ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

APSU is the state's designated liberal arts university, made up of the College of Arts and Letters, College of Business, College of Graduate Studies, College of Professional Programs and Social Sciences, College of Science and Mathematics and the School of Technology and Public Management at Fort Campbell. The School of Education and the School of Nursing are part of the College of Professional Programs and Social Sciences.

The University offers about 1,100 courses, including Web-based courses, in more than 30 undergraduate degree programs leading to associate (two-year) and bachelor's (four-year) degrees, as well as graduate studies for master's degrees and the education specialist degree.

APSU has two Centers of Excellence, both recognized as "accomplished" by the Tennessee Board of Regents for success in education.

The Center of Excellence for the Creative Arts, the only program of its type in Tennessee, is dedicated to achievement in music, creative writing, visual arts and theatre. The Center attracts outstanding national and international talents, enabling you to study with working artists. It sponsors outstand-

ing activities, including the Mid-South Jazz Festival and the Dimensions New Music Series. APSU also provides you with creative facilities, including the state-of-the-art \$9.4 million music/mass communication building.

The Center of Excellence for Field Biology offers hands-on training in research and practical management under the guidance of practicing professionals. The Center for Field Biology is housed in the massive \$38 million Sundquist Science Complex.

APSU also has four Chairs of Excellence, one in the arts, one in the School of Nursing and two in business. These visiting faculty positions bring outstanding scholars, artists and business leaders to campus to teach and share their "real-world" knowledge.

FACULTY

Nobody will have more impact on your college years than your professors. That's why it's so important to have faculty who are truly dedicated to teaching.

Ninety-five percent of our faculty hold the highest degrees in their fields. APSU, with its "Accomplished" Centers of Excellence and Chairs of Excellence, also attracts distinguished scholars, artists, scientists and business professionals to teach each year.

Best of all, the APSU faculty has a long tradition of active involvement with students. They make themselves available to consult with students during regular office hours and often outside class. Plus, many faculty members volunteer their time to work with student groups.



THE CAMPUS

Austin Peay has been at the center of Clarksville since 1927, when it was established by the Tennessee General Assembly as Austin Peay Normal School for teachers.

APSU and Clarksville have grown together.

APSU achieved university status in 1966, and a close bond exists between the University and community.

Located 40 miles northwest of Nashville at the Tennessee-Kentucky border, Clarksville is the fifth largest city in the state.

Clarksville also is the birthplace of Governor Austin Peay, for whom the school was named. The mascot, appropriately, is the Governor.

Situated just a few minutes from Clarksville's downtown, APSU's campus has served as the site for educational institutions since 1806. Today, the APSU main campus consists of 77 buildings and more than 160 acres. The University also maintains a 475-acre teaching farm and a separate facility at Fort Campbell.

The newest building additions to the main campus are: the Sundquist Science Complex (2002), the Morgan Univer-

sity Center (2002) and the Drew Simmons Fitness Center (2003). A new recreation center will open in late 2006 where the Armory was formerly located. The Sundquist Complex is one of the South's premier science education facilities and represents the largest capital appropriation ever in Tennessee for a single classroom building. The new Morgan University Center is located in the heart of the campus and features meeting rooms, a food court, coffee shop,



ballroom and lounges for Austin Peay students. The Drew Simmons Fitness Center offers more than 6,000 square feet of state-of-the-art services and equipment, including 20 cardio stations, over 4 tons of free weights and dumbbells and a full schedule of group fitness classes.

While the majority of students are residents of Tennessee and Kentucky, APSU also attracts students from the entire Southeastern region and nationally. But wherever you come from, there's something about the APSU campus--its rolling lawns, the classic red brick tower of the Browning Building, the students' gathering places--that says this is a good place to call home.

ATHLETICS SUCCESS

Austin Peay continues to grow as it offers broad-based athletic opportunities at the NCAA Division I level. In 1998, APSU added golf to its list of women's sports, joining tennis, basketball, cross country, softball, track, rifle and volleyball. Women's soccer began the next fall. APSU offers men's teams in football (scholarship football will return on a partial basis in 2006 and fulltime in 2007), basketball, cross country, baseball, tennis and golf.



Jeff Gooch was named special teams MVP for Detroit in 2002. He is in his 10th NFL season and returned to Tampa Bay in 2004 for his second stint.

