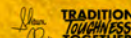

2019

RECORD: 13-1

2018

RECORD: 11-2

2017

RECORD: 9-4

2016

RECORD: 10-3

2015

RECORD: 11-2



Making its FBS postseason debut, App State rallied from a 24-7 deficit and kicked a 23-yard field goal as time expired in a 31-29 win against Ohio in the Camellia Bowl in Montgomery, Ala.

54-12

App State's 54-12 record from 2015-19 ranked as the fifth-best mark in the country during that span, trailing just Clemson, Alabama, Ohio State and Oklahoma.

KIDD BREWER STADIUM



In addition to boasting one of the most picturesque settings for college football with App State's campus and the natural beauty of the High Country serving as a backdrop, Kidd Brewer Stadium also stakes claim to being one of the toughest venues in the nation.

Going into its 59th season in the venerable stadium, which opened as Conrad Stadium on Sept. 15, 1962, App State boasts a 252-76-5 all-time record at home, including wins in 98 of its last 116 home games.

With the construction of the \$50 million north end zone facility, removal of the track and installation of new turf, The Rock has a new look in 2020. There are also plans to honor Hall of Fame coach Jerry Moore with a plaza and statue in his name outside the new end zone facility.

The facility will house a new football locker room, weight room, offices and



team areas, as well as 1,000 club level seats, athletic training spaces, retail and dining service facilities.

App State led the FCS in regular-season attendance in each of its final seven seasons at that level. It led the FBS Sun Belt

Conference in home football attendance in 2016, 2017 and 2019, averaging 25,787 fans in Boone during the 2017 season, 23,351 fans per regular-season home game in 2018 and 23,806 fans per home game during a 13-1 season in 2019.

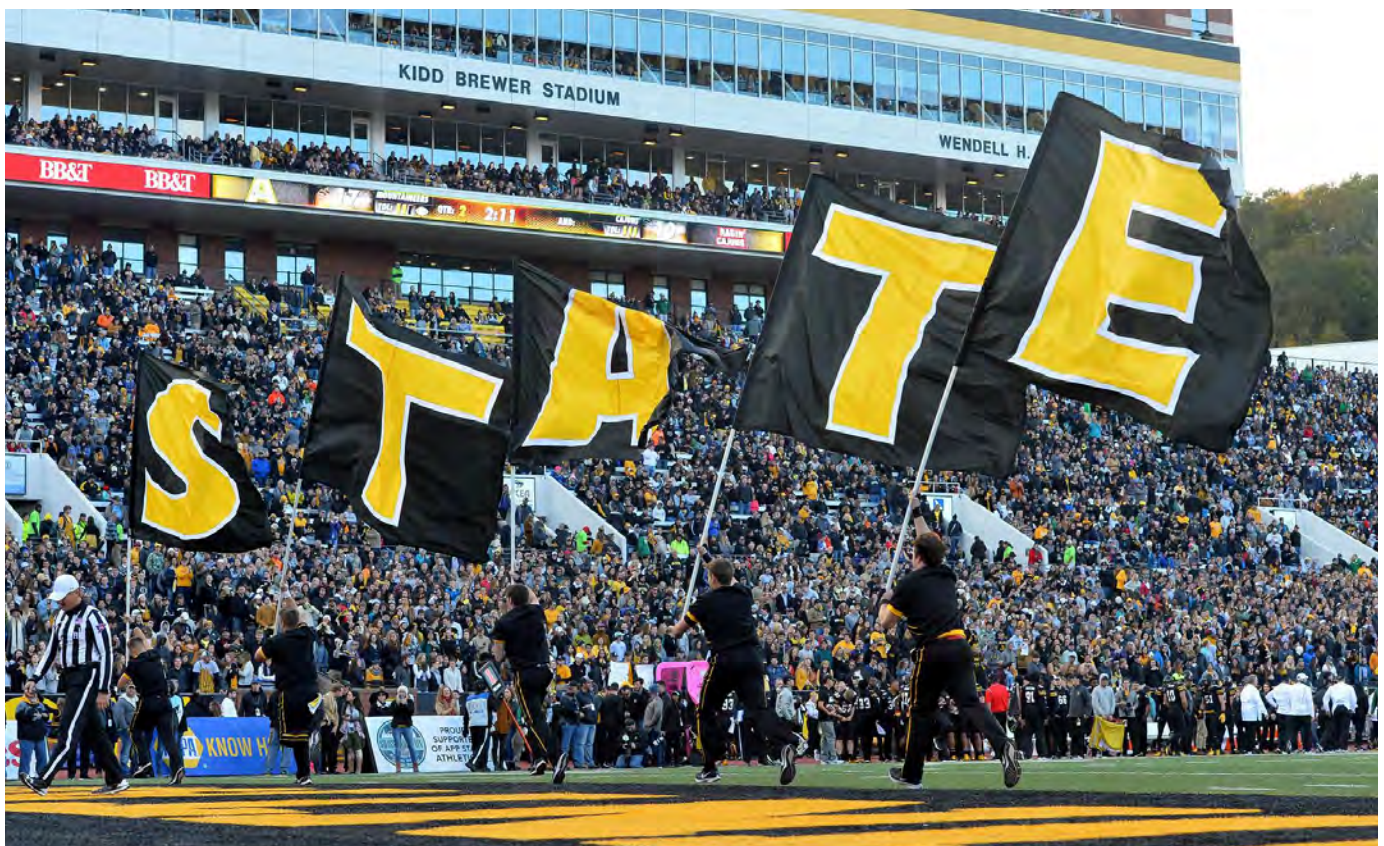
Kidd Brewer Stadium's seating capacity is 30,000, and Wake Forest's visit to Boone in 2017 attracted a record crowd of 35,126. The record was broken just one year after Miami's visit to The Rock drew a crowd of 34,658.

Kidd Brewer Stadium is now part of the Mark E. Ricks Athletics Complex. Thanks to philanthropic funding through A Mountaineer Impact, the video board display in 2017 increased to three times the size of the previous board with 2,500 square feet to feature 13HD technology from Daktronics. It measures 50 feet high by 90 feet wide for the overall scoreboard, with the new LED display measuring more than 37 feet high by 67 feet wide.

Kidd Brewer Stadium's official seating capacity was 16,650 in 2007, but several expansion projects, including construction of the 120,000-square-foot athletics center, have almost doubled the capacity.

Conrad Stadium opened in honor of former University trustee and R.J. Reynolds executive William J. Conrad and was originally constructed with 10,000 permanent seats.

Conrad Stadium was renamed on Sept. 3, 1988 in honor of Kidd Brewer, one of the most successful head coaches in App State football history and a colorful part of N.C. history. Brewer, a Winston-Salem native who served as head football coach of the Mountaineers from 1935-38, compiled a 30-5-3 overall mark in his four seasons.

Entering the 2020 season just shy of 1,000 all-time football games played, App State has proven itself as a championship-caliber program at both the FCS and FBS levels. The Mountaineers' run to three straight FCS national titles from 2005-07 included the historic 34-32 upset of No. 5 Michigan in 2007, and App State ended the 2019 season with not only a fourth straight Sun Belt title but also a fifth consecutive bowl victory.

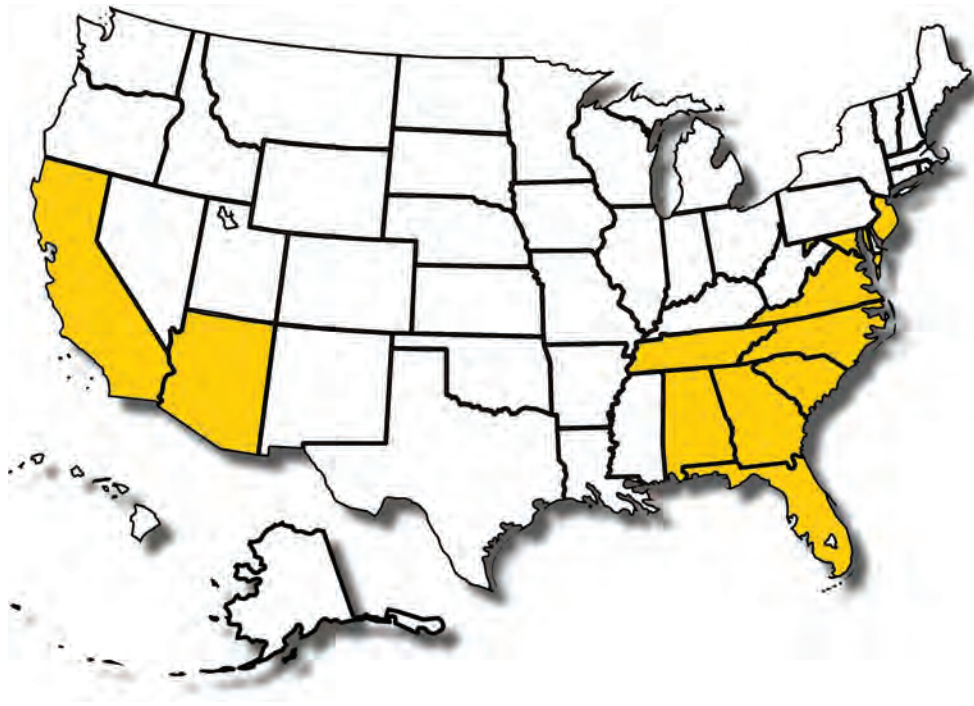

DR. SHERI EVERTS / CHANCELLOR



DR. SHERI EVERTS joined Appalachian State University as its eighth leader in July 2014. Previously, she had been provost and vice president for academic affairs at Illinois State University since 2008.

A Nebraska native who attended elementary school in a one-room schoolhouse, Everts graduated from the University of Nebraska-Lincoln in 1980 with a bachelor's degree in English instruction and secondary education. After teaching middle school and high school English in Kansas and Nebraska, she returned to UNL, where she earned a master's degree in literacy education and English (1991) and a doctorate in administration, curriculum and instruction (1994).

Everts began her higher education career in 1994 as an assistant professor in the Department of Teacher Education at the University of Nebraska Omaha. Rising through the academic and administrative ranks at UNO, she was named assistant vice chancellor for academic and student affairs in 2000, promoted to associate vice president in 2003 and named interim senior vice chancellor for academic and student affairs in 2006. She served in that interim capacity until June 30, 2008, when she went to Illinois State and also served as interim president at ISU.

Under Everts' leadership, App State has distinguished itself as

the premier, public undergraduate institution in the state of North Carolina.

Everts has continued the university's trend of slow and steady enrollment growth, placing emphasis on serving the citizens of North Carolina by increasing access to an App State education for underrepresented, rural and first-generation college students. Current enrollment stands at 20,023, representing an enrollment increase from 2019 of 3 percent in undergraduate students, 11 percent in graduate students and 18 percent in graduate and undergraduate students who enrolled in App State Online degree programs. Between 2014 and 2020, Everts led the university's increase in underrepresented students by 56 percent and first-year underrepresented students by 97 percent. As of fall 2020, 18 percent of App State students are from underrepresented populations, 30 percent come from rural areas and 34 percent of the total undergraduate population are first-generation college students. First-to-second-year retention rates exceed the national average by 12 percentage points.

Everts and the university hold our student-athletes to high academic standards. At Appalachian, student-athletes demonstrate the dedication and work ethic necessary to participate in their sport at the college level while maintaining exemplary performance in the classroom. Evidence of their academic success, in recent years, App State's athletics department has been named a two-time recipient of the Sun Belt Conference's Institutional Graduation Rate Award and has posted 16 consecutive semesters with a GPA above 3.0.

DOUG GILLIN / DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS



DOUG GILLIN was named App State's Director of Athletics on Feb. 27, 2015, and he officially began the role April 6, 2015.

Hired by Dr. Sheri Everts, App State's Chancellor, Gillin is in his sixth year in Boone. He has overseen progress in all facets of an athletics department that was in the beginning stages of its transition from FCS football and Southern Conference membership to FBS football and the Sun Belt Conference upon his arrival.

Earlier this year, Gillin was named one of four national Under Armour Athletics Directors of the Year for 2019-20. Among the most noteworthy accomplishments under Gillin's watch during the 2019-20 academic year:

- Spring 2020 marked the 16th consecutive semester that App State student-athletes achieved a collective 3.0 grade point average. The cumulative GPA of 3.25 and semester GPA of 3.59 surpassed the highest on record at App State.
- App State Football had a historic 2019 season, going 13-1 with road wins over the ACC's North Carolina and SEC's South Carolina, a fourth straight Sun Belt Championship and fifth straight bowl victory. It was the first 13-win season for a Sun Belt team or an FBS team from North Carolina. The team's final rankings of No. 18 in the Coaches Poll and No. 19 in the AP Poll are the highest in Sun Belt and school history.
- With 14,460 volunteer hours, App State Athletics finished second overall in the NCAA Division I Team Works Community Service competition for 2019-20.
- Construction is coming to a close on a \$50 million multi-purpose end zone facility at Kidd Brewer Stadium that will house the new football locker room, weight room, offices and team areas, as well as 1,000 club level seats, athletic training spaces, retail and dining service facilities.
- The Yosef Club brought in a school-record \$3.7 million in 2019.
- The App State Athletics and App State Football social media accounts were among the nation's fastest growing in 2019, as researched by SkullSparks and opendorse.

Under Gillin, App State Athletics' stated mission is to "support the educational mission of the university," doing so by adhering to four core values:

ACADEMIC INTEGRITY: App State also tied for first in the Sun Belt in 2019-20 with 10 teams achieving a perfect 1,000 single-year APR score. It led the league with five teams receiving NCAA Public Recognition Awards.

SOCIAL RESPONSIBILITY: In 2019-20, App State also had eight programs finish in the top 10 of their respective sports in the NCAA Division I Team Works Community Service competition.

COMPETITIVE EXCELLENCE: Gillin has helped oversee one of the most successful transitions to the FBS level of football in history. Outside of four straight conference titles and five straight bowl wins in football, other team championships under Gillin's watch include 2016, 2017, 2018 and 2019 SoCon wrestling, 2016 Sun Belt women's indoor track and field, 2016 and 2018 Sun Belt women's cross country, 2017 and 2019 Sun Belt men's cross country, 2019 Sun Belt women's tennis and the 2019 WBI tournament.

WORLD-CLASS EXPERIENCE: An emphasis on enhancing the health and well-being for App State student-athletes has seen the institution of the AppFuel nutrition program, the hiring of the department's first full-time dietitian and the hiring of the department's first full-time sports psychologist.



THE GILLIN FAMILY

Construction began at the Kidd Brewer Stadium north end zone site in early 2019, and donations to athletics have hit record highs.

Before arriving in Boone, Gillin was the deputy director of athletics at the University of Missouri from 2012-15, playing a prominent role in the Tigers' transition to the Southeastern Conference. He also spent time early in his career on college campuses at Lehigh, New Mexico, Missouri and Syracuse, while holding senior leadership positions at ISP Sports/IMG College from 2002-12.

The Binghamton, N.Y., native was a four-year letterman in ice hockey at SUNY Cortland from 1987-91. He graduated from SUNY Cortland in 1991 with a B.S. in physical education (sports management concentration). He went on to earn a master's degree in physical education from Ohio University in 1993.

Gillin and his wife, Leslie, have three children: daughters Shea and Lia and son Chase.



SHAWN CLARK

HEAD COACH
FIRST FULL SEASON
APP STATE, 1998

Less than four years after coming back to Boone to coach at his beloved alma mater, Shawn Clark not only became App State's head coach, but he began his tenure with a record-breaking bowl win.

Clark was hired as the 22nd head football coach in App State history on Dec. 13, 2019.

His five-year contract runs through the 2024 season, and he made his official head coaching debut while leading the Mountaineers to a 31-17 victory against UAB in the 2019 R+L Carriers New Orleans Bowl eight days after his introductory press conference. Ranked 18th in the final Amway Coaches Poll of the season, App State went 13-1 to become the first Sun Belt team and the first FBS team from North Carolina to win 13 games in a season.

Clark has helped lead record-setting runs to conference titles and bowl victories, not just at App State, where he played from 1994-98 and had served as an assistant since 2016, but also in four other leagues during his two decades of college coaching experience.

Working for championship-winning programs at Louisville and Eastern Kentucky before being part of a bowl win for Big Ten member Purdue and coaching at Kent State, Clark has also been a vital part of App State's historic FBS success.

Overseeing talented, hard-working offensive lines, he followed a December 2018 coaching change involving college teammate Scott Satterfield's departure for Louisville by excelling as an aggressive offensive play-caller in a 45-13 bowl victory against Middle Tennessee. With valuable experience at his disposal, Clark was promoted to assis-

tant head coach before the 2019 season with Elijah Drinkwitz in his first year as a college head coach.

In each of Clark's four seasons coaching App State's offensive line, with the Mountaineers earning four straight Sun Belt Conference titles while compiling a 43-10 record in that span, the line ranked in the top 25 nationally in both rushing yards per game and fewest sacks allowed. The unit was recognized by the Joe Moore Award as one of the nation's top 15 offensive lines in 2018 and 2019, and all five starters on the 2019 line received All-Sun Belt Conference recognition.

An offensive lineman in college, Clark was a two-time All-American (1996 and 1998) and three-time all-conference selection (1995, 1996, 1998) for teams that went a combined 45-16 during his first five years in Boone. In fact, as a player during the 12-0 start in 1995 and a coach for the 2019 team that has set a single-season record for wins by an FBS program in the state of North Carolina, Clark has been part of the two App State teams to post 11 regular-season victories.

Clark graduated from App State with a bachelor's degree in criminal justice in 1998 and earned a master's in education from Louisville in 2003.

His wife, Jonelle, was a standout softball student-athlete at Eastern Kentucky and was inducted into ECU's Athletics Hall of Fame in 2008. The Clarks have two children: a daughter, Giana, and a son, Braxton.

Clark began his college coaching career at Louisville in 2001 and has been part of six teams that won at least nine games. The Cardinals won

a Conference USA championship and bowl game during an 11-2 season in 2001, when Clark was a graduate assistant, and he coached the offensive line at Eastern Kentucky from 2003-08.

The Colonels had a winning record in each of those six seasons, and Clark coached three All-Americans who went on to play in the NFL. Eastern Kentucky went a combined 17-7 with back-to-back league titles and FCS playoff appearances before Clark moved on to Purdue for a stint that ran from 2009-12. Two offensive linemen from the 2010 team were drafted, the Boilermakers capped a seven-win season in 2011 with a victory in the Little Caesars Pizza Bowl, and they made another bowl appearance a year later.

Dale Jones returned to App State as defensive coordinator on head coach Shawn Clark's first staff in January 2020.

Jones coached at App State for 23 seasons from 1996-2018 before following head coach Scott Satterfield to Louisville, where the Cardinals completed an 8-5 season with a victory against Mississippi State in the Music City Bowl.

Jones, who coached Louisville's inside linebackers in 2019, worked with the same position group in his last five seasons with the Mountaineers. He coached the inside linebackers and served as co-defensive coordinator in 2018, when an App State team that went 11-2 ranked among the FBS leaders in scoring defense (No. 4, 15.5 points) and total defense (No. 6, 288.0 yards). Inside linebackers Jordan Fehr and Anthony Flory were first- and second-team All-Sun Belt performers, respectively.

During the coaching transition, Jones served as the Mountaineers' defensive coordinator for a 45-13 win in the 2018 R+L Carriers New Orleans Bowl against Middle Tennessee, which committed two turnovers, was sacked six times and was held to 62 rushing yards on 45 carries.

Jones came to Boone in 1996. He served as the team's defensive line coach and special teams coordinator for his first nine seasons with the program (1996-2004). In 2005, he began an eight-year stint as the Mountaineers' linebackers coach and was also the program's defensive coordinator for three seasons (2010-12). He once again directed App State's defensive line in 2013 before taking over the inside linebackers in 2014.

Jones coached 2017 senior Eric Boggs, an all-conference performer who led the team in tackles for three straight years.

Player development has been a staple of Jones' tenure at App State. During his first 23 seasons at App State, he coached 11 All-America defensive linemen and linebackers, including five two-time honorees. He also mentored 22 all-conference performers who earned the recognition a total of 36 times while four of his pupils — Josh Jeffries (2002), K.T. Stovall (2003), Jacque Roman (2008) and Jeremy Kimbrough (2012) — were named the Southern Conference's Defensive Player of the Year.

Twelve players that Jones has coached at App State have gone on to play in the National Football League.

During Jones' previous three-year tenure as the team's defensive coordinator, the Mountaineers led the SoCon in interceptions twice (2011 and 2012) and also topped the league in sacks (2011), red-zone defense (2011) and third-down conversion defense (2010). While serving as special teams coordinator, Jones was named the 2002 Special Teams Coordinator of the Year by American Football Monthly.

One of the most popular and decorated players in University of Tennessee history, Jones was an All-American and a two-time All-SEC performer as a linebacker for the Vols from 1983-86. He is best known as the defensive leader of UT's 1985 squad, which won the SEC championship and stunned No. 2 Miami by a 35-7 score in the 1986 Sugar Bowl. Jones' fourth-quarter interception of Alabama's Mike Shula to seal the Vols' 16-14 win over the Crimson Tide remains one of the most memorable moments of Tennessee's run to the 1985 SEC title.

Jones graduated from UT in 1988 and began his coaching career as an assistant under legendary head coach Johnny Majors at his alma mater in 1989. He went on to serve one-year stints with the Parma Panthers of the Italian American Football League (1990) and the University of Florida (1991) before a five-year tenure at Georgia Military College, where he served as defensive coordinator for four seasons.

Jones and his wife, Heather, have two children: a daughter, Brooke, and a son, Cooper.

TONY PETERSEN

OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR/QUARTERBACKS
1ST SEASON AT APP STATE
31ST SEASON OVERALL
ALMA MATER: MARSHALL, 1990

College coaching veteran Tony Petersen was tabbed as offensive coordinator for the App State Mountaineers' nationally ranked program in January 2020.

Petersen has directed some of the nation's most exciting and prolific offenses during his 30-year college coaching career, serving as an offensive coordinator in the Big Ten, MAC, Conference USA and American prior to taking the reins of the offense in Boone.

Petersen spent the 2019 season as an offensive analyst at Missouri after three-year stints coordinating successful offenses at Marshall (2010-12), Louisiana Tech (2013-15) and East Carolina (2016-18). He has helped lead his teams to 12 bowl games, seven conference championships and two FCS national championships throughout his coaching career.

From 1999 to 2006, Petersen was co-offensive coordinator, quarterbacks coach and eventually the passing coordinator at Minnesota, where quarterback Bryan Cupito set the school's all-time passing mark.

During Petersen's run as co-offensive coordinator at Minnesota, the Golden Gophers had three straight seasons (2003-05) in which they averaged more than 250.0 rushing yards per game.

Minnesota ranked third nationally and set a school record by averaging 289.2 rushing yards per game in 2003. The averages of 273.1 yards in 2005 and 256.8 yards in 2004 rank second and third, respectively, in program history.

A record-setting quarterback himself at Marshall, Petersen went on to coach two different stints at his alma mater from 1991-99 and again from 2010-12. During his first stint, the Thundering Herd qualified for the postseason eight straight times, winning FCS national titles in 1992 and 1996 and Mid-American Conference titles in both 1997 and 1998 after the school moved up to the FBS.

