship**

A member of the Class of 2022 did something a Crusader has not done in a decade...received the McConnell Scholars Program award.



Ali Geiger earned the exclusive scholarship to the University of Louisville. Only 10 students in the state receive the award each year which includes full tuition, room and board, books, fees, and travel. The program is aimed at Kentucky residents who have demonstrated outstanding leadership potential and are committed to the principles of scholarship, leadership and service. Applicants must also at least minor in political science.

In addition to receiving the scholarship, Ali got the chance to meet Senator McConnell and his wife, former Secretary of Transportation, Elaine Chao.

The last Crusader to win the scholarship was Kevin Grout in 2012.

#### 2022 Grad Receives **Art Scholarship**

A member of the Class of 2022 Creative Cru receives a scholarship to help her continue her artistic journey. Belle Schmid was awarded Xavier University's McAuley Art Scholarship. The scholarship is awarded to incoming first-year students majoring in art with good academic achievement



and outstanding artistic talent. The current four-year value of this award is \$152,000!

#### 2022 Grad Earns Impressive Academic **Scholarship**

The scholarships just keep on coming for the Class of 2022! Brooke Meyer also received a significant scholarship from Western Kentucky University. She was awarded the Cherry Presidential Scholarship, which is the University's most prestigious academic award. She was one of only 17 students to receive it this year. The scholarship is valued at \$16,000 annually and worth \$64,000 during a fouryear period.

Brooke plans to major in Environmental, Sustainability, and Geographic Studies.

#### **Crusaders Earn Industry** Certification

Two members of the Class of 2022 are industry certified in Machine Tool Technology.

Justin Middendorf and Caleb Dickman both received certification for Measurements, Materials, and Safety from the National Institute for Metalworking Skills (NIMS). Both split their school day between SHDHS and the Boone County Area Technology Center, where they studied Machine Tool Technology.

Justin and Caleb were both awarded \$1,500 scholarships through the Gene Haas Foundation, whose primary goal is to build skills in the

machining industry. Their scholarships can be used to help cover the costs of tuition, books, their personal National Institute for Metalworking Skills (NIMS) account, the cost of their individual NIMS credentials, or required tools for their program. Justin and Caleb will both continue their Machine Tool Technology education at Gateway Community and Technical College in the Fall.

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#### **National Merit Finalist**

Peter Constant '22 was named a National Merit Finalist.

He is one of only 15,000 students in the nation to be named a finalist.

### Pavback Challenge Winner

A Class of 2022 grad won a nationwide challenge and earned a scholarship for his efforts.

Next-Gen Personal Finance is a nationwide organization that helps teachers and students expand their personal finance knowledge. Noah Francis, along with ten of his classmates, entered the Payback Challenge back in October. Students had to play a game on the website and then create an essay or video reflecting on the lessons learned in the game.

1,200 students nationwide entered the contest and Noah was chosen as the \$1000 winner from the state of Kentucky.

the recent pandemic. I am thankful that Mr. Gish has agreed to serve as our Assistant Principal during my transition. He will be a great resource not only to me, but to every student, parent, faculty, and staff member.

I am excited about where SHDHS is positioned today and look forward to connecting with our amazing students, parents, teachers, staff members, alumni, and community supporters over the next school year.

#### Seniors Receive Medal-Cross of St. Benedict

A tradition that began three years ago ensures that Seniors will have a piece of SHDHS with them wherever they go.

The tradition of the Senior Cross began in 2020, during the Covid Pandemic, as a way to unite all of the graduating seniors while honoring the Catholic and Benedictine tradition that has been a staple of the school's heritage and success for so many years.

The history and tradition of SHDHS has always been closely tied with and steeped in the





traditions of the Benedictines. When the original school was founded in 1893 the pastor of the parish asked the Benedictine Sisters of St. Walburg Monastery to help teach and run the school. The sisters did so gladly, often going without a salary, to help ensure the local school children had access to a Catholic education. That devotion continued through the official founding of St. Henry High School in 1933. The Benedictine heritage can be found throughout the halls of the District High School that was built and dedicated in 1998.