In the 1990s, APSU gained much recognition for the success of its athletics program. Men's and women's basketball and baseball participated in NCAA tournaments while several athletes brought national attention to themselves and the school.

This has continued into the next century. In fact, 2002-03 saw both the Governors and Lady Govs basketball teams win OVC titles and advance to the NCAA tourney. Meanwhile, the Golf Gobs also won three straight league title

while baseball won two straight regular-season titles.

In 2003-04, the basketball Govs went undefeated in OVC regular-season play and made their first NIT appearance while the Lady Govs made it four straight OVC titles and four straight NCAA tourney appearances.

With APSU alumni playing professionally in the National Basketball Association and internationally, Major League Baseball, the National Football League, the Canadian Football League and overseas, and in golf and tennis, the University continues to build on its history of athletic excellence.

For instance, Jeff Gooch (Tampa Bay) is in his 10th season as an NFL linebacker. Meanwhile, his former Govs secondary mate, Michael Swift, also played multiple seasons in the NFL.

Trenton Hassell, the 2001 OVC Player of the Year, was the highest-drafted NBA Gov (30th pick) in history and then was named the Chicago Bulls "Player of the Year" as a rookie in 2001-02. After two seasons with the Bulls, he joined Minnesota in 2003-04 and earned national recognition as one of the league's top defenders. Hassell begins his fifth NBA season this fall.

Bubba Wells, who set several APSU and OVC basketball records, resurrected his pro basketball career in the Philippines after sitting out 1999-2000 recovering from a torn Achilles tendon. He played for the Globetrotters the last two seasons. and now has returned to APSU as an assistant basketball coach.

Meanwhile, Lady Govs' all-time leading scorer Brooke Armistead became the OVC's first WNBA-drafted player. She was the 2002-03 OVC Female Athlete of the Year in addition to OVC Women's Basketball Player of the Year. After completing her master's while helping coach the Lady Govs in 2003-04, she played briefly overseas as did Gerlonda Hardin, who followed her teammate as OVC Female Athlete of the Year.

After spending two seasons with the Kansas City Royals in the late 1990s, lefthander Jamie Walker, former OVC Pitcher of the Year (1991), is another Governor who has fought his way back into the major leagues. After overcoming an assortment of injury problems, he has been one of the Detroit Tigers' most dependable relief pitchers the past four years.



Trenton Hassell, who was the highest-drafted Gov by the NBA in 2001 and was named the Chicago Bulls "Player of the Year" that same season, earned a reputation as one of the NBA's top defenders with Minnesota.

An even more determined path brought former independent lefthander hurler George Sherrill to the Seattle Mariners.

GATEWAY TO THE NEW SOUTH

Situated in the rolling hills of Middle Tennessee, Clarksville is one of the fastest growing cities in the Southeast. With a heritage spanning more than 200 years, Clarksville/Montgomery County has continued to grow and adapt, becoming the state's fifth largest city, growing to more than 103,000 and growing faster than any other Tennessee city other than Nashville and Memphis. Area and business leaders have worked hard to build on community strengths with a vision of a vibrant, prosperous future.

Clarksville is an award-winning city, having received numerous rankings and recognitions during the past few years, including being a finalist for All-America City honors in 2002. It continually is ranked as a top-quality community by publications like *Reader's Digest*, *Money Magazine*, *Demographics Journal*, *Expansion Management*, *Forbes* and others. It also was recognized as the 10th Best City for New College Grads by *National Business Employment Weekly*.

Founded in 1784, Clarksville is named in honor of Gen. George Rogers Clark, a Revolutionary War hero from the area. Although agriculture has been a vital part of the past, Clarksville has grown to become a culturally diverse community, offering residents and visitors unique sights and sounds.

In partnership with APSU, Clarksville stands in a class of its own with art galleries and a wide variety of musical and theatrical events to satisfy most artistic tastes.

From significant Civil War history to mid-1800s architecture, some damaged by the January 1999 tornado, to Fort Campbell, home of the 101st Airborne Division (Air Assault), history buffs find interesting landmarks that tell unique tales of the area's past and present.

Clarksville began as an agricultural town with tobacco as a major source of income for the local community. Since then, Clarksville's economic base has boomed and now includes a diversified mix of manufacturing, government, finance, state university, military installation and retail. The downtown has rebounded from that devastating tornado to again take its place as the community's hub.