Petersen served as wide receivers coach in 1992 and directly worked with eventual three-time Super Bowl Champion Troy Brown. Petersen coached quarterbacks for five of his eight years at Marshall and was offensive coordinator in 1998, mentoring future NFL quarterbacks Chad Pennington and Byron Leftwich in that capacity. With future NFL star receiver Randy Moss as his favorite target in 1997, Pennington broke the NCAA record for touchdown passes by a sophomore.

During his three years at ECU's offensive coordinator, he directed some of the best offenses in school history and a top-20 passing offense all three seasons. In 2016, the Pirates ranked sixth in passing and 23rd in total offense.

From an individual standpoint, Petersen played a key role helping Biletnikoff Award finalist Zay Jones capture 2016 FBS stat titles in receptions (158), receptions per game (13.2) and receiving yards per game (145.5), while ranking second in receiving yards (1,746) on the way to establishing NCAA career (399) and single-season standards in receptions. In 2017, Gardner Minshew set AAC and ECU single-game completion records with a 52-of-68, 463-yard outing.

At Louisiana Tech, Petersen helped the Bulldogs achieve back-to-back nine-win seasons and a pair of bowl victories. He was a nominee for the 2015 Broyles Award after directing a Tech offense that was one of the best in school history and ranked 13th nationally in passing, 19th in scoring and 21st in total offense, while ranking highly in the Tech record books in both rushing and passing touchdowns. As Tech's quarterbacks coach, he molded senior transfer Jeff Driskel into one of the nation's top signal-callers with top-25 FBS rankings in

eight different offensive categories in 2015.

A year earlier in 2014, Petersen directed an offense that stood fifth at the FBS level in most-improved scoring offense (37.4 ppg) as the Bulldogs powered their way to a 9-5 overall record that included a C-USA West Division title and a 35-18 win over Illinois in the Zaxby's Heart of Dallas Bowl.

Petersen was Marshall's co-offensive coordinator for three seasons in the second of two stints at his alma mater. He mentored sophomore quarterback Rakeem Cato to an impressive 2012 campaign. The C-USA MVP led the nation in completions per game (33.83) and passing yards per game (350.08) and finished third in TD passes (37), fourth in completion percentage (69.5) and fifth in total offense per game (352.67). The Herd topped the league in scoring offense, passing offense, total offense, pass efficiency, third down conversions and first downs. In the latter two categories, Marshall ranked second nationally.

Petersen spent the 2009 season as the assistant head coach and wide receivers coach at the University of South Dakota after serving as quarterbacks coach at Iowa State for two years.

As a player at Marshall, Petersen was named the 1988 Southern Conference Athlete of the Year and the SoCon Offensive Player of the Year in 1987 after leading the Herd to the Division I-AA national championship game with a school-record 35 touchdown passes. He set 16 SoCon single-season and career standards in passing and total offense to go along with six Marshall single-season school marks before signing with the Minnesota Vikings as a free agent in 1989 and then entering the coaching ranks as a graduate assistant at Kentucky in 1990.

Petersen went to Marshall after a stellar career at San Joaquin Delta College in Stockton, Calif. A native of Lodi, Calif., he was selected by the Kansas City Royals in the Major League Baseball Draft after his first year at Delta.

He earned his bachelor's degree in sports management and marketing in 1990 and master's degree in administration in 1995, both from Marshall.

Petersen and his wife, Beth, have three children: Andy, Nikki Nelson and Taylor.

Cortney Braswell was hired as an assistant in January 2020, and he coaches App State's outside linebackers.

Braswell, a former high school head coach in Georgia and Tennessee, comes to Boone after serving as a

defensive quality control coach at Louisville for the 2019 season.

During his one season at Louisville working for former App State head coach

Scott Satterfield, Braswell helped the Cardinals to one of the biggest turn-arounds in college football with an 8-5 record and a win over Mississippi State in the Music City Bowl.

As the head coach at Ridgeland High School in his hometown of Rossville, Ga., in 2018, Braswell led the Panthers to an 8-4 overall record, a Region 6-AAAA runner-up finish and a 34-14 state playoff victory over Flowery Branch before a second-round loss at Cartersville, the eventual state runner-up. Ridgeland also scored a big regular season road win at Sandy Creek.

Braswell was the head coach at Chattanooga Central High School in 2016 and 2017 and led the Purple Pounders to the TSSAA state playoffs twice. He also served on the Tennessee Football Coaches Association Board of Directors, helping to represent the interests of football coaches statewide and serving as a contributing voice with the TSSAA legislation.

A two-time all-state running back at Baylor School in Chattanooga and a Mr. Football finalist for the Red Raiders as a senior in 2004, Braswell graduated from his high school as its single-game and career rushing and scoring leader and later played college football at Liberty University.

He began his coaching career in 2009 as he coached defensive backs at Ringgold. He went on to be defensive coordinator at Soddy-Daisy, East Ridge, North Murray, Chattanooga Central and Bradley Central and was the 2014 District Assistant Coach of the Year during his first stint with the Purple Pounders.

As the offensive coordinator at Chattanooga Notre Dame in 2012, Braswell's offense was one of the best in the state, averaging more than 34 points a game.

Braswell was born July 19, 1987. He has a son named Cayden.

Title-winning App State alum Nic Cardwell returned to the program as the offensive line coach in January 2020.

Cardwell played for the Mountaineers from 2004-07 and worked seven years in various roles with App State's football program, including the 2018 season as the tight ends coach, before following head coach Scott Satterfield to Louisville.

In 2019, with Cardwell serving as a quality control coach at Louisville, the Cardinals completed an 8-5 season with a victory against Mississippi State in the Music City Bowl. The previous year, while working with Clark on App State's offensive staff, he helped the Mountaineers win the inaugural Sun Belt Championship Game and beat Middle Tennessee in the New Orleans Bowl to cap an 11-2 season.

During the 2018 season, when App State averaged 37.3 points per game, Cardwell's tight ends combined for five touchdown catches and contributed to the Mountaineers rushing for 240.4 yards per game. Collin Reed earned All-Sun Belt honors, and Henry Pearson was ranked by PFF College as the nation's fifth-best true freshman tight end.

He was promoted following a 2017 season in which he worked in an offensive



quality control capacity for a 9-4 team at his alma mater and saw App State's tight ends account for a combined seven receiving touchdowns.

Cardwell's ties to App State run deep, as he played tight end on the three FCS national championship teams and finished his career as a co-captain.

He arrived at App State as an unheralded walk-on in 2003 and overcame a career-threatening neck injury to play in all 56 games for the Mountaineers from 2004-07. Four of his nine career receptions went for touchdowns, including FCS playoff scores against Coastal Carolina (2006 first round) and Richmond (two TDs in a 2007 semifinal).

Cardwell coached App State's tight ends in 2008, when Ben Jorden made the All-Southern Conference first team, before returning to Boone as an assistant director of strength and conditioning in 2011 and coaching tight ends again in 2012. He worked with the Mountaineers' tight ends as a graduate assistant from 2013-14 and coached the offensive line at North Greenville from 2015-16.

A native of Kernersville, N.C., Cardwell graduated from App State in 2008 with a bachelor's degree in criminal justice. He and his wife, Kira, have one son, Kai, and one daughter, Blakeley. They have two sons: Dominick and Christian.

Mark DeBastiani returned to the App State football staff in January 2020 as the safeties coach.

DeBastiani coached the defensive tackles at App State from 1995-96, when now-head coach Shawn

Clark was an All-American offensive lineman. In 1995, App State went undefeated in the regular season, won the Southern Conference championship and advanced to the FCS quarterfinals.

DeBastiani coached linebackers at Central Michigan last season, helping the Chippewas to the second-biggest turnaround in college football with a seven-win improvement from the previous year. CMU finished 8-6 after earning berths to the MAC championship game and the New Mexico Bowl. CMU's rushing defense ranked top 25 in the country, and the Chippewas led the MAC and were eighth-best in the nation with 7.9 tackles for loss per outing. DeBastiani coached linebacker Troy Brown to first-team All-MAC honors and Michael Oliver to second-team accolades, with Brown topping all MAC players with 18 tackles for loss.

In 2018, DeBastiani served as the defensive coordinator/linebackers coach at Alabama A&M, leading a unit that ranked second in the Southwestern Athletic Conference in points allowed and third in total yardage, continuing a long-running trend of solid defense wherever he has coached.

DeBastiani was a defensive quality control coach at Florida from 2015-17, specifically helping coach the linebackers. He helped lead the Gators to the SEC East division championship and the Citrus Bowl in 2015.

DeBastiani-led defenses at Norfolk State annually ranked in the top 10 in total defense among FCS schools during his 10-year tenure from 2005-14. He was a finalist for the 2014 Coordinator of the Year Award when Norfolk State finished No. 2 nationally in total defense. His unit was also No. 2 among all FCS teams during the team's MEAC championship run in 2011 and No. 3 in 2012.

DeBastiani was the defensive line coach and video coordinator at Bethune-Cookman for eight seasons prior to the move to Norfolk State. There, he helped turn the Bethune-Cookman defense into a force. The Wildcats' 3-4 ball-hawking defense was a key to the team's ascent to the top of the MEAC. The Wildcats ranked 13th and eighth, respectively, in FCS total defense during their two national playoff seasons in 2002 and 2003. BCU ranked second in the conference in 2004 in scoring defense and total defense. He also helped tutor one All-American, defensive lineman Damion Cook, from 1997-2000.

DeBastiani coached the offensive and defensive lines at his alma mater, Division II Shepherd (W. Va.) College, in 1993 and 1994, helping the Rams to the 1994 West Virginia Intercollegiate Athletic Conference championship.

DeBastiani earned his bachelor's degree in health from Shepherd in 1993. He lettered three years for the football team and started two years at center. During his career there, he was a member of back-to-back WVIAC championship teams (1991-92).

A native of Arthurdale, W. Va., DeBastiani was born May 26, 1970. He has two children, Ben and Maria.

Brian Haines, who joined head coach Shawn Clark's staff in January 2020, coordinates App State's special teams and coaches the running backs.

Haines came to Boone after spending 12 of the last 13 years on staff at Ohio University, where he helped lead the Bobcats to 91 victories, two Mid-American Conference East Division titles, nine bowl appearances and the first five bowl titles in school history.

A native of Williamstown, W.Va., Haines had served as Ohio's special teams coordinator for the last eight seasons and as a recruiting coordinator and tight ends coach for each of the last 10 seasons. He also had stints at West Virginia and his alma mater, Marietta College, early in his coaching career.

Ohio did not have a losing season in the 10 years after Haines joined Frank Solich's staff as a full-time assistant in 2010. In that decade, Haines helped the Bobcats win eight or more games on seven occasions, including a 10-4 record in 2011 when they won the Famous Idaho Potato Bowl for the school's first bowl victory.

Other Ohio bowl wins during Haines' tenure included the 2012 Independence Bowl against ULM, the 2017 Bahamas Bowl against UAB, the 2018 Frisco Bowl against San Diego State and the 2020 Famous Idaho Potato Bowl against Nevada.

The Bobcat offense set numerous school records in recent seasons and ranked among the best in the FBS and MAC in a variety of statistical categories. The 2019 offense was 20th in the country in scoring average, while it ranked 12th in 2018 and ninth in 2017. Ohio's rushing offense was 20th in 2019, ninth in 2018 and 16th in 2017.

Three of Haines' Ohio tight ends went on to play in the NFL: Jordan Thompson, Keith Heitzman and Troy Mangen.

Under Haines' watch, Ohio's special teams unit consistently ranked as one of the best in both the FBS and the MAC in terms of kickoff and punt returns and kickoff and punt defense. He coached the two highest-scoring players in program history

in Louie Zervos (437 points, 2016-19) and Matt Weller (409 points, 2009-12) as well as three of the top four kickers in terms of field goals made in Weller (79; 2009-12), Zervos (73; 2016-19) and Josiah Yazdani (31; 2013-15). Zervos' school-record 29 field goals in 2016 set an NCAA record for field goals by a freshman.

Haines also developed four-year starting punter Michael Farkas into one of the best in school history.

The Bobcats' kickoff return defense was top 15 in the country each of the last three years, including No. 2 nationally in 2019. It was also No. 8 nationally in 2015, No. 7 in 2013 and No. 9 in 2012, his first year directing the special teams.

In 2010, Haines returned to Athens in a full-time capacity after spending 2009 as a graduate assistant at West Virginia, supervising the Mountaineers' slot receivers and running backs. He helped coach the team's leading rusher (All-Big East first team tailback Noel Devine) and leading receiver (Jock Sanders) as the team made an appearance in the Gator Bowl.

From 2010-11, he coached the Bobcat tight ends and served as recruiting coordinator before adding special teams duties the next year.

Haines served as a graduate assistant for the Bobcats' offense during the 2007 and 2008 seasons. He assisted the offensive staff and worked directly with the wide receivers and offensive line.

Haines served as an assistant coach at Marietta College, his alma mater, for three seasons from 2004-06. He coached the wide receivers for two seasons and the secondary for one. He also served as the strength and conditioning coordinator for two years.

Haines, a standout wide receiver for Marietta from 2000-03, graduated in 2004 and went on to earn master's degrees from Marietta in 2007 and Ohio in 2008.

Haines was born Aug. 30, 1982. He and his wife, Mary, have two daughters: Blair and Quinn.

Longtime NFL coach Robert Nunn joined coach Shawn Clark's staff as the defensive line coach in February 2020.

During his first 31 years coaching football, Nunn spent 19 seasons in the NFL and was a successful junior college head coach for nearly a decade before that.

Most recently the defensive line coach for the New York Jets from 2017-18, Nunn was defensive line coach for the New York Giants when they caught fire in the playoffs and beat the New England Patriots to win Super Bowl XLVI. He also worked with the Cleveland Browns (2016), Giants (2010-15), Tampa Bay Buccaneers (2009), Green Bay Packers (2005-08), Miami Dolphins (2001-02, 04) and Washington Redskins (2003). In addition to the Giants, he also helped the Dolphins to multiple playoff appearances and the Packers to a pair of playoff games.

During Nunn's NFL coaching career, he was part of six top-10 defenses for three different teams, and 19 different players of his produced at least five sacks in a season. Of those 19 players, 11 matched or established their single-season career bests while coached by him. Among the players coached by Nunn in the NFL are Hall of Famers Bruce Smith, who broke the NFL career sacks record under him in 2003, and Jason Taylor, who established a single-season best 18.5 sacks in 2002, as well as Jason Pierre-Paul and Justin Tuck, both of whom registered multiple

seasons of 10+ sacks with him, while Osi Umenyiora logged 11.5 in 2010.

Before entering the NFL coaching ranks, Nunn spent nine seasons at Georgia Military College in Milledgeville, Ga., including the last eight (1992-99) as head coach while compiling a 66-19 record at the helm. Current App State defensive coordinator Dale Jones was Nunn's defensive coordinator for four seasons there. At GMC, he mentored 13 NJCAA All-Americans and 15 players who went on to the NFL, including former App State standout Daniel Wilcox as well as Troy Albea, Robert Bean, Lorenzo Brommell, Terry Guess, Billy Gustin, Nic Clemons, Reggie Rhodes, Jimmy Robinson, Sulecio Sanford, Jermaine Smith, Keith Stokes, Allen Williams, Horace Willis and Peppi Zellner.

Nunn coached defensive ends under head coach Johnny Majors at Tennessee in 1989 and 1990, where he first worked on staff alongside Jones. The Vols went 20-3-2 with wins in the Cotton Bowl and Sugar Bowl during those two seasons. Nunn got his start in the coaching profession as defensive line coach at North-eastern Oklahoma A&M College in 1988.

Originally from Apache, Okla., Nunn spent four years as a linebacker at Oklahoma State from 1984-87, helping the Cowboys make three bowl games and win two of them. Playing for head coach Jimmy Johnson, he served as team captain during his senior year. He graduated from the school in 1988 with a degree in secondary education.

He and his wife, Karen, have six children: a daughter, Josie, and five sons, Noah, Jacob, Nathan, Johnny and Jason

James Rowe joined the App State football staff as the cornerbacks coach in January 2020.

He spent the previous three seasons in the NFL as Washington's assistant defensive backs coach.

In 2019, Washington cornerback Quinton Dunbar was among the NFL's top interception artists, while in 2018 Rowe helped oversee a defensive backs group that was one of the best in the league in forcing turnovers. The Redskins finished the season with 15 interceptions, which was tied for the ninth-best mark in the league. Cornerbacks Josh Norman and Fabian Moreau and safety DJ Swearingen each had three forced fumbles and were all tied for the second-most forced fumbles caused by a defensive back that season.

In his first year in Washington in 2017, Rowe helped the DBs unit produce the team's strongest season against the pass in nearly a decade, ranking third in the NFL in completion percentage allowed (57.6 percent), ninth in passing yards allowed per game (213.8) and 10th in opponent passer rating (81.0).

Rowe served as defensive coordinator at Division II powerhouse Valdosta State in 2016, helping the Blazers to an 8-3 record. Among D-II schools, his defense



led the nation with 27 interceptions and ranked fifth in the country in opposing passing efficiency, limiting opposing quarterbacks to a 96.2 passer rating. Under Rowe's guidance, Valdosta State safety Kenny Moore earned first-team All-America honors from the AFCA.

In 2015, Rowe spent one season as a defensive graduate assistant at the University of Florida. That season, the Florida defense ranked No. 8 in scoring defense, No. 6 in total defense and No. 11 in pass defense, while Rowe assisted in the development of All-America defensive backs Vernon Hargreaves, Marcus Maye and Teez Tabor and first-round NFL draft pick Keanu Neal.

From 2012-14, Rowe served in a variety of coaching capacities at Jacksonville University. He began his tenure assisting with the team's defensive backs in 2012, adding the wide receivers to his purview in 2013 and eventually being promoted to defensive coordinator in 2014.

Rowe began his collegiate coaching career as a graduate assistant at Bethel (Tenn.) University in 2011, helping the Wildcats finish the year ranked No. 14 in the NAIA poll.

Rowe, a native of Cocoa, Fla., was a student-athlete at South Florida, lettering three times as a member of the Bulls' baseball team. After majoring in business administration, he earned his degree from the university in 2009.

He married his wife, Tiffany, in July 2019.

Pat Washington, a championship-winning coach with more than three decades of experience at the collegiate level, was hired as an App State assistant in January 2019. After coaching wide receivers in 2019,

he enters his second season with the Mountaineers in 2020.

In 33 years in the profession, Washington has been part of a BCS national championship at Tennessee in 1998, as well as six conference championships, 24 bowl games, 11 bowl wins and 12 double-digit-win seasons, counting a 2019 season in which App State went 13-1, won the Sun Belt Conference title and prevailed in the R+L Carriers New Orleans Bowl. The former Auburn quarterback most recently coached at South Carolina (2016-18) and has stops at Missouri (2013-15), Kentucky (2012), Southern Miss (2009-11), Mississippi State (2007-08), Kansas State (2006), Tennessee (1995-2005), Baylor (1994), TCU (1992-93), Louisiana (1989-91) and Auburn (1987-88).

In 2019, App State had two receivers with at least 50 catches for the first time since 2013, thanks to career years from juniors Thomas Hennigan (61 catches for 773 yards with six touchdowns) and Malik Williams (55 catches for 598 yards with four touchdowns). Corey Sutton put up 41 catches for 601 yards and seven touchdowns in just nine games before suffering a season-ending injury.

Under Washington's watch as South Carolina's tight ends coach, Hayden Hurst went from a former walk-on to a first-team All-SEC tight end and first-round NFL Draft pick by the Baltimore Ravens in 2018. Hurst ranked second on the Gamecocks squad in both receptions and receiving yards during the 2017 campaign.

Washington went to South Carolina from Missouri, where he served as the Tigers' wide receivers coach from 2013-15. The Tigers captured the SEC Eastern Division title and played in the SEC Championship game in both 2013 and 2014.

He coached Bud Sasser and Dorial Green-Beckham to All-SEC honors during his tenure and helped Mizzou become one of the most improved offensive attacks in the nation in his first year in 2013.

From 2006-12, Washington spent time coaching the likes of wideouts Jordy Nelson and Yamon Figurs at Kansas State in 2006 and helped Mississippi State break a six-year postseason drought with a Liberty Bowl win in 2007. He was also part of three winning seasons as the running backs coach at Southern Miss from 2009-11, including a 12-2 Conference USA Championship campaign in 2011 that was capped by a victory in the Hawaii Bowl. He coached receivers and served as the passing game coordinator at Kentucky in 2012.

As the receivers coach on Phillip Fulmer's Tennessee staff from 1995-2005, Washington helped the Volunteers post a 105-31 record during his tenure that featured 10 bowl appearances -- including three Citrus Bowls, two Fiesta, Peach and Cotton Bowls, and one Orange Bowl. The Volunteers also reached the SEC Championship Game four times with Washington on staff. A win in the 1998 SEC title game vaulted UT to the 1999 Fiesta Bowl, where the Vols downed Florida State, 23-16, to cap an undefeated season and a national championship.

During his tenure at Tennessee, Washington developed several standout receivers, including Peerless Price, Donte Stallworth, Joey Kent, Marcus Nash, Robert Meachem and Cedrick Wilson, among others. Nash, Stallworth and Meachem were first-round draft picks, and all six enjoyed NFL careers.

Washington's coaching career began at Auburn, where he served his alma mater as a graduate assistant coach from 1987-88. After the Tigers won SEC titles and played in the Sugar Bowl both years, Washington landed his first full-time position in the industry as the receivers coach at Louisiana (1989-91), and that was followed by a two-year stop at TCU (1992-93) as receivers coach. He spent one year at Baylor (1994) as the running backs coach, and the Bears reached the 1994 Alamo Bowl.

A native of Mobile, Ala., Washington played quarterback at Auburn from 1982-85. He was the starter in his final two seasons and guided the Tigers to a combined 17-8 record in those years and to 1984 Liberty Bowl and 1986 Cotton Bowl appearances.

Washington earned a management degree from Auburn in 1987. He and his wife, Claudette, are the parents of sons Tyson and Justin.

Justin Watts, a 19-year Division I coaching veteran, entered 2020 in his sixth season at App State and his third season as the program's recruiting coordinator.

Watts spent four seasons (2015-18) as the Mountaineers' wide receivers coach and coached the tight ends in 2019, when App State had a top-10 scoring offense en route to a 13-1 record and Top 20 ranking in the final polls.

According to the 247Sports database, the 18-player recruiting class in 2019 included three of the six highest-rated commitments in App State's FBS history, and the 2020 class is the highest-rated class in the program's FBS history. It also possessed four of the Mountaineers' 10 highest-graded prospects since the move to the FBS level.

In helping App State win the inaugural Sun Belt Championship Game and win a fourth straight bowl game in 2018, Watts coached a young group that included three sophomore starters in Corey Sutton (eight touchdowns), Thomas Hennigan and Malik Williams.

Watts turned an inexperienced group of wide outs into a productive unit in 2016, setting the stage for a 2017 season in which App's wide receiver corps became a dynamic, deep, and explosive unit for senior quarterback Taylor Lamb. Ike Lewis developed into a first-team all-conference selection, and Thomas Hennigan ranked among the FBS leaders in TD catches by a true freshman receiver.