Since 2020 every graduating senior is presented with a blessed Medal-Cross of St. Benedict that they can carry with them as a reminder of their time at SHDHS. The cross also serves as a symbol and reminder that through the love of Christ, they will always find protection and guidance, as they continue on their journey in life. The Medal-Cross of St. Benedict has a rich history of faith and protection from evil that dates back almost 1,000 years.

The crosses handed out this year to the Class of 2022 were extra special because they were blessed by Deacon (now Father) **AJ Gedney '10.** A special thank you to Kris Staverman for capturing the blessing in photos.

The Medal-Cross of St. Benedict helps to tie each Crusader alumni to each other while providing a great sacramental reminder of our Catholic faith, and gives each a spiritual gift to aid them on their journey after high school. The Medal-Cross of St. Benedict is indeed the embodiment of the unofficial school motto of St. Henry District High School: "Once a Crusader, Always a Crusader."

#### Crusaders March for Life

A group from SHDHS attended the 49th Annual March for Life this year in Washington DC. The March commemorates the anniversary of Roe vs Wade, which legalized abortion in the US.

The group began their journey by celebrating mass with other groups from the Diocese of Covington, then they attended the outdoor rally which featured several speakers, and then concluded the day with over 100,000 people marching past the steps of the US Supreme Court as a witness to those who cannot speak for themselves, the unborn.

Mrs. Tina Ryan said the temperatures were low, but their spirits high as they marched for a world where the beauty and dignity of every human life is valued and protected.

#### The Cru Cafe

The 2021/22 school year included the opening of the Cru Cafe, a student-led cafe open during Flex offering special drinks and snacks one day per week to students and faculty. The Cru Cafe was created to boost the morale and culture at SHDHS. In addition to having a common area for students to gather and enjoy time with their classmates during Flextime, the Cru Cafe also incorporates a learning environment for one of our students, Jenna Hail.

Jenna, like most students, has dreams and goals for the future. Jenna writes daily and dreams of becoming a journalist. In her writing, she expresses her deep care for her family and friends. Outside of school, Jenna has been the SHDHS volleyball manager and participated on the girl's basketball team. Although these activities have helped to build connections within the Crusader community, it was important for Jenna's teachers to find an innovative way for Jenna to build skills and strengthen relationships. Thus, the Cru Cafe was developed.

The Cru Cafe provides Jenna with job and social skills that will help her transition to the Supported Higher Education Program (SHEP) at NKU. The SHEP Program is an inclusive program through which students with intellectual disability (ID) who have graduated from high school, either with a traditional or alternate diploma, can attend NKU as nondegree seeking students.

Jenna assists with the drink menu for the week, helps to order the supplies while comparing prices under a certain

budget, creates posters for the upcoming events by using Canva, and keeps track of her expenses and profits with her math teacher. Not only is the Cru Cafe an academic learning experience



for Jenna, but she is also making friendships and building rapport with her classmates. One of Jenna's classmates, Elizabeth Tabeling, said, "Jenna is the type of friend you can't help but smile when you see her, and I knew that as soon as I met her freshman year. My friendship with Jenna began freshman year during PE class. Most people turn away from the idea of having PE first period, but I am a strong believer God placed both Jenna and me in that class for a special reason. At the time I didn't realize it, but looking back as a soon to be junior, I wouldn't trade dripping sweat at 8:00 in the morning with my best friend by my side for anything in this world. Jenna's positive attitude also contributed to the success of the volleyball team this past fall. In each game, Jenna was assigned a player's water bottle to keep track of and to hand to that specific player during a timeout and between sets. With Jenna being the team manager for the volleyball team last season, I got the opportunity to evolve our friendship and get to know Jenna a little more personally. If you would have told me freshman year that Jenna and I would be state champions together I would have told you you're crazy, but that is what God had in store for us. God's presence has always been foremost in my life, and I think it's safe to say that God blessed me with the most amazing person to call my best friend. Jenna has

not only taught me to show respect to everyone who walks in my path, but she has totally changed my outlook on life for the better."