Today, Clarksville continues to lead the region in health care, business, education and agriculture. Its natives have led state government, and its athletes have competed against the world. For more than 200 years, Clarksville has been building on the tradition of a proud past with an even brighter, progressive future as the Gateway to the New South.

Dr. Sherry Hoppe, APSU President

Dr. Sherry Hoppe was appointed Austin Peay's eighth president on Jan. 30, 2001—a three-way history-making event:

- She became the first woman president of Austin Peay.
- She is the first person in Tennessee to move directly from the presidency of a community college to that of a four-year university.
- She was the first woman to be inaugurated as the president of a four-year university within the Tennessee Board of Regents System - the nation's sixth largest system of higher education.

Dr. Hoppe was president of Roane State Community College in Harriman, from 1988 until taking a leave of absence in 2000 to serve as Austin Peay's interim president.

She has worked in the Tennessee Board of Regents System for more than 25 years, including more than 10 years at Chattanooga State Community College and a short stint at Nashville State Community College as interim president.

Hoppe earned her doctorate in educational administration with collateral work in communications from the University of Tennessee at Knoxville. Her master's degree in counseling and her undergraduate degree in English education are from the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga.

In addition to her work in higher education, Hoppe has been active in numerous community affairs. In addition to her



extensive list of leadership activities in Roane County and Knoxville, she currently serves on the boards of directors for Bank of America, the Clarksville Area Chamber of Commerce, Economic Development Council and Industrial Development Board.

She is a former member of the Commission on Colleges and concluded two terms on the board of trustees for the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. She has served as the president of the Tennessee College Association.

Dr. Hoppe has been the driving force behind many dynamic changes that have occurred at APSU, including the construction of the new student recreation center, to be completed in 2007.

From an athletics standpoint, she also was a driving force behind the construction of the new soccer field and the upgrades at Governors Stadium and Dave Aaron Arena. Dr. Hoppe also strongly supported the proposal for the Govs to return to scholarship football in 2006 and the Ohio Valley Conference in 2007.

A member of Rotary, she and her husband Bob attend St. John's Anglican Church. They have a son, Kevin, who holds a bachelor's degree in criminal justice and is a member of the Tennessee Highway Patrol. They live in historic Archwood on the Austin Peay campus.

Dave Loos, APSU Athletics Director

Dave Loos, the Governors head basketball coach is in his ninth year as Austin Peay's athletics director. Loos was named to the post in May 1997 and took over the duties July 1 of that same year.

The dual role is almost unheard of in this day of college athletics—he is one of only three Division I college basketball coaches who also serve as athletes director. He will begin his 16th season as Austin Peay's head basketball coach in 2005-06.

His double duties aptly point out the respect Loos earned both on and off campus. His common-sense approach to athletics director's duties have been with the same diligence that have been so representative of his APSU basketball tenure.

His Governors teams won the Ohio Valley Conference tournament and gained an NCAA tourney berth in 1996 and 2003; captured the 1997 (first since 1977) title, 2003 league co-championship and an undefeated 2004 league crown. Loos was named OVC Coach of the Year in 1990-91, 1996-1997, 2002-03, 2003-04—the only APSU coach in history to earn that honor more than once.

Under Loos, the Govs have had seven winning seasons in the last 10 years, including 2002-03's 23-8 mark—the most under Dave Loos and the second most in school history. He then led the Governors to an 16-0 OVC season and a 22-10 a year later. He has led APSU to two of its four 20-win regular seasons—the other being the 2000-01 season's 22-10 mark.

The Governors also have posted a .500 or better OVC mark in the last 12 seasons.

Loos not only has elevated APSU's program to the pinnacle of OVC prominence, but has done it with the dignity and class reflective of the reputation he built as an athlete and as a high school/college coach.

He is only the second APSU coach to lead the Govs to an OVC regular-season co-championship and NCAA Division I tourney berth. His APSU teams have advanced to at least the OVC tourney semifinals in eight of the last 10 years. That sustains his reputation of elevating his club's play during February-March, where the Govs own nearly a .667 winning percentage in the last 10 years.

In 1994-95, the Governors finished the regular-season at 12-15 but pulled two upsets

in the Ohio Valley Conference tournament before falling to Murray State when star forward Bubba Wells suffered a surgery-necessitating right leg stress fracture.

In 1995-96, the Governors again peaked late. In February, the Govs fashioned an 8-2 record, including six straight victories. APSU entered the NCAA tourney with a four-game win streak before losing to Georgia Tech.