In 2016, eight different wide receivers notched touchdown receptions. Shaedon Meadors finished the season with 45 catches for 716 yards and two touchdowns and had big receptions early against Louisiana and New Mexico to set the tone on TD drives. He also landed on SportsCenter's Top 10 with a grab off the helmet of a Georgia Southern defensive back in App's 34-10 win on ESPNU in October. Junior Ike Lewis also blossomed, especially late, with 10 catches over the final four games. Zy Letman also became a big-threat, hauling in a 37-yard touchdown in the win at Akron and a key third-down reception in the bowl win over Toledo.

In his first year, Watts helped send a veteran receiving core out on high notes despite not being a heavy passing team. Senior Simms McElfresh led the way with 466 yards and six touchdowns and was just ahead of senior Malachi Jones, who had 463 yards and three touchdowns. Rounding out the over-400-yards club, sophomore Sheadon Meadors had a break out year, getting 439 yards off 21 completions for three touchdowns.

With a diverse set of options through the air, Taylor Lamb threw a school-record 31 touchdown passes last season and ranked No. 1 in passing efficiency in the Sun Belt and 10th nationally with a 160.7 rating.

Watts came to Appalachian State from Middle Tennessee, where he served as wide receivers coach and recruiting coordinator for the past nine seasons (2006-14). During his time at Middle Tennessee, he helped lead the Blue Raiders to four bowl berths, three eight-win seasons and a Sun Belt championship (2006).

Known at Middle Tennessee for developing deep corps of wideouts, Watts coached 29 different receivers that caught 25 passes or more in a season during his nine-year tenure in Murfreesboro. Four of his pupils rank in the top seven in Middle Tennessee history in career receptions and four are among the program's all-time top 10 in career yardage.

As Middle Tennessee's recruiting coordinator, Watts consistently led the efforts to land classes that ranked among the best in the Sun Belt and Conference USA. Most recently, the Blue Raiders' 2014 recruiting class ranked third in C-USA, according to Rivals.com.

Watts began his coaching career with two seasons as a graduate assistant at his alma mater, Clemson (2001-02). During his stint as a G.A., he helped lead the Tigers to a pair of bowl berths.

He landed his first full-time coaching position at Appalachian State's former Southern Conference rival, Chattanooga, where he coached the Mocs' wide receivers for three seasons (2003-05). At UTC, he coached NCAA Division I FCS all-American Alonzo Nix, who set a single-season SoCon record with 90 receptions in 2003, and all-conference performer Emanuel Hassell, who led the league with 52 catches in 2005. In Watts' final season at Chattanooga, the Mocs recorded their first winning season in eight years.

Watts owns the distinction of being one of only two student-athletes to ever be a five-year football letterwinner at Clemson, a feat that he accomplished as a wide receiver from 1996-2000 (he received a medical redshirt after sustaining a season-ending injury during the 1997 campaign). He caught 51 passes for 561 yards during his career and was honored as a scholar-athlete at the 1999 Peach Bowl awards luncheon. The Tigers earned bowl berths during four of his five seasons on the squad.

A Florence, S.C. native, Watts amassed 7,979 yards of total offense and accounted for 74 touchdowns as a prep quarterback at South Florence H.S. He received a B.S. in sports management from Clemson in 2000. Watts and his wife, Lauren, have a son, Chase, and a daughter, Kendall.

GAME NOTES

Appalachian State increased its home winning streak to 11 games, a total that ranks fourth among the nation's Group of Five programs. The total ranks in the top 10 for all FBS programs, and Clemson is the FBS leader at 26.

The Mountaineers' seven-game winning streak is tied for the nation's third-longest with Ohio State, behind Clemson (16) and Army (10).

App State won its first home game of a season for the sixth straight year, and App State is 13-0 in its last 13 season openers played at home dating back to 1974.

App State scored touchdowns on all six of its trips inside the red zone.

App State had 11 true freshmen make their college debuts: Christian Wells, Dashaun Davis, Raykwon Anderson, Ben Williams, Nicholas Ross, KeSean Brown, Brendan Harrington, Jourdan Heilig, Christian Johnstone, Lyle Hiers and Craig McFarland. Johnstone was the starting long snapper, Harrington and Ross covered the game-opening kickoff and Wells had a fourth-quarter touchdown catch.

App State has held its opponents to less than 20 points in each of its last nine home games. That run includes the last two home games of 2017, all six home games in 2018 and the 2019 opener.

Senior defensive tackle E.J. Scott, junior cornerback Shemar Jean-Charles, junior defensive end Demetrius Taylor, sophomore cornerback Shaun Jolly and sophomore inside linebacker Trey Cobb made their first career starts for App State's defense.

Redshirt freshman offensive lineman Cooper Hodges started as App State's right tackle in his first career game appearance.

App State Opens Year With Win In Drinkwitz's Debut

BOONE, N.C. — Junior quarterback Zac Thomas accounted for three touchdowns, including two through the air to Malik Williams and Thomas Hennigan, as Appalachian State won 42-7 against visiting East Tennessee State in the FBS head coaching debut for Eliah Drinkwitz.

On the day App State celebrated the 30th anniversary of Hall of Fame coach Jerry Moore's arrival in Boone, Drinkwitz picked up his first victory in his first game since being hired in December 2018.

Starting a season at home in Boone for the first time since 2015, the Mountaineers increased their lead to 21-0 on the opening drive of the third quarter against the FCS-level Buccaneers.

"When you win, it's a lot of fun," said Drinkwitz, who is also App State's offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach. "There were a couple times I was sitting back there talking, and I forgot that I needed to be watching the defense. It was different. I had a couple of times that I needed to lock in and flip over to defense to make sure I was on top of that. When I was a seventh-grade coach, I coached both offense and defense, so I never had to switch over the headsets, but this was a little bit different."

Darrynton Evans and receiver Jalen Virgil joined Thomas in rushing for one touchdown apiece, and Jacob Huesman threw a fourth-quarter touchdown pass to true freshman Christian Wells.

Hennigan made a career-high seven catches for 79 yards to lead the offense, and Evans rushed 14 times for 99 yards as the Mountaineers totaled 277 yards on the ground. Thomas completed 16 of his 24 passes for 150 yards.

Defensively, the Mountaineers allowed just a third-quarter touchdown and 292 total yards. Desmond Franklin tied Akeem Davis-Gaither for the team lead with seven tackles apiece, Shaun Jolly had six tackles in his first career start at cornerback and defensive tackle E.J. Scott produced two big stops behind the line of scrimmage.

GAME NOTES

The 56-41 win against Charlotte tied for the fifth-most total points in an App State game, topped only by a 115-0 win against Piedmont in 1936, a 59-56 loss to Chattanooga in 2004 (115 points), a 79-35 win against Western Carolina in 2007 (114 points) and a 55-48 loss to Liberty in 2014 (103 total points). There were also a combined 97 points in a 52-45 loss at ULM in 2017.

The 98 points scored by App State in the first two games are its most since 1936.

Appalachian State extended its winning streak to eight games dating back to last year, tied with Ohio State for second-longest in the nation behind Clemson's 17.

The Mountaineers' 12-game winning streak at Kidd Brewer Stadium is tied for the nation's eighth-longest home winning streak.

App State improved to 94-17 in its last 111 home games dating back to 2003 and 27-5 at home as an FBS program.

Darrynton Evans is now in sole possession of first place in App State history with three kickoff returns for a touchdown in his career. Jimmy Watkins had both of his two TDs in 2000. Evans scored on a 94-yard kickoff return in the Camellia Bowl as a true freshman in 2016 and had a 100-yard kickoff return for a TD against Penn State in the 2018 opener.

Darrynton Evans posted a career-high 298 all-purpose yards with 234 rushing yards and 64 kick return yards. His previous high of 218 all-purpose yards occurred in last year's Sun Belt Championship Game, where he had 111 rushing yards and 107 kick return yards.

App State had held nine straight home opponents to less than 20 points.

Evans Provides Repeated Answers In Win Vs. 49ers

BOONE, N.C. — App State ended the first half even more impressively than the Mountaineers began it, resulting in some helpful separation during a 56-41 victory against Charlotte.

They needed every bit of it, with Darrynton Evans answering each big second-half play from the 49ers.

"Any win is a good win," coach Eliah Drinkwitz said. "I'm really proud of some guys stepping up and making some individual great plays."

In a White Out game that drew 29,182 fans to The Rock, Evans rushed for a career-high 234 yards and totaled four touchdowns, including an 87-yard run on the first play from scrimmage and a 68-yard touchdown run after Charlotte had cut its deficit to 42-34 midway through the fourth quarter. The 49ers scored again on a 27-yard touchdown pass with 3:17 remaining, but Evans fielded the onside kick and sprinted 45 yards untouched for his school-record third touchdown via a kickoff return in his career.

Shaun Jolly's first career interception sealed the victory for App State.

Evans finished with 298 all-purpose yards and became the first player in this millenium with at least 200 rushing yards, three rushing touchdowns and a kick return for a touchdown in the same game.

In addition to Evans' heroics, Zac Thomas had three TD passes, including scoring connections of 10 and 73 yards with Jalen Virgil.

Big plays on defense and special teams turned a one-point lead into a 28-13 advantage at the break. Demetrius Taylor's forced fumble on a sack led to Jordan Fehr's fumble recovery at the Charlotte 10, and Thomas threw a touchdown pass to Virgil on the next play.

After using three timeouts while the App State defense forced a three-and-out punt, Jolly used his right hand to block the kick. D'Marco Jackson scooped up the loose ball at the Charlotte 16 and raced down the left sideline to score his first career touchdown with 39 seconds left.

App State's nine-game winning streak is the nation's third-longest active streak behind Clemson (19) and Ohio State (10).

With its 44th win since the 2015 season, App State is tied with Boise State for most wins among Group of Five teams during that span.

App State won its 13th straight game with Zac Thomas as its primary quarterback.

App State head coach Eliah Drinkwitz was part of a win against North Carolina for the fourth straight year. NC State went 3-0 overall and 2-0 in Chapel Hill with Drinkwitz as the Wolfpack's offensive coordinator from 2016-18.

Zac Thomas had a 50-yard run, giving him three runs of at least 50 yards in 19 career games and seven runs of at least 20 yards.

Mountaineers Claim Historic Victory in Chapel Hill

CHAPEL HILL, N.C. — What a time for a Black and Gold breakthrough. The kick is blocked — again.

National defensive player of the week Demetrius Taylor forced two turnovers to help Appalachian State build a first-half lead on the road, and Darrynton Evans rushed for three TDs as the Mountaineers won 34-31 against in-state ACC program North Carolina.

The Tar Heels reached App State's 39-yard line with five seconds left, and Akeem Davis-Gaither pushed through a gap in the line to tip a 56-yard attempt at a field goal as time expired.

The second-ever football meeting between the two schools and first since 1940 drew a spirited, sold-out crowd to Kenan Stadium, and the Mountaineers posted their first win against a Power Five conference team since the historic upset of Michigan in 2007.

Taylor led App State's defense by recording 2.5 sacks, forcing two fumbles, turning a post-sack recovery into a 20-yard fumble return for a touchdown and setting up another touchdown with an interception. Jordan Fehr set a career high with 16 tackles, and six reserve defensive backs performed well under pressure throughout the fourth quarter on an extremely hot afternoon in Chapel Hill.

Evans' three rushing touchdowns contributed to his 78 yards on the ground, and Zac Thomas accounted for 281 yards of total offense.

UNC (2-2) scored with one second left in the first half and again in the third quarter to turn a 27-10 deficit into a 27-24 nailbiter, but the Mountaineers responded immediately to the Tar Heels' long TD march with a 75-yard touchdown drive that included Thomas' 31-yard pass to Thomas Hennigan and a 43-yard connection with Malik Williams.

UNC pulled within 34-31 on a short TD run with 3:01 remaining and got one last possession starting from its 20 with 30 seconds left. A 24-yard completion into App State territory set up a long-shot kick try.

Appalachian State improved to 28-5 at Kidd Brewer Stadium as an FBS program and is now 35-6 in Sun Belt league games. It is 35-4 in its last 39 games in Sun Belt play and 36-4 in its last 40 games against Sun Belt programs — counting the 2018 league championship game.

App State's 10-game winning streak is the nation's third-longest active streak behind Clemson (20) and Ohio State (11). It's the Mountaineers' first double-digit win streak since the 2009 team followed an 0-2 start with 11 consecutive victories.

Starting with 1:39 remaining in the first quarter, there was a two-hour, three-minute weather delay based on lightning in the area, ranging from 4:14 p.m. to 6:17 p.m. The last weather delay for an App State home game occurred during the 2014 home opener against Campbell.

The Mountaineers improved to 6-0 overall and 3-0 in FBS matchups against Coastal Carolina, with the game having the biggest margin of victory since the Chanticleers joined App State in the Sun Belt. The Mountaineers won 37-29 in 2017 and 23-6 last season.

App State moved ahead 28-21 with 1:59 left before halftime, and a personal foul on the extra point allowed the Mountaineers to kick off from midfield. Matthew McQuinn forced a fumble on a return to the 17-yard line, and a Coastal Carolina player came out of the pile with possession at the 3. After a quick three-and-out, App State went ahead 35-21 with 45 seconds left in the half.

Darrynton Evans finished with four kickoff returns for 132 yards, the second-highest yardage total of his career, topped only by his 154 yards on six returns against Akron as a freshman in 2016.

App State Puts Up Big Numbers In Sun Belt Opener

BOONE, N.C. — Sandwiched around nearby lightning strikes, Appalachian State put up plenty of offensive fireworks to win its Sun Belt Conference opener.

Zac Thomas had two touchdown passes while throwing for 246 yards and App State's three primary running backs accounted for a combined five rushing touchdowns in a 56-37 home win against Coastal Carolina on Saturday. The sold-out game at Kidd Brewer Stadium featured a two-hour, three-minute weather delay late in the first quarter.

"I thought our guys handled the adversity well," head coach Eliah Drinkwitz said. "We also had the factor of where we spent a lot of energy against UNC, so to be able to come back and sustain that energy for as long as we did today made me real proud of our guys."

Thomas ended up completing 19 of his 23 pass attempts against the league's top-ranked defense, and walk-on Matthew McQuinn delivered a huge forced fumble on special teams to help the Mountaineers turn a tie game late in the first half into a 42-21 lead in the third quarter.

The Chanticleers (3-2, 0-1) had cut their deficit to 42-30 late in the third quarter before cornerback Shaun Jolly returned his second career interception 24 yards for a touchdown with 11:59 remaining to help clinch the win.

Akeem Davis-Gaither had a sack among his team-leading eight tackles for App State's defense, which had three first-time starters, and Demetrius Taylor followed up a starring performance against UNC with a batted down pass, one stop behind the line of scrimmage, a partially blocked punt and a career-high-tying four tackles.

Daetrich Harrington rushed for one touchdown and a team-high 71 yards on 11 carries, Darrynton Evans scored twice while adding 60 rushing yards and Marcus Williams Jr. had two rushing TDs.

Akeem Davis-Gaither led App State's defense with 11 tackles, including 2.5 stops behind the line of scrimmage, and Noel Cook added eight stops. Defensive end Demetrius Taylor had a sack, a fourth-down stop on a goalline stand and a quarterback hurry to force a three-and-out.

Louisiana moved into field goal range early in the third quarter before George Blackstock blocked the 42-yard attempt, which was returned 11 yards by Josh Thomas.

After Chandler Staton's tiebreaking field goal, the defense allowed a total of 7 yards on nine plays while forcing three straight three-and-outs.

App State extended its winning streak to 11 games, which is the nation's third-longest active streak behind Clemson (20) and Ohio State (12).

The Mountaineers moved their all-time record against the Ragin' Cajuns to 7-0, including a 3-0 mark in Lafayette.

App State improved to 36-6 in Sun Belt Conference play (and 36-4 in its last 40 games in league play). The Mountaineers improved to 17-4 in Sun Belt road games.

Since 2015, App State improved to 16-0 in games in which it had more than a week to prepare. LSU is second in the country with a 10-0 record in those situations since 2015, and the 16-0 record doesn't include App State's four bowl wins.

With a 19-play, 97-yard TD drive that lasted 10 minutes, 11 seconds, it was App State's first 10-minute scoring drive since the Mountaineers moved up to the FBS level in 2014. Previously, the longest scoring drive by time as an FBS program lasted 8:49 — a 15-play, 93-yard TD drive against Idaho in 2015.

App State Wins Defensive Slugfest at Louisiana

LAFAYETTE, La. — App State remained undefeated by showing its grit and putting together a timely, clock-consuming touchdown drive to cap a defensive slugfest.

In a nationally televised matchup of two of the nation's highest-scoring teams, the Mountaineers pulled out a 17-7 victory at Louisiana.

App State (5-0, 2-0 Sun Belt) held a three-point lead when it regained possession at its 3-yard line with 12:06 remaining. Two fourth-down conversions prolonged a 19-play, 97-yard touchdown drive that took 10 minutes, 11 seconds off the clock — the program's longest scoring drive since it moved up to the FBS level.

Zac Thomas scored his second touchdown of the night when he made a leaping high-step into the end zone to end a 7-yard bootleg keeper around left end with 1:55 remaining, and the Mountaineers could begin celebrating when a fourth-down pass from the Ragin' Cajuns (4-2, 1-1) fell incomplete in the final minute.

"That drive said a lot about our offense, and we owe it all to our defense," Thomas said. "They played lights-out, and we owed it to them for keeping us in the game. That was our payback to them for a great job that they did."

With Thomas' first 7-yard touchdown run giving App State an early lead and Chandler Staton's 40-yard field goal breaking a third-quarter tie, the Mountaineers held Louisiana more the 37 points below its scoring average.

The lengthy fourth-quarter drive continued thanks to Thomas' 4-yard strike to Thomas Hennigan on a fourth-and-4 pass from the UL 38. The Mountaineers then faced a fourth-and-5 situation from the Louisiana 25 with less than three minutes left, and Corey Sutton drew a penalty for pass interference near the end zone to extend the series.

"We're always going to attack success," App State head coach Eliah Drinkwitz said. "We're never going to fear failure. I knew if I put the ball in our best players' hands, we were going to get it done."

App State totaled 196 rushing yards, or 73 more than Louisiana, which was averaging 314.0 rushing yards per game entering the ESPN2 contest.

App State became the first Sun Belt team to win a game as a ranked team. Troy started 8-1 to reach No. 25 in 2016 but lost 35-3 against Arkansas State the following week, and App State's 5-1 start to earn a ranking of No. 25 in 2018 was followed by a 34-14 loss in which Zac Thomas suffered a game-ending injury on the first series at Georgia Southern.

App State won its 16th straight game with Zac Thomas as the team's primary quarterback.

App State's 12-game winning streak tied for the second-longest winning streak in program history, matching App State's 12-0 start to the 1995 season. The Mountaineers won 17 straight games to end the 2006 season and begin the 2007 season.

App State became 5-for-5 in becoming bowl-eligible as a postseason-eligible FBS program.

The 45-point margin of victory tied for App State's second-highest margin in a Sun Belt win, matching a 52-7 win against South Alabama in 2018 and a 59-14 win at ULM in 2015. The top margin is 49 points from a 63-14 win against Louisiana in the 2017 home finale.

App State picked up its 250th win in Kidd Brewer Stadium, improving its home record to 250-75-5 since the stadium opened in 1962.

From the first quarter of the last ULM game in 2017 to the second quarter of Saturday's game against ULM, App State running backs had a streak of no fumbles that covered 777 carries for 4,694 yards. That streak involved four-plus games to end 2017, all 13 games in 2018 and five-plus games in 2019, or 22 straight full games without a running back fumble.

No. 24 App State Reaches 3-0 in Sun Belt with Win

BOONE, N.C. — In a matchup of division leaders, No. 24 App State rolled to its first win as a ranked FBS team.

The league-leading Mountaineers became the lone Sun Belt team without a conference loss following their 52-7 home victory against ULM on a homecoming Saturday.

After the Warhawks posted a touchdown on the game's opening possession, App State (6-0, 3-0) scored the next 52 points, including 31 straight to take a 24-point lead into the break of their 250th win in Kidd Brewer Stadium.

The run of points began with Darrynton Evans rushing for a 59-yard touchdown on his team's third play from scrimmage.

"We were well aware that no Sun Belt football team has ever been ranked for two straight weeks in the history of the conference," App State head coach Eliah Drinkwitz said, "so we were motivated to write our own history and to always compete to do it better than it's been done before."

With a strong effort from the offensive line, the Mountaineers put up 572 total yards, including 302 on the ground.

Defensively, they limited standout quarterback Caleb Evans to 75 passing yards and held high-scoring ULM (3-4 2-1) to 213 total yards, including only 121 yards after its game-opening touchdown drive. After throwing for 61 yards on the opening drive, Evans completed five of his final 13 attempts for 14 yards before he was replaced in the third quarter by Colby Suits, who went 2-for-8 for 27 yards.

Josh Thomas had a big fumble return to set up a score, Shaun Jolly intercepted a pass for the third time this season and Jordan Fehr added his first interception of the season.

The Mountaineers improved to 4-0 in league play for the fourth time in the last five seasons.

App State improved its record to 38-6 in league play since joining the Sun Belt Conference in 2014. It is 38-4 in its last 42 league games (after an 0-2 start) and 39-4 in its last 43 games against Sun Belt teams — counting the 2018 Sun Belt Championship Game against Louisiana.

Since joining the league, App State is now 18-4 in Sun Belt road games. In that time, the Mountaineers are 22-11 overall on the road. The only teams with more road wins since 2014 entering the weekend were Oklahoma (24), Clemson (24), Ohio State (23) and Boise State (23).

The 7-0 start is the Mountaineers' best since winning eight straight to begin the 2010 season, when they were still competing at the FCS level.

The Mountaineers' defense allowed three points and 139 yards to the Jaguars. It's the fewest points allowed since a 34-0 win over Toledo in the 2017 Dollar General Bowl (also at Ladd-Peebles Stadium) and the fewest yards allowed since a 54-7 win over Savannah State (114) in 2017. It was the fewest points allowed to a Sun Belt opponent since a 24-0 win vs. Louisiana in 2016 and fewest yards allowed in a league game since 2014 vs. Georgia State (62).

App State has given up its fewest points in a three-game stretch (17) since allowing 16 in 2015 wins vs. Old Dominion (49-0), Wyoming (31-13) and Georgia State (37-3). It's the best three-game Sun Belt stretch for the Mountaineer defense, which last gave up fewer than 17 points in three straight league games in 1998 as a member of the Southern Conference.

Dominant Effort on 'D' Leads App State Past Jags

MOBILE, Ala. — Ranked and still unbeaten, No. 21 App State didn't let a pregame storm rain on its nationally televised parade.

After warming up in a downpour at Ladd-Peebles Stadium, the Mountaineers shut down South Alabama's offense in a 30-3 victory that kept them alone atop the Sun Belt Conference standings.

Elijah Diarrassouba recovered a fumble, Demetrius Taylor blocked a field goal and the Mountaineers (7-0, 4-0) recorded three sacks as they limited the Jaguars to 139 yards of total offense — the second-smallest total against App State in a Sun Belt game.

"I thought our defense played unbelievable today and held them in check all game," App State coach Eliah Drinkwitz said. "It really allowed us offensively to kind of find ourselves. We struggled converting third downs and really didn't play solid enough offensively, but we played well enough to win and we'll be on to the next one."