All items offered at the Cru Cafe are \$1.00. Although this has been a challenge, given the specialty drinks offered, it has been important to keep costs low so that all students can enjoy a drink if they choose. The Cru Cafe has offered hot cocoa with toppings, Shirley Temples, sparkling blue drinks in honor of Autism Awareness, Arnold Palmers (Jenna's favorite), iced tea with fresh mint, lemonade with fresh lemon slices, Easter punch served with Peeps, and rootbeer/ orange/red soda floats. There have been various days when special snacks have been available also. The cafe offerings included Cincinnati Bengals-themed rice crispy treats, St Paddy's Day chocolate covered pretzels with sprinkles, doughnuts, and pop-tarts.

All Cru Cafe profits are going toward the Buddy Walk, a fundraiser supporting the Down Syndrome Association of Greater Cincinnati. The 2022 Buddy Walk will take place Saturday, September 10. Inclusive education is a priority at SHDHS. We value all students of all capabilities and work diligently to provide the best methods to nurture student growth, education, and dignity. When students with disabilities are included, real learning takes place on several different levels. Our community is blessed to have Jenna running our Cru Cafe.

#### Down Syndrome Awareness Day

Crusaders sported some crazy socks to support Down Syndrome Awareness Day.

On March 21 the SHDHS community took part in activities to educate them on the importance of supporting those who have directly or indirectly experienced life with Down Syndrome. This day is extra close to the hearts of the



Crusaders because of Jenna Hail, a junior, who was born with Down Syndrome.

One of our activities to bring awareness was to recognize students for doing Random Acts of Kindness. Jenna's family donated 21 pairs of socks from the World Down Syndrome International foundation to those students who were caught being kind. Students wore mismatched, colorful, or crazy socks to show their support of Jenna and The Cru Cafe served her favorite springtime drinks: lemonade and Arnold Palmer. Jenna also passed out stickers to her classmates.

#### SHDHS Goes Blue For Autism Awareness

The halls of SHDHS went from Crusader red to blue in honor of Autism Awareness Month.

Students and faculty wore blue and gathered at an assembly on April 5 to celebrate Autism

"Beauty and the Beast" was the final SHDHS performance for Jay Giffin '22. Here is his reflection on the musical as a whole and the role he got to play...

When I was told that Saint Henry's spring musical would be "Beauty and the Beast", I was excited. After all, it's a classic that everyone knows and -- more importantly -- that everyone loves. Furthermore, from an artistic perspective, the story impressively juggles meaty themes in a timeless

fashion without disturbing the whimsy of the script's fun aspects. With this in mind, I couldn't wait to see the vision that our director, Sofia Vietas, constructed, and I was not disappointed. With such a well-known story, it's very easy to simply stage what's written, but Ms. Vietas avoided this pitfall and went above and beyond. She brought life to the songs and scenes, conjuring substance where it otherwise seemed like there wasn't any. On top of that, she empowered our cast to find unique ways to express our characters. My favorite part of working under Ms. Vietas is her open-mindedness and her trust in her actors, and these aspects of her directing style were very much present in rehearsals. If a cast member asked a guestion beginning in "what if..." then Ms. Vietas's response was always an enthusiastic "yes!" As the beast, she gave me a lot of liberty to flesh out my character how I saw fit and to make my character my own, and that hasn't been my experience under many directors. By facilitating such a fun, creative, and playful environment, Ms. Vietas built the foundation





of our show on camaraderie and fun, and both of these aspects seeped into the final product.

This production really brought people together, and I think that's one of our theater program's greatest aspects. Saint Henry's program offers students a way to make like-minded friends in an accepting and creative environment. It was an honor to be a part of Beauty and the Beast, and it has been an honor to have been a part of Saint Henry's theater program for the past four years.

I think the story's message about anyone being able to change, no matter how far gone they are, is more pertinent than it's ever been. I feel blessed to have been a part of telling such a beautiful story with such beautiful people.