A year later, the Governors finished 17-14 overall—with All-America forward Wells missing the season's first 12 games—but won six of their final eight games, including a four-game winning streak that helped clinch a regular-season OVC co-championship.

In 1997-98, the Govs, despite a rebuilding season, ended the season with a surprising 17-11 record and a fourth-place OVC finish.

In 1999-00, the Govs ended 18-11 before going 22-10—the Govs first 20-win season since 1986-87 and the most regular-season wins (20) by an APSU team since 1976-77. That was topped in 2002-03.

Entering his 16th Govs coaching season, Loos has earned six "Coach of the Year" citations, four from his fellow OVC coaches and two from the Tennessee State Sports-writers Association. He was their 1995-96 and 2002-03 "College Coach of the Year."

He was named OVC "Coach of the Year" after his first APSU season (1990-91) in leading the Governors to a much-improved 15-14 record. He then began building his own program with young men who reflected their coach both on and off the court and represented the University with great class.

As a result, Loos achieved one of his program's goals—the Governors reclaiming their spot among the OVC elite and annually competing for the title. He previously restored the program's image, tarnished by an NCAA investigation prior to his arrival.

Loos became Austin Peay's 11th head men's basketball coach on July 14, 1990. The likeable 57-year-old has proven to be a "perfect fit" for APSU.

Loos came to APSU after four seasons as Memphis State's top assistant. He joined Larry Finch at Memphis State in 1986 and helped direct his alma mater to an

85-43 record, including two NCAA tourney appearances and a Metro Conference tourney title during his tenure.

Prior to joining Memphis State, Loos enjoyed four successful head coaching seasons at Christian Brothers College in Memphis. He took over that program in 1982-83, and after an initial 16-14 season, recorded three straight 20-victory campaigns.

Loos' move to CBC came after spending eight seasons as head coach at his alma mater, Mehlville High School in St. Louis.

The Missouri native played both basketball and baseball during his college days at Memphis State. Loos was the starting point guard for the 1968-69 Tigers, leading the team in minutes played. He also was the baseball Tigers' shortstop.

Upon completing his eligibility, he remained at Memphis State as an assistant in 1970. Following his graduation (1970), he officially began his coaching career as an assistant basketball coach and head baseball coach at CBC.

Loos is involved in many charitable events, including the NABC (National Association of Basketball Coaches) Coaches vs. Cancer Three-Point Attack.

He and his wife, Phyllis, have four children, David, who serves as a radio broadcaster for Governors and Lady Govs sports; Todd, Brad, a former Gov who is an assistant basketball coach at Central Missouri State, and Nicole, a former APSU dance team member who is completing her master's at the University.

Loos was inducted into the Memphis University Athletic Hall of Fame in 2002 and is a member of the St. Louis Amateur Baseball Hall of Fame as well.

Carroll McCray, Governors Head Football Coach

Carroll McCray begins his third season as Austin Peay head coach as the man who will lead the Governors football program in its transition back to scholarship play.

McCray know he faces a difficult task in APSU's last season as a non-scholarship program. He will attempt to lead the Gobs atop the Pioneer Football League South standings while also forced to look ahead to returning to scholarship football in 2006 and rejoining the Ohio Valley Conference the following year.

But APSU knew McCray was the type person who could handle such challenges when he was named APSU's 16th head coach on Jan. 20, 2003.

After spending 14 years as a Division 1-A/1-AA coach, the veteran coach ascent to his first head-coaching position was a natural one. And in doing so, became APSU's second coach in the non-scholarship era.

In fact, the Gobs four wins last season against a demanding schedule represented the sixth most by a first-year Governors coach. The Gobs also finished in a second-place tie in the PFL South, marking the first time the Gobs had finished above third place. APSU also won its first homecoming of the new century under McCray.

Prior to arriving at APSU, McCray spent his two previous seasons as an assistant at Mississippi State, coaching centers and offensive guards.

"Carroll McCray is a very knowledgeable and skilled football coach," APSU athletics director Dave Loos said on his hiring. "He is a man of great integrity who will have the best interests of our student-athletes at heart."

No truer words could have been spoken. No sooner was he named, McCray was a guest at local and area services clubs and other public gatherings. His never-ending energy was not lost on the APSU and Clarksville communities.