With 13 straight wins, the Mountaineers have the nation's third-longest active streak, and it's the second-longest streak in program history.

Late in the third quarter Saturday, while holding a 23-0 lead on ESPNU, App State's defense had allowed just 43 yards on 32 plays from South Alabama (1-7, 0-4).

The Mountaineers officially recorded 10 three-and-outs on defense, but 10 times in the first 11 chances and 12 times overall App State needed three plays or less to force a punting situation or turnover once South Alabama's offense took the field. A roughing-the-punter penalty officially wiped out one three-and-out stand, but the Jaguars had to punt again three plays later.

Offensively, App State's Marcus Williams Jr. scored once while rushing for 94 yards on 11 carries, and true freshman Raykwon Anderson came in late to add 99 yards on four carries thanks to a 67-yard touchdown. Zac Thomas' 132 passing yards included a 19-yard touchdown to Thomas Hennigan, who had six catches, and Malik Williams had three early third-down conversions.

GAME NOTES

The loss snaps App State's 13-game win streak that was the third-longest active streak in the country behind Clemson (23) and Ohio State (14). It was the Mountaineers' first loss since Oct. 25 at Georgia Southern last year. The team went 370 days between losses.

This was App State's first home loss since Sept. 23, 2017, a 20-19 defeat to Wake Forest. It snapped a 14-game home winning streak that entered the week tied for seventh-best in the FBS.

Despite playing in conditions with wind gusts exceeding 40 mph, Zac Thomas threw for a season-high 271 yards. It's the third-highest total of his career, behind 295 yards at Charlotte and 282 yards against Georgia State last season.

Zac Thomas had a game with three TD passes and no interceptions for the second time this season (also Charlotte) and the fourth time in his career.

Malik Williams set career highs in catches (eight) and receiving yards (89) while catching a second-quarter touchdown. His previous highs were six catches (three times) and 78 yards (at North Carolina earlier this season).

Corey Sutton had two receiving TDs in a game for the first time this season after doing it three times last season. With 13 career touchdown catches, he's now tied for ninth place in school history.

Senior OLB Akeem Davis-Gaither set a career high with 16 tackles, including 1.5 TFLs. His previous career high was 15 in a regular season win over Louisiana last year.

Senior captain and strong safety Josh Thomas played his 50th career game.

Fourth-Quarter Comeback Falls Short for App State

BOONE, N.C. — A windy and spooky Halloween night included plenty of rain, flurries of snow and a rare home setback for App State.

The first-place and 20th-ranked Mountaineers became the last Sun Belt team to suffer a league loss in 2019, as Georgia Southern used two long touchdown runs early in the second half to gain separation before holding on for a 24-21 victory.

App State receiver Corey Sutton's touchdown catches with 8:22 and 4:47 remaining cut the deficit from 17 points to three, and the Mountaineers had possession twice in the final four minutes. A fourth-and-4 pass from midfield fell incomplete to end one series with 2:16 left, and App State got the ball back at its 16 with 1:10 remaining but no timeouts at their disposal.

The game ended with a completion and multi-lateral effort near midfield.

"We'll move forward," App State coach Eliah Drinkwitz said. "It's all about being 1-0 and all about those things we preach when we win. We have to keep preaching them when things don't go in our favor, and we have to keep believing in them. That's what our team will do."

Thursday's result ended a 14-game home winning streak for App State, which had won its last 16 home games against Sun Belt competition since a midweek loss to Arkansas State in 2015.

Akeem Davis-Gaither led App State with 16 tackles, and Zac Thomas completed 25 of his 51 pass attempts for 271 yards and three touchdowns with wind gusts topping 40 mph at The Rock. Malik Williams (eight catches), Sutton (six catches) and Thomas Hennigan (six catches) all had between 67 and 89 receiving yards.

Zac Thomas needed less than two minutes late in the second quarter to direct a 10-play, 92-yard TD drive, which ended on Williams' 15-yard touchdown pass with just six seconds left in the half, but Georgia Southern quickly turned a 10-7 lead into a 24-7 advantage thanks to Wesley Kennedy III's 68-yard TD run and Shai Werts' 55-yard touchdown run in the first five minutes of the third quarter.

GAME NOTES

App State is the first Sun Belt team to win eight of its first nine games of the season since Troy in 2016.

App State claimed its first win over a team in the SEC at the time of the game. (The Mountaineers beat the Gamecocks 39-34 in 1975 when South Carolina was an independent)

App State is the first Sun Belt team with two P5 wins in a season.

The Mountaineers are the first team to win nonconference road games at ACC and SEC schools in the same season since Houston in 1999.

App State is the first G5 team with two P5 road wins in a season since 2013, when ECU won at UNC and NC State and Northern Illinois took down Iowa and Purdue on the road.

Since the Sun Belt was established in 2001, App State is the seventh G5 team with two P5 road wins in the same season. In addition to ECU and Northern Illinois in 2013, the other four are 2009 Houston (Oklahoma State, Mississippi State), 2009 TCU (Virginia, Clemson), 2001 Bowling Green (Missouri, Northwestern) and 2001 BYU (Cal, Mississippi State)

The Mountaineers are the first team to win road games at North Carolina and South Carolina in the same season since Clemson in 1991.

App State gave South Carolina its first home nonconference loss since 2017 (Clemson) and first to a team not named Clemson since 2015 vs. The Citadel.

Since 2015, counting bowl games but not season openers, App State improved to 22-0 in games in which it had more than a week to prepare.

App State improved to 11-1 in games on ESPN2.

App State Posts Another P5 Win At South Carolina

COLUMBIA, S.C. — Forty-four years after he helped App State beat South Carolina for the first time, Tommy Sofield stood in Williams-Brice Stadium and called for the Mountaineers to force a Gamecock turnover.

Moments later, true freshman Nicholas Ross returned a second-quarter interception for a tiebreaking touchdown.

Make that two dramatic wins against the SEC program. And a locker room celebration that included Sofield holding a commemorative ball.

Becoming just the seventh Group of Five team since the Sun Belt was formed in 2001 to post two Power Five road wins in the same season, App State escaped Columbia with a 20-15 victory in front of 80,849 fans and an ESPN2 audience.

"I'm just proud of the focus and effort our guys played with," head coach Eliah Drinkwitz said "I'm proud of the way they battled all game."

After cutting into a 20-9 deficit on a touchdown with 2:58 left, South Carolina regained possession and faced a fourth-and-15 from the App State 35 with 19 seconds left. Ryan Hilinski completed a pass for 26 yards to the 9 before spiking the ball with nine seconds remaining.

Nick Hampton forced a holding penalty on a pass rush as George Blackstock batted down the throw, leading to a snap from the 19 with six seconds left. The Gamecocks committed holding against Akeem Davis-Gaither on a pass that didn't connect at the back of the end zone, leading to a frenzied celebration from the Mountaineers.

App State's 34-31 win at North Carolina earlier in 2019 was its first victory against a Power Five team since the historic 2007 upset of Michigan, and now the Mountaineers have back-to-back wins against P5 teams.

Jordan Fehr (12 tackles), Hampton and Davis-Gaither had important sacks to lead a defense that posted 11 pass breakups and limited South Carolina to 21 rushing yards on 27 attempts.

Darrynton Evans' 85 rushing yards were part of his 158 all-purpose yards, and Jalen Virgil's 57-yard kickoff return set up App State's offensive TD.

GAME NOTES

App State became the first Sun Belt team to ever start a season 9-1 since the league was established as an FBS member in 2001.

App State became one of six teams with nine or more wins in each of the last five seasons. The others are Alabama, Boise State, Clemson, Ohio State and Oklahoma.

Since the 2015 season began, App State is No. 5 nationally in win percentage (80.6) and tied for No. 6 in total wins with a 50-12 record. The win total trails only Clemson (66-4), Alabama (64-5), Ohio State (58-6), Oklahoma (55-9) and Georgia (51-14). Wisconsin is 50-14 during the same span.

App State improved to 39-7 in league play since joining the Sun Belt in 2014. It is 39-5 in its last 44 league games (after an 0-2 start) and 40-5 in its last 45 games against Sun Belt teams — counting the inaugural Sun Belt Championship Game against Louisiana in 2018.

Since moving up to the FBS level in 2014, App State improved to 24-11 on the road, putting the program in a tie for third place nationally (with Ohio State and Boise State) for the most road wins in that span. Clemson and Oklahoma have 25. App State improved to 19-4 in Sun Belt road games.

Darrynton Evans surpassed 1,000 rushing yards for the second straight season. App State's produced a 1,000-yard back for the eighth straight season, a streak that is tied for second nationally behind the 10 straight from Boise State.

Zac Thomas threw for 256 yards with a career-high four touchdowns through the air and one with his legs. The five total touchdowns were also a career high.

App State Overcomes Adversity, Rolls to Road Win

ATLANTA, Ga. — Facing a two-score deficit after a momentum-swinging touchdown on the road, App State swung back and kept landing punches.

The first-place Mountaineers, ranked No. 24 in the Coaches Poll and No. 25 by the College Football Playoff committee, responded to the early adversity by scoring seven consecutive touchdowns en route to a 56-27 victory against Georgia State.

A defensive touchdown gave the Panthers a 21-7 lead late in the first quarter, but App State (9-1, 5-1) accounted for the next 49 points, with the first 28 producing a 35-21 halftime advantage.

"It's about staying in the fight," App State head coach Eliah Drinkwitz said. "Every play has a life of its own."

During the 49-0 run, the Mountaineers' defense forced seven three-and-outs in nine possessions, and one of the other two possessions in that stretch ended with Shaun Jolly's second interception.

Jolly's second pick followed his tiebreaking interception return for a touchdown late in the first half, and Corey Sutton's three receiving touchdowns were part of a career-high 173 yards on eight catches.

Zac Thomas threw for 256 yards with four touchdowns through the air and one with his legs, while Darrynton Evans surpassed 1,000 rushing yards for the second straight season thanks to a 131-yard night.

Over the final three quarters, the Mountaineers limited Georgia State (6-4, 3-3) to 33 rushing yards on 18 attempts and 140 offensive yards on 42 plays. Jordan Fehr finished with 10 tackles, and the cornerback tandem of Jolly and Shemar Jean-Charles combined for six PBUs.

App State's four-touchdown run over the last 15:09 of the first half closed with Jolly's 30-yard interception return for a score with 2:18 left in the half and another Jolly interception that set up Thomas' 1-yard touchdown pass to Evans with 22 seconds remaining before the break.

App State won on Senior Day at Kidd Brewer Stadium for the 22nd straight year. After a 25-19 home loss to Liberty in the 1997 finale, App State won its last 16 Senior Day games as an FCS program, with six of them coming vs. Western Carolina. The Mountaineers have won FBS regular-season home finales against Idaho (2014), Louisiana (2015, 2017), ULM (2016), Troy (2018) and Texas State (2019).

App State became the first Sun Belt team to ever start a season 10-1 since the league was established as an FBS member in 2001. The Mountaineers have reached double-figure wins three times in their last five FBS seasons, joining 11-2 marks in 2018 and 2015.

App State improved to 40-7 in league play since joining the Sun Belt in 2014. It moved to 40-5 in its last 45 league games (after an 0-2 start) and 41-5 in its last 46 games against Sun Belt teams — counting the inaugural Sun Belt Championship Game against Louisiana in 2018.

App State improved its series record against Texas State to 5-0, including 3-0 in Boone and 4-0 as Sun Belt counterparts.

Corey Sutton scored on a 45-yard touchdown pass in the first quarter to put him in a tie for fifth place in App State history with 17 career touchdown receptions. Dexter Jackson had 17 from 2004-07.

Darrynton Evans had three rushing touchdowns in a game for the third time in 2019. He also posted three against Charlotte and North Carolina.

Senior defensive tackle and former walk-on E.J. Scott recorded the first two sacks of his career on Senior Day.

Demetrius Taylor had a first-half sack to give him 6.0 this season and 12.5 in 36 career games.

App State Clinches Division Title On Senior Day

BOONE, N.C. — App State's Senior Day streak continued thanks to a second-half surge on a rainy, division-clinching afternoon at The Rock.

Darrynton Evans' three touchdown runs after halftime allowed the 24th-ranked Mountaineers to break free from a close game and claim a 35-13 victory against Sun Belt foe Texas State. Senior linebacker Noel Cook made a key interception against the Bobcats for the second straight year, and his third-quarter pick followed a pass deflection from senior defensive tackle E.J. Scott, who recorded two sacks.

The win for App State (10-1, 6-1 Sun Belt) and Georgia Southern's loss at Arkansas State meant the Mountaineers clinched the East Division title and a spot in the Sun Belt Championship Game.

Evans rushed for 154 yards and Zac Thomas threw two touchdown passes to lead the offense for App State, which won on Senior Day at Kidd Brewer Stadium for the 22nd straight year. Seventeen players were honored before the game, and the fifth-year quintet of Johnson, Akeem Davis-Gaither, Desmond Franklin, Collin Reed and Josh Thomas improved their career records to 51-12 overall, 35-5 against Sun Belt programs and 26-4 at home.

In addition to being No. 24 in the College Football Playoff rankings, the league-leading Mountaineers are No. 22 in the Amway Coaches Poll and No. 23 in the AP Top 25.

"It's always good to win on Senior Day," App State coach Eliah Drinkwitz said. "It took us a little bit to get going. Noel Cook's interception in the third quarter was a huge momentum boost for our team. We were able to capitalize there and finish it off."

Texas State (3-8, 2-5) used a 48-yard field goal to cut its second-half deficit to 14-13 before Evans scored on runs of 13 and 10 yards in the final six minutes of the third quarter. He added a 13-yard TD run with 6:26 remaining as App State finished with a 468-208 advantage in total offense.

The Bobcats regained possession trailing by just one midway through the third period, but Scott deflected the first-down throw, and Cook intercepted the ball at the Texas State 39 before returning it 10 yards.

GAME NOTES

With two games remaining, App State tied the Sun Belt Conference record for single-season wins and is responsible for three of the four 11-win seasons in league history. The others are 2015 App State (11-2), 2017 Troy (11-2) and 2018 App State (11-2).

Finishing with a 6-0 road record in 2019, App State clinched its first perfect road record since the 1995 team had six road victories (including one at Wake Forest) during a 12-0 start. That team lost to Stephen F. Austin at home in the second round of the FCS playoffs.

The 2019 and 1995 teams are the only ones in school history with 11 regular-season wins.

Before 1995, the last App State team to go unbeaten on the road was the 1950 team that was 5-0 with a pair of postseason, neutral site "bowl" losses. The Mountaineers were also unbeaten and untied on the road in 1947 (5-0), 1938 (4-0) and 1937 (4-0).

With 82 rushing yards, junior back Darrynton Evans increased his career total to 2,654 rushing yards and moved into the top 10 in school history.

Zac Thomas threw for a career-high 326 yards, topping his previous high of 295 from a 2018 win at Charlotte. He also set a career high with his 28 completions, three more than a total he had posted three previous times.

Thomas Hennigan recorded career highs in receptions and receiving yards by halftime in an 11-catch, 140-yard effort. His previous highs were seven catches (against ETSU in the 2019 opener) and 99 receiving yards (in the regular-season finale against Louisiana in 2017).

Willie Edwards recorded his first career interception in the fourth quarter.

App State Goes 6-0 on Road, Will Host Title Game

TROY, Ala. — An unblemished road record secured, App State could turn its attention to hosting another Sun Belt Championship Game.

Zac Thomas threw for a career-high 326 yards while accounting for five touchdowns, including four through the air, as the 25th-ranked Mountaineers won 48-13 at Troy. As the East Division winner with the head-to-head tiebreaker against West Division winner Louisiana, App State (11-1, 7-1) earned the right to face the Ragin' Cajuns (9-2, 6-1) in a title-game rematch on ESPN.

"We came out and just played really fast and started fast," head coach Eliah Drinkwitz said. "We knew we wanted to come out and set the tone of the game and send a message that we were here to play."

App State clinched its first perfect road record since 1995 by converting its first 10 third-down chances, recording four sacks and intercepting two passes against the Trojans (5-7, 3-5).

The Mountaineers' 6-0 road record includes the most wins for any of the seven teams nationally without a road loss, and they're the first FBS team to go 6-0 on the road since Western Michigan in 2016.

App State also tied the Sun Belt record for single-season victories, as it has accounted for three of the four 11-win seasons in league history.

In addition to the big night for Thomas, who completed 28 of his 34 pass attempts, Darrynton Evans' three touchdowns pushed his season total to 20. Thomas Hennigan set career highs with 11 catches for 140 yards, Malik Williams caught two touchdown passes and Jalen Virgil scored a long touchdown as part of his 95 receiving yards.

Defensively, Nick Hampton produced one of the four sacks against Sun Belt passing leader Kaleb Barker while amassing a team-high eight tackles, and Desmond Franklin's interception return created a short field for App State's third touchdown.

GAME NOTES

App State won a Sun Belt Conference title for the fourth straight year and is 2-for-2 in winning the Sun Belt Championship Game. Oklahoma won its fourth straight Big 12 title, and the only other FBS program with four straight titles at this point is Clemson, which won its fifth straight ACC title.

App State became the first in-state FBS program or Sun Belt program to post a 12-win season. Of the 10 instances of an in-state program winning 11 games in a season, App State is responsible for three of them (in the Mountaineers' six FBS seasons). App State is responsible for three of the four 11-win seasons in Sun Belt history.

App State posted its G5-leading fourth win this season against a team ranked in the top 45 of ESPN's FPI (Football Power Index). It's the only ranked G5 team with two wins over P5 teams (both on the road) or three road wins over ESPN FPI top 50 teams.

App State is 43-7 in its 50 games against Sun Belt teams, and it improved to 8-0 in the series with Louisiana.

Since the 2015 season began, App State is No. 5 nationally in win percentage (81.5) and tied for No. 5 in total wins with its 53-12 record. The win total trails only Clemson (68-4), Alabama (65-6), Ohio State (61-6) and Oklahoma (60-9), with Georgia sitting at 53-15.

App State fifth-year seniors Akeem Davis-Gaither, Desmond Franklin, Victor Johnson, Collin Reed and Josh Thomas finished their careers at The Rock with a 27-4 home record.

App State increased its season total to 69 touchdowns to tie the Sun Belt's single-season record. Arkansas State also had 69 in 2015.

No. 21 App State Secures 4th Straight League Title

BOONE, N.C. — Another Ring Game at The Rock. And a repeat champion. App State claimed its fourth straight league title and celebrated a Sun Belt Championship Game victory on its home field for the second straight year thanks to a 45-38 win against Louisiana.

Three early touchdowns from belt-winning MVP Darrynton Evans gave the 21st-ranked Mountaineers a 21-0 lead late in the first quarter, and captain Josh Thomas' first career interception return for a touchdown accounted for one of three turnovers forced by a senior on App State's defense. The Mountaineers led 42-17 late in the third quarter and maintained at least a 14-point lead until the Ragin' Cajuns cut into a 45-31 deficit on a touchdown pass with 1:19 remaining.

By prevailing in the first-ever matchup of Sun Belt teams with double-digit wins, App State (12-1) became the first FBS program from the state of North Carolina and the first Sun Belt program to post a 12-win season.

Evans added a second MVP belt to his collection with 162 all-purpose yards against the Ragin' Cajuns (10-3) and the three scores (58-yard catch, 8-yard run, 5-yard catch) that increased his season total to 23.

Zac Thomas' two TD throws contributed to his 174 total yards, including 143 through the air, and the Mountaineers got scoring runs of 25-plus yards from both Marcus Williams Jr. (78 rushing yards) and Daetrich Harrington (team-high 89 yards) as they rushed for 267 yards as a team.

Defensively, in addition to Josh Thomas' pick-six, E.J. Scott recovered his own forced fumble to trigger the early outburst and Desmond Franklin recovered a fumble forced by Noel Cook. Akeem Davis-Gaither recorded a team-high 10 tackles and Demetrius Taylor added his seventh sack of the season.

GAME NOTES

App State became the first FBS school to win five bowl games in each of its first five bowl-eligible seasons.

The fifth-year seniors made up the fifth class in college football history to win five bowl games and four conference championships, joining five-year classes from Nebraska (1969-73), Alabama (1975-79), Florida State (1991-95) and Marshall (1988-2002).

The fifth-year seniors went 54-12 and won four Sun Belt Conference championships. Fourth-year seniors such as Jordan Fehr and Noel Cook were on teams that went 43-10 with a Sun Belt title every season.

With 13 wins, App State tied for the second-highest total by a Group of Five team since the Sun Belt was established in 2001. Boise State had a G5-record 14 wins in 2009. The 13-win G5 teams before App State were 2017 UCF, 2016 Western Michigan, 2015 Houston, 2014 Marshall, 2011 Houston, 2010 TCU, 2010 Nevada, 2008 Utah and 2006 Boise.

App State set Sun Belt records for single-season points (543) and touchdowns (73). The old records belonged to the 2015 Arkansas State team that scored 520 points and posted 69 touchdowns. The Mountaineers finished with eight non-offensive touchdowns: four on interceptions, two on fumble recoveries, one on a kickoff return and one on a blocked punt.

Since 2015, App State improved to an FBS-best 24-0 in non-season-opening games in which it had more than a week to prepare.

With six sacks at the New Orleans Bowl for the second straight year, App State tied its bowl record and had its single-game high for 2019. The previous high was four against both Charlotte and Troy.

App State Caps Record Year With 5th Bowl Victory

NEW ORLEANS — Make it a perfect five for five by App State's quintet of fifth-year seniors.

Whether the 20th-ranked Mountaineers were putting the ball in the air or scooping it off the turf, they extended their record-setting bowl streak and capped a record-setting season with a 31-17 win against UAB in the R+L Carriers New Orleans Bowl.

Despite facing a two-TD deficit in the first five minutes, App State (13-1) scored 31 of the final 34 points with help from Zac Thomas' two touchdown passes to Thomas Hennigan and Tommy Dawkins' 2.5 sacks.

The Mountaineers took their first lead when bowl MVP Darrynton Evans ran 31 yards for a touchdown after recovering a fumbled fourth-down sneak early in the third quarter, and they went ahead for good on linebacker Trey Cobb's tiebreaking 24-yard return of a fumble forced by Nick Hampton's sack midway through the same period.

The Mountaineers became the first Sun Belt team and the first FBS team from the state of North Carolina to win 13 games.

"It's a great day to be a Mountaineer, baby," head coach Shawn Clark said. "Our team has a ton of poise, and it's been that way all year. Our team has great senior leadership."

With the win in Clark's head coaching debut, fifth-year seniors Akeem Davis-Gaither, Desmond Franklin, Victor Johnson, Collin Reed and Josh Thomas finished their careers with a 7-0 postseason record that included two wins in the Sun Belt title game and a 5-0 bowl record.

For fourth-year seniors such as Jordan Fehr and Noel Cook, they won a Sun Belt title every year they were in Boone.

Evans rushed for 157 yards Saturday while tying the Sun Belt record of 24 touchdowns in a season, and App State set league records for single-season points (543) and touchdowns (73). Defensively, Fehr led the way with 11 tackles in his final game, and the Mountaineers posted six sacks while holding UAB to 184 yards of offense after the first two drives.