The FPS Team worked through the future problem-solving process to formulate challenges, develop an underlying problem, create solutions, and develop an action plan to solve futuristic problems surrounding



global issues. This year's topics included Building Green (District), Insects (Regionals), and Mining (State Finals). Solutions generated in the process consider science, safety, cost, efficiency, carbon footprint, global debate, sustainability, and many other facets. The Crusader baseball team celebrated a historic season this year.


For the first time in school history the team made it to the Regional championship and finished as Regional

Mark Ryan finished second in the state in the pole vault


and Al Bessler came in third in the high jump. Mark also tied the SHDHS school record in pole vault at 13'6".

The Lady Cru redesigned and stocked shelves, put fresh coats of paint in the entryway and office, and loaded a truck with essentials to be shipped to Ukraine.

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
### Goodbye, Bowls

#### Grad Who Beat Cancer Now Pitching For UC

Alex Shea '19 has come a long way, and notched many accomplishments, since he was diagnosed with cancer his freshman year at SHDHS. He is five years cancer free, is pitching for the University of Cincinnati, and is currently playing for the Cincinnati Steam.

In early July, Shea

pitched the final inning in the Great Lakes Summer Collegiate League All-Star Game to preserve a 3-0 win by the South Division team. According to the Enquirer, the game was set for 10 innings so all 10 pitchers on each roster could throw one inning. Shea pitched the top of the 10th and got the save to complete a onehit shutout. Entering the All-Star break, Shea has pitched five games for the Steam, giving up five hits and two earned runs in nine innings while striking out 12.

Shea, a left-hander with a fastball

clocking in at over 95 miles per hour, is coming off his sophomore season at the University of Cincinnati. He feels blessed to be able to pitch after he was diagnosed with Hodgkin lymphoma in April 2016. He underwent extensive treatments for five months, and was declared to be in remission in September of that year, his sophomore year at SHDHS.

During his treatments, the Crusader community rallied around him. He was the focus of an all-day softball event

during his freshman year that was set up to raise funds for cancer and was also honored that fall at the Playing for a Purpose volleyball game against Notre Dame. During the same time he was visited in the hospital by Reds star Joey Votto. Shea got to reunite with Votto at a Reds game in 2021.

After going into remission, he was able to rejoin the St. Henry baseball team for the 2017 season, pitching for the Crusaders for his final three years.

His senior season, he went 5-2 with a 2.12 ERA, allowing only 12 hits in 30 innings. He threw a no-hitter against Ludlow in the 34th District semifinals, helping the Crusaders win their second-straight district championship.

"Everyone goes through ups and downs in their life," he said. "I feel like I have, too. Just being able to get back and play baseball once again, go to a higher level. It's very rewarding. It's a very cool opportunity and I'm glad to have it."

Shea enrolled at the University of Cincinnati to major in finance. He didn't sign with the baseball team but was recruited to join the team after he attended a prospect camp during his freshman year.

His freshman season at UC, 2020, was canceled by the pandemic. He pitched only two innings in 2021, but this past season he had a significant role for the team.

He pitched in 12 games totaling 22 innings. He had an ERA of 8.59 but struck out 23 and allowed only 21 hits in those 22 innings.

"I had some ups and downs. I had some great games and also had some games I want to have back," Shea told the Enquirer. "Being able to play college baseball at the Division I level is pretty awesome. I got to pitch against Ohio State, get some innings out of the pen and I got to start in the conference tournament. It was really a cool year, a lot of cool experiences."

UC head coach Scott Googins said Shea's cancer treatments kept him from being recruited. But now that he's in the UC program and developing his strength and his ability, the sky is the limit.

Alex has two more seasons of eligibility for the UC baseball team and is on track to graduate in the spring of 2023. While he doesn't know what the future holds, he loves being in the present.

"As you grow older, you get more perspective on things. Looking back, I think about how cool this opportunity is. I work hard every day because you can never take anything for granted."

#### Sydney Pitts '13 is a Marine Mammal