McCray brought 19 seasons of coaching experience to Clarksville. Prior to his hiring, he was brought to Starkville by then-offensive coordinator Sparky Woods. McCray previously served five seasons (1988-93) under Woods when the latter was head coach at South Carolina. He coached the offensive line, tight

ends, h-backs and special teams during that tenure in helping the Gamecocks in their transition to the Southeastern Conference. He coached offensive tackle Ernest Dye, the school's first all-SEC performer.

He also helped tutor three players who earned spots in the Senior Bowl and two in the Blue-Gray and East/West Shrine games.

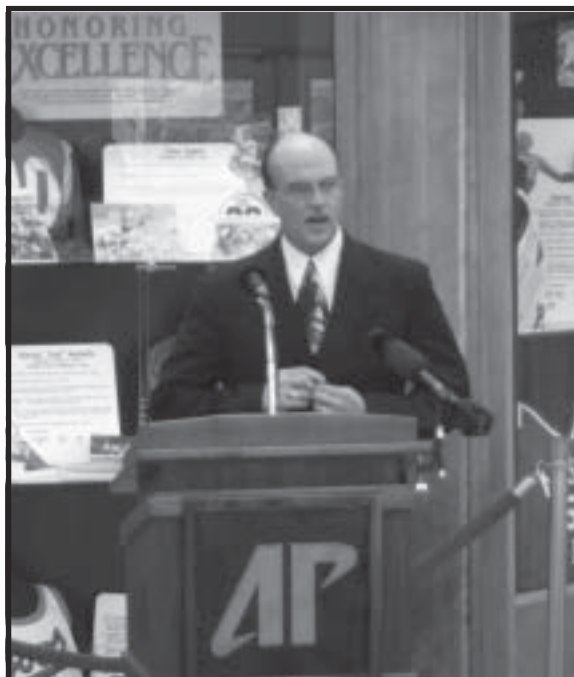
In between the two stints working with Woods, McCray worked seven seasons (1994-00) as the offensive line coach under Pete Hurt at Samford University.

While with the Bulldogs, McCray's offensive lines ranked among I-AA's best. In 2000, McCray's unit paved the way to a school-record 3,439 yards rushing and 41 touchdowns. Just one year prior, Samford averaged more than 300 yards rushing per game, the fourth highest total in Division I-AA. During his seven-year stint in Birmingham, McCray's offensive lines helped lead the way for 11 Samford running backs to gain more than 500 single-season rushing yards.

McCray began his coaching career with Woods at Appalachian State, where he served two years as a graduate assistant, working with the tight ends and tackles, and three years as an assistant in charge of the inside linebackers. While at Appalachian State, the Mountaineers compiled a 38-19-2 record. Appalachian State advanced to the NCAA Division I-AA playoffs in 1986 and again in 1987, advancing to the semifinals the latter year after eliminating defending national champion Georgia Southern.

McCray enjoyed a stellar playing career for Gardner-Webb College, an NAIA powerhouse, as an offensive lineman, earning three letters. Coincidentally, Gardner-Webb also produced Morehead State football coach Matt Ballard, a soon-to-be Pioneer Football League coaching opponent. Prior to beginning his career at Gardner-Webb, McCray was a standout lineman for Parkwood High School in Monroe, N.C.

McCray is married to the former Angel Allen. They have two children, a son, Trey, age 18, who plays football and basketball at Rossview High School, and daughter Meredith, age 13.

The Pioneer Football League Begins Fifth Year

The 2005 season marks the fifth year of the new Pioneer Football League and the 14th overall for the conference.

Five years ago, the PFL embraced its most significant changes in conference history when it became nine members strong with the addition of Austin Peay State University, Davidson College, Jacksonville University and Morehead State University to the league's newly created South Division. They joined charter members Butler University, the University of Dayton, Drake University and Valparaiso University, plus the University of San Diego (joining in 1992) forming the North Division.

The PFL is committed to operating a quality football program for the benefit of student-athletes and the university community. It is comprised of NCAA



Division I universities that previously sponsored intercollegiate football at other levels. With the passing of NCAA legislation at the January 1991 convention, Division I institutions were required to conduct all intercollegiate sports at the divisional level. Therefore, the five charter members (Evansville the fifth before dropping football in 1997) joined together, sharing a common academic and athletic philosophy and a common commitment to operate quality football programs.

The league spent its first season in 1993 under the administrative guidance of the Missouri Valley Conference, but the offices moved to St. Louis in 1994,

where current commissioner Patty Viverito took over PFL leadership.