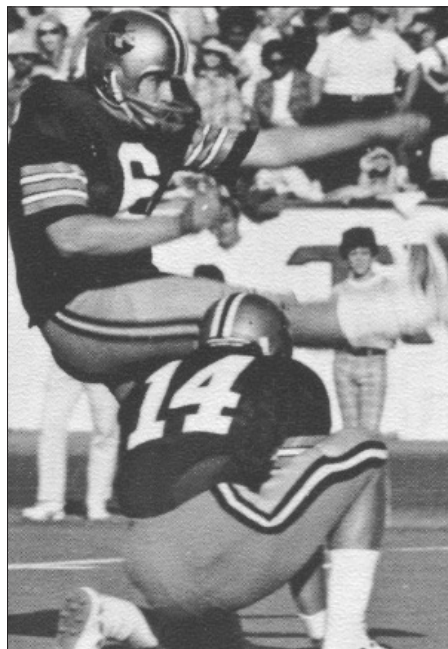

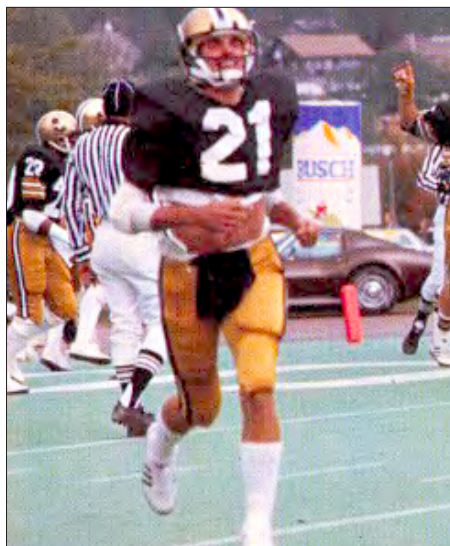

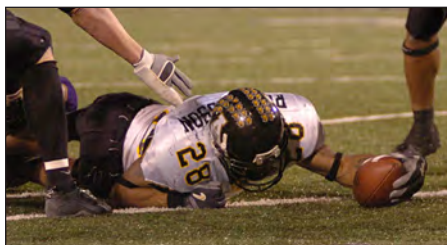

Murrell and Hunter combined for two more sacks down the stretch to squelch the Panthers' final scoring opportunities.



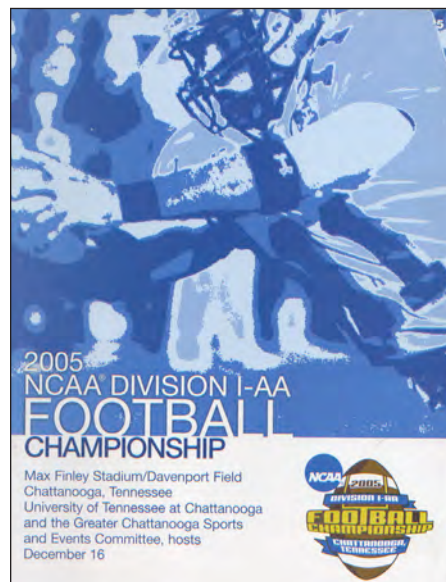
Appalachian defensive end Marques Murrell came off the left edge to strip the ball from Sanders.

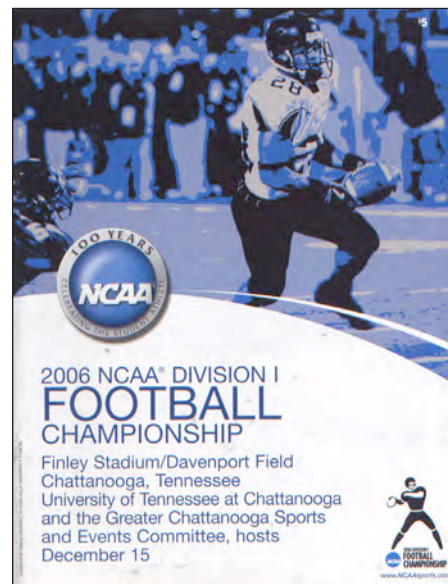
When UMass cut the Mountaineers' lead to 21-17 on a 42-yard Chris Koeplin field goal with 8:46 to go, Appalachian State head coach Jerry Moore told quarterbacks coach Scott Satterfield, "We've got to run eight minutes off that clock." Satterfield replied, "We've got to score." Moore agreed. "I didn't say don't score. But we need to run some time off the clock." Richardson, who ran 11 times for 48 of Appalachian's 80 yards on the drive, made sure the Apps accomplished both goals. In all, thanks to Richardson's running and a key third-down completion from Edwards to fellow freshman Josh Johnson, Appalachian ran 6:46 off the clock on the victory-sealing drive, which culminated with Richardson's fourth touchdown of the evening. The two-yard drive was also Richardson's 30th TD of the season, setting a new NCAA Division I FCS single-season record. Following Richardson's score, UMass' last-ditch effort was thwarted when Corey Lynch picked off a Liam Coen pass with 42 seconds to play.

Delaware appeared to grab its first momentum of the evening when future first-round draft pick Joe Flacco tossed a 39-yard touchdown to Mark Duncan with 1:10 remaining before halftime, seemingly cutting Appalachian's lead to two touchdowns heading into the locker room. However, just 26 seconds later, the Mountaineers took the momentum back for good when Edwards found Dexter Jackson for a 72-yard touchdown that extended the Appalachian advantage back to 21 points. Delaware would get no closer the rest of the evening.

Unlike its first two trips to Chattanooga for the national championship game, Appalachian State wasted no time in getting on the board in the 2007 title tilt, as it forced Delaware to punt after a three-and-out on the opening possession then promptly marched 58 yards in just six plays to take a 7-0 lead. Buoyed by spectacular downfield blocking from his offensive lineman, Richardson took a screen pass from Armanti Edwards and needed to beat just one UD defender at the goal line.

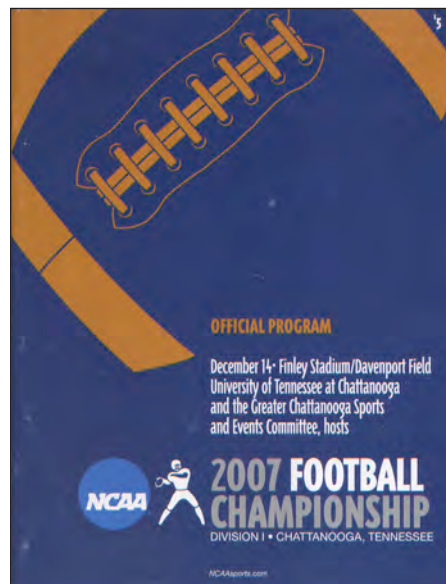

In his last collegiate game, Richardson came up huge once again on FCS football's biggest stage, finishing with 145 total yards (118 rushing, 27 receiving) and three of Appalachian's nine touchdowns but the most memorable play of the evening was undoubtedly the touchdown run by Elder, who was Appalachian's starter behind center in the 2005 title-game victory over Northern Iowa but is best known for the selfishness that he displayed in backing up a pair of all-America signal-callers in Richie Williams and Armanti Edwards during his four years in the Black and Gold.

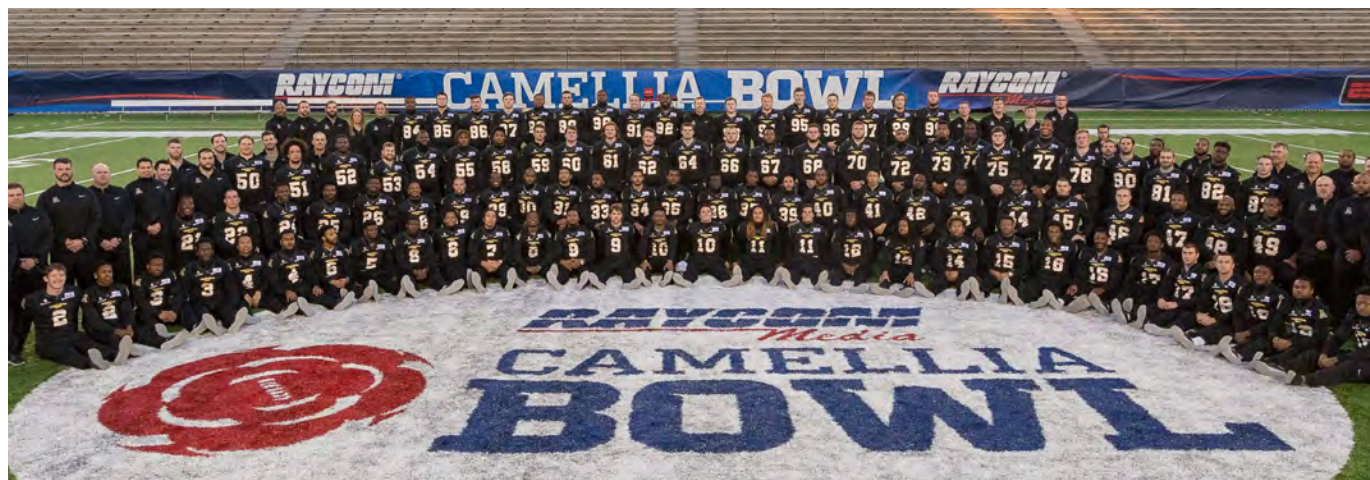

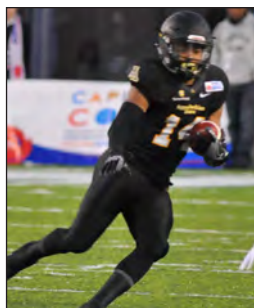

However, the tide turned in the final 91 seconds of the half. On the first offensive play after Ohio's field goal, OU linebacker Quentin Poling picked off Lamb and returned the interception 20 yards for a touchdown to give the Bobcats a 10-7 lead. Things went from bad to worse five plays later when Lamb mishandled a snap and it was recovered by OU's Tony Porter at the App State 23 yard line. Two plays after the miscue, Ohio running back A.J. Ouellette rumbled in from seven yards out and, in the span of just 1:11, the Mountaineers' 7-0 lead had turned into a 17-7 halftime deficit.

Appalachian State's comeback began in earnest late in the third quarter when it started what would turn out to be an 11-play, 97-yard touchdown drive. The series was aided by an unnecessary roughness penalty on Ohio defensive back Toran Davis, who clocked wideout Dante Jones several steps after Jones was overthrown by Lamb on a third-and-seven play from the App State 44 yard line. Six plays later, Lamb found junior tight end Barrett Burns for a 17-yard touchdown pass that cut the deficit to 24-14.

The monstrous comeback seemed unlikely when the Mountaineers entered the final period facing a 17-point deficit but they quickly turned the tables, scoring three touchdowns in a 1:56 span and taking a 28-24 advantage barely three minutes into the quarter. After App State's three-touchdown flurry, it was Ohio's turn to rally, which it did with a safety and a 21-yard field goal to retake a 29-28 lead with 1:47 to go. However, sophomore quarterback Taylor Lamb calmly led the Mountaineers on a nine-play, 73-yard drive over the final 107 seconds that culminated with Matics' 23-yard game-winner. Lamb accounted for 51 of the 73 yards on the game-winning drive, including a 32-yard run that moved Appalachian from its own 41 yard line all the way to the OU 27 with a minute left on the clock. The victory set a new record for victories by a team in its first season as a full-fledged member of NCAA Division I FBS (previously Division I-AA) after transitioning from Division I FCS (previously I-AA) and the first team to win a bowl game in its initial season as a full-fledged FBS squad.

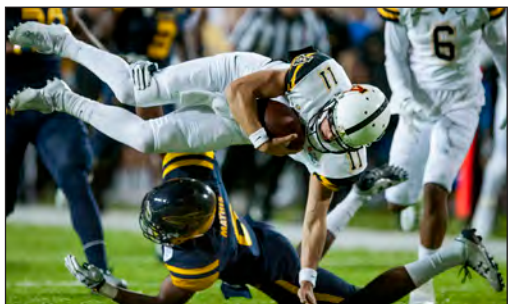

Cox was 2 yards shy of posting his fourth straight 1,000-yard season when he sealed the outcome with a 10-yard gain on the first play of the final series.

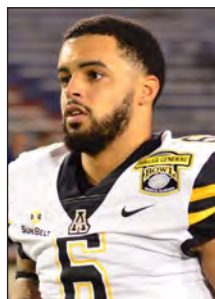

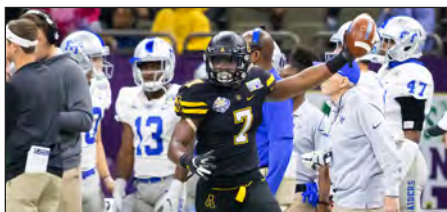

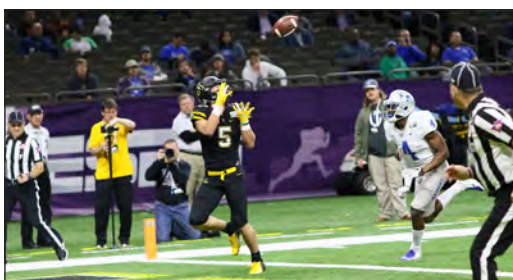
Middle Tennessee, which missed a 47-yard field goal to cap the game-opening series, followed a quick interception on App State's first series with a 24-yard field goal.

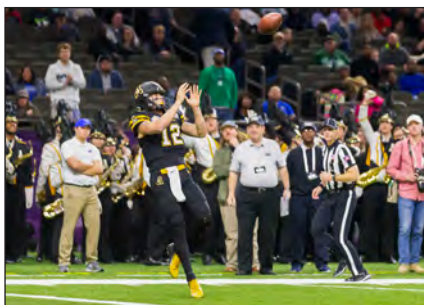

Hampton knocked the ball loose on a sack of Tyler Johnston III, prompting Cobb to scoop up the loose ball and run 24 yards for a tiebreaking defensive touchdown.

It was App State's sixth defensive touchdown of the season.

The Mountaineers forced a three-and-out punt and moved ahead 31-17 with a nine-play, 85-yard touchdown drive.

Facing a fourth-and-3, Thomas rolled right and threw a 27-yard touchdown pass to Hennigan, who again wrestled the ball away from the UAB defender in the end zone.

There were no points the rest of the way, and App State could begin celebrating when cornerback Shaun Jolly forced and recovered a fumble in the last two minutes.

NO. 23 JOHN SETTLE

On Nov. 22, 1986, before his last regular-season game at Kidd Brewer Stadium, the legendary John Settle became the first Appalachian State football player to have his jersey (No. 23) retired.

Settle's career established him as Appalachian's all-time leader in almost every rushing category. Settle displayed courage every step of the way. His pride and respect for the game set the standard of excellence by which all Mountaineer athletes, past, present and future, strive to perpetuate.

From 1983 through 1986, Settle graced the Appalachian backfield with steadfast courage and determination. He finished his career as the school's all-time leading rusher with 4,409 yards and 43 touchdowns. He presently holds 24 Appalachian records. At the time of his departure from Boone, he was the third-ranked rusher in NCAA Division I-AA football history.

Settle, a criminal justice major while at Appalachian State, was named the Southern Conference Player and Male Athlete of the Year as a senior, after rushing for 1,661 yards and 20 touchdowns. One of the highlights of his season was his five-touchdown day in the Homecoming victory over Davidson on Nov. 4, 1986.

The two-time All-American had a knack for rising to the occasion in the most important games. In Appalachian's first NCAA I-AA Playoff game in school history, on Nov. 29, 1986, Settle dazzled the crowd with 236 yards on 37 carries and a touchdown in the 28-26 defeat to Nicholls State.

His excellence continued at the professional level with the Atlanta Falcons. In 1988, Settle became the first rookie free agent in NFL history to gain over 1,000 yards in a season. During that year, he gained 1,594 total yards (1,024 rushing and 570 receiving) and was voted to the Pro Bowl, the all-star game of the NFL, in Honolulu, Hawaii. His fabled playing days came to a close with the Washington Redskins. He was rewarded for his hard work with a 1991 Super Bowl championship ring with the Redskins.

Settle's career continued to evolve as his playing days paved the way for a future in coaching. He began his coaching career by assisting with running backs at Appalachian in 1994. From 1995-1998, Settle served as an offensive assistant for the Cleveland Browns and later the Baltimore Ravens. His duties in the NFL involved coordinating the game plan and working with the running backs, special teams, and strength and conditioning. His experienced football mind was also used in the evaluation of personnel.

In 1998, Settle returned to the college game as the running backs coach at Fresno

State. After eight seasons at FSU, he spent five seasons in the same position at the University of Wisconsin. In 2011, he returned to the NFL, spending two seasons as the Carolina Panthers' running backs coach (2011-12) and one with the Cleveland Browns (2013). He is back in the college ranks as the running backs coach at Wisconsin.

Of his time in Boone, Settle says: "Appalachian helped lay the foundation for who and what I am today. As time moves on, I appreciate the days I spent in Boone more and more. The people, the fans, the University and the family environment that surrounds the community are something that I have not encountered since my days in Boone. I hope that someday I will have the opportunity to give back to a place that has given so much to me."

NO. 32 DEXTER COAKLEY

Perhaps the most decorated player in the illustrious history of Appalachian State University football, Appalachian retired Dexter Coakley's No. 32 jersey on April 19, 2005.

From 1993-96, Coakley set or tied six school records, earned a slew of personal accolades and helped lead Appalachian State to 32 victories and two NCAA Division I-AA playoff appearances.

The Mt. Pleasant, S.C. native made an immediate impact on Appalachian's squad and led the Mountaineers with 141 total tackles as a freshman in 1993, en route to Southern Conference Freshman of the Year honors.

Things only got better for the hard-hitting linebacker, both individually and for the Mountaineers. In 1994, he racked up 155 tackles to earn the first of three SoCon Defensive Player of the Year awards. Perhaps more importantly, he helped lead Appalachian back to the I-AA playoffs after a one-year hiatus and a first-round, overtime victory over No. 7 New Hampshire before falling at second-ranked Boise State in the national quarterfinals.

As a junior, Coakley led his squad to a perfect 11-0 regular season, becoming just the ninth team in 30 years to claim the SoCon crown with an undefeated, untied league record (8-0). For the second-straight season, Coakley hauled in SoCon Defensive Player of the Year and first-team All-America accolades after racking up 150 tackles. He also earned the inaugural Buck Buchanan Award, given to the top defensive player in I-AA.

Coakley capped his second-to-none collegiate career in 1996 by leading Appalachian in tackles for the third time with 166. He earned SoCon Defensive Player of the Year and first-team All-America honors for the third time, while also claiming his second-straight Buck Buchanan Award. He remains the only two-time winner of I-AA football's most prestigious defensive honor and the only Mountaineer to garner All-America status for three years.

Coakley remains Appalachian State's all-time career leader in total tackles (616), solo tackles (350), assisted tackles (266), double-figure tackle games (38) and 20-tackle games (seven). He is tied for the school mark with two-consecutive 20-tackle games, a feat he achieved twice, versus Georgia Southern and Marshall in 1995 and against East Tennessee State and Furman in '96.

Following the end of his career in the High Country, Coakley became the second-highest drafted player in Appalachian history when the Dallas Cowboys selected him in the third round (65th overall pick) of the 1997 NFL Draft.

His impact in the NFL was as immediate as his impact at Appalachian, as he started all 16 games for the Cowboys as a rookie in '97. In 127 games as a pro, he has registered 687 tackles, 10 interceptions, seven sacks and four forced fumbles and has missed only one game in eight seasons due to injury. He earned Pro Bowl appearances in 1999, 2001 and '03.

After spending the first eight years of his professional career in Dallas, Coakley spent the 2005 and '06 seasons with the St. Louis Rams. He retired from the NFL in 2007.

In recognition of his outstanding collegiate career, Coakley was inducted into the Southern Conference Hall of Fame on May 24, 2011 and became the first Mountaineer inducted in the College Football Hall of Fame on July 16, 2011. He was inducted into the S.C. Athletic Hall of Fame in 2019.

An active member of the community, Coakley received the Cowboys Unsung Hero Award in 2002, as selected by his teammates and fans. He has been involved with many charitable programs throughout and following his professional football career, including the Salvation Army, the Children's Cancer Fund Fashion Show, Dallas Cowboys Courage House, and Let Us Play! Sports Camp for Girls. Coakley and his wife, Nicole, have a daughter, Trinity, and a son, Zahn.

NO. 38 DINO HACKETT

Appalachian State University football retired its third jersey, Dino Hackett's No. 38, during homecoming festivities on Oct. 29, 2005.

"I've had a lot of honors in the NFL and college and I can honestly say having my number retired at Appalachian is the greatest honor I've ever received," Hackett said.

A member of Appalachian's 75th Anniversary Team, Hackett starred as a linebacker at Appalachian State from 1982-85. He holds eight school records, including most solo (106), assisted (94) and total tackles (200) in a season, which he accomplished in 1985 en route to first-team All-America accolades. His 27 total tackles against East Tennessee State on Nov. 23, 1985 are still tops in Appalachian's single-game annals, as are his 18 solo stops versus Furman on Oct. 26, 1985. In addition to the All-America recognition as a senior, Hackett was also an All-Southern Conference honoree in both 1984 and '85.

Following his standout collegiate career, Hackett was selected in the second round (35th overall) of the 1986 National Football League Draft by the Kansas City Chiefs, the second highest that a Mountaineer has ever been drafted by an NFL team. He went on to enjoy a successful seven-year professional career, spending six seasons with the Chiefs and one with the Seattle Seahawks. One of only seven Chiefs to ever start all 16 games as a rookie, Hackett's 140 tackles in 1986 are the second-most by a rookie in team history. He went on to earn a spot in the Pro Bowl following the 1988 season, in which he was part of K.C.'s top-rated pass defense. His 16 tackles versus the Seahawks on Sept. 20, 1987 are still a Kansas City record.

Since retiring from the NFL following the 1993 season, Hackett has returned to the Triad, where he and his brother, Joey, own and operate Hackett Properties, a real estate development company.

A graduate of Southern Guilford H.S. in Greensboro, Hackett resides in Pleasant Garden, N.C., with his wife, Cindy, daughter, Dustin Marie, and son, Jax. The family raises quarterhorses on their farm. "Honoring Dino was a highlight of my first year at Appalachian. To me, personally, Dino Hackett is what Mountaineer football is all about," Appalachian State athletics director Charlie Cobb said. "Along with being one of the best football players in App State history, Dino is someone who embodies the spirit of Appalachian and is a terrific ambassador for both the University and the athletics department. He is truly deserving of the honor."

NO. 71 LARRY HAND

Appalachian State University retired the No. 71 jersey worn by all-American and NFL standout Larry Hand as part of homecoming festivities on Sept. 30, 2006.

Hand was a two-time all-American and three-time all-Carolinas Conference honoree as a tackle at Appalachian from 1960-64. Hand was far from a top prospect coming out of Butler H.S. in Butler, N.J. In fact, he worked as a mason for two years before Appalachian head coach Jim Duncan brought him to Boone, despite the fact that the 6-4, 225-pounder only played junior varsity high school football. However, after missing his freshman season due to injury, Hand made an immediate impact on the Mountaineers and put together the first of three-straight all-conference campaigns in 1962.

In '63, he garnered all-America accolades for the first time, earning second-team NAIA honors. His breakout performance came in a 20-6 win over Lenoir-Rhyne, in which he led a Mountaineer defense that forced five fumbles and held the Bears to minus-22 yards rushing.

Following Appalachian's first victory over LRC in nine years, Duncan called Hand "the best pro line prospect to come out of the Carolinas Conference." Professional teams agreed, as Hand was drafted as a future selection by both the Detroit Lions (10th round — NFL) and New York Jets (21st round — AFL) prior to his senior season in 1964 (future selections could be used on players that had a year of college eligibility remaining but their class had graduated).

In '64, Hand showed why the professional teams jumped at the chance to draft him in the offseason, as he put together a monster season that culminated in first-team NAIA all-America plaudits and second-team recognition by the Associated Press. He was also awarded the 1964 Kirkland Blocking Award, established in 1957 by Catawba College in memory of Gordon A. Kirkland.

He signed with the Lions in 1965 and went on to play 13 seasons in Detroit. His 13 years of service are tied for the fourth-most in Lions history and his 164 games played are tied for the 11th-highest total in franchise history.

In his 13 professional seasons, Hand registered five interceptions as a defensive lineman, returning three for touchdowns. He was the Lions' defensive MVP in 1972 and is still tied for second in Lions history with two INT returns for touchdowns in 1967. Defensive statistics such as tackles, tackles for loss and sacks were not kept by the Lions until 1973 (and didn't become an official NFL statistic in 1983). However, it is known that he led Detroit in sacks in two of the five seasons that he played when those records were kept, with 11 in 1973 and seven in 1975 (both 14-game seasons).

As Appalachian State football departed Johnson City, Tenn., on Sept. 30, 2000, the most shocking thing to happen that night had been Joe Burchette's evolution from third-string quarterback to starter in a 30-13 win at East Tennessee State. As October began a couple of hours later, however, who took the bulk of snaps from center was the farthest thing from any Mountaineer's mind.

As Appalachian State's buses rounded a corner on Route 105 in Foscoe, N.C., six miles from Appalachian's Boone, N.C. campus, around 12:30 in the morning, they came upon a fiery accident that appeared to involve a van and a car. Not long after the buses came to a stop, someone on the lead bus recognized the van as the one transporting the football team's student trainers, managers and videographers.

Shouts of, "That's our van!" were followed quickly by the buses' occupants scrambling to get to the van. The first three people out of the bus were offensive coaches Stacy Searels, Rob Best and Shawn Elliott.

"The car was engulfed in flames," said Best, "and our biggest concern was that it might spread to the van."

According to the North Carolina Highway Patrol, a 1989 Audi station wagon driven by John V. White, III crossed the center line going about 60 miles per hour in a 35 mph zone and hit the 2000 Dodge Ram van head on. The car immediately burst into flames and White is believed to have died instantly.

Head coach Jerry Moore attempted to help the driver of the car, but "there was nothing anyone could do. The whole car was just a mass of flames and he was pinned in there."

As Searels, Best and Elliott reached the van, they found that two of the 13 passengers were still in the van: assistant athletic trainer Tony Barnett, the driver of the van, and Searels' student assistant coach, Jonathan Taylor. Searels ripped open the mangled door to the van and pulled Taylor out. Barnett was trapped by a tangled seat belt and an inflated air bag.

"Tony was pinned in the seat," said Best. "Stacy dragged Jonathan out and Shawn and I both grabbed the driver's seat and yanked it back to try and get Tony free. Stacy came back and helped us get him out."

"Stacy got in there and all but ripped the whole seat out of that van," added Moore. "Fire was everywhere but he had Tony in his arms and was getting him back toward the buses."

The 13 passengers were now out of the van, but in varying stages of injury, pain and shock. Many were still dangerously close to the burning wreck.

"When we first ran up, there were people just kind of lying on the ground," said sophomore wide receiver Joe Hamilton. "We grabbed a couple of the people and moved them away from the scene."

Jake Stroot, team video coordinator and Appalachian Sports Network sideline reporter, had managed to get out of the van but could get no further.

"I got out of the van and I couldn't walk," said Stroot. "(Neil Cornatzer, Aaron Dobbins and Daniel Jeremiah) carried me like 50 yards away."

"About four to six minutes after we got them out," said Best, "the van ignited. (The fire) spread pretty fast."

Best called the scene "unbelievable" as head athletic trainer Andy Massey examined the injured and the players attended to them.

"It was a complete role reversal," said Best. "The players had the kids who were in the van wrapped up in blankets and were applying pressure to stop bleeding wounds. The response and composure a lot of those guys showed was just amazing."

"They worked on me for six years now to try and keep me on the field," said senior wide receiver Joey Gibson, who missed the 1999 season with a knee injury. "It was kind of a flip to see us working on them."

"Everybody who was out there helping, being nothing but 10 or 15 yards away from that van, was at a risk," said Moore. "They ought to hang a medal around everyone's neck."

"That was hero stuff going on," said defensive coordinator John Wiley.

When EMS services arrived minutes later, many of the injured were prepared to be loaded onto ambulances. Barnett and Taylor were the first to be transported out. Taylor was taken to Cannon Memorial Hospital and life-flighted to Johnson City (Tenn.) Memorial Hospital, while Barnett was admitted at Watauga Medical Center.

Of the other 11 passengers, five were taken to WMC and five to CMH. Only the frontseat passenger was spared a hospital visit, due to a seatbelt and air bag. Most of the injuries consisted of broken bones and cuts. In all, only seven stayed the night in the hospital and after 10 days only Taylor remained hospitalized in serious but stable condition with a severe concussion and some broken bones.

After the injured were taken away, the team buses were allowed through the accident scene and arrived back on campus at about 2 a.m. A quiet 10-minute ride was followed by a team meeting. Before any of the equipment was unloaded, the players and coaches gathered in the Mountaineer Room in Owens Field House and prayed. Some prayed silently while others verbalized their hopes and wishes.

However, that early morning meeting is hardly the end of the story. Coaches still needed to coach and players still needed to play and those were not the easiest things to do for awhile. Athletics director Roachel Laney spent every day for the next week at the different hospitals, as did Massey and the coaching staff. Someone from the Appalachian State football team visited Johnson City daily to be with Jonathan and his family.

The staff also learned the nature of their relationship with the rest of the Southern Conference's coaches and teams. East Tennessee State made extra copies of their game films to replace the Appalachian copies lost in the accident. Also, the ETSU branch of Fellowship of Christian Athletes met Taylor's mother and held prayer meetings at Johnson City Memorial every night.

On top of all this, the team had to prepare to face sixth-ranked and SoCon rival Furman the next Saturday on regional television and deal with the attention from media.

"I hear about a different hero every day," said Moore after listening to different people's stories. "We're grateful and fortunate that we didn't lose anyone. But one life was lost and our hearts and prayers are with that family too."

"Everyone had their own heroes," said Stroot. "Everyone had two or three guys helping them out. It's really a big family. You realize how much everyone cares for you."

The emotional week was capped by an 18-17, come-from-behind win over the Paladins. As the final seconds ticked off the clock, Searels searched for a cell phone on the field. Finding one, he dialed the number for Taylor's room in Johnson City. After getting Jonathan on the phone Searels proclaimed, "We won, Jonathan. We did it. We did it for you."

"I'll never be prouder of a program, no matter what happens on the field," said Moore, long before the Furman contest. "They've learned a lot about priorities and how fragile life and health can be. They've showed me they have qualities that will serve them well a long time after they don't play football games anymore."

For their actions that night, Searels, Best and Elliott were presented with the NCAA Award of Valor. The award is presented only in years when there is a worthy candidate or candidates. It recognizes a current intercollegiate athletics coach or administrator, or a current or former varsity letterwinner at an NCAA institution, who, when confronted with a situation involving personal danger, averted or minimized potential disaster by courageous action or noteworthy bravery. In all, the NCAA Award of Valor has only been presented 15 times since its inception in 1974.

Best, who left Appalachian State after the 2002 season to be the offensive coordinator at the University at Buffalo, retired in November 2016 as head coach at Pilot Point High School in suburban Dallas, Texas. Elliott and Searels both serve as college football coaches — Elliott as head coach at Georgia State and Searels as offensive line coach at North Carolina

BRIAN STOKES

Many events on the gridiron during Appalachian State's run to consecutive NCAA Division I national championships in 2005 and '06 were described as heroic. However, Appalachian benefitted from the presence of a true hero on the field and in the locker room during the championship campaigns.

Brian Stokes came to Appalachian in 2005 as a 26-year-old freshman. Prior to his arrival in the High Country, Stokes spent five years in the United States Marine Corps, serving deployments to over 10 countries during his military career, including two tours of duty in Iraq.

During Stokes' second tour in Iraq in 2004, the former all-state linebacker and fullback at Williams H.S. in Burlington, N.C. served in over 200 combat missions, including the invasion of Fallujah. A sergeant in the 2nd Battalion, 2nd Marines, Stokes was the commanding officer in a humvee near Lutayfiah in August 2004 when his convoy was the target of two 200-kilogram roadside bombs, which blew the 300-pound doors off Stokes' humvee when detonated within yards of the armored vehicle. Everyone in the vehicle survived, but Stokes suffered shrapnel wounds in his right arm and lost the majority of hearing in his right ear.

Following his release from active duty, Stokes and fellow Marine Wayne Norman enrolled at Appalachian, where head coach Jerry Moore welcomed the heroes with open arms. Both were on the field for the opening kickoff in the 2005 home opener versus Coastal Carolina. Stokes was a regular contributor on special teams and played an important role in the Mountaineers winning their first-ever national title.

Little did Stokes know that just one week prior to the 21-16 victory over Northern Iowa in the 2005 NCAA Division I-AA national championship game, he was awarded a Purple Heart for the injuries he sustained in the roadside bomb attack 16 months earlier. He wasn't aware of the recognition until the Purple Heart arrived in the mail in February 2006.

Due to injury-riddled stints as a member of the football programs at East Carolina and Elon following Stokes' standout high-school career, the former Shrine Bowl participant was granted just two years of eligibility at Appalachian by the NCAA. He returned for his final gridiron campaign in 2006 and again was a key special-teams performer for Appalachian's second-straight national title march.

Stokes finished his career with eight tackles in 29 games and capped his football-playing days with an appearance in the Texas vs. The Nation All-Star Classic in El Paso, Texas.

His story has been told in dozens of newspapers and on television programs across the region and nation, highlighted by an appearance on CBS' *Late, Late Show with Craig Ferguson* in 2005. He graduated from Appalachian State with a degree in criminal justice in 2008. A book and movie chronicling Stokes' journey are in production stages.

Stokes is one of three Iraqi War veterans to go on to play for the Mountaineers. Norman suited up for App State for its first national championship campaign in 2005 and Chris Aiken, a five-year U.S. Army military police veteran who did two tours of duty in Iraq, played defensive tackle for the Mountaineers in 2010 and 2011.



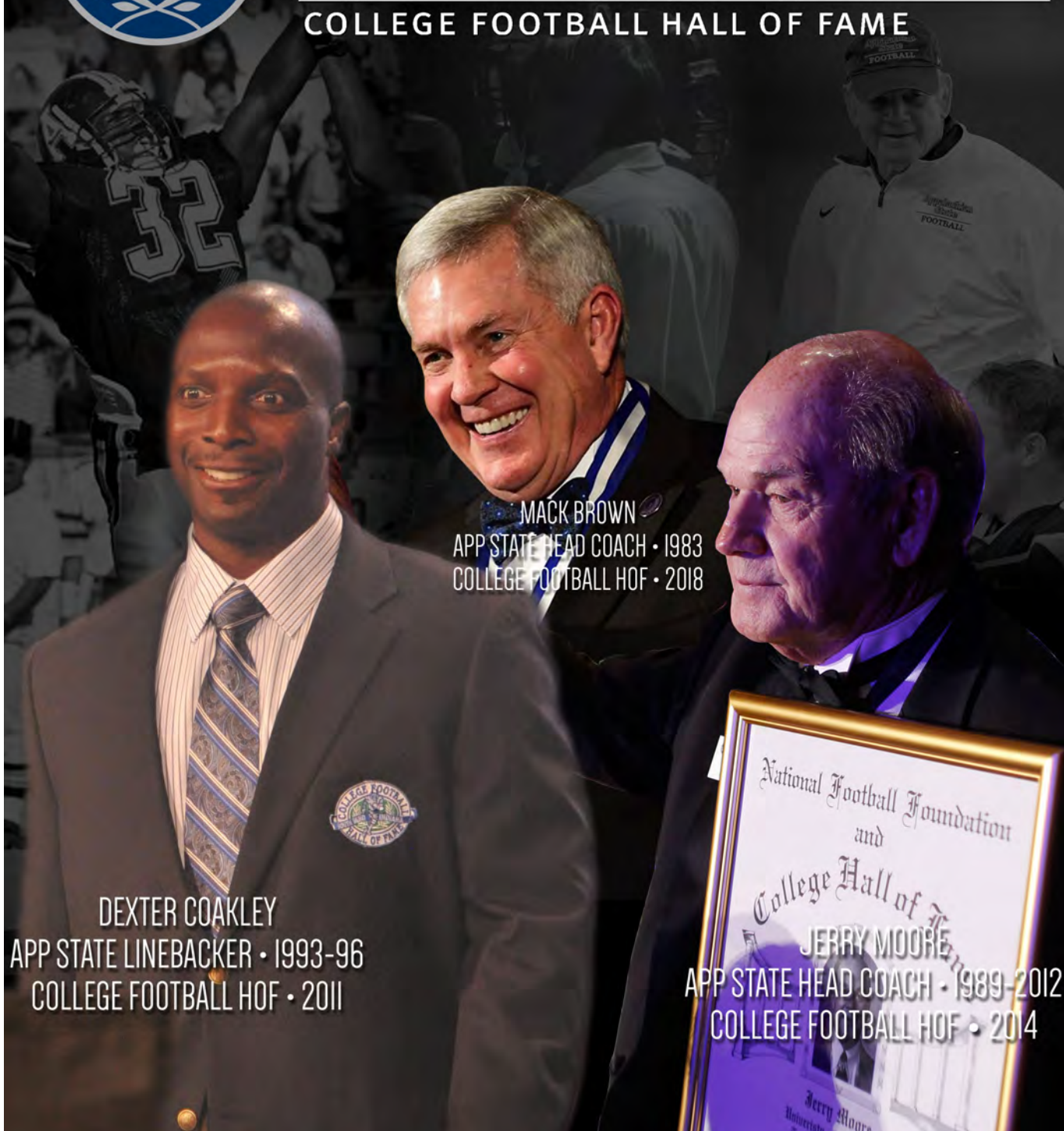

SEPTEMBER 9, 1972 APPS BREAK UP PAT ATTEMPT TO SAVE WIN APP STATE 7, WESTERN KENTUCKY 6

Registering three interceptions, four fumble recoveries, and a blocked punt, App State's stellar defense came up with the winning plays all afternoon in a defensive battle.

Midway through the third quarter, quarterback Steve Loflin hit Boone's hometown hero Richard Agle for a 78-yard pass and catch for their only touchdown of the day.

Managing a shutout late in the fourth quarter, the Apps gave up a touchdown on Clarence Jackson's one-yard plunge with 1:52 left in the contest to lead by one, at 7-6.

The Hilltoppers decided to go for two and the win, which proved costly when the Mountaineer defense broke up the extra point pass attempt in the endzone to save the victory.

OCTOBER 20, 1973 BRAKEFIELD TAKES DOWN OLD TEAM APP STATE 28, WOFFORD 21

Backup quarterback Phil Cocciolletti not only replaced injured Roscoe Batts in the third quarter, but took over the Mountaineers' run-oriented "Y Offense" and converted it to a passing attack.

Down 21-7 late in the third quarter, Cocciolletti connected with split end Bob Steelman for a 35-yard touchdown.

On Cocciolletti's second drive, he stunned the Terrier offense with another long ball connecting with Charlie Haugabrook for a 36-yard strike. He finished the drive with a one-yard dive into the endzone.

Late in the fourth quarter, Cocciolletti drove App State deep in Wofford territory before Jim Tucker's 6-yard scamper for the go-ahead TD. The Mountaineers' balanced offense recorded 191 yards in the air and 190 on the ground.

Place kicker Greg Clark was 4-for-4 on extra point tries. Clark went on to establish an NCAA record with 56 consecutive good PAT kicks.

OCTOBER 19, 1974 HARMON TAMES WILD DOGS WITH 47-YARDER APP STATE 23, EAST CAROLINA 21

In a game that both teams entered undefeated, placekicker Jerry Harmon proved to be the difference, converting a 47-yard field goal with 32 seconds left for the 23-21 victory over East Carolina.

Sophomore Devon Ford worked his way through ECU's touted "Wild Dogs" defense, amassing 231 all-purpose yards.

App State carried a 20-0 advantage into the locker room. The Pirates quickly countered in the third quarter behind Ken Strayhorn who rushed for two touchdowns bringing the deficit down to six points, at 20-14.

ECU claimed the lead, at 21-20, midway through the fourth quarter when halfback Jimmy Howe scored on a 65-yard run.

Late in the game, the Mountaineers took advantage of a short Pirate punt that gave them the ball on their own 45. The Apps used a pair of passes to set the stage for Harmon's long field goal.

SEPTEMBER 20, 1975 DAVIS REDEEMS HIMSELF WITH LAST-SECOND, GAME-WINNING FIELD GOAL AT WFU APP STATE 19, WAKE FOREST 17

Separated by less than 100 miles, App State and Wake Forest did not meet on the gridiron for the first time until 1975. However, the wait proved to be worthwhile for the Mountaineers, who scored a program-defining 19-17 win over the Atlantic Coast Conference's Demon Deacons.

Highlighted by strong defensive performances by both squads, the contest was tied at 10-10 at halftime and remained knotted until Appalachian quarterback Robbie Price's 32-yard touchdown run with 32 seconds left in the third quarter. However, Gary Davis missed the ensuing extra-point attempt and the Mountaineers led just 16-10.

The Apps' perilous six-point lead held up until a fumble deep in their own territory late in the fourth quarter. Appalachian's second turnover of the game set up a 15-yard touchdown drive that gave the Demon Deacons a 17-16 advantage with 4:20 to go in the ballgame.

The resilient Mountaineers responded by marching 61 yards in 11 plays and Davis made up for his missed PAT by splitting the uprights from 26 yards out with five seconds remaining to seal the 19-17 triumph.

NOVEMBER 8, 1975 PRICE IS RIGHT IN TRIUMPH AT USC APP STATE 39, SOUTH CAROLINA 34

Robbie Price put on an offensive show before 47,489 fans on hand at Williams-Brice Stadium, who saw seven scoring drives over 70 yards, four of which went longer than 80 yards in a 39-34 triumph over South Carolina.

After South Carolina scooped up a Price fumble and returned it for the first points of the day, App State got on the board with a 77-yard drive that was capped off by a John Craig score.

The touchdown was especially sweet for Craig who began his career with the Gamecocks two years earlier.

Appalachian led at the half, 24-14, but South Carolina came out quick in the third quarter, and reduced the Appalachian lead to four when Jeff Grantz scored from two yards out.

Price answered with a 32-yard touchdown pass. However, South Carolina scored late in the third quarter to make it 30-27.

The Gamecocks drove 81 yards take the lead, 34-30. However, the Mountaineers responded with a 16-yard touchdown pass from Price to a diving Donnie Holt.

Mike Staton sealed the win with an interception that led to a Mountaineer field goal to make the final score 39-34.

SEPTEMBER 24, 1979 MOUNTAINEERS PREVAIL BEHIND SURPRISE WISHBONE ATTACK APP STATE 35, WESTERN CAROLINA 27

Touted as an aerial display, quarterbacks Mike Pussey (Western Carolina) and Steve Brown (App State) drew 17,124 fans to Conrad Stadium for what was billed to be a passing thriller. The Mountaineers used an element of surprise by utilizing the rushing game in a 35-27 win.

Pussey connected on 16 passes for 231 yards and a touchdown, while Brown only put the ball in the air 13 times.

Trailing 27-14 at halftime, it was the newly constructed wishbone formation that sparked a rally. The Mountaineers totaled 266 rushing yards in the victory.

The Mountaineer defense allowed just 37 yards through the air and two first downs in the second half.

NOVEMBER 1, 1980 ROOKIE CARRIES APPS TO VICTORY APP STATE 27, WESTERN CAROLINA 24

With 15,850 fans on hand to witness the tandem of Steve Brown and Rick Beasley play in their final game at Conrad Stadium, it was freshman Alvin Parker who stole the show in a 27-24 come from behind win.

Beasley, who finished his career as the NCAA's fifth all-time leading receiver, went down in the first-quarter with an injury. Minus his top target, Brown was limited to 166 yards through the air.

Fullback Pete Carmelo went down in the second half, so it was the 5-11, 185-pound Parker who got the call and became the first 100-yard rusher of the season for App State.



John Craig (35), a transfer from South Carolina, scored Appalachian State's first touchdown and Robbie Price (5) threw for two touchdowns and ran for another in the Mountaineers' 39-34 win at Williams-Brice Stadium in 1975.

Down 24-20 in the fourth quarter Appalachian drove 92 yards for the victory, which included 47 yards on the ground from Parker.

Parker's former Maury High School teammate Derek Jenkins scored the game-winning touchdown. Jenkins finished the day with five carries for 58 yards while Parker ran 15 times for 106 yards.

SEPTEMBER 3, 1983 BROWN RECORDS WIN NO. 1 AT WAKE FOREST APP STATE 27, WAKE FOREST 25

Making his head coaching debut on Fireworks Night at Groves Stadium, Mack Brown orchestrated a fireworks display of his own in an upset win over Wake Forest, 27-25.

Kicker Billy Van Aman notched his first collegiate field goal when he split the uprights from 54 yards out. Van Aman also kicked a 29-yarder late in the third quarter to put App State up 20-17.

The game looked one-sided on paper as Wake doubled up Appalachian in total offensive yards (502-247). However, the Appalachian defense recovered five Wake fumbles. Linebacker Joel Carter registered a pair of touchdowns on two interceptions, including a 48-yard scramble to the end zone on his first pick.

Wake completed a 39-yard touchdown and converted a two-point conversion with 1:39 left, but would not get any closer as Appalachian ran the clock for the two-point win.

SEPTEMBER 8, 1984 4TH-AND-99 NO PROBLEM IN SPARKY'S FIRST W APP STATE 17, WESTERN KENTUCKY 16

Head Coach Sparky Woods received his first win with an amazing 99-yard, 12-play drive resulting in a 15-yard John Settle touchdown reception with five seconds remaining for the 17-16 victory.

Trailing 16-3 late in the fourth quarter, App State's Jimmy Armstrong intercepted a pass and returned it to the WKU 15 yard line. With 4:08 left, Mountaineer quarterback Randy Joyce connected for the first of two fourth quarter touchdown passes.

On the Mountaineers' final drive, Joyce converted a crucial fourth and 10 situation by completing an 18-yard pass to Troy Douglas. He followed with a 17-yard strike to Douglas.

Joyce rallied the Mountaineers by completing passes of 12, 17, and 19 yards before finishing the drive by connecting with Settle on a 15-yard screen pass in the waning moments.