In 1996, the Yankee Conference, a football-only conference, disbanded as its members began playing under the Atlantic-10 umbrella, making the Pioneer Football League and the Gateway Football Conference the only Division I conferences that sponsor football as their only sport. Additionally, the PFL, the Ivy League and the Patriot League are the only NCAA Division I-AA conferences that provide only need-based financial aid for football players.

The PFL remains a proponent of NCAA Division I-AA legislation that would develop a classification for Division I football programs operating with need-based aid and adopted the moniker of Pioneer based on the intent to become the first league in that new division.

Assistant Coaches – Defense

GRANVILLE EASTMAN — Defensive coordinator/Secondary

Granville Eastman is in his third season as an Austin Peay assistant, his first as defensive coordinator.

When Steve Haywood elected to return to offensive side of the football in the offseason, it was only natural that APSU head coach Carroll McCray elevate Eastman, the Governors secondary coach who had served two years as Haywood's right arm on the defensive staff.

In addition, Eastman again will work with the Governors special teams, an area that has displayed marked improvement in his two seasons.

The energetic assistant came to APSU in Spring 2003 from Tiffin (Ohio) University, where he served as a defensive assistant for four seasons.

McCray and Haywood were so impressed with Eastman in the interview

process, they delayed spring practice so proper paperwork could be finalized in the hiring process for the Toronto, Canada native.

Eastman was afforded increased responsibility in each of his four years at Tiffin. In 1999, he was hired as secondary coach while also serving as the program's academic advisor and recruiting coordinator. A year later, he was elevated to defensive coordinator in charge of the defensive line while continuing to serve as recruiting coordinator. In 2001, again he served as defensive coordinator while working with the secondary

During Summer 2002, he served an internship with the NFL's Detroit Lions and he did the same last summer with the Arizona Cardinals, learning more about special teams play.

Eastman was a two-time all-city defensive back at Leacock High School in Toronto before attending Saint Mary's University, Halifax, Canada.

There, he was a three-year letterman as a defensive back. Twice Saint Mary's played in national title games while he was there.

Eastman served one year as a volunteer coach at York University in Toronto before deciding to pursue a coaching career. From 1996-98, he served as graduate assistant at Arkansas State (1995-98) before going to working at Tiffin in 1999.



Marcus Gildersleeve — Secondary/Special Teams

One of the finest Clarksville-area football players in the last 15 years has returned home to serve as an assistant football coach in his hometown.

Marcus Gildersleeve, who starred at Northeast High School before playing his at Virginia Tech (1996-98), comes to APSU after serving two seasons as wide receivers coach at Nebraska-Omaha.

After receiving his bachelor's in Family Child Development (2000), he began his coaching career as the wide receivers and specials teams coach at the University of the South, working with his former prep coach, Rick Butler. In fact,

while at Sewanee in 2001 and 2002, his specials set an NCAA Division III single-game record by returning three blocked punts for touchdowns.

Gildersleeve entered coaching after a solid career at Virginia Tech, mostly as a wide receiver. The Hokies played in five bowl games while he was there, including the 1999 national championship game.

His best season came on 1997 when he caught 17 passes for 286 yards (16.8 ypc) and three TDs. As a junior, he was involved in two of Tech's three special teams TDs, recovering one blocked punt

for a TD and blocking another for a score.

Gildersleeve earned his way to Virginia Tech after a terrific prep career. As a senior at Northeast, he rushed for 1063 yards and 21 TDs, including one game where he rushed seven times for 256 yards and five TDs.

He is married to the former Letisha Turner. They have three children, Jayla, 4; Myla, 3; and Marcus Jr., 1.



RYAN TAYLOR — Linebackers

Ryan Taylor, who was one of the Governors leading tacklers his last three seasons as a rover/outside linebacker, begins his coaching career working with APSU's linebackers.

Despite his 5-9, 185-pound size, Taylor earned a hard-nosed reputation that resulted in him finishing no worse than sixth in team tackles in each of his final three seasons. His 75 stops as a sophomore ranked second on the team and he was sixth as a senior, despite missing two complete games following emergency surgery to repair a broken

blood vessel.

During his career, Taylor had a total of 21 tackles for loss, seven interceptions—two being returned for touchdowns—four fumble recoveries and seven forced fumbles. He also blocked a kick.