NOVEMBER 29, 1986 APP STATE FALLS IN FIRST PLAYOFF APPEARANCE NICHOLLS STATE 28, APP STATE 26

App State rallied behind the arm of Todd Payton and the running abilities of John Settle to bring a 25-13 deficit to within two, at 28-26, but the Mountaineers' season came to a close when Bjorn Nittmo's 42-yard field goal sailed wide left with 18 seconds left in the fourth quarter.

Settle rushed for 236 yards on 37 carries, while Payton completed 18-of-35 pass attempts for 294 yards and two touchdowns in the losing effort.

Heading into the I-AA Playoffs, the Mountaineers were seeded No. 6. They held a 13-6 advantage with 11 minutes left in the third quarter, however Nicholls State quarterback Doug Hudson rallied his team and scored on three of their next four possessions to edge the Mountaineers.

SEPTEMBER 9, 1989 MELCHOR LEADS APP STATE TO VICTORY AT WFU APP STATE 15, WAKE FOREST 10

Facing standout receiver Ricky Proehl and a crowd of 30,200 fans at Wake Forest, first-year head coach Jerry Moore and App State pulled off a 15-10 victory.

Knotted at 3-3 at the intermission, running back Ritchie Melchor recorded 121 of his 139 yards on the ground in the second half, which included a 67-yard touchdown run.

On the ensuing Wake Forest possession, Proehl took a short pass and danced 28 yards for the touchdown. With the pressure on late in the fourth quarter, freshman Harold Alexander boomed a punt to Proehl, who fielded the ball cleanly, but could not manage to get out of bounds before time expired.

AUGUST 31, 1991 ALEXANDER KEYS WIN AT MARSHALL APP STATE 9, MARSHALL 3

It was a tale of two great defenses that led App State to a 9-3 victory in the season opener.

Harold Alexander kept the Herd at bay throughout the game. He set a Southern Conference-record by averaging 55.5 yards on eight punts.

Alexander came up big by booting a 67-yarder and a 51-yarder out of his own end zone against a 10-man rush.

Appalachian's defense started the scoring in the first half when Marshall quarterback Michael Payton was pressured into an intentional grounding call that resulted in a safety. The Herd managed a field goal after a fumble recovery that gave them the ball deep into Mountaineer territory.

Fullback J.K. Reaves plowed two yards through the middle of the Herd defensive line to record the only touchdown of the day.

OCTOBER 19, 1991 APPS TOP FURMAN IN SOCON'S FIRST OT TILT APP STATE 26, FURMAN 23

It took three overtimes and four Jay Millson field goals, but when it was decided, App State topped Furman, 26-23, in the first overtime game in Southern Conference history.

The first half was marred by mistakes, and Furman led 17-9.

Late in the fourth quarter, linebacker Brent David forced a fumble and put the Mountaineers on the Paladin 17. After Nate Abraham ran for the quick score, D.J. Campbell connected with A.J. Ellis for the two-point conversion to tie the score, at 17-17.

Knotted at the end of regulation, Millson and Burr traded field goals in the first two overtimes. In the third extra period, defensive back Steve Wilks blocked a Burr field goal attempt. Millson connected on his fourth field goal of the day to clinch the victory.

OCTOBER 10, 1992 THREE MINUTES, TWO SECONDS AND 20 POINTS APP STATE 27, JAMES MADISON 21

D.J. Campbell completed three touchdown passes in the final 3:02 of the game, including one to Craig Styron, who caught it on his back with no time remaining on the clock for the winning points.

JMU began the scoring with one of the most famous tricks in football lore. Early in the second quarter, the Dukes executed the fumblerooski for a 14-yard touchdown. Bitten by the turnover bug, the Mountaineers fell short of the endzone twice due to turnovers.

With the score 21-7, D.J. Campbell threw the first of three touchdown throws to make it 21-14, with 3:02 to play. Just 32 seconds later, it was tied, at 21-21 on another Campbell TD pass.

With JMU driving deep in App State territory, the Mountaineer defense intercepted a deflected pass, giving Campbell a chance at victory.

After two quick passes to get the ball to midfield, Campbell heaved the ball deep into the endzone, where it found Styron.



All-America punter Harold Alexander was integral in two of Appalachian State's most memorable victories. He sealed a 15-10 win over Wake Forest with a booming punt in the waning seconds and registered a SoCon-record 55.5 yards per punt in the Mountaineers' 9-3 win over Marshall in the 1991 season opener.



OCTOBER 22, 1994 MOUNTAINEERS TOP NO. 1 MARSHALL APP STATE 24, MARSHALL 14

With ominous weather and a matchup against the No. 1 team in the nation, 19,781 rain-soaked fans spurred App State to a 10-point victory and triumphantly tore down the goal posts.

A dominant performance by the Mountaineer defense keyed the win. Dexter Coakley led the Mountaineers with 15 tackles, three for losses, two pass breakups, and a forced fumble.

Johnny Smith, who spent his first three years at fullback, notched seven tackles, a fumble recovery, a sack, and an interception that he returned 70-yards for a touchdown in the fourth quarter.

In only his second start, Scott Satterfield threw for 113 yards and ran for 30 more, including a score.

NOVEMBER 18, 1995 DIVING SNAG SAVES PERFECT SEASON APP STATE 28, THE CITADEL 24

Scott Satterfield proved his mettle as an all-Southern Conference quarterback by ignoring the pressure on fourth down and slinging the ball to the end zone, where Ron Gilliam's diving grab lifted App State to a 28-24 victory and saved the Mountaineers' perfect regular season.

Unbeaten entering the final game of the regular season, the Mountaineers had plenty of confidence travelling to face the winless Bulldogs. But Appalachian needed everything it could muster, including the pass from Satterfield to Gilliam with 1:39 left in the contest for the comeback triumph.

Satterfield who ran for 80 yards and passed for 176, had no problem sending the ball to Gilliam who was a converted defensive back with only four catches on the season.

OCTOBER 19, 1996 BACKUP QB LEADS APPS OVER EAGLES APP STATE 35, GEORGIA SOUTHERN 28

Backup signal-caller Bake Baker was called upon in the fourth quarter at Georgia Southern to create what head coach Jerry Moore dubbed a "spark." A spark is what he got.

With just over 10 minutes left, Baker took over and led the Mountaineers on three touchdown drives, allowing them to rally from a 14-point deficit.

The Mountaineer offense was desperate for production and the defense was not much better, with five players sidelined with injuries. But in his 10-plus minutes of action, Baker converted three scoring drives, capped by a 68-yard pass to Otis Smith with 3:13 left to provide the winning points.

Baker ended the game 8-of-10 passing for 159 yards and two touchdowns. Prior to his showing in Statesboro, he had completed just three passes in his career.

OCTOBER 3, 1998 APP DOWNS WFU IN OT FOR MOORE'S 100TH WIN APP STATE 30, WAKE FOREST 27 (OT)

Daniel Jeremiah's one-yard touchdown run in overtime gave App State head coach Jerry Moore his 100th career victory, a 30-27 triumph over Wake Forest in Winston-Salem.

Moore's 100th win was his fourth over Wake in his 10 seasons.

Appalachian jumped out to a 10-0 lead in the first quarter thanks to a 27-yard field goal by Stuart Jones and a 47-yard touchdown run by Terrence McCall. The Demon Deacons scored 17 of the game's next 20 points to take a 17-13 advantage into the fourth quarter.

After Jones' third field goal of the game cut the Mountaineer deficit to 17-16 early in the final period, Jeremiah hooked up with Joey Gibson for a 57-yard touchdown and a two-point conversion made it 24-17 Appalachian with 5:28 to go. However, Wake Forest responded with a 13-play, 74-yard drive, capped by a seven-yard touchdown pass from Brian Kuklick to Jammie Deese that tied the contest with only 53 seconds left to play.

In overtime, Appalachian held the Deacs to a field goal on the opening possession before clinching the win on Jeremiah's TD dive a series later.

SEPTEMBER 4, 1999 APP NEARLY PULLS OFF UPSET AT AUBURN AUBURN 22, APP STATE 15

For nearly three quarters, it seemed as though App State would pull off perhaps the biggest win ever by an NCAA Division I-AA school over a I-A op-

ponent. But a 33-yard touchdown pass with just 38 seconds left to play gave perennial-power Auburn a narrow 22-15 win over the Mountaineers before 78,123 at Jordan-Hare Stadium.

After Auburn took a 7-0 lead less than seven minutes in, Appalachian responded with 15-straight points to take an eight-point advantage deep into the third quarter. The Tigers evened the score at 15-15 late in the third period and marched 77 yards in just 1:04 to score the winning touchdown in the final minute.

Appalachian out-gained Auburn 323-288 for the game and held AU to just 54 yard of offense in the first half.

OCTOBER 16, 1999 APPS HOLD ON FOR WIN OVER NO. 1 EAGLES APP STATE 17, GEORGIA SOUTHERN 16

App State forced four turnovers, including Corey Hall's second interception as time expired, to claim a 17-16 win over No. 1 Georgia Southern before 19,981 at Kidd Brewer Stadium. The triumph was Appalachian's second ever over a top-ranked team, almost five years to the day after it knocked off No. 1 Marshall at KBS.

Without the benefit of an offensive touchdown, the Mountaineers ran out to a 17-0 lead. Weslan Hunter returned a fumble 43 yards for a score and Luke Manuel fell on another Eagle cough-up and the Apps took the seemingly comfortable 17-point lead with less than five minutes to play in the third quarter.

However, the Eagles came back with a vengeance, scoring 16 points over a 12-minute span. Trailing by just a point, got the ball back with under 30 seconds to play, but Hall sealed the victory with his pick off at the Mountaineer 38 yard line.

AUGUST 31, 2000 WAKE GOES DOWN AGAIN APP STATE 20, WAKE FOREST 16

For the third time in four meetings, App State knocked off the ACC's Wake Forest, this time scoring a 20-16 triumph before 26,853 fans at Groves Stadium. The win evened Appalachian head coach Jerry Moore's record versus the Demon Deacons at 5-5-1.

The Mountaineers dominated the first half, outgaining the Deacs 207-49, but trailed 10-7 at the break, thanks to an 88-yard kickoff return for a touchdown by Wake's John Stone. The score remained 10-7 heading into the final period and things looked bleak for the Apps, who lost starting quarterback Daniel Jeremiah to a knee injury on the first play of the second half.

However, backup signal-caller David Reaves led Appalachian on an eight-play, 66-yard drive, which he capped with a nine-yard touchdown pass to Rashad Slade on the first play of the fourth quarter to give the Mountaineers a 14-10 lead. Despite committing two turnovers in the final period, Appalachian forced Wake into a pair of turnovers of its own, including a fumble on its own 10 yard line with just over three minutes to go. Three plays later, Karim Razzak found the end zone from 10 yards out to seal the triumph.



Daniel Jeremiah's one-yard touchdown plunge in overtime lifted Appalachian to a 30-27 victory at Wake Forest in 1998. The Mountaineers' fourth win over WFU in 10 seasons was also head coach Jerry Moore's 100th victory at Appalachian State.

NOVEMBER 25, 2000 APP AVENGES LOSS IN PLAYOFF WIN AT TROY APP STATE 33, TROY STATE 30

After being handed a 34-28 setback in Boone by Troy State during the regular season, App State returned the favor on a much bigger stage, as it downed the fourth-seeded in the opening round of the I-AA playoffs.

Appalachian outgained Troy State, 200-21, in the first half en route to a 19-9 lead. The Mountaineers extended their lead to 26-9 in the third quarter and withstood three fourth-quarter Troy touchdowns to hold on for the win.

It was just the second road playoff victory ever for the Mountaineers.

OCTOBER 9, 2004 WILLIAMS REWRITES RECORDS IN COMEBACK WIN APP STATE 30, FURMAN 29

Junior quarterback Richie Williams rewrote the NCAA record book with his performance in App State's home triumph over No. 2 Furman.

Williams set NCAA all-divisions records by completing 28 straight passes at one point and going 40-of-45 in the win.

Despite Williams' efforts, the Mountaineers found themselves trailing the Paladins by six points after Furman quarterback Ingle Martin connected with running back Cedrick Gipson on a 52-yard catch and run with 2:03 to go in the ball game. Williams accounted for 78 yards on Appalachian's final drive by completing 4 of 4 passes for 61 yards and running for 17 more, including a 13-yard keeper for the winning touchdown with 35 seconds left.

In all, Williams threw for 413 yards and two touchdowns and tacked on 27 more yards on the ground to spark the victory, just one week removed from missing the Apps' 41-34 win over Texas State with a sprained knee.

DECEMBER 10, 2005 ELDER, HUNTER LEAD APPS TO FIRST TITLE GAME APP STATE 29, FURMAN 23

Filling in for an injured Richie Williams, backup quarterback Trey Elder threw a touchdown pass on his first play and ran for the game-winning score with 2:17 remaining in App State's 29-23 victory over Furman in the NCAA Division I-AA semifinals.

Elder completed 12-of-17 passes for 165 yards and no interceptions and ran 12 times for 69 yards in relief of Williams, who left the contest mid-way through the first quarter with a left ankle injury.

On his first play, Elder connected with Dexter Jackson for a 45-yard touchdown pass that gave the Mountaineers a 14-0 lead. However, Furman scored 23 of the next 30 points to take a 23-21 lead into halftime.

The Paladins' slim advantage stood up until Elder led the Apps on an 11-play, 67-yard drive, culminating with his 1-yard touchdown plunge with just over two minutes to go.

Led by quarterback Ingle Martin, the Paladins drove inside the Mountaineer 40 with under a minute to play. But, on first-and-10 at the 36, App State defensive end Jason Hunter hit Martin from behind, forcing the ball loose. Defensive tackle Omarr Byrom picked up the ball and returned it all the way to the Furman 1.

NOVEMBER 24, 2007 ROMAN STRIPS JAMES MADISON OF UPSET BID APP STATE 28, JAMES MADISON 27

App State's magical season looked like it was going to end three games short of the ultimate goal, but the Mountaineer defense stepped up at the most critical moments of the 2007 playoff opener.

JMU led 27-22 late in the fourth quarter and faced third-and-1 at its own 32 yard line, needing only one first down to end the Mountaineers' run at a third straight national title. The Black and Gold defense stopped the Dukes for no gain on two straight plays, including a fourth-down rush, and got the ball back deep in Madison territory.

Two plays after Devon Moore made a diving catch on fourth-and-3 from the 25-yard line, Armanti Edwards scored his third touchdown to give Appalachian a one-point lead with just 1:10 remaining on the clock.

JMU needed just four plays to drive 62 yards, setting itself up for an apparent chip-shot field goal to win the game. However, JMU head coach Mickey Matthews elected to run one more play and Appalachian linebacker Jacque Roman stripped freshman running back Jamal Sullivan of the ball. The loose pigskin was smothered by Pierre Banks just feet from the App State sideline, triggering a wild celebration that would last straight through to the Mountaineers' 49-21 rout over Delaware in the national championship game.

SEPTEMBER 4, 2010 EPIC 4TH-QUARTER RALLY LIFTS MOUNTAINEERS APP STATE 42, CHATTANOOGA 41

App State came back from a pair of 21-point deficits to rally for a heart-stopping 42-41 victory at upstart Chattanooga in the 2010 opener.

Appalachian trailed 28-7 with less than two minutes remaining in the third quarter and 35-14 just six seconds into the final period.

The Mountaineers scored a total of five touchdowns in a 10:12 span, including the middle three in just 2:54 and the final four over a 7:51 stretch after UTC had regained a 21-point lead on the first play of the fourth quarter.

Appalachian took its first lead of the game at 42-35 with 6:05 to go on a bizarre 33-yard touchdown reception by quarterback DeAndre Presley. The Mocs jumped offside on a third-and-1 play from the UTC 29-yard line, giving Presley a free play. The junior threw a quick pass to Matt Cline, who was drilled by a Moc defender and fumbled. Presley picked up the loose ball and weaved his way through the UTC defense, picked up a number of key downfield blocks and scoring the go-ahead touchdown.

Chattanooga responded by driving 86 yards to cut the deficit to 42-41. With a pair of UTC kickers having already combined to miss three extra points, the Mocs elected to go for two points and the potential win, but Appalachian's Mark LeGree batted down a pass on the conversion attempt.

NOVEMBER 10, 2012 LATE PICK HELPS MOORE CLOSE WITH A TITLE APP STATE 33, FURMAN 28

Troy Sanders intercepted a pass at the 5-yard line as time expired and 12th-ranked Appalachian clinched its record-tying 12th Southern Conference championship in the final regular-season game for coach Jerry Moore, whose team went 6-2 in the league despite dropping its league opener.

NOVEMBER 8, 2014 LAST-MINUTE FIELD GOAL EXTENDS STREAK APP STATE 31, ULM 29

Bentlee Critcher drilled a 39-yard field goal with 29 seconds left to lift App State to streak-extending win during its FBS debut in the Sun Belt.

After starting the year 1-5 (with a win over FCS Campbell), the Mountaineers closed the season with a six-game winning streak, as the ULM game improved App State's record to 4-5.

OCTOBER 31, 2015 MOUNTAINEERS WIN HALLOWEEN THRILLER APP STATE 44, TROY 41 (3OT)

Stephen Burns, Kennan Gilchrist and Doug Middleton combined to smother a fake field-goal attempt to start the third overtime, and Zach Matics followed with a 24-yard game-winner.

The contest was a tight affair throughout, featuring six ties and no lead of more than seven points. Despite being unable to put the pesky Trojans away, App State never trailed in regulation — its only deficit came when Troy scored first in the opening overtime.



Jacque Roman forced the Jamal Sullivan fumble with less than a minute remaining that sealed the Apps' 28-27 victory in the opening round of the 2007 NCAA playoffs.



OCTOBER 14, 2017

APP STATE OVERCOMES 20-0 HALFTIME DEFICIT APP STATE 23, IDAHO 20

App State mounted its biggest rally in seven years with a 23-20 victory at Idaho during the Vandals' final year in the Sun Belt Conference.

The Mountaineers trailed 20-0 early in the third quarter in the Kibbie Dome before coming back behind a sack-hungry, turnover-minded defense and three touchdown throws from senior quarterback Taylor Lamb. It was App State's biggest comeback since it erased a 35-14 deficit in the fourth quarter of a 42-41 victory at Chattanooga in the 2010 opener.

Lamb's 45-yard touchdown pass to Ike Lewis helped tie the game with 10:04 left, and Michael Rubino made a go-ahead field goal from 31 yards out with 7:24 remaining.

Idaho (2-4, 1-2) started its final drive by regaining possession at its 46-yard line with 2:23 remaining, and Tee Sims had a hand in two sacks leading up to a fourth-and-24 pass that was completed but stopped a yard short of the marker with 50 seconds left.

DECEMBER 1, 2018

MOUNTAINEERS WIN FIRST SBC TITLE GAME APP STATE 30, LOUISIANA 19

Hosting the first Sun Belt Conference Championship Game, App State won 30-19 against Louisiana in Boone to claim its third straight league title.

Darrynton Evans had an MVP-belt-hoisting performance in which his 218 all-purpose yards included 111 rushing yards and a 97-yard kickoff return. Quarterback Zac Thomas had two rushing touchdowns of at least 25 yards, and the Mountaineers allowed just one touchdown while forcing the Ragin' Cajuns to kick four field goals.

All three of Chandler Staton's second-half field goals for App State exceeded 40 yards, including a 43-yarder that pushed the lead to 11 points with 2:09 remaining.

SEPTEMBER 21, 2019

APP GETS FBS BREAKTHROUGH FOR P5 WIN APP STATE 34, NORTH CAROLINA 31

National defensive player of the week Demetrius Taylor forced two turnovers to help App State build a first-half lead on the road, and Darrynton Evans rushed for three TDs as the Mountaineers built a 27-10 lead before holding on to beat in-state ACC program North Carolina.

The Tar Heels reached App State's 39-yard line with five seconds left, and Akeem Davis-Gaither pushed through a gap in the line to tip a 56-yard attempt at a field goal as time expired.

The second-ever football meeting between the two schools and first since 1940 drew a spirited, sold-out crowd to Kenan Stadium, and the Mountaineers posted their first win against a Power Five conference team since the historic upset of Michigan in 2007.

Taylor led App State's defense by recording 2.5 sacks, forcing two fumbles, turning a post-sack recovery into a 20-yard fumble return for a touchdown and setting up another touchdown with an interception.



Akeem Davis-Gaither (24) blocked a 56-yard field-goal attempt as time expired in Chapel Hill to give App State its first win against a Power Five opponent since the Mountaineers joined the FBS level.

NOVEMBER 9, 2019

2ND P5 ROAD WIN OF '19 COMES IN SEC COUNTRY APP STATE 20, SOUTH CAROLINA 15

Becoming just the seventh Group of Five team since the Sun Belt was formed in 2001 to post two Power Five road wins in the same season, App State escaped Columbia with a win in front of 80,849 fans and an ESPN2 audience.

True freshman Nicholas Ross' 20-yard interception return for a touchdown with 1:51 left in the first half gave App State a 13-6 lead, and Zac Thomas' 1-yard TD run that gave the Mountaineers a 20-9 lead was set up by Jalen Virgil's 57-yard kickoff return following a South Carolina field goal.

After cutting into the 20-9 deficit on a touchdown with 2:58 left, South Carolina regained possession and faced a fourth-and-15 from the App State 35 with 19 seconds left. Ryan Hilinski completed a pass for 26 yards to the 9 before spiking the ball with nine seconds remaining.

Nick Hampton forced a holding penalty on a pass rush as George Blackstock batted down the throw, leading to a snap from the 19 with six seconds left. The Gamecocks committed holding against Akeem Davis-Gaither on a pass that didn't connect at the back of the end zone, leading to a frenzied celebration from the Mountaineers.

DECEMBER 7, 2019

MOUNTAINEERS WIN 2ND STRAIGHT TITLE GAME APP STATE 45, LOUISIANA 38

App State claimed its fourth straight league title and celebrated a Sun Belt Championship Game victory on its home field for the second straight year thanks to a win against Louisiana.

Three early touchdowns from belt-winning MVP Darrynton Evans gave the 21st-ranked Mountaineers a 21-0 lead late in the first quarter, and captain Josh Thomas' first career interception return for a touchdown accounted for one of three turnovers forced by a senior on App State's defense.

The Mountaineers led 42-17 late in the third quarter thanks to Thomas' defensive touchdown and maintained at least a 14-point lead until the Ragin' Cajuns cut into a 45-31 deficit on a touchdown pass with 1:19 left.

SEASON SUPERLATIVES

The Mountaineers became the first Sun Belt team and the first FBS team from the state of North Carolina to win 13 games.

App State becomes the first Sun Belt team to conclude a season in the Top 25 and claimed the top spot among FBS teams from North Carolina for the second straight year.

App State became the first FBS program to win five bowl games in each of its first five bowl-eligible seasons.

App State tied Ohio State for the third-best winning percentage among FBS teams, behind just LSU (15-0) and Clemson (14-1).

App State's 54-12 overall record in the last five seasons is the fifth-best mark in the country during that span, trailing just Clemson, Alabama, Ohio State and Oklahoma.

The Mountaineers finished as a statistical champion or co-champion in two categories: sole possession of first with a fourth-down conversion percentage of 81.3 and tied with Illinois for the FBS lead with six defensive touchdowns.

App State became just the fifth program in major college football history to send its fifth-year seniors out with five bowl wins and four conference titles, joining Nebraska (1969-73), Alabama (1975-79), Florida State (1991-95) and Marshall (1998-2002).

App State was the first Group of Five program to have two players picked in the 2020 NFL Draft, as running back Darrynton Evans went to the Tennessee Titans in the third round and line-backer Akeem Davis-Gaither was picked by the Cincinnati Bengals to open the fourth round.

App State led the nation in road wins en route to the only 6-0 road record by FBS teams.



App State ranked No. 7 nationally and No. 1 among G5 programs with an average scoring margin of plus-17.5 points per game against FBS competition. The Mountaineers had a balanced team that ranked No. 9 nationally in scoring offense (38.8 points), No. 21 in scoring defense (20.0 points) and tied for No. 2 with five blocked kicks.

The fifth-year seniors finished their careers with a 7-0 postseason record that included two wins in the Sun Belt title game. Fourth-year seniors were on teams that went 43-10 with a Sun Belt title every season.

Since 2015, App State improved to an FBS-best 24-0 in non-season-opening games in which it had more than a week to prepare.

App State set Sun Belt records for single-season points (543) and touchdowns (73).

With 13 wins, App State tied for the second-highest total by a Group of Five team since the Sun Belt was established in 2001. Boise State had a G5-record 14 wins in 2009.

App State set a program record for fewest turnovers committed in a season with nine and tied the program's single-season record for lost fumbles by losing only three.

In all six of its FBS seasons, App State has ranked in the top 25 nationally in rushing yards per game (No. 16 at 231.4 in 2019) and fewest sacks allowed (tied for No. 17 with 18 in 2019).

App State set a program record with seven national television appearances in 2019.

App State led the Sun Belt in attendance for the third time in the last four years.

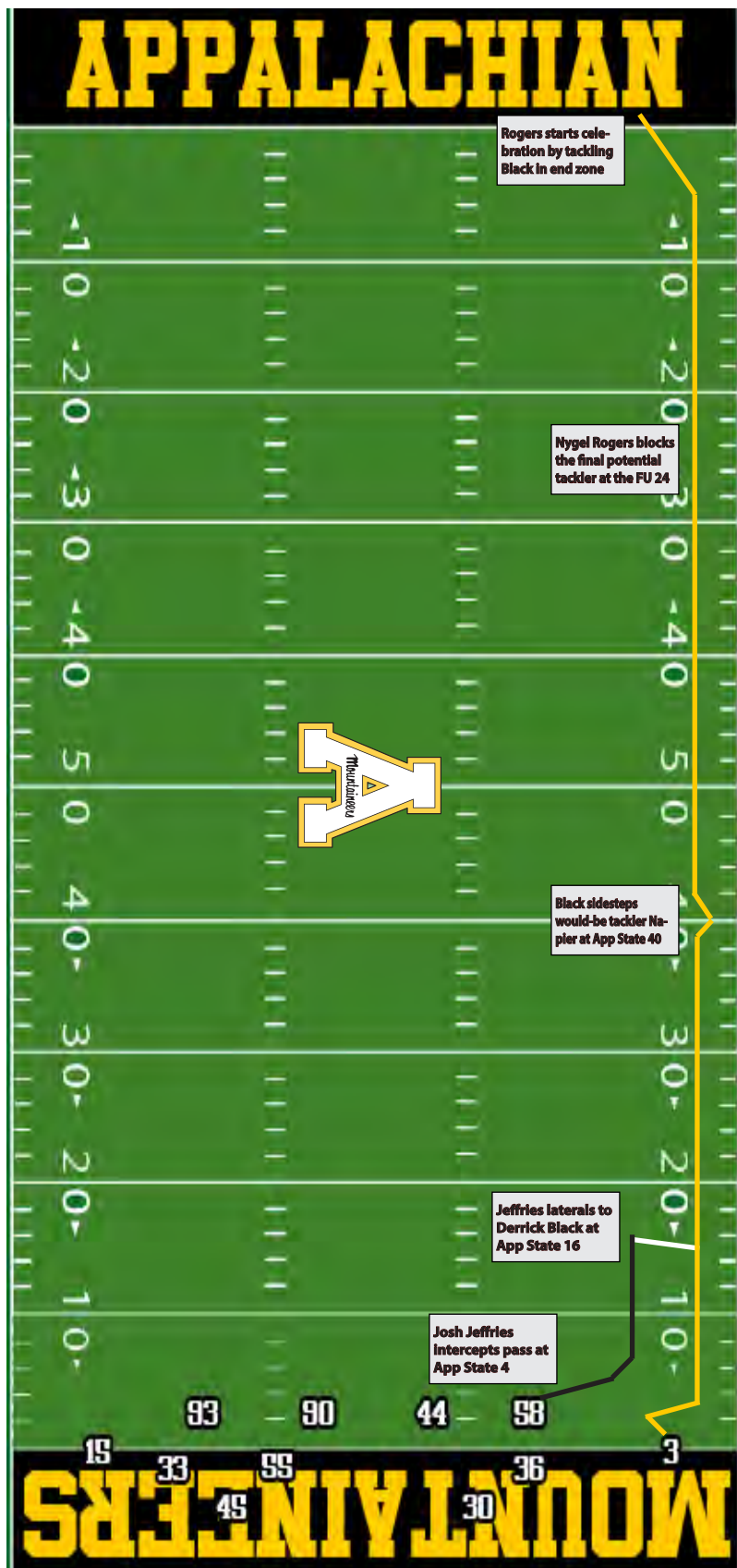

The Mountaineers were trailing 9-7 in the fourth quarter after three Furman field goals and an interception return for a touchdown by the home side. With 5:39 left, Joey Hoover's 24-yard TD catch from Joe Burchette gave Appalachian its first lead of the game, at 14-9.



Furman took the ensuing possession and marched 73 yards on 13 plays, converting a first down on third-and-18 and then retook the lead on third-and-goal from the Appalachian 12 with 0:07 remaining when Billy Napier found Bear Rinehart for the go-ahead touchdown. Furman led 15-14.



Furman elected to go for two points on the point-after. Napier's pass on the two-point attempt was intercepted by Josh Jeffries at the Appalachian 4. Jeffries darted toward the right sideline before lateraling the ball to Derrick Black at the Appalachian 16.



With Jeffries and Nygel Rogers both running downfield to block, Black avoided two would-be tacklers on his way to score two points and give Appalachian the lead in remarkable fashion, 16-15.



Rogers tackled Black in a celebratory hug in the end zone. The Mountaineers cleared the sideline to join the celebration.



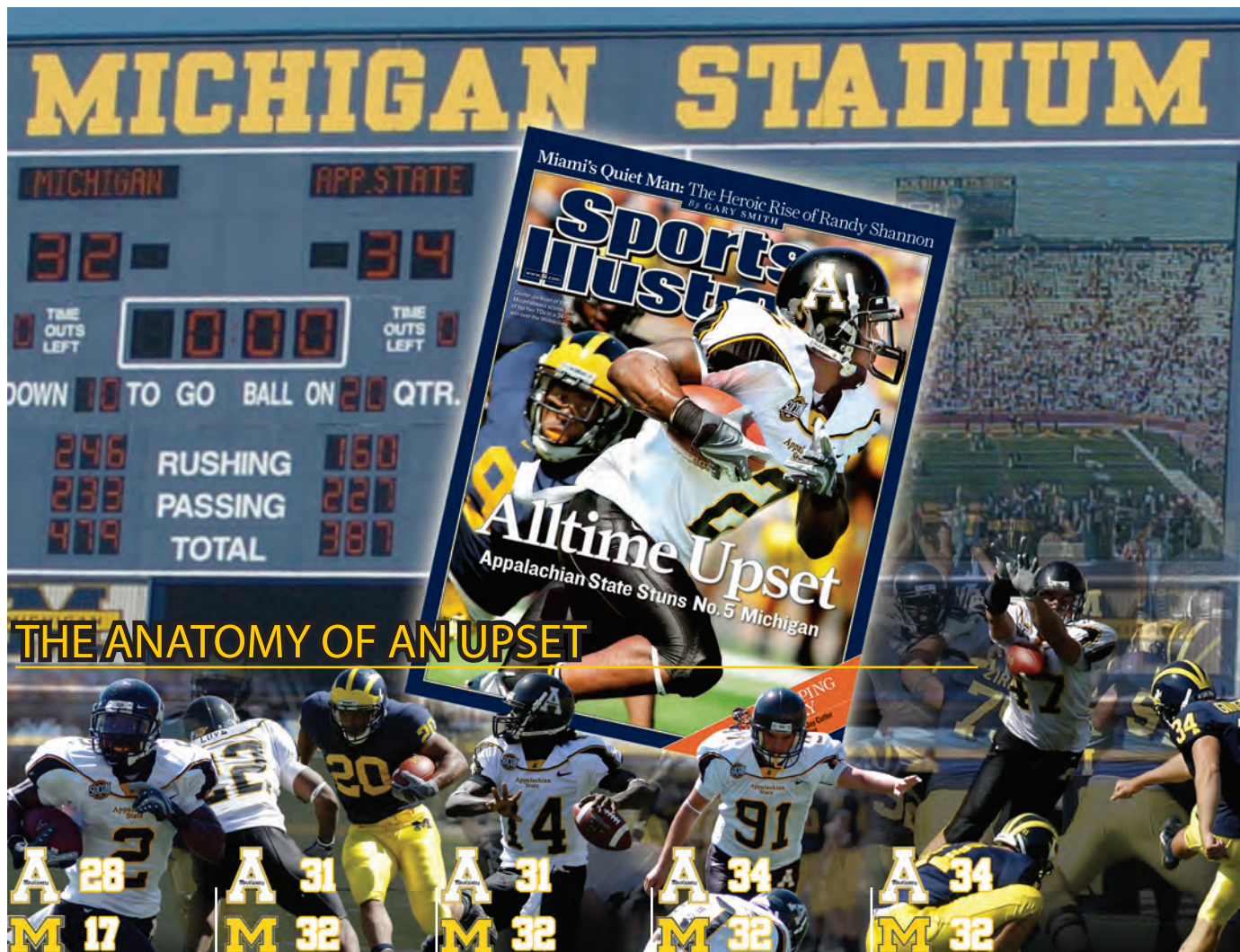

THE ANATOMY OF AN UPSET

Thanks in large part to Dexter Jackson's two touchdown catches and Armanti Edwards' perfect first half (7-of-7 passing, 129 yards, 3 TD; eight rushes, 41 yards, TD), App State jumped out to a stunning 28-14 advantage late in the first half and led 28-17 at halftime.

Michigan came roaring back in the second half and took a 32-31 lead on a 54-yard touchdown run by Mike Hart with less than five minutes to play.

Things looked bleak for Appalachian State when the Wolverines intercepted a pass by Edwards on the first play after Hart's touchdown, but freshman Brian Quick blocked a U-M field-goal attempt to give the Mountaineers the ball back with 1:37 left to play.

Edwards engineered a seven-play, 69-yard drive over the next 1:11 to set up Julian Rauch's go-ahead 24-yard field goal with just 26 seconds remaining on the clock. Edwards completed 5-of-5 passes and accounted for all 69 yards on the drive (18 rushing, 51 passing).

After a 46-yard pass from Chad Henne to Mario Manningham, Michigan had an opportunity to win the ballgame on a 37-yard field goal. However, Corey Lynch made the "block heard 'round the world," scooped up the loose ball and returned it 62 yards as the clock expired.

THE AFTERMATH

• Appalachian State's shocking win over college football's all-time winningest program was the first ever for an NCAA Division I Football Championship Subdivision team over a nationally ranked D-I Football Bowl Subdivision opponent.

• A crowd estimated to be as large as 10,000 welcomed the Mountaineers back to Kidd Brewer Stadium later that evening.

• The Apps were the darlings of the national media for weeks to come, highlighted by a Sept. 2, 2007 press conference that was televised live by ESPNEWS and Dexter Jackson's appearance on the cover of the Sept. 10, 2007 edition of *Sports Illustrated*.

• The victory prompted the *Associated Press* to change its 71-year-old policy and allow all Division I teams, regardless of subdivision, to receive votes in its Top 25 poll.

• Appalachian State went on to post a 13-2 overall record and win its third-consecutive NCAA Division I Football national championship.

• Michigan went on to post an 9-4 overall record and No. 18 ranking in the final 2007 AP poll. The Wolverines finished second in the Big Ten standings and defeated defending BCS national champion Florida and Heisman Trophy winner Tim Tebow, 41-35, in the Capital One Bowl on New Year's Day.

HALL OF FAMER JERRY MOORE



The winningest coach in Appalachian State University and Southern Conference history, Jerry Moore compiled a 215-87 record in his 24 seasons at Appalachian State from 1989-2012. That run included 10 SoCon championships, 18 postseason appearances and an unprecedented three straight FCS national titles from 2005-07.

In 31 years overall as a head coach, Moore was 242-135-2. He was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame in 2014, adding that honor to recognition from the North Carolina Sports Hall of Fame, the Southern Conference Hall of Fame and the Appalachian State Athletics Hall of Fame. In 2018, he was also awarded The Order of the Long Leaf Pine, which recognizes "exemplary service to the State of North Carolina."

While he enjoyed success at nearly every stop of his 51-year coaching career, the 24 seasons at Appalachian State cemented Moore's standing as one of college football's all-time great mentors.

In leading the Mountaineers to three consecutive national championships from 2005-07, he made Appalachian the first program to ever win three straight titles at the FCS level and the first Division I institution (FCS or FBS) to accomplish the feat in 61 years. Appalachian became the first institution from the state of North Carolina to ever win an NCAA football championship at any level when it defeated Northern Iowa 21-16 in the 2005 national title game, a feat it repeated with wins over Massachusetts (28-17) and Delaware (49-21) in the 2006 and 2007 NCAA Division I Football Championship finals.

Moore also led the Mountaineers to seven SoCon championships in an eight-year span (2005-10, '12), making Appalachian State only the second program to achieve that feat since the league began crowning a champion in 1933.



Appalachian won 26 straight conference games from 2007-10.

Additionally, Appalachian State became a household name when Moore led his squad to perhaps the biggest and most prominent upset in college football history, a 34-32 triumph over the University of Michigan in the 2007 season opener.

The victory over Michigan, which came into the contest ranked No. 5 in the Associated Press Top 25 poll, marked the first time that an FCS team had ever toppled a nationally ranked FBS opponent. The victory also compelled the AP to change its long-standing history of only accepting votes for FBS teams in its Top 25 poll, which allowed the Mountaineers to become the first FCS team to ever receive votes in the poll, which they did on three occasions in 2007.

Moore is no stranger to individual awards, as he is a three-time American Football Coaches Association Coach of the Year (2005, '06, '07). He also won the 2006 Eddie Robinson Award

(National Coach of the Year) from The Sports Network, is a six-time AFCA Regional Coach of the Year and an eight-time SoCon Coach of the Year.

In 2009, he was named the Liberty Mutual FCS Coach of the Year, which included \$50,000 for Moore's favorite charities and \$20,000 for the Appalachian State Alumni Association scholarship fund.

Under Moore, Appalachian State players earned all-conference recognition 257 times and received All-America honors on 99 occasions.

In addition to his nearly quarter-century tenure at Appalachian State, Moore also served as the head coach at North Texas (1979-80) and Texas Tech (1981-85) and spent 15 seasons on the staffs of legendary mentors Hayden Fry (1965-72 at SMU), Tom Osborne (1973-78 at Nebraska) and Ken Hatfield (1988 at Arkansas). Moore began his coaching career with four seasons as an assistant coach at Corsicana H.S. in Texas (1961-64).

A native of Bonham, Texas, Moore was one of the nation's top receivers at Baylor from 1958-60.

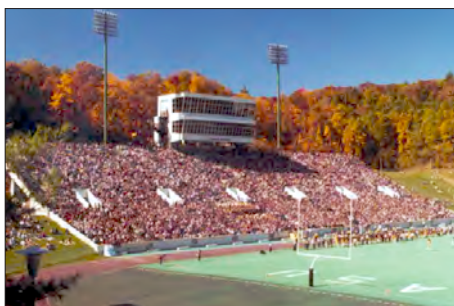
Construction began in 1960 on Conrad Stadium (left) and what would become known as Owens Field House (right) in the stadium's north end zone. Conrad Stadium officially opened on Sept. 15, 1962 when Appalachian State hosted Emory-Henry.



In 1970, the natural grass playing field was removed from Conrad Stadium and replaced with an artificial surface, the first in the Carolinas.



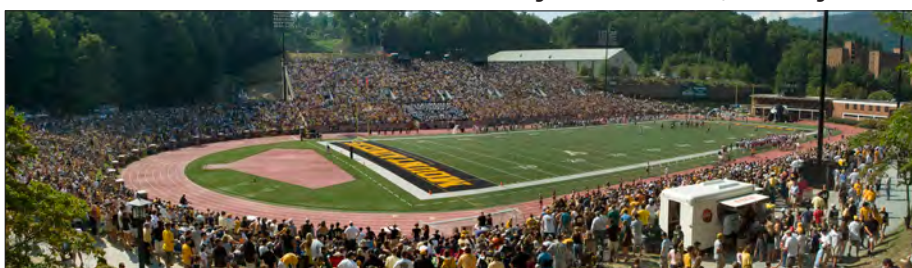
In 1978, the stadium underwent a massive renovation which included an 8,000-seat expansion and new press box/chancellor's suite on the stadium's west side.



Stadium capacity jumped to 18,000 following the extensive renovations in 1978. Another restoration project in 1995 dropped capacity to 16,650.



Re-named Kidd Brewer Stadium in 1988, much of the facility remained largely unchanged from 1978 until the beginning of the 21st century. However, additional renovations became necessary when App State began drawing crowds in excess of 20,000 on a regular basis.



Prior to the 2007 season, the press box was removed from the west side of the stadium to make way for the 120,000-square-foot Appalachian Athletics Center. Following the '07 campaign, construction began on a 4,400-seat upper deck on the stadium's east side.



Extensive renovations in Kidd Brewer Stadium were completed in 2009.

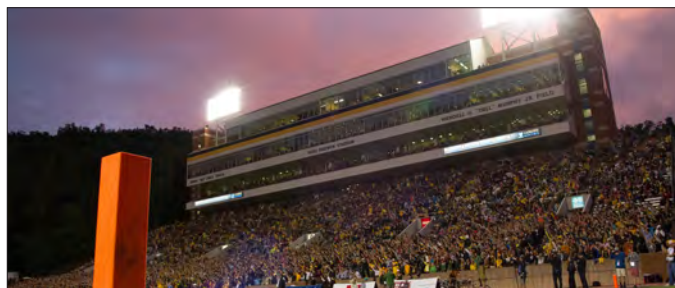

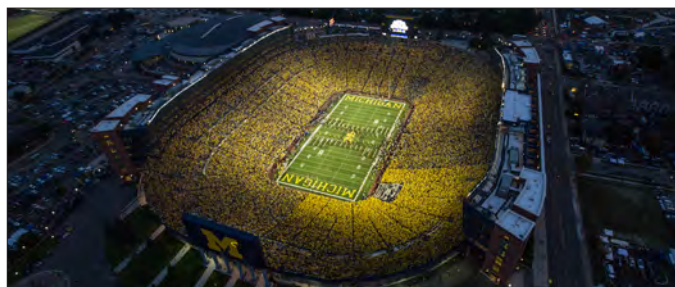

NOTING APPALACHIAN STATE IN THE POSTSEASON

• Appalachian State was the first program to ever win three consecutive NCAA Division I FCS/Division I-AA national championships and remains one of only two programs to accomplish the feat. Only three other programs have ever won two Division I-AA/FCS national titles in a row: Georgia Southern (1985-86, 1989-90, 1999-2000), Youngstown State (1993-94) and North Dakota State (2011-13).

• Only eight programs in NCAA football history boast three straight national titles, regardless of division. Appalachian State became the first Division I program (FCS or FBS) to accomplish the feat in 61 years when it won its third consecutive title in 2007.

• Appalachian State is the only school from the state of North Carolina to ever win an NCAA football national championship and the only public institution in the state of North Carolina to win a national title on any level of college football (private institutions Lenoir-Rhyne and Elon have won NAIA national championships).

Yosef is mountain talk for "yourself," with the idea being that if you are an Appalachian alumnus, fan or friend and have a heart filled with black and gold, you are Yosef.

In preparing the layout for the 1942 edition of Appalachian's annual yearbook, *The Rhododendron*, editor James Storie and associate editor Elizabeth South (who later married in June 1942) were talking with freshman Lloyd S. Isaacs and Bill Mitchell of Observer Publishing about being one picture short of a perfectly balanced annual.

The result of their chatter was the creation of a character named *Dan'l Boone Yoseff from Appalachian*. He was presented as a member of the 1941-42 freshman class.

Each member of the foursome deflected credit for the creation of Yosef. Although called the Mountaineers, Appalachian had no mascot prior to Yosef. There were no plans in 1942 for Yosef to continue and evolve into what he is today.

His initial publication was such a hit that students went so far as to want to order picture packages of Yosef instead of pictures of themselves. Undoubtedly, the caricature, the name and the idea appealed to Appalachian students.

There is a controversy as to where the original image of Yosef came from and who was responsible for the picture. Accounts mention a bookstore staff member generating a sketch but an artist in Charlotte has also been credited with the creation of the mountain man.

The next mention of the fictional character came during the years of 1946-49 when Yoseff served as a guest editorial writer in the student newspaper (*The Appalachian*). He wrote using mountain colloquialism with a penchant for misspelled words.

Yoseff dropped the second "f" and became Yosef in January of 1947. On Nov. 22, 1947, the University sponsored a Mr. and Mrs. Yosef contest. Skills needed for the titles included hog and chicken calling.

The first mention of Yosef as the mascot of the Mountaineers is a picture in the March 12, 1948 edition of *The Appalachian*. The photo tabbed him as a perennial freshman.

In 1949, John Geffrich, a 48-year-old World War II veteran, was one of the first Yosef mascots. Geffrich helped establish a lineage of male undergraduates portraying a bearded man with coveralls, a pipe and a straw hat. The addition of a musket and a black-and-gold pick-up truck called the "Yosef Mobile" came along through the generations of Yosef.

Prior to the 1983-84 academic year, a committee comprised of University students, staff and faculty members modernized Yosef's look through a cartoon-type head and body. The Yosef mascot has undergone several overhauls over the past three decades, including one this offseason that gives the top Mountaineer a fresh new look as Appalachian State begins a new era in the Sun Belt Conference.

Responsible for providing school spirit, Yosef is an official member of Appalachian State's cheerleading squad. He was an integral part of App State's 1986 and 1989 UCA Division I and 2008 Speed Squad, Inc. Large Squad national championships. Yosef goes to mascot instructional camp with the Mountaineers' cheerleaders each summer.

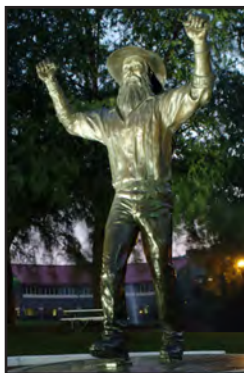