But Taylor also accomplished much off the field. The mathematics major was an eight-time member of the Athletics Director's Honor Roll (3.0 GPA) and two-time first-team member of the Pioneer Football league All-Academic team. Three times he was nominated for Academic All-America

As a result of his outstanding career both on and off the field, Taylor was named APSU's Male Joy Award recipient last spring as the most valuable senior athlete.

The Olmstead, Ky., native played linebacker and running back for Gwynne Gaddie at Logan County High School. He earned third-team all-state as a senior.

Assistant Coaches – Offense

BOB ATECA — Offensive Coordinator/Quarterbacks

Bob Ateca, who served as the Governors quarterbacks and wide receivers coach the previous two seasons, now has the title as offensive coordinator. He was elevated to the position after Ken Jones resigned last December.

After spending nearly 10 head-coaching years at the high school level, Ateca joined the Governors coaching staff in summer 2003 and proved to be a valuable addition to the Govs staff.

After handling running backs in 2003, he took over as quarterbacks and wide receivers coach in 2004.

Owning a longtime dream to coach at the college level, Ateca came to APSU after spending eight years at Clarksville

High School, the last seven as head coach. He directed the Wildcats to a pair of playoff appearances. His 2000 Wildcats finished 10-2 followed by a 7-4 mark in 2001. He continues to teach in the local school system while working with the APSU football program.

Prior to that he coach five years at Houston County, his final two as head coach, including a state playoff appearance.

The Govs offensive coordinator built an outstanding reputation in the local area with his respective schools, turning both into respectable programs.

In fact, he coached former APSU All-America running back Jay Bailey at

Clarksville High School.

Ateca is a Jacksonville, Fla., native where he played linebacker at Forrest High School. He later transferred to Hendersonville where he graduated in 1983.

Ateca attained his bachelor's degree in health and physical education from Austin Peay in 1989.

He has has wife, the former Regina Evans, have four children; Lauren, age 15; Anamarie, age 13, Isaac, age 9, and Mirian, age 2.



STEVE HAYWOOD — Assistant head coach/Offensive line

After serving four seasons as defensive coordinator, Steve Haywood has shifted back to coaching an area where he gained playing recognition—the offensive line.

The transition proved smooth during spring practice. It was the second time the former Governors offensive tackle-guard has served as offensive line coach in his five-year APSU fulltime stint. In 2000, he returned to APSU as offensive line coach after serving one season as offensive line coach at Cumberland College (Williamsburg, Ky.).

In 2001, his career took a dramatic turn when he accepted the challenge as the Govs defensive coordinator.

In a short period of time, he helped develop in the APSU's strength. He also assumed many other duties in his full-

time coaching tenure and was named assistant head coach in Summer 2002. He served as director of football operations prior to McCray's hiring.

When Carroll McCray was hired in Winter 2003, he saw Haywood's indispensable attributes and retained him as the program's defensive coordinator.

The Huntingdon, Tenn., native has spent a lot of time in Clarksville. He first came to APSU in 1993 starting at tackle as a freshman. A year later he was shifted to his more natural guard position, where he started on the right side for the next three (1994-96) years. He earned second-team All-OVC honors as sophomore and honorable mention his senior season. He also was voted team captain as a senior.

After completing his eligibility in 1996,

he remained at APSU as a student assistant offensive line coach in 1997 and then became graduate assistant a year later, working with the defensive line, giving him a different perspective on line play.

Haywood received his bachelor's degree in health and human performance in 1997 and his master's the following spring.

A two-way lineman at Huntingdon High School, he was a two-time all-district and all-West Tennessee offensive line selection.

He is married to the former Kim Laub, a former Lady Govs tennis player.



BRIAN CLAYBERN — Running backs

Brian Claybern joined APSU during early August to round out the Govs offensive coaching staff.

The former offensive lineman at Hanover (Ind.) College will serve as running backs coach.

He came to APSU after serving the past 1 1/2 years as a personal trainer in Louisville.

where he received his master's in sports administration last spring.

Claybern is a 2003 Hanover graduate, earning his bachelor's in physical education. While at Hanover he played on three Heartland College Athletic Conference championship teams and made a trio of appearances in the NCAA Division III playoffs. As a senior, Claybern was voted team captain.

A Fort Michell, Ky., native, Claybern

played his prep ball at Beechwood High School. An offensive and defensive lineman, he was a two-time (1997-98) All-Northern

Kentucky, helping Beechwood win three state titles during his career..
